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

BY-LAWS.

I. THERE shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, &c.," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such Delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each Division of the work undertaken by said church, or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special Meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else, not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be requisite to form a quorum.

TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

We are again bidden to keep "The feast of In-gathering at the year's end." As we note the full harvest, and new, wide-spreading fields, we know that our petition for more laborers has been heard and answered, and every heart will be inspired to "Sing unto the Lord with thanksgiving."

Since the last annual gathering, our branch of the Auxiliary has broadened its lines, and, we believe, greatly increased its efficiency. Like the ancient builders of the Temple of God, we may say, "This work goeth on fast, and prospereth." Larger schemes than were ever before proposed, are successfully inaugurated. By request of the Diocesan Board of Missions we are co-operating in their efforts to strengthen the Church in the feeble parishes of Massachusetts, and with that purpose the new department, "Diocesan Missions," has been established; with the approval and aid of the Bishop, four officers have been added to our Board—an Assistant Secretary of the Domestic Committee, to whom is entrusted the entire charge of work in behalf of Missions in our own Diocese, and three Vice-Presidents who are placed over three Missionary Districts—the Worcester, the Connecticut Valley, and the Berkshire. The Vice-Presidents are empowered to call meetings of the several parishes included in their districts; and, working with the Standing Committee of the Auxiliary (of which they are members), and with the Rectors of these parishes, are requested to give such needful information, aid, or counsel, as shall develope greater interest, and promote larger growth in mission work. We aim to arouse every Church woman in Massachusetts to a realization of her personal responsibility, in efforts for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. No parish will necessarily longer be deprived of the strength, inspiration and glow that cheer fellow workers in a great organization. We need the substantial help and close fellowship of the many true-hearted Christian women, hitherto apart from us.

As we are more closely united, let us presume to urge your appreciation of the great pleasure experienced by the several members of the Standing Committee, in acceptance of the occasional invitation to visit and confer informally with parochial societies, a little remote from our centre. They would gladly whisper into willing ears, items—often too sacred to find their way into print—of the joys and sorrows, the real needs and sacrifices, the loneliness and discouragements of our brave Missionaries, thus bringing the hearts of workers at home more into touch with those for whom they are privileged to work.

The Treasurer's Annual Report gives proof of another new departure. That we may harmonize our yearly accounts with those of Miss Emery, General Secretary, our financial year will now and henceforth date from the 1st of September, and no report has been made to-day of money disbursed or the value of boxes forwarded since that date. This is not a new rule, but we have for the first time been obedient to its demand. Our figures for this year are consequently lessened by the relative value of two and a half months. But this appearance of diminished prosperity need not depress us; for we find that the result of our abbreviated working year is, in value, considerably over \$22,000, only \$500 less than the *total* of last year, and exceeded by but three annual offerings since we began existence as a branch of the Auxiliary, twelve years ago.

With the establishment of many new agencies, it is deemed expedient to abolish the time-honored custom of a report from each committee. Your Secretary assumes the duty assigned to her, and gives the record of the whole work, with no slight degree of sympathy in the disappointment of many who have hitherto listened with interest to detailed account of labors wrought and appeal for aid in new ventures.

The long columns headed "Boxes with Valuations," "Payments" for Churches, Schools, Hospitals, Orphanages, Scholarships, Life Insurances, Salaries of Missionaries and Teachers, etc. etc., tell the year's work. Domestic, Diocesan, Indian, Colored, Foreign, Mexican and Haitien Missions have all been aided and comforted. The record is good; it tells of self-denying effort, of interest and active zeal. Yet it grows poor and small as we place by it a long list of burning appeals for immediate help, the knowledge of pressing needs and actual poverty of strong men and delicate women, who are making glorious their profession as Soldiers of Christ in our home and foreign fields, and the *certainty that we could do more* were we fully obedient to the Divine Command!

The "Domestic" Committee pleads for extended interest in the Missionary Dioceses of our own country. Our hearts should indeed burn with holy zeal, as we witness the faith and courage that animate godly Bishops and clergy, amid unending labors and difficulties. What can they do to supply the spiritual needs of the thousands, pressing in like a mighty army to possess the land of their several jurisdictions, unless Christian men and women, who know that the dear Lord died for the salvation of these, as for themselves, will strengthen the hands of His Ambassadors? During the past four years the sum of \$1800 has been given in support of Missionaries in Bishop Brewer's Diocese of Montana. Our pledges (made for but *three* years and voluntarily continued) have been redeemed, and we turn to other causes. But that work has grown, until it demands the full efforts of three men, and it ought not to be discontinued for need of funds. In the jurisdiction of Wyoming and Idaho, Bishop Talbot is making earnest effort to establish Church Schools; for this purpose it is essential that he shall secure \$10,000 in addition to the offerings of his own Diocese. Delegates from thirty-six of our Parishes have recently signified to our

Domestic Committee their hearty concurrence in the proposal of the Committee to pledge \$1000 for this object, the payments to be made in two consecutive years. The names of one hundred and eighteen parishes and missions are upon our list. Will not many of these hasten to signify their desire to advance this good work?

For one and all of our Missionary Bishops do we entreat your sympathy and your help. The daily newspaper, with its statistics of immigration and almost incredible growth of population in our nearly illimitable country, and its sickening record of ignorance and lawlessness and sin, pleads with unintentional eloquence the necessity of Domestic Missions, and shows the burden laid upon those who "watch for souls as they that must give account."

Identified with this department is that recently inaugurated in behalf of "Diocesan Missions." The doors of our homes open upon the new field. We enter it at every turn in the great cities, the manufacturing towns, the rural districts of Massachusetts. And yet, our eyes are so blinded we too often fail to see the many thousands who are deprived of the rich blessings and comforts afforded through the ministrations of our own beloved Church, and our ears are more than dull of hearing, and cannot hear the entreaty of Bishop, Clergy and Laymen, to send to the needy in our own Diocese the riches of the Gospel of Christ!

We have made a beginning of better ways. Every Rector has been requested to work with us, and to appoint a representative in his parish who will communicate with Miss Milton, the appointed Secretary. Feeble parishes are urged to make known their wants, and with the promise of encouragement, are incited to renewed effort for themselves. From prosperous parishes we earnestly solicit moneyed contributions, that may aid the payment of salaries in our feeble missions, the debts upon church buildings, and other necessary outlays. And since we would not reflect upon (neither is it possible to *forget*) the noted generosity of our wealthy parishes in furnishing Missionary Boxes, we beg that the Diocesan Mission Committee shall be richly supplied with substantial and valuable articles of clothing and the usual necessities for home comfort, that being dispensed judiciously and delicately, will carry cheer and assurance of sympathy to those who often need far more than they ask! Strong in faith, courage and determination we enter upon our new undertaking; help us to help each other, as members of one household.

Through divers channels your Christian charity has flown, purifying and sweetening the lives of the much tried Indians of the West and Colored people of the South. The story of suffering and wrong is too old and too new to necessitate recital from the Dakota League. Prominent in the recorded work of the year we find aid for St. Mary's and St. Paul's Schools in Dakota, for the Segur Colony, and for the education of the daughter of a Missionary to the Indians, the establishment of another scholarship in Hope School, several large donations of books, etc. etc. The statement of the Mohawk Conference that "Land, Law and Education are the three things that Indians need," and the desire expressed by the leaders in our great national organizations for relief of the Indians, "that Government will *not* withdraw aid from Contract

Schools," embolden us to urge more faith in the ultimate results of our present undertakings, and a holy rivalry with other Christian bodies, in giving to them the knowledge of Christ. They receive it gladly, and show the result in development of a spirit of self-help, in their generous donations to their poorer brethren, in the awakening interest in Mission work (as evinced in the establishment of a branch of the Auxiliary among the Indian women of Dakota), and above all, in the advance of meritorious pupils to the position of trained Catechists, thence to the Diaconate, and after due time, the return of these to their former wild homes as Christian Messengers of Eternal Life and Peace. The work is indeed Divinely ordered, Divinely blessed, and must go on.

The cheering aspect of Missions for the Colored People of the South is cause for thankfulness. Our Committee note the good effect of the Colored Commission in making clear the general plan and extent of the work; in the agitation of the color question in some Southern Dioceses, thus bringing the matter to the attention of many who would not be otherwise interested, and in the growth and elevation in grade of the higher schools. A deeper appreciation of the helplessness and homelessness of these people has entered into the hearts of our church-women in Massachusetts, and we rejoice in more money pledges for salaries, scholarships, etc., a larger money value of the Missionary boxes, and a show of interest in some of our weaker parishes. But we can take no rest, until three times our present "forty" parishes realise the great ease and the little cost with which they can give material assistance in the form of boxes of good, although partly-worn clothing, and also in *many small* offerings of money, to relieve immediate suffering. It has been a long, cold, dark night for the Indians and Colored people. Through the faint gleams of the dawn we catch glimpses of the brightness of the coming day—but still too many

"Homes are bare and cold,"

and still the

"Lambs for whom the Shepherd died
Are straying from the fold!"

Turning to look at Missions for Mexico and Haiti, we find strength and good courage combating gigantic difficulties and disappointments. A new scholarship has been established in Mrs. Hooker's Orphanage in Mexico, several Mission stations, under the superintendence of the Rev. William B. Gordon, have been well helped, and the admirable work of the school at Cuaxithi has been greatly advanced through our contributions. But without decided increase of offerings and pledges the work cannot go on. In Haiti, the dark clouds of sorrow and suffering of twelve months ago, proved but the opening of a long storm. A few boxes and some money contributions witness to our sympathetic remembrance of these poor Christian brethren, but "what are they among so many?" The poverty of the Church, the great privations of the Bishop, Clergy, and self-sacrificing helpers, ought to stir us into instant adoption of any plans of relief which may be proposed by the Board of Missions. Amid "fightings without and fears within," a few brave

souls bear Christ's Banner in the battle fields of those distant lands, and the blood of martyrs, whose history will ever be unwritten, is enriching the soil of the Church of God. Were we to concentrate all the strength of our Auxiliary in this Diocese, upon Mexico and Haïti, there would still be opportunity for other helpers to do all in their power.

The character of our work for Foreign Missions proves that such Missions are far from being a failure. Note the payments on the third year of the "Eliza F. Drury Memorial Home" in Western Africa, the demand for scholarships, promoting Christian education of the children of heathen parents, the help to Mrs. Brierly, toiling on *alone* year after year, with never-failing health and courage, in a prostrating climate with much physical weakness, because of the visible advance in the Christian life of the pupils of the Mission. Observe the elevating and purifying effect of our schools in Japan, and the readiness of the people to learn of the principles of Christ—and the Institute of Tokio, for the advanced education of women of high social position—the rapid growth of these schools, and the almost inevitable planting of the seed in their expanding minds by Christian teachers. Then the "St. Mary's Baby Orphanage," Shanghai, China, where we have again through our offerings sent some degree of comfort. They tell us, in forcible words, of their need of greater assistance. Will not the cry of the homeless, motherless little ones reach the ears of loving mothers here, and move them to teach their own sheltered and tenderly-nurtured children to give to these orphans something of the brightness and warmth of a Christian home?

Apart from these systematic contributions the children's Penny Collection has helped the Massachusetts Sunday School Scholarship in Cavalla, Africa. The work in the Zenanas of India has been advanced, and the sufferings consequent to the floods in China have been alleviated through your contributions. The Rev. Mr. Wilson, of Springhill Mines, Nova Scotia, moved many hearts into generous response to his appeal for aid in erecting Chapel and Hospital for the poor miners under his spiritual oversight; a people of all nations—many of our own countrymen—literally dwelling in darkness all the long day, but generally willing, and often eager, to be taught the Word of Life during their hours of rest. From every distant land we hear the call; we see the opened ports, the opening hearts, and are easily persuaded that our Christian Heralds may quietly and moderately enter and take possession. But there is a hard battle to be fought. Infidelity and so-called science, and the teachers of a faith which denies the Lord who bought us and redeemed us by His own most precious Blood, have already planted their banners in the field, and it is time indeed for the Soldiers of Christ to arise and put their armor on!

Within such easy reach of Church people, that it is too often overlooked, is an opportunity for good, in which your interest is solicited. The Chinese in the city of Boston are already very numerous. They prove grateful and interested pupils in Sunday School; but, as each pupil must have his teacher exclusively, it is difficult to find many who *can*, and others who *will*, give them an hour on Sunday afternoon.

"Every creature" (to whom the Gospel shall be preached) certainly includes the heathen people who come to find a home in Christian lands. We ask all who can to teach the poor Chinese that they "are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the saints, and of the household of God."

The Altar Society goes on its way so unobtrusively, it is difficult to realize the very great necessity of more willing workers. Through the faithful labors of a few, they have given away during the year twenty-five Surplices, sixteen Cassocks, twenty Stoles, fourteen sets of Altar Linen, three sets of Communion Silver, besides giving value of work when materials were furnished, in total \$513.29. The Committee record with thankfulness the spiritual help afforded through the administration of the Holy Communion and an address from the Rev. Mr. Kidner, on the occasion of the annual meeting, and the use of the cheery working rooms of St. Andrew's Church Building for the embroidery class. An effort has been made to divide the work into several departments, which necessitates the willing service of more persons who can prepare the different articles and share the responsibility. The example of St. Paul's Church, Brookline, is worthy of emulation:—one lady taking charge of all work sent from the Altar Society, and others pledging themselves to sew an half hour daily and pay ten cents each towards the expenses of express, etc. From February to May seventy-five articles were furnished by them. The President asks *only* the time and interest of more helpers, all materials being freely furnished by the Altar Society.

The Church Periodical Club, inaugurated in New York within the past year, and heartily commended to Diocesan Branches by the General Secretary of the Auxiliary, is an organization giving promise of great usefulness. It undertakes to supply to Missionaries and others of the Clergy, to schools, reading-rooms, prisons and houses of charity, religious and secular magazines, papers and books, and to aid in the establishment of reading-rooms in feeble parishes and Mission Stations. A small beginning has been made in our Diocese, and we trust that the excellent and easy charity will take hold of the hearts of many, as they realize the great good and comfort conveyed through such a channel. We suggest this as a work that would certainly enlist the interest of young school girls, who have little time for more active effort for Missions. In the last report of the "Children's Twenty Minute Society," we find that the children of Massachusetts have contributed more than seven-eighths of the total, over \$300. Every parochial branch of our Diocesan Girls' Friendly Society (mostly composed of girls who earn their daily bread) has a good record of Missionary work and offerings. Miss Emery's last Annual Report shows the *children's* offerings during the past year as amounting to "over \$50,000, besides many well filled Missionary boxes." Can we not arouse the *young girls* of our large Diocese to give, in remembrance of the rich blessings of their happy lives, a little of their time, their means, and of themselves, to systematic work for Missions?

We close our record with reverent gratitude for all that our Lord

and Master has enabled us to accomplish in His service. As "Laborers together with God" we look upon broad fields stretching over this fair earth on every side; we see some in the seed-time, some in the fulness of a ripe harvest, and many "in the lands of wilderness and great drought." We have, to-day, again presented "ourselves, our souls and our bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice," and with renewed consecration we go forth, rejoicing in our opportunities, and remembering the Divine Promise that all the earth shall see the salvation of our God. We look for the coming of the happy day when shall be heard "The voice of a great multitude saying, Alleluia, for the Lord God omnipotent reigneth. Let us be glad, and rejoice, and give honor to Him."

THE Standing Committee of the Auxiliary met for informal discussion of the work of the Vice-Presidents, November 7, in the Library of All Saints Church, Worcester. The plans already adopted were enlarged upon, with suggestions as to details. Cordial acquiescence was expressed in the proposal of the Diocesan Mission Committee for combined effort in behalf of the Mission at Athol.

At the close of the Conference Mrs. Burnham introduced Mrs. Twing, Honorary Secretary of the Auxiliary, saying that she had a communication of interest to make to the ladies. Mrs. Twing then briefly announced her expectation of making very shortly a visit to the far distant field of China, on the invitation of the Bishop of Shanghai; the expenses of the passage and return, six hundred dollars, having been generously paid by one officer of the Massachusetts Branch of the Auxiliary. The purpose of the visit is, in conference with the Bishop and other Missionaries, to plan for the larger development of work for and among Chinese women, who, in consequence of national prejudice, have no pastorate, and cannot be reached by the ministry of the clergy, either native or foreign. Mrs. Twing's intention is to spend a short time also in Japan, and then to return and tell the various Branches of the Auxiliary what she has seen and heard in both countries, asking their help in inaugurating new work and establishing more firmly what is already begun. The visit to China will include our Missions in Shanghai, Haukow, Wuchang and Ischang, the last point being one thousand miles up the Yang-tse Kiang river.

The officers expressed their warm sympathy with Mrs. Twing in the proposed journey, and pledged her their continued interest and all the support that it might be in their power to give. They ask for her the prayers of all the members of the Auxiliary in this Diocese, and such special contributions to the undertaking as may enable Massachusetts to retain in it throughout, the same foremost and honorable position, which, through the liberality of one of its own officers, it has now the pleasure and privilege of enjoying.
