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

AT the close of the summer's rest, we are again met together to take up with renewed zeal and deepened love our labor for those whom God has, in a measure, committed to our care—those in far distant lands and in our own, who still grope without the light and comfort of that blessed Gospel which guides our own feet in the way of peace, and which bids us in our sorrows not to mourn as those who have no hope, and also for those who in Christ's name have gone forth to bring these wanderers in; but our hearts are saddened and our heads bowed as we see the chair vacant that has never been vacant before, and miss the voice that for so long has led us in our prayers for God's guidance in and blessing upon our work. We remember to-day with peculiar interest her last charge to us, her earnest plea that while the coming weeks would be full of rest and refreshment, we should not let the great missionary work flag.

For six years Mrs. CHICKERING has presided at our meetings with a grace and dignity that have won all hearts. The members of the Standing Committee alone know how much the success of the work is due to her. Gracious, wise and loving, she conciliated those who were opposed to the work, directed into proper channels the zeal of others, and when in our counsels opinions differed, such was our confidence in her superior judgment that we gladly yielded to her suggestions.

Gentle words of greeting and kindly sympathy have made her very dear to us, but more potent than either have been the consecrated heart and the ripe Christian character out of which we felt these graces flowed. God has called her home, but our loss is her infinite and blessed gain.

Whereas, Our Father in His infinite love and wisdom has removed from our midst our beloved President, we would not only humbly bow in resignation to His blessed will, but devoutly thank Him for the gentle way in which He led her through the valley and shadow of death—her eyes opening on the celestial glory ere she knew her call had come. Therefore

Resolved, That as members of the MASSACHUSETTS BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, we would express our heartfelt grief at the death of Mrs. HORATIO CHICKERING, the only President we have known, and our appreciation of her winning grace, womanly strength, and earnest religious life.

Resolved, That while we bless God's holy name for this His servant departed this life in His faith and fear, we would beseech Him to give us grace so to follow her good example, that with her we may be partakers of His blessed kingdom.

Resolved, That the MASSACHUSETTS AUXILIARY raise a memorial to Mrs. CHICKERING in testimony of its love for her and its appreciation of her Christian character.

Resolved, That a copy of the above be sent to the family of our late President, and that a copy also be entered upon the records of this Association.

BY-LAWS.

I. THERE shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting: and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, &c.," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such Delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each Division of the work undertaken by said church, or any of its working societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special Meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else, not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be requisite to form a quorum.

SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

THE work of the sixth year of the MASSACHUSETTS BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS has ended, and once more with grateful hearts we render thanks to Him, Who has seen fit to prosper us in the efforts we have made to aid those who, in Christ's name, go forth to preach and teach the glad tidings of great joy.

During the year just ended the missionary work has met with two great losses. In the death of the Rev. Dr. Twing, the church at large has been called to mourn for one, whose faith and courage in the great mission work never failed. In the death of our beloved President, the loss comes nearer home, and we shall listen in vain for the words which, during the past six years, have inspired in the hearts of her hearers new zeal and love for the Master's work; but though the voice is silent, and the form unseen, surely we may believe that God has but removed her to a higher sphere of work, and while He has taken her unto Himself, to us He has left the bright example of a pure and holy life. In the memory of Mrs. HORATIO CHICKERING, the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has received a rich legacy; with God's help let us be true to it.

During the year nine regular monthly meetings have been held, with an average representation of thirty-five parishes, a gain of five over last year, which is most encouraging as showing a growing confidence in the work.

A marked proof of interest in the Auxiliary has been shown by invitations extended to the Standing Committee to visit different parishes in the Diocese. The most important of these visits, was the one paid in November to S. Stephen's, Pittsfield. Each division was represented, and a regular auxiliary meeting held. This is not the place to record details of that meeting, but to those who accompanied our President on that journey, who knew of her brave determination to bear all fatigues and excitement of the occasion, and who understood her deep sense of its responsibility, as a means of furthering the work of the Auxiliary, it is a matter of profound gratitude that her gracious presence should have been welcomed in that distant parish, and her sweet influence felt among the people.

Another gain this year is the inauguration of the Sunday-School plan of quarterly mission Sundays, combining systematic training of the children in mission work, with penny collections where they can be made. This plan originated with the Foreign Committee, and has been kindly accepted already by a large number of the parishes.

The annual meeting was held on October 17th. The exercises of the day began with the celebration of the Holy Communion in St. Paul's Church, the Rev. Dr. Courtney officiating. In the afternoon the business meeting was held in St. Paul's Chapel, and was opened by the Rev. Dr. Courtney, who also made a short address. He was followed by Miss Emery, who gave most encouraging accounts of the increase and interest in the Auxiliary. Bishop Paddock being present, was invited to close the meeting, which he did after making a short address. A reception was then held, to which the clergy were invited, and was very fully attended.

The Anniversary of the Auxiliary was held in the evening of the same day, in St. Paul's Church. After Evening Prayer, a missionary sermon was preached by Rev. W. W. Newton, of Pittsfield.

In the following reports the detailed work of the different divisions will be found.

From the general treasurer's report you will notice a decrease of over \$2000 in the receipts for the past year; it is the first and we trust the last time such a report will ever be made.

DOMESTIC DIVISION.

BEFORE presenting the report of the work done by the Domestic Department during the past year, we wish to regret with you the resignation in the early part of the Winter of the secretary, who has so ably served in that department since the formation of the Massachusetts Branch of the Auxiliary. Her interest in the work was very deep, and her consecration so entire that we cannot cease to feel the influence of her example.

Now let us look, as briefly as possible, at what we have accomplished in the year just past, and also try to catch a glimpse of the hopes and needs for the year which lies before us.

The amount necessary for the endowment of the bed in the Fannie C. Paddock Memorial Hospital in Washington Territory has been raised, and the bed has been named Lucy Lee Chickering, in memory of our beloved President, for whom our hearts are now mourning. The completion of this fund has required a great deal of patient effort, and we wish to thank most heartily all those who have assisted by their contributions, either great or small.

Sister Eliza's salary, for which we are pledged \$100, has been paid as before. Let us hope that we may all remember what a useful and valuable work she is doing, and not let Massachusetts be backward in holding up her hands.

Our scholarships are all in Bishop Tuttle's school, at Salt Lake City. We are sorry to say that one of these has been unprovided for this year. The scholarships are very important. They enable the children who are brought out from the Mormon population to have a Christian education,

which they will get in no other way. The education of these children is our one great hope. The older people, if not firm in the Mormon faith, are many of them given up to Spiritualism, and a great proportion of them have been so deceived in the religion which they have left, that they say "we are tired and discouraged; give us no more religion of any kind."

St. Mark's Hospital at Salt Lake City, St. Luke's at Denver, Colorado, Cadle Home, Greene Bay, Wisconsin, and the Children's Hospital, Omaha, Nebraska, have all received help during the year, either in boxes or money. Many of the smaller parishes, which cannot supply the needs of a missionary family, are able to do acceptable work for these objects.

We wish that our boxes, which have brought joy to so many homes, may be in future larger in number and more generously filled than ever before. May we mention here the clerical suits, which are mountains in the eyes of so many of the parishes. The missionary must be clothed, and a clerical suit costs only \$22.50. Cannot nearly all of the parishes by a little effort supply them when desired?

The number of boxes sent has not been so large as in the year 1882. This we regret, and can account for only by recalling the terrible sufferings caused by the fires which raged in Michigan last year, and which so enlisted your sympathies. We are glad to tell you, however, that our receipts for 1883 are far in advance of those for 1881.

We hope in the year now opening to do something more than in the past toward the building of churches and schools.

Relying upon your interest, we have partially pledged \$150 for a scholarship in the girls' school at Bolivar, West Tennessee. This scholarship is to be for the benefit of missionaries' daughters. We shall be glad to receive annual pledges from parishes or individuals for this object.

In closing, may we urge each parish in the diocese to try to do something for those who have not the opportunities and blessings which even the weakest of our churches enjoys? If each parish in Massachusetts will do the most that with earnest effort it can do, the result will be something of which we can now have no conception.

"Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down and shaken together and running over shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again."

INDIAN AND FREEDMEN DIVISIONS.

(IN CHARGE OF THE DAKOTA LEAGUE.)

THE first thought that comes to the mind in connection with the heading of this Report, is the fact that no principle has been more urged in these days than the duty of the strong races to try and elevate the weaker ones. This principle is as old as St. Paul: "We that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak." And while there is no guarantee that we shall not

have discouragements, ingratitude, a hundred things to contend with, yet as long as one race stands a single step above another, it must never be contented until it has raised that other up to itself. If this principle be involved in all christian civilization, nay, if it lies at the very root of the religion of Him, "who humbled Himself even to death, that He might make us the children of God," shall we consider it too high and holy a motive to animate us in dealing with these two races, alien to our nationality and yet inextricably bound up with the fortunes of this country? Is it not strange that a free, rich nation of nearly fifty millions of white people, inheriting all the best life of the centuries, should grope and stumble so long and sadly in dealing with a comparative handful of savage Indians, whose destinies are cast entirely into their hands! It is much that we are thinking about it more and more, and that some of the best minds in the nation are studying how to lift them up and guide them into an orderly, peaceful life.

The other race, the negro, is so different, and the task easier, and yet harder. They are already masters of their lives and property, and yet are ignorant, incapable of carrying the burden, while the whites in their immediate neighborhood are unable to cope alone with the gigantic task of fitting them for the duties thrust upon them.

Where are we, and what is our place in the solution of these problems? Is it unbecoming in us even to consider them? It can hardly be, for in the great conflict with darkness and wrong, there is a place for every one, and no soul is useless or unnecessary. Let us be glad that our own church has long taken such a forward stand for the help of the Indians, and in sustaining and advancing her efforts, there is room for vastly more energy than we have ever shown. Bishop Hare said last winter, how gladly, if he had the means, he would establish a new boarding-school at an agency in his own jurisdiction, where there were five thousand Indians, and no school of any sort. It is facts like these that make your committee long to have the enthusiasm within the church keep pace with that aroused in the last two or three years in so many new directions.

As to the Freedmen, the church seems awakened, and much will probably be said at the present General Convention. We want to be ready to take up and urge on whatever plans may be adopted. The Freedmen have waited long, but just so surely as there are human needs, however inarticulate, and perhaps unconscious, so surely at last will Christ-taught souls rise up to minister to those needs.

For the Indians this last year the Dakota League has given nearly nineteen hundred dollars in money, and thirty-five hundred dollars in boxes; for the Freedmen over nine hundred dollars in money, and twenty-five hundred dollars in boxes. Thus there has been a slight increase of receipts for the Freedmen, but for the Indians a decrease of about two hundred and fifty dollars in all. We regret this latter fact, but cannot think it more than a temporary thing, for now, when so many are caring for the Indians who never thought of them before, we who have so long watched and worked for them, cannot be left behind, we are confident.

In closing, we turn our thoughts to her who, long before she was President of this Branch of the Auxiliary in its present form, was a member of the Dakota League, and gave to it in days long past, and invariably since, her wise help and enthusiastic sympathy. What these were with her we all know,—it is like taking a constant sunshine out of our work together. But

shall we not yield in glad submission, grateful for her sake that God has called her to a fuller life, and knowing for ourselves, that "in His will is our peace."

FOREIGN DIVISION.

In looking over the record of the past year of missionary work, the Foreign Committee find much cause for thankfulness and encouragement. The sum total of receipts for this year gives our Division an increase over the preceding one of about two hundred and fifty dollars, testifying to the steady growth of the work; and we are very glad to announce that we have been enabled fully to meet our pledge of the payment of Miss Bruce's salary.

The result of a few quiet meetings held in some of the country churches in the autumn was the adding to our list of three new scholarships in the Girls' School in Osaka, Japan, which, with two that have since been taken, give us four new ones for Japan, and one for Africa, a gain to our work for which we are truly thankful. We would also say that a second one has been added to the school in Joppa, although that school is not supported by the Woman's Auxiliary.

Through the first collection, taken in accordance with the Sunday School plan alluded to in the Report of the General Secretary, over sixty dollars were received, with which it is proposed to establish a Scholarship in the Divinity School at Tokio, Japan. It is to be called the Massachusetts Sunday-School Scholarship, and we trust it will be supported continuously in the future. The direct money result of this plan, however, is the smallest advantage we look for, but we hope that through the influence thereby exerted the generation now growing up to fill our places in the church, will be prepared to take up this work of missions, with hearts full of love to the Saviour's cause, and hands trained for His service.

We desire to acknowledge the pleasure and benefit received at different times during the year, from the visits of some of our missionaries, and of the Rev. Mr. Kimber of New York.

A request has been received from the Secretary in New York, that an effort should be made in the coming year by the Massachusetts Branch, to raise something towards the education of the children of the Foreign Missionaries, and this we would suggest to you as one object for your offerings in the future; an object which commends itself as most worthy of our sympathy.

With so much to make us thankful in the past, shall we not strive, in the days that are to come, that the work may prosper yet more abundantly, and pray more earnestly than ever before, that while we sow and water, God will give the increase?

MEXICAN AND HAITIEN DIVISION.

A YEAR ago our Committee expressed the hope that they might be able to send help to Bishop Holly in his undertakings for the people of Haiti, particularly for his Industrial School, and it gives us pleasure to state that we have had every encouragement for that work, and have been able to send all that was wished, both for the special work of the School, and for the personal wants of the missionaries, and the amount of our contributions for Haiti has been more than double that of last year. In the preparation of the boxes, there have been most interesting and touching evidences of the true missionary spirit among those who have helped us, in the patience and faithful care and self-denial with which the work was done all over the Diocese, so that not only has comfort been carried into the homes of those who were in want, but we have all been cheered and inspired.

One great source of hopefulness in our duties has been the letters from the missionaries in Haiti, full of manly cheerfulness and Christian courage, in all the darkness of the times through which they are passing. Obliged to leave the towns where they were just gaining a foothold among the people, and to see them desolated by fire and sword, they turn to new labors with unbroken spirit, believing, as one of them writes, not that they must wait for peace before they can make progress, but that peace can come to that unhappy country only by their being "instant and active and faithful in propagating the principles of the Gospel, which alone are able to raise poor Haiti from her degradation and misery."

While this year's contributions towards the Church in Mexico have not equalled those of last year, yet they have not fallen much below those of the year before, and though we have undertaken no new work in that field, we have endeavored as far as possible to keep up our usual support of the cause.

In the midst of all the changes that have occurred in Mexico, the Orphanage for girls, in charge of Mrs. Hooker, has been calmly continuing its work. Into the protection of that quiet old convent building, little children from sinful or desolate homes have been gathered, and from it, young girls have gone forth to carry, in the grace and sweetness of their womanhood, the light that they have there received, out into the dark places of the country. We look at this work as the precious fire that is to keep alive the lamp of truth and purity in Mexico, and we ask you to help us to feed its flame.

In thus reviewing the labor of the past year, and gathering up its record to present to you, our Committee has a sense of satisfaction,—not that any great progress has been made, or any great work undertaken, but because, in all the doubts and difficulties of the year, our friends have shown by their continued support, their confidence in the underlying principles of their undertaking. There have been changes, and even complete overthrow in some parts of the field;—times of hope and of discouragement;—now apparent progress, and again utter inaction; but our hearts have been steadfast, confident in the final triumph, not necessarily of present methods or present administration, but of the cause, as a work of the Church and a movement towards Christ. For to those who love it and think largely of it, it shows itself to be, not in its present tumult and distress, which are temporary and transitional, but in its glorious beginning and its anticipated future,—a movement towards that Christ, Who is the Author and will be the Finisher of its faith.
