"BRING THEE HITHER TO ME"

The Woman's Auxiliary asks the prayers of the Church on the Festival of the Transfiguration of Christ (August 6th), the Auxiliary's "Altar Day."

The following resolution was unanimously adopted at the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, St. John's Church, Los Angeles, May 24, 1898, and endorsed the following day by the Diocesan Convention, with the addition that where practicable the offerings be devoted to the General Fund of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz.:

Resolved, That we set apart the Feast of the Epiphany for an Auxiliary Day, and that, as members of the Auxiliary, we consider it not only a privilege but a duty to attend the services held on that day in the parish to which we belong; and further,

Resolved, That should the appointment of this day meet with the approbation of the clergymen of the Diocese, they be requested to offer, at the celebration of the Holy Eucharist on the Feast of the Epiphany, special prayers for the work of the Auxiliary.

Grant that to many hearts may go the call of opportunity to serve Thee in this work, in the bearing of others' burdens and the fulfillment of the law of Christ. In what they think and do, enable them to hear the voice of Thy Son to guide and strengthen them. And in all the means of grace in Thy Church, and more especially in the Holy Communion at Thy Altars, help them to see Him Who is invisible, that in their aims and difficulties and trials they may have the abiding faith that all things are possible to them that believe. We ask this for the merits of Him Who came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, Thy Son, our Saviour, Jesus Christ. Amen.

O Lord, our Heavenly Father, we pray Thee to send forth more laborers into Thy harvest, and to grant them Thy special grace for every need. Minutes of the Thirty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary

The Thirty-seventh Annual Meeting on January 31st, 1933, began at nine o'clock with the Holy Communion at which Bishop Stevens was the celebrant, assisted by Bishop Gooden and Dean Beal. The business meeting convened at ten o'clock with Miss Hibbard in the chair. Bishop Stevens read the opening prayers. Mrs. Chappel, the President of the Cathedral Branch, welcomed the Woman's Auxiliary.

The minutes of the 1932 meeting were omitted on motion.

The officers gave their annual reports which were accepted.

Mrs. Stockton read the annual report of St. Mary's Japanese Mission, which this time took the form of a resolution of thanks to the Woman's Auxiliary.

Motion passed that the Corresponding Secretary write a letter of thanks to the Rev. John M. Yamazaki for his kind resolution, and of appreciation for his wonderful work at St. Mary's during twenty-five years.

The Rev. Mr. Yamazaki gave us his greeting. Mrs. Weld gave the report for the Committee on Church Literature for the Blind.

Mrs. Stevens spoke about the Girls' Friendly Society. Roll call showed 520 members present, besides twelve visitors and about fifteen of the clergy.

Mrs. Spencer Smith took the chair during the reading of the President's address.

Motion made by Mrs. Beal and carried, of rising vote of appreciation, for Miss Hibbard's six years of service.

Bishop Stevens expressed his approval of the suggestion to revise the Constitution and By-Laws.

The following recommendation was read and passed:

"The Diocesan Board of the Woman's Auxiliary recommends that a Committee representative of the whole Diocese be appointed by the Bishop to revise the Constitution and By-Laws of the Los Angeles Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, with special reference to Article V of the Constitution, amending it to make possible the election of Diocesan officers rather than their appointment.

"The Board further recommends that this Committee make their report at the next Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and that two months in advance of this meeting, copies of the proposed Amendments be sent to every Branch in the Diocese."

The following recording of resolution was passed:

Resolved, that Article V of the Constitution be amended to make possible the election of Diocesan officers, and that such necessary changes be made in Constitution and By-Laws as will make them consistent with present practice in the National Church and Province;

Resolved, further, that a vote be taken on these Amendments in 1934.

The motion was passed to send greetings to the absent officers, Mrs. Johnson, Mrs. Cowles and Miss Boulton. The motion was passed to have the Secretary send letters to Mrs. Ray Miller and Miss Rouse, former Diocesan officers who are ill. Bishop Gooden read the Noonday Prayers. The morning session ended, and at two o'clock the meeting reconvened in the Cathedral.

Dean Beal welcomed the Woman's Auxiliary. Bishop Schmuck of Wyoming, spoke on "The Challenge of Christ."

Bishop Stevens spoke about the work of the Hospital of the Good Samaritan.

Motion passed of vote of thanks to Dean Beal; Mrs. Harris and her ushers for making the meeting so perfect in its arrangement. Bishop Stevens appointed the officers for the year, and gave us his Benediction. The meeting adjourned and was followed by an informal tea in the Cathedral house.

Report of the Work in Convocation of San Bernardino

The Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Convocation of San Bernardino was held in Redlands in October. The attendance was large and the reports splendid. Owing to the hearty cooperation of the Educational Secretary, Miss Martha Wright, and the consecrated leaders of each Branch, our work has grown along the higher lines. We have had more Quiet Days and Days of Intercession and more Corporate Communion. Mrs. Thomas Fleming, Jr., visited many of the Branches, giving a devotional talk.

Bishop Gooden's appeal for more help in financing the Social Service Department found an immediate response, showing a keen interest in that work.

The work of our Educational Department expanded under the guidance of Miss Wright, many programs showing an eagerness to extend our vision and to discuss the topics given us at Denver.

In March we were privileged to have our first Corporate Quiet Day. The Rev. Mr. Gibson conducted it for us in Redlands. While the attendance was not large those who were privileged to hear Mr. Gibson went away strengthened and helped to carry on our great work for the Master.

The spring meeting of the Convocation was held in May in Beaumont with a splendid attendance. In the morning Dr. Dorothy Page of Redlands University gave a fine talk on "Youth and Its Problems," which brought out a lively discussion. In the afternoon Miss Patton gave a report of the meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary at the Synod in Sacramento.

The third annual Officers' Conference was held as usual in Beaumont. At ten o'clock we had a Corporate Communion which was followed by an Educational program. Mrs. Thomas Fleming, Jr., acting as chairman. She also gave us an interesting account of the Churches Abroad. Miss Hanson of Riverside talked on Community Settlement Work. At twelve o'clock, as is the custom, we all gathered for a friendly lunch and later listened to our Diocesan officers tell of their work—Miss Patton, Mrs. Stockton, Mrs. Malpas and others. Miss Hibbard who always inspires us to do our best, told us of her visit to New York to the meeting of the Executive Board.

Many of the Branches attended the District Meeting in Pomona, and out of it came an interest in the larger work of the Auxiliary, with the result that Redlands and San Bernardino have expanded into Service Leagues.

We have been glad to welcome Mrs. Laslett for a course of lectures at Redlands. Mrs. Habersham has inspired us with her missionary message and pictures, and Deaconess Julia Clark, at our Annual Meeting, told of her work in China. We welcome the visits of our officers, for they leave us richer for their visits.

Report of the Vice-President of the Convocation of San Diego

We are glad to be able to report continued progress in the San Diego Convocation. This progress we feel has been shown by a greater earnestness in the Branches, a better understanding of the work as a whole, and a fine spirit of co-operation in our Convocational contacts.

The policy of personal visits to the Branches by the Vice-President and Convocational officers, has been continued, as well as that of holding at least two General Meetings and a Quiet Day, during the year. We feel that the progress in our Convocation owes much to this policy and it is very gratifying to have the Branches requesting visits from the Convocational officers.

We were again fortunate in having Mrs. F. A. Habersham visit the Parishes and Missions of the Convocation, during the month of November, bringing her series of interesting pictures of our Church's work and, as always, giving encouragement and inspiration.

Our General Meetings each had a special note of interest this year. The first one, held at La Mesa on May 19th with an attendance of 230, at which time our Diocesan President made her much-appreciated visit to the Convocation and we were fortunate enough to have Miss Boulton tell us of the Synod meeting at Sacramento, and Miss Bartberger to tell us of her work at Anvik, Alaska, was held in the Methodist Church, owing to lack of space at our own St. Andrew's Mission. This thoughtful hospitality seemed to add something very special to our meeting, as did the presence of our beloved Suffragan Bishop. The offering was given to the Whitsunday Offering.

Our second General Meeting was held at St. James-by-the-Sea, La Jolla, on October 20th. After the opening service of Holy Communion, with which our General Meetings are always opened, and a short address by our Diocesan Educational Secretary, Mrs. W. L. Laslett, the meeting divided into four Conferences: Leadership and Diocesan Reports, conducted by the Vice-President and Mrs. F. C. Malpas; Religious Education, conducted by Mrs. Laslett; the United Thank Offering, conducted by Miss Maude Merryweather, and Christian Social Service, conducted by the Rev. Francis Bloy. After luncheon findings of the Conference were given and inspiring closing address was given by Mr. Bloy. This form of meeting was an entirely new departure. The attendance was excellent—185—and the Conferences were enthusiastically received by our members and considered of great help in carrying on this year's work.

Our Annual Quiet Day has been changed from Advent to the week before Lent, so will not appear in this report.

Mrs. F. J. Bate has been appointed Religious Educational Secretary and is already doing good work.

The work of Miss Maude Merryweather, as Convocational Rep-

representative of the United Thank Offering, has been of great value.

We are happy to announce the forming of two new Branches: St. Luke's, San Diego, and St. Michael's, Carlsbad.

The Council Meetings of Branch Presidents and Convocational officers, continue to be of inestimable value and, with the aid of our earnest and devoted Branch Presidents, Convocational officers and members, we hope to "carry on" in the San Diego Convocation in spite of the difficulties which surround us all.

Report of Vice-President of the Convocation of Santa Barbara

The Convocation of Santa Barbara met twice in 1932, the Spring Meeting, May 17th, was in Santa Paula and the Annual Meeting, November 18th, was at All Saints, Montecito. These are the meetings of the Convocation as a whole, but part of the day is given over to the Woman's Auxiliary and that's what concerns us in this report.

When the women meet it gives an opportunity for questions. It is a help, I think, for Santa Paula to hear the questions of Santa Maria, and a help to all, to get a report of what goes on at the monthly Board Meetings in Los Angeles, and to get the news from the Synod, and information about Study Books, and so forth.

February 12th was the Woman's Auxiliary Education Day, when sixty-five women met in Montecito to hear Mrs. Laslett, Diocesan Educational Secretary. As usual she brought us much information and a great deal of inspiration, and we were all richer because of what she gave us.

A short Conference was held by the Presidents of the Auxiliaries and Guilds, and the question was asked, "How much time should be given at a meeting to the Devotional service?" Everyone was unanimous in feeling far more time should be allowed than is usual, and everyone said they would endeavor to plan their own meetings so that more prayers and Bible Readings should be said, and an effort made to create less rush and more spiritual purpose at each gathering.

My own visits in February, April and November, to Santa Paula, Lompoc and Oxnard, were very happy occasions, and I appreciate so much the cordial reception which is always given me. A great interest was shown everywhere in the Study Books, and in general reading of Church magazines.

These visits into the Parishes and Missions of the Convocation are the important thing here, and your Vice-President re-

grets that last year so few were made.

I was delighted to be unofficially invited to Trinity, Santa Barbara, November 1st, to hear Miss Hibbard, just back from an Executive Council Meeting in New York, bubble over with news and enthusiasm from "The Front," and on December 6th to hear Mrs. Habersham and see her delightful pictures taken among the mountaineers.

The monthly Board Meetings are an inspiration, and it is with deep regret that I have to miss one occasionally. I was able last year to fly down and back in a day, but the Coast Airways has had to close, and it is impossible to come and go by train in a day and attend all the meetings.

The women of the Convocation could not get together on November 28th for the Day of Intercession for the "Every Member Canvas," so every Parish and Mission was asked to hold a service of its own, by the women, and I am glad to say that a few did so—Santa Barbara, Santa Paula, Lompoc and Montecito. It is not easy for women who are not used to holding such services, to do so, and it was splendid that these four places did. Our own service in Montecito of two hours, was beautifully planned and conducted by our U. T. O. Treasurer.

So in looking back over the year, it seems as if we might rejoice that the information which had to be stressed a few years ago, about the machinery in the life of the Woman's Auxiliary, does not now need to be stressed so much, and that the more important part in the life of the Woman's Auxiliary has been stressed, namely the life of prayer—prayer for the individual—prayer of that group, and prayer on Days of Intercession. If the women of the Church in the Convocation will be a praying group, we can be truly thankful.

Some of the Los Angeles Mission branches were visited by request and four District Meetings attended.

Annual Report of the Supply Department

As we face 1933, we can with pride look back on 1932, and see work well and faithfully accomplished.

Last Lent 94 branches worked for the various Missions, and I am proud to say that both the Convocation of San Bernardino and that of San Diego responded 100%. Our total value for Lent was \$7,885.72. This is a conservative estimate as some of the valuations were late and some who sent direct to Honolulu did not get their valuations to me. However, our efficient Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Malpas, has taken care of that, and if your report is properly made out and sent to her, your Branch will receive full credit in the Annual.

The packing at All Saints last April was even more exciting than usual, for we had to send so many things via mail. I can never be too grateful to my able assistants who came early, worked hard and stayed late. We sent to the Lepers at Kusatsu, Japan, 47 parcels, two large bales, one small one; two boxes and two tins of cod liver oil. That is not as easy as it sounds, for all those 47 packages could not weigh over 11 pounds not even by so much as a quarter of an ounce. Also every single item in all the things sent to Japan had to be carefully listed on account of the customs. Do you wonder that I appreciate my workers.

Alaska received six bales and 11 boxes for Dr. Burkes' hospital at Fort Yukon. The Indians on the Wind River Reservation, Wyoming, had four bales and four boxes. Emery House, a student center at Salt Lake City, Utah, two bales of blankets and bed linen.

The Mission to the Klamath Indians on the northern border of our own State, California, had 11 boxes sent in via parcels post. Also through the kindness of an Auxiliary member a folding operating table was sent up there. In fact, this Diocese did so well by the Mission of the Holy Spirit, that the Missionary in charge has asked for us again this year and once more we are working for the Klamath Indians.

We sent two bales and 10 boxes to St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Shanghai, China. These contained bedding, pajamas and hospital supplies.

This makes a total of 17 bales and 87 other parcels shipped out from the Diocese of Los Angeles. Besides all this nine of our Branches worked for Honolulu and mailed their things direct.

For Advent, 1932, we sent two personal boxes to Missionaries in the United States. One of these boxes was sent by St. Paul's, San Diego, and one by All Saints', Pasadena. Their combined value was \$325.00. We sent \$30.00 for an Indian catechist's suit and underwear, and we sent four women missionaries Christmas gifts of \$5.00 each. These women were all supported by the United Thank Offering, and were one in Honolulu, one in the Philippines, one in Japan and one in China. Then we had the privilege of sending Christmas presents in the form of checks to

26 of our own Diocesan Missionaries, the money you sent in for this amounted to \$988.50. So our Advent total, including the boxes' value was \$1,363.50 less than last year, but more Branches participated and after all that is what we want, don't we—100% co-operation. The year's work of the Supply Department was \$9,249.31.

Thank you, my fellow workers. You have been behind me and my work so splendidly from the wee Mission to the largest Parish. I am very grateful.

Report of the Social Service Department

The Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Los Angeles has done an amazing amount of Social Work during this past year of financial stringency. Much of this has probably not been reported, hence the figures which follow are merely an indication of the amount of work done by consecrated women.

The Church Welfare Association has carried on not only its protective work amongst adolescent girlhood, but also has done relief and case work in the families from which our clients came. Miss Cooper, the field worker, is constantly busy with regular clients and emergency work; then, too, she does follow up work and investigating of homes for the Church Home for Children. On the sixth of December, 1932, we had the honor of being affiliated with the Church Mission of Help. \$1,410.15 was contributed to the Church Welfare last year through the Diocesan W. A. Treasurer. This sum was partly contributed by branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, partly by gifts from individuals. I ask you all to see that your Branch is doing its share towards this obligation which we have assumed.

The valuation placed by branches on their work, gifts of food, clothing, etc., amounted to \$4,852.15.

Cash contributed to Diocesan Institutions by the W. A. and paid through the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer totaled \$1,552.45. Cash donated by individuals for relief and paid through our Treasurer was \$344.00, making a total of \$8,158.75 given towards the relief and happiness of our fellowman.

The Secretary of the Department has been responsible for raising the amount needed for the Church Welfare Association budget. This is a tremendous responsibility and will only be lessened as each Branch assumes its share. Two Conferences have been held: the State Conference of Social Work was attended, as was nearly every meeting of the Diocesan Social Service Commission. Over thirty people have been found employment. Wholesome recreation has been found for two girls, foreigners in this country, who needed friendship. Seven layettes

were given away ; milk has ben provided for children ; clothes have been given away constantly during the year, given by those who wished to share what they had. Many families were given baskets at Thanksgiving and at Christmas I was responsible for seeing that 97 families were remembered with a Christmas dinner and food sufficient for several weeks thereafter. Many individuals have come to the Secretary for advice and temporary relief and some solution for their problem has been found whenever possible. One elderly indigent couple were sent to Colorado to live with their son.

It would take too long to go into detail about the work ; it has been terrifically heavy this past year. I am deeply grateful for the cooperation of the members of the Auxiliary and for their splendid response to the Church Welfare Association pledge cards. Let us end 1933 with a Social Service Committee with its Secretary in every Branch.

Report of the Church Welfare Association

In examining the work of the Church Welfare Association perhaps the first question we ask is, "What need has the community for our particular contribution to Social Case Work?" "Do the adolescent girls of this community need us?" Part of the answer, at least, is in the volume of our work, and the source of the applications made to us. The year's total of cases for 1932 was 128 families ; of this number 78 were given active service by the Church Welfare Association. In addition, some slight service was performed for 25, and the balance were the 25 families, including 35 children, seeking admittance of their children to the Church Home, and whose situation needed investigation or follow-up, in the opinion of the Church Home for Children.

Of the 78 families who called for the greatest part of our attention, 36 were known to us before 1932, and 42 were new to us during the year. At present, we are working with 42 of the families, having completed services for 36. The average monthly "case-load" has been over 45.

The children in the 78 families numbered 121—80 of them being girls of adolescent age.

The largest number of families—36—were referred by the private social agencies, most of them Chest agencies. These include the C.P.A., the Travelers' Aid Society, the Church Federation, the Salvation Army, the Midnight Mission, the Jewish Children's Bureau, the Girls' Rendezvous, and the Ruth Protective

Home. Eighteen were referred by the Juvenile Court, nine were referred by interested individuals, chiefly clergymen and church women. Three were reported by the Juvenile Police Bureau and three by other families known to us. The Board of Education and the County Welfare Department each referred two cases, Los Angeles General Hospital, one case; one personal application was made by a parent, and one anonymous letter was written to us. The Church Home for Children and the Church Mission of Help in New Jersey each referred one case.

So much for the source and volume of the work. Next in what kinds of families (what types of family situations) are we working? The economic situation is rather naturally of prime importance; 31 out of 78 families, or nearly 40% we know to be living on the narrow margin of existence. This number does not include families of diminished income, but purely situations of unemployment and economic crisis, or else dependence on county charity. By or through the Church Welfare Association 11 of these families—61 individuals—have been given financial assistance, consisting of groceries and milk orders. Eighteen families were given clothing—with 60 individuals. This percentage of economic distress would be increased undoubtedly if we knew the families of all of our girls. Some are separated from parents whom we do not know, as they live in other communities or out of the State.

Fourteen families, or 18%, are Church families.

Two-thirds (or 79 out of 121) of the children were with their parents on the last day of 1932, or at the last contact we had with them. Fifteen lived with relatives and five with friends. Nine girls worked for their room and board, and four were boarded with families. Five were placed in "Corrective Institutions" (schools for 24-hour supervision), and three were placed in club residences for girls. One girl married and established her own home. The whereabouts of two girls who ran away is still unknown.

Ten of the 121 children are adopted children.

The services given by the Church Welfare Association included:

- (1) Investigation and follow-up of neglect or abuse of girls.
- (2) Friendly supervision of Juvenile Court Wards.
- (3) Assistance to parents and guardians with girl's problems.
- (4) Supplement of parental supervision on advise of schools, social workers, etc.
- (5) Placement of girls in boarding homes, or referred to the right agencies.
- (6) Finding of housework jobs and placement and supervision of girls.
- (7) Co-operation with out-of-the-city organizations, Church Mission of Help, for example.
- (8) Referral of girls who move away to churches and social organizations.
- (9) Emergency help, as outlined above, with food, funds, milk, and clothes. Our provision for families at Christmastime was a substantial item.

Results? The best measure is the individual adjustments made by various girls:

- (1) **Dorothy**, age 17, an orphan was a ward of the Juvenile Court, a sex delinquent, but not serious problem. Church Welfare Association arranged for her participation in Church activities and provided recreational treats. Relatives co-operated. Finally Dorothy went to live with friends who do not know about her difficulties. Church Welfare Association no longer needed.
- (2) **Carolyn**, age 17, the one superior member of a low-grade family. Removed by the Juvenile Court several years ago. Church Welfare Association supervised Carolyn in work-homes when she left El Retiro School, and she graduated from high school with high honors. Carolyn has since lived at the Business Girl's Club while she tried to get a job. Resented further help. Experience taught her several things. Now on her own volition she is again doing housework. Plans to go to Junior College next year. Waiting to marry a boy in the Navy when his term is over.
- (3) Another girl, **Margaret**, now 18, came to our attention when reported as a potential problem by a relative. Found to be overworking in a housework job. Parents in Michigan. Sent to a club residence where she was much happier; worked; paid her way. Finally when she had no job, returned to parents with friends who were driving East.
- (4) One mother came for advice regarding placement. Through the Church Welfare Association her two daughters, age 15 and 13, were placed in a fine home for girls near the mother's work. Mother divorced. Housework. Full support of children. Girls have made a good adjustment.
- (5) **Clara**, age 17, was referred by a Church woman, because of lack of supervision at home. She was boarded at the Girl's Friendly Lodge. Completed high school. Good student with civic achievements. Mother dead. Father unemployed. Found work on a boat for self and two sons. Clara now working on Saturdays at Kress store. Boarded with friends. Stopped Junior College work because of expense and impractical nature of work.
- (6) Our greatest job has been in helping to establish a home for a girl whom we have known for a long time. She had a child out of marriage, who is nearly three years of age. After a long struggle with the parents of the baby's father, we were able to get hold of him. The amazing result was that when he acknowledged his responsibility and was released from jail, he offered to marry the girl. Now they both have work—the girl's is part-time, and his is temporary. The baby is in a day nursery and all is well (for the present).
- (7) Perhaps our most famous friends are the ones known as "the Oklahoma family." The girl of 17 married rashly and was mistreated by her husband and now has a four-months-old baby to support. Her parents have seven children from four months to 22 years of age. Their motto is, "I reckon as we can make out somehow." No one complains. Need neighborly help and encouragement, and food to eat! Milk has been provided. (Social Worker's task of helping to maintain "morale".)

The job ahead for the Church Welfare Association:

- (1) Bolster up families known to us, and get as much material relief to them as possible, through various sources (Red Cross, etc.).
- (2) Maintain high standard of work with girls with decreasing community resources:
 - Overcrowded schools.
 - Poor conditions for work.
 - (Treatment of employers and lower wages.)
- (3) Work with other agencies to keep community reminded of girl's needs.
- (4) Be intelligent and active in regard to bills up for legislation:
 - Legislation, mental hygiene program, adoptions, the State Department, etc.

- (5) Have a voice in public opinion regarding condition of labor for girls and women.

Report of the Educational Department

It is a great satisfaction to be able to report a distinct gain in the devotional life of the women of the Diocese as evidenced by an increased number of reported corporate communions, Bible classes, and prayer groups.

Fifty-four branches have held program meetings, twenty held discussion groups, twenty-two reported Bible classes, and fourteen prayer circles. Twenty-six branches have libraries.

Receipts from sale of books, cards, leaflets, etc., and from donations amount to \$804.32. Expended for purchase of books and magazines, for postage, printing, and traveling expenses, \$782.10, leaving a cash balance of \$22.22.

Books to the amount of \$29.50 have been given away in the Diocese.

The Diocesan library, under the able management of Mrs. Frank C. Seehorn, continues to fill a need. New books are being added as funds permit.

I have spoken at four interdenominational, two convocational, seven district, and nine parish meetings; conducted forty-six class sessions and held one leader's conference.

The educational department has had charge of a well stocked books table at each Diocesan meeting and also during the sessions of Harvard Summer School.

It is with great pleasure I announce that Mrs. Frederick J. Bate of La Jolla has most kindly consented to serve as educational secretary for the San Diego convocation and her consecrated effort is already bearing the fruit of increased interest in the things that make for righteousness.

The past year has held many difficulties and I more than ever appreciate the loyal support and constant cooperation of each member of my committee.

May the new year find us going of "from strength to strength."

Report of the Committee on Church Literature for the Blind

I will try in a short report to give you a few pictures of the different things which are being done by your Diocesan Committee on Church Literature for the Blind.

Each month the Spirit of Missions is transcribed into Braille by Alfonso Verduco, a young Spanish man who is blind and who lives in Coronado. Readers are found, who read aloud the articles selected, while he does the transcribing. He is paid by the page and earns from \$8.00 to \$9.00 for each copy. After the book is sent me, I forward it to the State Library in Sacramento. About half a dozen people take the magazine out from the library each month. That is not very many readers, but enough I think, to make all the labor worth while.

Last spring at the Synod Meeting in Sacramento, I was able to go to the library, and was shown all through the rooms where the Braille books are kept. It was quite thrilling to see them all, especially the Spirit of Missions, sitting up on the shelf. It is amazing to see the large variety of subjects which are offered the blind.

Also in Sacramento I was able to meet a young blind woman with whom I had had correspondence. She was at one of the Synod lunches, and sent me word she'd like to meet me, so I went over to her table and met this smiling, sweet woman, and we had a good talk. Since then she has written me several times and asked to help in any way, so I was able to give her a piece of work which needed to be done. There was a splendid session at the Synod given over to the subject of the blind, Miss Allison and others gave tremendously interesting talks. At this meeting a copy of Dr. Weld's book, "The Meaning of Christian Healing," in Braille, was given by your committee to the State Library. That was the only copy we had, so we need another, to be able to lend it. If the committee had a fund, we could help some blind person by paying them to transcribe a copy for us.

Another thing your committee has done, is to send out Christmas cards in Braille to about thirty people. The cards were made by Alfonso Verduco who was paid a small sum, and through the kindness of Mrs. Crose and other members of Mr. Spalding's Church in Coronado, they were addressed and mailed. I tell you of this to let you see that really there are quite a number of people working for this cause.

In my report a year ago, I told you about Ah Len Fung, a Chinese Christian girl, who is blind and lives in Hawaii. Last October she wrote to ask how she could get a Children's Bible Story Book for her young blind brother. I found at the Universal Braille Press here in Los Angeles a very nice book for \$2.50, and

through the Church Periodical Club, the book was bought and sent her. Her letter of thanks came at Christmas time. She says: "I thank you very much for the wonderful gift of the Bible Story Book that you sent my brother and me. I enjoy reading the book more than anything else. I read to my brother every evening and he enjoys it very much.

Miss Nelson, the other member of this committee, has been much hampered, as she had to return the Braille machine lent her, and so has not been able to do any transcribing. A new machine (which is like a Corona typewriter) costs about \$35.00. Fortunately a friend has lent me one, which Miss Nelson can use for the rest of the year.

I wish I could show you some of the letters I receive from these unknown friends who thank me for cards and the magazine. They are so appreciative and very touching.

Also I get letters asking me to get in touch with someone who is blind. Recently I was asked to write to someone in Oregon.

So you see the work of your committee grows bit by bit, and it can, eventually, I hope, provide much more Church literature for the blind.

We need your prayers, your presence, and your help, for while we have our splendid new equipment, we are facing difficult problems at a difficult time and I realize as never before the pressing need of bringing my people to Christ. Please do not feel that the work at St. Mary's Japanese Mission is complete; it has only just begun, and I beg your continued interest and support.

The response to requests for books and magazines during the year has been very gratifying in view of the fact that many people have been compelled to give up subscriptions for themselves, and very few have had to be discontinued, though in many cases, subscriptions have had to be replaced by forwarded ones.

The Church Periodical Club has been able to assist Mrs. Weld, Chairman of the Committee of Church Literature for the Blind, by providing a book of Bible stories in Braille for blind children in Honolulu.

Magazines and books have been sent to many of the isolated people in the diocese as well as to our missionaries at home and in foreign countries and considerable welfare work has been done in connection with regular duties by providing clothing and other necessities for the unemployed.

Apparently the depression has brought out the desire to share what we still have and to help the less fortunate by diverting their minds and encouraging them by this expression of sympathy, thus through our work, reaching out the hand of Christian fellowship. Shall we not continue our giving in this spirit and face the new year happily and confidently?

Report of Work Among the Isolated in the Diocese of Los Angeles

It is now a little more than a year and a half, since work among the isolated, as a branch of a Diocesan department, viz., the Church Periodical Club, was definitely begun, and it does not immediately appear to have advanced, to the degree that was indicated, at the time when it was first undertaken.

There are several reasons for this seeming lack of progress, one being that any work of this nature is necessarily slow of accomplishment. It is quickly begun by those who are interested, but not so quickly followed up by those for whom its benefits are intended, who perhaps are **not** interested, and are, therefore, slow to respond.

Accepting this fact, there is but one thing to do—**keep on trying!** Those hardest to reach are often the most in need, so that our opportunity to help becomes greater, rather than less.

The one thing **not** to do is to stop the business of offering what the Church has to give. Those who are isolated **must** be made to feel the love and interest of those who are in immediate touch, with Church life and with its opportunities.

The large number of names at first received were not all of people who could properly be called "isolated." Some were the names of invalids, and shut-ins, already members of some parish, and therefore eligible to its regular ministry. Such people are referred back to the priest of the parish to which they belong.

Among the truly isolated, work is being continued as it was begun—by the sending of literature, and by helpful suggestions, always being careful not to dictate, and by the writing of personal, friendly letters. At Christmastime cards were sent, also friendly messages and several small gifts, with the idea that the recipients would realize that the Church, and Her Spirit, lay behind these tokens of friendliness and good will.

In all contacts, an effort has been made to make these lonely ones feel that they, too, are a part of the Church, and that this desire to keep in touch with them is the symbol of a brotherhood to which they, also belong and whose benefits they have every right to share. In immediate necessity, material wants have been supplied. One family, in particular, has been largely assisted, when general conditions, caused by depression, and its resultant physical suffering, were met and cared for, and it is possible that this one instance may be the opening wedge for a Church school in one of the desert sections of the Diocese.

Members of the "isolated" group, made up as it is of people who are entirely out of touch with any kind of spiritual life, may not always be aware of their own need in that direction, but this does not alter the fact that such need exists, and for its relief, we, who have so much, are responsible.

All letters received express deep gratitude for this friendly interest on the part of the Church, and the free use of the wonderful extension library is very generally and greatly appreciated. Indeed, it is not possible to say how much or how little has been done. It is the casting of bread upon the waters. For 1933, the outlook is most encouraging, partly because of a better understanding of isolated people and their needs, and partly because of a better knowledge of how to reach and help them.

In closing, I should like to ask the cooperation of everyone who may know of those who can be helped through this branch of Diocesan work, and I am also very deeply grateful to those who have already been so interested in its development, and who have been so generously helpful in every way.

CONSTITUTION

1. This Society shall be called **The Los Angeles Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.**

II. The object of the Society is: By systematic and united effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese, to promote the study of missions, to encourage prayer for missions, and to be of service to the National Council in all its departments.

III. The Church itself is the great Missionary Society, and every person, by baptism, becomes a member of this Society; therefore, every baptized woman in the Diocese is a member of the Woman's Auxiliary, but terms of membership in any Parish Branch shall be fixed by that Branch.

IV. All Parish Societies that so desire may become branches of this Auxiliary, first obtaining the consent of the Rector or Clergyman-in-charge, by appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

V. A President, a Vice-President-at-Large, a Vice-President, over such divisions of the Diocese as the Bishop may counsel, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, a Supply Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a United Thank Offering, a Directress of the Altar Department, a Directress of the Church Periodical Club, and an officer over any other department that may be formed, shall be appointed by the Bishop.

VI. The Annual Meeting shall be held at the time of the Diocesan Convention, and Monthly Diocesan Meetings on such dates and in such places as the President may appoint. General meetings may be arranged by the Vice-Presidents, in their respective districts.

VII. An Annual Quiet Day shall be held during the season of Advent.

BY-LAWS

1. The duty of the President shall be to preside at the meetings of the Society, and have general charge of the work, under

the direction of the Bishop. The Vice-President shall act for the President in her absence, and assist her in the care and oversight of the work. The duty of the other Vice-Presidents shall be to preside in the absence of the President at the general meetings held in their several charges, and to cooperate with the President in the supervision of the work of the Auxiliary in the sections to which they respectively belong.

2. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to correspond with the various branches in the Diocese, to collect their reports, and to prepare an annual report.

3. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to give notice of meetings, to keep a record of such meetings, and to prepare an abstract of the minutes for the annual report.

4. The Treasurer shall keep an account of all moneys received and expended, and make a report at the Annual Meeting.

5. The Supply Secretary, the Educational Secretary, the United Thank Offering Treasurer, the Directress of the Altar Department, the Directress of the Church Periodical Club shall superintend their several departments, in consultation with the other Diocesan Officers.

6. The Secretaries of Parish Branches are required to correspond with the Diocesan Officers, who alone correspond with the National Secretaries of the Woman's Auxiliary.

7. Each Parish Branch shall make an annual pledge, according to its ability, to the following Diocesan Funds—the **General Working Fund**, the **Bishop's Missionary Fund**, and the **Altar Fund**. These pledges, and all other money, must be sent through the **Diocesan Treasurer**, and all checks made out to her.

8. At the Annual Meeting each Branch represented shall be entitled to but one vote on business of general import.

9. All moneys collected for the United Thank Offering Fund shall be paid to the Diocesan Treasurer of that Fund, and by her paid to the Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer.

This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended by a motion made at the Annual Meeting, and voted on the following year.

President's Address

Bishop Stevens, Bishop Gooden and Officers and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Los Angeles:

Our first thought today is of our former diocesan officers who have died during the past year—Miss Alice King of Long Beach, the secretary of the Junior Auxiliary from 1912 to 1915, and Mrs. Franklin Dill Simons, the recording secretary from 1915 to 1923. Both of these officers were women of deep spirituality and great charm, and the diocese is the richer for the noble example of their lives. "Grant them, O Lord, continual growth in Thy love and service."

As we look over the past year, a year of grave problems everywhere, our first thought as members of the Woman's Auxiliary should be one of deep thankfulness that we have been able to carry on our work so effectively. While our actual financial returns may not be quite as large as in former years we have grown in numbers, in interest, and in devotion, and not only has every department kept up its work but several have shown marked development. We should be especially grateful to our Social Service Department which, under the capable leadership of its secretary and Field Worker, have carried on so splendidly for us. It is unthinkable that the Woman's Auxiliary could have functioned without a Social Service Department and "passed by on the other side" in this time of distress and poverty. I could go on indefinitely and speak of the constructive work of our Educational Department and our District Meetings, the practical help of our Supply and Altar Departments, the generous giving through the United Thank Offering, and of our other departments, but you have heard all these reports this morning. They speak for themselves far more glowingly than I could speak of them. All of you, from the smallest to the largest branch in each of the four Convocations, have made this record possible, and to you all as well as to the entire diocesan board and committees I extend my deep appreciation. Your cooperation and loyal support during the six years I have been your president have been a constant joy.

If our first thought today is one of thankfulness, our second thought should be one of faith, faith in God and in a divine plan for the world. Many of us are filled with fear as we see the old order changing. We read such gloomy novels as "Nobody Starves" and imagine the plight of that young couple multiplied by eleven million unemployed and we are filled with despair. But if we are Christians we should have faith in the future and meet the new age unafraid, realizing that the present tragedies and seeming cruelties are the pangs of birth. In a recent book, the title of which is very comforting to many of us, "Life Begins at Forty," Professor Pitkin of Columbia University says: "High excite-

ments lie ahead of your now turning forty . . . The world is still to be civilized; and, in your day, this supreme process will begin. Were you to be no more than idle spectators, all other ages, past and present, would envy you."

The great question for us is—will the Church count in the days of reconstruction or of High Excitements as Professor Pitkin calls them? The problem is so stupendous that we wonder what we can do with our limited understanding and inherited prejudices. The following are some simple thoughts for us all. We can inspire confidence and sustain morale by our Christian faith and by our own integrity of character. This will do more to help our neighbors than we dream of. As Professor Einstein remarked in a recent address in Pasadena, "In spiritual forces lie the principal hopes for overcoming the crisis." Then we can help not only by what we are but by what we do and think. We can cooperate with all welfare and constructive work in our parishes, communities and in the diocese, and as intelligent Christian women we can continue the study of our economic and industrial conditions that we began so courageously at the Triennial in Denver. This does not mean that we have to become crusaders for Technocracy or any other "Ocracy" but it does mean that we can keep an open mind towards all new movements that aspire to bring about a new and better world. But let us fully realize, that, as Mr. Reynold Blight stated in an article in "The Churchman," "Any conception of society that falls short of the Kingdom of God as revealed by Jesus Christ is hopelessly inadequate to the tremendous challenge of the new times."

But as well as this we have a distinct responsibility as members of the Woman's Auxiliary. Miss Lindley, our National Executive Secretary, recently said, "Whether we like it or not we are leaders in a very critical time. Because we and not others occupy our places, we are largely responsible for what the women of the Church think and do." For many years the Auxiliary has been a distinct force in every diocese and missionary district in the country. During this time of serious financial adjustment for the Church we must remain this same spiritual, constructive and forward-looking power. Let us then hold our standards higher than ever and be truly an Auxiliary to the National Council and thus to the whole Church in her hour of need.

It is a matter of rejoicing that the Diocese of Los Angeles has never been sufficient unto itself but has always kept in touch with the larger current of Church life in the province and in the nation. Situated as we are with a constant influx of people we have never been allowed to stagnate but have always welcomed members and ideas from every part of the country. Each year we have sent our five delegates to the Provincial Meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary. Last spring this meeting was held in Sacramento, at which time our own Mrs. Weld of Santa Barbara was elected one of the provincial officers. During the past four years

it has been my privilege, in addition to my work as your Diocesan President, to be your Provincial Representative on the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, as it was the privilege of my predecessor, Miss Magill. Thus for many years our Diocese has been peculiarly in touch with the heart of the Church's work. This past year I have attended two meetings of this board in New York, in April and October. At the latter meeting Mrs. Harper Sibley gave a thrilling account of the Laymen's Foreign Missions Inquiry of which she was a member from our Church, visiting India, China and Japan. The report of this inquiry is now in book form under the title "Re-Thinking Missions." While we may not agree with all its conclusions it is a book of deep thought and will have far-reaching effect on the Missionary policy of the churches concerned. I recommend it to each one of you if we are to keep abreast of current religious thoughts.

So we face 1933 with Thankfulness for the past and Faith in the future, and with a determination to make the Woman's Auxiliary count as never before, remembering these striking words of the great Californian, David Starr Jordan—"Today is your day and mine, the only day we have, the day in which we play our part. What our part may signify in the great whole we may not understand, but we are here to play it and now is the time. This we know, it is a part of action, not of whining. It is a part of love, not cynicism. It is for us to express love in terms of human helpfulness."

Report of the Woman's Auxiliary

(Submitted to the Annual Convention, February 2, 1933)

In spite of the difficulties of 1932 it has been an excellent year for the Woman's Auxiliary. While the financial returns were not quite as large as in former years we have grown in numbers, in interest and devotion. All our departments have functioned and several have shown marked growth. We now have 109 branches.

Our Social Service Department has done outstanding work in relief and character building. \$1,410.15 was contributed by the branches towards the salary of the Field Worker; clothing given valued at \$4,852.15; cash for relief, \$344.00; contributions to diocesan institutions, \$1,552.45 — a total of \$8,158.75. Besides this employment was found for thirty-seven individuals, and thirty families helped at Thanksgiving and ninety-seven at Christmas.

The Supply Department sent supplies to seven mission stations, three in the Orient and four in this country, valued at \$7,885.72. In Advent two personal boxes were sent outside the diocese and Christmas checks to twenty-six of our own diocesan missionaries—total \$1,363.59. Total for Supply Work, \$9,249.31. The Altar Department has helped eighteen missions in the diocese and disbursed \$835.78.

The Educational Department has done a fine piece of constructive work along many lines and reports over one thousand women enrolled in study classes and marked growth in the devotional life. The Church Periodical Club sent out 330 current periodicals to home and foreign addresses besides hundreds of books, Christmas cards and odd magazines to libraries, schools and charitable institutions. Both the League for the Isolated and the Committee on Braille have done excellent work.

Monthly diocesan meetings have been held the second Tuesdays of the month in the Cathedral House. Five district meetings were held within the Los Angeles Convocation and equally successful ones in the other Convocations. During the Summer School a Conference was held and two daily study classes led by Miss Margaret Marston, National Educational Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary. Our Educational Department had charge of the Book Table and sold \$218 worth of books. A Quiet Day was held in Advent conducted by Dean Lane. Two missionaries have visited the diocese and spoken in all four Convocations—Miss Marguerite Bartberger of Alaska, and our own Deaconess Julia Clark of China.

Our aim for the year is to be of the greatest possible assistance to the Diocese and the National Church at this critical time. I bespeak for my successor the same co-operation and loyal support from the clergy that they have so graciously given me.
