Recording Secretary's Report.

The semi-annual meeting of the Maryland Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, held its opening service in Grace Church, November 8th, at ten o'clock. The Bishop of Maryland celebrated the Holy Communion.

In his address the Bishop acknowledged the aid given by the Woman's Auxiliary, and stated that of the fourteen silent churches opened during his Episcopate, ten are still in the Diocese of Maryland. Hence the need of the continuance of the Silent Church Fund to strengthen and sustain these feeble parishes. The boxes meet special needs of Diocesan Missionaries and must be continued. The necessity of more generous support compels Maryland to accept \$1,350 from the Board of Missions to carry on the Colored work. He referred thus to the fact, little realized, that Maryland is a Missionary Diocese.

Archdeacon Gray spoke on Diocesan Missions, noting more rapid growth in the country than in the city, thereby answering the question, "Do Missions pay?"

Luncheon was served at Hazazer's Hall, where the missionary meeting was held at two o'clock.

The roll-call noted a full representation of officers and delegates. There was also an encouraging attendance of the clergy and visitors. After a greeting by the President, the Rev. Ambrose D. Gring, of Kyoto, Japan, was introduced. He said in part, "It is a great work done among a great people, and God is using the people of Japan for great purposes. He

made an earnest appeal for the Church in Sendai, and begged we should send more than they asked for, in order to build a church that would compare favorably with the heathen temples. For the Japanese say, "If we do not honor God with our temples, why should they honor Him?" As the Government has swept out of existence all barriers, and the Emperor has granted freedom to our religion, let us catch the inspiration of these great responsibilities.

The Rev. Mr. Merrill followed with a graphic account of his work among the Oneida Indians, and his missionary efforts on their behalf. For fourteen years the men quarried stone, and the women worked, saving small sums, until three thousand dollars had been raised for a church. Miss Sybil Carter has introduced the lace work, and many women are deftly manufacturing it for sale.

The last speaker, the Rev. J. Addison Ingle, of Hankow, gave an earnest and effective account of Missionary work in China. By means of stereopticon views, he rendered more real the strength and encouraging features of Church work in China.

The annual business meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at All Saints' Church, Frederick, on May 23rd. As soon as the quaint old town was reached by the visiting body of officers and delegates, its generous hospitality was recognized in the greeting of the Rector, and officers of that Branch. The morning service in the quiet church at half after eleven o'clock, was followed by a bountiful luncheon, served in the Parish Building. The presence of the Junior Auxiliary as waitresses added to the pleasure of a delightful social hour. At two o'clock, the business meeting was called to order by the President after the calling of the roll, and the report of the Corresponding Secretary had been read, interesting reports were given by the Treasurer, the Chairman of work among the Indians, the Babies' Branch, the Church Periodical Club, and the Junior Auxiliary. The officers of the preceding year were re-elected. The President gave an account of her visit to the Ecumenical Council in New York, to which she was a delegate.

Mrs. A. E. Physick, President of the Easton Branch, presented an address upon Mission work in general, emphasizing the importance of Foreign Missions. Rev. J. Addison Ingle, our faithful Missionary in China, followed, giving the salient points of his work there, noting the commercial value of missions and their influence on trade. The Missionary opens the country, introduces new needs, and has a political as well as spiritual value. Mr. Ingle said in closing, "the religion of Christ was Oriental, and had circled the world."

The meeting adjourned after an address from Rev. J. Osbourn Ingle, and the singing of the Doxology.

Corresponding Secretary's Report.

The review of the work of the Maryland Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary shows a year of missionary activity. The summary gives in money and boxes a total of \$7,985.04. We welcome branches organized in the Church of the Messiah, Baltimore, the Chapel of the Good Shepherd, Jonestown, and St. Stephen's, Severn Parish, and an offering through Maryland, mite chests from All Saints', Sunderland.

The effort to raise \$100 annually for Colored work met with ready response. The sum to be given to the Bishop of Maryland to be used at his discretion.

Greater interest in the Church Periodical Club is noted. This great work shows good done in numberless ways and needs contributions from every parish branch. The method is simple. Persons having periodicals or contributions from a Christmas card to a stereopticon notify the parish librarian, who, reporting these gifts to the Diocesan Correspondent, receive suitable addresses.

To note any increase in the spiritual and intellectual as well as material growth of the work among the branches, a few questions sent by the secretary brought encouraging reports. In several of the branches papers upon missionary topics were carefully prepared by different members and read at the meetings. In others, selections from the *Spirit of Missions* were read and circulated. This valuable missionary magazine is earnestly commended to more general use. Let those who wrote discouragingly emulate this intelligent interest and they will realize the truth of the motto of one of our sister branches—"To *know* is to feel, to *know* is to pray, to *know* is to give."

Very instructive papers on China and Japan were prepared at the expense of much time and thought, and read by the President at the executive and at several of the branch meetings. Added privileges were offered in the *special* parish meetings which have outnumbered those of any previous year, and to which general invitations were extended.

At the annual meeting, St. Timothy's, Catonsville, Rev. W. M. Partridge presented the needs of the work in Sitka, Alaska. At St. Barnabas in November, Rev. Mr. Wetmore told of helpful work in the Mission Schools in the Diocese of Asheville, North Carolina. Rev. Dr. Edward Abbott gave a very interesting address on China and Japan, at the Epiphany Meeting of the Grace Church Branch. To the Emmanuel Branch, on January 24th, an earnest appeal was made by the General Secretary, Rev. Arthur S. Lloyd, for prayer and systematic offerings for the extension of the work.

At the same meeting, Miss Elliott, of Salt Lake, told of successful work and its peculiar difficulties in a Mormon country.

Under auspices of the Memorial Branch, a Missionary service was held in Memorial Church the evening of Palm Sunday. The General Secretary, Rev. A. S. Lloyd, spoke impressively of "Life abundantly given," and the personal responsibility resting upon every member of Christ to share the blessing with those who have it not.

At the Memorial Church meeting, May 8th, Archdeacon Gray plead for prayerful interest and support of the Colored work. We need pray for larger attendance upon these meetings, a fuller appreciation of opportunities for information which must prove a source of fruitful helpfulness.

There is but one more year for the ingathering of the United Offering of 1901.

A leaflet from the Church Mission House suggests, "that the members of the Auxiliary study the work of the different Bishops and of the Colored Commission, that interest growing through knowledge, they may be moved to greater and more loving gifts." Let us strive that Maryland's offering testifies deep interest in its object, so far-reaching in its influence.

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It is a sad duty to place upon record a sense of irreparable loss in the death of Miss Susan Randolph, a Vice-President of Emmanuel Branch and President of the Needle Work Guild of that branch. We cherish her memory and would emulate her faithfulness, her loving zeal, her unselfish devotion to the work for Christ.

In the death of Miss Mary Jones, Secretary of Emmanuel Branch, Cumberland, the Auxiliary loses a faithful co-worker.

Passed from earth to Life Eternal, their good works do follow them.

We have cause for thankfulness that the wonderful missionary awakening in the heart of the whole Church has touched a responsive chord in the Maryland Auxiliary. May the inspiration prove a quickening power, that our loyal loving service may win others to be co-laborers for the illumination of the "World for Christ."

Report of Indian Aid Committee.

A meeting of the Indian Aid Committee was held in Grace Chapel, Thursday, November 16th, Mrs. A. L. Sioussat, presiding. It was decided for the better interest of the work to present its claims at the Executive meetings, giving up three special meetings during the year.

The Committee would place on record its deep regret at the resignation of Mrs. Wm. R. Devries, who for the past two years has efficiently labored for its interests. Though losing some of the devoted workers for Indian Missions, it is grateful to note continued interest. From South Dakota we hear that the children love the schools, and that the Indians make self-denying efforts to pay their mite to the church. The women alone raised \$3,000 during the year.

The salary of a teacher at St. Paul's School, Yankton Agency, S. D., has, since its organization in 1873, been the untitled effort of the Association. A number of the branches continue this pledge, and it is hoped others will contribute to raise the full sum, \$350. We now send \$200.

The Annual Lace Sale is an interesting feature of this department. The beautiful exhibit of dainty lace in Emmanuel Parish House, November 22nd, testified to the faith of the noble woman, who could foresee that these "brown children of our Father" only needed the opportunity to become self-helpful and industrious. The result of the sale was \$176. Miss Sybil Carter holds herself responsible for salaries of eight teachers in different Lace Schools, and appeals for generous support.

At the general meeting, November 8th, Rev F. W. Merrill, of the Diocese of Fond du Lac, awakened a lively interest by his bright and graphic account of the needs of the Mission at Green Bay among the Oneidas, which was responded to by substantial help in money and boxes.

Reports from the Bishops in charge tells us that their needs are as pressing as ever, that appeals come from those far away in the forest for a missionary.

Shall we not give our prayers, our sympathy, and as far as possible our practical help to sustain work which has been singularly blessed in every effort of the Church?

President's Report.

The third annual report of the Junior Department records its growth in other ways than having added to its members, the increase being more in the line of better attendance, in interest, and an intelligent beginning in its principal requirement, viz: missionary study. The aim is not so much towards a money report (although very good work has been done) as towards a report of what reading is done, and what mission fields are brought before the children. Subscriptions to the "Young Christian Soldier" is made a requirement in each branch, and we leaders are asked to subscribe to the "Spirit of the Missions" and to make missionary reading a feature of every meeting.

As one of the means of enlisting interest, two illustrated lectures were given on the foreign fields of China and Japan. The first on January 19th, by the Rev. Addison Ingle, missionary to Hankow, China; and the second on February 24th, by the Rev. J. Thompson Cole, formerly missionary to Japan. As a result of these talks, the Juniors have made more interesting acquaintance with the church work in China and the beauties of Japan, which they are ready to continue by talks and readings in the branch meetings. We record this as the first year in which offerings have been made for foreign work, several branches having sent to China and Japan, and uniting in a general Easter offering towards the organ fund for St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China.

The gifts in the Domestic field were Christmas boxes to St. Elizabeth's School, South Dakota; Shoshone School, Boise; Schools at Beaufort, North Carolina, Asheville, Concord, New Hampshire, and St. Philip's Chapel, Annapolis, Md., besides gifts of money to Asheville and Cuba, the total value being quite up to the work of last year.

The President records interesting visits to seven branches, and the forming of a new one lately at Millersville, Md.

Executive meetings have been held monthly, and have proved of great service. The officers have learned to know each other, to become interested in the work of each branch, and to consider what is best and most helpful for mutual strength and interest. The yearly general meeting was held in the Parish House of Emmanuel Church on Saturday afternoon, May 19th. It was most interesting, because the children themselves took part, each branch contributing a three minutes' report, which was read by its own Secretary. There was also hearty singing followed by a greeting from the Rector, and missionary talks by the Rev. C. Ernest Smith and the Rev. Howard Faulkner. An informal tea brought the children into social touch, and completed a most enjoyable afternoon. Thanks are due to the Rector of the church for his kind and fatherly interest on the occasion, to St. Phoebe's Guild for hospitality, and to St. Cecilia Guild for help with the music.

We record with regret the resignation of the faithful President of St. Phoebe's Guild of Emmanuel Church, a regret which is tempered by the appointment of her capable Secretary as successor, and her own continuance as an active worker.

The development of the missionary spirit is at last recognized as "the potent factor on which depends the future extension of the missions of the church."

A great movement in this direction is the annual service for children on the second Sunday in Epiphany, "this day being set apart by the Board of Missions (as well as the Monday following, as a day of conference for Sunday School teachers to discuss methods of missionary study) for when the teachers are themselves interested in missions, the children quickly catch a thorough missionary spirit from them."

This service was held in eight churches in Maryland, but it is hoped a greater number will respond in Epiphany, '91, and that the ultimate result of the whole movement may bring about "the study of missions as a recognized part of Sunday School instruction."
