

Resolution

Passed by the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, Diocese of Long Island in Memory of Mrs. Robert S. Fanning.

WHEREAS in the translation to her Eternal Home of Mrs. Robert S. Fanning, our Long Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council has sustained an irreparable loss, we desire to testify to the inspiration which these sixty-one years of spiritual guidance has wrought in our Association, for she was our last Charter Member, and her life was so precious and sacred to us that as we sought her counsel, even during the last sad months of her invalidism we felt that her responses to our appeals came illuminated with the heavenly atmosphere in which she constantly dwelt. We rejoice that one of her latest acts of service in our behalf was the revision of her inimitable pamphlet on the duties and privileges of a Delegate to the Woman's Auxiliary. A fund will be provided to perpetuate the publication of this invaluable leaflet.

She held many important Offices in our organization, and might have held the highest if she would have accepted it. For many years she was Corresponding Secretary, and for some years Chairman of Box Work.

The last Office which she would accept as failing health impaired her strength, was Chairman of Prayer Partnership, and we love to think of the beneficent results which must have attended that hallowed correspondence with our Missionaries.

We extend to her daughters our most loving sympathy, rejoicing in the knowledge that their hearts were with her in all her sacred ministries and will endeavor with us to Carry On to bring to a joyful fruition her consecrated labor for the establishment of Christ's Kingdom upon Earth.

Be It Also Resolved, that we spread this Resolution upon our Minutes, and that a copy of the same be sent to her bereaved family.

Report of the President

As we figuratively turn the pages of the sixty-two years in the history of the Woman's Auxiliary of our Diocese, we find many changes, and since last May we have been in the midst of one, a general reorganization, which is being worked out as a trial period for this year. Constitution and By-laws set aside, under the guidance of the Executive Board, the Auxiliary is carrying out a plan which has so many advantages, it does not seem possible to return to the old order—the "Old Order," on the strength of which we build today.

The Diocese has been divided into four districts, Brooklyn, Queens, Nassau, and Suffolk, each under a vice-president, and full line of committees, meeting monthly, save in the three months when general diocesan meetings are held.

Much interest has been aroused, new parishes enrolled, fresh zones reached, hitherto untouched. The responsibility is now shared by splendid additional officers and chairmen of committees, thereby enlarging the scope of interest, building inspiringly and constructively for future leadership in the Auxiliary. New friendships and contacts have been made of lasting and precious value.

The speaking standards have been maintained, and carried into wider channels through the more frequent message from the mission field. Our giving must necessarily increase in the same proportion. All of the other work has been zealously carried on in our fields of service, i.e., Missions, Education, United Thank Offering, Church Periodical, Box and Altar work. New committees are being formed in Devotional and Social Service lines.

Twenty-three parishes took part in the Auxiliary Day of Prayer, and days have been set aside for special study of the Bible and for hours of devotion. "In quietness and confidence shall be our strength."

As a consequence of the increase in the number of parishes enrolled, and the growth in interest and knowledge of the work, the average attendance has jumped from 127 to 430 a month, throughout the districts, and in actual numbers, including the Anniversary; and Evening Branch meetings, of which two have been held, the attendance has been 1,970 up to February the first.

Can we hesitate or shrink from undertaking fresh ventures? No—We must continue to press toward the mark, strengthen the faltering ones, encourage those new to the work, and in

all things "be strong in the power of His might." Our aim is to reach every parish and mission in the Diocese.

We have had losses, one great one, in the death of our beloved and last Charter Member, Mrs. Robert S. Fanning, for whom a Memorial is being planned. Already we have arranged to print for continual distribution, her spiritual and valuable words on the "Duties of Delegates." In the example of these noble lives we find courage "to carry on the song where they broke off the strain."

I am thankful for this opportunity of expressing my personal, unbounded appreciation of the loyalty, friendship, infinite patience, unremitting labor, of our officers, chairmen, members of committees, and all Auxiliary members, without which this change could not have been carried out.

Well do I know where the strength of that loyalty lies, in complete devotion to our Master, and I am both proud and humble in being privileged to work with you in our mutually inspiring task.

Finally, and I have purposely postponed these words, I want to leave with you two thoughts. First, of the faithful, never failing cooperation of our three Bishops, who, in the midst of exceedingly busy lives, have answered every call, no matter how small, giving their counsel of inestimable value, and in their addresses of consecrated spiritual power, have set our souls on fire with a zeal and enthusiasm that know no bounds.

And now, in these vital days we eagerly await the call to further service, through the "Church Wide Endeavor," the Presiding Bishop's great plan for revitalizing lives, with prayer in our hearts that we may learn to know God's purpose for ourselves, then carry His message of salvation with faith and courage to all the world.

Report of Recording Secretary

Following our old schedule there were five regular monthly meetings held, January to May inclusive, with an average attendance of 155.

At the January meeting we voted \$9,000 our quota pledge, and no stated amount for each of five specials, Foreign, Domestic, Diocesan, Indian and Colored—we met our pledge with about \$9,300 and gave over \$500 to specials.

There was no speaker at the January meeting, time being given to conference on methods of conducting Woman's Auxiliary work in Parish Branches. Speaker at the February meeting, the Rev. George M. Plaskett, Rector of the Church of the Epiphany, Orange, New Jersey.

In March Bishop Creighton brought us teaching and great inspiration. At the April meeting, Mrs. J. R. Hicks spoke to us of work at the Holy Comforter Mission. No speaker at the May meeting.

On May 26th, the out-of-town meeting held at St. John's Church, Cold Spring Harbor. There were 400 present. In the afternoon the plan for regional meetings was outlined by the President, Mrs. Waller, and Mrs. Goodwin presented the following resolution:

That we adopt the proposed plan for a trial year from this date, that meanwhile the Executive Committee be empowered to conduct the affairs of the Woman's Auxiliary according to their best judgment and for that time the by-laws be suspended.

This was adopted and a vote taken, result being affirmative.

Reports of the Districts appear elsewhere, telling of successful Regional meetings.

There has been decided growth in numbers and interest with fine attendance and representation of several parishes not heretofore enrolled.

We do not state numbers as it is difficult to be sure during these experimental months.

Several of our members have gone on to greater privilege and we have realized our loss. The whole auxiliary has bowed in sorrow at the going of our charter member, Mrs. Robert S. Fanning, to whom we owe much for high example and consecrated leadership.

Report for the District of Brooklyn

The New Plan for the Woman's Auxiliary of Long Island went into effect at the time of its adoption by vote of the Auxiliary on May 26th, and a Committee was shortly afterward appointed by the Vice-President for Brooklyn to make nominations for the offices of 2nd Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer to serve in the District of Brooklyn during the year. This Committee reported at the October meeting of the District at which time elections were held and appointments made.

The Vice-President for Brooklyn who had been elected to that office in 1932 was asked by the President of the Diocesan Auxiliary to continue in office during this year when the New Plan is on trial.

The officers elected were 2nd Vice-President for Brooklyn: Miss C. Florence Kuhlke; Secretary: Miss Eveleen Harrison; Treasurer: Miss Margaret DeGrove. Mrs. Warren L. Duffield was appointed Assistant Secretary.

Preceding the business session at our first meeting, October 12, Bishop Larned was celebrant at a Corporate Communion Service in St. Ann's Church after which he made an inspirational address. At the business session The Auxiliary voted that our regular District Meetings (which fall on second Thursdays in the month, excepting November, February and May) shall be held in St. Ann's Parish House at 10 o'clock A. M.

An optional scale of parish dues was adopted at \$1.00, \$1.50 or \$2.00 to cover District expenses.

Two new committees function this year in our District, the Devotional Committee and the Committee for Christian Social Service. The Devotional Committee arranged a program for observing the Day of Prayer on November 11th among the Brooklyn parishes and has planned three morning meditations to be held in January, which Bishop Larned has graciously consented to conduct. Thus we are seeking to reinforce our spiritual nature that we may be equipped more thoroughly for effective service.

The Committee for Christian Social Service is composed of young women and to them we look for information and leadership in helping to solve the social problems which our great city presents. At their first meeting they had the privilege of listening to a comprehensive talk on the phases and purposes of Christian Social Service given by the Social Service Secretary of the Diocesan Council, the Reverend Cranston Brenton. They intend to invite representatives from the organized charities of Brooklyn to speak on their particular work: and will choose finally a definite object upon which to concentrate corporately. An effort will be made to tabulate the various forms of social service activities participated in by members of the Committee.

Our Educational Committee is planning for classes on the

Mission Study topic "Christ in the Modern World" and urges that a small circulating library of Mission study books be installed in Parish Auxiliaries: also that Branches shall invite speakers from among our Diocesan and District Officers and from the Mission fields. Under the auspices of Holy Trinity Auxiliary, Bishop Creighton conducted a morning class on the "Basis of Brotherhood."

The United Thank Offering is being stressed and boxes are being placed as widely as possible.

The Parishes responded generously to the call from the District Chairman of the Bureau of Supplies for the Long Island Christmas Box, and for other needs.

The Missions Committees, Hospitality Committee and Literature Committee are functioning actively. The Literature Committee sent Christmas greetings to all our delegates who were incapacitated.

To date the Diocesan Chairmen of the Altar Committee and the Church Periodical Committee have had charge of those District Committees.

The Auxiliaries of Brooklyn took a joyous and substantial part in completing the Auxiliary pledge for Quota.

The Evening Branch Meetings are increasingly successful and a separate report follows. Attendance at all meetings has been excellent.

Several Auxiliaries have reorganized and the Mission of Our Saviour has formed a branch and is actively participating in our work.

We see great possibilities ahead in all departments and we ask for grace and power to bring them to fulfillment.

Report for the District of Queens

Following the regional plan adopted at a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of Long Island held on May 26, 1933, at Cold Spring Harbor, Queens District delegates were called to a meeting at St. George's, Flushing, on June 7th, 1933. The Committee asked Mrs. Lester Leake Riley to serve as Vice-President for the trial year. The third Thursday of the month, at ten in the morning was selected as time for meetings.

The work of organization has progressed steadily. Officers and committee heads have been appointed. Two district meetings have been held with an average attendance of over one hundred. The first was held at St. Gabriel's, Hollis, on October 19, Bishop Creighton being the Celebrant and speaker. The second at St. George's, Flushing, with Mrs. Townsend, diocesan chairman of Indian work, and Mrs. E. P. Miller of Boone University, China, as speakers.

Every auxiliary pledge from Queens had been paid before December 15 and to these many parishes added special help at the last moment. Total contributions to the Auxiliary quota were more than \$1,850 or 20% of the \$9,000 quota.

The response in the parishes to district leadership has been cordial and encouraging. It seems clear that we have lost nothing and gained much by bringing the meeting nearer to the home parishes of our people and we look forward with high courage and enthusiasm to the year ahead.

Miss Kuhlke and Mrs. Edsall represented the District, Mrs. Waller and Miss Gibson the Diocese and Miss Grace Lindley gave the missionary address based on her travels as National Executive Secretary. The offering went to "Quota."

Report of the Daily Vacation Bible School Committee

Eleven Schools supported in full, and four self supporting, is the record for our Vacation School work in 1933. A special vote of thanks is due the 84 fine Teachers who, in spite of a most drastic cut in salary, carried on their work with a spirit of loyalty through the hot summer days. Over 1,300 girls and boys were taken care of, for four difficult summer months, when schools are closed, and, for the majority, the dangerous streets are their only playground.

In spite of hard times, the Woman's Auxiliary expressed their real interest in this work by contributing \$579.25. To this was added from other sources \$135.51 making a total of \$714.76. In addition to the upkeep of the schools, and the teachers' salaries, their registration fees in the ten weeks training school were paid, and \$25.00 spent in buying books that will be of value to the schools for years to come. The schools were visited and supervised by Miss Virginia Zimmerman, Educational Secretary for the department of Religious Education of the Diocese, to whose wise management, and untiring interest the Committee owes a debt of gratitude.

Report of the Church Periodical Club 1933

The Long Island Branch of the Church Periodical Club presents its Forty-fifth Annual Report as follows, 1,642 Current Periodicals sent regularly by 427 Donors, 98 Bibles and Testaments; 925 Prayer Books and Hymnals; 9,436 Books Theological and Secular; 2,842 Tracts and Lesson Papers; 69,876 Christmas and Easter Cards; 9,000 Picture Cards, 1,200 Calendars, 720 Carols, Music and Records, 1 Victrola, 2,530 Games and Scrap Books, and 53,725 odd numbers of Magazines and Periodicals. This is an inspiring record of Zeal, Patience, Loyalty and Generosity and I doubt there being any work that receives more gratitude. Naturally in these days of enforced economy there has been some curtailment in quantity, and the increased cost of postage has in some cases made the more distant objectives prohibitive for large quantities, but for the current number sent regularly, the most valuable branch of the C. P. C. activities, the postage is the same whether sent in our own state or to the most distant of our American possessions, especially all our Missionaries should receive this proof of our sympathy and cooperation. It would be most helpful if the Church Schools of our own Diocese would carefully collect their Lesson Leaflets as they finish the course, and bring them to the C. P. C. at the Diocesan House. They are invaluable in our own Mission Schools.

We regret exceedingly that so few of our Branches contributed financially to our Fund; only 22 out of 125 members. This money we are privileged to designate for our Library Fund, and every book purchased is furnished with a Bookplate inscribing it as the Gift of the Parish, or it may be made a Memorial to a revered member of the Parish. The Library in St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, Japan, is our present beneficiary; we also previously placed an \$18,000 Library in St. Paul's University, Tokyo. Long Island is nobly represented in it.
