

## BY-LAWS.

---

I. THERE shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in November, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed; they shall be nominated by a Committee appointed each year by the Society at some meeting prior to the Annual Meeting.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant during the year, the same shall be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, &c.," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided that the number of such Delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each Division of the work undertaken by said church, or any of its working societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month, from September to May inclusive.

VIII. At Stated or Special Meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-fifth of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be requisite to form a quorum.

### EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT.

---

#### REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

WE close to-day our eighth year, as the MASSACHUSETTS BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS. Upon the threshold of a new year, let us reverently pause, and lift up our hearts in grateful praise to Him Whose Divine Blessing has strengthened our hands to the accomplishment of good.

Surely, as workers together with Him, "Hitherto the Lord hath helped us; to Thy Name give the praise; for Thou also hast wrought all our works in us."

The review of the year's record will not be altogether cheering, if we consider only its financial aspect. The receipts of 1885 have been considerably less than those of last year. But although our resources have been lessened, in consequence—as we believe—of long-continued depression in the business world, the work of the Auxiliary has gone bravely on, with no visible diminution of interest or effort.

The meetings of the nine working mouths have been well attended, with an average representation of thirty-three parishes; seven additional parishes have been enrolled, raising our number to 105; and the growing confidence and kindly coöperation of the Clergy encourage the hope, that soon after we enter our second decade every parish in the Diocese of Massachusetts may be identified with this Missionary work of the Church of God.

The field is the world, and appeals for aid have been presented to us from the North and the South, the East and the West. The reports of the secretaries of the several departments will bear witness to the kindly reception ever given such appeals, and the generous response, when practicable. Apart from our Treasurer's general report of money, boxes, etc. etc., it is pleasing to note among the *Specials* of the year, the work of the S. S. Penny Collection, the increase of the Lucy Lee Chickering Fund, the payment of Insurance Dues of four Clergymen, the support of five free Hospital beds, of two or three Missionaries, and forty-seven Scholarships.

During the winter, the Bishop of the Diocese met Christian women-workers monthly in celebration of The Holy Communion, and a service of instructions upon The Christian Life. These services were held in St. Paul's Church, Boston, and largely attended by members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

On the evening of October 15, a year ago, the Anniversary was observed, with Divine Service and a sermon, in St. Paul's Church. The Bishop presided, and the Rev. Alexander H. Vinton, Rector of All Saints Church, Worcester, Mass., preached the sermon.

At the Annual Meeting in the afternoon of October 15th, Miss Helen Turner, for two years the faithful and efficient Diocesan Secretary, resigned her office, to the regret of all associated in the work.

An Afternoon Tea, with social gathering of the Clergy and others interested in Missionary enterprise, was an enjoyable feature in celebration of the Anniversary.

There is much in the retrospect of the year to cheer us. Letters received by your Secretary from several of our smaller parishes, in the distant parts of the Diocese, evince intelligent appreciation of the intention, and the result of this Diocesan Organization, and the desire to awaken a new spirit of work among themselves.

It is our earnest wish to secure the coöperation of such parishes, and representatives of the several branches of our missionary work announce the pleasure with which they will accept any invitation to visit and confer with parochial Missionary Societies.

Our life, as the life of a *real auxiliary*, must be that of unceasing activity and growth. In this age of great opportunities, the responsibility of an organized band of Christian women develops daily. Countries hitherto unknown are constantly opening, and souls long bound in darkness await the Light and Gospel of Divine Love and Redemption.

From every quarter we hear the cry, "Come over and help us!" Our work *must* advance. We shall need larger offerings of money. We shall need, also, larger offerings of that wealth which every woman in our community may lay upon the altar of her Lord,—more earnest, self-denying effort, more Christian sympathy and fervent prayer, more real consecration of body and soul. If only the record of each one of us may be, "She hath done what she could," we shall surely go on from strength to strength, and hasten the time when the whole earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea!

## DOMESTIC DIVISION.

ONCE more we come before you with our report of the work accomplished in the past twelve months.

We should all be glad to say that great things have been done; that all have done what they could. But can we say this? Would it be true? Some, loving God with all their hearts and longing that others might be taught of Him and know the blessedness of loving, have done all in their power, often with great self-denial. But most of us, and many whom we might influence, give and work but sparingly.

Why is this? Surely not because we do not love God's work in the world! It must be because we do not understand the work and because we do not know definitely what it is.

If each delegate would make it her duty to study conscientiously the work of the different departments, she would carry to the parish which she represents a fund of information which would interest all, from the richest to the poorest, and if a really systematic effort were made, all might have the privilege of giving.

We wish to thank you all for your prompt and generous response to our appeal for the church and rectory in Jacksonport, Wisconsin.

Rev. Mr. Gardner, to whom the money was sent, wrote us delightful letters telling of the uprightness of the people, of their love to their Church, and of their energy and willingness in doing all that they could for her.

Now he writes that the money is received and the building progressing, and Miss Emery asks if we can help in driving a well, which they must have, as the only water is three quarters of a mile from the rectory. Any contributions for this purpose will be gladly received and forwarded.

The delegates in conference have this year decided to undertake the payment of a missionary's stipend in Bishop Brewer's diocese, besides the sum for which the women of Massachusetts are pledged towards sister Eliza's salary. This we hope to accomplish by asking each woman in the diocese for a weekly offering of one cent, or many cents, as she may possess the power to give.

The amount for these objects must be pledged annually for three years.

The Massachusetts Sunday School Scholarship in Bishop Tuttle's school has been maintained this year as last by the Penny Collection fund, contributed by the Sunday Schools, and is a most important part of our work. Two new scholarships in the same school have been taken for the coming year.

Several good boxes have been sent to the hospitals in the West and in our own State. Let us be impressed with the fact that all diocesan work demands our attention, and may be reported through this Society.

The boxes for clergymen's families have been during the year the means of great encouragement, and always will be. Many of our missionaries and their families could not live in decent comfort without them, and we hope that in the future more will be filled, with greater care and more generously than ever before.

It will surely be good for us all to read and re-read the leaflet entitled, "Belinda's Box."

We are thankful that many most excellent boxes have been made up by parishes of small means but great missionary zeal.

The Altar Society has done much this year and is very useful. Miss Parker, president of the Society, says: "We have given to different mission stations, two Altar Cloths, two sets Altar Linen, one Cassock, nine Surplices and four Stoles. Besides this we have made twenty-five articles, cut and basted eight, and furnished two patterns, for which we have received \$186.00. This is about twice as much as we did last year. We could do twice as much again if we had more workers."

In accordance with this statement, we make an earnest appeal, in behalf of the Altar Society, for helpers who are willing and able to do nice sewing.

Before closing, may we once more urge the delegates to bend all their powers to understanding the work and to interesting those about them in it.

Surely every Christian woman in the diocese of Massachusetts will be glad to know of the work which they can do for God, and when they know will do it.

#### INDIAN AND FREEDMEN DIVISION.

(IN CHARGE OF THE DAKOTA LEAGUE.)

THE Dakota League Committee, in beginning their 13th Annual Report, would state that the growth of the work has made necessary the appointment of an Assistant Secretary, Miss Jennie McIntosh, who will give special attention to collecting information about the Freedmen, and will also assist the Committee in many other ways.

The receipts of the League the last year have been, for Indians over \$2000 in money and about \$2800 in value of boxes, and for Freedmen about \$600 in money and \$1600 in boxes. Thus it is seen that the receipts for both Indians and Freedmen, but more especially the latter, have suffered a marked falling-off, a fact which is partly explained, we hope, by various local causes, but a fact nevertheless to which we would invite your attention, that you may unite with the Committee in earnest efforts to prevent this state of things from becoming chronic.

The number of colored people at the South is not growing less, nor do we receive fewer appeals for help. Perhaps among the numerous interests demanding our sympathy, this particular race does not receive its due attention. We are, it may be, puzzled how to work for them, and perplexed amid the varied attempts of good men to solve the problem. But after all, the solving of great problems is not the special province of a woman's missionary society. Let us mind the simple duty of strengthening the hands of a few men and women of our own church, who live among these people and are willing to teach and train them. We ask, then, that all the

church-women of the Diocese will carefully consider the claims that this particular work has upon them, so that it may not be crowded into a corner, but may assume its rightful place.

The Indians, also, are still with us,—they are not exterminated nor have they died out, as has been predicted of them many and many a time. Perhaps one of these predictions will come true at some distant day, and then the men and women living at that day can lay the Indian question aside as a thing forever settled. But this is not for us, nor can we for one moment anticipate that possible day. Meanwhile there are many, and thank God, their number is increasing every day, who see that our treatment of the Indians as a nation cries to heaven for justice, and that we cannot escape the responsibility. Our own church is a recognized leader in the field of Christian effort for them, but O, how long we halt and stumble over the work of teaching and elevating a comparative handful of people right at our very door. We rejoice, we are thankful for all we have been able to do, and for the never-failing interest of this Society in the work; but it makes our hearts ache to think of what might be done if we had thousands of dollars where we now have hundreds. Not to speak of all our old mission stations, which were never more promising than now,—there (for one example) are the 17,000 Navajos in the South West, one of the most promising tribes in this country. How delightful if we could write to Bishop Dunlop that if he would start a mission among them, we would send him a thousand dollars every year in support of it! We wait for such pledges, we pray for them, and we tell our desires in all earnestness to this Society, knowing how long and how faithfully your hearts have responded to every appeal for the red man. Let us do these things and save the Indian from the lingering and shameful death which must be his unless we interfere. But if we pass by in careless indifference, while he lies wounded and among thieves, who of us will dare to answer, when, in the fulness of time, our inmost souls are searched by God's question, "*Where is thy brother?*"

#### FOREIGN DIVISION.

THE recurrence of this season reminds us that another working year has passed away with all its possibilities and its opportunities. Let us glance at what has been accomplished, and at the work which lies ready to our hands in the coming season.

Notwithstanding the general depression in business our receipts have been nearly, and but for the delay of some of our payments would have been quite equal to those of the previous year. We most heartily thank all the parishes and individuals who have contributed to this result. Many of these are friends long tried and faithful, on whose unfailing coöperation we can always rely, while some have occasionally or but lately taken an interest in the foreign work. We earnestly wish that every parish of the diocese

could be represented on our list, and would remind them that a very small contribution from each communicant would materially help on the work.

Of the \$2502.06 received, nearly one half has been paid for the support of thirty-five scholarships. Miss Bruce's salary was continued for part of the year, in accordance with a vote of the Board in New York. Toward the \$1500 which we hope to raise for the hospital in Japan, about \$500 have been already forwarded, and the remainder of our receipts has been appropriated to insurance dues, to Mrs. Brierly's work, and to a few other objects that called for our assistance. In place of the support of any teacher, we propose for the coming year to make a special effort to raise the remainder of the money for the hospital land, and trust with your aid to accomplish this purpose.

The most marked event of the year was the visit to this country of the new Bishop of Africa for his consecration service in New York. Those who had the pleasure of hearing Bishop Ferguson, were much impressed by his graceful and winning address, and his single-hearted devotion to the work to which he has been called. Had the length of his stay allowed him to plead his cause in more of our churches, we doubt not the interest aroused would have been very great, but unfortunately for us he was obliged to return home after a very short visit. Africa seems especially to excite our interest at this time, when the heart of that vast continent is being opened to the nations to whom it has been so long a sealed book, and upon Christians rests the responsibility that the civilization to be carried thither shall be a Christian one. Our part of African work has hitherto been only on the outskirts; but we need to press on and possess the land. Mrs. Brierly has already appealed to our interest and sympathy. Let us continue to hold up her hands.

A letter from Mrs. Lanning, in Osaka, tells of her satisfaction in the results of the sale of articles sent here last year to be disposed of for the benefit of her work. The things were made by the Japanese women with the commendable desire to aid in the support of their own mission. In view, however, of the great suffering caused in Japan by the recent floods, these women voted unanimously to appropriate this money to the sufferers.

We call your attention to the proposed Memorial Home in Athens, in memory of the late Dr. and Mrs. Hill, our oldest missionaries, and highly esteemed for their long and successful work in Greece. We ask your interest and assistance in this undertaking.

For China we make no particular appeal, as the calls elsewhere seem so pressing, but trust that you will continue the assistance in that field which you have hitherto rendered.

The receipts from the Penny Collection for the Foreign Quarter were much less than for the previous years, though many of the Sunday Schools have continued their contributions regularly. Some, we know, are doing all they are able in other ways, but we hope that all will coöperate as far as possible in this plan for the systematic training of the children of our church to an interest in mission work.

Through all the work goes on, we trust, though quietly and without startling results. The kingdom of God cometh not with observation, were the words of our Lord. Pentecostal triumphs, a nation born at once,—these are the exceptions. As in the natural so in the spiritual world, the seed must be sown in faith; the upspring and the harvest will be in God's

own time. With a deep sense of our own shortcomings in faith and zeal, but with earnest resolve and fresh courage, let us take up in the coming year the work which lies before us. SARAH H. BRADFORD,

#### MEXICAN AND HAITIEN DIVISION.

THE work of the Church in Haiti has been full of interest during the past year, the letters from the missionaries bringing news of great activity. Under Bishop Holly's wise and energetic management the clergymen in the different stations feel each other's support in all their work. One interesting feature of it to us, is the coöperation of the women—the wives of the missionaries and others teaching the children, not only in the Sunday School, but in day schools, where sewing and other household occupations are taught to the girls. Miss Baker's little school flourishes, and she writes cheerfully of her taming some of the unruly boys and bringing her little kingdom into order. The boxes we have sent have been most gratefully acknowledged, and seem to bring real help. We have been much disappointed in not having been able to pay our share of Miss Baker's salary, and we hope that this year the parishes may make some arrangement so that the small sum of \$175 may be secured annually in Massachusetts,

In looking over the work of the past year in Mexico, and in this Diocese, your committee can report no great changes in the missionary field, and no very encouraging increase of interest here. And yet there are unmistakable signs of an unquenched vitality in Mexico, and some slight indications of fresh sympathy here.

In the first place, Mexico is linking itself by new ties to this country. Mr. Rodriguez, the young Mexican who was educated in the Theological Seminary in Cambridge, is now the centre of the little group of workers in Mexico, and by his knowledge and love of the Church, gained here, is inspiring the Mexican clergy with zeal for her worship and desire for a knowledge of her methods. A lay-reader from Bishop Elliott's Diocese is also at work there, thus forming a new bond with the adjoining jurisdiction of Texas, whose Bishop is greatly interested in the struggling church. Visitors to Mexico from this country, among them one of our own members, have gone in large numbers, and their sympathy and interest in what they have seen have done much towards increasing the friendliness of the Mexicans towards us. But beyond all these indications, the fact of the existence of an earnest faithful body of Christians in Mexico, working so far as we have given them light in the paths which the Church points out, working above all in the light which Christ keeps burning in their hearts, with faith unshaken, and courage undaunted, in the midst of poverty and discouragement, seeing themselves abandoned by their fellow-workers and yet meeting with small encouragement from us—this fact confronts us as positive evidence of the genuineness of the work in Mexico,—that it has a true vitality, and that whether we believe in it or not, whether we aid it or not, it has a living root in the soil where it has been planted that will draw its own sustenance by virtue of its own nature. As a proof of this vitality

we need only look at the work that is being done in Mexico. So far from contracting her sphere of usefulness, Mrs. Hooker now cares for eighty girls in her Orphanage, and any vacancy occurring is filled at once. Nine of the orphan boys are sheltered in Mr. Maruri's home, and share his scanty living; and it is hoped that this remnant of the Boys' Orphanage may prove the nucleus of a new one. The services are kept up in the Cathedral, and more of our liturgy is being introduced as prayer-books are sent to supply the worshippers, and as they become better instructed in the Church service. Mr. Rodriguez holds weekly meetings for Bible teaching. Outside of the city, the Rev. Antonio Carrion and the other clergymen in Hidalgo are holding services; the rural congregations there having more means than those in the towns, raise some funds towards building churches.

When we look for a corresponding awakening in Massachusetts, a sympathy that keeps pace with these persevering efforts, we do not find it. The cause of Mexico has not that hold upon us that it should have; and yet there is enough encouragement to warrant our continued appeals, and lately new parishes have come forward with offers of help. Your committee earnestly entreats you to further by every means this new impulse of helpfulness. Let the individual workers in Mexico appeal to you by the steady self-sacrifice of their lives. Forget the sad record of the past, and recognize their struggle to extricate themselves from the difficulties and errors into which they have been led. Remember that the battle for righteousness and truth is the same all over the world, and stretch out a helping hand to those who still remain upon the field, deserted but for them. And we beg that your interest may not lose itself in vague desultory efforts. Let Mexico have an advocate in your missionary meetings, that her cause may be placed upon a permanent footing. Try to provide for scholarships in Mrs. Hooker's Orphanage, or help towards the support of the orphan boys. There is no longer any danger of rash, ill-judged movements there. It is merely a question of upholding a feeble but genuine effort for Christian work by Church methods, and it holds in itself the promise of growth and endurance.

Thus once more your Committee submits its Report, relying upon the remembrance of your past aid, and hoping for an increase of your labors in the future.

The oldest of the Mexican clergy—beloved and venerated by them all—he had enlisted the admiration of all those of this Church who had visited Mexico and seen him fulfilling his duties at the Cathedral and among his people, with beautiful grace and dignity, and the most touching patience.

His orphan boys have been placed under Mr. Rodriguez's charge, and Mrs. Maruri is to be their matron.

The support of his widow and of these boys was the last anxiety of Mr. Maruri, and the Mexican Committee appeals to its friends not to allow the work, to which he has been so faithful, to be abandoned.
