SECRETARY'S REPORT.

No one who has watched the quiet and steadfast growth of the WOMAN'S AUXILIARY since its beginning, can fail to be impressed by the amazing results which have crowned the eighteen years, of which the last General Report was the summary, and the strength which comes from such union of individual and corporate effort was never better exhibited than in the earnest congregation of one thousand women who met in the Church of the Holy Communion, New York, on October 7th, 1889. So many instrumentalities have been used to set forth the results of this gathering that it only remains to be noted, how we seemed to have reached a period of fruition, and it added no feeble element to our fervor that such work as the School for Girls, Dallas, Texas, of Bishop Garrett; the Memorial Hall to Bishop Elliott in San Antonio; the offer of a Mission Training House, to be equipped and carried on for a year, by one to whom God had given both desire and means, could be counted as accomplished facts since our last assembling; while the provision of one thousand dollars

for a Chapel in Anvik, Alaska, the wonderful descriptions of the doors opened, entered and blessed in China, Japan, India and Africa to women—through women—seemed to bring us to an eminence as to Mount Pisgah, from whence we could look back into the valley, and view the paths by which we had been led; and forward to our glorious opportunities—possibilities almost too vast for mortal eyes.

It was well for us that our own Anniversary came just one month later, when we could still feel the enthusiasm so roused and concentrated, and nothing could have been more propitious to our day of gladness than the stirring notes sounded in the opening address of our own Bishop of Maryland; nothing more suggestive than our greetings from the beautiful mountains of Japan through Rev. Mr. Page; nothing more comforting than the reminder of the consecration of our work, in our LORD'S acceptance of the service of the women who ministered to HIM of their substance, brought to us by Dr. Elliott; with the earnest words of the Bishop of Fond du Lac, on the value of opportunity: "I shall pass this way but once; let me do what I can before the darkness falls."

We recall too our first Social gathering, the success of which was largely due to those who so ably planned and carried out details; especial acknow-

ledgments being due to the Rev. Rector of Grace Church, to whom the Auxiliary owes much in the past year. Our Afternoon meeting, by far the largest and best ever witnessed in our work, thirty-four Parishes responding to their names, aggregated ninety-five representatives. To this were brought the interests in the women of Japan by Mrs. Page, in her vivid sketch of manners and customs, and the ever welcome inspiration of our General Secretary, Miss Emery, who entered so cordially into our enjoyment, and gave us, as always, so many threads to weave into our fabric for the year.

Another feature most cordially welcome was the representation from our twin sister, the District Auxiliary; we feel that great gain has been made in closer contact between bodies, necessarily two from geographical position, but with one heart and purpose.

We had also the pleasure of numbering among our guests the Countess of Meath, to whom has been granted the blessedness of enlisting much of the interest of the children throughout the world: the Ministering Children's League having its branches in so many parts of that dominion on which the sun never sets. This element, long desired by the Auxiliary, is now embraced in the Junior Auxiliary.

Our next meeting was so different in kind, that it is not wonderful a shadow should fall across the page. On the 27th of December, our President, Mrs. WILLIAM J. ALBERT, was called to the rest that remaineth for the people of GOD, and while to one whose lamp was trimmed and burning such summons meant only peace, yet to us for whom her place is still unfilled, such a vacancy brings a feeling little short of dismay. We can only hope that our women may be guided to realize that such a trust is only given with power and strength to fulfill it, and that to one who will give earnest purpose a great work is open in this, our Diocese of Maryland.

The last meeting for the year was held at Christ Church, when Miss Scott presented the claims of All Saints' School, Liberia. Some of the Branches have already given substantial proof of the impression made by her touching appeal, and it is hoped that all may do something.

This accumulation of privilege would but overfreight us if there were not results to show, but at no time has there been more demand for work or information. The growth of the Missionary principle has cropped out in various directions throughout the Diocese. We have added Branches in St. Barnabas and Holy Innocents, Baltimore, also in Hyattsville, Cumberland, Oakland, and have re-

ceived help from the Church of the Messiah, Baltimore. Most encouraging has been the contact with organizations hitherto recipients; but now, by application of the self-denying, self-supporting element, so in harmony with the teachings of our Great Missionary Head, are now contributing to the cause of Missions;—I refer to the Mothers' Meetings, of which that at Memorial Church is the Training School, they having given twenty-five dollars in penny collections to the Mission at Anvik, Alaska.

For the coming year the Bishop's Fund could be much enlarged, and the work in the Diocese greatly expedited, if each member of our body would devote even the penny a week to this purpose.

To any one who witnessed the Ordination of the first class of the Maryland Theological School the fact must be apparent, that the plan for the rehabilitation of the waste places in our Diocese has been inaugurated, and in no way can we prove more clearly our right to the title of an Auxiliary, than by renewed vigor in furnishing material aid to our own Home-field, including as it does the cradle of the Maryland Church, to whose instrumentalities we owe the first presentation of the blessings of the Church of England in these parts.

We have surely as much need here as is found in Chicago, Milwaukee, Indiana and California, and

New York, where the Bishop of the Diocese lately made the first appeal of the day for Diocesan Missions, and then introduced as the next speaker a representative of the Indian field. The Bishop of Iowa, quoted in the last report of the Honorary Secretary, says: "We are glad to have * * the assurance that the Woman's Auxiliary can properly and profitably work for Diocesan objects, as well as for objects far removed."
