“BRING THEE HITHER TO ME”

The Woman's Auxiliary asks the prayers of the Church on the Festival of the Transfiguration of Christ (August 6th), the Auxiliary's "Altar Day."

The following resolution was unanimously adopted at the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, St. John's Church, Los Angeles, May 24, 1898, and endorsed the following day by the Diocesan Convention, with the addition that where practicable the offerings be devoted to the General Fund of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz.:

Resolved, That we set apart the Feast of the Epiphany for an Auxiliary Day, and that, as members of the Auxiliary, we consider it not only a privilege but a duty to attend the services held on that day in the parish to which we belong; and further,

Resolved, That should the appointment of this day meet with the approbation of the clergymen of the Diocese, they be requested to offer, at the celebration of the Holy Eucharist on the Feast of the Epiphany, special prayers for the work of the Auxiliary.

In what they think and do, enable them to hear the voice of Thy Son to guide and strengthen them. And in all the means of grace in Thy Church, and more especially in the Holy Communion at Thy Altars, help them to see Him Who is invisible, that in their aims and difficulties and trials they may have the abiding faith that all things are possible to them that believe. We ask this for the merits of Him Who came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, Thy Son, our Saviour, Jesus Christ. *Amen*.

Report of Santa Barbara Convocation

A year ago Bishop Stevens appointed me Vice-President of the Woman's Auxiliary for the Santa Barbara Convocation, to succeed Miss Jane Rouse, who felt unable to carry on the work any longer. Miss Rouse had given the Convocation a rare spirit of devotion and

spiritual leadership, and I realized it would not be easy to follow in her footsteps.

During the year I have found the work a great joy. There are two sides of it, one is attending the monthly Officers' Meetings in Los Angeles, and the other is visiting the Parishes and Missions throughout the Convocation. I have been able to attend almost all the Board Meetings and have enjoyed them greatly. It's a great privilege to meet with the other officers of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese, and to work with them in this great work. Miss Hibbard asks for a report from every officer, so we each know all that the others are doing. It is tremendously helpful to hear what Miss Bolton is doing in the San Bernardino Convocation, and what Mrs. Van Schaick is doing in San Diego. Each Convocation has its own particular situation to meet, and yet the general problem in the Diocese is the same. But the greatest interest to me in the Board Meetings is to hear the reports from the Altar Guild, the United Thank Offering, the Church Periodical Club, the Educational Secretary, the Treasurer, the Advance Program, and—Miss Hibbard's own reports from the National Executive Council. Because *these* are the things *about* which I need to know, and *for* which I must work with great enthusiasm as I undertake the second part of my job—making the rounds in the Convocation.

Santa Barbara Convocation may not be more isolated than the others, but it seems so because there are absolutely no big cities or centers in it, anywhere. Santa Barbara is the largest town, and that is small. We are not able to gather together in some city in the northern part, or some city in the southern part and hold meetings; all the work has to be done individually with each mission by itself.

Two fine meetings were held last year, one at All Saints', Montecito, when Mrs. Harper Sibley gave a marvelous talk on the Jerusalem Conference, and one at Trinity, Santa Barbara, when Mrs. Laslett held an Education Day. And at the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings of the Convocation, in Montecito and Ventura, Dean Weld put the Woman's Auxiliary on the program, and gave us a chance to talk of Auxiliary matters. But very few from Lompoc or Santa Maria in the north—or Fillmore in the south, can come so far to attend these meetings.

So that is why frequent visits to the Missions are very necessary.

When I began, I had an idea I couldn't *really* drive a car, but now with great confidence I travel hundreds of miles in my Ford coupe. I have visited Santa Barbara, Montecito, Lompoc, 70 miles to the north, Carpinteria, Ventura, Oxnard, and Santa Paula, 50 miles to the south, and am to be in Fillmore, which is 60 miles away, on February 9th. At these informal meetings I try to make very real the needs and opportunities of the Church Periodical Club, and United Thank Offering, and the other departments, and to picture the machinery of the work, helping the Mission to see beyond its parochial needs out through the Diocese and Province

to the National Organization in New York.

I am so anxious that the Guilds grow into Auxiliaries in each Mission, so that the horizon can be broadened beyond the limits of a Guild. My hope is that Mrs. Stockton and Mrs. Pierce and Mrs. Gardett and all the others will be strengthened in their work because of what I *get* from them at the Board Meetings, and try to *give* in the Missions throughout the Convocation.

In closing I want to thank Miss Hibbard and all the members of the Board, not only for the cordial reception they gave this new Vice-President, but also for the inspiration and help they constantly and generously give me.

Report of the Supply Department

I cannot give my report of the Supply Work done in the Diocese of Los Angeles during 1930, without speaking of the loss of our efficient leader, Mrs. B. Marshall Wotkyns, who for so many years had been your Supply Secretary. Her wonderful enthusiasm for the work has been to me so great an inspiration that as her successor I shall try my very best to maintain her high standard in my department. Her death, as you know, occurred in the summer, just after we had finished the work for the year, and she had the satisfaction of seeing the bales on their way to the outposts of our Church.

We sent last Lent 8 bales of clothing and household supplies to Eagle, Alaska, 6 to Anvik, Alaska, 3 bales of hospital supplies to St. Luke's Hospital, Manila, Philippine Islands, and 5 bales of hospital supplies to St. Luke's Hospital, Shanghai, China. This shipment has all safely reached its different destinations, and I have had warm thanks from the different missionaries. The Lenten Work for 1930 had a value of \$6,536.20.

In the Advent just past we were able to send out two personal boxes to missionaries outside our Diocese, one to Utah and one to Texas. They were taken by Branch B of All Saints', Pasadena, and St. Paul's, San Diego, and were most satisfactorily filled and much appreciated. We sent from the Advent Fund \$35.00 for an Indian Catechist's suit and five dollars as a Christmas gift to a woman missionary in Japan.

In our own Diocese we furnished ten personal boxes for missionaries, six of these were taken by individual Parishes and four filled from the Advent Fund. The total Advent Work for 1930 was \$1,873.30.

So during the year 1930 the Supply Department has handled goods to the value of over eight thousand dollars, but aside from the money value, we have been able to supply the needs of the workers in the Field and to lighten their burdens, especially in the foreign field where the same amount of money would not have served the same purpose, as they would have been unable to get the actual material or clothing.

Headquarters has asked us to send to the following places for our 1931 work; Rowe Hall, Tanana, Alaska; St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska; St. Luke's Mission, Honolulu; St. Mary the Virgin Mission, among the Indians at Nixon, Nevada; St. Margaret's House, the School for Christian Service, Berkeley, California, and hospital supplies for the General Church Hospital, Wuchang, China. It is a big work, but we are a big Diocese. I know that you will not fail me but that each Branch will do all I have asked for in its Lenten quota. Just the other day I had a letter from New York asking if we could do some extra emergency work for Lent. If any of you feel that you can do more than I have asked, will you write me and I will send you further work to do.

Without the backing of each separate Branch I can do nothing, but with your assistance we can go forward and accomplish more and better things.

Report of the Chairman of the Social Service Committee

The Social Service Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Los Angeles has just completed its first year of existence. It came into life with a great horizon and splendid vision in the project of the Church Welfare Association. The Auxiliary guaranteed the Church Welfare Association \$2,000. \$1,500.00 of which it guaranteed to raise, the other \$500.00 Bishop Stevens agreed to be responsible for. The treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary received up to January 1st, 1931, the total of \$1313.05. Since then pledges have been paid which bring the amount up to over \$1400.00. This is a splendid showing for the branches with the existing financial conditions. In line with the Diocesan Social Service Committee, the Parish Social Service Committees of the Woman's Auxiliary have been formed. One or two have offered a course on the Principles of Social Service. These committees also take under their wing the Auxiliary work for the Home for the Aged, Church Home for Children, Seaman's Church Institute and the Christmas boxes for the Seamen's Institute, Neighborhood Settlement and family relief. Some of the committees have visited the church institutions and have helped to bring back the message of Christian Social Serv-

ice to their branch. Many of them are making a decided effort to share their effort with the community and all of us are doing our best to use the resources offered us by the Church and the Community. The Church Welfare Association to whom the money went for the salary of their field worker, did work which in figures fails entirely to show their scope and tremendous breadth. The total number of Court Cases handled by the Field Worker in 1930 was 47. The number of cases referred to the Field Worker direct by Parishes totaled six. In addition to this the Field Worker gave of her training and experience to clergy and parents who had problems that needed solving, and which might become Juvenile Court Cases unless given a normal outlet and proper background. This work of the Church Welfare Association with the adolescent girls of the Juvenile Court, all of whom are Protestants, and most of whom have some Episcopal Church connection, is a work that must go on. We have made a splendid beginning but as the work continues, our horizon widens and develops and our support must be steady and generous so that these children of Christ will not call to us in vain.

Report of the Educational Department

The work done in the Educational Department has this year again shown a gratifying increase.

The unfailing efforts of each member of the committee and of all parish educational secretaries has been of great help to me and I express to them my very warm appreciation.

In the Diocese about 1000 women are now enrolled in some form of study class.

42 branches have program meetings; 18 have discussion groups; 14 have Bible classes; 18 have book shelves; 5 have prayer circles; 24 have corporate Communion.

I have spoken at 20 Auxiliary meetings; led 4 leaders' conferences, 2 at the Cathedral and 2 at Harvard Summer School; led 16 class sessions, 8 at Beverly Hills and 8 at Redlands.

I have spoken at Convocation meetings in Santa Barbara and at Redlands and led one inter-denominational meeting in La Jolla.

A book table has been attended at each Diocesan Meeting, at the Harvard Summer School and at the meeting of the Los Angeles Convocation at Long Beach.

The book business again shows a substantial increase.

Receipts from the sale of books, leaflets, cards, etc., and from donations amount to \$912.79.

Expended for books, printing, postage, traveling, etc., \$903.64, leaving a balance in cash of \$9.15.

The Diocesan Library, under the able direction of Mrs. Frank C. Seehorn, is constantly growing in scope and usefulness.

All members of the educational committee have consented to serve for another year with the exception of Mrs. W. L. Van Schaick, whose resignation was accepted with very real regret.

We are, however, most fortunate in having as her successor Mrs. Dudley N. Carpenter of San Diego, whose consecrated training and ability have already borne fruit in her chosen field.

I close this brief report with gratitude for your constant kindness to me personally and for your loyalty in service.

I wish for each of you a year of greater knowledge of and deeper devotion to the ideals of Christ who came to teach us the way of life.

Christmas Box Work—Seamen's Institute

As Chairman of Seamen's Institute Christmas Box Work, I can report that never has there been such co-operation as this year.

In many instances, the boxes were requested, filled and returned to San Pedro, or to my house, without any supervision from me. And the boxes were more uniform and attractively done up than usual.

Some few had extra articles tied on the outside, which had to be removed and were used to fill other boxes, and a few were so palpably light, that investigation was necessary, but these were rare cases. 746 boxes were filled by the Auxiliary members, or their friends, and \$126 in money given to keep with the dinner for 212

men. Over 300 more men joined the 212 who had dinner, and all received boxes. The rest of the boxes were given to seamen in the hospital, to men detained on the ships in the harbor—on duty, and to seamen at the immigration station. *Every box was given out.*

The Christmas was never so appreciated. Hard times find many sailors without jobs. For shipping, too, has been very dull.

The party—in spite of one bishop having an engagement to speak elsewhere—and the other bishop being engaged with influenza—was a festive occasion and greatly enjoyed.

In reporting this, I am not speaking alone for the Los Angeles Convocation, because the Auxiliary of the entire Diocese partakes in this work, and often those farthest from the sea, show the most enthusiasm.

But could you see all the joy your boxes give, I know you would feel repaid. The money value is considerable:

Report of St. Mary's Japanese Mission

At this Epiphany season in which the Light was shown to the Gentiles and with a deep feeling of special thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father for the missionary efforts of the Church, I am very happy to make a short report to the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese to which St. Mary's Japanese Mission owes so much.

The year 1930 was begun with a very well organized effort to advance our work. We had Mrs. Stockton not only in our Kindergarten and Sunday School but also, at her suggestion, St. Mary's Guild assumed the responsibilities of an Auxiliary branch, and has this year met their pledges, contributed to the Lenten work, the United Thank Offering Fund and the Seamen's Institute.

We have also a recently organized Junior Chapter of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew and a Junior Chapter of the Daughters of the King—the latter composed of fifteen earnest young girls of the Mission. I have also had some splendid helpers—both American and Japanese—to assist me in our onward march of bringing our people to Christ through the Church.

To the Woman's Auxiliary I am more than grateful for the increased support the Auxiliary has given my work.

The Sunday School has still an attendance of 308. The daily kindergarten is always trying to bring new and tender souls under the Church influence. The Boy Scouts are faithful in their duties of cleaning the Parish Hall and arranging it for the Sunday School. The Girl Scouts have increased from 12 to 26. Both Boy and Girl Scouts are under good leadership and are trained to become good citizens and loyal Churchmen.

On the evening of last Palm Sunday I had the joy of presenting a class of thirteen to Bishop Stevens for confirmation. We now have two services of the Holy Communion—one in Japanese for our adult members, one in English for our American-born members. Both services are well attended.

Christmas Day a mother and her two children were baptized. One man, whose wife has been praying for the past twenty years that her husband might be brought to the altar of our Saviour, will be baptized next Sunday, that day being the Conversion of St. Paul, the Apostle to the Gentiles.

We are very thankful for God's blessing upon our work.

Now, this year we are asking very fervently for our new Church buildings. We need them badly and we need them this year,—not for the gratification of having a beautiful new Church but for the glory of God and that our harvest may be greater. We are still having our services in the over-crowded small house, and are still having our Sunday School in the backyard, the attic, the rector's home and on the street in the bus. It is no longer romantic but rather pathetic because we face a crisis. We must either choose between advance or retreat. When news of our building plan became known, non-Christian people immediately began building a school and club house within three blocks of our mission and their building will be completed in the latter part of February. That will affect and undermine our work very much. Our members realizing this, felt it was their duty to work for our new buildings so they, with few exceptions, pledged one month's income toward this building fund. These pledges are faithfully being paid. We have also gifts from several American friends and the amount of \$7,000 has been deposited in the bank.

We hope and pray that the National Council may see fit to help us acquire this necessary equipment—but to obtain an additional lot, build a church and a parish house, we will also need \$20,000 from the Diocese.

It is 25 years since our beloved Bishop Johnson and Miss Mary L. Paterson started the Mission. St. Mary's Mission for the Japanese is in your country; it is in your city; it is the only Church Mission in Southern California for the Japanese.

So we have faith and I know I shall see our dreams realized and especially know that the Woman's Auxiliary (which for a quarter of a century has contributed to our support) will not fail us.

Among other opportunities for service is the new work of the League of the Isolated, responsibility for which has been accepted by the Church Periodical Club. I feel that with all these possibilities before us, we must not be content but must go on to greater accomplishment.

CONSTITUTION

I. This Society shall be called THE LOS ANGELES BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

II. The object of the Society is: By systematic and united effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese, to promote the study of missions, to encourage prayer for missions, and to be of service to the National Council in all its departments.

III. The Church itself is the great Missionary Society, and every person, by baptism, becomes a member of this Society; therefore, every baptized woman in the Diocese is a member of the Woman's Auxiliary, but terms of membership in any parish branch shall be fixed by that branch.

IV. All Parish Societies that so desire may become branches of this Auxiliary, first obtaining the consent of the Rector or Clergyman-in-charge, by appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

V. A President, a Vice-President-at-Large, a Vice-President, a Vice-President over such divisions of the Diocese as the Bishop may counsel, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, a Supply Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a United Thank Offering Treasurer, a Directress of the Altar Department, a Directress of the Church Periodical Club, and an officer over any other department that may be formed, shall be appointed by the Bishop.

VI. The Annual Meeting shall be held at the time of the Diocesan Convention, and Monthly Diocesan Meetings on such dates and in such places as the President may appoint. General meetings may be arranged by the Vice-Presidents, in their respective districts.

VII. An Annual Quiet Day shall be held during the season of Advent.

BY-LAWS

1. The duty of the President shall be to preside at the meetings of the Society, and have general charge of the work, under the direction of the Bishop. The Vice-President shall act for the Presi-

dent in her absence, and assist her in the care and oversight of the work. The duty of the other Vice-Presidents shall be to preside in the absence of the President at the general meetings held in their several charges, and to co-operate with the President in the supervision of the work of the Auxiliary in the sections to which they respectively belong.

2. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to correspond with the various branches in the Diocese, to collect their reports, and to prepare an annual report.

3. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to give notice of meetings, to keep a record of such meetings, and to prepare an abstract of the minutes for the annual report.

4. The Treasurer shall keep an account of all moneys received and expended, and make a report at the Annual Meeting.

5. The Supply Secretary, the Educational Secretary, the United Thank Offering Treasurer, the Directress of the Altar Department, the Directress of the Church Periodical Club shall superintend their several departments, in consultation with the other Diocesan Officers.

6. The Secretaries of Parish Branches are required to correspond with the Diocesan Officers, who alone correspond with the National Secretaries of the Woman's Auxiliary.

7. Each Parish Branch shall make an annual pledge, according to its ability, to the following Diocesan Funds—the *General Working Fund*, the *Bishop's Missionary Fund*, and the *Altar Fund*. *These pledges, and all other money, must be sent through the Diocesan Treasurer, and all checks made out to her.*

8. At the Annual Meeting each branch represented shall be entitled to but one vote on business of general import.

9. All moneys collected for the United Thank Offering Fund shall be paid to the Diocesan Treasurer of that fund, and by her paid to the Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer.

This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended by a motion made at the Annual Meeting, and voted on the following year.

President's Address

Bishop Stevens, Bishop Gooden, and Officers and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Los Angeles:

My message to you today is contained in the outstanding idea given us by the recent Lambeth Conference—that of Witness. “Ye shall be witnesses unto me—unto the uttermost parts of the earth” were the last recorded words of our Lord. As this great idea takes hold of our imagination there passes before us at once the mighty procession of those who have borne witness in the past.

As we think of our own Diocese the first name that comes to our mind is that of Mrs. B. Marshall Wotkins, for twenty-five years our Diocesan Supply Secretary and one of the original members of All Saints' Parish, Pasadena. In all her years of service she never missed an Annual Meeting and we cannot help but feel that she is with us today. How she would have rejoiced to have this meeting in her own parish! I do not wish at this time to emphasize our great loss, keen as it is, but rather to give thanks for her life—for her youthful and courageous spirit, her great joy and enthusiasm in her work that made it her supreme interest. We love to think that the memorial to her from the Diocesan Auxiliary is at Point Hope, Alaska, in the Mission Field that she loved and worked for so devotedly. The character of dear Mrs. Wotkins is so firmly built into the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese that it can never be effaced but will always be a living inspiration.

In November the Woman's Auxiliary lost another devoted member in Miss Julia Meeker, also a member of All Saints' Parish, and the Diocesan Educational Secretary for the year 1916. A gifted and consecrated woman, her influence will long be felt.

In the deaths of Mrs. Charles T. Murphy of Los Angeles and Miss Adele Hickman of Oceanside, the Diocese again loses members who have given a lifetime of devotion to the Woman's Auxiliary.

These four women, two Diocesan Officers and two parish workers, are noble examples of those who have borne witness. “Grant them, O Lord, continual growth in thy love and service.”

As we carry on the work that others have begun our great question is, How may we be effective witnesses in our day and generation? First and foremost we must be *living witnesses*. In a recent

little book by Dr. William Lyon Phelps "Caesar or Christ" we find these pertinent words "Men and women are judged by their lives. The only convincing answer to atheism and scepticism is to live like a Christian. That is more difficult than to argue with, or to denounce, or to ridicule the atheist; but it is also more effective." To be true witnesses then, Christianity must so shine through us—its joy, its beauty, its power, its fearlessness—that others see Christ in us. Unless we humbly and sincerely strive after this ideal of Christian perfection our light will not shine very far and our gifts will lose their magic power.

Our second thought is how we may be witnesses in our own Diocese which is experiencing such phenomenal growth. In a recent talk to the Woman's Auxiliary the Rev. Mr. Balcom, General Missionary for the Los Angeles Convocation, stated that one-third of the population between the Arctic and Mexico was in Los Angeles County. Think of this great missionary field within our very doors and our opportunity to give of ourselves and our money! The Woman's Auxiliary is experiencing the same growth, twenty-one new branches having been organized during the past year—making a total of 102 branches in the Diocese. Eighteen of these new branches are in the Los Angeles Convocation and a debt of gratitude is due to Mrs. Baird S. Cooper for her fine pioneering work. In the spring we are planning to hold six District Meetings within this Convocation so that we may bring the ideals of the Auxiliary to these new branches and revitalize the older ones. We ask for your co-operation in attendance at the meeting in your District. This new life in the Los Angeles Convocation is only an example on a larger scale of what is taking place in the Convocations of San Bernardino, San Diego, and Santa Barbara where the Vice-Presidents of these respective Districts are Witnesses for Christ in the truest sense of the word.

A special opportunity for service lies in our Social Service Department which was organized just a year ago and which has done a fine piece of constructive work in the support of our Field Worker at the Juvenile Court. This Social Service work has brought us larger returns than we dared dream of a year ago. It has broadened our vision, deepened our sympathies, and helped us achieve one of our great objectives—interesting the young woman and the professional woman. The day is past when we can say what is missionary work and what is Social Service work—it is all helping to bring the Kingdom of God on earth. Mrs. Riddell, our new secretary, needs the financial support of every branch if this work is to

continue.

Still another great field of service, and one which has not been fully realized, is our Altar Department. You have heard the fine report of Mrs. Pierce and how through her the Woman's Auxiliary has literally gone out into the highways and hedges of the Diocese with altar and chancel furnishings for the new missions. Right here is an opportunity for the Altar Guilds of the Diocese to help in a fine piece of missionary work and share in the joy of witnessing to Christ. Might not each Altar Guild contribute something to this fund and feel themselves a part of the Woman's Auxiliary? May I call their attention to an interesting and practical little "Altar Guild Manual" just written by Mrs. Perry, the wife of our Presiding Bishop?

At this point I wish to express my deep appreciation to all the diocesan officers, parish workers, and heads of committees who have worked so faithfully and efficiently during the past year and made possible the fine report that I have just sent in to headquarters in New York. For the first time during the four years of my presidency all departments of Auxiliary work were reported—devotional, educational, social service, supply work, gifts of money, and recruiting. As a suggestion for our devotional life I want to call your attention to a resolution adopted at our Annual Meeting in 1898, reference to which can be found in the devotional page of our Annual Report, in which The Feast of Epiphany is set apart as an Auxiliary Day when the Holy Eucharist and special prayers are offered in our respective parishes. We cannot over-emphasize the power of prayer and I want to pass on to you the following little verse which was given to me a few days ago:

Three things the Master asks of us, and we who serve Him here
below

And long to see His Kingdom come, may pray or give or go.

He needs them all,—the open hand, the willing feet, the praying
heart,

To work together and to weave a threefold cord that shall not part.
Not all can go; not all can give to speed the message on its way,
But young or old, or rich or poor, or strong or weak—we all can
pray.

Prayer and action go hand in hand, and the Recruiting Committee, under Miss Winkler, reports three young women of outstanding ability who have offered themselves as candidates for nurses in the foreign field. We are also glad to welcome Mrs. Robert B. Gooden as secretary for the Little Helpers, a fine department of work

in connection with the Church School Service Program. That we have been able to accomplish so much in a year full of difficulties, with so many new problems facing us, coupled with the business depression, is a subject for devout thankfulness. On the whole it has been a year of growth in spiritual values. As our graphic friend Will Rogers puts it "In reality it's been our most beneficial year. It took some of the conceit out of us. We had begun to believe that the height of civilization was a good road, bathtub, radio and automobile. I think the Lord just looked us over and decided to set us back where we belonged."

As we look beyond our Diocese into our great nation and the world we are appalled at the fact that in spite of our boasted modern inventions we are so tragically far from being a Brotherhood. Only by the permeating of society by the spirit of Christ can this come about. And here again we may be witnesses through the support of our Advance Work Program which makes possible the further extension of our Church with all its transforming power. Then there is our United Thank Offering, that wonderful offering that builds hospitals, schools, churches, and that supports over two hundred women workers. Through this offering the women of the Auxiliary are literally being witnesses unto the uttermost parts of the earth. In Denver next fall we hope to present an offering of \$25,000 from this Diocese. Let us keep this as our goal.

So we face 1931, an important year in the life of the Church. Next September our delegates will be representing us at the great Triennial Meeting in Denver, the greatest meeting yet to be held by the Auxiliary. During the past three years it has been my privilege to be a member of the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary and I can testify to the fact that the Woman's Auxiliary of today represents a wide awake body of women, thoroughly alive to the great problems of our changing world and in touch with all phases of work in our Church. We are truly an Auxiliary to the National Council. In addressing the Board at a recent meeting Bishop Perry, our Presiding Bishop, said "The power that animates the Auxiliary is of greater value than mere legislative forms of organization—it is a great spiritual force—a moving current in the life of the Church." God grant that we may continue to be this great moving current, and courageous followers of Him who said "Ye shall be my witnesses."

AN APPRECIATION

HELEN C. WOTKYNs

Entered Into Rest June 6th, 1930

How beautiful and vital was Mrs. Wotkyns' sympathetic, consecrated life. She was one of the rare ones of the earth who go through life, doing good, with a sweet unconsciousness of effort, which leaves a rich heritage.

Dear, lovable Mrs. Wotkyns, so warm in her affections, so definite in purpose and so fine in understanding. Her church was the great and comforting objective of her life—she valued its historic beauty, she believed in its authority, and she loved its services.

Her work for the Woman's Auxiliary became her contribution to her beloved Church. It was not altogether the tremendous efficiency of the gathering of the vast stores to send to Alaska, the packing, the statistical care of what became so great a work—it was her sympathetic human interest in the missionary at his post and the intimate knowledge of each Indian whose wants the missionary had plead, that made her work stand out.

The Advent Season with its call from our own Diocese made a particular appeal to Mrs. Wotkyns. It was always her pleasure to think of the families as a group of her friends with personal wants. The old and the young were remembered with an appreciation of the social as well as practical need.

In the earlier days when we were so often inspired with the ringing call of "Specials," it was Mrs. Wotkyns who made an immediate response. The letters to her from the many missions near and far, if gathered together would make a beautiful tribute to her unselfish life.

Those who remember the informal meetings of the Diocesan officers when the circle was smaller, in Mrs. Cowles' or Mrs. Hubert's house, remember well Mrs. Wotkyns' vivid personality with its enthusiasm and interest. Whenever any problem was under discussion, the human side of it from her point of view was the one to be considered.

Distinct also, is the memory of those days in the old Diocesan House, when Mrs. Wotkyns gathered her forces assembling the bales and boxes for shipping. All the infinite details of those busy days were accompanied by whimsical allusions to this or that per-

son—so we easily pictured the missionary and his environment—and knew why this was being sent and why something else was needed. Rarely is work so personal as hers and therefore so rich in its influence.

All Saints' Parish Auxiliary was one of the first to be organized in the Diocese. Mrs. Wotkyns was associated with it from its organization and was proud of its constant fine record. She was a vital force in the Parish Auxiliary and became the same strong force in the Diocesan Auxiliary of which she was an officer for many years.

She was equal to all the duties and emergencies of the rapidly growing field in the then new Diocese. Year after year she was reappointed by Bishop Johnson and later by Bishop Stevens. Each year she assumed added obligations which under her care were always met.

For twenty-five years Mrs. Wotkyns was the Diocesan Supply Secretary. When the Diocese became part of the Missionary District, she was appointed head of the same department in the larger circle. There were larger responsibilities but, as always, she was equal to them.

Mrs. Wotkyns was widely known and appreciated—and held in deep affection. She was indeed a distinguished Churchwoman.

In the old Churches of England and our own land—we feel the invisible presence of those who have prayed within their walls. One's own Church seems to take on that hallowing association.

May we not today think that in All Saints' Church, at the end of the many years of Mrs. Wotkyns' life in this Parish, that her fine spirit is still here, and that her influence remains, which like a torch has been passed on to others, to strengthen them?

Hers was a valiant soul—we shall miss her!
