The United Offering of 1913.

At the conference of diocesan officers held in Cincinnati October 8th, the question of the object for the United Offering of 1913 was one of the most important matters to be decided. After careful consideration, the resolution offered by the committee appointed by the conference was unanimously adopted. It is as follows:

Resolved, That the United Thank-offering of 1913 be given to the Board of Missions for Woman's Work in the Mission field, including the training, testing, sending and support of women workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$20,000 be devoted to buildings for the use of women workers, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also, that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly as the Lord hath prospered them.

A Prayer for More Workers

Almighty God, Lord of the harvest, we humbly beseech Thee to send forth more labourers into thy harvest, and especially to put into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to Thy work in the Mission field; that so the bounds of Thy blessed kingdom may be enlarged; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

A Prayer for the Diocese

Blessed Lord, who has taught thy children to pray for each, send Thy blessing upon the Diocese to which I belong. Give grace to its Bishops and clergy, that they may win souls to Thee, and guide Thy people in the narrow way. Grant to us growth and increase, if it be Thy will, and teach us to give largely of our substance, for the glory of Thy name and the work of Thy holy Church. Make these souls, for whom Thou hast died, true to Thee, to all their vows and duties in this life, and so prepare them for the joys of thy heavenly kingdom, for thy mercy's sake, O blessed Jesus, who with the Father and Holy Ghost livest and reignest, one God, world without end. Amen.

Report for Maryland Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

It is with great thanksgiving that we come together for our usual greetings on the completion of this peaceful and profitable fiscal year of our auxiliary work. We have gone on our ways serenely, regretting the changes that have come to us through resignation or death, but strong in the conviction that we still retain the interest and devotion of those who have been our fellow-workers here, whether they still bless us with their earthly presence, although unable to bear the weight of official work, or whether they have been called to higher service, we are yet one in the Body of Christ.

In supplement to the able secretarial reports must come some wider outlook into the forces shaping the work of the world today, and so we take a backward glance not only over our past year, but on the triennium from 1907 to 1910, which has brought such wonderful awakening all along the line of missionary work.

The Pan-Anglican Conference, although now belonging to past history, not only sent abroad its quickening power into all English-speaking lands, but it continues to wield a substantial influence through its central committee of woman's church work—a continuous committee of one of the most helpful divisions of labor in that great scheme. Continued along the lines on which it was organized, under the same officers, it is taking up not only missionary questions, but is dealing with other problems of the day.

It is with great pleasure and profit that Maryland takes her place in these councils, thus affording an opportunity for our women to share in these larger influences which will go out to many lands.

For their spring gathering a paper was prepared on "How Women May Help to Form a Right Public Opinion on the Question of Divorce." It has been duly forwarded to the Hon. Mrs. Montgomery, at Bishop Bourne, Chiswick, London, and acknowledgement, with the minutes of their meeting, arrived just before this goes to press. Each member of the committee is asked to give them as wide circulation as possible, and

so the resolution made is given in this report, and only the desire to prevent undue expansion deters us from presenting the minutes entire.

At the close of the discussion it was determined to send a resolution to the Royal Commission on Divorce in the following terms:

"The Central Committee of Women Church Workers, consisting of representatives of church women from dioceses in every part of the world, desire to express to the members of the Royal Commission the earnest hope that there may be no increase either of the courts which have jurisdiction in divorce proceedings, or of the grounds upon which divorce may be legally obtained, as they believe that any such increase would weaken the sense of the sanctity of marriage in the minds of the people, and the strength and stability of family life."

These questions lie at the root of the strength and purity of our national life, without which we have no right to expect to cope with the problems of Christianizing the people who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death.

The Laymen's Missionary Movement has also brought a great tidal wave of enthusiasm and good fellowship into our midst. We shall not soon forget the stirring meeting held at the Lyceum, when, side by side with the officers of the Woman's Missionary Societies of the religious bodies about us, we heard the message from lands afar, and joined our prayers and praises for all that had been done and for all that might be accomplished when we had cleared away some of the barriers of conventionality among those who profess and call themselves Christians.

Latest of all the press brings to us the note of preparation for the great World's Conference at Edinboro—that gathering from which so much is expected, and which will doubtless bring forth fresh fruit in some now unforeseen way for the furtherance of the healing of the nations.

Within our own borders a signal advance was made, when, outside of our usual method of work, quite apart (by the express wish of the Board of Missions) from the Woman's Auxiliary, already laden with pledges, an appeal for the Foreign Field came through the Philadelphia Committee organized by Miss Coles, who has so often "provoked us to good works" in her consecrated life and strong personality; supplemented by Miss Carter, of St. Timothy's, Catonsville, in a similar committee for Baltimore. A fine meeting was arranged and held

in the ballroom of Mrs. Barton Jacobs, whose generous hospitality furnished this opportunity for the telling of the story of St. Paul's College, Tokyo. The earnest welcome and stimulating foreword was given by our own Bishop Co-Adjutor of Maryland, and from the Bishop Co-Adjutor of Southern Virginia—the charge to us as church women to consecrate some part of our life interest and worldly gear to the helping of those who without it could never attain to our fulness of privilege—followed by the simple and touching presentment of Mrs. Pancoast, of Philadelphia, who made us see and feel the great needs of the hour and our privilege in meeting them.

We have thus had some part in the contribution of over \$1,800 for the making ready of the ground whereon the greater St. Paul's College shall stand, and where, when it has been put into the hearts of those who can help to do so, will rise its walls, from whence its influence may go down through the centuries in the Christian education of the Empire of Japan.

For our own home work, sincere congratulations are due each one of you in the fulfilment of our pledges—first for the silent churches, which marks our first work for our Bishop in the early days of his Episcopate, and that there is, as well, at the close of this year the sum requested by our Bishop Co-adjutor to assist in the Parish House Fund. It is not only in the production of the money, but the touch with those who are trying to help themselves, the uplift of their hands, in this erection of centres from which parish life may expand into yet broader touch with the world beyond, and for which centres appeals are found in every movement for the betterment of the world, civil and religious, today.

The great anxiety of the day is for our united offering. Not only do we sympathize with our Treasurer, whose indisposition keeps her from us today, but we look with dismay at the comparatively small sum now in hand. We can only say that great things have been done in short periods before. Let us trust that we may forge ahead in our few remaining weeks to our full measure—may we not hope beyond it?

Report of Recording Secretary.

The number of Parish Branches is fifty-six, the two new branches that have formed since last reported being St. Paul's, Linganore Parish, and St. James' Chapel, Irvington. During the year there have been eight regular but no special meetings of the Executive Board. The average number of branches represented at these meetings has been eighteen, a larger attendance than in past years. The Semi-Annual Meeting took place December 8th, 1909, at Grace Church. In the morning there was a celebration of the Holy Communion, with an address by the Bishop Co-Adjutor of the Diocese.

The luncheon at Hazazer's Hall was followed by a very largely attended missionary meeting, with addresses by Bishop Murray, Miss Emery and Dr. Correll, of Japan.

The Annual Business Meeting was held at St. John's Church, Mt. Washington, on the afternoon of May 25th.

Reports of the year's work were presented and the annual election held, resulting as follows:

Addresses were made by Bishop Murray and by Rev. Wilbur Watkins, Rector of St. John's, and due notice was taken of the fact that Mrs. Sioussat this day celebrated the twentieth anniversary of her appointment as President of the Maryland Auxiliary. The meeting was well attended, and much interest was displayed.

Refreshments were afterwards most kindly provided by the ladies of St. John's Branch.

Corresponding Secretary's Report.

The real work of the year began with the largely attended Semi-Annual Meeting, held December 8th, a somewhat later date than usual.

The Bishop Co-Adjutor most kindly took charge of the day, preaching in the morning at Grace Church on Auxiliary Work from a Spiritual Aspect, and speaking in the afternoon on Practical Methods of Carrying it On. His thoughtful remarks on the necessity of system in raising money for mission work made a deep impression, and at the close of his address a unanimous vote of thanks was tendered him, together with a pledge that Maryland Auxiliary would raise for Diocesan Work the full amount of \$600, for which the Bishop had so clearly shown the need.

Miss Emery then talked briefly of her journey round the world, and gave a touching account of some of her experiences in the Mission Field of China.

She was followed by Rev. Dr. Correll, of Japan, who made so moving an appeal for assistance in raising the Building Fund in his own mission at Tsu that over \$200 was pledged on the spot by the various Branches represented. Altogether, this largely attended meeting was marked by an unusual spirit of enthusiasm, and was an encouraging beginning of the season's work.

At the December meeting of the Executive Board arrangements were made to put into effect Bishop Murray's suggestion of apportioning to each Parish Branch the amount it should properly contribute to the two funds for which he had plead—\$300 for the silent churches and \$300 for building parish houses. A committee, consisting of the three Secretaries and the Treasurer, was appointed for the purpose. They carefully undertook the work, and in January sent to each branch a statement of what they hoped it would contribute to each fund. The suggestions were based on thorough investigation of what each Branch had voluntarily done for Diocesan Work

in the last three years, and as a result nearly every suggestion was received with satisfaction, and at this date the whole sum of \$600 has been paid in with comparative ease to all concerned.

The general interest in auxiliary work has been well maintained. In various churches and parish houses there have been special missionary addresses and meetings from time to time. Many boxes have been prepared and sent out in answer to appeals from the Church Missions House, and it is pleasant to state that every appeal of this kind received from Miss Emery has been fully answered.

On Tuesday of Holy Week the members of the Auxiliary and of the Girls' Friendly Society arranged a "Quiet Day for Church Women." The services were held at Christ Church, and consisted of a celebration of the Holy Communion by the Bishop Coadjutor, followed by a most interesting series of meditations on "The Approach to God," conducted by Rev. Wm. Cleveland Hicks, of Cumberland. From beginning to end the services were restful, helpful and inspiring, and all who were present united in hearty thanks to Bishop Murray, Mr. Hicks and Dr. Niver, who had each in his different way contributed so greatly to their spiritual welfare.

The routine work of the Auxiliary has gone on as usual. Occasional visits for encouragement have been made to the newer Branches by the different officers. New Secretaries for the Babies' Branch and for the Church Periodical Club have been appointed, and are faithfully doing the work. The more we do the more we find to do. The work set before us broadens day by day, yet surely we may say with humble gratitude that as the field of our duty widens, so also does our vision. We close our year with thankfulness that even in small measure the Maryland Auxiliary has by work and prayer done something for the cause of missions, and with firm resolve to strive still harder to bear our own full part in the widespread missionary movement that calls at last all Christians to unite in winning the world for Christ.

Report of President of Junior Auxiliary.



The yearly meeting of the Junior Department was held on Saturday afternoon, May 14, in the Parish House of St. Paul's Church. The meeting was opened by the Bishop Coadjutor, the Rt. Rev. John Gardner Murray, who gave us a most helpful and inspiring address, and whose presence was greatly appreciated, as was that of the Rector, who gave us a cordial greeting. To give quotations from only a few of the reports read by Parish Secretaries will suffice to emphasize the growth in not only generous giving, but the spirit in which the gifts have been made. Reports which showed not only attention to systematic giving, but to work which was nearest home, as well as that far away. For example, from one was read that a Christmas box had been sent to Morganton, N. C., scrap books for the children at a city hospital, a crippled child clothed for the winter, money contributed for all general pledges, and the year's work closed with a gift of \$58 to the "United Offering."

Another reported a Lenten offering of \$64 for domestic missions, an offering of \$74 for St. Margaret's School (Tokyo, Japan), \$25 toward the United Offering, and \$165 toward their "parish assessment," and, in addition, it was considered necessary to have missionary talks and to be fully informed upon every object considered."

Another Branch organized in February of this year with a membership of 15 reported sewing done throughout Lent for the Girls of St. Mary's-on-the-Mountain, Sewanee, Tennessee, and a gift of \$20.00 towards the "United Offering."

Another had its weekly meetings opened by members "in turn," and the Junior prayers said in unison, "and after the filling of all regular pledges" reported that \$100 had been raised to endow, in perpetuity, one day of every year in Christ School, in memory of the late Rev. C. C. Griffith, for whom the Branch is named.

Another branch, whose share of the united Christmas box to South Dakota was valued at \$45, reported having given as happy a Christmas in gifts to poor of the parish, and among other gifts had sent \$15 toward the endowment fund of St. Andrew's School for Boys (in Tennessee) and \$15 towards the "United Offering." Besides missionary readings, this branch had assumed the Christmas entertainment for the Sunday School, giving the missionary play entitled "A Dream of Dolls," which, they said, "did much to broaden the missionary vision of the actors as well as the audience."

Another branch, which celebrated its first birthday, reported with smaller gifts—one of \$30 to St. Margaret's School in Tokyo, Japan, having taken Japan for study as well as work, the course of instruction commencing with object lessons on Japan, followed by a series of talks. Several papers were prepared by members, and from time to time questions upon "A Missionary Catechism" were asked. Attention is called to this because it is an unusual record of study for a first report.

Another, after a fine report of systematic giving in many ways amounting to over \$150, ends with a sentence which showed the leaders' appreciation of the truest purpose of every church society—"My ideal is for the members of our Branch to grow in grace. I want every member to be the better spiritually for the time she spends at the meetings, and I would like to see you all grow into good church workers, faithful church goers, enthusiastic over church matters. I appeal to you to lay aside indifference, one of the worst enemies of Christianity, and, be your work successful or apparently otherwise, do something, and do it with your might and main, to further the Master's cause."

These extracts are from only a few of the many good reports, but enough to show that the increase in gifts is accompanied by a growing spirit of the giver, not only in a desire for knowledge of missions, but the blessing of a spirit of prayer.

Scholarships are still supported. One named in memory of the Rt. Rev. Addison Ingle, first Bishop of Hankow; one for the Rev. J. H. H. Eccleston, in St. Mary's Orphanage, Shanghai, China, and one for Rev. Wm. M. Dame, in South Dakota, besides one in St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, Japan, and three

in St. Paul's School, Beaufort, N. C. Many Christmas boxes were sent, the largest being the joint box containing 600 presents for the Indian boys and girls in charge of the Rev. Amos Ross, South Dakota, besides several to nearer points, such as the mountain missions of Virginia and North Carolina. Among the joint money gifts have been the furnishing of a table and chairs for the dining room of St. Andrew's Priory, Honolulu; money for Bishop Rowe's work in Alaska, and for that of Miss Ridgely, in Africa, to whom also was sent a Christmas box for her schoolgirls there, and \$25 towards the salary of an Indian teacher. Besides reports, the yearly meeting was unusually interesting, having an attendance of over 200, who not only listened to reports eagerly and sang missionary hymns with spirit, but presented an offertory of \$187 for the "United Offering." We acknowledge the courteous hospitality of the Parish Branch, whose members made our first meeting in the "Mother Parish" one to be remembered happily.

The Epiphany service was the usual impetus to renewed zeal, and was greatly enjoyed, although there was a note of sadness in realizing it to be the last to be held in St. Peter's Church, where (owing to the co-operation, encouragement and enthusiasm of the Rev. Wm. H. Falkner, the former rector, and the present, the Rev. R. F. Humphries) we have ever felt at home, and this service a memorable event each year.

The addresses were given by the Rector and the Rev. L. E. Goodwin (of Irvington, Md.), who gave a stirring account of personal experiences and of others in heathen lands, and the music was, as usual, rousing and beautiful, led by the St. Cecilia Guild.

One of the most successful meetings of the year was a "Conference for Students," held under the auspices of this department, and attended by over 300 students from different schools, and, although this meeting is not to be identified with any organization, the interest created in the first resulted in plans for making it of yearly occurrence. Three new branches have been added during the year, making a total enrollment of 36 branches. The monthly "executives" have been the usual "tie" binding the parish officers in a mutual interchange of interest, sympathy and co-working, and no report of mine is complete without a tribute to the loyal and devoted service

given by my fellow diocesan officers.

Mission Study Classes have not been well taken up as yet, but we hope the small beginnings so cheerfully cherished and kept alive by our Educational Secretary may reach a bigger growth in time to reward her splendid efforts in this special line. She has conducted monthly intercessory services, missionary talks and encouraged missionary spirit in many ways.

We realize that many methods are necessary under the head of Mission Study, and gladly urge attention to this important feature, that with greater knowledge every Junior may realize herself a stone in the great fabric of Christ's Church, and account (more and more) for her "talent" with faithful and intelligent service, so hallowing her work with knowledge, prayer and work as to bring herself the highest reward of more and more love for Him for whom she builds.
