

1872—1922

The celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Long Island, held its first session in the Church of the Messiah, the Rev. St. Clair Hester, D.D., Rector, and was more especially in honor of the organization of the Woman's Auxiliary in our National Church fifty years ago. The Rt. Rev. Frederick Burgess, D.D., LL.D., was the celebrant for the Holy Communion; the late Rev. Reese F. Alsop, D.D., making one of the most inspirational addresses that it has ever been our privilege to hear, from the text: "See that thou make all things according to the pattern showed to thee in the mount." He said: "Our very membership shows that once at least we have been on the mount and seen visions of beauty of service and self-sacrifice; we came down with shining faces, we had seen the Pattern. The enthusiasm of high moments is more precious than gold; lose it and you are poor. Wordsworth says: 'This is the most difficult task, to maintain the heights the soul can reach.' If we have lost sight of the Pattern, come to the mount of the risen Lord where He gave directions to His little flock, 'Go ye into all the world.' Give for this work, live for it, and your life shall be alight with the glory of God. Amen."

At the Out-of-Town Meeting, held at the Cathedral, Garden City, our Bishop made the address and was also the celebrant at the Communion service. His text was from Ephesians, from the missionary letter which St. Paul wrote while in prison: "According to the eternal purpose which He purposed, in Christ Jesus our Lord." This, the Bishop said, was the same high purpose which had been the inspiration of the Woman's Auxiliary for the past fifty years; that through them God had been working his purpose out, and today we give to him all the praise and say with thankful hearts, "What hath God Wrought."

In November, 1922, our usual Anniversary Meeting was held at St. Paul's Church, Flatbush, the Rev. Wallace J. Gardner, Rector. Bishop Burgess was the celebrant at the Communion

service and the address was made by the Rt. Rev. James H. Darlington, D.D., LL.D., Ph.D., Bishop of Harrisburg. He came to us as one who for twenty-five years, while Rector of Christ Church, Bedford Avenue, had deeply appreciated and stimulated the work of the Woman's Auxiliary in Long Island. Perhaps few of us remember his text, for it was somewhat shrouded in the warmth of his greeting, his wealth of reminiscence and the lines which seemed to take the place of the text,

"Four things that I may happy be
I pray that God will give to me;
Someone to love with all my heart,
Something to do by toil or art;
Something to hope for further on,
A memory sweet to muse upon.
All these in Christ, my Lord, I find,
On Him, I rest with quiet mind."

All these blessings have been richly enjoyed by the members of our Woman's Auxiliary, and it is our responsibility to share them with all the nations of the earth.

On Thursday, December 14, the Family Celebration of our Fiftieth Birthday was held in St. Ann's Parish House. The room was transformed from its usual austerity by palms, great bowls of golden chrysanthemums, festive furniture and tea tables gleaming with beautiful china and brilliant candelabra.

In the receiving line were officers, chairmen, guests, our only living ex-President, Mrs. Charles Bellows, and two of our three charter members, Mrs. Robert S. Fanning and Miss Laura T. Mitchell. Miss Phoebe Hagner, through physical disability, was unable to be present. Her cross was sent to her, and she had one day of happiness in its possession before being called to her Heavenly Home.

After a short reception the program for the afternoon was opened by a brief word of greeting from the President, followed by a resumé of the happenings of half a century of busy, happy years, given by our honored Corresponding Secretary, Mrs.

Robert S. Fanning, who that day rounded out her wonderful service of twenty-four years.

It gives us great pleasure to be able to present her report elsewhere in this book.

One of the most appreciated features of the afternoon was the presence of Mrs. Miller, daughter of our first President, Mrs. John A. Paddock. Surely never was the story so inimitably told of the impressions made upon the children of a rectory home by the constant visits of missionaries and missionary bishops; and then the eventful hour when they heard that they were all to be missionaries, for their father, the Rev. John A. Paddock, Rector of St. Peter's Church, Brooklyn, had been appointed first Missionary Bishop of Washington Territory. Then the pathos of the mother's death, even before they reached that far Western home. It was a wonderful story, charmingly told, and it served to link up the past and the present with indissoluble chains.

We were most fortunate in having with us Mrs. Grafton Burke from Fort Yukon, Alaska, to tell us of our Memorial Chapel, built there in memory of Mrs. Cox, our third President, and later enriched by memorials to two other beloved officers, Miss Louisa Gilbert and Mrs. Alexander Hutchins, our fourth President.

As Mrs. Burke finished her recital, the Birthday cake, ablaze with its fifty candles, was brought to the platform, and in their illumination the Charter Members were presented with gold crosses, set with a topaz, the golden stone. The cake was cut and distributed with the other dainty refreshments, and after singing "Blest be the tie that binds," we bade a loving farewell to the past and prepared with strong faith, joyful hope and loyal love to follow more faithfully the Pattern shown to us in the Mount.

Just at the close of the year 1872, Bishop Abram Newkirk Littlejohn, the first Bishop of Long Island, called together the clergy of his diocese, with representative women from all the parishes, the Secretaries of the Board of Missions, and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and himself organized the first diocesan branch of the Woman's Auxiliary ever formed to aid every department of the missionary work, with president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer, and regularly appointed delegates from each parish of the diocese, made up into five committees, for Diocesan, Domestic, Foreign, Indian and Colored Missions, all composing a Board of Managers, which has held its regular monthly meetings in the city of Brooklyn ever since. At this time was set the example of an all-day meeting on the anniversary of the organizing of the branch, beginning with the celebration of the Holy Communion, and an address by the Bishop, whose custom it has always been to preside throughout the day; the morning service being followed by luncheon, to which all the clergy and friends of the Auxiliary are invited, and then by addresses during the afternoon on all departments of missions, interspersed with the singing of many missionary hymns.

The educational value of this action can hardly be overestimated. Slowly but surely, though in many varying ways, the example was followed. In 1875, the Bishops of Ohio, Western Michigan, Milwaukee and Central New York appointed diocesan secretaries to organize, under their direction, branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in their respective dioceses. In 1876, the Bishop of Southern Ohio did the same, while the Bishops of Newark and New Jersey superintended the formation of the second and third diocesan branches to be organized in aid of all general missions.

It is an honor of which any auxiliary may feel justly proud—that it has been privileged to carry on the Master's work as

an organized body for fifty years. That seems a long time to look back upon, but there is sometimes help for the future in looking backward—seeing where mistakes may have been made, different methods used, and also finding encouragement in the increase and development of the work in newer and broader fields.

In glancing over the records of past years there is much of interest which must of necessity be omitted for lack of time, and much of this record will, to many of you, be an oft told tale, but there are many new members in our ranks to whom the story may be of interest and we *all* can rejoice in the growth of the work.

To these five departments were added the work of St. Phoebe's Mission, the Church Periodical Club, and later the United Offering, now known as the United Thank Offering, The Altar Society, The Junior Auxiliary and the Babies Branch, now called The Little Helpers, both now placed under the Department of Education.

Special emphasis was laid on the box work and in this there was constant encouragement from the Bishops coming from the distant Western fields—assuring us of the great assistance these boxes were to the hard-working clergy and their families, isolated as they were from many of the comforts and even necessities of decent living.

Our anniversaries were held then as now in November and were great occasions; we met for all day—the numbers were not so large as now, and you will smile when I tell you that the luncheon was provided by each delegate bringing her contribution—a chicken, a dish of salad, a cake, a package of coffee, etc., those from a distance as well as those near by, and not in automobiles either! All more primitive, but also full of enjoyment and genuine hospitality. The first President, Mrs. Paddock, after eight years was called to a broader field of service when Dr. Paddock of St. Peter's Church, State Street, was made Bishop of Washington Territory—but the Master called her to “go up higher,” for soon came the word that her earthly pil-

grimage had ended, just in sight of the field to which she had so ardently consecrated herself and her life. Mrs. Paddock was succeeded by Mrs. Seaman, Mrs. Cox, Mrs. Hutchins and Miss Benson, all of them now saints in the Paradise of God. I am sure it is in the minds of all—how they have led us from small beginnings to a larger and fuller life—handing on the torch of missionary inspiration to those who followed them, making us realize that Long Island has a heritage of faithful service and traditions of no mean worth to hand down to the coming years.

Mrs. Bellows succeeded Miss Benson with efficiency and faithfulness, and now it is our privilege to have Mrs. Heinigke, who holds our affection and trust, as President for a third term of office.

The records show that all through these years the work was growing and broadening in its scope, developing a clearer vision, more devoted effort, more loving service.

Under the educational Department, Mission Study Classes have been formed each winter, led most successfully—but alas! so few parishes avail themselves of this great opportunity of spreading a knowledge of the need and the right methods of doing so. Mass meetings, Quiet Days all have helped, and the Out-of-Town Meeting, each Spring carries the message of the Church's Mission into the more distant parishes. The amount of the United Thank offering has increased steadily until this year it is over \$14,000. The Box work has been reorganized, the Church Service League has been formed, and the fiscal year changed from May to January that it may agree with the date used at the Church Missions house.

In 1919 the name of our Society was changed to Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, and now again to Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council. In 1919 the Nation-Wide Campaign was originated and to this each member of the Auxiliary is expected to give loyal support in the home parish; it already has enabled the Church to attempt great things in accomplishing its work. It has also helped the Long Island

Auxiliary by making it possible to employ a trained leader for the Mission Study Classes and extend its work in other ways. In this crisis of world conditions, the women of the Church must stand faithful and true to those who are trying to discover the best methods of extending the Kingdom.

In our Auxiliary much responsibility rests upon the parish delegate; if she does not carry home to the parish the story of all the fields—told so graphically and convincingly by the different chairmen at the monthly meetings, how else will the needs be known and met?

In reading the minutes of the first meeting, December 10, 1872, Miss Mitchell, Miss Hagner and myself, as far as I can find out, are the only members then present, who are still living.

I would so gladly pause here, did time permit, to pay tribute to the many faithful workers who have labored with us in all these years and have now passed to their reward. We thank God for their blessed examples and take courage to go on.

Many memorials have been placed by the Long Island Auxiliary in different parts of the field, and today we are emphasizing the needs of St. Stephen's Chapel at Fort Yukon, as our 50th Anniversary offering goes to help move it back from the shores of the Yukon River which each season is encroaching nearer and nearer beyond its borders and threatening the safety of the building. The Chapel is a memorial to Mrs. Samuel Cox, our third president; in the little robing room hangs a picture of Mrs. Cox, on the altar is a cross—a memorial to Miss Louisa Gilbert, a faithful and devoted Secretary of the Auxiliary, and in the chancel are a prayer desk, lectern and altar Service Book—memorial to Mrs. Alexander Hutchins, our fourth president. The latter were chosen and planned by the Auxiliary with the advice and supervision of Archdeacon Stuck on his last visit to the East—taken out by him to Alaska and used for the first time at his funeral.

Our gifts have increased from the first year of the Auxiliary's existence, 1873; which, in money received and boxes,

valued \$3,856.09. But we must not dwell too much on what we have accomplished—rather press on to greater achievements, more earnest prayer, more faithful endeavor and higher aim. We cannot rest satisfied until all the parishes and missions in the Diocese are represented in the Auxiliary and doing their share. Out of 150 parishes and missions, only 92 are sending delegates to the Diocesan Auxiliary meetings. Think what an advance we could make, what power would be released if all would lend their aid, spiritually and materially; if we could awaken the motive power which has been planted within us, which in so many lies dormant, because they know not!

Do let us in the midst of all the necessary routine of the business side of our duties as delegates, keep within us a deep sense of the illuminating, uplifting power of a consecrated aim, and of the Holy Spirit within our hearts.

With our love and prayers and in making our gifts let us remember the little verse:

“And must I be giving again and again?”
“Oh, no,” said the Angel, piercing me through,
“Just give till the Master stops giving to you.”

Report of Recording Secretary

The Recording Secretary takes pleasure in presenting her report for 1922, pleasure because it is a record of well attended meetings and faithful and splendid accomplishment all along the line; still, with all that we have done there comes a note of questioning: Why have we only 90 parishes represented out of 150 on Long Island? It gives one food for thought. One of the objects of the Woman's Auxiliary is "to further the missionary work of the Church." How? "By awakening missionary zeal among the Churchwomen of the Diocese, and diffusing missionary information." Are we doing this as well as we might? Would it not be wise for us at the beginning of our new half century in an intelligent and definite way to devise means by which these unawakened fellow members may be reached? What a report then some future Recording Secretary might write!

We have had eight regular meetings, eight executive, and two special, as well as our Out-of-Town meeting, our Anniversary, the Suffolk County meeting held at Patchogue, and our Birthday Party.

At our regular meetings we have had an average attendance of 123 members. This looks like a falling off compared with the previous year, but one or two very stormy days, and two meetings coming on Holy days, made the difference.

We had 432 *listed* delegates, 266 in Brooklyn, 130 in Queens and Nassau, and 36 in Suffolk, representing respectively 42, 36, and 13 parishes.

As this was the United Thank Offering Triennial Year, the Out-of-Town meeting was held at Garden City. Bishop Burgess preached in the morning; our speakers in the afternoon were Archdeacon Ziegler, Deaconess Hargreaves, and Mrs. Van Nostrand.

At our Anniversary held at St. Paul's, Flatbush, the sermon was by Bishop Darlington, and our speakers were the Most Rev. Edward Hutson, Archbishop of the West Indies; Bishop Mosher,

Dr. A. R. Gray, and Archdeacon Russell. At this time we also heard the very sweet singers from St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville.

Other speakers during the year have been Archdeacon Spurr of Moundsville, West Va.; Dr. Gilman of China, Miss Peters of Farmington, N. M.; Miss Smith, who visits all the Indian reservations; Mrs. Hunt of Fort Valley, Ga.; the Rev. Shirley Nichols of Japan, and Deaconess Bedell of Alaska.

These men and women, many of them coming straight from the field, fill us with awe, for their unbounded self-sacrifice, their love for their work, and the spiritual note that runs through their message from beginning to end. How grateful we should be for such fine representation.

The Birthday Party, an occasion that will never be forgotten by those attending, our President tells of in her message.

Seven Auxiliary members attended the General Convention of the Church at Portland in September. Of the important things decided on there, an account was given by several returning delegates. Five attended the annual Provincial Synod held at Albany in November, and three of our members are delegates to the Church Service League.

It is not necessary here to speak of the splendid achievements of the United Thank Offering, the Box Work, the Church Periodical Club, etc. All is recorded in its proper place elsewhere, but we have surprised even ourselves, and those in charge of these matters may well feel proud, for without their faithful presentation and urging, we never would have attained such results.

Of new work, our Christmas celebration at Montauk is first; this might almost be called a memorial to Miss Benson. Then come the Near East Offering; the Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund; the Missionary Rally at the Church of the Good Shepherd; our help in the Daily Vacation Bible Schools; our interest in the Concert given for St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville; and our latest task, which was to raise the money asked for the

saving of our memorial chapel, St. Stephen's, Alaska, from the inroads of the river. The answer to the special appeal sent out for this purpose was more than gratifying.

As one who attended the Summer School at Princeton, it is a joy for me to be able to report Long Island so well represented. Thirty of the students belonged to us, fully ten of whom were either from the Auxiliary or sent by some of our interested members.

Six of "Our Own" have passed on to their Heavenly Home, and an unusual number of our members have gone through great sorrow; to them our hearts go out, in love and sympathy.

At the beginning of a new half century does it not seem as if we might consider this work of ours more earnestly than, perhaps, some of us are doing? For instance, do we think enough about it? Of course, it is not new. How many years ago is it since the woman of Samaria, all unexpectedly, met her Lord face to face and talked with Him? Did she stop there? No, with shining eyes, and heart on fire, she ran, full of missionary zeal, and *telling others*, brought them to Him. Are we as anxious as we might be to do this, although we have opportunities she never knew?

How many years ago is it since Dorcas started Box Work, giving of her money and making garments? I don't believe *she* had missionary letters, and all the incentives we have.

Are we thankful enough for all that the love of Christ has done for women? Are we as eager as we might be to do what we may for Him?

Can we not follow the example of St. Paul, and "forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus"? Does the question arise, What is that high calling? To each one of us comes the answer straight from the boy Christ of long ago, who being questioned as to why he had not followed the expected routine, answered in those memorable words, "Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?"

Let us make this the answer to all questions, to all doubts, to all perplexities; so keeping before us and attending to our "Father's business" we cannot go far astray. Then the work of our beloved organization for the next fifty years may climb to the heights we pray for, and it cannot help being a glory to that Father whose faithful children we, in our hearts, would truly be.

Report of the Church Periodical Club

The Long Island Branch of the Church Periodical Club presents its thirty-fourth annual report, as follows:

Three thousand, two hundred and twenty current periodicals sent regularly; 198 Bibles and Testaments; 458 Prayer Books and Hymnals; 4,563 books; 2,412 tracts and catechisms; 47,410 Christmas and Easter cards; 17,425 picture cards and calendars; 2,563 carols and music; 11,723 games, scrap books, puzzles, pictures, etc.; and 56,429 odd numbers of magazines.

This has been an eventful year in the life of the C. P. C. in Long Island. Through the generous co-operation of the Woman's Auxiliary it was enabled to complete its contribution

to the \$18,000.00 Library for St. Paul's College, Tokyo, in money and books, of \$1,421.35.

Many of the gifts were memorials, or in honor of someone revered. The Diocese gave for its Bishop, Dean, Canons and Archdeacons; the Parishes for their Rectors; the Woman's Auxiliary for its President and all former Presidents, for its loved and lost officers and fellow members. The Juniors, Little Helpers and Girls' Friendly were all represented on the Bookplates which honored Long Island.

May I record here the deep gratitude and appreciation with which the President of the Woman's Auxiliary signed fifty Bookplates, the privilege conferred by the members' gift of \$300.00 in her honor.

The Provincial work assigned for the year was the Institutions and Missions of our own Dioceses. Large collections of books have been furnished to St. Johnland, St. Giles, Kings County Hospital, Kingston Avenue Hospital, Church Mission of Help, Montauk Mission, Kings Park, Church Charity Foundation, and the new Diocesan Church Mission to the Jews.

Our work for the coming year is to enlarge the Boone School Library, and to furnish our share of a Library for the New World School, El Coto de Manati, Porto Rico. A new Bookplate will accompany all future gifts of books.

This is a record of important and appealing work, but no less essential are the thousands of pictures, cards and calendars that have brightened the lives of those to whom they came as light in dark places of the earth. But beyond and above all is the current magazine sent regularly, bearing its continuous message of sympathy and helpfulness to those who, through either isolation or penury, are deprived of the cheer and information which so enrich our homes. Has not every member of this Diocese just one more periodical that she is willing to "Pass On?"

Report of the Educational Secretary

The Educational Secretary presents the following report of the work done in 1922:

In Epiphany a class was organized to study "The Survey" and train leaders for Lenten classes. Through the appropriation from the Nation-Wide Campaign Committee, it was again possible to secure Mrs. Haslehurst as leader. The number of parishes represented at the class and the attendance was disappointing. Only eight people attended regularly, seven others coming for one or two meetings, but the work was well done and the subject full of interest.

Of our eight recognized leaders, two were ill, one was in Europe, one in Florida and one doing literary work, which made it necessary for two requests for leaders of parish classes to remain unfulfilled. We welcome most heartily the coming of a new leader, Mrs. B. F. O'Connor, of St. George's Church, Flushing, and hope that she may work with us for many years.

Perhaps the most encouraging sign of growth in our work is in the number of parishes where the reading of books or papers on various mission fields is made a part of the Lenten meetings. Reports of successful work along this line have come from St. John's Church, the Church of the Atonement, Trinity Church, Arlington Avenue; the Church of the Good Shepherd, Brooklyn; Grace Church, Jamaica; and St. John's Church, Huntington. "Japan," "Neighbors," Miss Emery's book "A Century of Endeavor," and "The Survey" were studied in this way.

A new book by Dr. Jeffries, called "How Can We Know the Way?" was used in many classes throughout the Church. It presents the subject of missions entirely from the "motive" standpoint, emphasizing *Discipleship*, while "The Survey" presents it entirely from the "method" standpoint, emphasizing *Stewardship*. Both these books were used in classes held in Long Island.

In November we had the privilege of having Miss Laura

F. Boyer, of the Church Missions House staff, lead a class on the text-book for 1923, "Wanted—Leaders," a study in Negro development, by Bishop Bratton. It is hoped that this advance training will enable us to have more classes than we can have when the normal training is given during Epiphany, and the result of this change in the plan of our Diocesan work will be watched with interest.
