## SECRETARY'S REPORT.

---

Any report made by your present Secretary must necessarily be imperfect, her official routine only beginning with February, but the admirable work done by her predecessor has rendered her duties comparatively easy.

The regular meetings of the Maryland Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to Missions were this year supplemented by visits from Rev. Joseph Kimber, Miss Sybil Carter, and our General Secretary, Miss Emery, which opportunity was afforded us through the kindness of the Rector of St. Peter's Church, and all who were able to be present will long remember the earnest words then spoken.

Our methods, while differing materially from other Dioceses, have accomplished a work, which has carried comfort and relief to fields abroad and at home.

It has been the custom here as in other branches to augment the meagre salaries of hard working missionaries with boxes containing suitable outfits. It will be gratifying to all to realize that boxes ranging from \$50 to \$200 in value have gladdened many households, otherwise straitened for the necessities of life.

Even the last call, although coming at a time when work for the year has well nigh closed, has met with prompt and material aid.

In this connection the suggestion is offered that a store-room be provided where outgrown or partly worn clothing, old linen, &c. could be cared for, mended if necessary and put in such shape as would fit it for use, many demands being made upon us for cast-off wear.

To summarize our work, each department has received assistance and a goodly share of interest, St. Peter's and Grace leading the van with foreign scholarships, Christ Church having sent more boxes, and Emmanuel the largest general contributions in cash, to say nothing of the main army of Parishes who have nobly fulfilled their pledges. The Indian work has been as ever steadfast in the support of laborers in the field, such as Miss Ives and Rev. Joseph Taylor.

In the Diocesan department assistance has been rendered in the way of Theological education.

The younger daughters of the church are awaking to a sense of their responsibilities, and the Auxiliary welcomes the very creditable first fruits of the Junior Missionary Society of Maryland with deep thankfulness. We have to record both gain and growth as compared with past years.

The special needs of the Diocese will be for the care of two or more bright lads, from 14 to 16, now at school in training for the sacred ministry. These boys require about \$150 each for yearly expenses, and our Bishop has expressed the hope that the Woman's Auxiliary will assume the support of two of these young students.

We have not all the great happiness of sons, to be consecrated to the service of GOD, but surely the next best thing will be to sustain those selected for that holy calling by wisdom and experience.

In the department of work among colored people, the necessity for prompt action becomes more and more apparent. The deficiency in the Christian training of this race, rouses us to wonder if we are taking our part in this, one of the most stupendous problems of our day. Special attention should be called to the Industrial School in St. Mary's County under care of Rev. Mr. Bryant, whose faithful labors among his people are well known; in which he is training the younger generation to manual labor. His latest investment was for wash-tubs, supplemented with a gift from the Bishop of a cook stove. This is a field where a pledge of fifty dollars yearly, supplies of old clothes, shoes, &c., for both adults and children, would be most welcome. Miss Emery has also asked our Branch for some aid in the matter of a scholarship in the orphanage under care of Mount Calvary, also rating at \$50 per annum, and as it is the only Church Institution of the sort in the Diocese, we trust something may be done.

There seems no more fitting conclusion than the charge of the Blessed Apostle, "WHILE WE HAVE TIME let us do good unto all men, especially unto those of the household of faith."
