Secretary's Report.

The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Grace Church, November 14, 1894. The Holy Communion was celebrated by Bishop Brooke, of Oklahoma. The clergy in the chancel were the Rev. A. C. Powell, rector, the Rev. W. M. Gilbert, the Rev. C. C. Griffith, the Rev. E. T. Lawrence, and the Rev. P. F. Hall. In his address Bishop Brooke described the mission of the Auxiliary as the "filler up of the gaps" in the work of the Board of Missions, the women of the church ever throwing in the "little things" which yet were so great in their usefulness and comfort.

After luncheon in Grace Parish House, the meeting assembled for business at 2 P. M. There were 200 present, including 87 officers and delegates. After the calling of the roll by the Secretary, the President, Mrs. Sioussat, made the opening address. She spoke of the great loss to the Auxiliary by the death of Mrs. Clarence Buel, one of the vice-presidents. Welcome was tendered to the new branches of the Auxiliary—St. Timothy's, Catonsville, St. John's, Frostburg, and Grace Church, Elk Ridge. Mrs. R. S. Scott, of Mt. Washington, read her report, showing a large amount of work accomplished by a comparatively young branch in a country parish.

Mrs. Currie, President of the Indian Aid Committee, read a report of work among the Indians and the special needs of Bishop Hare.

Visitors from distant fields were introduced—Miss Ives, of South Dakota, and Miss Dodson, of China. Miss Ives spoke of the pleasure of meeting women whose aid and sympathy had been extended since her first going out to Bishop

Hare. "From my heart I grasp your hands." She has 53 native helpers, and a sewing society which cuts and makes garments for the suffering ones, as well as to sell for church work. At every mission station there is a branch of the Auxiliary. In seven years their mite chests have netted \$200. They support a child in Shanghai and have given a pledge towards the Deaconess Home in China. The best work is among the children, and the schools are gaining the confidence of the people. These are supported by donations, not by the government, and all reservations are kept in order by Indian police, showing the civilizing power of Christianity among them. Miss Dodson opened her address with grateful allusion to Maryland for sending to China one of their best missionaries. There the Auxiliary work had been organized a year and a half ago by Mrs. Twing. Their meetings last all day, some coming for the day and night, and riding fifteen miles in wheelbarrows. Miss Dodson's special needs and work were for a training-school to fit young women for teachers, the whole amount for which was given at the Hartford Council. Their own offering, the first toward the object, \$50, was a generous one, as most of them have only \$4 per month. Two pledges were made for \$50 scholarships in this school, one by Christ Church branch, and the other by Emmanuel. Mrs. Sioussat suggested a donation to Bishop Brooke. She urged the Auxiliary to keep in mind and send a generous gift to the united offering at the coming Triennial meeting.

Thanks were tendered the Rector and ladies of Grace Church for their kindness and courtesy.

The meeting closed with singing of the Doxology.

The Secretary reports a copy of the Maryland report sent to every Diocesan, as well as parish branch, and many letters written regarding our work. The Secretary should be informed what parish branches are doing, that there be no unequal distribution. A prompt return of letters avoids much delay in replying to others applying for work.

A leaflet from the chairman of the committee on Systematic Giving, was sent as an Easter greeting to the parish officers.

We are urged to realize the great advantage of the old method of proportionate giving. If conscientiously acted upon, there would be no lack in the missionary treasury. There was also sent to the various branches, at Bishop Penick's request, his plea for the colored work. Noting the work, so vast and difficult, he states that "3,500,000 women call for the sympathy, prayers and help of their Christian and more favored sisters to bring them into the fullness and joy of Christian womanhood."

By invitation of the St. Paul's branch, in March, Miss Emery addressed the Auxiliary in behalf of the United offering, emphasizing its noble object, the sending for all time a shepherd to gather the wandering ones into the fold; she urged such a work to be worthy of our self-denial, our influence, our enthusiasm. Offerings are coming from China, from Africa, from Calcutta, from Alaska, from the Indians; surely such as these should stir our hearts to testify the strength of their devotion. The pledges already in hand show a loving self-sacrifice on the part of some of our branches, and encourage the hope that Maryland will send a generous gift.

It is interesting to note that even the very little ones are now working with us. The Babies' Branch of the Auxiliary, started in November last, is established in Emmanuel, St. Paul's, Christ Church, Church of the Holy Comforter, Luther-ville, and St. John's, Howard county, and has a few members in other churches. The Babies' Branch is intended to introduce children to their missionary responsibilities from their baptism. Any baptized child under six years of age may become a member by the payment of five cents, which goes this year toward the United offering. The baby then receives a book and a box. The book is a certificate of membership and a yearly record of the amount contributed. Into the box the child itself puts its offering each Sunday, a penny or more, and at the same time it either listens to or repeats the text, "Little children, love one another;" and the prayer, "God bless the missionaries all over the world."

At a special meeting of the Auxiliary, held in Memorial Church, April 23d, Rev. J. A. Gilfillan, of White Earth, Min-

nesota, delivered an address. He graphically described the growth of the work among the Indians of Minnesota, among whom he has faithfully labored for twenty years. He has trained seven Indian deacons, who are working among their people, many of them delighting in the hymns and service of the Church. Marvellous seems the change from the old idle, degraded life, to work upon the little farm with its log cabin, while schools at many points gather in these "children of the wandering foot." A noble tribute was paid to Bishop Whipple's love and devotion to his red children. Rev. J. J. Enmegahbouh, the Indian missionary, well known to many of us, in his old age still ministers to his people. God's manifest blessing upon this work appeals to our continued interest and support.

The May meeting was held in the Parish House of St. Michael and All Angels, with opening service by the Rector, Rev. C. Ernest Smith. The large attendance showed growing interest and enthusiasm. In the re-election of officers, Mrs. John T. Mason was unanimously chosen to fill the vacancy made by Mrs. Stewart's resignation. After the reading of reports by the Secretary and Treasurer, Mrs. Currie read report from the Indian Aid Committee. She deplored lessening contributions and urged fuller attendance at the meetings, and more generous response to the needs of the Indian field. Mrs. Brown read an encouraging report from "the School Girls' Missionary Chain." Its object is to interest and educate young girls in missionary work. Over the Woman's Building in Chicago was written: "Children the hope of the nation." It is hoped that every parish will add a link to this chain so far-reaching in its influence. It was decided to divide the surplus in the treasury, sending \$25 to foreign field, and \$25 for deficiency in pledge for support of an Indian deacon. An appeal from Miss Emory for a box for South Carolina, left unsupplied, was promptly responded to, various branches uniting their contributions.

The President read a letter from Bishop Paret, expressing warm appreciation of assistance rendered by the Silent Church Fund.

Reviewing the past year, the President congratulated the Auxiliary upon the work done despite the severe strain of financial depression. "But the year, so full of mercy, has yet had its sorrow and its pang, in the grief and distress that has come to those with whom we have been associated in Christian work. In the death of Mrs. Robert Brown, the Auxiliary not only of St. Paul's branch, but of the entire body, loses from its visible organization a most steadfast and faithful worker. In Mrs. Alrick's departure, a mother in Israel is gone from our midst. It is not necessary to eulogize her—her works do follow her,—but the President feels that she must express the gratitude to the Giver of all good gifts, which she personally feels for the privilege of such a friend. Always clear and comprehensive, always firm to her vital personal trust in her Saviour, it is impossible to believe that such interest, such devotion in our work, can end with this life. In the communion of saints, in the union of this world and the next, in some way through the mystical channels of grace leading to life eternal, we are still one in Christ." She spoke of the loss we sustain in the resignation of our faithful Treasurer, Mrs. John Stewart, who has so long fulfilled the arduous duty. A rising vote testified the grateful appreciation of the auxiliary. The President seconded Mrs. Devries' motion for more urgent effort to have a branch in every parish in the state, making her chairman of a committee to gain information upon extension of the work.

After animated discussion to gain the opinion of the Maryland branch as to the disposition of the United offering, it was unanimously decided to leave our President (who will represent Maryland at the Triennial meeting) untrammelleed to vote upon the special designation of a missionary jurisdiction.

A vote of thanks for hospitality and courtesy was tendered the Rector of St. Michael and All Angels. After singing the Doxology the meeting adjourned for a social reunion at the rectory.

To the devotion and activity of our President is due much of the apparent growth of interest in the work of our branch. By the invitation of the rectors she has visited several of the

parochial branches and had most interesting meetings, both among the younger members of the Auxiliary and the older organizations. Yet the increase is far short of our larger aim. "It has been said that God's work among men will never be accomplished according to His perfect will, until every one of His children has done a little of it." Let us not rest content till every parish is working with us, the poorest may do something; where a box cannot be undertaken packages can be prepared for the larger boxes, and all can give their sympathy and prayers. While we cannot answer every appeal, let us be more eager to know of the progress of Missions, and as we learn of the self-denying labors of the "Heralds of the Cross," no demand upon us will seem too great, if it help win the kingdom for Christ.
