At a meeting of the Maryland Branch, Woman's Auxiliary, October 30th, 1901, the following resolution was adopted by a rising vote :

While they bow in submission to the love and wisdom that has called her to "higher service," they pray that they may emulate her "great love for the Master, and burning zeal for the relief of suffering and needy humanity."

Report of President.

The year of Auxiliary work just ended (running from September to September) had its beginning in the Triennial gathering on the Pacific Coast, and the journey across the Continent, undertaken on September 23rd, 1901, gave to us a succession of wonders. The varying landscape, the curious shapes which the formations of rock assumed—here a castle, there a fortification, while the grasses and tufts of chaparral take on odd resemblance to garden beds. A little later on, the arid wastes, soon, we trust, to be made beautiful through Government Irrigation, which will carpet the barren soil with the vivid green of the alfalfa and bring rich return of crop to the farmer, and after a while, the magnificent chain of the Rockies coming so gradually into the landscape that one is prepared for their full grandeur by the time we reach the Continental Divide. We speed along over what once was the great wagon road of the emigrant trains, now the highway of steam with memories of what the pioneers in Church and State had endured and through what trial and suffering this fair country of ours had come to her strength and beauty of to-day.

This "going up to the Feast"—to which every woman in the Auxiliary looks as the crown of her three years watching and waiting, gives always the final touch to the delight of travel. We had been asked to add to the mere enjoyment of the tourist some effort to acquaint ourselves in detail with the activities of Church Life in the Dioceses through which we passed. Having been joined in Chicago by our Chaplain, the Rev. W. T. Watkins, of St. John's Church, Mount Washington, we held preliminary sessions in one end of the car and were

quite ready to accept the invitation of Bishop Leonard to stop over in his jurisdiction, and so to get our first glimpse of the Western Church.

The extent of the territory—all of Utah, part of Wyoming and a part of Western Colorado—made us realize our arrival in the region of large proportions, and the bulwarks thrown up against the great incoming tide of Mormonism in the work of the Bishop and his faithful staff impressed us with great force.

The cordial hospitality, the thought which gave us one of the Bishop's theological students as our guide, the Auxiliary meeting in the Cathedral of Salt Lake City, where it was pleasant to renew our acquaintance with Archdeacon Ostensen and Deaconess Elliott, and where the story of Beggar's Ranch, Robber's Roost and the Hole in the Wall sounded like the wildest fiction, the fresh young faces at Roland Hall, with its attractive surroundings and home-like influences, the visit to the hospital, and the Sunday service when Bishop Tuttle gave us his crowding memories of the days when he came out as the first Bishop of Utah, the somewhat hurried resumption of our journey on that Sabbath afternoon by reason of the great throng en route, the reunion next day with our own Maryland Diocesan and his staff—all these are written deep in the chronicles of memory.

The first glimpse of San Francisco in the glow of the setting sun as we crossed the Bay on that bright, beautiful afternoon of October first seemed a forecast of the sunshine of welcome which awaited us at every turn.

Through the kindly thought of Mrs. Paret we enjoyed together that most inspiring of all gatherings—the opening service of the General Convention in Trinity Church, and echoed with all our hearts the strains of the Recessional, that survival of ^{our} an old Metrical Psalter.

tribes "Oh 'twas a joyful sound to hear,
 Our ~~notes~~ devoutly say—
 Up, Israel to the Temple *haste*
 And keep your festal day."

From thence we went to the luncheon in the Maple Room at the Palace Hotel, ever to be remembered for the wealth of floral display. The flowers so unlike our own, the tropical foliage, all were a perpetual delight to the eye and an outward and visible sign of our welcome from the women of the Pacific Coast, voiced later in the Officers Meeting by the cordial greeting of the President of the California Branch, Mrs. James Nicolands. *Newlands.*

The message of cheer and record of work done in the three years we had left behind us, were as ever hopeful and uplifting and no traces of the shadow, so soon to fall upon our path were yet visible. Thursday was our great day, when first we gathered in Grace Church about the altar, itself the gift of a departed Auxiliary officer, and hearkened to the roll-call of those who having finished the course in faith, do now rest from their labors.

Then came the meeting in the Alhambra, crowded in every nook and corner, when we were proud indeed, to have fourteen Maryland women rise when their Diocese was called.

Bishop Nichols' hospitable greeting and humorous allusion to their ability to bear Eastern draughts or drafts, Bishop Partidge's eloquent address upon the "Meaning of Foreign Missions," Bishop Hare's plea for "Our Missions to the Indians and their White neighbors," the burning words of Bishop Dudley on "Our Work among the Colored people of the South"—all carried a message of inspiration to our hearts. We were watching eagerly for news of our offertory, and our proceedings were suspended as the count was announced by the man who has done more for us in bringing us up to higher standards of exactitude and the measure of our obligations, than has ever been accomplished before—that noble type of our American Churchman, Mr. George Thomas, Treasurer to the Board of Missions, ^{and} when he told us that for three hours they had been at work and that our offering represented \$104,000, we joined in strains of heartfelt thanksgiving, not so much for the money, but in gratitude to find that we had not diminished our returns,

that we had not fallen behind, and that the ratio of increase had been about the same that has marked the growth from \$2,000 in New York, to ~~\$2,200~~ in Baltimore, to \$5,500 in Minneapolis, to ~~\$8,200~~ in Washington, and now, to the \$104,000 in San Francisco, of our United Offering. The stirring up of our minds by way of remembrance in the matter of direct contributions to the Board—although it came from the devoted General Secretary, Dr. Lloyd—like a blast of arctic strength upon our well earned enthusiasm, helped to tonic up our atmosphere and gave us albeit with some heroic treatment, the direct current along which our efforts may be carried to substantial results. No one doubts the ability of the Auxiliary to raise the \$100,000 desired for the Board.

The preparation and care for our section of the Missionary and Historic Exhibit, so ably planned out by the late Honorary Secretary, Mrs. Twing, had occupied much time and thought, and the thanks of the women of the Maryland Auxiliary are due to their Bishop and the Committees on Library and Records, for their generous permission to convey the choicest treasures of the Episcopal Library across the Continent. Special acknowledgement should here be made to Miss Whittingham, who packed with her own hands every article in the case, which had once borne the Episcopal robes of him whom many of us remember from earliest childhood hours—William Rollinson Whittingham, of blessed memory—fourth Bishop of Maryland.

The requirement that the case was not to be out of sight of its carrier was faithfully complied with, and it is with much satisfaction that we record its safe arrival, its presentation and safe return.

The rooms of the Headquarters of the Auxiliary were filled with like chronicles in picture, document and relics, telling the story of how the church had taken root and grown,

first in the Colonies and then in the several States and Territories, and showing the abundant fruit in the many Dioceses of today. Here we met and greeted our workers from the far off fields, and had our souls stirred within us as we listened to the stories of consecrated lives—of their battles with the power of darkness, and the triumphs which had come when the strife seemed fiercest.

The Bishop of Alaska made his plea for men, and gave his tribute of unstinted praise to the women who in every sense of the word had ministered to him.

The Bishop of Shanghai told the story of how steadfast had been his staff through all the perilous days of the troubles in China, and pleaded for a chance to give Christian education to the higher grades of Chinese women.

The Bishops of Tokio and Kyoto making plain the necessity for keeping the Church abreast of the rapid pace which the new Japan had set for herself, and so with the many others from abroad and at home, all brought stimulus and new life to us.

And then came that day when we stood together mute under the sudden bereavement by which our former head and founder had been in the wisdom of the Almighty removed from us, and we knew what was in the mind of the man of God when it was asked of him: "Knowest thou that the Lord will take away thy master from thy head today? And he said, 'I know it,' hold ye your peace.'"

When, after words of comfort which came from the full hearts of those over us in the Lord, we sang the old hymn,

"Blest be the tie that binds
Our hearts in Christian love,"

the vision of what might come to us from the example and precept of her who had left us for a while began to open to our gaze, and before her last earthly journey had been completed, one of her dreams for the Auxiliary was fulfilled, and through the devoted labors of three church women the desire of Bishop Graves for the higher grade schools was realized.

The Maryland Auxiliary wish to record here their sense of obligation to Miss Coles, Miss McVickar and Mrs. George Thomas, who garnered in the fruit of the whole Auxiliary field and helped so signally to put into concrete form our longing for a permanent remembrance of our indebtedness to Mary Emery Twing.

To your President was given the honor of fulfilling some few of the appointments left vacant by this affliction and from the wonderful service in St. Luke's Church, when every order of the American Church seemed represented by Bishop, clerical or lay delegate, or Auxiliary officer, the journey to Benicia, in the Diocese of Sacramento, was taken.

enjoyed Welcomed by that hospitality ever a characteristic of Auxiliary arrivals a most interesting meeting of the Convocation was held, when report from the several districts were given, and if an Auxiliary Officer was absent, her clergyman rose at once and answered for her. Sheltered in a quaintly built house, which had been brought around the Horn from the East in sections, and put up under the conviction that there was no suitable wood for building in California, shaded by the beautiful pepper tree, a restful and profitable night was spent.

From San Francisco to Los Angeles, and thence on to Denver we followed the path laid out and met the women of the church, taking sweet counsel together, whether in the beautiful Cathedral or in the little Chapel of the Hospital, purpose was deepened, resolves were freshly made, and the strength which comes from contact and sympathy was brought out.

Among our Maryland Missions we have great encouragement, not only have new branches been formed, but one cannot ride twenty-five or thirty miles on a Sunday with the faithful minister, without realizing what it means to have these little centres of work dotting the country. It may be the country School-house where the seating accommodation was never meant for the statue of the adult, or it may be in the old Colonial Church, with its mural tablets and the homes of the dead about it; but in every case joy has come from the interest manifested.

the sturdy churchmanship, which counts it a small matter to trudge miles over sandy roads or to drive along the old highways to fill the place of worship with hearty strains of devotion and attentive listeners.

The appointment of our United Offering Treasurer came none too soon to release the labors of our devoted Auxiliary Treasurer, and we bespeak your earnest cooperation to be given to Mrs. Richard Sperry, whose earnest appeals will be given in every available channel.

We must not overlook our Maryland mite chests for the Bishops' Fund. Every Maryland Church helped, makes another possible centre from which missionary activity may go forth and so in a widening circle we can reach as well an offering to the Board of Missions and care for the needs of such of our own clergy as desire our cooperation.

Grief has come into our own family circle of the Executive Board. One, a matron and mother in Israel, has been taken for higher service by the Master—Mrs. Julius Sams, of Holy Trinity Parish Branch. Her ready sympathy and quick response have lightened many a task of appeal. While from the youngest and loveliest of our divisions of work—the Babies' Branch—was called its first President—Susan C. Appold. Her sweet and patient persistence in what was a totally new field of work when she took it had its fruits in the establishment of this department on the best and surest foundation, and her lovely, gentle spirit we feel must still continue its influence on earth.

"Blessed," indeed, "are the dead who die in the Lord, for they rest from their labours, and their works do follow them."

It is hoped that our room devoted to the use of the Diocesan Auxiliary in the Episcopal Library will be the center of renewed activity for those who wish to study either Church History or Missions. It is an uncommon privilege to have access to such a wonderful ~~wealth~~ wealth of literature as we are offered in the Library, ~~while~~ the admirable leaflets of the Church Missions Publishing Company will furnish outlines, either for very early beginners, or through the more extended bibliography a

thorough and complete course of Missionary study. The last leaflet on South Africa is commended to you as a model of condensation and suggestion.

As a member of the Board of Directors of the Church Missions Publishing Company, your President attended the Annual Meeting held in the Greek room at the Berkeley Divinity School where plans for future work—among them a simple working scheme of Missionary Study for Sunday Schools were discussed, and she would bespeak from all her helpers, so ready to respond to every appeal through all these years, a fresh and renewed interest in all these instrumentalities, which we hope, pray and believe will aid in the extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom.



Recording Secretary's Report.



On November twentieth the Semi-Annual Meeting of the Maryland Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Grace Church, at half after ten o'clock.

At the opening services the Bishop of Maryland celebrated the Holy Communion and delivered an earnest charge from the text: "I press towards the mark."

The attendance of Auxiliary women and their friends at the Missionary meeting, held at Hazzer's Hall, at two o'clock, indicated great interest in the purposes of the organization.

After a hymn, led by the St. Cecelia Guild, the President, who conducted the services, gave a synopsis of the journey to, and stay in California, of the delegates of the Maryland Branch of the Auxiliary to the General Convention.

The Bishop of Shanghai was then presented and said, it gave him great pleasure to speak in Baltimore, because of the interest here in mission work. In recounting the needs of St. Mary's Hall, he said it should be a memorial to Mrs. Twing, because in 1896, she inaugurated the first woman's work in China.

St. Mary's Hall has about one hundred students, who are interested in higher education. The boys in the church schools of China are from the highest classes, but not the girls. He noted the fact that St. John's School pays more for its support than the Church gives it. The amount needed by Bishop Graves to promote the work is \$25,000 for chapel, school and land. In concluding, he cited the fact that the offerings of the Chinese had quadrupled in the past four years.

Miss Bull, who then addressed the meeting, said the great need of Japan was to be saved from atheism, or lack of any religion, and maintained that Western civilization failed to make men christians. She spoke of the difficulty our schools had to contend with, in competing with the high grade of Japanese schools. She gave a short sketch of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Kyoto, which began with the women's meetings, and thirteen years ago were converted by Miss Carter into a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of the United States. The last U. O. amounted to \$47.00.

An interesting story of a Japanese child was told who gave the first sum of money sent for the heathen in America, and thus began the Junior Auxiliary of Japan.

At the annual business meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary held in the Parish House of St. Michael and All Angels on May 27th, the opening services were conducted by the Rector, the Rev. Ernest Smith, who gave a most cordial welcome to those present.

After the roll-call, reports were read from the Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, the Junior Auxiliary, the Babies' Branch, the Church Periodical Club, and from the Secretary of the United Offering, who made her first report, evincing zeal and earnestness in the work.

The present officers were nominated and re-elected.

The President read a note from the Bishop of Maryland regretting his inability to be present.

In a stirring address, the first speaker, the Rt. Rev. Bishop of Kentucky said, the Board of Managers depended on the women and children, and, beside the pleasure of giving the United Offering every three years, they had stipulated to raise \$100,000 for the Board. In concluding, he emphasized the fact, that to be interested in Missions was to know about them, and urged the Auxiliary to continue the sending of boxes for the love that went with them, and, as assurances of sympathy, to those in hard places.

Miss Paddock, Vice-President of the G. F. S. then spoke of the work of which she is a most zealous exponent. She told how the seed was planted in Lambeth Palace just twenty-seven years ago, and how in Boston, fifteen years later, the girls were asked to give one penny a month, and the response from them was \$150,000 on the altar at Easter. She noted the success of the work, in the fact that twenty-six Missionaries had gone out from the Society since its incipency. A rising vote of thanks was offered for the speakers, and for the hospitalities proffered the Auxiliary by the St. Michael and All Angels Branch. At the close of a most interesting meeting, to which the singing of the St. Cecelia had added much, the Rector extended an invitation to partake of refreshments, so bountifully provided for those attending.

The address of the Bishop of Maryland at the November meeting gave the key-note for the year's work. "Pressing towards the mark," not content with what had been done, but striving to do greater things, as co laborers with Christ for His Kingdom. Prayer the motive power. After a year of missionary activity, the summary gives an encouraging increase in the offerings of the Branch.

We welcome branches organized at St. Matthew's, Sparrows Point, Church of the Holy Comforter, Lutherville, Trinity, Long Green, St. James, A. A. County and a desire to work with us, from Mission Chapter, Church of Transfiguration.

The President's report of the Triennial meeting in San Francisco, of the remarkable attendance, the growth of the Woman's Auxiliary in the past three years and the presentation of the great United Offering, \$107,000, was calculated to bid us, "thank God and take courage." Ere the session closed, the joy was shadowed by the sudden call to rest from her earthly labors, of our beloved Honorary Secretary, Mrs. Mary E. Twing.

The Woman's Auxiliary of to-day, under God's blessing, is the result of her foresight, faith and untiring devotion.

While we miss her wise and loving counsel, we have the inheritance of her prayers and self-denying labors, and can emulate her motto for the Woman's Auxiliary, "Every Church Woman a Church Worker."

At a special meeting in Grace Chapel, December 12th, Miss Coles, of Philadelphia, Secretary of the Pennsylvania Branch, delivered an address. She paid a just and beautiful tribute to the memory of Mrs. Twing, and made it a personal obligation and privilege for every member to give an offering to the proposed memorial. The President's appeal was followed by Miss S. R. Carter, of St. Timothy's, who warmly reminded the Branch of its possibilities. Towards the requisite sum \$15,000, for the additional building, St. Mary's School, Shanghai, China, Maryland made the second largest contribution, \$1,012. No one large gift, but the many contributing, make it a loving testimonial and an encouraging sign of growing interest in Foreign Missions. The monthly Executive meetings give opportunity for discussion of methods of work and of general information.

Mrs. J. McD. Gardiner, Tokyo, interested us in her life in Japan for twenty years, and that country's wonderful development. At another meeting, Rev. Lewis B. Browne, of Sparrow's Point, gave a few words of commendation, and would organize a Branch in his parish.

With pride and pleasure, greetings from the Maryland Branch were sent to Maryland's beloved and faithful Missionary, Rev. J. Addison Ingle, whose consecration as Bishop of Hankow, marks another advance in work for China. An address to the Ascension Branch, May 2nd, by Mrs. F. Howard Taylor, of the China Island Mission, told of a wonderful work in answer to prayer and firm conviction, that "God is enough" in every difficulty. Her graphic details of self-denying and loving effort for the enlightenment of the poor Chinese women, made us realize the oneness of all workers in Christ Jesus.

The meetings of St. Timothy's Branch are a privilege to those who can accept their hospitality. Miss Carter's report shows strong fine work. She writes, "successful, because it is the doing of what God created every human being to do, and that is by his or her life to reveal Him to the world." At their meeting April 24th, Archdeacon Joyner spoke of his work in South Carolina among the Colored people. The Memorial Branch held a general meeting January 28th. The subject, "Why do Missionary Work!" 1—God's need, 2—the heathen's need, 3—the Christian's need; was forcibly presented by the speakers, Rev. Nelson P. Dame, of Winchester Va., Mrs. A. L. Sioussat and Miss Sallie Stuart, President of the Virginia Branch. Through invitation of the same branch, Bishop Funsten, of Boise, presented the claims of his work and received an offering. The topic chosen for their weekly meetings during Lent, "Women's Work for Women," was successively presented by members of other religious bodies. The good that others are doing, being a helpful stimulus to our own efforts. The result of such activity is shown in increased membership and larger offerings, the record of the branch doubling that of the previous year.

The President, ever ready to respond to an invitation, has visited other branch meetings, and much good has been accomplished by encouraging in the weaker parish branches, the spirit to do what one can. It should be remembered that the many small gifts in His name, count more in the end than the few large ones. For helpful and practical suggestions, the secretary would commend to every branch a little book, "Fling out the Banner," by Mrs. H. M. Morrison, to be procured by sending fifty cents to the Young Churchman Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. For general information we urge reading of "The Spirit of Missions," the leaflets of the Church Missions Publishing Company and the use of the Lending Library of the Church Missions House. A book can be kept two weeks, with only the expense of postage both ways. For the benefit of new branches, it is well to explain, that from the Silent Church

Fund, \$300 is paid annually to the Bishop of Maryland, to keep open a church not able to pay the salary of a pastor. Collecting for this object, many of the branches use the Maryland Mite Chests, any surplus going to the Maryland treasury, to be disbursed by general vote, when urgent appeals are presented. The Central Fund meets the working expenses of the Maryland branch. No stipulated sum required, but an annual contribution is asked from *each* branch. The election of Mrs. R. B. Sperry as special treasurer of the United Offering, promises extended interest. It is hoped that each branch will avail itself of her readiness to present its claims.

Not underrating the helpfulness of the boxes which supplement the small stipend of our Missionaries and could not be spared, we are urged to widen our aim, to have a keener sense of our responsibility to the Board of Missions. The promise of the whole Auxiliary to raise \$100,000 this year for the general work to which the church is pledged, calls for a response from the branches. Would not an offering from *each* branch for General Missions, enable Maryland to meet her share in the obligation?

It is gratifying to state that the room in the Diocesan Library is open to visitors. The table will be kept supplied with reports, leaflets, etc., to make it a centre for disseminating Missionary information. The interest of the branches is asked in extending its usefulness.

During the year, death has taken from us one of our most efficient and valued co-workers, Miss Susan C. Appold, Secretary of Christ Church branch. We would place upon record our appreciation of her loyal devotion to the work of the Master, her ready sympathy and generous offerings to any cause for the extension of His Kingdom. She leaves an undying and fragrant memory, as the Founder and faithful secretary of the Babies' branch of Maryland.

In the death of Rev. Julius E. Grammer, D. D., the Maryland Branch loses one of its earliest friends and supporters, and will

cherish the memory of his inspiring words and his missionary zeal.

If alive to the wonderful opportunity of Christ for the world, let us seek to win the co-operation of the many who do not see the great need, and ask for our work, the blessing of "the same God which worketh all in all."

Report of the Indian Aid Committee.

The Annual Lace Sale was held in Emmanuel Parish building, December 11th.

Miss Sybil Carter's narration of details in connection with the making of the dainty and beautiful specimens, made the exhibit doubly interesting.

Another School established in Southern California, brings food to Indian women starving for the necessities of life.

As a co-worker, Miss Sallie Steuart of Virginia promises valuable aid to Miss Carter who is overtaxed with the growing demands upon her time and strength. The result of the sale was, \$127.30.

From South Dakota we have an encouraging account of the steady progress of the Indians. Their contributions make a remarkable showing and most of the money is contributed by Indian women.

By death, Bishop Hare loses two of his long-trying missionaries, Rev. J. W. Cook, a faithful priest for thirty years, and Mrs. W. J. Cleveland, who went out as a trained worker more than thirty years ago. By increasing our contributions to the salary of Indian teachers, we are lightening the burden of those giving their strength and life to the Master's work. Appeals for the Indians of Alaska, Oklahoma and Lemhi Reservation have been responded to. We note with gratification the interest of the Juniors in the Indians, shown not only in their generous gifts, but in their study about Indian Missions.

We enroll with grateful memory the name of Mrs. Chas. Willett, a former President of the Indian Aid Association, who has entered into rest. She was a life-long sympathising and generous friend of the Indian Cause.

The Committee would record in a feeble testimonial, the passing from earth to Life Eternal September 16th, 1901, of our beloved and honored Father in God, the Right Rev. Henry B. Whipple, of Minnesota. While his great heart embraced entire humanity, he was everywhere known as the "Apostle to the Indians." In the touching words of the old Indian missionary Enmegahbowh, "The best friend our people had, the great warrior, the great Bishop, the loving man has fallen." Full of years and abundant labors for Christ and His Church, he has entered into his well-earned rest, and we give thanks for his noble life so nobly ended.

President's Report.

In presenting the fifth annual report of the Junior Department, attention is asked not so much to its statistic accomplishment, as to items which mark its progress in the line of Missionary study, and to those which give evidence that the Missionary idea is taking genuine roots in the minds of the children. To show this more clearly it may be well to quote from a few of the reports—thus allowing the juniors to speak for themselves. These Reports were presented by the secretaries of the parish branches at the general meeting on May the tenth, and showed not only steady increase of membership, more attention to missionary study and a larger giving, but a reaching out for even greater attainment.

Reading from the report of Hannah More Academy—
“We are still supporting one pupil at the Mission School at Cape Palmas, Africa, and adding somewhat to the fund which we are trying to raise for the endowment of this scholarship.

We are at present trying to secure the co-operation of several Church schools for the purpose of sending a Missionary to the foreign field, as an extension of the work of the Church—Students' Missionary Association, which has awakened so much interest in Colleges.”

Many of the branches keep in touch with the children to whom they send help and gifts.

We read from St. Peter's Church branch—“During Advent we sent a box of materials to some Juniors in North Carolina, and they returned us a box of holly which was used for Chancel decoration at Christmas.”

The branch at the Prince of Peace Church (Walbrook) has a scholarship in the school at Beaufort (N. C.), and sent there a large Christmas box ; which included Christmas gifts and a wardrobe for the child they are educating.

The branch at Trinity Church (Towson) has several scholarships at Beaufort, and has sent valuable boxes to the same place, keeping in touch and giving the work their sympathy by frequent letters.

The branch at St. Timothy's Church (Catonsville) in speaking of the Mission in North Carolina to which they have pledged gifts for the coming Christmas—"We hope that our pleasure in giving them though very great—will be as nothing to that of the children who are to receive them—and whom by God's help we want to help raise to a higher and worthier life, in showing them that the children of other parts of their country know of them, love them, and want to work for them."

In the branches at St. Mary's Church (Hampden) Trinity Church (Dorsey) and St. John's (Mt. Washington) especial attention has been given to Missionary Study. The report of the first named reads—"We choose a country to be studied at each meeting. One member will write something about the geography, another the history, another the inhabitants, and still another about the missionary work." This branch has sent a generous gift for the Missionary Apportionment Fund as well as taken a scholarship in the Widely Loving Society (Japan) asking the name of child holding it—that they may write to her, to keep up a mutual interest and sympathy.

Trinity branch (Dorsey) "gives part of the time of each meeting to study, and the St. Phoebe's Guild of Emmanuel Church, gave a fine report of generous giving, as did "the branches at St. Luke's Church, Ascension Church, All Saint's Church (Frederick), Holy Comforter (Lutherville) and St. John's (Ellicott City), but the fear of encroaching on too much space limits these to only a mention.

Besides reports—three excellent original papers were given at the General Meeting. One on "Bishop Hare and his work,"

by a member of the Memorial Church branch ; one on " Bishop Whipple, the Apostle to the Indians," by one of the boys of the branch at St. John's Church (Mt. Washington), and one on " William Carey," by a member of the branch at St. Luke's Church. At the same meeting answers were given to questions on the Lenten " Spirit of Missions," and at a later date, two papers on Japan were handed in which are worthy of mention and publication.

Four new branches have been welcomed during the year, viz : At the Chapel of the Atonement, a second at the Church of the Ascension, at Grace Church and at All Saint's Church (Reisterstown). First reports were received from these, as well as from the Branches at St. James' Church and the Church of St. Mary the Virgin.

The year's report includes in its giving—A share in the United Offering of 1901, one also in the " Mary E. Twing Memorial Fund," several scholarships in different mission schools, offerings for Bishop Brent's work in the Phillipines, an offering to the Missionary apportionment fund, and one to the Bishop of Maryland for mission work, besides nearly one thousand Christmas gifts, and gifts of money. Besides the giving, there has been shown an earnest striving to become more intelligent church-workers by means of prayers for missions, and a more careful study of missionary fields and workers. Monthly executive meetings have been held regularly, and been of great benefit, the inter-change and conference making a bond between the officers, which results in mutual strength to help each in her branch work. We recognize gratefully the loyalty and support given by the officers to all suggestions made in reference to methods and the disposal of their work.

The resignation of our faithful recording Secretary is noted with great regret, although we are fortunate in having as her successor one who is most earnest and capable.

We express also, sorrow in the loss of a dear fellow-officer—the first president of the Babies' branch who was taken from our midst during the year. She brought " light, love and

cheerfulness to whatever she touched," and has left a sweet and blessed memory to all who had the privilege of knowing her. This record would not be complete without a mention of the Epiphany service held in St. Peter's Church on Sunday afternoon, January 19, at which time there were stirring addresses from the Bishop of Los Angeles, the rectors of St. Peter's Church, and of the Church of Ascension and the Rev. Joshua Kimber of the Board of Missions; with music led by the St. Cecilia Guild, and joined in heartily by the large Congregation.

We appreciate gratefully the interest of the Rector through whose kindness the service was so well arranged and carried through, and we hope every year to make it more a source of inspiration.

We acknowledge also the courtesy and kind interest of the Rector of St. Luke's Church, in inviting and arranging for the Spring Meeting, and also the ever-ready help of the St. Cecilia Guild.

Let me close with a message from the Bishop of Maryland, sent to the Juniors on the day of their General Meeting, which will show his cordial sympathy with this work—"I want to express through you, to them, my very great interest in them and for their work. God bless the Junior Auxiliary and all its members."
