Every year is a fresh beginning. The pleasure of coming together after the summer's separation and the solemn happiness of our Anniversary day is always mingled with the expectation and resolve that this year's story shall be best of all.

The last year has given much reason for thanksgiving and may well increase in us the spirit of cheerful effort and willing service. It has repeated the lesson, so slowly learned, that there need not be a period of anxiety about contributions and the fulfilment of pledges. The close of every year brings completion, and this year's results did more. Shall we not carry through all this year a confident faith and so give more thought and time to those two things in Auxiliary service which are higher than gifts—Prayer and Knowledge?

There is a marked advance in the recognition of the personal responsibility of each member of our Auxiliary, and nothing is so valuable and effective as this acknowledgment. Personal influence alone wins workers and friends for the missionary cause. There is something for every woman to do, and it lies near her hand.

A larger number of parishes than ever before have had a share in the work of the year. Some have newly come to us, and some have shown an increased interest and activity which have been very helpful. The ideal of the Auxiliary is that every parish in the Diocese shall be on its list of workers and "lend a hand" in strengthening the church at home and sending the message to "all the world."

We shall have this year as usual those "special" pledges which are to us like dear old friends, and for which the Board of Missions depends upon "Long Island." The ready and



animated response to emergency calls from the field is too delightful a privilege to forego, and we shall entirely meet our apportionment, and take up some advance work. For, there is opened to-day to the Woman's Auxiliary larger opportunity and greater need for its service than ever before in its history. Interest in missions increases everywhere as the story of missionary heroism and missionary accomplishment is repeated. And where one missionary goes, more are needed: preachers, teachers, surgeons, nurses. From East and West, North and South, urgent voices are calling, "Come and help us."

The question of personal influence and personal responsibility returns. Each one of us can add to her store of knowledge of missionaries, and the people whom they teach and serve. Each one can inspire others with the enthusiasm and the faith that grows out of such knowledge.

And above all other service Auxiliary members recognize and have proved the power of prayer. Let us appropriate the words of the old hymn, and make them a motto for the year:

Thou art coming to a King,  
Large petitions with thee bring;  
For His grace and power are such  
None can ever ask too much.

## Report of Recording Secretary

October 1909, brings us to the beginning of the Long Island Auxiliary's thirty-eighth winter. The years gone by have furnished many valuable lessons, but none greater than those of courage and faith, and so, while we look back, we do so only that the past may help and inspire the future; that this coming year of work may mean more to us as individuals, and consequently more to the world of missions, than any previous year has done.

In November, 1908, the Anniversary Meeting was held in the Church of the Incarnation, Gates Avenue. The missionary sermon at the morning Communion service was preached by the Rev. Frederick B. Carter, of St. Luke's Church, Montclair. Deeply interested in missions himself, Mr. Carter inspired us with a desire to know more of the work and of those actually carrying it on.

The generous hospitality of the ladies of the church was extended to all present at the morning service and was accepted by a large number who filled the parish house for luncheon. An interested congregation greeted the afternoon speakers and listened attentively to each one. The first address was made by the Rev. Mr. Lee, from Anking, China, at home on furlough, but spending his time of rest working hard to raise \$25,000 for the enlargement of the Anking mission schools, which fit the Chinese to labor among their own people.

Archdeacon Holden told of the needs at our very doors and the work that was crying out for help here on Long Island, where people of every nationality make it a foreign as well as diocesan field.

Dr. Lloyd in a few words brought the day to a fitting close and made us feel it had been well worth while. Home and foreign missions he said must grow together. We exist for



the spread of the Gospel, but if we do not send forth others the spirit dies within ourselves.

Our regular monthly meetings have been given increased interest by the speakers who have come to us from time to time. Mr. Wood, corresponding secretary to the Board of Missions, spoke on "The Negro Question," and pointed out the condition of the race to-day. Mrs. Hunter, of St. Augustine's, Raleigh, told how the problem is being worked out at the school and hospital and of the many proofs coming to her day by day that all the efforts we may put forth in behalf of the colored race are worth while.

Bishop Robinson, of Nevada, brought home to us the story of life in camp and mining towns, and made plain the odds against which the Church must fight in our own West.

Of life at Circle City and Fort Yukon in Arctic Alaska, Miss Lizzie Woods told us, and the contrasted condition of women in Japan thirty years ago, before Christianity had made its way, and now, was pictured by Dr. Correll, from Osaka.

The most difficult work of the Auxiliary for the year, that of fulfilling the pledges made by the various committees, has been well done. Every committee more than met its obligations; in some cases increasing the original pledges, in others giving to objects not at first planned for.

Only a part of these pledges, however, could be applied to the apportionment and we have not quite met this year the \$2,000 asked by the Board of Missions. We all understand that the whole amount pledged by the Board in undertaking its work must be raised in some way. If we fail to contribute our share the burden falls on others who have already done their duty in the matter. Let us, therefore, this coming year make still greater effort and meet our quota of the apportionment in full.

The Foreign Committee assumed the same obligations as the year before, giving to one scholarship in Mexico, two in Shanghai and the support of one hospital bed in Anking. Two



of these pledges are memorials. In addition to them, several memorial scholarships are given yearly by individuals and parishes, thus largely increasing Long Island's gifts abroad.

The work of the Indian Committee has reached in the North to Alaska, where we support the Rev. Mr. Loola as he labors among his own people under Arctic skies, and in the South to Florida, the home of the Seminoles among the Everglades.

The committee on Colored Work has again paid the dress-making teacher's salary at St. Augustine's school, Raleigh, and contributed to the support of St. Paul's, Lawrenceville, and the Bishop Payne Divinity School.

The Domestic Committee undertook pledges for the far West and farther East; Arizona and New Mexico, Utah and the Philippines. How well the work was done is indicated by the fact that the pledges in the States were increased from \$75 to \$100, and that of one hundred and fifty dollars to the Philippines was almost doubled.

The Diocesan Committee, instead of working for special objects decided to raise a certain amount for each arch-deaconry, leaving its disposal to the discretion of those in charge. This was done most satisfactorily, about \$600 passing through the committee's hands. The amount, however, could well be doubled and yet fall far short of meeting the actual needs. For Long Island, with her rapidly increasing population and need of new missions, has no help from the General Board and must look after her own.

The important work of sending missionary boxes, augmenting the efforts of the committees, has been continued as heretofore to the cheer and comfort of many homes.

In connection with the subject of giving, while we regret the loss of four parishes formerly contributing, five new ones have been gained, and the total receipts for the year, exclusive of the United Offering, were \$1,000 more than the year previous, the increase being general and not confined to the wealthy churches.



The Woman's United Offering has grown steadily during the year. It is hoped that October, 1910, may find a larger sum in the treasurer's hands than the \$5,000 sent to Richmond two years ago. It is also hoped that every churchwoman on Long Island who has not done so, will recognize her privilege to contribute to this fund, for the maintenance of work by women for women in all lands.

The Long Island Junior Auxiliary has been gaining in both numbers and contributions. Too much importance cannot be attached to developing this organization, which contains the women of to-morrow who will carry on the work in the future. This past year the Juniors furnished Christmas boxes for all the diocesan mission stations as well as some in Dakota, and gave liberally in money and boxes to work in the district of Asheville.

Under Junior Auxiliary auspices there was conducted a study class again last winter, the subject being the "How and Why of Missions." Nothing could do more to arouse an interest in missionary work than wider knowledge of this very subject.

Our youngest department, the Babies' Branch, is doing well. It more than raised its apportionment and has placed memorial fonts; one at Bridgehampton, Long Island, the other in our own chapel at Fort Yukon, Alaska. When the babies can accomplish so much, what could we not do if we really tried?

The beautiful work of the church Periodical Club has gone on during the year, bestowing untold blessing upon those in far away places who, without its ministrations, would suffer for want of mental stimulus and refreshment. We cannot estimate the good done by this forwarding to others of the books, periodicals and papers we have read. May we never think it not worth while to do so.

From the Altar Society has gone much this past year to make the new and smaller missions churchly in their appointments. There is little in the way of vestments, hangings, linens, etc., that cannot be used again, and chancel furniture



is always needed. This society works with little money, depending upon the gifts of parishes that are renewing their furnishings for its materials.

The Auxiliary year was brought to a pleasant close by the out-of-town meeting, held at Far Rockaway early in June. St. John's Church was well filled for both morning and afternoon sessions, and the luncheon hour was delightfully spent in the parish house and under the trees at the rear of the church, where the bountiful hospitality of Archdeacon Mesier and the ladies of his parish was fully appreciated.

The celebration of the Holy Communion at the morning service was followed by short addresses on the work, by several chairmen of committees. In the afternoon the principal speakers were Dr. Myers, head of St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Shanghai, and Miss Porter, now working at Tsing-Poo. The stories of the daily lives of these missionaries, who are laboring for the uplift of Chinese women, proved that all the latter want is an opportunity to hear the gospel of Christ.

These out-of-town occasions are valuable to the Auxiliary in bringing together city and country delegates, as the regular meetings cannot do, and it is hoped that they may be mutually helpful and inspiring.

Happily the Auxiliary has lost no active workers during the past year, but this summer two of its older delegates passed to the life Eternal: Mrs. J. G. Johnson and Miss Mary Rhinelanders King. Mrs. Johnson was long an interested, liberal member from St. Ann's. Miss King, for over twenty years, has been a delegate from All Saints' Church, Great Neck, and for many years attended the meetings regularly. Ever generous of her means, Miss King during her lifetime contributed largely to Auxiliary objects, and at her death gave her large fortune to charity and missions.

A few weeks ago the widow of Bishop Schereschewsky died in Tokio, Japan. In 1867, before the Long Island Auxiliary existed, Mrs. Schereschewsky, then Miss Susan Waring, went from St. Ann's, Brooklyn, to be a teacher in Shanghai.



After her marriage, Mrs. Schereschewsky continued to be interested in educational work and through her influence many schools were started. Her later years were devoted to helping her husband in his wonderful translations of the Bible.

So these Long Island women, each in her own way, recognized her opportunity to further the cause of missions. May it also be said of each one of us that we, too, were not blind to the heavenly vision.

# Women's Association of the Episcopal Church

## Constitution of the Association

Article I. Name. This Association shall be known as the Women's Association of the Episcopal Church.

Article II. Purpose. The purpose of this Association shall be to promote the spiritual and temporal welfare of the people of God.

Article III. Membership. Any woman who is a member of the Episcopal Church may become a member of this Association.

Article IV. Officers. The officers of this Association shall be:

President. The President shall be elected by the Association for a term of one year. She shall preside over the Association and represent it in all official matters. She shall also be the ex-officio president of the Episcopal Church in the United States.

## Article V. Officers

Vice-President. The Vice-President shall be elected by the Association for a term of one year. She shall assist the President in all official matters and represent the Association in the absence of the President.

## Article VI. Officers

Secretary. The Secretary shall be elected by the Association for a term of one year. She shall keep the records of the Association and see that the dues are collected.

## Article VII. Officers

Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be elected by the Association for a term of one year. She shall be responsible for the financial affairs of the Association.

## Article VIII. Officers

Members-at-Large. There shall be a number of members-at-large elected by the Association for a term of one year. They shall assist the officers in all official matters.

## Article IX. Officers

Committees. The Association may appoint such committees as it may deem necessary for the carrying out of its purpose.

## Report of the United Offering Chairman

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The United Offering is the women's thank-offering of the whole Church. It is made triennially, at a Eucharist of thanksgiving, and is devoted to missions for women. The last presentation of the United Offering, amounting to nearly \$225,000, occurred in October, 1907, in Richmond, Va., the Diocese of Long Island contributing \$5,260.65. The next United Offering will be made in Cincinnati, Ohio, in October, 1910. What shall be the amount of our gift?

The year which has just closed, from October 1, 1908, to October 1, 1909, is the second of this three-year period, and shows encouraging gains. The amount received during the second year is double that of the first year, while nineteen additional churches have become contributors.

To bring this Offering to the knowledge of the women of the Church, there should be in each parish of every diocese and missionary district, one devoted woman to act as United Offering Treasurer, whose duty and privilege it is, to tell to the women of her parish the inspiring story of this Offering. All Treasurers should be provided with mite-boxes and leaflets, for distribution. The boxes should be opened twice a year, in March and September, and the contents forwarded by the Treasurer to the Diocesan Chairman. The amount received is immediately placed in bank, that it may begin to draw interest on the first of April, and the first of October.

An annual meeting is held in Lent, for the instruction and encouragement of any who are interested in the United Offering, and all are welcome. The meeting is especially designed to aid United Offering Treasurers in their work, and they are earnestly desired to attend, for the occasion is important. Notices of these meetings are sent to the Treasurers, and the rectors of parishes are asked to announce the date, that all



who desire may be present. Such a meeting was held on April first, when the large rooms at the Diocesan House were filled with an intent company from all over the Island. It was a great privilege to have as the speaker of the day, the Rev. Dr. Arthur S. Lloyd, the retiring General Secretary of the Board of Missions. No one who was present can forget the wonderful inspiration of that occasion, nor lose its resulting encouragement.

This Diocese now has seventy parochial United Offering Treasurers. There should be many more. It is the aim of the Chairman to have a Treasurer in each parish, through whom it should be possible to reach every Church-woman in the diocese. Until this is accomplished our offering is not, in the highest sense, a "United" Offering. The Chairman is ready to do all in her power to stimulate interest, and to help to make our part in this work worthy of the Diocese of Long Island, and of so great a cause. She will gladly visit any parish whose members wish to know more of the Women's Thank Offering.

There are now, in the domestic and foreign missionary fields, one hundred and sixty-five United Offering missionaries. They are women sent out to minister to women, in the name of Our Lord, and their maintenance is wholly dependent upon this fund. Let it be our part to increase their usefulness by our loving offerings, given in thankfulness for personal blessing, for our Christian heritage, and for the high privilege of furthering the Church's mission to mankind.

## Report of Junior Auxiliary

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The work of the Junior Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of Long Island has gone quietly and steadily on this year. In the fall about 30 Christmas boxes of toys, Christmas tree ornaments and candy were sent to different Mission schools, from Long Island to South Dakota.

On January 9th, the Saturday after Epiphany, the fourth annual meeting of the Long Island Juniors was held at the Diocesan House. As our branch of the Juniors had selected for the special object of their offerings this year, the work among the Mountain Whites in the district of Asheville, we were very fortunate in having with us at our annual meeting Mrs. Walter Hughson, who gave a most interesting account of the missionary work in that district. She also told of her particular work, Grace Hospital at Morganton. Miss Lindley, of New York, spoke most helpfully on the spiritual side of the Junior work. Tea was served at the close of the meeting.

The Normal Study Class on "The How and Why of Foreign Missions" was held by Miss Arrowsmith at the Diocesan House during the Epiphany season.

Boxes containing clothing and hospital supplies have been sent by the Juniors at different times during the year. The total value of the boxes amounted to about \$786.37.

Regular monthly meetings of the Parish officers and delegates have been held at the Diocesan House. At the meeting in February Mrs. Heinigke spoke on, "What the Juniors Can Do For the United Offering."

## The Babies' Branch of Little Helpers

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Object: *To train a child from baptism in habits of praying and giving for missions.*

Who are the Little Helpers? They are the band of baptized children who are dropping a gift in their little red mite-boxes each Sunday and with prayer and gifts are helping the Board of Missions meet its obligations.

On Holy Innocents' Day a special children's service is held that all the Little Helpers may unite in making their annual offering. This bringing in of gifts we would make a red letter day, not only to the children, but in the history of every parish. At the service held on last Holy Innocents' Day in Christ Church chantry, it was a joy to welcome secretaries and Little Helpers from almost every parish branch.

In making a distribution of the offerings, the first gift was to the Board of Missions, meeting our appointment in full. The second was to Bishop Kendrick, which helped the Woman's Auxiliary meet its apportionment, and we also gave to other Auxiliary pledges.

But the sweetest of all gifts is the font which the Babies send to a mission each year. Such a gift Miss Woods took back to Alaska from our little Long Island Babies. The brass bowl which she purchased before leaving New York is to stand on a pedestal made from a native tree and be used for a font in St. Stephen's Chapel, Fort Yukon. Nasturtium seeds have also been sent to the little Indian children to plant in that "land of ice and snow."

Miss Emery tells us that the Little Helpers in sixty-one dioceses have given to general missions this year \$3,487.61, \$778 more than the year before. They have doubled their pledge for the Little Helpers' bed in St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh, and all the other pledges are more than filled. Instead



of the one font pledged they have this year given two; one to a mission in the district of Kyoto that Miss Emery visited in her journey around the world; the other will be given to one of our Western missionary districts.

For the coming year \$4,000 will be the Babies' Branch apportionment; \$30 the Long Island share.

We are most grateful for the success of our work during the past year, but we need the co-operation of every parish in this diocese if out of littleness greatness shall grow.

Branches have been organized in the following parishes during the past year:

Christ Church, Bay Ridge; Epiphany Church, Ozone Park; St. Stephen's, Brooklyn; Church of the Ascension, E. D.; Grace Church, E. D.; Holy Trinity, Brooklyn Heights; St. Matthew's, Brooklyn Manor; St. John's, Far Rockaway.

Boxes containing infants' clothing and Christmas gifts have been sent by the parish secretary to the Home Mission, Virginia, for the poor whites; to the Canal Zone; to St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh, N. C., and to Miss Woods, Ft. Yukon, Alaska. Value about \$50.

Two thousand five hundred and sixty new current magazines sent regularly; 70 Bibles and Testaments; 100 Prayer Books and Hymnals; 3,000 books; 824 tracts and catechisms; 12,500 Christmas, Easter and Sunday School cards; 3,000 calendars; 2,513 Christmas and Easter carols; 130 pieces of music; 7,500 pictures; 100 games; 50,000 odd numbers of magazines and 51 boxes and barrels, contents uncounted.

These figures represent much self-denial and many hours of faithful, patient labor. But God has ordained that all things worth while shall be attained through work. As was lately said by one of His ambassadors, "When God wishes you to act like a disembodied spirit, He will disembody you." So, then, let us labor on, remembering that our great Example came not to be ministered unto, but to minister unto others.

New fields open to us every year. The last brought the Canal Zone, where Archdeacon Bryan begs our help for the seventeen Episcopal congregations under his care, including 30,000 West Indians. All attend church and clamor particularly for church literature. Deaconess Carter asks for children's papers for her lonely mission at St. John's in the Wilderness, Alaska. Miss Arnold and Miss Reed, in their canyon at Happy Camp, California, thank God for the "Mail Bag Missionaries," which have come to their aid, for no wheel can enter that narrow gorge.

Among the many lonely lives to which the Church Periodical Club has ministered, no greater results have been shown than in the prisons, where the supply of reading matter has led to correspondence with the inmates; some of whom have written



that although condemned to life-long sentence, they could yet gratefully acknowledge the Wisdom which had led their hearts under the power of the sacred Word. From a distant lightship a sailor wrote, "We do not know just what the letters C. P. C. stand for, but whatever it may be, God Bless It."

On January 11th, of this year, was celebrated the twenty-first anniversary of the founding of the Church Periodical Club. The meeting was presided over most ably by the late Dr. William R. Huntington, of Grace Church, New York, who commended most heartily the work and its results. Its field is the world, and its possibilities are only bounded by the generosity in money, labor and material of those whose lives God has so richly blessed. There is no one who shall read these words who cannot help in this work, and it is verily the "cup of cold water," which, however given, shall in no case lose its reward.

## Report of Mission Study Class

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The Diocesan Mission Study Class, for the season of 1909, began meetings on January 7th and continued until March 5th. Nine members were enrolled, representing eight parishes, while one member came from the Reformed Dutch Church of Flatbush.

The subjects studied were a short sketch of Missions among the Mountaineers of the South, chosen because the juniors of this diocese concentrated all offerings on work in the district of Asheville and the principal part of the work, *The How and Why of Foreign Missions*. The class read, in connection with the text-book, six books on the subject of missions in general. They belong to the Auxiliary, and may be freely used. These and former sets are to be had at 170 Clinton Street, Brooklyn.

This course, at first glance rather dry, proved very interesting as well as instructive, treating of the motives and methods of carrying on missions. Some of the topics were *Foreign Missionary Administration*, on the organization and methods of the Board of Missions; *Qualifications of Missionaries*; *Financial Support* and *The Native Church*.

It was disappointing to find that, after the members of the class had done very good work and were enthusiastic, they found little, if any, opportunity to use what they had studied. So, instead of being able to report a number of parish classes, as a result, it must be stated that very little was accomplished.

# Constitution and By-Laws

OF THE

## Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions

### Diocese of Long Island

#### CONSTITUTION.

##### ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the LONG ISLAND BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

##### ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

##### ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all delegates representing parishes in the Diocese, said delegates being appointed by the rector of such parishes, each delegate paying an annual due of one dollar. There shall be at least two and not more than five delegates from each parish.

##### ARTICLE IV.

The officers of the Association shall be a President, a First Vice-President and a Second Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer.

There shall be, moreover, an Advisory Board, consisting of five or more delegates, appointed by the President. These, with the above-named officers, shall constitute the Executive Committee.



## ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board, to call special meetings of the same when the occasion shall arise, to countersign all drafts upon the Treasurer, and to obtain fresh information from Missions, to be read at the stated meetings of the Association.

## ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to preside, in the absence of the President, over the meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board.

## ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association, and to prepare the Annual Report.

## ARTICLE VIII.

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, and to send out all notices of the stated and special meetings of the same.

## ARTICLE IX.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts upon the funds, when countersigned by the President, and to present an Annual Report.

## ARTICLE X.

Any Parish in the Diocese too remote for representation shall, on the annual payment of not less than two dollars, be entitled to report its work to this Association.

## ARTICLE XI.

The Constitution shall not be altered, except at an annual meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Association.



## By-Laws

### I.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the second Thursday of May, in each year, at such hour and place as the Advisory Board shall direct.

### II.

The election of Officers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

A Nominating Committee shall be appointed by the President at the March business meeting, consisting of three delegates, none of whom shall be an officer. This Committee shall send to each delegate a slip containing the name of every office printed, and a place opposite each in which she may write the name of her choice for that office. From these slips, which should be filled out immediately and returned, a ticket shall be made out containing, if possible, two names for each office. Only those persons nominated in the preliminary ballot shall be eligible. This ticket shall be printed and given to every delegate on the day of the annual meeting in May. At this meeting each delegate shall indicate her choice by scratching the name she does not want, leaving but one candidate for each office. The ballot box shall be in charge of three delegates appointed by the President, whose duty it shall be to erase from the roll the name of each delegate as she casts her ballot, and to count and record the vote.

### III.

In case of any vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Advisory Board, and any one so appointed shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

### IV.

All persons contributing to the treasury, annually, at least the sum of one dollar, shall be members of the Association, but not entitled to vote.

### V.

The stated meetings of the Association shall be held on the second Thursday of each month, except that the November meeting shall take place on the first Thursday of the month, the second Thursday being the Anniversary. Place of meeting to be determined by Association.

There shall be no stated meetings in June, July, August or September.



## VI.

In all matters of importance a resolution shall be brought before the Association, to be deferred to the next meeting for decision, unless passed by a unanimous vote.

## VII.

At a meeting of the Association any number of delegates present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and at the annual meeting of the Association a number of delegates, equal to one-half of the number of parishes represented therein, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

## VIII.

At the monthly meetings of the Association the order of business shall be: 1. Devotional services. 2. Minutes of the last meeting. 3. Treasurer's report. 4. Intermission. 5. Calling of the roll. 6. Reports of Parishes and Committees. 7. Unfinished business. 8. Miscellaneous business.
