Minutes of the Annual Meeting

The 60th Annual Meeting of the Maine Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held May 16 and 17, 1938. At the invitation of members of St. Mary's Branch, Falmouth Foreside, the Registration Tea was held in their Parish House on Monday afternoon from 3.30 to 5.30. Members of other Portland Parishes were present and many delegates from different sections of the Diocese. At 8.00 P. M. the scheduled Conference took place in the Parish House of the Cathedral of St. Luke. The Presiding Officer, Mrs. Charles F. Flagg, was assisted by the Honorary President, Mrs. Herbert Payson, Mrs. Kenneth C. M. Sills and Miss Marguerite Ogden, former Presidents. It was an informal discussion of many subjects pertaining to the Church, to Parish Work, and Social Service, and made a most interesting evening.

A Corporate Communion Service was held in the Cathedral at 8.00 o'clock, Bishop Brewster, the Celebrant, assisted by several clergymen, after which breakfast was served at St. Stephen's Parish Hall. At 9.30, the business session in the Cathedral Parish House began. One hundred and sixty-seven were present, including nineteen officers, delegates and guests from thirty-three Branches and clergymen from many Parishes in the Diocese. Minutes of the preceding Annual Meeting were accepted as printed in the Annual Report. The Annual Report of the Recording Secretary, Miss Edith C. Trickey, was read and accepted with one correction. The President, Mrs. Flagg, spoke briefly, referring to her sorrow in necessary changes in the conducting of the Rural Work in Maine, and urged more support for it. She had spoken before all the Portland Branches and several throughout the Diocese. She expressed her gratitude to the Ex-Presidents, who, when summoned, were always ready to assist and said that this year had been a very happy one.

The Annual Report of the Treasurer, Mrs. G. Bradford Hamilton, followed and was accepted, as audited by Mr. James A. Noon. Mrs. Clara G. Kendall gave a verbal report of her work as Corresponding Secretary. The report of Mrs. Manton Copeland, Supply Secretary, was read by Mrs. Drake, the sum total of work being \$902.71. This report was accepted. Allotments from the Supply Department will be sent out earlier next year, work for the House of the Good Shepherd will be an addition to the Supply Work and allotments will pass through the Supply Department Secretary. Sending of personal boxes may cease by 1940, but personal articles will be sent to Missionaries. Boxes will go to colored and Indian schools as usual, as they carry a special message.

The Educational Secretary, Mrs. George H. Beard, reported replies from fifteen Branches. Subjects for study, 1938-39, will be "India" and "The Church in the City." Branches will please order their books through Mrs. Beard. This report was accepted and that of the United Thank Offering as given by its Treasurer, Mrs. Frank B. Bull, who said that with the increasing number of women using blue boxes she hopes to have an increase in replies.

Mrs. Sills, Secretary of Christian Social Service, reported a tremendous amount of work, along this line, done in Maine, twenty-one Branches coöperating in this Diocese, but of these, only four reported any work on Peace. The Day of Prayer is a step towards it, furthering the cause of Peace. Mrs. Sills also made a report, as President of the Province, for this Triennium. Rural Work will again be our Project and all are urged to contribute towards it. The sum of \$750.00 is to be divided among Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont, and our share for this year will be \$250.00. It was voted to have printed on the Pledge Cards for the Branches, Provincial Projects. Mrs. Arthur Sewall II, Diocesan Directress of the newly formed Diocesan Altar Guild, reported \$25.00 in the treasury, and any contribution to the Guild will be gratefully accepted. Mrs. Francis E. Cummings, Secretary and Treasurer of the Altar Society, reported a balance on hand of \$19.00. Mrs. Warren R. Martin, Directress of Linen Work, reported only one paid order from the Diocese this year. If Parishes will give orders to this Society it will help Missions also. Mrs. Stuart B. Purves reported that the Church Periodical Club is trying to increase the sum of \$47,000 in its Treasury to \$50,000 by its 50th Anniversary and the balance in her treasury is \$23.00. The C. P. C., she said, is the only Missionary who can travel all over the world on a postage stamp. Miss Mary Louise Rowe of Bangor reported for Mrs. W. H. Martin, Correspondent for Isolated Churchwomen, who was unable to be present. She has sent post cards, literature and magazines to women on her list and hopes to visit them later. Mrs. J. B. Waterbury, reporting for work on Publicity, had sent the necessary notices to newspapers and to the *Northeast*, the Diocesan magazine. Miss Mary B. Chadwell spoke feelingly of our Prayer Partner, Miss Caroline A. Couch, Bishop Root's Secretary, who is still working at the American Church Mission, Hankow, China, and read a very interesting letter recently received from her. A Committee, consisting of Miss Ogden, Mrs. Payson and Mrs. Sills offered Resolutions upon the death of Mrs. Henry Van Bergen, Nash, a valued member of the Executive Board, and it was voted that they be accepted and spread upon the records and a copy sent to her daughter. Mrs. Fred D. Hill, Secretary of Supply Closet, who was unable to be present, sent her report, which was read, showing that articles to value of \$85.00 had been received, and articles sent out, three boxes, articles given to Miss Teague for distribution and to Mrs. Copeland for the House of the Good Shepherd. It was voted to accept these reports to be placed on file.

Rev. Mr. Van Couenhoven of St. Matthew's, Hallowell, reported briefly but enthusiastically upon the Wellesley Conference, saying it was of supreme importance and significance to every woman in Maine and urged the giving of one scholarship.

Noon-day prayers were said by Right Rev. Benjamin Brewster, after which the Rev. Edwin L. Souder made a brief address on China. He drew an interesting comparison between the condition of women in China at the present time, and those of perhaps twenty-five years ago. They have so much more freedom now and are able to decide matters for themselves. He described many curious customs and in a humorous way gave a picture of everyday life there.

After luncheon at the Hotel Columbia, delegates and guests returned to the Parish House for the afternoon session.

Miss Ogden, speaking for Rural Work, announced that Mrs. Genie Daly will take up her work June 15th with two schools, having three young women to help her for one month. If the Woman's Auxiliary would raise \$300.00 this year, the Diocese could carry on this work. The President, Mrs. Flagg, hopes we will have the problem solved by increased pledges on cards and individual gifts. Immediately pledges for extra money were made from the floor: Trinity Parish, Portland, \$5.00 extra; St. Mary's-by-the-Sea, Northeast Harbor, \$10.00 extra; St. Margaret's, Belfast, pledged \$5.00; St. James', Old Town, \$5.00; and Miss Trickey, \$5.00, making \$30.00 altogether. Mrs. Edward C. McAllister of Gorham reported ministrations there, by Canon Ernest A. Pressey, very much appreciated. On motion of Mrs. Kendall, it was voted that a note be written to Miss Margaret Teague, expressing regret at her departure from this Diocese and wishing her success in her new venture. Mrs. A. Harold Plummer, Secretary for Church School Offerings, spoke of two scholarships in Woman's Auxiliary, one in Church School, Pauline Osgood Scholarship started by Mrs. Nash, being given in February of this year to a girl in St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China. Please ask rectors what they are doing about Epiphany Offering on this scholarship. Miss Shirley White reported on Young People's Fellowship. This year one hundred and fifty young people met at Worcester and today are definitely interested in taking a forward step, and to interest other people in it. The President referred to Mrs. Odell's splendid work among the Northern Missions, which has been much appreciated in the Diocese.

The report of the Nominating Committee, consisting of Mrs. Clara G. Kendall, Chairman, Mrs. Christen Simmonds of Waterville, and Mrs. Frank O. Brown of Bangor, was read by Mrs. Kendall, and it was voted on motion of Mrs. Sills that the Recording Secretary cast the ballot for the slate as presented by the Nominating Committee. The Recording Secretary cast the ballot for the list of officers as printed on the first page of this Annual Report, which was read by the President, Mrs. Flagg, who declared these officers elected. Mrs. Beard spoke about the Girls' Friendly Society, hoping in September to have some secretaries.

It was announced that United Thank Offering Custodians should be elected by members of the Woman's Auxiliary. Mrs. Stanley A. Macdonnell presented a resolution to offer a vote of thanks to members of the Committee on Hospitality, which was made unanimous, and it was voted to have notes of appreciation sent to all who assisted in plans for the meeting.

Offering for the day, to be used for General Expense Account was \$51.04. An invitation to hold the fall meeting at Bar Harbor on September 27th was given by delegates of St. Saviour's Branch, and was accepted.

The meeting was adjourned after prayers and benediction given by Rev. John R. MacFarlane, Church of the Good Shepherd, Rangeley.

Report of Recording Secretary

The Maine Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary held its fall meeting with St. John's Branch, Presque Isle, on September 21, 1937. Eight officers, fifty-seven delegates and guests from twelve Branches and three clergymen were present. Miss Charlotte Brown, a retired United Thank Offering worker interested all in describing her work and journeyings in the great state of Nevada.

The mid-winter meeting was held with St. Matthew's Branch, Hallowell, on February 1, 1938, with sixteen officers, eighty delegates and guests, representing seventeen Branches, and several clergymen. The President, Mrs. Charles F. Flagg, made her report as delegate to the Triennial at Cincinnati, and Mrs. Kenneth C. M. Sills reported on the Conferences at Edinburgh and Oxford. The Rev. Mr. Lichtenberger of St. Paul's Church, Brookline, spoke on the Chinese situation.

There have been the usual Board Meetings, three in number, in September with Miss Trickey, a January meeting at St. Luke's Parish House, and one in April with the President, Mrs. Flagg, when arrangements were completed for the Annual Meeting.

On Thursday, October 7, 1937, a celebration of the Holy Communion was held in many churches of the Diocese, that we might be one in spirit with those delegates, representing the Diocese at the great United Thank Offering Service in Cincinnati on that date.

The Quiet Day for Prayer, on November 11th, was observed as usual by many Branches.

Much interest was expressed in Study Work during this winter, subjects being "The Moslem World" and Margaret Teague's "Forward in Rural America."

To the Maine Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council:

I submit my first annual report.

During Advent, I sent out a few letters and some materials, but requests for study material were slow. In January, I prepared a form letter and sent to each Branch where I had had no contact. I had replies from fifteen Branches. Fourteen Branches had some form of study during the Lenten Season. Five Branches chose the "Rural America" for their subject; seven Branches studied both "Rural America" and the "Moslem World"; one Branch studied the "Moslem World"; and one Branch read a book on Missions and several have used the Triennial packet. I have spoken on the "Moslem World" at two Branches.

There are probably other Branches that have study groups, but failed to notify me.

The subjects for 1938-39 are "India" and the "Church in the City." Materials are on exhibition here, and I am ready to assist you in your selections.
