## Report of President.



In a review of the year that has gone and a greeting for that which is to come, we feel that the Maryland Auxiliary can be cheered by the record of the past season, and filled with inspiration for the future.

The request from the Bishop of Maryland for the sum needed to complete the Parish House at Sparrows Point, came to us after the plans for the year had been laid, and in the case of some of the Branches, their pledges were made elsewhere. Perhaps no better test could have been given us of what our work was worth.

True, the dread of possible failure, the strong probability of deferred success, brought us at first dismay, but the prompt completion of the undertaking within six months, may be considered an outward and visible sign of our loyalty to him who is over us in the Lord.

If it has aroused us to some conception of our capabilities for greater things than we have yet undertaken, if it has brought us closer together—as hard work always does, if, above all, it has led us to realize that every such centre provided for the instrumentalities of the Parish Priest among the men who toil, the wage workers, forges one more link in the ties which bind the Church of God together in Christian life and love. If all these be so, then are we debtors to our father in God and can give thanks that this labor of love was given to us. We are now ready to pass to the special work which will need every hand to help, every thought to consider the conduct of our Auxiliary Craft.

These are two topics which just now represent our first and gravest responsibilities. Primarily, our annual apportionment of \$100,000 for the Board of Missions, or rather the difference between what we have every year contributed to that body, and what is necessary to raise our quota up to the amount named. It is not exhilarating to find that while on either side of us, our Sister Dioceses have filled up their measure, we are still to achieve this desirable result.



For the second, our United Offering is near at hand, and, as our faithful Secretary and special Treasurer will elsewhere put these details more fully before you it is our bounden duty simply to remind you once more of what we have undertaken.

Let us turn to the record of our pledge:

"Resolution adopted October seventh, 1901.

"Resolved, That the United Offering of 1904 be given to the Board of Missions for Woman's Work in the Domestic and Foreign Fields, including the training, sending and support of women workers, also the care of such workers when sick and disabled.

"This to be interpreted to include Brazil, Haiti, Cuba and Mexico."

This tells its own story—the United Offering of 1901 must be doubled, nay trebled, if this is to be accomplished.

In our Home Field there has never been a time when so many demands were made for workers and means. The desire for information grows apace. In this connection we trust that the Maryland Auxiliary will expedite the plan of a uniform study course with leaflets and pamphlets, issued by the Church Missions Publishing Company, which cannot fail to ground us in the education so necessary for intelligent work.

Even from over the sea has come a request to know more of our methods in the Mission Field, and the whole church must rejoice with our Chicago Sisters, that a priest has been asked to go over and deliver lectures, illustrating work in our Missionary Jurisdictions, at the invitation and under the auspices of the S. P. S., that great mothering society which brings the name of Bray before us with all the remembrances of missionary effort and illumination which he brought to these shores.

It has been a great pleasure for your President to spend a part of her summering among the old Parishes of Maryland, where so much of our early life—religious and social—began, and she hopes from these journeyings, so delightful in their contact with the women and men who to-day preserve and treasure these hallowed possessions, to accumulate some additional material for preservation, in photographs of old buildings and the copying of old records, to that already offered through our Auxiliary to the Bishops' Fund, which may go down to future generations, to remind them of the Rock from which they were hewn.



In the Foreign Field the progress of the work is greater than our interest in it will permit us to conceive. In China and Japan the story is the same. The appreciation of Christian life and influence is shown in the most practical way by the outspoken views of public officials.

When an ex-cabinet officer of a heathen land can record the conviction that "the basis of national and personal welfare must be religion;" when the rector of Grace Church, Tokyo, has been chosen by the Prime Minister of Japan for the head of a Government school,—these and many other signs of the times bear best and strongest testimony to the lives that have been lived among them. Let us see to it that the hands of those who are wrestling with such problems of darkness and ignorance as we can not know, are upheld by our prayers and our alms, as we shall have one day to answer for our opportunity and responsibility.

No record of church work in the Diocese of Maryland would be complete without mention of one who, so great was her shrinking from public notice, might even have wished to stay our tribute of loving remembrance, but who was beyond question, foremost among all who have led us as church women.

Margaret Harrison Whittingham in her rare wisdom, her intelligent insight, her wide culture, has left her impress upon every movement which stood for real and true work for the church in our midst. In historical research she was ever ready with the authority and suggestion most needed. In the study of the Holy Scriptures her aid was invaluable, and the deep spirituality which she brought into all investigation hallowed it. In our Woman's Auxiliary her sympathy was ever ready, and her frequently expressed regret was that she could not more often meet with us.

By heritage and experience she had known of the leaders in all the great movements which have marked the life and growth of the church throughout the world in the last half-century. Selwyn, Hannington and all the noble army among whom they stood were no mere names to her. Indeed, the missionary principle was the rule of life in her home, and perhaps the first of all the numerous plans for systematic giving was that formulated by her beloved father, our revered Bishop Whittingham. There could have been no missionary exhibit in California at our last meeting of the General Convention but for her untiring zeal and personal



exertion in its behalf. With her own hands, and in the robe-case where she had so often placed the sacred vestments of her father, she packed each article of our priceless collection of the treasures from our Diocesan library, which were so much appreciated and had such educational value for all who saw them.

Her counsel ever brought comfort, and though her bodily presence has gone from us, in working out the little span of life left us, we hope and believe that in God's own good way she knows how she is loved and honored by the church women of Maryland.

We chronicle this year the loss from our circle of Diocesan officers, two whose faithful service and constant attendance will be greatly missed.

The Vice-President representing the Annapolis Convocation, Mrs. William F. Gardner, has felt unable to continue with us in that capacity, while Mrs. M. P. Wetherall, our Recording Secretary and valued co-worker, is also compelled to resign her work. We know that our interests will still be theirs, and we trust that their places may be filled by those who will like to remember what dear associations are those of one Auxiliary family.

Time fails us to chronicle the interesting occasions for meeting the Auxiliary women both in our own and other Dioceses. Every one of them, whether in the Parish House, the Sunday School, the beautiful old Manor house, or in the great congregations of Annual Meetings, are fruitful in blessing. It only remains for us to realize as each day's labour ends that the harvesting is at hand. Are our sheaves ready?

## Recording Secretary's Report.



The opening service of the Semi-Annual Meeting of 1902 was held in Grace Church on November twelfth at ten o'clock.

Morning prayer was said by the rector, and at the administration of the Holy Communion, the Rt. Revs. the Bishops of Maryland and Kyoto were the celebrants. The Bishop of Maryland in his address reviewed the work of the Auxiliary for the past year. He said he found the report full of interest, and considered the growth in the past two years remarkable, the report in money being doubled, while he felt sure more interest was represented otherwise.

Luncheon was served in Hazazer's Hall, where the Missionary Meeting was held, at two o'clock.

After the singing of a hymn and the calling of the roll, the President in a few happy words of welcome introduced the Rt. Rev. Sidney Partridge, of Kyoto.

Japan, the Bishop said, meant the kingdom of the sunrise; the most interesting land on earth, where the day begins. Kyoto, which forms a part of his Diocese, means Capital City, and has a population of 7,000,000. In describing the needs of the mission work here, he said the present building of St. Agnes' school was to be made the Parish House, and near it the new St. Agnes' will be erected, the work requiring \$3,000. To Rev. Mr. Gring's work in the extreme northern portion of the diocese the Bishop has promised \$5,000.

The next speaker, the Rev. Lawrence B. Ridgely, said, we have heard the message from the land of the sunrise, and now we are to hear that from the flowery kingdom. Old China gave the



literature, and then a Bishop to Kyoto. He noted the fact that in this kingdom of China one-fourth of the human race lived. In referring to educational work, he stated that the American Chinese schools added several branches besides both languages, whilst the native schools teach only Chinese. The Christian religion had proved most effective in every direction, and we have a work in China, because, first, the Lord commanded it; second, because China asks for it, and third, because she so needs it.

The last speaker, the Rev. Mr. Gasmann, of California, who labored nine years among the Sioux of South Dakota, called the American Indians the most interesting people in the world. He said we have paid for this vast land in coin of a very base nature. Emphasizing the fact that industry was at the bottom of their success, he stated that the Indians were the first manufacturers in the State of Dakota.

Hoping to increase interest in the United Offering, the Treasurer, Mrs. Sperry, made an earnest appeal. She suggested that members might add to this fund by contributing thank offerings for special blessings.

The large attendance both of clergy and members at the meeting augured well for the future of the work, and the inspiring singing of the St. Cecelia Guild added much to the pleasure of the occasion.

The Annual Business Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held on May 26, in the Parish House of St. Michael and All Angels. The calling of the roll showed a very large attendance. The election of officers resulted in the appointment of those of the preceding year. To give more time to speakers present, several reports were omitted. The Treasurer of the United Offering Fund presented an interesting report showing larger contributions.

The Committee of Special Work for Sparrows' Point reported through the Treasurer, Miss Cuyler, the amount raised to be \$1575.15, which sum was presented most happily by the President, Mrs. Souissat, to the Bishop of Maryland. In response he thanked the Auxiliary lovingly for their labors, and said the endowment of the Auxiliary was in the hearts of the Women of the Auxiliary.

Mrs. O. V. S. Ward, of the Chicago Branch, was present and spoke of methods used for the increase of interest in that branch.

The General Secretary, Miss Emery, the special speaker of



the occasion, called attention to the apportionment plan as the important work now pressing the heart and mind of the Women of the Auxiliary, to which they were asked to appropriate \$100,000. She suggested literature for summer reading for members of the Auxiliary, and reminded them that while the laborer was at work in the Mission Fields they rest, and asked that their prayers should be given them.

After the singing of the Doxology a most interesting meeting closed, and those present enjoyed the hospitalities, so graciously provided by the St. Michael and All Angels' Branch. A rising vote of thanks was given this branch, as well as the St. Cecilia Guild.

## Corresponding Secretary's Report.



To those of us who enjoyed the privilege, the many heart-stirring words heard at the Missionary Council held in Philadelphia in October, 1902, made it indeed a "Feast of fat things," strengthening us to take up the work of another year with renewed zeal.

In his address at the November meeting, the Bishop of Maryland noted evidences of growth in extended organization and larger contributions, from a comparison of reports of the past three years. While commending the offerings given to Foreign and Domestic Missions, he asked for a more generous giving to the missionary work of the Diocese. His later specific appeal for \$1,500 to aid in the erection of a Parish House at Sparrow's Point, clearly pointed out the aggressive work of the year. A committee, with Mrs. R. B. Sperry as chairman, called the attention of each Branch to the urgent need, which, at the Bishop's request, kindled enthusiasm and a most gratifying response. A generous contribution towards the result, \$1,575.15, was \$203 from the sale of tickets for the "Illustrated Talk on Colonial Churches," given by Mrs. A. L. Sioussat, March twenty-third. So full of interesting details both of the old parishes, of the manor houses and their traditions, the lecture has been asked for publication as valuable for the Diocesan Library.

The year's summary gives encouraging increase in the offerings of the Branch:

We give \$1,702.68 toward's the Board's appropriation for General Missions, a gain of \$58.52 over the year before. Though



unable to contribute Maryland's full quota towards the \$100,000 promised from the whole Auxiliary for the work to which the Church is pledged, we have not been unmindful of the obligation. The branches have been and are urged to send their contributions as "Designated Contributions." These aid the Board in meeting some pledge or appropriation it has made in the name of the whole church, and apply upon the apportionment. "Specials" are offerings sent in addition to what the Board has promised.

We welcome branches organized at Church of the Advent and at St. John's, Waverly.

Opportunities for information have been given at the special meetings of the branches. To the Grace Church branch, Bishop Brewer of Montana gave an earnest charge on the wonderful growth of the Auxiliary and its ever widening mission.

To the St. Timothy's Branch an address from the Rev. Arthur S. Lloyd, D. D., was uplifting, the heart full of love for Christ *must* do His work. He made an earnest plea for Dr. Teusler's Hospital, Tokyo. Mrs. A. E. Physick, President of the Easton Branch, spoke to the Memorial Branch upon the "responsibility and privilege of taking part in the Mission Work of the Church". At the same meeting Mrs. Souissat gave some account of Bishop Ingle's work in Hankow, emphasizing the need of Bible teaching among the Chinese women. To an executive meeting Miss Woods talked of Missions in the North Carolina Mountains. Another executive meeting welcomed Miss Dodson, of Shanghai, who gave interesting particulars of fourteen years valuable work in China, specially of her rescue work at St. Mary's Orphanage.

In some of the branches Lenten weekly meetings with papers on different portions of the Field have been instructive.

A very interesting paper was read to the Memorial Branch by Rev. Percy Hall, graphically telling that wonderful story of Uganda, Africa, of the leavening power of christianity in the short space of twenty-five years.

The result of the Lenten self-denial of this branch was brought in envelopes upon which each individual had been asked to inscribe a text from the Scriptures, and to let the spirit of the text and earnest prayer accompany each gift, no names were given. It is commended as a helpful method to more spiritual service and liberal offerings.



The Secretary must again urge the branches to return the blanks sent in the spring, as promptly as possible, and with them notice of special meetings held, or efforts made for the extension of their work. When work, unknown to the Secretary, is chosen by a Branch, she should at once be informed, thus saving unnecessary applications and much time in placing appeals to which it is her duty to respond.

We regret to report from the Church Periodical Club lessening contributions. The cheer and refreshment brought to far away and lonely workers by the periodicals and papers sent, appeals for generous and growing interest.

Each year brings its note of sadness as we place upon our annals the names of those who leave us.

Miss Margaret H. Whittingham was a true and loyal friend of the Auxiliary from its earliest organization, to whom we owe the only record of the foundation of the Maryland Branch. With highest ideals of character and endowed with gifts of intellect and grace, her talents were consecrated to the Church she so dearly loved and to the memory of her father, the beloved and honored late Bishop of Maryland.

In the death of Mrs. Samuel Cox, President of the Long Island Branch, and of Mrs. L. R. Brewer, President of the Montana Branch, we lose faithful co-workers, and would give thanks for their noble examples and loving service for the ever growing Kingdom of Christ on earth.

Stirred by the possibilities of greater things for our dear Lord and His Kingdom, and conscious of the much we have left undone, let us pray more fervently and give more generously for the shepherding of the many who are straying from the fold.

## Report of the Indian Aid Committee.

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The annual sale of lace made by Indian women was held December 5th in Christ Chapel, under the auspices of the Christ Church branch,

Exhibiting specimens of rare designs, Miss Sybil Carter showed with just pride the gold medal awarded at the Paris Exhibition for Indian lace. Miss Sallie Stewart of Virginia was present. She gives valuable aid in disposing of the lace.

The result of the sale was \$146.50.

At the November meeting, Rev. J. G. Gasmann, of Alameda, Cal., gave an interesting address in behalf of the Indian Aid Association, an earlier organization than the Woman's Auxiliary, and now merged into the general work for missions. He labored with success for nine years at Crow Creek and Yankton Agency, South Dakota, teaching the Indians the dignity of work and the value of a home. He commended the faithful labors of Rev. Philip Deloria, to whose work some of our branches have sent generous aid. When we hear of the contributions of the poor Indians, we may well ask ourselves, what our offerings might be, with our larger opportunities and blessings, had we like faithfulness and zeal.

We would place upon record our appreciation of the long and faithful labors of Rev. J. Johnson Enmegahbowh, who entered into rest in June, 1902. He was ordained by Bishop Kemper in 1859, and was the oldest and best beloved of all the Indian missionaries of Minnesota. As "one who stands before his people," the meaning of his name, his native eloquence and wonderful tact exerted an untold influence over the simple minds of his red children. Memory recalls how many were stirred to give generously, when



he visited Baltimore in 1881, raising \$700. towards the erection of St. Columba, White Earth. Through his intervention many lives were saved in the massacre of 1862, and in recognition of his valuable services to the State, the legislature of Minnesota proposes the erection of a monument over his grave.

So fruitful have been the efforts for christianizing these poor people, we plead for continued and generous support of Indian Missions.

## President's Report.



The work of the Junior Department can be reported as having *passed* the standard of last year. Not so much by the addition of new branches, but rather in the growth of weak ones, and a steady progress in those already strong.

No statement will show this quite as well as to quote from a few of the Parish reports read at the yearly meeting on May the ninth.

From the report of Grace Church Branch is read, that the membership has increased from three to sixteen, and that, besides Christmas gifts to several places in Maryland, fifty dollars was sent to Beaufort, N. C., for the education of a little fisher-boy at St. Paul's School, this sum paying his tuition for five years.

In addition, this branch has contributed thirty dollars for one-half of an Indian scholarship, to be called the "William Paret" Scholarship, (the branch at St. Mary's Church, Hampden, contributing the other half,) toward the education of an Indian girl in one of Bishop Hare's schools in South Dakota. St. Mary's Branch has also a scholarship in the Widely Loving Society of Japan.

The membership of St. John's Church, Ellicott City, has increased from five to thirty-two members, and an item from their report reads: "We found this year that we could support a scholarship in one of Bishop Ingle's schools, and it makes our work seem very real to know that we have a little Chinese girl of our own to care for."

The branch at the Memorial Church has increased from twenty-five to thirty-eight members, and reports her gifts, ten dollars towards the building fund of the Parish house at Sparrow's Point, and the sending of a scholarship to Bishop Hare, to be called the "William M. Dame Scholarship."



The branch at Hannah Moore Academy has a membership of eighty-six, and is not only most thorough in the systematic study of Mission fields, but reports a like giving. For example, besides an offering for general missions, twenty dollars for mission work in the Ragged Mountains, Va., twenty-two dollars to Bishop Van Buren for work in Cuba; fifty dollars was sent to Bishop Brent for educational work in the Philippines, and fifty dollars to Bishop Ingle for a scholarship in St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China.

Model boxes were sent from the Guild of St. Phoebe, at Emmanuel Church; branches of St. Timothy's, Catonsville; Trinity Church, Dorsey, and Trinity Church, Towson; and also two joint boxes from ten branches, containing nearly 1,000 Christmas presents were sent to Standing Rock, S. D.

It is hard to resist the temptation of quoting something from every report, for there is so much that is good in them all.

We have welcomed one new branch during the year, that of St. Mark's Church, Pikesville, which, young as it is, reports having sent a scholarship to Beaufort, North Carolina, and an offering for mission work in Cuba.

A source of great inspiration was the Epiphany service held on Sunday afternoon, January 11th, in St. Peter's Church. This was arranged by the Rector, who not only generously included it in the number of Jubilee services being held at that time in his church, but secured such speakers as the Rev. J. B. Falkner, D. D., the Rev. H. L. Duhring, D. D., of Philadelphia, and the Rev. A. S. Lloyd, of New York. In spite of gloomy weather the church was filled with children, whose happy voices led by the St. Cecilia Guild gave a stirring ring to the missionary hymns, and who listened well to the fine and interesting addresses which made this service one to be long remembered.

The monthly executive meetings have been of great value in allowing opportunities for talking over methods of work, deciding the objects, as well as subjects of study, and how best to awaken and keep up interest. It is a pleasure to acknowledge the loyalty and sympathy of the officers to all suggestions about Parish work, and also to add that to their united energy and earnestness is due the steady growth of the Junior Department.

The general meeting held on May 9th closed the record of the year, and was much enjoyed by all present.



The cordial greeting and address of the Rector of Emmanuel Church, the reports of the Parish secretaries, the offering presented by the Parish treasurers, the hospitality of the Guild of St. Phoebe and the help of St. Cecilia Guild, all combined to make it an occasion of thanksgiving. The special offering was partly for the Bishop's work in Maryland, and the rest (added to a fund in hand) amounted to \$100.00, and was sent as a greeting to the Rt. Rev. Addison Ingle, Bishop of Hankow.

To close, let me say that we look forward hopefully to the future of the Junior Department, which every year gives evidence of more intelligent growth and of a greater desire to support its share of the Church's work. The principal advance during the past year is shown in the number of scholarships sent, and this desire to aid in the education of other children shows a growing sense of responsibility.

It is the privilege of all healthy youth to grow, and we pray for the Juniors a steady advance in numbers, interest, sincerity and generosity.
