

The Woman's Auxiliary asks the prayers of the Church on the Festival of the Transfiguration of Christ (August 6th), the Auxiliary's “Altar Day.”

The following resolution was unanimously adopted at the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, St. John's Church, Los Angeles, May 24, 1898, and endorsed the following day by the Diocesan Convention, with the addition that where practicable the offerings be devoted to the General Fund of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz. :

Resolved, That we set apart the Feast of the Epiphany for an Auxiliary Day, and that, as members of the Auxiliary, we consider it not only a privilege but a duty to attend the services held on that day in the parish to which we belong; and further,

Resolved, That should the appointment of this day meet with the approbation of the clergymen of the Diocese, they be requested to offer, at the celebration of the Holy Eucharist on the Feast of the Epiphany, special prayers for the work of the Auxiliary.

Minutes of the Eleventh Annual Meeting.

ST. PAUL'S PRO-CATHEDRAL,
LOS ANGELES, May 14, 1907.

The Eleventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Los Angeles opened with the celebration of the Holy Communion in St. Paul's Pro-Cathedral at 9:45 a. m. The Right Rev. Joseph Horsfall Johnson, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese, officiated, assisted by the Very Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., and the Rev. Henderson Judd. The sermon was preached by the Rev. Angus M. Porter, of Redlands.

Immediately after the service, the Auxiliary organized for business in the Parish Hall.

At roll-call 192 women responded from 38 branches.

Reports were read by the following diocesan officers, and, on motion, accepted: Mrs. J. E. Cowles, Vice-President of the Los Angeles district; Mrs. T. McF. Patton, Vice-President of the Riverside district; Mrs. F. D. Ferree, Vice-President of the San Diego district; Mrs. William S. Porter, Vice-President of the Santa Barbara district; Mrs. L. C. Spencer, Recording Secretary; Mrs. B. Marshall Wotkyns, Secretary of Box Work, and Mrs. Abiel Leonard, Treasurer, whose report had been duly audited. Mrs. J. H. Johnson, Directress of the Altar Department, made a verbal report.

The Bishop offered the noonday prayers for missions.

Reports of the following diocesan officers were read and accepted: Miss Elizabeth Dickinson, Secretary of the Young Woman's Branch; Deaconess Emma B. Grebe, Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary; Mrs. Josephine Butler, Secretary of the Babies' Branch; Mrs. Pallister, Secretary of the Missions Study Classes; Mrs. William F. Hubbard, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, and Mrs. E. J. Willett, Treasurer of the United Offering, who, in giving her report, made a strong plea in favor of raising the United Offering in this Diocese to the sum of \$2,100, to mark the twenty-first anniversary of the beginning of the United Offering in Chicago. Miss Emily A. Brown read the Treasurer's report of the new Japanese mission at 1334 South Flower Street.

The Bishop spoke appreciatively of all the work as shown by these reports. He suggested that members give papers and magazines to street-car men to read while waiting at the end of the line,

and also to firemen. He noted with pleasure that this was the largest attended morning session in the history of our Auxiliary.

At 1 o'clock luncheon was served in the lower hall to 237 people.

At 2:15 p.m. the meeting reopened with a hymn. The Auxiliary collects were offered by the Rev. F. A. Brigham.

The President then introduced Mr. Brigham, the Indian priest and missionary at Walpole Island, Ontario, near Detroit, as the first speaker. Mr. Brigham said he was thirteen years old before the light of the Gospel dawned upon him, but that Indians were deeply religious in their own way and saw God in everything; that they believed in a real God and looked forward to the coming of a mysterious Redeemer.

Mrs. J. E. Cowles then gave a graphic account of her visit to the Church schools for the Chinese, the Japanese and the Hawaiians in Honolulu, and described the Sunday services at the Cathedral, St. Peter's Church and St. Elizabeth's Mission.

Deaconess Clara Carter, of Fairbanks, Alaska, described the hospital life and work of that mission. In their busy lives, morning, noon and evening prayers are never omitted, so that the hospitals are permeated with the religious atmosphere, and hospital work is growing to be of the utmost importance in Alaska. A new mission is to be started among the Koyakuk Indians, some ten miles above the Arctic circle, near Bettles, to be known as St. John's in the Wilderness, where Miss Carter will minister on her return.

Mrs. Hubbard asked that small, dainty articles for the annual fair at Fairbanks be sent by mail.

The offering was taken for the general work. It amounted to \$73.92; at the morning service \$23.45, afternoon \$49.97.

The President then called upon Mrs. Edwin Grice, of Philadelphia, for many years a diocesan vice-president in New Jersey, and an officer in many clubs. Mrs. Grice begged that women who had training in club work should take their training and experience into Auxiliary work, there becoming leaders of study classes on missionary lines. She said that only passion and devotion to our Christ can cast out the passion and greed of this world. She said that there is always a question in educational conferences as to whether examinations are worth while, but that the Great Teacher always put the disciples under the examination test, and down through the centuries it can still be heard: "Lovest thou me?" If thou lovest, then serve.

The Bishop beautifully supplemented these earnest words of Mrs. Grice.

The Question Box and Discussion was in charge of Mrs. William S. Porter, of Santa Barbara.

Mrs. Porter held the chair while the President read her Annual Address.

The Bishop called attention to the fact that yesterday, May 13, was the anniversary of the date on which the three famous ships, the Godspeed, the Discovery and the Constant, arrived in Jamestown bay, three hundred years ago.

The Bishop reappointed the President and all the diocesan officers for the coming year.

A young Japanese student named Light Shinjiro Mayakawa spoke of our newly established Japanese mission, and begged for the earnest prayers of the Auxiliary in its behalf. All are invited to visit it at their convenience, at 1334 South Flower Street.

The following resolution, offered by Mrs. Willett at the last Annual Meeting, was adopted:

Resolved, That the By-Laws be amended by adding a section to be known as Section 9.

SECTION 9. All moneys collected for the United Offering Fund shall be paid to the Diocesan Treasurer of that fund, and by her paid to the Auxiliary Treasurer.

A short letter from a colored girl in Louisville, Ky., was read. She has compiled a cook book and offers it for sale at \$1.25, all the proceeds to go for the benefit of their mission.

The President begged the members to remember that this is the beginning of the new year, and urged them to hold meetings during the summer and not let them lapse during vacation.

The meeting then adjourned with the Bishop's benediction.

Report of the Recording Secretary.

During this year the diocesan officers have held nine regular meetings, at which the attendance ranged from eight to thirteen, except on one stormy day when only four could attend.

Two new branches—St. Matthias' and St. Mark's—have been formed, and others have been reorganized or revived.

On July 19th the Summer Quarterly was held in St. Luke's Parish Hall, Long Beach, Mrs. Hubert presiding. The Rev. Charles E. Spalding related incidents of his recent visit to Deaconess Miller's

mission at La Jolla, saying the services were largely attended by the Indians. The President gave an interesting resume of mission work in many fields, speaking especially of work with which we are most actively connected. Mrs. J. E. Cowles read extracts from the journal of the Rev. L. B. Ridgely, describing Easter week at Wu Chang, China. The Rev. Frank Bugbee gave a graphic account of the desolation in San Francisco at the time of the great disaster, describing particularly the ruined churches, and dwelling with heartfelt appreciation on the immediate and generous assistance of the Church at large. Two letters from Bishop Aves, of Mexico, were read, one containing greetings and expressing regret at his inability to be present, the other to his cousin, Miss Rouse, explaining the work and needs of his jurisdiction. The offering was taken for the Church in Mexico, and \$25 sent to Bishop Aves for that purpose.

On October 4th the Fall Quarterly was held in St. Paul's Parish Hall, Mrs. Hubert in the chair. The Rev. Jules Prevost, from Tanana, Alaska, made the address, giving practical hints of great value to each worker present. He spoke of the use which is made of the contents of the large bales we send annually, and the great benefit derived therefrom by the mission as well as by the Indians, who are required, unless sick or infirm, to make some return, in labor or otherwise, for the supplies they receive. He stated that last year the offerings of the Indians at Tanana were larger than those of any other congregation in Alaska. He told us of his faithful helpers, Blind Patil, Stephen, and Policeman John, asking that special packages be made up and marked for them. (Stephen Minister has since died.) Mr. Prevost was on his way East to complete the medical studies set aside thirteen years ago to accept an urgent call to the Alaska mission field. His successor at Tanana is the Rev. Mr. Hoare, from Eagle. The offering was devoted to the Alaska freight. Miss Pattison, who has been a missionary in Japan for five years, and since then a worker in San Francisco among the Japanese, spoke of her work there, and stated she was about to begin such work in Los Angeles, under the Bishop's charge.

On November 7th the third of the district meetings was held in All Saints' Parish Hall, Pasadena, Mrs. J. E. Cowles, Vice-President of the Los Angeles District, presiding. As usual, in the morning there was a joint service for the Convocation and the Auxiliary. Mrs. Doolittle, recently returned from Honolulu, read a short paper on work there among the Chinese. She voiced Bishop Restarick's urgent plea for help in training Chinese for the priesthood, stating that \$40 a year would educate a Chinese lad there. Reports were

made by the diocesan officers. Deaconess Miller thanked the Auxiliary for the help, comfort and encouragement always given her, and asked that the same affectionate interest be continued to her successor. Miss Pattison spoke of her work now beginning among the Japanese in Los Angeles, and asked the help of all branches, suggesting that each member be asked to contribute ten cents monthly to this important work. Mrs. Hubert made a strong plea for tithing our incomes, thus providing a sure fund for missionary work. The Bishop spoke of the importance of this Japanese work and the immediate need of a house for it. The new branch of St. Matthias', Los Angeles, was welcomed. Twenty-three branches were represented. The attendance was encouragingly large.

On December 14th the Annual Quiet Day was held in St. Paul's Pro-Cathedral, the Right Rev. the Bishop, conductor. There were meditations on the Messianic Psalms, on the manner of prayer, the withdrawal into one's closet, meaning that concentration which may be practiced anywhere and everywhere, leading to genuine honesty with oneself and the need of unfailing persistence. The perfect prayer—the Lord's prayer—was explained sentence by sentence, beginning and ending with praise to God; the prayer for others and for our every need. The large congregation dispersed with a deepened realization of the duty and helpfulness of such prayer.

On March 12th the Winter Quarterly was held in Christ Church Sunday-school room, Los Angeles. Mrs. Hubert presided, and presented a thoughtful paper on the origin and growth of woman's work for missions, dating from New Testament days. She urged that above the imperative claim of each parish and mission was the command of our Blessed Lord, "*Go ye into all the world,*" which could not be disregarded. The offering towards a scholarship was \$27. The Bishop introduced the Rev. F. A. Brigham, a North American Indian priest, who has been ministering to his own people at Walpole Lake, Ontario. Mr. Brigham's Indian name signifies one who brings the light. Mr. Brigham's text was "*To the Jew first and then to the Gentile.*" Over two hundred were present, including seven of the clergy.

The President has visited and addressed most of the branches in the Diocese during the year, carrying encouragement and enthusiasm. Many visits to branches far and near have been made by other diocesan officers, and much interest has been aroused, the results of which are visible.

Report of the Young Woman's Auxiliary.

Everything must have a beginning, and some beginnings are but small ones. So it is with the Young Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese. The first branch was that of All Saints', Pasadena, which will celebrate its third birthday the latter part of this month. The original plan of using this branch, with its two meetings a month, one for study of missions, the other for work for missions, as a pattern, has been somewhat modified, as in some parishes it has been deemed more advisable to devote to missionary work and thought one meeting a month of some already formed organization of young women.

The Church of the Epiphany, Los Angeles, was the second to open its doors, and a missionary chapter was organized in the Girls' Friendly Society. During Lent its members united with the Daughters of the King and the Clover Leaf Society in most excellent work for the Alaska missionary box.

The Altar Guild of St. John's, Los Angeles, is reading along missionary lines at its weekly meetings.

At St. Luke's, Long Beach, St. Margaret's Guild and St. Mary's Guild are each holding one missionary meeting a month, and the former guild has begun the study of missions in Alaska.

As the purpose of this branch of the work becomes better understood, it is hoped that it will find a ready welcome in more and more parishes, and this tiny acorn may grow into a splendid oak of many branches.



Report of the Box Work.

In Advent, besides boxes sent to diocesan missionaries from twenty-six branches, clerical suits were given to six missionaries by Coronado, Riverside, Santa Barbara, St. John's (Los Angeles) and Pasadena; enough money sent by other branches to buy suits for two other missionaries. Then two special boxes were sent—one to Port Townsend and one to a widowed daughter of a clergyman, both of which were most gratefully received. The Lenten work has been most satisfactory in every way; forty branches have sent boxes for Alaska, and in nearly all cases money towards the freight. Much improvement is shown in the work on garments, for, with few exceptions, the clothing has been new, and, if second-hand, in good condition. Special mention should be made of the box sent from San Gabriel; it was a delight—twelve sets of infants' outfits beautifully made, fit for the dearest baby in the home of any one. Also the two sets of baby outfits from our youngest daughter, St. Matthias'; and those from the Young Woman's Branch of All Saints', Pasadena. Santa Barbara also sent a specially good box.

It was not only a pleasure, but a privilege, to help pack the boxes for Alaska, from all the goodly store sent to us for that purpose. Sixteen bales and a box of medicine are ready to start on the journey to the far north. The wife of one of the missionaries came in while the packing was being done. She remarked that she had always thought the best boxes were sent from Philadelphia, but the one sent this year from our own Diocese, Los Angeles, was the finest ever sent to Tanana.

I congratulate you, one and all, most heartily. We wish, however, that the work could be divided more evenly, and that the boxes to our diocesan missionaries at Christmas could be more generous or money sent more liberally for the clerical suits. The good done in the fashioning of comfortable, shapely garments for the families of our missionaries who go to the front is not the only benefit resulting from our meetings in each parish branch, but besides this they are powerful aids in the development of Christian fellowship and self-sacrifice to those who give themselves so loyally and lovingly to the work.

The Missions Study Class.

The work accomplished since October, 1906, has been:

Eighty letters written to keep in touch with every branch in the Diocese.

Seven diocesan study meetings have been held, with an average attendance of twelve, the highest number present at one time being twenty-six. Nine parishes were represented, viz: St. Paul's, Christ Church, St. John's, St. Athanasius', Ascension, Epiphany, St. Luke's, St. Matthias', Los Angeles; St. Luke's, Long Beach, and Pasadena.

By special invitation, with expenses for journeys volunteered in almost every case, addresses were given to the following nineteen branches: Coronado, Anaheim, San Bernardino, Pasadena, Redlands, Riverside, San Diego, Santa Paula, Ocean Park, Glendale, Ontario, and in the city the Church of the Neighborhood, St. Luke's, Epiphany, Christ Church, St. Mark's and St. Matthias'.

During Lent we had courses of Prayer Book study: Seven at Riverside; seven at Hollywood; six at Pasadena. Forty-six in all, entailing a travel of 2,300 miles.

The librarian for Trinity Church, Santa Barbara, reports sending 2,000 magazines to the war ships in that harbor.

Packages of magazines were also sent to the County Hospital, Port Los Angeles, Salvation Army, and men at the section camps in the mountains; Sunday-school leaflets, service and lesson books to mission at Boulder Creek, and forty pictures to Mrs. Folsom, of Honolulu.

As reported to the Correspondent, 115 current secular and religious papers and magazines are mailed either weekly or monthly by the contributors; 3 Bibles, 4 nice Prayer Books and Hymnals, 51 Sunday-school leaflets, service and lesson books, 12 cards, 280 sheets and books of music, 55 pictures, 100 books and 4,788 odd papers and magazines (mainly the latter) have been sent out during the past year; but we regret we have to report the contents of seven boxes and five large packages of magazines not noted.

Christ Church, Coronado; St. Luke's, Long Beach; the Churches of the Ascension and the Epiphany, St. John's and St. Paul's, Los Angeles; All Saints', Pasadena; St. Paul's, Pomona; Trinity, Redlands; All Saints', Riverside; Trinity, Santa Barbara, and Church of Our Saviour, San Gabriel, have shared in this giving. We are also indebted to St. Matthias', Los Angeles; St. John's, San Bernardino, and St. Augustine's, Santa Monica, for friendly helping hands, although not represented by librarians.

After the San Francisco disaster our C. P. C. corps sent \$3 to the California Correspondent to purchase a book for the Bishop William F. Nichols traveling library. A tourist whom the daughter of the Correspondent interested in our work kindly gave several books and \$5 for our traveling libraries.

Thanks to the offering of one of our librarians and to the Christ Church Chapter of the Daughters of the King, we were able to order twelve copies of "From the Crib to the Cross" for Mrs. L. F. Folsom, of Honolulu, to use as text books for her work among the Chinese and Japanese.

CONSTITUTION.

I. This Society shall be called THE LOS ANGELES BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

II. The object of the Society is: By systematic and united effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese, to promote the study of missions, and to encourage prayer for missions.

III. The Church itself is the great Missionary Society, and every person, by baptism, becomes a member of this Society; therefore, every baptized woman in the Diocese is a member of the Woman's Auxiliary. But terms of membership in any parish branch shall be fixed by that branch.

IV. All Parish Societies that so desire may become branches of this Auxiliary, first obtaining the consent of the Rector or Clergyman-in-charge, by appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

V. A President, a First Vice-President, a Vice-President over such divisions of the Diocese as the Bishop may counsel, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Junior Department, a Secretary of the Babies' Branch, a Directress of the Altar Department, a Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club,

a Secretary of the Missions Classes, and an officer over any other department that may be formed, shall be appointed by the Bishop.

VI. The Annual Meeting shall be held at the time of the Diocesan Convention, and Quarterly Meetings on such dates and in such places as the President may appoint. General meetings may be arranged by the Vice-Presidents, in their respective districts.

VII. An Annual Quiet Day shall be held during the season of Advent.

BY-LAWS.

1. The duty of the President shall be to preside at the meetings of the Society, and have general charge of the work, under the direction of the Bishop. The First Vice-President shall act for the President in her absence, and assist her in the care and oversight of the work. The duty of the other Vice-Presidents shall be to preside in the absence of the President at the general meetings held in their several charges, and to co-operate with the President in the supervision of the work of the Auxiliary in the sections to which they respectively belong.

2. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary, under the direction of the President, to correspond with the General Secretary of the Auxiliary and the various branches of the Diocese, to furnish them with work, to collect their reports, and to prepare an annual report.

3. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to give notice of meetings, to keep a record of such meetings, and to prepare an abstract of the minutes for the annual report.

4. The Treasurer shall keep an account of all moneys received and expended, and make a report at the Annual Meeting.

5. The Secretary of the Junior Department, the Secretary of the Babies' Branch, the Directress of the Altar Department, the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club and the Secretary of the Missions Classes shall superintend their several departments, in consultation with the other Diocesan Officers.

6. The Secretaries of Parish Branches are required to correspond with the Diocesan Officers, who *alone correspond* with the General Secretary and the Secretaries of the Board of Missions, and transmit to them all moneys.

7. Each Parish Branch shall make an annual pledge, according to its ability, to the current expenses and work of the Diocesan Branch, and also to the Bishop's Missionary Fund for Diocesan work.

8. At the Annual Meeting each branch represented shall be entitled to but one vote on business of general import.

9. All moneys collected for the United Offering Fund shall be paid to the Diocesan Treasurer of that fund, and by her paid to the Auxiliary Treasurer.

This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended by a motion being made at the Annual Meeting, and voted on the following year.

Address of the President.

To the Right Reverend the Bishop and Woman's Auxiliary:

In a general sense, the word "go" means to proceed from one place, state or station to another; it means to circulate; it conveys all that is opposed to resting. Christ our Lord bade us *go* and do a certain thing, and if we care for His bidding we will find the ways and means. "You know that love will creep in service where it cannot *go*."

However much we desire to follow our own inclinations, however much we boast of our privilege of individuality, we argue in a circle when we fail to acknowledge that life is service and dependence. One may be possessed of an independent nature, yet no one's life is altogether independent. There are conditions in every life which call for service—service rendered and service received. It may be difficult, oftentimes it is most difficult, yet this very difficulty is a call to responsibility, and "acceptance of responsibility is the admittance into personal experience with God. Responsibility is the sacrament of inspiration," the measure of which is proportionate to the faith and courage with which it is approached. If as a first principle life is reduced to service, whom shall we serve?

In the beginning, by word of mouth, Christ told us to whom we were to go and render service; but during nineteen hundred years life has gradually grown so complex, the scope of human activity has become so wide that a tendency has arisen to make religion a department of life instead of a synonym for life itself, and the basis from which all activities, social, industrial or philanthropic, should radiate. And this basis is the *raison d'être* of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Do people—even Church people—quite realize what the Woman's Auxiliary is? To many minds it only represents one of those departments, whereas in reality it is the basis from which has sprung parochial life, guild work and all the organizations of Christian development.

What first suggested the Needlework Guild of America? What brought about the establishment of a Juvenile Court, a Humane Society, of Orphan Asylums, of Homes for the Aged and

Indigent, Newsboys' Homes, Hospitals, Settlement Work? All these and other such societies are offshoots of one central thought, and that thought was put into effect when the words were uttered: "Go" into all the world and "do unto your neighbor as unto yourself." This missionary commission is the Church's charter, and whoever accepts Christianity becomes a missionary.

"As one lamp lights another nor grows less,
So nobleness enkindleth nobleness."

All the splendid activities of which our Christian civilization is so justly proud have lighted their lamps from the central torch, which is the missionary. Andrew immediately sought Peter when he became a follower of Christ, nor could he have remained a disciple had he not done so, for the spirit of Christianity compels extension of Christianity. Had there been no missionary enterprise there would have grown no parochial life, and as the child recognizes with loyal affection the parental love, it does not look upon duty as a difficulty, but as an opportunity. For some occult reason antiquity appeals to the human mind; people like to trace their ancestry very, very far back; they like to belong to the oldest organization, of whatever character it may be—the mother organization. Even so in our dear Mother Church, we look with approval and gratification upon the offshoots of the great vine, glad of the new growth, while yet rejoicing in our claim of representing the vine itself, the strength, the first cause; and this is the meaning—missionary—of the Woman's Auxiliary. At the birth of Christianity its life commission was given, and with authority. The Christian was delegated to perform a certain action; this, being missionary work, is consequently the alpha and omega of Christian obligation.

As time went on, women were appointed as an Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, which is by the Church directed to fulfill the fundamental commission. Recognized membership in this Woman's Auxiliary is our center of gravity; all else we may choose to do, all else being over and above this one thing which is first required of us. It is, therefore, self-evident that Christian women are all members of the Woman's Auxiliary, and the only question which confronts us is: What kind of members are we? Are we enthusiastic members? Are we sufficiently interested to be intelligently informed as to its meaning and purposes? Are we prayerful members, fulfilling its highest requirement? Are we in touch with its workings right here within our own Diocese and beyond our own borders? Are we learning daily to

care more and more for it because of its own worthiness? It would seem commonplace to further define its meaning or to dwell upon the obligation of active membership.

Those who can arrange to do so should attend General Convention and receive an indelible illustration of the magnitude of the Woman's Auxiliary in numbers, in interest, in helpfulness. Where it is not possible to attend such gatherings, read the Church papers and *Spirit of Missions*, and learn the vast importance in which this steadily growing organization is held. You will see how it goes hand in hand with the work in every diocese in the world, and you will hear every missionary bishop of the American Church speak of the incalculable support they receive therefrom.

Within the precincts of our Diocese we are thankful that we have been able to accomplish more this year than before. Our Advent boxes were fuller and better and more costly, our Lent work for Alaska more general; and could you each and all be present at the packing of these bales and boxes, it would thrill your heart to see the splendid shipment, realizing what cheer it will carry to the Tanana region and what comfort it conveys to this community for the full year to come. Then our several scholarships have all been paid and the apportionment fully met—this fund which means comfort to our missions and missionaries if met, otherwise suffering. We have also responded to many special calls—a good reason for closing the year with a deficit in our General Working Fund. Miss Emery says that a branch should never close its year with a surplus in the treasury, when the needs are so many and so urgent; and recently, when we were obliged to decline some assistance because we had no funds, a clergyman said: "Why, I hardly believe I could sleep at night if I had no debt on my mind." However, it would seem preferable for us to close the accounts of the year without a deficit and even with what would seem to be a surplus, for the demands upon the treasury directly after this Annual Meeting are the heaviest of the year. Entertainment, Alaska freight, and printing of the Annual Report all call for immediate payment, and we are not apt to receive anything from the branches for some months. It would be helpful could this be kept in mind and the first installment of the pledge to the General Working Fund paid at as early a date as possible.

To keep abreast of the growing needs arising from extension of the work is our high aim. It is a great pleasure to announce that two of our branches have each paid entirely for a scholar-

ship, Pasadena and Redlands each giving \$50 toward the apportionment which we designated to be used for scholarships. Let us hope that three branches at least will be able to report doing this next year. When we think of the privilege of helping to educate boys and girls both in this country and abroad, our hearts bound with the pleasure of participating in so worthy an undertaking. Men and women, children and babies, lay-workers, clergy and bishops are looking to us in their needs. Our co-operation is anticipated in school and hospital work as a practical basis from which we may rise to the teaching of God's message, and the Church endeavors to meet the openings and opportunities on every side as fast as each individual lends that co-operation which alone will make it possible.

The eyes of our entire country are at this moment turned upon Jamestown, and to find the reason we look back just three hundred years to the landing of the colonists—those early settlers who left England to seek new homes in a new world. What was their first act? They landed on Wednesday; on Thursday they built a fort for necessary protection, and then straightway set to work to arrange for the Sunday service, which was held under an old sail stretched between four trees. A log fastened from tree to tree served as a pulpit, and here Chaplain Robert Hunt, a man of courageous missionary spirit, who had given up his living in Kent to meet this opportunity, held the first Church service. He used the Book of Common Prayer, and daily thereafter, until his death, read Morning and Evening Prayer to these colonists, with celebrations of the Holy Communion as frequently as possible. An evidence of the earnestness of these settlers was shown when their provisions grew scarce and yet scarcer; they reserved what wine they had for use of the Holy Communion. This Tercentennial is a great anniversary when we contrast the first church building, described as "a homely thing, like a barne," with the beautiful churches now thickly built throughout our land; and when we think of the first General Convention, with only one bishop, and our present House of Bishops, counting something like one hundred! The clergy have come to number something like five thousand and our communicants eight hundred thousand. From coast to coast the symbol of Christianity is never for many miles out of sight. Missions from home have extended abroad, bishops and clergy, men and women helpers have carried the cross into every country; the Woman's Auxiliary has multiplied interest and efficiency wherever the bishop and priest have gone; and from the day of that landing

in Jamestown in 1607 and for sixteen hundred years before until today, no sun has set but that its rays have lighted upon some woman in some place in some way fulfilling that first given commission.

Where one woman has realized opportunity, it is within the province of every woman to fall in line and lend the support of interest, encouragement and appreciation of conditions to those who are in the front rank of the warfare. Our own Bishop has recently told us that "transgression of a commandment is the denial of a principle of life," and no woman can fail to remember the commandment laid upon each one. The ancients represented opportunity as a bald head with a forelock; "seize opportunity, for when it is past there is nothing to lay hold of."

Women have demonstrated a desire for the stimulus and pleasure of association with others. We see how well filled are the ranks of many societies—the Daughters of the American Revolution, Woman's Temperance Unions, the sororities and alumnae associations, the General Federation of Women's Clubs, and notably, within the city at this moment, the National Congress of Mothers. We are invaded by the spirit of organization, and why? Because interest begets interest, enthusiasm begets enthusiasm. The most successful organization is the one having the largest number of sympathizers. Shall not that organization be the Woman's Auxiliary? We stand as the first of all organizations; to us was given the first commission; our activity was the first to make its helpfulness felt; our example was the first to suggest these further enterprises; we were the acorn from which the mighty oak has grown with all its spreading branches. Shall we not retain our identity? Shall we not hold sacred our heritage and live our lives so that the daily thought of the obligation upon us as members of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be to each of us that first principle from which all else shall radiate? The door of opportunity stands open, but doors unentered do not remain open. The avenues of knowledge open freely on every side, and knowledge is power in religion as surely as in science. Power is an all-important requisite, and to gain it we needs must seek after knowledge. Interest in missionary matters comes not from mere instinct any more than interest in any sphere can grow without knowledge; and to gain this interest in its full completeness we must use God's means of growth. Prayer, which has been called "the rope which pulls the bell of heaven," must be the means by which we learn to know and practice His Divine Will.

During the last one hundred years missions have manifested miraculous development. Colossal obstacles have been removed, long-locked gates burst open, great triumphs won. Have we faith to join the ranks on the winning side? The work is clamoring for capable women as teacher, nurse, sympathizer. One-third of the unevangelized can best be reached by woman, and a large part can be reached only by her. While men are the pioneers—strong, bold, courageous—much of the work is inaccessible to man, calling for woman's patience, tenderness, understanding. They seem fitted to soothe, to comfort, to win. The effect of their co-operation "is felt from the center to the circumference of Christian service," and the call is upon every woman in the land. We are justly told that "the only way to have power and to serve is to live a full, deep life at home, and the only way to have large power and serve at home is to cast the eye far abroad and wind the interest of a whole world about the heart."

It is of the utmost importance for us to watch well our own lives, for day by day we are sending forth an influence which is acting upon some other life. We cannot stem it, because it is that unconscious influence which is stronger than all else. It is a tremendous responsibility, for we can never know whom we may be affecting.

Emerson says:

"Little thinks, in the field, yon red-cloaked clown,
Of thee from the hill-top looking down;
The heifer that lows in the upland farm,
Far heard, lows not thine ear to charm;
The sexton, tolling his bell at noon,
Deems not that great Napoleon
Stops his horse and lists with delight,
Whilst his files sweep 'round yon Alpine height;
Nor knowest thou what argument
Thy life to thy neighbor's creed has lent."
