"BRING THEE HITHER TO ME"

The Woman's Auxiliary asks the prayers of the Church on the Festival of the Transfiguration of Christ (August 6th), the Auxiliary's "Altar Day."

The following resolution was unanimously adopted at the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, St. John's Church, Los Angeles, May 24, 1898, and endorsed the following day by the Diocesan Convention, with the addition that where practicable the offerings be devoted to the General Fund of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz:

Resolved, That we set apart the Feast of the Epiphany for an Auxiliary Day, and that, as members of the Auxiliary, we consider it not only a privilege but a duty to attend the services held on that day in the parish to which we belong; and further,

Resolved, That should the appointment of this day meet with the approbation of the clergymen of the Diocese, they be requested to offer, at the celebration of the Holy Eucharist on the Feast of the Epiphany, special prayers for the work of the Auxiliary.

Amen.

O Almighty Father, Who didst vouchsafe to Thy chosen ones on the mount the comforting vision of the glory that shall be revealed, to strengthen and cheer them in their Apostolic work, we beseech Thee to be with Thy servants, the members of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese, in all their efforts for the spread of the Kingdom of Thy dear Son. Grant that to many hearts may go the call of opportunity to serve Thee in this work, in the bearing of others' burdens and the fulfillment of the law of Christ. In what they think and do, enable them to hear the voice of Thy Son to guide and strengthen them. And in all the means of grace in Thy Church, and more especially in the Holy Communion at Thy Altars, help them to see Him Who is invisible, that in their aims and difficulties and trials they may have the abiding faith that all things are possible to them that believe. We ask this for the merits of Him Who came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, Thy Son, our Saviour, Jesus Christ. Amen.

O Lord, our Heavenly Father, we pray Thee to send forth more laborers into Thy harvest, and to grant them Thy special grace for every need. Guard and guide the workers in the field, and draw us into closer fellowship with them. Dispose the hearts of all women everywhere to give gladly as Thou hast given to them. Accept, from grateful hearts, our United Thank Offering of prayer and gifts and joyful service; and bless it to the coming of Thy Kingdom, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Mrs. Chapel, President of the Cathedral Branch, welcomed the Auxiliary. The officers' reports were read and accepted. After Mrs. Crawford's report as treasurer, a certificate of audit by Mr. W. N. The meeting adjourned at 12:30 and reconvened at two o'clock in the Cathedral.

Dean Beal welcomed the Auxiliary.

The Rev. John Bryant, new student chaplain at U. C. L. A., spoke on the very important work the Church is doing at Universities.

Mrs. Robert A. Woods, head worker at the Neighborhood Settlement, spoke of the people who come there, and settlements as being definitely the Church's work.

Bishop Gooden gave us a splendid challenge on the Auxiliary's opportunities for service today in, "First Things First."

It was moved by Mrs. H. T. Bryant and passed, that a sincere vote of thanks be extended to the Cathedral and Dean Beal for their hospitality; to the Cathedral Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Daughters of the Church for their cooperation; and to the ushers and all other workers who have helped to make this such a successful day.

The offering was taken up by the ushers—members of the Girls' Friendly, who looked very pretty with pale blue veils. Bishop Gooden appointed the officers for the ensuing year. They are the same as last year. Then he gave us his Blessing, the meeting adjourned, and tea was served.

Report of the Vice-President of San Diego Convocation

We continue to feel, in the San Diego Convocation, that the work is greatly strengthened and stimulated by our general meetings and by personal visits to the Parishes and Missions. During

the past year each Parish and Mission has been visited by the Vice-President or the Convocational Educational Secretary, and in some instances, by both. We feel that valuable contacts have been made by these visits.

In addition to these visits, our able Diocesan Secretary for the Advance Work, Mrs. F. A. Habersham, visited our Convocation during the first two weeks in November, showing her pictures of the Church's work in the Orient, and giving her inspiring talks. She visited in all thirteen Parishes and Missions and we feel that our Convocation owes much to her fine work among us.

Our first General Meeting for the year was held, in May, at Grace Mission, Escondido. Holding such a meeting so far from San Diego was quite a new departure, but proved well worthwhile in reaching Missions not usually contacted. This meeting was one of the high lights in our year's work, as it was the occasion of the annual visit, to the Convocation, of our President, Miss Hibbard, who always brings us so much. We were also fortunate enough to have with us our Diocesan U.T.O. Custodian, Mrs. Stockton, and our Supply Secretary, Miss Patton, both of whose talks were much appreciated. Mrs. Stockton also spoke on the work of St. Mary's Japanese Mission, and the offering for the day was sent to St. Mary's Building Fund. The attendance at this meeting was 156.

In October another General Meeting was held at Christ Church, Coronado, the occasion of this meeting being the visit of Dr. Mary James of the General Church Hospital, Wuchang, China, to the San Diego Convocation. In addition to Dr. James' inspiring talk on the work at the General Church Hospital, splendid reports of the General Convention in Denver, were given by Mrs. Spencer Smith and Mrs. John Riddell. The attendance at this meeting was 248, and the offering was given to the Advance Work.

Our Annual Quiet Day, held at All Saints, San Diego, on November 30th, was again conducted by Bishop Gooden. We feel we owe much to Bishop Gooden for giving us this Day, which helps us to "carry on" during the year. Again the offering was sent for the Advance Work.

We deeply regret the resignation of our Convocational Educational Secretary, Mrs. D. N. Carpenter, who has moved to San Francisco. Mrs. Carpenter worked faithfully in many ways. Two special educational meetings were held under her leadership, one in March, when Miss Edna Eastwood of 281 4th Ave., New York, spoke on the Church's work among the isolated, and one in April, when Miss Hill, of Los Angeles, gave a talk on India.

Our most recent general meeting was an Educational Day, held at St. Matthew's, National City, with an attendance of 138. The day's conference was under the leadership of our Diocesan Educational Secretary, Mrs. W. Lawrence Laslett who, in a most able way, discussed the year's Study Book, "Building a Christian

Nation," and some vital phases of the Devotional Life.

As the work of the Woman's Auxiliary has become better known in our Parishes and Missions, we have not felt the need of a monthly meeting of our Council of Branch Presidents, but several of these meetings are always held during the year and are of inestimable value in planning and carrying out our work.

Three new Branches of the Auxiliary have been formed in the Convocation during the past year; Branch B, at St. Paul's, San Diego, a Branch at Vista, and one at Encinitas, including members from Carlsbad.

If so, the hope is, to switch that emphasis this year onto the **spiritual** life of the individual, and to stress the need for deepening our relationships with God, if we in **any** way expect to be worthy channels for His plans.

Miss Hibbard, Miss Patton, Mrs. Habersham, Mrs. Stockton, and perhaps other Diocese officers have been invited into the Convocation, and have spoken at Parish and Group Meetings.

Mrs. Habersham's visit to the Convocation last November

brought much inspiration to many, and I was very glad to be invited to share the opportunity with the group in Fillmore. The Fillmore women deserve praise and help; they have no church or resident priest, but they meet very regularly and work hard, and slowly and surely are raising funds for a church building.

The northern part of the Convocation is, perhaps, the most isolated spot in the Diocese, and yet, when meetings are held, more and more women from Santa Maria and Lompoc, seventy miles away, come to the larger centers. I am sure it was a Red Letter Day for Santa Maria last April when Mrs. Harper Sibley drove over from her ranch at Templeton to meet the women of the Guild.

The monthly Board meetings in Los Angeles continue to be a constant source of inspiration and help, especially the day we met from ten to three, being Mrs. Fleming's guests for lunch. That day was given over to the report of the Findings Committee and to the discussion of those five tremendous subjects handled at the Convention.

The Convocation has had to accept the resignation of its Editorial Secretary, Mrs. Wadsworth Baylor, who can no longer hold that office. It is a great loss to the Convocation, which, however, thanks Mrs. Baylor deeply for all she has done so faithfully.

The new year leads us to the new book; which we hope will be studied by every one—for what can any of us desire **more** than that we **build** Christian homes—Parishes—Convocations—Dioceses—and a Christian nation.

Report of the Supply Department Woman's Auxiliary

We stand at the beginning of a new year of work and accomplishment. It is well therefore to pause for a few moments and look back to see what we did in 1931.

As your Supply Secretary I am very proud of you. It has been a hard year for everyone, but the Woman's Auxiliary has not failed; it has gone forward in the true spirit of Christian fellowship, helping our workers in the field and supplying the sinews of war.

Last Lent we sent to the following Missions: Four large bales of hospital supplies, bed linen and blankets to the Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China; four bales to St. Mary the Virgin, an Indian Mission in Nevada; five bales to Rowe Hall, Tanana, Alaska; five bales to St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska; a large

box to St. Margaret's House, Berkeley, California, consisting of household linen and blankets; then nine of our branches sent via parcel post to St. Luke's Mission, Honolulu. The Girls' Friendly Society gave all the layettes and baby clothes for all these Missions and made them most exquisitely and we are very grateful to them for being our able assistants.

This list of numbers and places does not really give the picture of how wonderful the things are. One has to come to the packing to realize that, for everything sent in is so well made and all the orders so well carried out.

Eighty-two branches responded, eight were unable to do anything, and eight failed. I hope this year none will fail. We have no duplicates and no overlapping. When you fail the Mission Station far away is out just that much. If, for any reason, you cannot do the allotment I send, please let me know in time so that others may do it.

I heard from every Mission we sent to and every one was pleased with our work and in every case the bales arrived in excellent condition. The women who help me pack are very conscientious; no bale is either slighted or badly sewed.

I have a wish: that is that more branches would have special Supply Secretaries. Some already have, and where that is so I get better and quicker cooperation. If you appoint one, however, it does not do me or you any good unless you send me at once her name and address. Please remember that.

All of you, I believe, know about the Lenten Work, but not all, I fear, know about the Advent Fund. This is just as important, for then we help our own. The Bishop calls on us then to help the Diocesan Missionaries, and they need our help every bit as much as foreign missions. Yet, though I sent a letter to every branch of the Auxiliary throughout the Diocese, I heard from less than half. I fear your education has been neglected. At Advent we give money, not sewing. Put it in your budget and give something next Christmas, no matter how small—be part of us. The Branches that did give were so generous that we were able to do a splendid work, made it a banner year, in fact. This is what we did for Advent: Gave Christmas checks to twenty-four Diocesan Missionaries; sent two splendid personal boxes out of the Diocese; gave two U. T. O. workers Christmas presents; gave an Indian Catechist a suit of clothes and received such grateful thanks from all.

In Lent all of our work and material and medicine was valued at \$7,437.59. In Advent the value was \$1,938.37. So the Supply Department sent money and goods during 1931 to the value of \$9,375.96.

Truly, it is more blessed to give than to receive.

Report of the Secretary of the Social Service Department

The year that has just passed has been an especially busy one for this department. So many opportunities for service have presented themselves that the Church Welfare Association, one of our original reasons for existence, has become one of many avenues of friendliness.

As Secretary of the Social Service Department I have attended forty-three meetings, spoken thirty-three times to various organizations; attended a Social Service Conference held in San Francisco in January under the leadership of the late Dr. Charles Lathrop; spoken at a Convocation Meeting at Douglas, Arizona in February; at the Synod Meeting in Phoenix in May, and lead a discussion group on "Home and Family Life" at the General Convention in Denver.

For the Church Welfare Association I would like to report that our Field Worker, Miss Cooper, has done splendid work, and members of the Committee have cooperated by acting as "big sisters" to the clients, in many cases the only real friend the girls have. They have also procured scholarships when needed; clothing, money, transportation, and other things co-incident with the work. During the year Miss Cooper paid 710 visits for the Church Welfare and fifty-nine calls of investigation for the Church Home for Children. The types of cases handled by the Church Welfare Association during the year are as follows: Unmarried mothers, 5; maladjusted children, 35; placement problems, 15; neglect or unsatisfactory home conditions, 39. The sources from which our clients were referred are as follows: Juvenile Court, 39; Episcopal Church referred 15; Schools, 6; various social agencies, 28; individuals referred 6, making a total of ninety-four cases handled during the year with an average monthly case load of thirty-five. The total amount contributed through the Woman's Auxiliary Diocesan Treasurer was \$1,430.55; of this \$450.00 was solicited from individuals by the Social Service Secretary to make it possible to continue the work. On the 13th of November the Association held its Annual Luncheon and planned the program for the regular Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary Meeting. A Case Conference was demonstrated which proved successful both in interest and education, and nearly \$100.00 was given to help one of our maladjusted clients; beside the offering.

At Christmastime twelve families were paid friendly visits and then given Christmas boxes through the department. Several of these families are being followed up, as they are splendid people in desperate circumstances and are doing all in their power to keep from becoming public charges. Clothing and small amounts of money have been given by the Secretary to individuals belonging to the Episcopal Church who have never known poverty, but due to the times are in dire need. Through the offices of this department one boy was placed in the Church Home

for Children and has made a happy adjustment.

On looking back over the year's work we are happy for the friendliness and cooperation we have received from members of the Auxiliary and Clergy and are grateful for what has been accomplished; but we know that there is much to be done, such as closer cooperation between the Parish and Diocesan Social Service Secretary. The realization by each Branch that the Church Welfare Association cannot continue in existence unless each one pledges a definite amount in proportion with their means and state on the pledge cards when it is to be paid, as the Field Worker must be paid each month. Also that the branches should be conscious that all work done for Diocesan Institutions such as the Home for the Aged, Church Home for Children, Seamen's Church Institute, etc., individuals helped and community social agencies cooperated with constitute Social Service work and should be reported as such. This will make for stronger organization and greater unity.

To all those who have helped so much in the work I extend my grateful thanks and say to you as those to whom we carried Christmas cheer said to us, "You have made, what seemed to us, a dreary world become suddenly bright; undoubtedly the Christ Child liveth."

Report of the Educational Department

Again the work of the Educational Department shows a satisfactory increase; especially is this so in the deepening of the devotional life in Parish Branches as evidenced by the increase in the number of corporate communions, prayer circles and Bible classes.

Fifty branches report program meetings, 22 have discussion groups, 18 have Bible classes, 12 have prayer circles, 31 held corporate communions, 24 have book shelves.

I have spoken at three Convocational Meetings, five District Meetings, one Young People's Meeting; I have held one Leader's Conference and led two interdenominational classes and forty class sessions.

The sale of books has slightly surpassed that of last year.

Receipts from the sale of books, cards, leaflets, etc., and from donations amount to \$939.57. Expended for purchase of books, leaflets, magazines; for postage, printing, and traveling, \$918.14, leaving a balance in cash of \$21.43.

The Diocesan Library now contains about 300 volumes of up-to-date religious books. These are being used more and more extensively throughout the Diocese. To Mrs. Frank C. Seehorn I extend my warmest appreciation of her constant helpfulness.

A quarterly bulletin of the activities of the Woman's Auxiliary has been issued by the Educational Department and has proved itself useful.

An outstanding, forward-looking piece of educational work was done by the Diocesan Board when they assisted Miss Virginia Smith, President-elect of the Y. W. C. A. of the University of Southern California, to attend the Student Volunteer Convention recently held in Buffalo, New York. Miss Smith tells us that she there received a great deal of knowledge and inspiration and that she is deeply grateful to the Woman's Auxiliary for their interest and help.

It is with very real regret that we accepted the resignations from the Educational Committee of Mrs. Wadsworth Baylor of Santa Barbara, and Mrs. Dudley N. Carpenter of San Diego, both of whom have rendered us much faithful and valuable service. To them I extend my most sincere thanks.

The constantly increasing educational work of this ever-growing Diocese would be overwhelming to me were it not for the splendid help I receive from my committee, from Parish Secretaries and from my many friends—not the least of whom is Mrs. Thomas Fleming, Jr., who has provided transportation for me and the books, times without number.

May the new year find us filled anew with the Spirit of Christ that we may grow in usefulness and in power.

Christmas Box Work for the Seamen's Church Institute

"Financial depression" is an unknown term when it comes time for the Woman's Auxiliary to fill Christmas boxes for the Seamen.

Long before the boxes are in hand I am asked for them on every side. This work in our Diocese is unique. In other Ports,

where there are Institutes, some provide dinners—others fill small bags, all with uniform articles. But here it is strictly Auxiliary work. Started by our Auxiliary and their friends nine years ago, it has grown in volume and real personal interest and is known by the sailors all over the world. Mr. Tait, the superintendent at our San Pedro Institute, tells me he receives letters from men even in foreign ports regretting they are not in San Pedro at Christmas and asking if there is not some way they could receive a box—which is a commentary in itself.

This year you had a family of 800—and you filled 800 boxes. We could have had 200 more had there been that many more sailors. Every merchant marine man in the harbor, at work or waiting to be employed—those ill in the Marine Ward of the Hospital and those detained in the Immigration Station, had a box.

The dinner was not held at the Institute this year, but tickets were given to the men for a Christmas dinner at a restaurant, which thus cared for a greater number. The money you contributed helped to make this possible.

The night of the entertainment a moving picture was provided by Mrs. Nichols Milbank, the President of the Women's Crew, the newly-formed organization to assist the Institute.

After that a few short addresses, a few musical numbers and the men joined in singing some Christmas carols, which, judging from the volume, gave much enjoyment. After that, the boxes, which were piled in bright array on the platform, were given out. I can only reiterate—how I wish every woman could give her box to her man.

The sewing kits are particularly prized. And you will be interested to know that the women at the Home for the Aged made 200 of those bags which many of you had for your boxes. And so we grow, making each year more contacts.

Report of the Committee on Church Literature for the Blind

A year ago a committee on Church Literature for the Blind was formed; its two members are Miss Esther Nelson and myself. At the Synod last May in Phoenix a Provincial Committee was also formed, and this report will cover activities of both Diocese and Province.

The Committee wanted first of all to find out how many blind people there are connected with our Church. In answer to letters sent every clergyman in the Diocese and every Diocese in the Province, we find there are about seventeen in the Diocese and about thirty-four in the Province. I feel sure there are many more.

The Committee then set about providing church literature for these blind people. The Spirit of Missions was chosen; and the Editor, Mr. Hobbs, gave his consent to having the magazine used in any way for the blind. The June number was transcribed into Braille by some friends, and was mailed out to those on our list.

Through the Rev. Mr. Spaulding, in Coronado, the Committee heard of a young blind Spanish lad, who could both read Braille and use the machine to transcribe books. He has a friend (I think she must be one of the rare people of this world) with whom I correspond; and through her he has been given work by our Committee. He has transcribed six months' copies of the Spirit of Missions. These volumes are so beautifully done that we send them to the State Library in Sacramento, from where they are taken out and read by any and all who want them.

I had a letter a few weeks ago from a woman who had read the September and October numbers, and she says, "I want to tell you that I much enjoyed having them. The very nature of the material in the Spirit of Missions ought to be especially valuable to Braille readers who are necessarily limited in their reading, as it presents a broad scope and a world view."

The Spanish lad is paid by the page, (the regulation price) and it seems, that, not only is he in need of money, but that he also needed to feel he **could** earn something—he needed to feel he could be a wage earner.

A Braille magazine should not have more than 80 or 90 pages, as it is too clumsy and heavy if it contains more. Therefore the printed copy has to be prepared carefully, the articles chosen, and the lines counted (17½ lines of print to a page of Braille) and then it is sent to the young man. People in Coronado read the articles aloud to him while he transcribes them. One hopes they learn something of the activity of the Episcopal Church in missionary fields.

At Christmas the young man took some of his earnings and bought presents for the little children, his friends of the neighborhood, and had in this way the happiest Christmas he had ever had. When that word reached me, I felt it was for me, too, one of the happiest, because through the work of our Committee so **much** happiness had been started. Just this one thing alone—the finding and giving work to this young man would make the work of the Committee worth while—but much more than this has been done. Miss Nelson has finished her Red Cross course in

Braille and works **hours** a day at her machine. She made a great many Christmas cards, and I also received many cards and calendars from Mrs. Baxter, all of which were mailed by us, and we both have had quantities of letters of thanks and appreciation.

A letter was sent to every State Library in the country asking if it would like to receive regularly the Spirit of Missions for its Blind Department. Thirty-seven states said, "Yes," and we are hoping eventually to have sufficient funds to enable us to have copies made and sent.

A copy of Dr. Weld's book, "The Meaning of Christian Healing," was made and sent to Miss Allison. She writes, "The joy and help which I derive from 'The Meaning of Christian Healing' can not be measured in words. I shall return this precious volume to you with the hope that you will eventually place it in the California State Library or in the Library of Congress, Washington, D. C." I wish I could pay the young man so he could transcribe **many** copies for **many** libraries.

The question of how to transcribe the books is a very serious one. Transcribing can be done by volunteer workers who offer their time and service; and though this is a fine thing to do, not a **great** many books are made. Or transcribing can be done by machine at the wonderful printing house of Mr. Atkinson's on North Vermont Avenue, or at the other Braille press in Lexington, Kentucky. This is very expensive, but large quantities can be made. Or the transcribing can be done by the blind themselves who desperately need employment. This latter way seems, for the present, to appeal most to the Committee, as the blind are then being helped in two ways—they are given employment and they are also being given Literature to read. There is a National Transcribers Society at Santa Cruz; they have hundreds of unemployed longing to be given transcribing to do. To quote from a recent letter, "Some of those who are the most needy are those who do almost perfect work. Several of the blind workers are worthy young people who are depending on this organization to supply them with work so that they may have the means with which to educate themselves in music and other lines. So, Mrs. Weld, if you care to send your work on to us we will gladly turn it over to some blind person who will not only do good work for you, but will repay, with a heart full of gratitude and love for you, because of your interest and encouragement."

The Committee has been asked to send Braille Sunday School Lessons material to Honolulu, and we hope to be able to do so.

Mrs. Loaring-Clark is the national head of this work. I was fortunately able to see her in San Francisco last October and tell her all that is being done out in the West. She heartily approved and endorsed the work. She has an appropriation for her work and is doing wonders.

Blind people crave above all else independence, freedom. There seem to be two special outlets for them—one through

books, and one through trained dogs. Through books the blind can enter the world of imagination, they can travel into far countries, they can enter the world of the Spirit, they can laugh and cry over novels. Through trained dogs blind people can be physically free . . . they can go with their trained dogs alone through the city streets and country lanes. I have been asked to help start a training school for dogs and blind in Southern California, but not yet.

At present your Committee is doing one thing only: Providing Church Literature in Braille; and in providing the literature is also giving employment to the blind themselves.

St. Mary's Japanese Episcopal Mission

The year 1931 was a great year for St. Mary's Japanese Mission, great because the long hoped for new Church and Parish building became a reality. We have many to thank that this is so; first, our beloved Bishop Stevens, who obtained from the National Council of the Church an appropriation of \$15,000.00, also those good friends throughout the Church who gave us their hearty support and contributed so generously to the Building Fund. The majority of these are members of the Woman's Auxiliary. The Auxiliary has never failed St. Mary's. It has been our friend and helper since the day that Miss Paterson founded the Mission, twenty-four years ago.

There was a short delay in starting the building, due to a misunderstanding on the part of some of our neighbors, but the cloud being dispelled, construction was started and on August 16th, Bishop Gooden broke the ground and four months later laid the cornerstone in the presence of a large congregation. The building was finished in time for the Christmas services. It was the happiest and most joyful day in our Mission life, when our members and three hundred Sunday School children gathered in the new Church to worship our new-born King and Saviour. Now we are looking forward to the glad day when Bishop Stevens will consecrate the new edifice.

Our new buildings are very beautiful and substantial, and adequate for the many activities of St. Mary's Mission, among which are the Sunday School, Kindergarten, Boy and Girls Scouts, Junior Daughters of the King, Girls' Friendly Society, Young People's Society, the Knights of Christ's Kingdom, a Boys' Club, Brotherhood of St. Andrew, Junior and Senior, Afternoon School

for Language, Choir and Woman's Auxiliary.

Due to the generosity of a good friend who is a member of the Woman's Auxiliary, we have a beautiful marble altar, choir stalls and pews for the new Church, for all of which my people are deeply grateful and give thanks that they are able to worship "in the beauty of Holiness," and rear their children in an atmosphere in which they can learn to love and appreciate the sublime service of the Episcopal Church—Sei Ko Kai—the Holy Catholic Church. The Church has a seating capacity of three hundred. The Parish House will accommodate five hundred. On the first floor there is a large assembly room with a platform that can be used for entertainments, the Kindergarten rooms, and a most convenient kitchen. Upstairs there are the Sunday School Class Rooms, Library, offices, and a large, pleasant room furnished and used by the Woman's Auxiliary. Our equipment for the Parish House is still incomplete and we hope that when our friends see and know our needs they will assist us in any way they can.

Within a week the Kindergarten, which has been carried on with loving care and patience by Mrs. Stockton and Mrs. Hirata, her assistant, will be established in its new quarters. You can imagine the joy of teachers and children when they are settled in comfortable rooms after experiencing every inconvenience during the past months.

Last Sunday we had the first baptism in our new Church, a father and son. The little boy is a member of our Sunday School, as is an older brother who was baptized two years ago. We feel that in this case it was the children who brought the father to the Altar and made of them a united Christian family. Following close upon this happy service, I was called upon to conduct the burial service for a little boy who was also a member of our Sunday School. In the near future, the first wedding will be held in the new Church, when two of our young members will be joined in Holy matrimony. I am sure our friends will rejoice to see how already the new Church is ministering to the needs of its people.

I know that you are glad to hear the good news I have brought you today concerning the work which you have so warmly supported, and I wish to express my thanks to the many Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary which have helped us by gifts and pledges to attain the realization of our hopes. I feel sure you will continue to give us the support and sympathy that will help us to take advantage of this larger opportunity to win our people to Christ and His Church.

This has been a difficult year but I am very happy to report that the work shows an increase in the amount of reading and other material supplied, notwithstanding a decided decrease in receipts. Many subscriptions have been replaced by forwarded magazines and there is a continuing demand for the latter. The cooperation of all friends is earnestly desired as the need has correspondingly increased with lessened incomes of those helped.

Not only the Prayer Books but the hymnals also, were given to the Bishop Johnson Memorial Chapel at the University of California at Los Angeles.

A reference book was sent to Deaconess Julia A. Clark at St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China, to help replace her personal library lost during the floods. St. Hilda's Library suffered also in this disaster and books for girls in their teens are greatly needed.

A number of magazines were provided for the Recreation Hall at Boulder City, Nevada, for the men working on the Colorado River dam at Boulder Canyon.

500 Christmas cards were supplied to the Seamen's Church Institute for the use of the seamen, as well as many hundreds of magazines and a number of books.

Reading matter was sent to the U. S. Forestry Department camp for unemployed men near Yucaipa.

A large number of Christmas cards were sent the missionary in charge of work among the lepers at Kusatsu, Japan, for distribution among these unfortunate people.

In addition to usual gifts of the Church Periodical Club, 56 bundles of clothing were supplied to needy persons and a Victrola with records, radio set and curtains furnished for a community house in an isolated district.

Progress of the Work Among the Isolated is shown by the appended Supervisor's report.

In closing, I wish to express my thanks to all who have helped in the work and particularly to the Parish secretaries. I am deeply grateful that we have not failed those who look to us for help and that we may face the new year with confidence in our ability to still carry on.

Literature has been placed where advisable.

Enrollment blanks for Adult Study Courses, with outlines of study, together with the Form Letter, and a list of Books in the Extension Library have been sent to all names of those who seemed to be in a position to make use of the help offered.

Samples of literature — Devotional, Missionary, etc., when asked for by a Priest as an assistance in parochial work, have supplied.

One transfer has been given to a parishioner of Rev. Dr. Swan, Tujunga, California.

Strictly "isolated" people are not very numerous in the Diocese of Los Angeles.

CONSTITUTION

I. This Society shall be called **The Los Angeles Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.**

II. The object of the Society is: By systematic and united effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese, to promote the study of missions, to encourage prayer for missions, and to be of service to the National Council in all its departments.

III. The Church itself is the great Missionary Society, and every person, by baptism, becomes a member of this Society; therefore, every baptized woman in the Diocese is a member of the Woman's Auxiliary, but terms of membership in any Parish Branch shall be fixed by that Branch.

IV. All Parish Societies that so desire may become branches of this Auxiliary, first obtaining the consent of the Rector or Clergyman-in-charge, by appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

V. A President, a Vice-President-at-Large, a Vice-President, over such divisions of the Diocese as the Bishop may counsel, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, a Supply Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a United Thank Offering, a Directress of the Altar Department, a Directress of the Church Periodical Club, and an officer over any other department that may be formed, shall be appointed by the Bishop.

VI. The Annual Meeting shall be held at the time of the Diocesan Convention, and Monthly Diocesan Meetings on such dates and in such places as the President may appoint. General meetings may be arranged by the Vice-Presidents, in their respective districts.

VII. An Annual Quiet Day shall be held during the season of Advent.

BY-LAWS

1. The duty of the President shall be to preside at the meetings of the Society, and have general charge of the work, under the direction of the Bishop. The Vice-President shall act for the

President in her absence, and assist her in the care and oversight of the work. The duty of the other Vice-Presidents shall be to preside in the absence of the President at the general meetings held in their several charges, and to cooperate with the President in the supervision of the work of the Auxiliary in the sections to which they respectively belong.

2. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to correspond with the various branches in the Diocese, to collect their reports, and to prepare an annual report.

3. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to give notice of meetings, to keep a record of such meetings, and to prepare an abstract of the minutes for the annual report.

4. The Treasurer shall keep an account of all moneys received and expended, and make a report at the Annual Meeting.

5. The Supply Secretary, the Educational Secretary, the United Thank Offering Treasurer, the Directress of the Altar Department, the Directress of the Church Periodical Club shall superintend their several departments, in consultation with the other Diocesan Officers.

6. The Secretaries of Parish Branches are required to correspond with the Diocesan Officers, who alone correspond with the National Secretaries of the Woman's Auxiliary.

7. Each Parish Branch shall make an annual pledge, according to its ability, to the following Diocesan Funds—the General Working Fund, the Bishop's Missionary Fund, and the Altar Fund. These pledges, and all other money, must be sent through the Diocesan Treasurer, and all checks made out to her.

8. At the Annual Meeting each Branch represented shall be entitled to but one vote on business of general import.

9. All moneys collected for the United Thank Offering Fund shall be paid to the Diocesan Treasurer of that Fund, and by her paid to the Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer.

This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended by a motion made at the Annual Meeting, and voted on the following year:

President's Address

Bishop Stevens, Bishop Gooden, and Officers and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Los Angeles:

During the past year the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Los Angeles has lost three of its former Diocesan Officers by the death of Mrs. J. Arthur Evans of Hollywood, Miss Anne Wilson of San Gabriel, and Mrs. Theodore A. Eisen of Los Angeles. With rare devotion Mrs. Evans served as Diocesan Directress of the Altar Department from 1919 to 1922 and left a deep spiritual impress on the work. One of our pioneer members of outstanding character, Miss Wilson, acted as our first Diocesan Correspondent for the Church Periodical Club when the Diocese was organized in 1896 and served devotedly for four years. Mrs. Theodore Eisen, another pioneer member, acted as Recording Secretary at the first Diocesan meeting in 1896, as Vice-President in 1897, and as our second Diocesan President from 1898 until 1902. These three able and consecrated women helped to lay the firm foundations on which we are still building today and we owe them a debt of deep and lasting gratitude. "Grant them, O Lord, continual growth in Thy love and service."

In her last annual address to the Woman's Auxiliary, twenty years ago, Mrs. Eisen said, "Now the future is before us. Let us be full of courage and go forward. Today and the future is ours to mould into a glorious past." My message to you today after twenty years is contained in the same simple word, Courage—the courage to go forward in these difficult times and make the world's need the Church's great opportunity. As Mr. Spencer Miller said in his great address to the women at the Triennial, "We need not be discouraged. Rather, as Christians, should we rejoice at the new task which is ours, to push forward the spiritual frontiers of the world . . . To the discouragement and despair of men everywhere we can bring the revitalizing hope of the Gospel of Love. It is written that 'They who suffer, see.' Surely out of the world's agony and suffering, men are getting a clearer picture of the road which leads unto the city of God."

These are indeed thrilling times in which to live and one of rich opportunity for the Church. We can make our religion count as never before as a great constructive force. Only last week Dr. Robert A. Millikan, in a lecture at the Pacific School of Religion, stated that the Church would be the leader in "the most inspiring job of the next century," that of satisfying the intellectual and moral needs of man. As a concrete example of what we can do in our own communities—we can emphasize the right use of the Parish House as a means of building character and sustaining morale. As a prominent social worker recently said, "As the ability of the family decreases the social administrations of the Church should increase." We can strengthen

those organizations which have a direct share in teaching the right use of leisure as a means to a more abundant life. Our imagination at once leaps to a host of possibilities along educational and recreational lines. Let the Woman's Auxiliary be among the first to take part in the present movement of Educating for Leisure.

As we look back at the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary we realize that it was both a climax and a new beginning—a climax of three years of splendid achievement, a beginning of rich promise. As Auxiliary women we stand challenged by the great program presented to us under the title, "The Kingdoms of Our Lord." I hope that every Branch of the Auxiliary will read and study the addresses and findings on the five subjects under discussion—Family Life, Property and Economic Conditions, International Relations, Inter-racial Contacts, and Religious Thinking Today—either in connection with the text book, "Building a Christian Nation," or separately. Copies of the addresses and findings can be secured through the Educational Department. During the next three years we shall have these vital topics brought to our attention again and again, and in seriously considering them the Woman's Auxiliary will be trying to face the great issues of our day in the light of Jesus Christ. As one Bishop wrote, "You know, I believe the findings of these committees have done no end of good for the Auxiliary. I believe they have made the Church realize that the Auxiliary is not just a bunch of ancients bound by tradition and interested in teas and meetings, but a group of women able to deal with present-day problems even more effectively than the men of the Church."

From the splendid reports that you have just heard I am sure that you will agree with me that the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese is not "just a bunch of ancients bound by tradition," but a group of earnest, forward-looking women engaged in a work of real creative force which embraces many types of service and reaches out into the community, the Diocese, and the world. We have a good record for the past year. Our departments have been strengthened and enlarged and a few new ventures have been made—such as work among the isolated and the blind. The Social Service Department has definitely taken root and is filling a tremendous need, not only in the work of our Field Worker at the Juvenile Court, but in many other avenues of service. Our Educational Department now boasts of a Diocesan library of over three hundred volumes, and has seen the birth of a quarterly Woman's Auxiliary Bulletin. Our Supply Department and Altar Department have rendered more effective service than ever. The United Thank Offering of \$22,345.76 presented at the Triennial was a fine increase over that of 1928. The five District Meetings held within the Los Angeles Convocation, in addition to our Monthly Diocesan Meetings, have filled a long-felt need and have helped the Los Angeles Convocation to deal as effectively with its

seventy-three branches as its sister Convocations of San Bernardino, San Diego, and Santa Barbara have long dealt with their lesser numbers. You may be interested to know that we now have one hundred and seven branches in the Diocese.

I am sure I speak for every member of the Woman's Auxiliary as well as for myself, when I thank our splendid Vice-Presidents and other Diocesan Officers for their faithful and efficient work during the past year. I do not believe there is a more capable or devoted group of women in the whole Church or women who give more freely of their time and talents—and give with joy. Without their help it would be impossible for me to carry on as your leader.

As your President it has been my great privilege this past year to preside at all our Monthly Diocesan Meetings, with the exception of December, when I was representing you in New York; to visit in all four of our Convocations; to attend the weekly session of our Diocesan Summer School; to be one of your delegates to the Provincial Synod at Phoenix in May, and to the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary at Denver in September where I led one of the Discussion Groups on Inter-racial Contacts; and to attend as your Provincial Representative three meetings of the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, one in Evergreen, Colorado, in September, and two in New York City, in April and December, respectively.

It is with a feeling of great pride that I represent the Diocese of Los Angeles at all these meetings. You have made this possible—and by **you** I mean every Branch in the Diocese—by your fine cooperation, the high standard of work that you have maintained, and your eagerness to move forward as fresh goals have been presented to you. My earnest plea today is—not to slacken our pace for the coming year. The temptation will be great as we are pressed with material and parochial worries. But let us keep our vision clear and realize that curtailment in any of our departments of work would spell tragedy, and would mean added distress to our clergy, our missionaries, our Institutions in the field, and the unfortunate in our own communities. The world needs the Gospel of Jesus Christ as never before. To those branches who are suffering temporary financial distress we extend our sincere sympathy and beg them not to leave us but to continue their spiritual and moral support. We need them.

Let us then go forward with Courage and with the realization that it is a wonderful age in which to serve the Church, an age which Sir James Jeans describes as follows: "Our problem is no longer to muddle through for a few more generations. We see ourselves as the architects of a tremendous future. . . . We have the thrill of ever-changing views—now and again we reach a ridge or summit which opens up new and unexpected vistas. Those who come after us will live in a very different world; they will not know the thrill of the pioneer. And unless human nature

changes vastly in the meanwhile, we may be sure they will regret the 'good old days' in which we are now living. They will think of our age as the golden age, the glorious morning of the world."

Report of the Woman's Auxiliary

(Submitted to the Annual Convention, January 27, 1932)

During 1931 the Woman's Auxiliary has lived up to its past standards, the work in all departments functioning well and several new ventures being made, such as the work among the isolated and the blind, and additional District Meetings. We now have 107 branches.

Besides our Monthly Diocesan Meetings held the second Tuesdays of each month at the Cathedral House, five District Educational Meetings were held within the Los Angeles Convocation. Most successful District Meetings were also held in the other three Convocations. In addition to this a Woman's Auxiliary Conference and a daily study class on "Building a Christian Nation" were held at the Diocesan Summer School, and an Annual Quiet Day held in Advent with meditations by Bishop Parsons. We also cooperated with the World Day of Prayer last February. In October Dr. Mary James of the General Church Hospital, Wuchang, visited the Diocese in behalf of the Advance Work and spoke at seven meetings throughout the Diocese.

Several of our departments have been strengthened and enlarged. The Educational Department has over one thousand women enrolled in study classes, four of these being Interdenominational Classes sponsored by our Church, and has a library of over three hundred volumes which is lent throughout the Diocese. Educational Conferences have been held in each Convocation, and a student from the University of Southern California assisted in her expenses in attending the Student Volunteer Conference in Buffalo. The Social Service Department has done a fine piece of constructive work in paying \$1,430.35 toward the salary of our Field Worker at the Juvenile Court, who has paid 710 visits for the Church Welfare Association and fifty-nine calls of investigation for the Church Home for Children. In addition the Department has met many charitable appeals and has contributed over \$2,000.00 to Social Service Work throughout the Diocese.

The Supply Department during Lent sent twenty bales of hospital supplies, bedding, and clothing to two mission stations in Alaska, two in the Orient, an Indian Mission in Nevada, and St. Margaret's House, Berkeley, valued at \$7,437.59. During Advent

twenty-four Diocesan missionaries received Christmas gifts of money, and two personal boxes were sent outside the Diocese, valued at \$1,938.37. Total value of Supply Work, \$9,375.96. The Altar Department has been of great assistance in supplying Altar and Chancel furnishings for nineteen missions in the Diocese and in assisting sixteen others, and has disbursed \$835.47. In addition to this 800 Christmas boxes were sent to the Seamen's Church Institute, valued at \$1,600.00

The Church Periodical Club has sent out 348 current periodicals in the home and foreign field; 30,753 odd magazines and papers, and 1,329 books, both theological and secular. Prayer books and hymnals were also given to the Bishop Johnson Memorial Chapel at U. C. L. A. Work among the isolated has been definitely organized and thirty-nine names are on the list to whom literature and Church instruction is sent. The Committee on Braille work reports that eighteen blind in the Diocese and thirty-six in the state have been provided with the Spirit of Missions in Braille, the work being done by a blind young man in Coronado.
