

WITH the opening work of the new year, we are called to mourn the loss of one of our number, who for many years has been one of the most active in our association.

In 1875 Miss GRACE H. HAMLEN was made Recording Secretary of the Dakota League, which office she held up to the time of her death. How faithfully she has fulfilled all the duties of that office, how earnestly she has plead and how untiringly she has worked for both the Indians and the Colored race of our land, many of you know; and those who were more intimately associated with her, know how broad were her sympathies, how comprehensive and, at the same time, exact, her knowledge of all parts of her two fields of work. The Red Man and the Negro have lost a strong advocate, and we, a wise and loving co-worker.

As the summer months passed away, and the failing strength made it evident to the friends about her, that she too was passing away, she still clung to her work and to the hope that in a few months she might again be at her post; but at the gathering in of the harvest, she was called to carry up her sheaf, and to hear, we believe, the "Well done" of the Master whom she had striven so devotedly to serve.

Whereas, our Heavenly Father in His infinite love and wisdom has taken from us our beloved co-laborer,—Miss GRACE H. HAMLEN,—Therefore,

*Resolved*, That we bow in humble resignation to His will, beseeching Him to send forth more laborers into the fields from which He has called her.

*Resolved*, That as members of the MASSACHUSETTS BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, we express our deep grief at the death of Miss HAMLEN, and our hearty appreciation of her faithful labors.

*Resolved*, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the aged father and to the bereaved family of Miss HAMLEN, and that the foregoing be entered also upon the records of the Association.

#### REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

TWELVE months since, we assembled here, in the autumnal harvest-time, to give account of our work, and to cheer one another with report of goodly fruits, new seed sown, and increase of laborers in the Mission field. The year had not been altogether devoid of disappointment and anxiety, but we had experienced great mercies and goodness, that called forth glad thanksgiving. Assured that the Lord of the harvest had appointed our task, and that He in His own good time would fill the garners with plenteous store, we went out, strengthened in faith and hope, to scatter the precious seed anew, and with humble, fervent prayer, to await the golden fruitage.

Again we are called together, and surely *this* is a day of gladness. With hearts full of gratitude to God, we "publish with the voice of thanksgiving," His blessing upon our labors. The Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions celebrates its ninth anniversary to-day. We keep the feast with rejoicing, inasmuch as we can present evidence of decided growth and strength, the report of much larger average attendance in the monthly meetings, of the extension of our interests and efforts, of more work accomplished, and greater financial prosperity, than in any year of our existence. It has been our privilege to gladden more hearts, among the many who are bearing the burden and heat of the day, in our own country, and in foreign lands; we have increased our scholarships until they are 54 (fifty-four) in number; we have completed the "Lucy Lee Chickering Memorial fund," of \$1,000, and enlarged the work for Churches, Schools, and Hospitals. And, may we not believe that we have enriched *ourselves*, with larger offerings of prayer and self-consecration? We humbly and reverently present these gifts to the Lord, giving thanks that we may be workers together with Him.

With the review of the year, we recall our obligations to the Right Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese, for godly counsel and admonition, in Instructions to Christian Women-Workers—to the Rev. William S. Langford, D.D., Secretary of the board of missions, for the helpful sermon on occasion of the

anniversary service—and to the several missionary bishops and clergymen who, from time to time, have returned to “tell how great things the Lord hath done,” kindling anew our zeal, as they taught us the glory of hardship and suffering for the advance of Christ’s Kingdom.

To the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of St. Paul’s Church, Boston, we would express most grateful appreciation of the generous hospitality they have ever evinced in giving to us the use of the Church and Chapel. And we cordially thank the Rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Boston, and the trustees of the Huntington House, for the privilege of storage, which by their kindness has long been afforded us.

In the joy of to-day, many hearts are saddened in realization of a great sorrow, under the shadow of which we still stand. Miss GRACE H. HAMLEN, ever a faithful and efficient helper since the organization of the Diocesan Branch of the Auxiliary, entered into the rest of Paradise, on the 19th day of September. “She hath done what she could” through many years of consecrated service. We, her co-workers, have sustained a great loss. Bowing submissively to the Divine Will, we give thanks for her good example and incite one another to renewal of personal consecration, and prayerful effort. One by one, the Master is calling our fellow-laborers home. They have gone up from the fields of earthly toil, and, with the song of rejoicing as they laid down their sheaves, it may be that they mingled thanksgiving for all the weariness, and the labor, and the burden of the day ended. The shadows of the evening hours are deepening over some of our band, gathered here; must not each heart ask itself, “Where hast thou gleaned today? Where wroughtest thou”? Let us work while it is day, ere the night cometh! for the field widens, the seed is in our hands, and the promise sure!—promise of

“A glorious harvest of sinners won,  
A harvest worth securing,  
Rest for the toilers, their life-work done,  
Crowns for the victors, and near the throne  
Peace, joy, and life enduring.”

Lord of the harvest, that it may please Thee to send forth more laborers into the harvest, we humbly beseech Thee.

## DOMESTIC DIVISION.

As our Secretary has just told us, the year past has been full of prosperity. The receipts for Domestic Missions alone have been more than twice as large as at any previous time. This increased interest in the work has, of course, added somewhat to the labors of your domestic committee, and we are glad to tell you that Miss Mary Amory Greene has consented to become an Assistant Secretary of the Domestic Department.

The salary for the new Missionary in Montana, and also that for Sister Eliza in Colorado, have been contributed, and we thank the many parishes from which the money came, not only for their several offerings, but for the cheerful responsive letters which accompanied so many of them, and for their cordial acceptance of the fact that the offering must be annual for three years.

The pennies from the children in the Sunday Schools, which must be noticed here, came in quickly and generously this year as they have before, and are the means of two new scholarships in Mormon schools. We hope that the collection for the coming year will be still larger, and we trust that the children in Utah have been greatly benefited by these scholarships, and that our own children (which is as important) have derived much missionary teaching from the leaflets distributed in the Sunday Schools.

Much successful effort has been made in different branches of the work by some of our smallest parishes. This is encouraging, for it shows us that though the body may be weak the spirit is willing, and we have faith to believe that the body carrying such a spirit cannot fail to grow strong. One parish bravely says: "We are very weak in numbers and have almost no money, but we are happy in the thought that if we try very hard we may be able to supply the needs of a Missionary with a small family, 'clerical suit' and all." When we read a letter like this the effect is electrifying, as you may imagine. Here, may we urge you all to work for families when it is possible to do so? Work for the hospitals is most meritorious and acceptable; still, when a missionary has been invited to state his needs, and has been promised a response in substantial form, it must be very disappointing to find the winter wearing away and no fulfilment of the promise. And unless we exert ourselves to the utmost many letters will inevitably be at the end of the season literally worn out, having been sent and returned, read and re-read, and no "box" is the only result we can see.

Perhaps they were not very "interesting letters," but may we say here, —trusting that you will bear patiently with our little habit of mingling exhortation with the year's report,—that every missionary, excepting as we clothe him with our love for the work which he is doing and for the Master whom he is serving, cannot be intensely "interesting" or write intensely "interesting" letters.

In the past months requests have come to us again and again on Monday or Tuesday morning for three or four "interesting" letters to be read before a meeting of ladies on Wednesday afternoon. If it is necessary to send to New York for this choice collection the letters are very apt to be too late for the meeting. Therefore, we beg that more time may be allowed for obtaining and despatching the assignments.

We must give the Altar Society a moment of our time; this also has been most successful. Miss Parker, the president of that society, tells us in her report that although orders for work have increased, the profit has not kept pace with the demand upon their charity. Their gifts to feeble churches of Altar Linen, Vestments, etc., during the year have reached a total value of \$259.00—more than twice that of last year. This Society is a part of our Domestic Missionary work,—certainly a most useful part. Before its existence the request in a missionary's letter for a surplice or cassock often struck terror to our hearts. Now we have only to write to Miss Parker, and the task to which most of us feel so unequal is undertaken and accomplished for us. May we bespeak your interest in this Society, and urge you to prove your interest by becoming subscribers to its support at an annual payment of fifty cents.

Let us all enter upon the duties of the new year with greater consecration, thereby gaining fresh courage and going on from strength to strength.

#### INDIAN AND FREEDMEN DIVISION.

IN presenting the Fifteenth Annual Report of the Dakota League, the thoughts of the Committee turn sadly and lovingly to her, who for twelve years has been its faithful Secretary. At the time of the formation of the Society in 1863, Miss HAMLEN became a member, and since 1874 she has been one of its officers, giving time and thought without stint to its plans, laboring during the past two years with failing strength, but with never-failing energy in the projects of the League. Within a few weeks of her death, she was looking to her work for the coming winter, when those who watched her, knew that for her all *active* service was at an end. She has “entered into the rest that remaineth”—to us is committed the work she has laid down.

The work of the Dakota League, during the past year, has been of its usual kind, with a slight increase in money and boxes. Much remains to be attempted in new fields, both for Indians and for the Colored people.

In the Indian work, the stations supplied by us for many years have been well looked after; our boxes have brought comfort and cheer to the Missionaries themselves, and have helped to lighten their labors, in caring for the old, the sick, and the little children. But there are other places which call for our help, and to which your Committee would like to respond.

Bishop Walker of North Dakota would be greatly encouraged by an offer of help for his Indian work, which languishes for want of money. In the far West, among the Shoshones and with our protégées in Indian Territory, there is much awaiting our aid.

We have been specially urged by the Auxiliary in New York, to put forth renewed efforts in behalf of the Colored people. We, in Massachusetts, do not seem to be working to the extent of our ability. Comparatively few parishes, connected with the League, work for both branches; very many do but little for the Missions among the Colored people; and very often your Committee have to leave unanswered urgent appeals for help.

In the year that is before us, besides meeting our pledges, let us earnestly strive to use greater diligence in pressing on the work, and in so influencing parishes and delegates, that many and rich sheaves shall be garnered for the Master's use.

#### FOREIGN DIVISION.

In our last annual report, it may be remembered, the hope was expressed that over and above our regular pledges, the sum we had undertaken to raise toward the much needed hospital land in Japan might be completed by the close of the year. This proposal was made with some tremblings of heart, inasmuch as it required larger offerings than those of any previous year; but as the months passed on, doubts were changed to thankfulness for the warm-hearted sympathy which came to our assistance, so that now but a trifling sum is lacking of the entire 1500 dollars.

Indeed the medical work in these heathen lands must commend itself to all, even to those least interested in foreign missions, as one of the most hopeful forms of Christian work. From our missionary physicians, we hear of crowds of miserable sufferers seeking the relief which their own people cannot give, or from which they are debarred by poverty; and through the help imparted to the body, the best opening is afforded for the entrance of spiritual truth. While the blind are made to see and the lame to walk, to the poor the gospel is preached. Dr. Harrell, in Tokio, seems to have his hands more than full. Dr. Lanning is doing the same work in Osaka; Dr. Boone in Shanghai; and in Africa Dr. Perry, physician and teacher both, began his work on the very day succeeding his arrival last June. He has brought great comfort and relief to Mrs. Brierly, who had been bearing the burden and heat of the day with no assistant of her own race and color.

For three years the Massachusetts S. S. Scholarship in Rev. Mr. Tyng's school in Osaka, has been supported by the receipts from the S. S. Penny Collections. It seems better now, however, that the children's money should go directly to objects set forth in their leaflets, and therefore we purpose to discontinue this scholarship and in future ask their help each year for some special cause.

As items of encouragement in the year's results, we may mention the five new scholarships pledged for Africa, including the redemption from a heathen and degrading marriage of the girls educated thereon—the interest

shown in the new Orphanage at Shanghai, in which the support of two babies is pledged by the Massachusetts Branch of the Auxiliary, and also the great increase of our receipts over those of last year by about six hundred dollars. But in connection with the Orphanage, we have to note the great loss sustained by it, and by our mission, in the death of Mrs. S. C. Partridge. Her term of service was a short one, less than two years, yet it is to be judged rather by the faithfulness and earnestness of the work performed than by its duration. Mrs. Partridge's thoughts and cares were for the Orphanage to the very last.

For the coming year to what objects shall our efforts be especially directed? There should be no resting on the past, only inspiration from it for the future. As the work advances, the field opens out into broader reaches, the vast plains of Africa teeming with human life—Japan's open doors—the millions of China in their own land and those also who in spite of proscriptive legislation are found within our borders, all call on us to lighten their darkness. For the latter class we would say a word. Mrs. Twing, at one of your last winter's meetings, asked your sympathy with the 40,000 Chinamen living in heathen ignorance in San Francisco. Two churches in New York and two in Philadelphia have begun work among the Chinese in those cities, but our church in Boston has done nothing for this class. While we send missionaries to the heathen across the sea, shall we disregard those at our own doors? Can we not help some of them at least, to carry home hereafter, as the most precious of the new ideas received from us, the story of the Gospel?

Bishop Ferguson writes that as he advances into the interior of the country, he needs to plant at each new station a small church, at a cost of perhaps \$800 for each. We propose to you to make one such church your special work, and also that you should do something for the work in Greece, which the urgency of other calls has obliged us lately to overlook.

Are we appalled at the magnitude of all these seemingly endless tasks? Let us remember that for the end we are not responsible, but only that each do what she can, and remember also that we have a promise as well as a command. Are they not enough?

Ours "not to make reply,"  
Ours "not to reason why,"

Ours but to obey and go forward.

#### MEXICAN AND HAITIEN DIVISION.

ONE of the first incidents of our work in Haiti during the past year was the journey of Bishop and Mrs. Holly and Miss Baker to the mountains, to visit the mission of the Rev. Mr. Battiste. The long letter describing the journey, written by Mrs. Holly, opened to us at once a new and interesting

field. The toilsome ride on horseback up the steep mountain paths, the hints of the magnificent scenery, the glimpses into the lives of the people, with the characteristic virtues of the half barbarous mountaineer, simplicity, gratitude, and eagerness to learn; the picture of the good pastor, meeting his people in little flower decked chapels among the lonely hills, and leading their voices in the anthems of our Church; gathering the children into schools; healing the sick, and comforting the dying—all these details revealing such genuine primitive missionary work, brought us at once into sympathy with it all, and made us long to give it our aid. We have been able to do something for it, and we hope to do more. We have despatched one box for Mr. Battiste, and sent him the half of our Sunday School penny collection, and have heard how opportune was the gift, and how gratefully received. We also sent our usual Christmas box to Mrs. Holly, for distribution among the poor children of the Sunday Schools in Port au Prince. Our wish to give pleasure to these children has been increased by the accounts we hear of them. They seem to be most zealous and industrious little creatures, working in every way that they can to earn money for the improvement of their own schools, and sending the largest share of their earnings to the help of Mr. Battiste's mountain children whose schools are so poorly furnished, and maintained with such difficulty. We hope very much that this coming year we shall be able to send more money and books to keep up the schools on whose support so much depends, and which are regarded as the most essential feature of the missionary work in Haiti.

The five years during which this committee has had charge of the work in Mexico have been full of difficulty and struggle,—difficulty in getting at the true facts of the work, and struggle in keeping on in the path that little by little has opened before us. During the past year especially we have all watched with deep anxiety the movements that have taken place in Mexico. We have seen that little company of workers, of whom the moving spirit and the only interpreter to us has been Mr. Rodriguez, making brave attempts to keep up religious services, orphanages, and all charitable and educational work, as nearly as possible after the methods of our Church. We have seen them gradually led to make a formal appeal to our Church to take them under its guidance, and we have been pained witnesses of their consternation and grief when that appeal was refused. Still watching them we have seen them not entirely dismayed, only a few dropping off from discouragement or the necessities of poverty. All this time, guided by the most trustworthy information we could command, we have sent them what help we could. Our money has gone through the Mexican League, designated chiefly for Mrs. Hooker, who has kept a home for her girls in all her privations, and for Mrs. Maruri, who as you all know has continued her husband's protecting care of the orphan boys. Our aid has been in no small proportion to that of other Dioceses, but when we heard from time to time of the extreme poverty and the sacrifices of those men and women we longed to send them more.

Then the Convention met, and the work that we have been watching so long came before the eyes of the Church. Although the clergymen in Mexico had no money to send a delegate, it was deemed so important that they should be truly represented that Mr. Rodriguez sought and found aid from other bodies of Christians in Mexico for the journey. His stories of

the hardships, the heroic struggles of the Mexican clergy, who have been actually pushed to the verge of starvation, left no doubt of their earnestness and sincerity. We were also assured by him that they wished to keep their work entirely free from any connection with Bishop Riley. The result of his statement was an almost unanimous expression in the House of Bishops in favor of the work in Mexico as represented by Mr. Rodriguez, and a resolution by the Board of Missions to send a clergyman of our Church to supervise the work of the Mexican Presbyters.

This action clears our way of many difficulties. In future we shall be able to hear more frequently and more accurately from the field. We feel too that Mr. Rodriguez has a right to our confidence and our help. He has shown himself a most devoted servant of the Church, continuing true to her under great temptations and the deepest poverty.

Our work for Mexico is not over; it has just begun. Let us pray with all our hearts that God will send a man there fit to comfort and strengthen and guide those sorely tried people, and let us rejoice that we have been enabled to keep faithful to God's purposes, and pray that we may labor yet more abundantly in His cause.
