

Report of the Recording Secretary

The General Convention held in New York during October, began the season of 1913-14 with special inspiration and interest. The Triennial meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary gave a most vivid sense of the love and zeal for missions felt by women all over the land. The very heart beat of the Auxiliary work was heard at the great United Offering Service in the Cathedral of St. John the Divine when the offering of praise, of prayer, of thanksgiving, of service and of gifts was made to the majestic chant of, "On Thine alter laid we leave them, Christ present them, God receive them." Briefly the offering for 1910-13 was \$307,000, Long Island's share was \$9,533.03.

As the next door neighbors of New York, Long Island women enjoyed the opportunity of going to all the Conferences and meetings of the Triennial, where every phase of the Auxiliary work was discussed, and had the privilege also of meeting splendid leaders and workers from all parts of the country. One Saturday afternoon, late in October, we entertained all these visitors from far away at Garden City. A special train carried the party to their destination, and in the Cathedral of the Incarnation we heard from the lips of Bishop Talbot, Bishop Gailor and Bishop Partridge of the broadest, noblest aspects of Missionary endeavor. In our Bishop's house the cordial hospitality of this Diocese was offered, and St. Mary's School, St. Paul's School and the House of St. Giles the Cripple were thrown open for the inspection of the guests. Miss Benson and Mrs. Harold Arrowsmith planned and carried through a most delightful day.

Two objects of importance in the Foreign field came so persistently before the meetings during the Triennial that their urgency could not be withstood. St. Mary's School, Shanghai, in need of land and buildings, St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, facing a magnificent opportunity to enlarge its influence, made definite and irresistible demands. Large pledges were made

to each, and every Diocesan branch rose to do its share. Long Island's leaders pledged to St. Mary's fund \$100, to St. Luke's \$250. Within one month the loyalty of the delegates in the Diocese had more than met these pledges. The offerings at our Anniversary service were voted for this purpose and \$280 was placed upon the Altar at that service. Bishop Burgess, who presided at our November Anniversary, put the pledges before us so forcefully, the words of Bishop Rowe, Bishop Padock and Bishop Huntington were so uplifting, the morning sermon by Dr. Stearly and the whole atmosphere of our day at the Church of the Good Shepherd were so helpful, that the offering was just the outpouring of thankful hearts. Before the year was out these sums had increased to \$141 for St. Mary's and \$440 for St. Luke's.

Meanwhile the routine of our Diocesan Branch was getting under way. The seven re-elected officers went on as in the year just passed. The chairmen of the five committees presented their pledges and set to work to meet them. Miss Atwater for the Diocesan Committee added something to the Queens and Nassau pledge. In January the chairman went on a long vacation and the work of this committee went into the hands of Mrs. Rogers and Mrs. Taylor for completion. All the pledges were met. In memory of Mrs. Willard her daughter, Miss Gladys Willard, will send to this committee \$100 a year for the next five years to be used for the Church of the Annunziazione in Brooklyn. In memory of Mrs. Willard also, the Auxiliary gave to the same church, a silver chalice and paten bearing the inscription, "In memory of Mary C. Willard, a member since 1889 of the Long Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, and for many years a faithful and valued officer. Presented to the Church of the Annunziazione by her friends and fellow workers in the Auxiliary. Feast of All Saints, 1913."

The Domestic Committee, under Mrs. Preller, added to its list of pledges one for the work of Bishop Atwood in Arizona. When the Bishop spoke to us of his work there,

this pledge was gladly accepted and a "special" gift of \$100 was made toward St. Luke's Home for Tuberculosis Sufferers in Phoenix. The Rev. Stuart Tyson told us graphically of work in the Southern mountains, so some of the far corners of our land were brought very near to our thoughts.

The Committee on Colored Work accepted, at Miss Schapp's suggestion, the same pledges that it has carried faithfully and long. Archdeacon Russell in telling us of St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., told what the Church is really trying to do for the Colored people of this land in all the schools under her care. With pledge fulfilled, this committee received in memory of Mrs. Jane A. Benson gifts of \$1,000 each for St. Philips' Church, Brooklyn, and St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C., from Miss Mary Benson. The Good Friday offering was sent to St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh, N. C.

Mrs. Langstaff submitted for the Indian Committee their pledge of long standing. We heard much of the Indians in the Yukon Valley when Archdeacon Stuck gave an illustrated lecture on a winter journey among them. A "special" of interest was made to help pay the salary of an associate worker for Mr. Hoare in Tijora, and the offering at the Out-of-town meeting was given to Miss Langdon as a personal gift, to replace in small measure some of the things she lost in the fire which destroyed the Mission House in Tanana.

The Foreign Committee pledges, under Mrs. Arrowsmith's direction, took us into many schools and some hospitals scattered round the world. All these were met, and through the influence of the General Convention this committee had a magnificent total of "specials" to report at the close of the year. Bishop Kinsolving, of Brazil, the Rev. Mr. Correll, of Tokyo, and Mrs. Ely, of Shanghai, came during the winter to tell us of various foreign fields.

The work of the Box Committee, when Miss White felt obliged to lay it down, was taken up by Mrs. Reynolds of the Church of the Incarnation. Her familiarity with the outside

workings of a Box Committee made it easy for her to manage the inside workings of it when she took the lead.

Mrs. Gibson, of St. John's Church, Huntington, was appointed Chairman of the Altar Committee, and she brought to the work much of the energy and zeal which had characterized it under Mrs. Willard's loving guidance.

The Juniors and Little Helpers reported general well being and some extension work. The Educational Secretary enlarged her duties and held, as usual, a Normal Mission Study Class in the Epiphany season. Books on Missions are in circulation now at all the Auxiliary meetings, and it is hoped that they will be much in demand. Mrs. Bellows, Miss Kröger and Miss Arrowsmith spoke of the work in these three departments every month.

The Church Periodical Club, as Mrs. Heinigke tells of it, is a very interesting subject at all our meetings. Through the efforts of the Club copies of "The Spirit of Missions" may now be found in many Branches of the Public Libraries, notably, in this city, in the Montague Branch.

Long Island shared in the gift which was made by the whole Auxiliary to Miss Julia C. Emery as an expression of appreciation of her long years of service as General Secretary. The gift was presented by Bishop Lloyd at the Auxiliary Rally in Carnegie Hall, when hundreds of Auxiliary women who had shared in making the gift were present.

Beginning in February, a box was provided at our meetings in which small gifts could be received for the speaker of the day; gifts too small perhaps to go alone on the long journey through the hands of Parish, Diocesan and General Treasurer, but gifts none the less worthy and loving. This has proved a most acceptable plan and the speakers have received in these last few months offerings which have been a direct response to their own words to us.

A few changes only are found in the list of delegates, some new Parishes added, some dropped, some new individual names, some old ones missing. It is along this line

that serious work must be done in the near future for the good of the Auxiliary; there are too many Parishes in the Diocese *not* represented in our work. It may be that our zeal for a strong advance would awaken in this Diocese the "Spirit of Missions," which is so dormant that never yet has the missionary apportionment of Long Island been met.

One more of the charter members who has seen full forty years of work in the Auxiliary has entered into her rest; Miss Nannie Prout of the Church of the Incarnation died in January. In April Mrs. W. F. Hayward, a delegate from St. Jude's Church, passed from this life. We honor them both for their service to the cause of Missions.

In May the Out-of-Town meeting was held in St. John's Church, Huntington. Although we all regretted the absence of Miss Benson on account of illness, the day was happy and full of interest. The Rev. Mr. Sherman told us about Hankow and Missions; Miss Langdon told us about Tanana and Missions, and the Rev. Nathan Matthews told us about Liberia and Missions. The Juniors had a Conference in which they planned great things for the coming winter. Their smiling young faces were most welcome among us and added to the pleasure of our day.

The meeting in Suffolk County was held in St. Luke's Church, East Hampton, in August. Miss Hobart, librarian at the Church Missions House, spoke on the Study Course for the coming year. "Social Aspects of Foreign Missions," Dr. Mary Glenton, told of hospital work in Wuchang, China, and the President of the Long Island Branch made an address. Miss Hobart gave also impersonations in costume of "Ah Meh," a Chinese schoolgirl in St. Mary's, Shanghai, and of "Singing Thrush," an Ojibway Indian squaw. The delegates to the meeting were entertained at tea by Mrs. Carson, a parish branch president for New York, whose summer home is in East Hampton. This fourth annual meeting in Suffolk was most enjoyable, all who attended were enthusiastic in their praise of the plan and its results.

Familiar tasks, familiar methods, familiar names make up the Annual Report year after year. Only a renewing spirit can save workers and methods and tasks from failing for very sameness. Spirit of the living God, touch Thou each one!

Report of the Junior Auxiliary

The Junior Department of the Long Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has completed its ninth year. The Annual meeting was held on January 3, 1914, at the Diocesan House. The Rev. Charles B. Ackley gave a very interesting address on our Missions in Cuba, and Dr. Mary Thurston spoke of the medical work in China. Tea was served after the meeting by the Helping Hand Chapter of St. Paul's Church, Flatbush. The Normal Study Class met during the Epiphany season at the Diocesan House. The book used this year was "The Emergency in China," by Dr. Potts, of St. John's College, Shanghai. The class was led as usual by the Educational Secretary, Miss Arrowsmith. Several Parish classes were held during Lent.

Before Christmas a number of boxes containing clothes, books, toys and candy were sent to Porto Rico, the Oneida Indians, the Mountain Whites, and Colored Missions in the Diocese. Boxes were also sent during the year to various Mission institutions and schools. Thirty-two boxes being sent in all. The Junior Auxiliary also sent a very large number of books, magazines, calendars, Christmas and Easter cards through the Church Periodical Club. The total value of the boxes amounted to \$497.77. \$116.16 was given to General Missions. The total amount of money raised being \$167.16.

Regular monthly meetings of the Junior officers and delegates have been held during the winter and spring at the Diocesan House.

The Babies' Branch of Little Helpers

Object: *To train a child from baptism in habits of praying and giving for Missions.*

At the Annual Service on April 25th the attendance was larger than at any time since work was started in the Diocese, and, notwithstanding the continuous rain, many present came from far away parishes. The exhibit, which has become a part of the Annual Service, was added to this year by a representation of Hayti, where a font was sent—a gift from all dioceses. At the request of the Associate Secretary of the Church Missions House, the whole exhibit was placed in the Jerusalem Chamber, St. Michael's Parish House, New York, at the time of the General Convention of 1913. When the diocesan service was held in the Cathedral at Garden City for the presentation of the United Offering, hidden in the heart of a star was the Little Helpers' offering of gold. The star has come to mean much to the little Long Island Helpers. Badges of blue with a silver star were given to each member at the Annual Service, and in speaking to the children Miss Kuhlke told them how the star represented light with each point showing something that all true Little Helpers could do for Missions—Pray, Love, Give, Hear and Tell. It is a source of encouragement that secretaries who have removed from the Diocese have found others to continue the work. And still others whom we feared were lost to us, have returned with new branches, St. Gabriel's, Hollis, St. James, Brooklyn.

Report of the Church Periodical Club

The Church Periodical Club presents its twenty-sixth Annual Report as follows:

Three thousand current periodicals sent regularly. There have been distributed 60 Bibles and Testaments, 245 Prayer Books and Hymnals, 2,090 Books, 1,423 Tracts and Catechisms, 44,408 Christmas and Easter Cards, 1,833 Calendars, 7,789 Picture Cards; Carols and Music, 1,200; 341 games, 35 scrap books, 13,000 pictures, 49,440 odd numbers and 56 boxes, contents uncounted. In considering the labor, patience and self-denial of the donors, the uplift, gratitude and appreciation of the recipients, which these figures represent, it was pleasant to hear the assertion that the most valuable man in a corporation is he who has found a use for the waste material.

It was a pleasing co-incidence that the Triennial Convention which was held last year in our city, occurred in the twenty-fifth year of the life of the Club, and no one could have foreseen the inspiration and encouragement which resulted therefrom. Inspiration from the presence of Bishops, Archdeacons and Missionaries, who rejoiced in the opportunity of testifying to the invaluable assistance of the Club in their work, and suggesting new methods of usefulness, encouragement in the new fields opened to it, and the eagerness with which their representatives besought its aid.

Perhaps the most important work of the Club is attested by the letter of a Missionary who wrote, "We depend upon you for the equipment for our work; the other religious bodies are so well supplied with all working materials, our material is so much higher in price that it is impossible to obtain more than a very meagre supply;" and the reply of an Archdeacon to a proffer of assistance by a church worker, "I have no equipment for you except the promise of a Traveling Library from the C. P. C." What a privilege to labor together with Christ's ambassadors.

May the new season of service on which we are entering be equally blessed to those who give and those who receive.

Report of the Educational Secretary

The Diocesan Mission Study Class was held at the Diocesan House as usual, beginning directly after Epiphany. Six parishes were represented, several members who intended to join being prevented by illness.

The text-book, *The Emergency in China*, proved very interesting and roused much enthusiasm, shown in the excellent parish work of the members afterward. A class of twenty-four, with average attendance of eighteen, was held at St. John's; a remarkable class at St. Matthew's gave a contribution to the New China Fund, and an interested class met at Christ Church. An experiment of grouping several parishes was very successful in a class at St. James, composed of members from three parishes.

Several study classes and meetings were held elsewhere in the Diocese, but all of this work is not reported, we feel sure.

The text-book for this season is *Social Aspects of Foreign Missions*, by W. H. P. Faunce, President of Brown University, and for children, *Building the City*, by Miss Payton. Talks on educational work and methods will be given at any parish if requests are made to the Educational Secretary, who is ready to supply pamphlets and to loan books on Missions.

Reports of all study classes, programme meetings and all educational work should be sent promptly.

An urgent plea is made to all parishes for contributions of all kinds of altar linens and furniture, vestments for clergy or choir, music, and books for use in the service of the Church, which for any reason may be of no further use in the parish.

Such donations can be disposed of as the demands arise, for use in our Diocesan Missions, or for Auxiliary boxes.

The Committee meet the last Friday of each month from 10 to 12, in the Woman's Auxiliary room in the Diocesan House, and cordially invite any member of the Woman's Auxiliary to pay them a visit bringing materials, or requests for sewing, for they hope to interest all the Parochial Altar Guilds in doing Altar Auxiliary work in the Diocese, and so fulfil the command,

"And thou shalt make a hanging of blue and purple and scarlet and fine twined linen, wrought with needlework." Exo. 26, 36.

Constitution and By-Laws
OF THE
Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions
Diocese of Long Island

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the LONG ISLAND BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all delegates representing parishes parishes, each delegate paying an annual due of one dollar. There shall be at least two and not more than five delegates from each parish. Any parish too remote for regular representation shall be allowed an alternate in the Diocese, said delegates being appointed by the rector of such for every delegate appointed, without any extra dues.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of the Association shall be a President, a First Vice-President and a Second Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer.

There shall be, moreover, an Advisory Board, consisting of five or more delegates, appointed by the President. These, with the above-named officers, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board, to call special meetings of the same when the occasion shall arise, to countersign all drafts upon the Treasurer, and to obtain fresh information from Missions, to be read at the Stated meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to preside, in the absence of the President, over the meetings of the Association and of the Advisory Board.

ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association, and to prepare the Annual Report.

ARTICLE VIII.

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, and to send out all notices of the stated and special meetings of the same.

ARTICLE IX.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts upon the funds, when countersigned by the President, and to present an Annual Report.

ARTICLE X.

The Constitution shall not be altered, except at an annual meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Association.

By-Laws

I.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the second Thursday of May, in each year, at such hour and place as the Advisory Board shall direct.

II.

The election of Officers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

A Nominating Committee shall be appointed by the President at the March business meeting, consisting of three delegates, none of whom shall be an officer. This Committee shall send to each delegate a slip containing the name of every office printed, and a place opposite each in which she may write the name of her choice for that office. From these slips, which should be filled out immediately and returned, a ticket, shall be made out containing, if possible, two names for each office. Only those persons nominated in the preliminary ballot shall be eligible. This ticket shall be printed and given to every delegate on the day of the annual meeting in May. At this meeting each delegate shall indicate her choice by scratching the name she does not want, leaving but one candidate for each office. The ballot box shall be in charge of three delegates appointed by the President, whose duty it shall be to erase from the roll the name of each delegate as she casts her ballot, and to count and record the vote.

III.

In case of any vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Advisory Board, and any one so appointed shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IV.

All persons not delegates contributing to the treasury, annually, at least the sum of one dollar, shall be members of the Association, but not entitled to vote.

V.

The stated meetings of the Association shall be held on the second Thursday of each month, except that the November meeting shall take

place on the first Thursday of the month, the second Thursday being the Anniversary. Place of meeting to be determined by Association.

There shall be no stated meetings in June, July, August or September.

VI.

In all matters of importance a resolution shall be brought before the Association, to be deferred to the next meeting for decision, unless passed by a unanimous vote.

VII.

At a meeting of the Association any number of delegates present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and at the annual meeting of the Association a number of delegates, equal to one-half of the number of parishes represented therein, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VIII.

At the monthly meetings of the Association the order of business shall be: 1. Devotional services. 2. Minutes of the last meeting. 3. Treasurer's report. 4. Calling of the roll. 5. Reports of Parishes and Committee. 6. Unfinished business. 7. Miscellaneous business.
