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

B Y - L A W S .

I. THERE shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting: and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, &c.," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such Delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each Division of the work undertaken by said church, or any of its working societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special Meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else, not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be requisite to form a quorum.

FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

FIVE years of the work of the MASSACHUSETTS BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS has been completed.

With thankfulness to God, we acknowledge a steadily increasing interest in the Diocese, in the subject of Woman's work in the Church.

The Rectors in nearly all the parishes have organized bands of workers, for preparing boxes or packages of clothing for hospital and school supplies, for different missionaries and mission stations. These have not only lightened the burdens and cheered the hearts of the recipients, but have given to the workers at home an inestimable blessing, in the consciousness that they personally are doing something, for the increase of Christ's Kingdom on earth.

It is not only in the preparing of boxes that we are engaged. Much money has been raised, as will be seen by the Treasurer's Report, to found scholarships at various mission stations at home and abroad; to pay insurance dues on the lives of missionaries; to pay for outfits and travelling expenses of missionaries newly starting for their untried work; and to pay salaries guaranteed by us.

The General Board of Missions has most fittingly assigned to the Woman's Auxiliary this work.

The methods used by us to carry on our work are our public meetings, held monthly, where the latest information, received in regular correspondence of the secretaries of the different divisions with the missionaries, is reported to the ladies, and these letters are loaned to the parish delegates to read in their societies whenever desired; printed reports and leaflets of missionary intelligence are distributed, and all the most pressing wants are here made known. Any parish desiring special work, by corresponding with our committee, can receive a list from which to choose, according to their ability to do for the faithful workers at the front.

It is by making known the deprivations and necessities of the missionaries, with faith and belief that the christian women of our church will gladly do what they can to help them, that the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary is enabled, with the co-operation of the Bishop and clergy, to present so satisfactory a record.

There have been held, during the year, nine regular monthly meetings with an average representation of 30 parishes.

The November meeting was a public one in Trinity Chapel during the Missionary Conference, and was largely attended by clergy and laity. After the transaction of business, we listened to an address from Mrs. Twing. The Bishop was then invited to take the chair. He introduced Archdeacon Kirkby, a missionary for twenty-seven years in British Columbia, who gave a most interesting account of his work among the Esquimaux and Indians. He was followed by Bishop Whipple, who, with great earnestness, told of the work in his diocese.

The anniversary of the Auxiliary was observed in Trinity Church on the evening of Sunday, Nov. 13th. Evening prayer was read by the Rev. Dr. Phillips Brooks and Mr. Allen. The sermon was by the venerable Archdeacon Kirkby.

The division reports which follow will give you detailed accounts of the year's work.

You will notice by the Treasurer's report a steady increase in the annual receipts, being an excess of \$4,109.97 over last year, and nearly twice as much as the first year of our work.

DOMESTIC DIVISION.

THE Domestic Committee acknowledge, with great pleasure, the interest manifested by many parishes in the work which, nearly five years since, was committed to their care by the Bishop of the Diocese, and can also report a gradual increase, not only in the number of new helpers whom they have gladly welcomed, but in the number and value of the offerings made by these working parishes. May their prayers have gone up with these offerings as a memorial before God!

Sixty-nine boxes or packages of varied character and value have been sent during the last year, on errands of love into twenty-three missionary jurisdictions and dioceses, including our own, and have cheered, we trust, many a missionary household. Those only who have known the privations of some of our clergymen and their families can fully realize the benefit of the assistance thus rendered to them. One of our Bishops, to whom a box was sent for distribution among his Clergy, writes: "These boxes do a vast deal of good. I cannot tell you how acceptable they are to people who have little." And another—a Western Bishop—writes: "Our missionary and charitable work in this new land rests on such a slender basis, that every help is highly appreciated."

Our brethren in Michigan, literally tried in the furnace of affliction, received many tokens of remembrance which were thankfully accepted, and the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, both here and elsewhere, was gratefully acknowledged. St. Luke's Hospital in Denver, Col., for which assistance was asked in our last Report, received a box from two of our parishes.

Aid is still desired for it; and particulars respecting its work and needs will be given by the Secretary of this Committee.

The necessities of St. Mark's Hospital, which has lately been enlarged, and of the "Clothing Room," in Salt Lake City, Utah, were remembered by some of our parish societies. The charities of the Church in that great Mormon centre always need our help, and we trust that it will never be withheld from the faithful workers there.

To the Cadle Home, Green Bay, Wis., and to the Children's Hospital in Omaha, Neb., other of the boxes were sent; and gifts will doubtless be acceptable to them again the coming year, as also to those of our own diocesan institutions which were likewise remembered.

A few of the boxes were sent to Missionary Sunday Schools; and the Committee hope to hear of such boxes being sent this year to many poor children of the Church, to brighten their Christmas holidays with gifts prepared by the children of our own Sunday schools; for as upon these, in a few years, will devolve much of the active work of the Church, it is well that they should early learn the blessedness of cheerful giving.

More than half of the money given through this Committee was contributed for the endowment of the "Bed" in the "Fannie C. Paddock Memorial Hospital," of Washington Territory, for which an appeal was made to the ladies of the diocese last spring, and to which a very gratifying response has been given. Many individual gifts, some of large amount, have been received, and a few parishes have responded. But that this "Bed" may truly be endowed by the church-women of Massachusetts, the Committee ask for an offering from every parish, which, whether large or small, will be gratefully received. The Hospital was opened in April of this year, and commenced its charitable work in loving memory of her whose name it bears, and whose works thus do follow her as she rests from her labors in the Paradise of God. About \$1200 are required to complete the endowment, and it is hoped that this amount may be given in time to present the "Bed" as an Easter offering, acceptable, we cannot doubt, to Him who "took our infirmities, and bare our sicknesses."

A part of Sister Eliza's salary was paid as usual, and we trust that her work will not be forgotten by her friends.

The payment has been reported to our Treasurer of six scholarships for St. Mark's School in Salt Lake City, two being new ones, to be called the "Arthur Memorial," and the "Mary A. Morrison." Another was not pledged beyond the present year; but is there not some one who will provide for its continuance, in memory, it may be, of some dear child or friend? Mrs. Tuttle writes, "that the Bishop's schools would utterly fail, could they not have just such help as these scholarships give, to meet the heavy expenses which they entail."

The Committee earnestly hope that during the ensuing year there will be no decrease in any part of the work, but that all who have helped in the past will continue their assistance in the future, and that many more of the parishes may take part in these ministries of love. The missionary work of the Church is an ever increasing one, and so should that of its helpers be. In addition to boxes forwarded directly to missionary households, it is hoped that others may be sent to one or more of our Bishops for distribution, as only by their agency can the needs of some of the Clergy be supplied.

By application to the Secretary of this Committee, missionary letters may

be obtained by societies or individuals desiring them, or any information which she can give in regard to objects for work. Let us not, however weary and faint hearted we may sometimes be, rest contented with what we have already done in our Lord's service, but, as He gives us the time and ability, continue our work till of each one it can be said, "she hath done what she could."

INDIAN AND FREEDMEN DIVISIONS.

THE Dakota League has collected the last year for the two objects committed to its care, nearly nine thousand dollars; over three thousand dollars in money, and boxes valued at nearly six thousand. Of these amounts, a little more than one third went to the Freedmen, a larger proportion than last year, and the entire offerings to this work are greater by more than a thousand dollars. This is one source of gratification to the Committee, and another is, that larger contributions in *money* have been given to Indian Missions and less in boxes. The need for boxes is in no sense outgrown, only we deprecate any feeling that they can entirely take the place of money contributions. We want money always, for Paul Caryl Zotom, and for the scholarships, for some special appeals which are made to us from time to time, and for the general work. For the Freedmen, we are always pledged to Mrs. Payne's salary; and there are many ways in which the whole work at Petersburg might be made more efficient. It is a large city, with a large colored population; and the Rev. Mr. Cooke's school forms an excellent nucleus for religious and charitable work. The Committee feel that they cannot emphasize too much the opportunity here afforded us to aid in strengthening the Theological Seminary, and large school, and in establishing an orphanage, an infirmary, and other desirable enterprises on a permanent basis. Mrs. Payne writes, that every day, and almost every hour, applications are received for teachers from the School to go in all directions, so that we see how widespread its influence must be. Nor would we refuse our sympathy to other workers among the Freedmen, some of whose names appear in our Treasurer's Report, and all of whom it is a great pleasure to help as we are enabled by others to do so.

This is the tenth Annual Report of the Dakota League as a diocesan Society, and we pause for a moment to think over its work. It is in reality eighteen years since its formation, for in a Chronology of Indian missions published not long ago, the Dakota League appears as the earliest organized of all the Indian associations of the Church, having been begun as a parish society in Emmanuel Church, Boston, in 1864. In those old days, it only tried to raise one hundred and fifty dollars a year, and perhaps to send one box of clothing. Compare this with the figures given to-day, and let us be thankful that God has taught so many to remember His Indian children.

The impetus given to the work by the Dakota League becoming a Diocesan

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Society in 1872, was certainly remarkable, as the first year the contributions amounted to nearly five thousand dollars. The two following years they reached a higher point than they have at any time since, although the number of parishes contributing was less than at present; thus leading us to fear that possibly we have not quite fulfilled the early promise of the Society. But may it not be urged that in those days the Dakota League had the field entirely to itself (as far as Woman's Missionary Associations in Massachusetts were concerned), and that now the number of interests has increased and the *whole* contributions are very much larger. For in 1878 came another great change, when the League became a part of the larger society which has committees for all branches of mission work; and to the League, by the Bishop's request, was given another charge, that of the Freedmen.

At first, we were perhaps inclined to look a little askance at these black brothers, and to wonder if they ever could claim as large a share of our regard as the red men had so long possessed. But we soon learned to feel that it was most wise thus to put the two races together, and that with all the differences in their situations, the points of resemblance were greater; it became easy to consider them together, so that now we should feel deeply grieved if we did not have the Freedmen. It may be said that the contributions to the Freedmen, the first year that we began to receive them, were just about what those to the Indians were in the early days of the Dakota League, that is, less than two hundred dollars. This year, we report in all for the Freedmen over thirty-three hundred dollars, which is truly encouraging.

To sum up the contributions for these ten years, we find them to be—for the Indians, in money and boxes, over fifty-six thousand dollars; and for the Freedmen (for four years and a half) about eighty-five hundred.

A look into the past is occasionally desirable and profitable, but it can never be prolonged, and therefore with truly grateful hearts for what has been accomplished, we turn back to our part in the present. We work with a wholly different atmosphere surrounding efforts for the Indian, than did the founders of this League,—an atmosphere of sympathy and co-operation, allies having arisen in unexpected quarters, and the air being full of eloquent voices urging mercy and justice for him. Let us be true, then, to the standard of the past, and try to carry it ever higher and higher, so that we, in our turn, may be an inspiration to those who shall receive the work from our hands.

MEXICAN DIVISION.

LAST autumn you heard, in the Report of the retiring Secretary of the Mexican Division, an appeal to your friendliness towards the new Committee; and now they are glad to acknowledge the kindness, the sympathy and generous support with which you have always met them.

We are sorry to tell you that we must also give a parting message from

our chairman, who, to our great regret, and her own, having been obliged to leave the diocese, has resigned. She hopes, however, to leave her work to one who will receive the kind welcome that you have always given to her.

In summing up the work of the year, let us first remind you that to the work of the Mexican Division has been added the care of Cuba and Haiti. In both these departments we have received encouragement and help. The only work possible for Cuba, there being now no mission of our Church in the island, was the outfit provided for our prospective missionary now at school preparing for his work, and he can doubtless depend upon our aid for the coming winter.

With regard to Haiti, Bishop Holly's school has especially appealed to us. We have not been so successful as we hoped in supplying tools for its workshops, owing partly to our inexperience in such things, and partly to the lack of funds; but we have now nearly enough, and hope to send the box in a few weeks. The family of a clergyman in Haiti has received a supply of clothing from the ladies of Christ Church, Springfield; and we shall be happy if other parishes will come forward and undertake such work, which is quite in our province. We are also anxious to complete the insurance dues of one of the Haitian missionaries.

But when we look at the results of our labors for Mexico, we can have no feelings but of gratitude and hope. We have founded a new Scholarship in the Theological Seminary named for our Bishop, and another Scholarship has been taken by St. Paul's Church, Holyoke, in the Boys' Orphanage, Mexico. We have also assumed part of the salary of the Rev. Mr. Butler, the head of the Seminary. All these are new undertakings, and point to the fresh interest in Mexico springing up in Massachusetts. Five new parishes have also been added to our list in this department.

Our books show an increase over the receipts of last year of about \$127; but it must be remembered that we have undertaken new responsibilities, the expenses of which this increase by no means covers, so that we must take care that there is no decrease of offerings for general purposes.

The statement made by the Mexican Commission as the result of their investigations into the church government, and the favorable report of Mr. Winston, an honored member of the Board of Missions, after his visit to Mexico, have undoubtedly influenced public opinion in favor of the work. But, behind all this, we must believe that the character of the work itself, the fact that it is truly earnest and consecrated, and the vigor displayed in its wonderful growth, have made it hold its place in many hearts.

But yet, with all our causes for congratulation, the Mexican Church has far larger claims upon Massachusetts than she has ever recognized. Let us sketch briefly the wonderful rise of this church, its astonishing progress.

Remember the first planting of the Cross in America among these people. The Spaniards found that marvellous Aztec civilization, all the wealth and resources of an active, ingenious, and wonderfully patient race. The Church of Rome began its work. However tempered in individual instances with mercy, and lighted by spiritual grace, that work was carried on with remorseless cruelty, and the Cross planted above a ruined civilization, a degraded country, a broken-hearted people. Everywhere the blight of spiritual oppression and loose morality kept the land in ignorance and sloth. What the Church of Rome brought to those heathen people must not be overlooked. Compared with the religion which she supplanted, her teachings were light itself. But the state of the people spiritually, morally, in-

tellectually, after three hundred years of her supremacy, shows how unfaithfully she used her opportunities. Let us not hesitate to say that her day in Mexico is over. She has had time enough, and her oppressed people can testify that she has had power enough. Now let her depart,

“And leave her dolorous mansions to the peering day.”

While the North advanced to light and truth, Mexico, with all her natural gifts of climate and material resources, did not lift her head. At last the national spirit awoke. The establishment of political freedom, in 1821, was almost simultaneous with a religious awakening. We cannot now give the details of the reformation that followed. Read them for yourselves. It is enough for us to say that it took place all over Mexico, as it is taking place there now, in separate, humble hearts, by the opening of the long closed Bible. There is no movement of the Church that is showing more native vigor than this in Mexico. Among those same Aztec Indians, among their Spanish conquerors, in all directions from the Capital, new congregations are springing up and calling for instruction and ministry. There can be no more interesting spectacle than that of a church entering into the holy places of souls, casting out unworthy objects of worship, and enthroning once more the one God, in His gracious Three-fold manifestation—rejecting every appeal to the lower nature, and calling upon the supreme activity of the noblest faculties of the soul. Such a work is the Mexican Church striving to do. It has come out of the very needs of the people. It is the embodiment of their freed aspirations, after all these years of oppression.

Alas for the nation that, rising as Mexico is with wonderful rapidity into material wealth, political importance, and intellectual freedom, should be morally inert, spiritually dead! Mexico looks to us to avert from her such a fate. To us, her nearest neighbor, her instructor in her new arts, her model of government. Upon us her national Church depends in this critical period of infancy. The time will come when it will no longer need us,—when, standing by God's help upon its own foundation, it will be the central church for all the Spanish speaking people of this continent. But now its Bishop, whose own fortune has been poured out in its cause, is at the end of his private resources. The educational work must be carried on, to supply clergymen for the new parishes that will not be denied, and to train the children in religion and purity of life. They need their Book of Common Prayer to give them, as Mr. Winston says, “a dignified place and standing among the churches of christendom, to settle all doubts of the soundness of their faith, to be the ground work of their religious teaching and the guide in their religious worship. But they must be aided to publish it.”

Now in viewing such a work as this, what should be our feeling towards it? Surely not discouragement, though our capacity for helping it seems small. No—rather gratitude to our Lord, who in so showing His power among these people, has giving us the unspeakable blessing of aiding in His glorious work; joy in giving our alms, our labors, our prayers for its advancement; and perfect trust that He who has been so clearly present with its devoted martyrs in the past, is so clearly present with its earnest and self-sacrificing laborers now, will be with it always, even unto the end.

FOREIGN DIVISION.

WE feel that there is very much for which to be grateful, during the past year. In the great loss sustained by us, through Mrs. Morgan's resignation, the society has sympathized so warmly and so efficiently, that the record is, in many respects, more gratifying than the statistics alone would warrant, though they are fairly encouraging. The year has not fallen short of the preceding one in the amount of money received, though it exceeds it only by a few dollars. Three new scholarships and one memorial hospital bed have gladdened the hearts of the missionaries in China and Africa, one of the African being the first venture in the foreign field by the Church of the Ascension, Fall River, led by the devoted zeal of their present rector. The boxes requested for Japan and Africa were quickly and generously filled, and thoroughly appreciated. Last and best of all, through the "ready help" of a member of St. Paul's, Boston, the earnest appeal from China for women teachers was answered by the departure of Miss Bruce, in September, for Shanghai, in company with two ladies from other dioceses. The Mass. Branch of the Auxiliary has been paying the salary of Miss Pitman, of Japan, but her marriage rendering that no longer necessary, the New York Board has suggested that Miss Bruce should be adopted in her stead. Many of the parishes contributing have consented to the transfer, and the rest will no doubt do so, and we hope that those who have not yet helped will make such pledges as will insure the full amount for the future, without having to resort to donations and offertories to complete it.

Several parishes were gratified by a visit from the Rev. Mr. Fair last February, but he was unable to accept all the invitations extended to him.

An earnest entreaty has been received from New York, to do more towards insuring the lives of missionaries. It is an appeal that should meet a ready response from every heart, truly longing that the people sitting in darkness should see the great light, for it will burn with far greater steadiness and brilliancy if the bearers are free from anxiety for the dear ones left desolate, if they should be called upon to lay down their lives in the service.

In every branch of missionary work, the more we do, the more we must do; but on the other hand, the more we do, the more also, through Christ, we can do, and if, like David, we would refuse to give to God of that which costs us nothing, but would realize the infinite happiness of making some real sacrifice for Him, we should surely win the blessing which He has so emphatically promised: "Prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of Hosts, if I will not open you the windows of Heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."
