Address of President.



It is a period of notable commemoration to which our attention must be called in this year of grace, 1907. Fifteen years ago our thoughts were with our own colony of Maryland, to which just one hundred years before, 1792, had come the gift of the Episcopate, a blessing withheld from us, for over a hundred and fifty years since the founding of the colony, 1634. At that time (in 1892) we welcomed to our midst the thirteen hundred women of the Auxiliary, in triennial session assembled, our first large united offering of \$22,000 was placed upon the altar in old St. Paul's, and we feel the impetus today of that assemblage of women, who gathered up in themselves from all over this broad land the love and devotion, the heroism and self-sacrifice which distinguished the women in these early colonies, and for whom Mary Taney stood sponsor, when she wrote her courageous letter to His Grace, the Archbishop of Canterbury, begging that a shepherd might be sent to "your stray flock in this wilderness," and she intimates that proof is to be found of this filial devotion in the supplies sent out and the tariffs exacted by the mother country, and prays again that one man at least may come to the aid of Christ Church, Calvert County. From his own privy purse Charles II sent out the Rev. Paul Bertrand, who must have been a strong arm to succour in the troublous times when churchmen were undergoing the persecutions on this side, that their brethren were suffering abroad. From this time the succession went on, the faithful parish priests with their miles of territory, for their ministrations never failed, and the days have been few when, as in the case of the faithful Rechabite, they have "wanted a man to stand before the Lord."

But today the sun on the dial of the centuries turns back in his course, and we are to consider that earlier period when so soon after the Reformation the Church of England in her relation to primitive simplicity planted upon the shores of our sister colony of Virginia, then embracing our own State and the Carolinas, in her coast line. Today enterprise is commended and colonizations are fostered and encouraged ; but at the end of the 16th and the first half of the 17th century that man was indeed favored who could have the royal permission to depart for regions beyond the seas ; even though such deplorable arguments as those of Gilbert and Raleigh to the Virgin Queen and James I were employed, when to the first, assurance was given that "these lands have been fatefully reserved for your Matie"; and to the other the more subtle and specious incentive, which moved the avarice of James "of the gold and silver which were to replenish the royal coffers"; but to their honor be it recorded that every adventure contemplated the conversion of the nations and the bringing in of the Kingdom Eternal. We know the story of the preliminary colonizations—the martyrs of the Rappahannock slain in the saying of their mass amid the "salvages." The Roanoke enterprises, which, although ending in disaster, brought us first into contact with the lords of the soil ; with them Manteo and Nanchese went back to England, and to their Christianization we owe the salvation of the colony at a later period, while John White's drawings in the 1585 voyages are the best presentment yet made of the Indian and his mode of life. After the last tragedy, when the few settlers who were left to await the return of supplies, were found to have disappeared forever from the pages of history, when the little daughter of Ananias Dare, the first white child born on these shores, with the cross of her baptism yet fresh on her brow, had disappeared with the rest into the mists of tradition, the blue eyed, fair haired lads in the Croatan wigwams and the Indians' legend of the White Doe, were all that remained to us of Roanoke. It was not, then, until 1607 that under Smith, Gosnold and New Port, the three little ships, the Susan Constant, the God Speed and the Discovery sailed into the Chesapeake Bay, and on the James River

began the settlement of Jamestown, and took formal and final possession for the Church by their first service under the old sail, nearby which the first church was built. Hunt and Whittaker were the van-guard of a noble army upon whom today we turn and look back, and our hearts burn within us as we recognize our Lord among them, leading them, as we must believe He is leading us, who are so laden with privileges such as they never had.

What does it all mean to us? Are we preparing ourselves for what we shall see and hear in the great gathering of the visible Church in Richmond in October?

History repeats itself. We are invited today across the continent as our shortest highway to Cathay and Cipango, the quests for which have lured many a noble soul to death. The Phillipines of that Spanish dominion so wonderful in its world control in the early days are ours, and our own Bishop Brent is their Bishop. The Spanish main witnesses the establishment of the Church of England and our own jurisdictions of Cuba, Porto Rico and Hayti. The Northwest Passage has been found, although but a barren discovery, but our Bishop of Alaska claims even the Arctic Circle as his territory. The little one has indeed become a thousand.

The services to be held on James Town Island will mark a most wonderful gathering from the East and from the West, and perhaps to us may come the vision of that which the little handful of colonists with their devoted priest lived and died for—the gaining of the world for Christ.

May we be found worthy of our part in the great congregation—worthy to lay our gift upon His altar—the gift which may carry our women forth to comfort and aid our clergy along our “far-firing battle line” in their conflict with the world, the flesh and the devil. “For the promise is to you and to your children, and to them that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call.”

Recording Secretary's Report.

The number of Parish Branches amount to fifty-one. During the year there were two general meetings of the whole Auxiliary and seven executive meetings, composed of the officers of the several Parish Branches. These last were held, as for many years past, in the Parish House of Grace Church, on the third Wednesday afternoon of each month, from November to May inclusive. It is gratifying to note an increasing attendance of officers, representing each year a greater number of Branches. These meetings are most important, as at them the general work of the Diocese is planned, and reports of work done are rendered, so at the request of one of the country parishes a plan has been devised whereby the minutes of the meetings are printed and distributed to those branches whose officers cannot be present. By this means it is hoped to keep all branches of the Maryland Auxiliary in touch with what is being done, and thereby gain in offerings as well as interest.

The semi-annual meeting took place on the twenty-eighth of November in the morning; there was a celebration of the Holy Communion at Grace Church, with an address by the Bishop of Maryland in the afternoon. A largely attended missionary meeting, at which the speakers were the Bishop of Puerto Rico, Rev. Robert Burleson, representing the Board of Missions, the Rev. Harrington Littell, of Hankow, and Miss Sally Stewart, President of the Virginia Branch.


The spring meeting was held at Trinity Church, Towson, May 28th, and was under the immediate direction of Rev. Mr. Powers, Rector of the Parish. This being the annual business meeting, there was but one speaker, the Rev. Robert E. Woods of Wuchang, who gave an interesting talk

Corresponding Secretary's Report.



Another year's record of work impresses us with the privileges given us, the opportunities offered and of the use which we have or have not made of them.

In his address at the November meeting, the Bishop of Maryland reminded us that the glory of the Woman's Auxiliary was the patient, loving devotion of women to little things, not small but great in successful achievement. He acknowledged the helpfulness of contributions for Diocesan work and urged the women to more diligent, prayerful service, to give heed to the "coming days," the glory of the future when all scattered ones shall be brought back to Christ's Kingdom.

In his plea for Porto-Rico, the Bishop of Van Buren spoke with appreciation of women's work in the Mission Field.

Dean Burleson presenting the work of the Board of Missions, to whom the women are helpers, as implied by the word auxiliary, said their first duty was to make others understand what it is, the missionary society of the Holy Catholic Church. Each branch to share the obligation of the apportionment, which equalizes the expenses of a progressive campaign for the extension of the church in all lands.

The encouraging report to be given by the Foreign Committee shows that a responsive chord was touched by Rev. I. Harrington Littell's eloquent appeal for the needs of the Chinese Mission in Hankow. Stirring words from Miss Steuart, President of the Virginia branch, made us realize that the United Offering must hold an important place in our prayers and gifts, that our Thank-offering to be presented at the Triennial meeting, October third, prove us mindful of our blessings, specially of the priceless heritage of the American church, founded by our forefathers, three hundred years ago.

Removal from Maryland compelled the resignation of Mrs. F. W. English, the efficient and faithful United Offering treasurer. Mrs. Wilton Snowden fills the vacancy, visiting the branches and circulating leaflets, her enthusiasm has deepened interest in this noble offering which asks of every woman in the church, how can we help to make it an offering "rich and rare."

Missionaries from the Field have made us keenly alive to the great work being done and our share in doing it.

To St. Timothy's branch, Deaconess White presented for Bishop Brooke the great need of church extension in Oklahoma, meeting a helpful response.

At the annual service of the Grace branch, Bishop Wells, of Spokane, spoke of the growth and needs of his diocese, the privations of the missionary whose work was made possible by the women of the Auxiliary, to whom he never appealed in vain.

At an Epiphany meeting of the Emmanuel branch, Bishop Johnson, of South Dakota, and Rev. Robert E. Wood, of Muchang, China, gave a recital of their work that stirred deeply their hearers.

An unusually crowded audience filled Grace Chapel February 13th to hear from Dr. W. T. Grenfell the wonderful work done by a layman on the Labrador coast, exemplifying the power of the Christ life, "the joy of doing something for others for His sake who came to give and not to get."

To a missionary service of the Memorial branch March 10th, Rev. W. Cabell Brown, D. D., gave an interesting account of the work done in Brazil by a few devoted missionaries, who fifteen years ago in faith and hope laid the foundation of this mission, so fruitful in results.

It is cause for congratulation that the claims of the Church Periodical Club are now presented by our correspondent, Mrs. West. Let each branch have its librarian to collect periodicals and magazines no longer used, which sent, are a boon to isolated missionaries,

We note growing interest in missionary study. Weekly meetings of different branches during Lent with study classes or talks about missions at home and abroad, which

with intercessory prayer, offer instrumentalities that enlarge our vision and deepen our own spiritual life.

At Memorial Church in Holy week there was a corporate celebration of the Holy Communion for the Woman's Auxiliary and the Girls' Friendly, drawing closer the bond of Christian love.

At a recent meeting at Emmanuel, Bishop Joiceleyne gave a vivid description of the earthquake in Jamaica, presenting the needs of fourteen churches in ruins. Towards their restoration \$100 was pledged from the Auxiliary.

We would not forget that the Bishop of Maryland asks for the continuance of the Silent Church Fund, \$300 annually, and \$65 towards the salary of the Locust Point Janitress. Most important is an annual contribution from each branch to the Central Fund, which defrays expenses of the organization, also that the reports be sent in promptly when the year's work closes, carefully reporting *all* contributions and their designations.

We note an encouraging gain in value of boxes sent and money offerings and welcome the formation of a branch at St. Stephen's, Severn Parish.

We record with grateful appreciation the readiness of our beloved President to every claim upon her time for the benefit of the Auxiliary, not only in our own but in other dioceses, also the generous giving of her Illustrated Lecture on "Colonial Churches in Maryland" to increase the sum pledged for the Catechetical School, Hankow, China.

Each year "we count how grows in Paradise our store."

We miss today the presence of our beloved first vice-president, Mrs. Hugh Holmes Lee, who was called to "higher service," May twenty-fifth, after eighteen years of devoted service, and twenty-one years the faithful treasurer of the Emanuel branch. We cherish her memory and abiding influence—teaching us something of the joy of "servants of Christ doing His pleasure."



Indian Aid Committee.

Summing up the work done for Indian Missions, we gratefully record the inspiration given by visits from the coadjutor Bishop of South Dakota, the Rt. Rev. Frederick F. Johnson. In addresses to the Emmanuel branch, and to a largely attended missionary service at Ascension Church, he paid a noble tribute to Bishop Hare, whose sagacious forethought, gentle patience and unswerving steadfastness has transformed the condition of that Indian country, forty years ago a wilderness. Now dotted with churches, where the native clergy hold their position with fidelity, and sixty trusty laymen are doing faithful work for Christ. At their last convocation, the year's offering from the Indian women was \$3,500. May we not ask, "what shall we render for all the benefits He hath done unto us?" Though we have missed the Indian Lace Sale, a contribution has been sent to "the Sybil Carter Indian Mission and Lace Industry." Failing health compelling rest from her activity in behalf of this work which has done wonders for the uplifting of Indian women, friends and helpers of Miss Carter make it an established organization.

Indian missions now established in 14 dioceses, the work appeals for continued support and prayerful interest.

Report of Foreign Committee.

The Foreign Committee held five meetings at the Diocesan Library. It has enlarged its numbers by asking for two representatives from each parish, and it has also issued a leaflet giving a history of the Committee's work, since its formation in March, 1904.

The deficit of \$213 on sum pledged for the Hankow Catechetical School has been made up by the proceeds of an illustrated lecture by Mrs. Albert Sioussat on "The Early Colonial Church in Maryland," given at Arundell Club Hall, on Thursday, March 7th. This lecture was very generously offered for this purpose by Mrs. Sioussat.

The special work for 1907 was the raising of money for the purchase of the ground for the new Training School at Hankow. Rev. S. Harrington Littell has aroused much enthusiasm for this all over the country and made a stirring appeal for it at the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in November, 1906. He brought with him a card scheme for raising the amount needed, which has proved most effective and popular. The Foreign Committee felt that it could do no less than pledge the \$875 still lacking, and has more than redeemed the pledge. Nearly every branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese pledged itself for one or more cards at \$25 each, and general interest was aroused.

On April 8th, 1907, the Annual Ingle Memorial Service was held in Emmanuel Chapel, the preacher being the Rev. G. T. Helfenstein of St. John's, Howard County. After the service an informal meeting was held in the Parish House, at which Mrs. Pancoast, of Philadelphia, told of the work of the Pennsylvania Foreign Committee. It is gratifying to note the increased amounts which pass through the hands of our Treasurer, whose report will be found in full on another page.

The Foreign Committee is now the authorized channel through which all gifts for Foreign Missions from the Woman's Auxiliary of Maryland should pass. It is earnestly urged that all contributions for Foreign Work should be sent direct to the Treasurer, Miss Elizabeth Chew Williams, 407 West Lanvale Street, who will promptly acknowledge and forward them to the Church Missions House in New York. Each parish will be credited with the amount it sends in *The Spirit of Missions*, and also in the Annual Report of the Maryland Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

President's Report.



There is a temptation to retrospect as to the beginning and growth of the Junior Department in this report, as it completes the first ten years of its existence, but beyond the usual brief review of the year's work I will add to the statement of its age, only an expression of thankfulness and gratitude for its steady growth in intelligent interest, earnest purpose and generous giving, and to express the hope that the coming ten years may hold an even greater progress in what constitutes the ideal church society, viz: spirituality of purpose. That quality which so blesses the worker as to make the work a cheerful service, instead of merely a duty.

There are only a few parishes where there is not a branch, and as it becomes more and more recognized as an excellent means of developing a sense of personal responsibility towards the Church's work, we hope, in time, there will be this nucleus of good church workers in every parish.

The yearly Missionary Service was held on Sunday afternoon, January 11th, in St. Peter's Church, and was arranged by the rector the Rev. R. F. Humphries, who gave a cordial address of welcome and of encouragement, and we also gratefully acknowledge the kindness of the Rev. Dr. Arthur Kinsolving, who gave a strong address on Missionary Fields and Workers, with special mention of work in Brazil.

Another feature was the hearty singing, and we feel grateful every year to have the stimulus of this service to increase our interest and enthusiasm. The offertory was divided between the work of the Rev. F. Hughson, in Tennessee, and Mission Work in Maryland.

The yearly business meeting was held on Saturday afternoon, May 11th, in the Parish House of Emmanuel Church. After a cordial welcome from the rector the Rev.

Dr. Eccleston, there were read reports from twenty-three parish branches, followed by an inspiring talk on China by the Rev. Robert E. Wood, of the China Mission, and the answering of questions on the children's number of the "Spirit of Missions," and on the "United Offering."

Among the various items reported were several scholarships. One, the Memorial Scholarship to Bishop Ingle in Hankow, China, the "Wm. M. Dame" Scholarship in South Dakota, the "J. H. H. Eccleston" Scholarship in St. Mary's Orphanage, Shanghai, China, and two in St. Paul's School, Beaufort, N. Carolina.

In the foreign fields money was sent for Miss Ridgely's work in Africa, for that of the Rev. J. Armistead Welbourne in Tokyo, Japan, to the Chinese Famine Fund, and to Bishop Jocelin, Jamaica, in the foreign fields.

In the domestic fields, to Porto Rico, Alaska, South Dakota, Oneida, Arizona, Asheville, Arkansas, and in our own diocese of Maryland.

Separate Christmas boxes were sent to Blowing Rock, N. Carolina, Ragged Mountains (Virginia), Springfield and Beaufort, and ten branches united in boxes to the Rev. Luke C. Walker (Indian Priest) to supply gifts for the Christmas festivals of his four chapels in South Dakota.

Other joint work was the raising of thirty-seven dollars towards the Hankow Building Scheme, twenty-five towards the salary of an Indian teacher, forty towards the class room in St. Paul's College, Tokyo, Japan, (this last appeal being undertaken by Juniors of all dioceses), and lastly, an offertory at the general meeting which (added to money in hand) amounted to \$157.00 for the United Offering.

Besides this report of giving, we have made a new beginning towards the systematic study of Missions, a committee having been appointed whose plans have been carefully drawn up, and presented to every Parish branch.

Japan was the country recommended for study this year, and special books named and provided.

In this connection there is need of young women who are willing to join Mission Study Classes with a view of becoming leaders, that our work may grow.

After the close of last year's work there entered into rest our faithful Treasurer, Miss Louisa Lay, who was called to "higher service" in June, and to whom more special tribute was recorded in that report.

Since then we have lost our faithful Secretary, Miss Mary Sifford by removal, and we testify also, to her most loyal and devoted service.

We are fortunate in their successors, and feel grateful for their willingness and fitness.

This report is thankfully given. Notwithstanding there have been several changes and losses, we have been greatly encouraged by the loyalty of both leaders and members.

We have added one new branch, that at St. Paul's Guild House, which is strong in numbers and interest. My heart is cheered by the loyalty and cooperation of diocesan and parish officers, and I testify to this fact as the reason of our greatest strength, and from it take courage and hope for an even larger future for the Junior Department.
