In Memoriam—Mary Benson

At the October meeting a committee was appointed to draw up suitable resolutions in memory of Miss Benson, and at the November meeting Mrs. R. S. Fanning, Chairman of the Committee, presented the following, which were unanimously adopted:

RESOLUTIONS OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Miss Mary Benson, the beloved Honorary President of the Long Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, was very suddenly called to her heavenly home on Thursday, the 10th of October.

The Auxiliary, desiring to put on record its profound grief in its loss and its appreciation of her inspiring and able leadership, has, by resolution, ordered the following minute spread upon its record:

Miss Benson's name first appears in the books in 1887, when she was first delegate from Grace Church, later as Chairman of the Colored Work, then Second Vice-President, and in 1909 until 1917 as President, which office she filled with rare ability until a year ago, when, ill health compelling her to relinquish active work, she was made Honorary President of the Auxiliary. In every office she gave of her best, forwarding the cause of missions so near her heart not only as a bounden duty but as a joyful service. Most truly did she obey the Master's command,

"Go ye into all the world," by her loyal support and many and always liberal gifts so lovingly and lavishly bestowed. There are many who "rise up and call her blessed."

Her personality was an inspiration to all who knew her. Gracious, considerate, buoyant, she radiated an atmosphere of harmony where varied opinions might always find a safe and satisfactory expression.

Her leadership was keen and constructive, and the spirituality of her own life made its beautiful and ennobling imprint upon all with whom she labored; her ardent enthusiasm was contagious and her graceful hospitality most lavish.

She loved much, but a record of her work would not be adequate without making mention of her devotion to the colored cause. To it she gave of her sympathy, her talents and her substance in fullest measure.

It will be difficult indeed for her co-workers to take up the task that she has laid down, but they believe that in communion with that great company of the victorious saints she has found a place where she may still work with us unseen, but truly a living witness for the coming of Christ's kingdom among men.

Hers was a life spent in doing for others, a life of loving service, and when the Master's call came it was but a translation, just a step beyond the veil, there to behold the "King in His beauty." And above the sadness of the separation one can almost hear the note of triumph and the words "Come ye blessed of my Father, receive the kingdom prepared for you."

"We give Thee hearty thanks for the good example of all those Thy servants, who having finished their course do now rest from their labors."

Report of Recording Secretary

This is a record of the year 1918, a sad and anxious one in many respects, but also one with many causes for thankfulness, and one of the greatest of these is the thought that the spreading of the Gospel of Christ, which is our work, has gone steadily on and that others beside ourselves have learned to think in world-wide terms. As Bishop McCormick said at our anniversary meeting, "Now we see the whole world recognizing what we have always maintained, that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is for the whole world," and it "is readjusting to these ideas and we are coming into our own."

We have all, as individuals, been called upon as never before to help in many worthy causes, but Auxiliary meetings have been just as faithfully attended, pledges just as generously filled, and extra calls responded to as heartily as if it were not a year of war with its many anxieties and privations.

We have held eight regular and one special meeting with an average attendance of 129 members.

Our speakers have been the Rev. Mr. Hilton, of Morganton, N. C.; Mr. John Thomas, Field Secretary of the Diocesan Social Service Committee; Bishop Burleson, of South Dakota; the Rev. Edwin H. Goold, who is now in charge of St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C.; Miss Helen Littell, who speaks on China; Miss Cady, who is assistant to Miss Thackara at the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Fort Defiance, Arizona; Mrs. Biller, of the Church Missions House, New York, and Mrs. McCord, of our own diocese, both of whom spoke on the Advent Call, and the Rev. Mr. Creasy, of Fort Hall Indian Mission, Idaho.

At our out-of-town meeting held at St. George's Church, Hempstead, a day long to be remembered, we listened to Mrs.

H. B. Taylor, of St. James Hospital, Anking, China; the Rev. Mr. Sedgwick, of Calvary Church, New York, and the Rev. Mr. Silver, who at that time was chaplain at West Point.

At our anniversary service, held at St. Ann's Church, we listened to Bishop McCormick, of Western Michigan; the Rev. Mr. Tong, of Shanghai, and Dr. William C. Sturgis, Educational Secretary of the Board of Missions. This was our Forty-sixth Anniversary and another day that will linger most delightfully in our memory.

These speakers fill us with a desire to do better things. As we listened to Mr. Hilton telling of his work among mill hands, mountain people and colored people, more than one man can manage; to Miss Cady, who with Miss Thackara does all the hospital work, gets meals for eighteen people and still tries to get in some education for the Indian boys who need it so sorely; as we heard Mrs. Taylor tell of what could be done at St. James with the proper equipment; as we listened to the awful conditions in China described by Miss Littell, and to Mr. Creasy telling of the wonders that can be done for the Indian boy and girl, with much love and patience and so little money, it showed an amount of self sacrifice almost beyond comprehension and made us wonder that more are not eager to "come over and help us" in this all-important work of saving God's little ones.

In special work done, surely the "Advent Call" must take first place; to those of us who felt timid and wondering as to the outcome, a most wonderful revelation has come; such hearty co-operation from our rectors, such kindly welcome from the people visited, such beautiful and uplifting services, and to one parish at least the memory of a saint, Bishop Courtney, who, standing on the borderline as he seemed and most truly was, preached on that first Sunday in Advent from the text, "In everything, by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known unto God," showing us the friend that God might be to us if we would, and his own conception of prayer. As one remembers him now, it is with joy to think of him as being forever with the Friend he loved above all other.

The result of the Advent Call we may never know, but many little things show that it is bearing fruit. Of Miss Kuhlke's and Mrs. McCord's untiring efforts to make it what it was, too much cannot be said. In a spirit of consecration they undertook it, and God blessed and prospered it.

Another special and important thing done, under the auspices of the Foreign Committee, was the completion of \$1,000, Long Island's additional pledge for the Church General Hospital at Wuchang, China, and still another, the raising of \$500 under the auspices of the Colored Committee in honor of the fiftieth anniversary of St. Augustine's, Raleigh, N. C.

The work of the various committees speaks for itself in their reports, and Miss Childs, vice-president for Queens and Nassau, and Miss Hewlett, vice-president for Suffolk, have added much to our success by their never-failing interest in the churches out on the Island; by their labors parishes have been added to our lists that we have never been able to reach before.

At a meeting held in March, 1918, By-Law I, Section 2, which called for the annual meeting being held in April, was altered so as to change the annual meeting to December, and By-Law V, which said a nominating committee should be appointed in "March," was changed to read in "November." Therefore the annual election was held in December.

We have had, as in every year, losses in our ranks. Sister Rebecca, Mrs. E. H. L. Smith, Miss Sophie Musson and Miss Mary Benson have passed on to life eternal.

Several of these were old and valued members and we shall miss them. Of Miss Benson, for thirty-one years a member, seven years our President and one year our Honorary President, it may be truly said she is a loss to the whole diocese—to us an irreparable one. A true, generous friend, a wise counselor, a woman of the highest ideals, her life has been an example and inspiration to all of us. While we miss her sorely, it is a happiness to know that she is "with Christ, which is far better."

A simple record of duties fulfilled, days of light and days of shadow, each bringing us a little nearer to the time when we shall see face to face and know even as we are known.

Report of the United Offering Treasurer

1918

Here we are on the threshold of 1919, when our United Offering will be presented at the Triennial Convention of our Church, early in October, in the city of Detroit, Michigan, while in this coming May, in our own diocese, we will lay it upon the altar of the Cathedral in Garden City, at a special service, designated, so that many can attend and share in its uplifting, thrilling preparations for the last and final uniting of all offerings from many parts of the world. Why this great and unusual celebration? Because it is the effort, the united effort—such strength in that word—for three years of all the parishes and stations in our own diocese, and all dioceses, to send, with its result, all the women workers, far and nigh, into the world's field and sustain them there, care for them when sick and bring them home again.

Let me remind you that in the greatest stress of old England's resources caused by the four exhausting years of war, to "mind, body and estate," she contributed to missions this past year the largest total in the history of her historic church. Consider for a moment what that means, and don't let us permit any detail of work, time, or gift, to the various war activities pass our lips as an excuse on our part for failure to follow England's glorious lead. Let us, with vigor, make these coming weeks replete with the determination that the American Church, standing by her colors, will place the glorious United Offering away beyond any past result. So I beseech you in this final word to our Long Island diocese, that her motto, *Onward!* will be fulfilled in an overwhelming gift, thus doubling the number of

women workers, teachers and nurses to all parts of the world, so that "not one jewel shall be lacking in His crown through our neglect."

Report of the Junior Auxiliary

Once again the Juniors commenced their year's work by coming together at their annual mass meeting. This time St. Bartholomew's was our host and our attendance was two hundred and seventy-five, nearly a hundred more than in 1917. The Rector, the Rev. Frank M. Townley, opened the meeting with prayer and welcomed us. Representatives of the various branches then read their reports, following which two branches presented missionary plays. The Juniors from the Church of St. Matthew delighted us with their interpretation of "The Sunset Hour," and the members of the branch at the Church of the Ascension gave a well-acted presentation of "The Light of America." There was a recitation of an original poem, called "Our Junior Work," composed by one of the leaders of the branch of the Church of the Holy Apostles, and the program concluded with a stereopticon lecture by the Rev. Mr. Thomas on his work in Brazil. Ice cream and cake was served by the members of St. Bartholomew's Church School.

The speakers at our monthly Junior Leaders' meetings during the year have been: Mrs. Alexander for St. Agnes' School, Kioto, Japan; Miss Cady, on our Church's work at the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Fort Defiance, Arizona; Dr. James, on the Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China; Miss Grace Lindley, on Junior Work; Miss Prophet, on Manual Work, and Miss Bell, on a Course of Mission Study for our Juniors in Long Island.

Miss Cady's talk resulted in the Juniors becoming interested in a blind nine-year-old Navajo Indian boy named Howard McKinley. As a Diocesan Special, we are educating him at a school for the blind in New Mexico, at an annual cost of two

hundred and eighty dollars. We are happy in knowing that this new interest, instead of taking away from our gifts to other objects, has appeared to increase them.

For the fifteen months, closing December 31, 1917, our gifts, aside from our box work, amounted to \$121.85, and for 1918 they are:

While we cannot really say there is a Junior branch at the Church Charity Foundation, a number of our friends who live in the Home for the Aged and the Blind have become interested in Junior work and will help us during the coming year.

We have passed through our year of testing bravely, having increased our box work and missionary gifts, and best of all, having grown in love for our Church's mission—"To go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

Report of the Church Periodical Club

The Church Periodical Club presents its Thirtieth Annual Report, as follows:

Three thousand, three hundred and four current periodicals sent regularly, 83 Bibles and Testaments, 80 prayer books and hymnals, 1,747 tracts and catechisms, 6,630 books, 80,718 Christmas and Easter cards, 9,305 picture cards and calendars, 1,476 carols and music, 14,573 pictures, games and scrap books, 84,628 odd numbers of magazines and periodicals, and 71 boxes, contents uncounted.

This report covers twenty-one months, no report having been published in the Spring. It includes much unusual and interesting work for the soldiers and sailors of the Nation, both here and abroad. Of all the branches of Church workers engaged in the service of the Church War Commission, probably the C. P. C. was the only one to which the war work was only an extension of their regular work, as the chaplains of the Army and Navy have always been among their most grateful recipients. But the distinguished service as chaplains in this war of four of our most honored Long Island clergymen naturally inspired increased zeal. There are still about 150 chaplains abroad, and thousands of men in hospitals and service, so our work is not yet finished for them; but when they are all returned to their homes, we trust that every periodical will be continued and transferred to some member of God's other Army, whose work is never finished in their effort to establish His Church in the dark places of the earth.

We record with deep sorrow and regret the loss by death of one of our most earnest librarians, Mrs. E. H. L. Smith, of St. James, Long Island.

The growth of the C. P. C. in Long Island during these thirty years made it necessary, for efficiency, to ask assistance, and we have been most fortunate in securing the collaboration

Report of the Educational Committee

When Miss Arrowsmith resigned as Diocesan Educational Secretary a committee was formed to carry on the work which she had organized in Long Island and had presented to us, year by year. The new secretary was glad to have Miss Arrowsmith's help and interest as a member of the committee. The Normal Class was thrown open to any one interested in the subject of mission study without the obligation to teach a class being imposed. This experiment created fresh interest and proved itself worthy of continued use. Another change in method was to have each member of the committee lead one session of the

Normal Class. This also was interesting, but the general opinion is in favor of one leader for the whole course and that experiment will not be repeated. Eight women attended the Normal Class regularly and at nearly every session we had a few visitors. The parish classes in this Diocese reported to the committee were as follows:

The Advent Call

In that wonderful little book, "The Meaning of Prayer," by Fosdick, he asks the question: "Is it not due to the lack of the *culture* of prayer, that this generation is practically efficient but spiritually shallow?" The Advent Call was an effort to deepen the spiritual life of the women of the Church, and therefore when one is asked to write a report on the results one can only say that those are in God's hands. But being so great a movement, designed to reach all the women of the Church, there had to be a certain amount of machinery and it was my privilege to set this in motion. In spite of the Bishop's endorsement there was opposition on the part of a few, indifference on the part of some, but enthusiasm on the part of those who realized the possibilities of this movement—to unite all the women of the Church in prayer. This enthusiasm grew as the plan became better understood. If it had been possible for representatives from *every* parish to attend the training classes, and come under the influence of our inspired and consecrated Diocesan leader, there would have been even more enthusiasm. While the letter asking the co-operation of the clergy was sent out on September 30, the epidemic of influenza, in many cases, made it difficult for them to appoint leaders and set the plan in motion as early as desirable.

Training classes were held, under the leadership of Miss Kuhlke, in Brooklyn, Huntington, Jamaica and Patchogue, all day sessions at the last three places, fourteen sessions in all. Five other meetings were also addressed by her. Twenty-one thousand, one hundred and sixty-seven pieces of literature were sent out in packages to be distributed to the women of each parish taking part in the Call.

Conditions in nearly every parish being different, modifications of the original plan had to be made. In several of the larger churches "Quiet Days" were held, in others special services

in the evenings. *All* had at least one special Celebration of the Holy Communion; many had a number. In some parishes the Messengers made the calls on one day; in others, all through the week of December 1 to 8; some presented the cards to be signed; others collected those which had been sent out with a special letter from the rector.

The Prayer Cards and Bible Readings were gladly received in almost every case and one woman's remark that "in her busy, driving life she was grateful for *being asked* to give a small portion of her time for prayer and meditation, as she knew she ought," is typical of the attitude of many.

To a goodly number of the clergy the women of their parishes are indebted for helpful and inspiring sermons and addresses, and it is certain that in the lives of most of the women taking part in this Advent Call the privilege and the practice of prayer has come to have a new and more helpful meaning.

The parishes in which the Advent Call to Prayer was heard numbered sixty-three in all.

Constitution and By-Laws
OF THE
Long Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary
to the Board of Missions

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

NAME.

This Association shall be called THE LONG ISLAND BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT.

Its object shall be to aid the Board of Missions and to further the missionary work of the Church in the following ways: By awakening missionary zeal among the Churchwomen of the Diocese, and diffusing missionary information; by raising money for missionary objects; by sending boxes to missionaries in the field; by encouraging the formation of parish branches in the Diocese; by daily prayer for missions.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP.

Membership in this Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary consists of Parish Delegates and Honorary Members.

Parish delegates are Churchwomen appointed annually by the Rector of a parish, or by the Priest-in-charge of a mission. Their duties are to attend the meetings of the Auxiliary and report its proceedings to their parish branches; to interest the members thereof in the pledges assumed by the Auxiliary, so that every parish may take its share in the raising of these pledges; and to supply missionary information.

The Annual Dues of each delegate shall be one dollar, payable in October.

Honorary Members are former members who have rendered valuable service to the Auxiliary. They are nominated by the Executive Com-

mittee, and elected by the Auxiliary. Honorary Members pay no dues, and do not vote.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS.

The officers shall be a President, a First Vice-President for Brooklyn, a Second Vice-President for Brooklyn, a Vice-President for Queens and Nassau counties, a Vice-President for Suffolk County, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, an Assistant Treasurer.

These officers shall be elected annually to serve for one year, and are eligible for re-election.

ARTICLE V.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Officers, with an Advisory Board consisting of five or more members, who shall be appointed by the President.

ARTICLE VI.

VOTING.

At the annual meeting each parish or mission is entitled to one vote. At any meeting, upon request, any question may be voted upon by parishes, each parish or mission having one vote.

ARTICLE VII.

AMENDMENTS.

This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Meeting by a two-thirds vote of the parishes present, provided that the amendment has been proposed and considered at a previous meeting.

By-Laws

I. MEETINGS.

1. **MONTHLY MEETINGS.** This Branch of the Auxiliary shall hold stated meetings on the second Thursday of every month from October to May, inclusive, at ten o'clock A. M., excepting that in November the stated meeting shall be held on the *first* Thursday.

Should the date of a meeting fall on All Saints' Day, Maundy Thursday or Ascension Day, the meeting shall be held at two o'clock in the afternoon.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer.

The order of business at the stated meetings shall be:

Minutes of last meeting.
Reports of Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer.
Report of Corresponding Secretary
Report of Box Secretary.
Reports of Parish Boxes.
Reports of Committees.
Unfinished Business.
New Business.

2. ANNUAL MEETING. The Annual Meeting shall be held on the second Thursday in December. At this meeting the Officers shall be elected for the ensuing year.

3. ANNIVERSARY. The Anniversary of the Long Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be observed on the second Thursday in November.

II. DEPARTMENTS AND COMMITTEES.

The work of the Auxiliary shall be carried on through the following Departments: Diocesan, Domestic, Colored, Indian, and Foreign. There shall be also a Box Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a United Offering Treasurer, a Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, an Altar Committee, and such other Committees as may be authorized by the Auxiliary.

III. DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Committee, and she may call special meetings at her discretion.

She shall appoint the Heads of Departments, the Assistant Secretaries, the Advisory Board, and the members of Committees.

The Vice-Presidents shall preside at meetings in the absence of the President, and shall hold themselves in readiness to assist her otherwise at her request.

The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of the meetings, and shall prepare an Annual Report.

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Auxiliary, and send out notices of meetings.

The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money, report at each monthly meeting, and present an Annual Report.

The Treasurer's accounts shall be audited by an expert accountant.

The Assistant Treasurer shall aid the Treasurer in her work.

IV. DUTIES OF CHAIRMEN.

The Chairman of each Committee shall inform herself on her special branch of the work, and present its needs to the Auxiliary. She shall receive contributions for the work of her department, returning to the donors receipts for the same, and shall forward the amounts to the Treasurer.

The Box Secretary shall obtain a list of boxes required for the mission field, and shall be prepared to assign them to the parishes represented in this Auxiliary.

The Educational Secretary shall be prepared to teach mission study classes, and shall encourage the formation of classes in the diocese and in parishes.

The Treasurer of the United Offering shall be prepared to furnish the parishes with the United Offering boxes and leaflets. She shall make an annual report of money received, and on the third year, she, or some one delegated by her, shall present the full collection at the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

V. NOMINATIONS.

A Committee on Nominations shall be appointed in November. This Committee shall be composed of three members (not officers). They shall send to every delegate a nomination paper, on which she is asked to write the name of the person she desires to nominate for each office. These papers shall be returnable by a given date, and from them a ballot shall be made, upon which the two names having the largest number of nominations for each office shall be placed, after it has been ascertained that these persons are willing to serve.

VI. ELECTIONS.

The Election of Officers shall be by ballot, each parish having one vote.

One ballot shall be sent to the chairman of each parish delegation, before the Annual Meeting. At the time of the elections, the tellers shall be provided with the official list of parishes, and the name of each parish or mission shall be checked off as the vote is cast.

VII. VACANCIES.

A vacancy occurring in an elective office during the year may be filled for the remainder of the term by the Executive Committee.

VIII. AMENDMENTS.

These By-Laws may be amended at any monthly meeting of the Auxiliary by a two-thirds vote, providing that due notice has been given, and the amendment discussed at a previous meeting.
