

The Woman's Auxiliary asks the prayers of the Church on the Festival of the Transfiguration of Christ (August 6th), the Auxiliary's “Altar Day.”

The following resolution was unanimously adopted at the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, St. John's Church, Los Angeles, May 24, 1898, and endorsed the following day by the Diocesan Convention, with the addition that where practicable the offerings be devoted to the General Fund of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz. :

Resolved, That we set apart the Feast of the Epiphany for an Auxiliary Day, and that, as members of the Auxiliary, we consider it not only a privilege but a duty to attend the services held on that day in the parish to which we belong; and further,

Resolved, That should the appointment of this day meet with the approbation of the clergymen of the Diocese, they be requested to offer, at the celebration of the Holy Eucharist on the Feast of the Epiphany, special prayers for the work of the Auxiliary.

FOR THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY IN THIS DIOCESE:

O Almighty Father, Who didst vouchsafe to Thy chosen ones on the mount the comforting vision of the glory that shall be revealed, to strengthen and cheer them in their Apostolic work, we beseech Thee to be with Thy servants, the members of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese, in all their efforts for the spread of the Kingdom of Thy dear Son. Grant that to many hearts may go the call of opportunity to serve Thee in this work, in the bearing of others' burdens and the fulfillment of the law of Christ. In what they think and do, enable them to hear the voice of Thy Son to guide and strengthen them. And in all the means of grace in Thy Church, and more especially in the Holy Communion at Thy Altars, help them to see Him Who is invisible, that in their aims and difficulties and trials they may have the abiding faith that all things are possible to them that believe. We ask this for the merits of Him Who came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, Thy Son, our Saviour, Jesus Christ. *Amen.*

Minutes of the Tenth Annual Meeting.

ST. PAUL'S PRO-CATHEDRAL,
LOS ANGELES, May 15, 1906.

At 9 a.m. a preliminary Conference of Diocesan and Parish Branch officers was held in St. Paul's Parish Hall, presided over by the Diocesan President, Mrs. P. G. Hubert, who opened the meeting with the Auxiliary prayers, sixty officers being present.

The President urged that the delegates should carry home to their branches a full report of these meetings, and also requested that a portion of their pledges be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer as soon as practicable.

Announcement was made that fourteen bales and five boxes, one of them containing twenty-five dollars' worth of medicine, had been forwarded to Tanana, Alaska.

The Tenth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Los Angeles opened with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist in St. Paul's Pro-Cathedral. The Right Rev. Joseph Horsfall Johnson, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese, officiated, being assisted by the Very Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., and the Rev. A. G. L. Trew, D.D. The sermon was preached by the Rev. Charles H. Hibbard, D.D., rector of South Pasadena.

Immediately after the service, the Auxiliary organized for business in the Parish Hall. After the hymn, "Fling out the Banner," the Bishop spoke a few hearty words of welcome and commendation, and read a loving greeting from the House of Churchwomen in San Francisco to the women of the Diocese of Los Angeles.

At roll-call 189 women from twenty-nine branches responded.

Reports were read by the following officers and, on motion, accepted: Mrs. T. McF. Patton, Vice-President of Riverside and vicinity; Mrs. J. E. Cowles, Vice-President of the Los Angeles district. In the absence of Mrs. F. D. Ferrée, the new Vice-President of the San Diego district, her report was read by Mrs. Charles L. Barnes. Report of the Recording Secretary, Mrs. L. C. Spencer. Report of the Diocesan Treasurer, Miss Emily A. Brown, duly audited.

Deaconess Grebe, in her report of the Junior Auxiliary, stated that the Birthday Bed Fund was now over a thousand dollars. Christmas boxes had been sent to five Indian reservations, the boys taking part in the work.

Mrs. William F. Hubbard, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, made her sixth annual report of its work in this Diocese.

Mrs. Pallister gave a verbal report of the Church Missions Study Class, which was highly commended.

The Bishop offered the noonday prayers for missions.

The regular annual pledges were then taken.

The Chair appointed a Committee on Resolutions, consisting of Mrs. J. D. H. Browne, Mrs. J. E. Cowles, Mrs. J. H. Johnson, Mrs. T. McF. Patton and Mrs. C. L. Barnes.

An invitation to visit the Hospital of the Good Samaritan was extended to all present by the chaplain of the hospital, the Rev. Henderson Judd.

Lunch was served in the lower hall to 259 persons, including many of the clergy.

At 2 p.m. the meeting reopened with a hymn, the Bishop reading the missionary collects.

In the absence of Mrs. W. M. Friesner, Diocesan Secretary of the Babies' Branch, her report, covering ten years' work, was read by the Secretary, Mrs. Bugbee, and accepted.

Mrs. Joseph H. Johnson made a verbal report of the work of the Altar Department.

Mrs. C. J. Willett, United Offering Treasurer, reported 161 new boxes given out this year and \$548.68 received. On motion, her report was accepted.

Mrs. J. E. Cowles was called to the chair while the President read her annual address.

An extract was read from a letter written by Mrs. Laurence B. Ridgely, now in Wu Chang, asking our prayers for China, that that nation may become Christianized before becoming modernized.

The Question Box, skillfully conducted by Mrs. J. E. Cowles, proved an interesting and helpful innovation.

Mrs. Cora R. Brunson, former Diocesan President of the Minnesota Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, spoke of our threefold obligations—prayer, service and gifts.

The offering taken amounted to \$26.16, and with that of the morning service, \$27.13, making a total of \$53.29, to be applied to the General Working Fund.

Mrs. Willett offered the following amendment:

Resolved, That the By-Laws be amended by adding a section to be known as Section 9, to read:

SECTION 9. All moneys collected for the United Offering Fund shall be paid to the Diocesan Treasurer of that fund, and by her paid to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary.

This amendment to be acted upon at the next Annual Meeting.

A letter from Miss Emery was read, urging women to maintain their sense of responsibility for missions during the summer vacation, and suggesting the reading of at least one missionary book and the study of the missionary portions of the Bible.

A letter was read from Deaconess Sophie R. Miller, pertaining to her work among the Indians.

Mrs. J. D. H. Browne presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS, In the providence of God, the Diocese of San Francisco has been called upon to suffer a terrible calamity through earthquake and fire; and

WHEREAS, The House of Churchwomen is bearing its share in this calamity; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Los Angeles, in annual session assembled, extend to Bishop Nichols and to their sisters in the mother diocese their deepest and most heartfelt sympathy, praying that God may have them in His holy keeping in this time of their sore trial, and feeling assured that a great good will grow out of this apparent evil, and that the Church in San Francisco will rise strengthened and blessed from the ordeal through which it is passing. Be it further

Resolved, That the Woman's Auxiliary of Los Angeles has been much touched by the message of loving greeting extended to them by the House of Churchwomen in San Francisco at their last session and presented by Bishop Johnson.

This resolution was adopted by a rising vote.

Mrs. William F. Hubbard offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That a message of loving sympathy be sent Miss Esther Towell, First Vice-President. We sincerely regret that she, who organized the work of the Woman's Auxiliary in Southern California, is unable to attend the tenth anniversary of our Los Angeles Branch, and gratefully acknowledge the invaluable service she has rendered.

Mrs. Bugbee offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That we send to Mrs. William F. Friesner our appreciation of her faithful and loving ten years' service as Secretary of the Babies' Branch, and our sincere regret that she feels unable to longer retain that office. We also desire to express to Miss Emily A. Brown, the faithful and efficient Treasurer, our appreciation of her labor, and our sincere regret that she is obliged to resign her office.

Mrs. Johnson moved that Mrs. Ridgely's request for prayers in behalf of China be not forgotten, and that the Secretary be instructed to convey to the Rev. Mr. Ridgely and Mrs. Ridgely our loving sympathy.

Mrs. Eberhardt read a report from St. Faith's branch of Ascension Church.

The Bishop compared the Auxiliary of the present, under Mrs. Hubert's presidency, with the Auxiliary as he found it on coming to this Diocese, with Miss Towell as its moving spirit, and gave these two leaders well-merited praise. He spoke with appreciation of Mrs. Friesner's work as Secretary of the Babies' Branch, and of Miss Brown's labors as Treasurer, deeply regretting that circumstances prevented them from continuing in office.

The new officers appointed by the Bishop for the coming year are:

Mrs. F. D. Ferrée as Vice-President for the San Diego District.

Mrs. Wm. S. Porter as Vice-President for the Santa Barbara District.

Mrs. Abiel Leonard as Treasurer.

Mrs. Josephine Butler as Secretary of the Babies' Branch.

The President and other officers were reappointed.

The meeting adjourned with the Bishop's benediction.

Report of the Recording Secretary.

During this year the diocesan officers have held ten regular meetings, with an attendance varying from six to eleven.

On June 15th was held at Epiphany Church the first of the Woman's Auxiliary meetings of the Los Angeles district, in connection with the Convocation. Mrs. Hubert presided. Reports from each branch in the district were made. Seventeen branches were represented by delegates. Eighty women were present. Stirring addresses were made by Deaconess Grebe, Mrs. Pallister and Mrs. Willett along their own lines of work.

On July 14th the summer Quarterly was held at Long Beach, in St. Luke's Parish Hall, Mrs. Hubert presiding. Deaconess Metzler, recently from the Diocese of Kyoto, told of the industrial school at Kunazoa where girls receive a Christian education and also are taught embroidery, for which they are paid the usual wages. Deaconess Metzler's own work among the young men was to instill the principles of Christianity, while teaching them English. Miss Forrester, who had long taught in the Mary Josephine Hooker Memorial School in Mexico, traced the growth of the school from its small beginning to recent years. Bishop Johnson highly praised the work done there, stating that the efficiency of the school was largely due to the self-sacrificing life and teaching of the whole Forrester family—the late Rev. Henry Forrester, his wife and daughter. Adjutant Bailey, for years a worker under Bishop Hare in the South Dakota Indian schools and reservations, gave a graphic account of her work among those Indians. This meeting was memorable in that each of these speakers had been an active worker and spoke from personal experience. The offering was given to the Bishop's missionary work.

On November 15th the fall Quarterly was held in connection with the Convocation, in the Church of the Messiah, Santa Ana, Mrs. Hubert in the chair. Fifty-three women were present. Addresses were made by diocesan officers, who explained the scope and purpose of their different departments. The Bishop appealed for seventy-five dollars to repair Church property, and this amount was promised him.

December 13th our annual Quiet Day was held in St. Paul's Pro-Cathedral, conducted by the Rev. William MacCormack, rector of All Saints' Church, Pasadena. The subject of prayer was most helpfully treated.

After the holidays the Diocesan President, Mrs. P. G. Hubert, gave a reception in her home to the clergy, the members of the Woman's Auxiliary and their friends.

On February 13th the winter Quarterly was held in St. Paul's Parish Hall, Mrs. Hubert in the chair. The Rev. Joseph MacConnell, general missionary, told of his trip to Deaconess Miller's mission at La Jolla, and also to Mesa Grande. He spoke further of the great need for missionary work at the beach resorts. Miss Wall, missionary on furlough from the Diocese of Tokyo, appeared in rich Japanese costume. She told of the Japanese women's work, their meetings and their own missions, their work for Formosa. She said the older women visit homes, giving advice and counsel, and that the younger women, who are better educated, help in teaching the young girls. She showed a picture of the beautiful church at Sendai, and urged the

great need of a mission house there for women workers. She spoke feelingly of the threatened famine and the terrible suffering which must occur should the partial rice crop fail. The day being rainy, the attendance was small and likewise the offering. Ten dollars was given to Miss Wall, who applied it to the work at Sendai. Later a special offering of fifty dollars was sent direct to Bishop McKim for the famine sufferers in his diocese.

At the time of the decennial anniversary of the Bishop our President was appointed chairman of the committee to plan and carry out the reception given by the Diocese to Bishop and Mrs. Johnson, February 22d. By a happy thought, a united gift of \$100 was made to the Decennial Fund by the diocesan officers as a body.

Our last work has been to help the sufferers in the San Francisco disaster. The branches gave liberally clothing, food and money. With the hearty approval of the Bishop, our President appealed to the branches for a special additional contribution, and \$130 was sent to Bishop Nichols to aid suffering Churchwomen, preferably those of the Woman's Auxiliary.

So each year we hear of new work and new needs, ever increasing. May we find these increased duties and privileges mean to each of us an upward step on the ladder of life, which leads to "that better country, which is an heavenly."

Report of the Young Woman's Branch.

In the past year the Young Woman's Branch of the Auxiliary of All Saints' Parish, Pasadena, has held twenty regular meetings, five special meetings and one birthday party. The President, Miss Dickinson, presided over all but three of these meetings. The membership has slowly but steadily grown, the attendance at regular meetings varying from eight to twenty-four. When Bishop Kendrick gave his address there was an attendance of sixty-four, including members and guests.

In the past year the Woman's Auxiliary has opened its doors to our organization, and the society will be officially known in the future as the "Young Woman's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary."

Through the able leadership of Miss Dickinson, who was the originator of the idea of this society in All Saints' Parish, the amount of work accomplished has doubled in this its second year of existence.

The pledge of \$100 toward the reading-room for the Church of the Neighborhood, in Los Angeles, has been met; the nurses' fund of \$5 per month is still kept up, and eight boxes of clothing have been sent to the clothing bureau of this same church.

A bulletin board has been placed in the vestibule of All Saints' Church, which is kept filled with missionary literature.

Sufficient money was forwarded for thirty-six prayer books and hymnals for Alaska.

At the annual Christmas bazaar, the branch had a miscellaneous table, which netted \$35.30. The Christmas work consisted of mounting seventy Perry pictures, which were sent to the Good Samaritan Hospital and the Church of the Neighborhood, of Los Angeles, and the Good Shepherd Hospital, at Fort Defiance. To Miss Thackara, at Fort Defiance, there was sent before Christmas \$6 to be used in surgical work. Eight children's scrap books have been completed and will be used in the children's ward at the Good Samaritan Hospital. Missionary scrap books have now been started, which will be retained in the library of the society.

At Easter a box was made up for a diocesan missionary to the value of \$30.

During the year a birthday box has been introduced, into which every one, as her birthday is celebrated, is asked to put a penny for every year of her life. The special object toward which this shall be contributed to be decided at the annual birthday party.

At the birthday party one year ago, the branch had the pleasure of listening to talks by the Rev. Mr. MacCormack, the Rev. Mr. Marshall, Deaconess Grebe and Miss Morison. During the year Bishop Kendrick and Mrs. P. Gengembre Hubert addressed the branch.

Although the work accomplished has doubled this year, the hope is entertained that each coming year may be marked with even greater success.

Report of the Junior Auxiliary.



Motto: St. Luke ii: 49—

"Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business."

Looking back over the Junior report of a previous year, 1901, I see the Secretary then, Miss Elliott, was constrained to say: "Our

usual work has been done this year with such increasing good results that every member has reason to be proud." Today I repeat her words, and so will you when you hear us report a grand total for the year of \$851.34, and in addition to this amount \$31.29 has been received and expended in the lantern and library fund.

We now have in the Missionary Library forty bound volumes, thirty-six of the Soldier and Servant series, forty-two Round Robin and one hundred leaflets. During the year we have loaned forty-eight books and forty leaflets, given the lantern exhibit five times and loaned it once to the Church of the Neighborhood. We would urge all the branches to make use of these things provided for them.

We have had ten meetings of the Secretary's branch, four of them being missionary meetings, when the diocesan, foreign, Indian and domestic fields of work were presented by able speakers. We would thank Bishop Johnson, the Rev. William MacCormack, the Rev. T. C. Marshall, and Miss Wall, of Japan, for their instructive talks to us on these several occasions.

Another cause for rejoicing is, the Birthday Bed Fund has reached and gone beyond the \$1000 mark.

Our Christmas exhibit was a credit to the many little ones who sent sufficient toys for six boxes, which were sent to five Indian reservations.

Eight branches responded to our Bishop's appeal for canned and fresh fruit for the hospital.

We have visited and spoken at different branches thirty times during the year.

Three branches have been reorganized and three lively new branches organized—St. Andrew's and St. Matthias', Los Angeles, with thirty and forty members respectively, and the Little Helpers, at Redlands, under the leadership of Mrs. J. H. Logie.

It is such good news that I must tell it to you—that the boys are coming in, in ever increasing numbers, at least twenty in the two new branches mentioned above.

Finally, we have felt for a long time the need of some sort of a service and admission card for use in the several branches. It gives us pleasure to say that such cards have now been printed and may be had free for the asking.

Our missionary evening at Christ Church was a grand success; fully eight hundred persons were present. The Juniors rendered the program remarkably well. Surely the Junior work in the Diocese must take on new life and energy after so striking an illustration of what they have done and can do.

Junior Entertainment.

A unique and intensely interesting Diocesan Junior Evening was held at Christ Church during Convention week. Many and varied were the exhibits: An Alaskan igloo, snow-covered and occupied by little ones in Alaskan furs and caps, who crawled in and out of the

low doorway. A Chinese pagoda, with rare and beautiful flags, curios and pictures, where Chinese attendants formed a picturesque contrast to their Alaskan neighbors. Descendants of Uncle Tom discoursed darky melodies during the evening from their typical southern cabin. Some twenty or more children from St. Luke's, Los Angeles, entered into the spirit of their characters, and with their blackened faces and slices of watermelon seemed transported from "way down in Dixie."

Not so attractive to the ordinary passer-by, but quite as useful to perplexed Junior leaders, was the exhibit of the Secretary's branch, with its lantern and slides, its leaflets, books and curios collected from many sources by our indefatigable Secretary, Deaconess Grebe.

The Philippines, with their palm-covered hut and valuable souvenirs from these islands, next attracted our attention, faced across the room by a Torii, a Shinto shrine where tea, goldfish, incense, cherry blossoms and Japanese maidens were intermingled in delightful profusion.

Indians with scalping knives and war paint looked fiercely out from their tepee, and had it not been that they flew the Stars and Stripes, we might have felt afraid of such warlike companions.

A hospital scene showed many views of the interior of our Hospital of the Good Samaritan.

It was worth coming some distance to see the wife of the rector of St. Stephen's, Hollywood, attired as an Hawaiian princess, with a palm-leaf skirt, and garlanded with flowers fashioned in the true Hawaiian style, attended by other lesser dignitaries of her court.

Promptly at a quarter to eight o'clock a processional was played, and the white-robed children's choir of Christ Church marched and took their places in front of the platform, and the program, to which we had all been looking forward, had begun.

After a few words of explanation and welcome by Bishop Johnson, Deaconess Grebe and the Rev. Baker P. Lee, we were confronted with a girl in flowing garments, who told us of the hardships and difficulties of being a follower of the Lord in Antioch, where the disciples were first called Christians. She was followed by others appropriately dressed, representing the progress of Christianity down the centuries until the present time; when one of the Christ Church cadets appeared to tell us that although we did not have the same hindrances that those before us have had, still there was need of watchfulness now as much as ever.

St. Paul's Juniors, twenty-two strong, with banners, gave in rhyme the names of the missionary bishops, together with some of the characteristics of their work.

A clock which had adorned the platform all the evening and caused much comment was brought into use by the Juniors of St. Matthias, as, in their Dutch caps, they recited verses of Scripture for each hour, telling how short is the time for work in the Master's vine-yard.

Many Junior leaders wished that the "Officer's Dream," so well given as a dream, might indeed be fulfilled, and that the members of their branch might have the honor of being the messengers for God in the dark places of the earth.

A little tot brought tears to the eyes of many as she sang "Little Black Me," a hope in the childish heart that there might indeed be a place in heaven for her in spite of her black face.

Several children of different nationalities next appeared and told in rhyme a song of missionary work in their homes far away.

A hush fell over the audience as banners of different sizes, bearing puzzling figures, were slowly carried to the platform. These, we discovered, represented the Sunday-school Lenten offering at various periods between 1878, when it was \$7,000, and the current year, when it has reached the sum of \$125,000.

A congress of the nations came to the platform, and all present joined with them in singing the grand missionary hymn "Wider and wider yet."

After a few words of praise and congratulation from our Bishop, this most successful entertainment was closed and another opportunity given to inspect the homes of the various people represented.

The branches of St. Paul's, St. John's, St. Luke's, Vernon, and St. Luke's, Long Beach, were represented by faithful, earnest, regular members, and I have no hesitation in saying that any one of these, if called upon at a moment's notice, would be able to give an intelligent and interesting talk upon the country, the people, its pagan religions and its early Christianity, and I am sure they will all agree that we have derived much pleasure as well as profit from our meetings. Many packages of current literature were also taken to hospitals, sailors, firemen, Coffee Club at Redlands, isolated people in the mountains and elsewhere, and packages of cards were sent to La Jolla and Mesa Grande Indian reservations, and literature to the Church of the Neighborhood.

As reported to the Correspondent, 101 current and secular papers and magazines are mailed by the contributors; 7 calendars, 30 pictures, 153 cards, 4,689 odd papers and magazines (mainly the latter) have been sent out during the past year. An active interest is being taken in our work by our librarians, who deserve to have their efforts warmly seconded.

Twice during the season parcels of current literature, also a few books, have been sent the Correspondent by tourists at the Raymond, Pasadena, thanks to the suggestion of the wife of our Bishop.

It should be placed on record that the Church Periodical Club of our Los Angeles branch of the Woman's Auxiliary sent out traveling libraries fifteen months earlier than the California State Library at Sacramento.

Your Correspondent can not report in full in regard to our twelve traveling libraries, as a number are awaiting shipment, but she trusts soon to make a new departure in this arm of the service. It seems fitting that the Albert Gallatin Goodall Memorial, the gift of our President, and the Robert Beach Boothe Memorial, which was the first donated and has been sent to nine places in Southern California, should be the pioneers in going outside of our Diocese.

The Elizabeth Miner Memorial has been improved by the gift of over \$5 worth of new books from her mother, and the William Gold Hubbard Memorial was re-arranged last July and more than \$20 worth of new books added.

Twelve clergymen of our Diocese and one in the missionary jurisdiction of Sacramento have each received a theological work of his own choosing. Much to the regret of your Correspondent, this fund is now nearly exhausted. The clergy have been very appreciative of these favors.

CONSTITUTION.

I. This Society shall be called THE LOS ANGELES BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

II. The object of the Society is: By systematic and united effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese, to promote the study of missions, and to encourage prayer for missions.

III. The Church itself is the great Missionary Society, and every person, by baptism, becomes a member of this Society; therefore, every baptized woman in the Diocese is a member of the Woman's Auxiliary. But terms of membership in any parish branch shall be fixed by that branch.

IV. All Parish Societies that so desire may become branches of this Auxiliary, first obtaining the consent of the Rector or Clergyman-in-charge, by appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

V. A President, a First Vice-President, a Vice-President over such divisions of the Diocese as the Bishop may counsel, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Junior Department, a Secretary of the Babies' Branch, a Directress of the Altar Department, a Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, a Secretary of the Missions Classes, and an officer over any other department that may be formed, shall be appointed by the Bishop.

VI. The Annual Meeting shall be held at the time of the Diocesan Convention, and Quarterly Meetings on such dates and in such places as the President may appoint. General meetings may be arranged by the Vice-Presidents, in their respective districts.

VII. An Annual Quiet Day shall be held during the season of Advent.

BY-LAWS.

1. The duty of the President shall be to preside at the meetings of the Society, and have general charge of the work, under the direction of the Bishop. The First Vice-President shall act for the President in her absence, and assist her in the care and oversight of the work. The duty of the other Vice-Presidents shall be to preside in the absence of the President at the general meetings held in their several charges, and to co-operate with the President in the supervision of the work of the Auxiliary in the sections to which they respectively belong.
2. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary, under the direction of the President, to correspond with the General Secretary of the Auxiliary and the various branches of the Diocese, to furnish them with work, to collect their reports, and to prepare an annual report.
3. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to give notice of meetings, to keep a record of such meetings, and to prepare an abstract of the minutes for the annual report.
4. The Treasurer shall keep an account of all moneys received and expended, and make a report at the Annual Meeting.
5. The Secretary of the Junior Department, the Secretary of the Babies' Branch, the Directress of the Altar Department, the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, and the Secretary of the Missions Classes shall superintend their several departments, in consultation with the other Diocesan Officers.
6. The Secretaries of Parish Branches are required to correspond with the Diocesan Officers, who *alone correspond* with the General Secretary and the Secretaries of the Board of Missions, and transmit to them all moneys.
7. Each Parish Branch shall make an annual pledge, according to its ability, to the current expenses and work of the Diocesan Branch, and also to the Bishop's Missionary Fund for Diocesan work.
8. At the Annual Meeting each branch represented shall be entitled to but one vote on business of general import.

This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended by a motion being made at the Annual Meeting, and voted on the following year.

Address of the President.

To the Right Reverend the Bishop and Woman's Auxiliary:

Our tenth anniversary, which we celebrate today, makes this Annual Meeting one of unusual interest; and the nature of this report becomes naturally a review, retrospective to old members, and to others a page of history.

When we speak of our tenth anniversary, let no one suppose that Auxiliary work in Los Angeles and vicinity has been carried on only ten years; for he who runs may read, and by reading the yearly reports of the Diocese of California, will learn that the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was established in 1880, and soon thereafter we find records of branches in and about Los Angeles working under the San Francisco leadership. St. Paul's, Los Angeles, Pasadena, Santa Ana and Santa Barbara are among the very first names appearing on the list of contributors, and in the first detailed report, printed in San Francisco in 1883-4, we find under Los Angeles "Miss Emma Grebe's Sunday-school class, box to Quinalt Agency, \$8.40."

In the Eighth Annual Report, 1888, Mrs. Lawver, the Diocesan Secretary, says: "The Los Angeles branch deserves special mention, not only for its good work, but on account of the position it will assume as a focus for the larger *diocesan* work in the years soon coming. Regularly organized in May, 1887, it holds monthly meetings for the transaction of business and the diffusion of missionary intelligence. It has seven collectors besides the usual officers, and sixty regular contributors giving from ten cents to a dollar per month. The Secretary and other chief movers in this work were 'Auxiliaries' in their Eastern homes, and coming to a new diocese were glad to take up the old work. It reports: Vestments, clerical furnishings, clothing to missionaries, and cash, \$331.70."

Our own dear Miss Towell was in particular *the* especial one of these "Easterners," who established the first Auxiliary work in Los Angeles, and it is our privilege and pleasure to have her wise guidance and unabated interest continuing with us.

The Ninth Annual Report, of 1899, states: "In the Auxiliary of St. Paul's, Los Angeles, the high standard of last year's work has

been maintained. It has given in boxes and Church furnishings \$178.75; in cash, \$76.50; total, \$225.25. During Lent the branch Secretary (Miss Towell) organized the 'Little Missionaries,' a most precious band. Their simple work is planned to educate them rather than to add largely to mission receipts. Total receipts from Los Angeles, 1899, \$264.60. The Pasadena branch, though feeling the demand upon it of church building, continues its missionary labors zealously, and reports boxes, \$59.25; cash, \$45.10; total, \$104.35.' It is thus early in the history of the Pasadena branch that we find the name of Miss Wotkyns as Secretary, and today she is one of our diocesan officers.

This same report continues: "To our strong branches is this year added another, which so far reaches an ideal as to here merit detailed notice. On June 13th the mission chapter of St. Paul's Guild, San Diego, which had before this done good missionary work, became a branch of our Auxiliary. Meetings are held weekly, the third of the month being made an instruction meeting, to which members contribute articles and items of interest. Dues of active members were placed at 15 cents a month and honorary members 50 cents. The varied and valuable work which it has completed with so little help from diocesan officers is shown in this result: Cash, \$118.00; boxes, \$407.10; total, \$525.10, and the juvenile branch giving to St. James' Church Sunday-school \$17.50, made a total from St. Paul's, San Diego, of \$542.60." It was during this year that the Riverside branch joined.

In 1890 Mrs. Lawver reports: "The first society to join the Junior Auxiliary was the Little Missionaries of St. Paul's branch Sunday-school, Los Angeles. They include boys as well as girls, and a boy treasurer guards the funds. Seventeen members, each giving a penny a week and spending an hour sewing and making picture books. They have started a birthday fund, and during this year these Juniors have given \$32.25, the total by St. Paul's, Los Angeles, being \$364.30."

In 1891 Pasadena sent its first missionary box, valued at \$90.00, and its total with cash offerings shows \$131.00. During this year many new branches from the south added their names—Escondido, Oceanside, Coronado, Ventura, Pomona, Santa Monica, Los Angeles Epiphany and Los Angeles Ascension.

In 1892, in St. Paul's, Los Angeles, one of the missionary boxes was undertaken with 90 cents in its treasury. When finished, the box was valued at \$108.00. "How is this for faith and works?" asked the Secretary.

And so the organization grew until in the report of the Sixteenth Annual Meeting, held in St. Luke's Church, San Francisco, Bishop Nichols presiding, we read: "It was our privilege to hear a most stirring sermon from Bishop Johnson. Surely every one must have awokened to a new sense in regard to domestic missions as the Bishop described the possibilities of the work, the extent and resources of the country, the need of the work, the influx of foreigners forgetful of religion and exposed to new temptations. We indeed felt that domestic missions are our best service to our country as well as a duty to God." This was *our* Bishop's first missionary sermon, and Bishop Nichols, in his charge to the Auxiliary, dwelt upon the division of the branch which should give better opportunity for developing the territory within each new organization.

In Mrs. Lawver's report on this eventful occasion we read: "Today I have the unique privilege of presenting to two bishops the record of one work, and in welcoming the Bishop of Los Angeles to this, the other half of his Auxiliary—for we claim him as our own—for one short day we defy ecclesiastical canons, scorn precedent and set up two bishops in equal authority over one territory, the loyal hearts of the yet undivided branch—hearts which no division of the diocese can sunder." At the end of that day's business the same Secretary concludes: "And now farewell. To what shall I liken this parting? We see on some plant of our care a vigorous branch shooting upward and outward, blossoming, fruiting, bristling with twigs that divide its duty of giving and taking. We look again, the branch has divided and now there are two, the same fiber though they grow apart, always the same sap, but more twiglets, more leaves, more blossoms and fruit. Thus may it be with us—two branches reaching upward to one source of energy, our roots one, one world to bless, parting only that we may give more widely of our protecting love. And so it is not farewell, but good-bye. God be with us both, and of His perfect love give us a perfect work to do." And thus we reached the parting of the ways.

On May 25, 1896, on the day preceding the First Annual Convention of the Diocese of Los Angeles, Bishop Johnson held a primary meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and appointed the first officers. Twenty-three parish branches and ten Juniors composed the new diocesan organization, seventy-seven remaining in the northern diocese. During this meeting a telegram was received from Mrs. Lawver bearing a touching message of loving greeting from the Auxiliary in the north to the new diocesan branch.

In the report of this primary meeting, Mrs. Kellogg, the first President, said: "We are entering upon our new life as a separate diocesan

branch, a little twig as yet, but destined, we hope, to grow to a fair flowering and a goodly fruitage. Let us then prove our loyalty to our new Bishop whose soul is in the cause of missions; to the Board of Missions whose handmaids we are; to the Church in her greatest work, and to our Blessed Lord in the zeal with which we enter upon our first year's work."

In answer to which Bishop Johnson said in part: "I have already indicated my interest in this Woman's Auxiliary. Unlike diocesan and parish organizations, it has behind it the authority of the whole Church. For that reason alone, if for no other, I feel that its work demands the sympathy and aid of the bishops, and that, at the very outset of my episcopate, I ought to make my personal interest understood and felt. It is my desire that every baptized woman in this Diocese should appreciate that, by virtue of her baptism, she is a member of the Auxiliary, and that the Church, by such a broad conception of this society, has imposed upon every woman an obligation to help by prayer and labor the great cause of missions. I beg those who realize this fact to rise up to it, and I entreat women, as I also entreat the clergy, to make this fact widely and generally known."

And so we were established as a separate diocesan branch. The Bishop of Los Angeles took his Auxiliary into his own keeping, and, as predicted, "its future was assured." Under his guidance the earnest-hearted leaders began their duties, and the members of the ever-increasing branches worked faithfully, growing to fair proportions until eight years had passed, when a great meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held during the Seventh District Conference. There were present seven bishops and several hundred people, and the Rt. Rev. William F. Nichols, Bishop of California, making his first visit since the division of the diocese, said that as a mother felt pride in seeing her daughter grow in stature to her own height, so he rejoiced to see this young branch grown even to such a height; and later, that most efficient officer, Mrs. Lawver, who had guided our infancy and sent us forth with such tender words of God speed, graciously said that the delegation of California was very proud of the Los Angeles branch, who had grown as "a twin rather than a daughter."

And so today we round the milestone of our first decade and pause a moment to examine the "small twig," looking to see whether it has reached the dimensions so earnestly anticipated by the first President.

In actual number of branches we cannot say we have grown very much. We number only forty-five. Some of our strongest branches of a few years ago have become weaker, some of the weak ones have grown stronger. Some missions which were strong have lost the

services of a clergyman and drifted, and other encouraging instances exist where, even in the absence of clergy and services for years, the Auxiliary alone has held the people together and continued steadfast.

Our numbers have not increased as we would wish. If the call—not of an organization but of the Church—to every baptized woman has not yet brought the full response, it must be that those women who have recognized this moral responsibility have been doubly earnest, for the report of this our tenth year shows results.

The first natural claim upon us is helping the missionaries of our own diocese, and we have responded to every request, and further have insisted upon giving assistance to some who feared to burden us and had to be urged to accept our services. In addition to the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund we raised \$75.00 for his use on the Colegrove Mission, and our Juniors sent full supplies to Mrs. Miller for Christmas needs of the Indian Mission. It was our further privilege to send several Christmas boxes outside the Diocese, and one of the recipients wrote to Miss Emery saying: "We feel very grateful to you for putting our needs in such good hands."

In a letter received this week from Miss Emery, she "hopes" we will surely have our apportionment paid by August, and we have the pleasure of notifying her that our Treasurer sent the last check completing it before this meeting.

We are supplying entirely the needs of the growing mission at Tanana, Alaska, having just shipped fourteen bales of almost entirely new clothing and five boxes, one containing \$25.00 worth of medicine.

Just at the close of our year, with a treasury almost depleted, the payment of all pledges and specials just met, came the appalling news of the destruction of San Francisco by earthquake and fire. Not only messages of sympathy were sent at once from the Auxiliary, but a fund was promptly raised and a check of \$130.00 sent to Bishop Nichols to meet some special needs of our own Churchwomen who might not be assisted through any other agency.

It is a sorrow that we must part from some of our dear co-workers this year. The health of our faithful and devoted Treasurer precludes her acceptance of another term of office, and for like reasons we must lose our very dear Secretary of the Babies' Branch, whose name has been on the working list of diocesan officers during the full span of our ten years of life; and also Mrs. Knox, Vice-President, of Santa Barbara, who was likewise appointed by the Bishop at the primary meeting.

During this year a delightful Missions Study Class has been conducted under exceptionally able leadership. Our new chapels and missions are being supplied under the direction of the Altar Department.

The twenty-two branches of the Junior Department, the Babies' Branch and Church Periodical Club work call for special reports.

The amount of work being accomplished through the energy of our splendid leaders in each department is something to be thankful for, and yet we dare say scarcely a word of thanks, for the spirit in which these officers work is too far above lip praise. The development of the Young Woman's Branch, as shown by their report, is most gratifying.

Besides the contributions in kind, our Treasurer reports a cash total for the year of \$3,175.41. You see the Women, Juniors and Babies have been wide awake. And yet these gratifying results are far from satisfying. While we are in no sense disheartened, this is not the ideal aim we hold in view. I hope there are present many women who have not yet signified their active association with the Woman's Auxiliary, for it is especially to them I would bring my message today.

The members are justified in their sense of pleasure over the results of the year, but increased membership is the only real red-letter mark, and I am convinced that the only reason we have not doubled and tripled the forty-five branches reported, is that the words of our Bishop, the ruling of our Church, the command of our Blessed Lord have not yet reached the understanding of our women. We have heard these same words often, but without hearing their meaning. It is an unintentional though deplorable fact, and I beg every woman present to let this message today reach that inner understanding and recognize the "still small voice" which calls to the fulfilment of the Christ command.

In the State of California there are over ten thousand club women. Shall we be satisfied until the Woman's Auxiliary outnumbers any humanly planned organization? We are living in an age when we can all do more than one thing. When it was necessary to make by hand the tallow dip to give light at night, to spin and weave the linen for our clothing, to strike a flint before a fire could be kindled, the possibilities of outside interests were necessarily limited. But now that the touch of a match ignites the gas stove, a turn of a button illuminates our homes, and sewing machines do in an hour what aforetime required days, we *have* time for more outside interests, and it is only a question of adapting our time and thoughts to live a well-rounded, useful and glad life. Club life is full of helpfulness—it develops the mind, it widens opportunity, it teaches organization, and is an undeniable advantage in the lives of very many women; but we can create evil out of that which is good, unless we combine the

varied needs of soul and spirit, and a character is warped when developed on a straight line. If we study the requirements of the Woman's Auxiliary we will find that no woman in this Diocese is too busy to be a member, and when all is said can our consciences presume to disregard the commission placed upon each one of us by our Lord Christ?

Dear members of the Auxiliary, take this thought of personal responsibility for your own. Do not fail in service to your neighbor by not telling her how much we need her. And those of you who are not yet expressed members, consider the fact that a Church life is incomplete without this membership. Let us not wait for tomorrow—all too soon it has become yesterday—only today is our own, only today can we work, only for today is strength promised. Summer is almost here, it is not meant for a season of idleness, but preparation; it is the seed-planting time for the Advent harvest. Let each day as it dawns be the *today* of our best endeavors. "We are haunted by an ideal life, and it is because we have within us the beginning and the possibility of it."

Shall we not one and all go forth from this our tenth anniversary, determined to extend the influence of the Auxiliary, with a renewed sense of personal responsibility?
