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

## ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

### REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

UNLIKE any preceding anniversary, the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, at the close of its Eleventh year, finds itself crippled in one of its members—its right hand as it were,—so that the leading paper of its annual report must this year be little more than an apology. The able and devoted Secretary, after three years of laborious service, is constrained to accept a twelve months' leave of absence. We miss too, at this time, the strong and helpful friend whose fatherly counsel has been wont to begin our working year, and whose apostolic blessing has brought it to a fitting close.

It is satisfactory to be able to state that of the one hundred and eighty parishes, chapels and missions in the diocese, one hundred and seventeen,—or nearly two-thirds,—are enrolled as Branches of this Society. But self-gratulation is restrained by the further fact that there are still as many as eleven organized parishes, with upwards of thirty families and upwards of forty communicants each, who are aliens from this sisterhood.

The attendance of delegates at the general monthly meetings is about forty,—representing only one-third of the parish membership.

The officers of the four committees,—watchmen on the walls of our Zion not less than are the clergy—bear in their heart and brain through all the seasons, year by year, the interests of their several departments. We shall hear in the reports which are to follow, their review of the past year and their forecast of the opening one.

The activities of the Society naturally arrange themselves into the two forms of preparation of boxes and gathering of money; and the competition between the two has generally resulted in favor of the boxes, by some two thousand to three thousand dollars.

This year the excess is about thirty-two hundred dollars; and a review of the past four years shows a steady increase of about nine hundred dollars a year. The total amount in Boxes this year is thirteen thousand and thirty-three dollars.

Last year the contributions in money touched the highest mark (as yet) in an excess of four thousand dollars, in round numbers, over the amount in boxes. Surely the churchwomen of the diocese will never allow a decline in this record! "The silver is *mine*, and the gold is *mine*, saith the Lord." The returns this year show an aggregate of little less than ten thousand dollars.

Another promising feature of the work is the gradual increase in the number of Scholarships,—which are maintained partly by parishes or individual members of parishes, and partly by Sunday Schools. During three years past thirteen new Scholarships have been added, making sixty now supported by this Auxiliary, namely, forty-four in the Foreign department, ten in the Indian and Colored People's division, and six in the Domestic division.

In the field of Home Missions, the Indian work holds its steady way, sometimes against reverses, and sometimes with good cheer. The average of contributions is high. The work among colored people shows an increase of general interest and of material aid. Some here present can but recall the fervent appeals and the devoted prayers of one now of blessed memory in the cause of the Indian and the negro,—the late Secretary of the old Dakota League.

An important adjunct of the Auxiliary is the Altar Society,—now about completing its fifth year; which reported a year ago the making and giving away of over fifty altar and clerical vestments to needy mission stations, and the assisting of nine parishes in the same kind of work. "Our gifts could be doubled if we had more workers," said the report; and one of its members closed her appeal with the words, "There surely must be many women in Massachusetts who are willing to help the cause of missions by doing a piece of needlework four times a year." This year the Society reports fifty-one vestments and other articles sent to Mission stations, amounting in value to over three hundred dollars.

The life insurance dues of four foreign clergymen are still continued, and the support of two orphaned Chinese babies is still secure.

"So many worlds, so much to do, So little done, such things to be,"—these are words which must often rise in the heart of the thoughtful worker; but she will not fail to remember that work, *for others*, is her peculiar privilege,—and that it will never end. With this inspiration, and conscious of the "high companionship" that attends her, she can respond in this better strain:—

"I ask no heaven till earth be Thine,  
Nor glory-crown, while work of mine remaineth here;  
When earth shall shine among the stars,  
Her sins wiped out, her captives free,  
Her voice a music unto Thee—  
For crown, new work give Thou to me!"

## DOMESTIC DIVISION.

THE report offered this year by the Domestic Committee, shows good work done, because many willing hearts and hands have thrown their might into the work.

The number of parishes connected with the Domestic Department of the Auxiliary is greater than last year. The number of objects for which they work is increased.

New hospitals and new schools are sending from every part of the West their appeals for help, and we must help them. The Church has always, from the earliest times, been first in caring for the bodies and minds of the needy, the State learning of her and following her example, therefore we must do now while we have opportunity what the State will, as well in the West as elsewhere, soon do for us. But the care of the missionary's family will be ours as long as salaries are small and man must eat, drink and be clothed. For the past year or two the tone of request in the missionary's letter has changed. Less bed linen, table linen, and under clothing is asked, and this is a real trial to many parishes. Dresses, cloaks, and suits cost money, and many societies find very little in their treasuries. They can sew but they cannot spend money. This is a difficulty with which we must grapple, or it would not be spoken of here. This change in the letters may perhaps be accounted for when we consider the growth of the country. As the West grows older the necessities of life are more easily obtained, and this same growth makes necessities of those things which were once considered luxuries. Now what can we do? Let us think carefully! We must not demand that the missionary's requests shall be such as we can meet, and thus try to adapt our end to our means, but we must, if we are to go forward adapt the means to the end by finding some way to increase our money and thus be able to send the more expensive gifts. The labor of our hands can be given in greater measure to the hospitals and schools. In behalf of your Committee we beg each parish to give their best and most unselfish thought to this matter, then the problem will be sure of solution and every missionary will find his wishes responded to quickly and in a most encouraging and satisfactory manner.

The Sunday School Penny Collection has amounted to comparatively little this year, being scarcely sufficient for the support of one Scholarship in the Mormon School where it has formerly supported two.

The fund for the support of a missionary in Montana has been forwarded and our pledge is redeemed, as our promise was for only three years. Of course we may, if we wish, consider ourselves

free from all further responsibility in this matter, but Bishop Brewer tells us that the diocese is not yet able to assume the payment of the salary, and the parishes to which the missionary ministers are not yet self supporting, and he begs us as we value the most excellent work which is being done, to continue our help by sending \$300. during the coming year or two years. This, we think, will be possible, as several parishes have expressed their desire to continue their subscriptions.

Our share of Sister Eliza's salary has been contributed as in the past. Let us remember the useful and necessary work which she is doing in Colorado, and make it sure for another year by doing our part.

The Altar Society has done most earnest and successful work in its own department. Of this work a separate report will be given.

The Secretary of the Domestic Department, as she resigns her work into other hands, thanks you most earnestly for the kind and ready way in which you have always seconded her efforts in behalf of the work.

Let us pray for the Auxiliary's increased usefulness and power.

May God bless us all and pour upon our lives the light of his countenance, that we may see the things which he has for us to do.

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## INDIAN AND COLORED PEOPLE'S DIVISION.

THE Report of your Committee for the past year has much encouragement to offer. We have the satisfaction of finding that our receipts, both for Indians and colored people, quite equal those of the previous year, if we deduct, (as we justly may,) the special and unusual gift of one thousand dollars, reported in 1887, for a theological Scholarship.

To feel our own work a part of a greater, is always inspiring. The Country and the Church are both recognizing in large ways, the necessity of dealing wisely with the two races to which we owe so much, and whose future, as well-trained Christian citizens, is of such vast importance.

Our work is of three sorts: the preparation of boxes of clothing, the payment of pledges for certain Scholarships and salaries, and general gifts of money. All these things are necessary, yet your Committee desire to present the urgent need, in both departments, of money or the things that money will buy. If the parish officers

understand this clearly, we are sure that even from small parishes, there may come to us, not only the careful and valuable work of the Guild or the Sewing Circle, but some offering in money.

In looking over the general Report of the Woman's Auxiliary, we notice,—especially in the Indian department,—a difference between our methods and those of many other dioceses. Other Branches report churches or schools built by their efforts: we have no such record. It has been our custom to send the greater part of the money raised by the Dakota League, to the Missionary Treasury, for the mission work already established to whose support the Church stands pledged. This work, though modest, is no less effective than the other. This we cannot give up. But can we not do both?

That we can raise money for "specials" has been shown in the instant response to the appeal made in behalf of Mrs. Handford and her five little children, who by the sudden death of the devoted missionary at Cheyenne, were left bereaved and desolate in a strange land. It has been shown by Mrs. Burnham's success in raising money for the training of farmers in the Segur Colony,—a work declared by Prof. Painter of the Indian Rights Association to be "the best example of successful Indian civilization."

These things we rejoice to have done, but can we not do more? Can not we, too, build in Dakota a school or a chapel,—a rude log-building, perhaps,—but a place for teaching or worship? Can not we help Bishop Talbot to build the much-needed school among the Shoshones? Can we not free Mr. Babbitt's school in Columbia, from debt, or pledge to Mr. Russell, for his new and hopeful Normal School at Lawrenceville, Va., more than one Scholarship of twenty-five dollars? Surely, we are not content to report, from year to year, merely no falling-off of interest and support in our work.

We bless God "for the good example of those departed this life" who labor no more in the Church Militant. Why should we not thank Him, also, for those who are laboring now, whose lives are a daily sacrifice of joyful devotion to the work we all hold dear? We do well to give thanks;—but let us count no gratitude sincere or profound, that does not stir and stimulate our own sluggish lives to more generous and faithful service.

## FOREIGN DIVISION.

For the Foreign Division of our branch, the past year has been a comparatively uneventful one. No new departures have been undertaken, only the old ones sustained as far as possible. Our principal efforts have still been for the African field towards maintaining our pledge for the Eliza F. Drury Memorial Station, assisting Mrs. Borsirly's work at Cape Mount, with some little help given to other of the Mission Schools.

In China our Scholarships have been continued, also the support of our babies in the Orphanage; and lately the furnishing supplied for the new Clergy House in Wuchang. A romantic little incident which we can hardly call a part of our work, has been the marriage of the missionary, the Rev. Mr. Pott of New York, to Miss S. N. Wong, the Christian Chinese woman, in charge of the Orphanage.

During the year several new missionaries have gone to Japan, and among them Miss Palmer from Boston, who was present at one of our Spring meetings. An interesting feature in the progress of Japan is the institution, by the Japanese themselves, at Osaka, of a school for the education of higher class women, and for this they have asked the assistance of a missionary teacher from our number. Bishop Williams also proposes to open a school for this class in Tokio, and has been seeking anxiously for a suitable person to take charge of it. The position is to be filled by Miss Aldrich, a lady from New Hampshire.

Miss Sibyl Carter, whom you have already heard speak to us of the various missionary fields, is to be in Japan for a year, and so will be able to bring us home much interesting information fresh from the field.

The Sunday Schools have responded rather more fully to our leaflet for the Penny Collection, giving us enough to pay the Scholarship, with a balance toward a second one. Cannot more of the smaller schools be persuaded to take an interest in this plan? Meanwhile our total receipts have again fallen off, though less than at one time we feared, and it may be partly accounted for by the fact that some of the rectors have sent their contributions, not as before, through the Auxiliary, but directly to New York. Other rectors, while making their Lent collections for the Board, have come to the Auxiliary for information and inspiration, so that its influence is not to be tested, perhaps, solely by the receipts to its treasury. Be that as it may, let this be the text for our thoughts that we be not lightly disheartened: "the leaven which a woman took and hid in three measures of meal until the whole was leavened."—the Divine leaven, human instrumentality, the silent, hidden working, and the results as God Himself shall decree.

## MEXICAN AND HAITIEN DIVISION.

THE report of your Committee for last year, announced the arrival of Rev. Mr. Gordon in Mexico, to superintend the Church work there, and reviewed the labors of his first six months.

It was a report which for the first time since 1881, the year your present Committee began its work, told of actual organized missionary labor. Every preceding report had recorded struggle against disappointment, painful retracing of mistaken advance, vague, though never abandoned, hopes for the future.

Last year, for the first time under Mr. Gordon's care, regular missionary work, the building of churches, establishing clergymen, founding schools, was begun, and it has continued steadily ever since. But has this great change from confusion, and almost despair, to order, and assured advance in the field, been met by a corresponding change in this diocese? Have those parishes who have watched the mistakes and misfortunes of the Mexican reformation with distrust, now that it is fairly out of the darkness, come forward to encourage and support it?

We are obliged to say that they have not, that there has been no such recognition of Mexico's brave victory, no such cordial approval of Mr. Gordon's exceedingly trying and laborious efforts. Fortunately for him, and for Mexico, other dioceses have responded, as we have not, and it has been possible to reappoint Mr. Gordon, and continue what is so well begun. But to Massachusetts it is due, very largely, that there was any work in Mexico for our church to take up, and are we to be the ones to draw back, now that we are no longer leading a forlorn hope?

There is one special work of Mr. Gordon's which we must care for, as we are pledged to its support. That is the school in Cuaxittie.

Last Spring a letter from Mr. Gordon was published in the Churchman, saying that one of the congregation at Cuaxittie, the owner of a large hacienda, had provided a school room, and furniture for a school for girls, Mr. Gordon had engaged a teacher, and the work had begun. "If I only had the money to pay the teacher's salary, \$25 per month," wrote Mr. Gordon, "I would start a boys' school for which the owner of the hacienda will furnish the other requisites, as he did in the case of the girls' school."

Your committee saw in this an opportunity for doing some definite work that would be of substantial aid to Mr. Gordon, and of great advantage to the future of the Church, and being encouraged by pledges from a few ladies, and some gifts in cash, the raising of the salary was assured. Mr. Gordon promptly appointed the teacher, and the school began the first Monday in September. Twenty-one boys are now at work in it, who would otherwise grow up in complete ignorance, and the master gives entire satisfaction. The plan of your committee was, that a few par-

ishes, say twelve, should assist in this matter by the regular payment of \$2. per month. This would secure the amount needed.

But the parishes have not come forward as was hoped. May we beg you to consider this need conscientiously.

Mrs. Hooker now has the aid of Miss Isabel Dunlop, daughter of the late Bishop Dunlop of New Mexico, she having become a teacher in the Orphanage. Mr. Gordon writes, "Miss Dunlop is a great comfort to Mrs. Hooker, and I am sure she will prove a very valuable assistant." Mr. Rodriguez, who labored so faithfully for Mexico in its darkest days, now that the work is in charge of one who can relieve him, has given up the congregation in the city of Mexico and accepted other work. Mr. Gordon writes, "I do not see that the congregation has suffered at all from the separation of Mr. Rodriguez. His successor Rev. J. Hernandez, son of the late Bishop elect of Cuernavaca, seems to be giving entire satisfaction."

The history of our church in Haiti, during the past year, was uneventful up to the summer. Bishop Holly and his wife, and their son, Alice Baker, and Mr. Battiste, continued their faithful, quiet work, and the two sons of the Bishop pursued their studies in New York.

Suddenly, on the fourth of last July, the fire broke out in Port au Prince, which destroyed over three hundred houses, and swept away our church building, and the home of the Bishop, leaving the family destitute. The fire was the precursor of one of those revolutions with which Haiti is racked at almost every, so called, election of a new President, but while previous revolutions have usually been bloodless, and ended in the speedy establishment of one of the contending candidates, the country now is still unsettled, and new insurrections are breaking out.

All this calls for but one remedy, the educating and christianizing of the people.

We were able at the time of the fire, to send prompt aid in money; a box has just been sent from St. Stephen's church, Lynn, and we are still sending supplies for the relief of the destitute. But the church must be rebuilt, the house of the Bishop must be restored, and we must do our part towards it.

With this statement of the progress and the needs of your work, your Committee commends it to your steady, generous, and faithful support, for the coming year.

Its progress has been more rapid, its needs are greater, than they have ever been before. May it call forth a more generous aid, a completer trust, a more enthusiastic love, by appealing to you in its triumphs, and its sorrows, as the voice of Christ, Himself saying: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

## MASSACHUSETTS ALTAR SOCIETY.

WHEN this Society was started by the Domestic Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary, five years ago, it was an experiment, but it has proved to be a successful one. There is an ever increasing demand for such assistance as we can give, and it is a great pleasure to find that there is also an increasing interest among the members; the subscribers, however, are still few.

We have given away during the year seventeen cassocks, ten surplices, six stoles, five sets of altar linen, six altar cloths, and one chalice and paten. Besides this we have assisted some parishes by cutting and making vestments, for which they provided the material. The value of all our donations amounts to \$303. This is more than our gifts last year, although the time for working had been shortened by two months, our report this year, ending Sept. first, instead of Nov. first, as it did last year, to bring our year into harmony with that of the Woman's Auxiliary.

We had, last year, thirty subscribers and one hundred and three working members. It is quite necessary that these members should be increased as we are constantly in need of more assistance in all the departments.

The subscriptions have been devoted this year to providing altar silver for mission stations, and we have been able to buy two sets with the amount received in this way. One has already been sent to Perham, Minn., and the other will go soon to a mission station in North Carolina.

Our treasury has been kept well filled by our numerous orders, otherwise we could not carry on our mission work. These orders have included all kinds of vestments, plain and embroidered, made by the workers, and various pieces of ecclesiastical brass work on which we get a percentage. These orders are necessary to our work, therefore we are anxious to receive them. The prices are reasonable, and we earnestly hope that any one who is thinking of purchasing these articles will patronize us.

Each year we have added some new feature to our work, and this year it has been a class in embroidery. This class has eight members and two teachers, and it met once a week from January until May. I think all who attended it enjoyed the lessons, and the society certainly profited by their work. The class will be continued this year, meeting in a room in St. Andrew's Building, which has been very cordially offered to us by the Rev. Mr. Kidner.

In closing the report I would like to give you the result of our five years' work. We have given away thirty cassocks, twenty-four surplices, twenty-six stoles, nineteen sets of altar linen, fourteen altar cloths, three sets of book marks, three sets of communion silver, and helped eleven parishes to make vestments, making 149 articles, in all valued at \$914. I hope the amount done may stim-

ulate all to do a great deal more. It is always inspiring to be connected with a successful organization, and ours has certainly been that; but while we congratulate ourselves on having been able to do so much, we must not think we have done enough, but remember that we must not weary in well doing, but always press on to greater usefulness. I can assure you that much more can be done than we are doing now, and could you read all the letters I receive I am sure you would seize with eagerness the opportunity of doing God service and cheering the hearts of those who are working so much harder in many distant places to build up His kingdom.

Let me urge you to renewed energy and interest in this work, and with God's blessing we shall lighten the burden on many shoulders.
