B Y - L A W S .

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, &c.," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such Delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each Division of the work undertaken by said church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special Meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else, not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be requisite to form a quorum.

SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

EACH annual meeting must bring with it the result of the work for the year past, and in looking back upon that which has been so satisfactorily accomplished, may we not awaken an enthusiasm which shall kindle anew a desire to do more and nobler deeds for Him, who thought it not too much to give His very self that we might better know the true spirit of self-sacrifice and love? It is with this hope that we bring before you the Seventeenth Annual Report.

The monthly meetings from September to May were very largely attended, not only by those living in the city, but also by those coming from out of town, and it can be truly said that each meeting was one of special interest. On different occasions, five Bishops and as many Missionaries set forth most clearly and forcibly the needs and possibilities of their work, and the letters which were frequently received from our President, descriptive of her visits to stations in Japan and elsewhere, were also read. With these varied pictures of missionary life came numerous demands, and it is very gratifying to know that in spite of the general feeling of depression which existed during the past winter, when there were so many calls for assistance from all sources, our Branch of the Auxiliary did not fall behind, but did its share in answering appeals both Foreign and Domestic, and that the Treasurer's report can be looked upon with satisfaction.

Possibly one of the most encouraging features of the year has been the constant organization of Parish Branches, for each branch means another link in the great chain of human interest and sympathy, which should be limitless; several branches of the Junior Auxiliary have also been formed, and the report of one especially, could it be given here at length, would no doubt cause astonishment, showing as it does how much can be done by a few children working systematically together, for besides raising quite a sum of money for different objects, a box was sent at Christmas to one of the missionaries in the South, containing more than one hundred gifts.

Encouraging news comes from the Vice-Presidents of the various districts. Mrs. Bigelow writes of the Worcester District, "every branch has worked with interest," and, "our meeting held in Worcester was very largely attended, two hundred and fifty persons being present." From Berkshire District, we hear through Mrs. Newton of the fulfillment of the pledge to raise seven hundred dollars for the "Elizabeth Stuart Newton Memorial Fund." Connecticut Valley and the South Eastern District have also been hard at work; although the latter was only organized a year ago, its record is an excellent one, and it would be well if the other districts could follow the example of the South Eastern, paying as it does, the expenses of a delegate to be sent to the monthly meetings in Boston, thus keeping more in touch with the work in general.

As each Committee gives its own report, there remain but two points which must be brought forward here, and it is earnestly desired all should bear them in mind, namely, the "Bishop Brooks Memorial Fund" and the "United Offering." Neither belongs to any special division but to every church woman, who should deem it a privilege to give to one or both of these most noble objects. The "Bishop Brooks Memorial Fund" is permanent, and we hope will grow annually larger.

Massachusetts must not forget what she has pledged herself to do for the "United Offering" or how far short the sum already in hand comes from the amount which should be handed in to the general treasury at the Convention in 1895; let each one realize how quickly the time passes, and how necessary it will be for every woman to do what she can, if she desires that the pledge to the "United Offering" be fulfilled.

One of the gifts of the year which deserves special mention is the "Mary E. Foote Memorial Fund." Four hundred dollars have been placed at the disposal of a member of our Committee, for the personal use of clergymen in this country; it is spoken of here for the Indian, Colored and Domestic Committees; all derive benefit from the fund.

The resignation of Miss Ellicott is deeply regretted by the members of the Auxiliary, as well as by the Standing Committee, who appreciate most fully the excellent and faithful work done by her as Secretary.

Our Report would seem most incomplete should we close it without expressing the pleasure we feel in having our President once more with us. Our thanks are also due her for keeping us so constantly in mind during her journey around the world.

DOMESTIC DIVISION.

As we read together the Annual Report of the work done by the Domestic Division of our Auxiliary, we find that all has gone on even more generously than in the past. For this we give thanks to God, and we stand ready to listen with heads bowed while He says to us, "O ye of little faith," for we were very fearful at the beginning of the year lest the financial difficulties, with which we are all so well acquainted, should cripple our workers and our work. But God be praised who giveth us the victory, and to whom all things are possible.

Perhaps in this connection we might like to read the figures which so encourage us, and which represent to us God's fulfillment of promise and answer to our prayers.

The contributions for Diocesan work have amounted to \$1,090.00, and Miss Turner, the Secretary of that work, gives us her report in the following words: "In regard to the Diocesan work, while it is a pleasure to be able to state that the amount received during the past year has exceeded that of the previous year, it is a great disappointment that the number of parishes contributing to the work has been less. During the coming year we hope to work in connection with the Archdeacons, learning from them the especial needs in the several archdeaconries, and giving such help, either in larger or smaller sums, as may seem best to them."

For our Domestic work we have received in money, \$3,651.46; in boxes, \$6,716.35; through the Children's Penny Collection, for the Child's Hospital Cot, \$96.79; making a total of nearly twelve thousand dollars. It is very gratifying to acknowledge several large gifts from individuals. These gifts have made this very satisfactory total possible. Let us remember for ourselves, and remind our friends that our Auxiliary Report is the only means by which a record of the gifts of Church women is kept, and that therefore it is most desirable that all such gifts should be reported to us. Pleased with our prosperity, do not let us sit down smiling with folded hands, but let us pray that prosperity may make us not only very glad, but very humble, and be an inspiration to more prayer and greater effort in the future.

Our Missionary boxes have been sent out as usual, most of them carrying joy and comfort to the hardworking men and women who earn them with so much self-denying labor, but we must remember that it is very easy for a box to cause sorrow and mortification, and a small box carrying such things as the givers, if in a like position, would enjoy receiving, gives far more happiness than a large box filled with such things as we can most easily send. The clerical suit as we read in last year's Report, is no longer a terror, but the unmarried clergyman is still unpopular, and it is suggested to us as a happy solution of the difficulty that his needs should be supplied by individuals instead of by societies. The box for an unmarried clergyman does not usually call for a great expenditure of money, but societies do not care to undertake it because there is very little sewing to be done. If persons willing to undertake the filling of these boxes as the letters come to us

during the winter would send their names to some officer of the Domestic Division, it would be a great help.

The Massachusetts Altar Society, which has done much successful work during the year, will do all in its power to assist any one in making up these boxes. Miss Parker, the President of the Society, reports the work done for the past year to consist of one hundred and two articles sent to fifty-nine stations in twenty-five States or Counties, amounting in value to \$581.00. Miss Parker asks for more members paying the annual assessment of fifty cents, and more helpers in the sewing.

Our pledges for the year, which were \$500.00 to Bishop Brooke and \$100.00 to the salary of a Deaconess, have been fully redeemed, and help has been sent to several other places.

Thinking of our many blessings, let us lift up our eyes unto the hills from whence cometh our help. Let us rejoice always and be giving thanks, praying that God will give us in greater measure each year the privilege of spending and being spent, and may all our efforts be for His glory.

THE INDIAN AND COLORED PEOPLE'S DIVISION.

"BETTER keep some of your Indians wild, bishop, if you would keep the Church interested," said a friend to Bishop Hare a few years ago; but we do not and cannot believe that, as the picturesqueness of savage life and the quaint dialect of the negro disappear, and new and complicated problems present themselves, the friends of these two races will weaken or fail. So far, at least, we have no grounds for such fear, for our record of the past year gives us hope and courage for the future. Surely it is not enough to confine our efforts to any few stations or dioceses, when the field is so wide and so white.

Our Treasurer's Reports show that our old friends have not been neglected. The usual work has been done in South Dakota, both for the Indian schools (especially St. Mary's and St. Paul's) and the mission stations and catechists (notably those in charge of Rev. Edward Ashley). Something has been sent to the Oneida Mission, where the little hospital is now completed. The Lucy Lee Chickering Fund, used last year for the benefit of the colored people, has provided an organ for St. Augustine's, Raleigh, and an altar for the Church in Tyler, Texas. We like to think of the worship in these far-away chapels, made rich and beautiful in her dear name.

Our interest in St. Augustine's has been stimulated by the visit of Mrs. Hunter; no one could hear her without feeling a growing respect for the standards and methods of this Industrial Normal School—already stamped with the special approval of the Commission; this impression has been recently deepened by the visit of Mr. Crittenden, himself the superintendent of the tin shop as well as the head of the classical department—a man who believes for his race, as for all races, in the dignity of labor, self-dependence and thoroughness.

One change we note in our work. For the salary of Mrs. Payne, whom feebleness has withdrawn from her long and faithful service, we are no longer responsible, but towards her pension we have felt sure that her old friends would gladly give one hundred dollars. This we have pledged.

The support of women missionaries has always seemed a most suitable work for our Society; associations of other Christian names shame us in this regard. We rejoice to know that for the coming year, two women, whom we may claim for Massachusetts, are to labor, one in the far North, the other in the South. Miss Wheeler returns to her efficient work in Columbia in association with Archdeacon Joyner. In special charge of boxes and the sale of clothing for the benefit of the mission, she will also be in touch with the manifold activities that centre in Columbia. How can we best show that we *do* rejoice in her return?

Miss Sabine, long known to many of us as "Sister Bertha," is by this time at home in Alaska. Our last news from her is dated July 17th, just before the little mission band, Mr. and Mrs. Chapman, Dr. Glenton and Miss Sabine, took the river boat that each year makes its trip to far-off Auvik. In the long summer day, with but three hours of darkness, she wrote of the incidents of the journey, and of the joy and hope and humility with which she went to her untried field. A house is to be built, and there she will gather from the dark, unclean, underground huts a little band of girls to be trained into industrious, happy Christian children. Her heart is full of love to us; from our meetings came to her the great missionary impulse. "It is not really far," she writes, "for it is in Christ's Church, and centres and distances are nothing to Him." At our last anniversary one generous friend gave for Mr. Chapman's work in Alaska five hundred dollars. That sum would support Miss Sabine for one year. Good would it be if one friend would pledge it; almost better if, from many offerings flowing into one treasury from all over the diocese, we could feed this flame of devoted service by which the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour is to come to those who, in their long night of winter, sit also in spiritual darkness.

From our Indian Missions, as from the South, comes the cheering word of "an advance all along the line." Wisely and well are many laborers seeking to lay broad and deep foundations as they preach the everlasting Gospel to the red man or the negro. Dangers and difficulties abound, but their hearts are undaunted. Let us not belittle our part in this great work. True it is that the poorest parish or person may do something. Boxes of clothing, or packages

which can be put into larger boxes, are always in demand for schools, hospitals, missionaries, native helpers or for sale. We can suggest work for any parish in accord with its abilities or wishes. But let us not forget that in very definite ways money is needed. No sum can be too small, no sum too great, from the dollar that will help to pay a five dollar scholarship, to the thousand that will support two women missionaries. May we not ask each society to remember this as the winter's work is planned?

From time to time members of this committee have been glad to tell to various parish organizations the details of the work, as they cannot be given in a report; but where this is not possible, why should not all the parishes have these details from their own members? This method is so successfully pursued in some places that we long to see it universal. We can furnish letters and leaflets. The "Spirit of Missions" is always at hand. We cannot, perhaps, *give* to every appeal, but more and more we believe that only as we keep shining before us the great missionary idea, made definite and practical by knowledge of what the great army is doing at special points, made warm and personal by our own growing sense of what Christ is to us, and must be to the world, so only can we do our best. No lowliest duty will seem too small, no highest demand too great for our obedient wills.

FOREIGN DIVISION.

YOUR Foreign Committee have much that is hopeful to report. The actual amount of your offerings is about the same as in the preceding year—with the additional sum of eleven hundred dollars toward the Bishop Brooks Memorial Church in Africa. The visit of Bishop Ferguson last autumn, and the longer stay of Mrs. Brierley among us, stirred up renewed interest in the Liberian Mission. To this was added the impetus given by the proposal to erect there a memorial to our late dearly loved Bishop. As a result the gifts for Africa have been out of all proportion to those for Japan and China—indeed almost twice as much as the sum of them. While this is relatively to be regretted, no one who knows the faithful labors and sore needs of the little devoted band there, can help wishing the actual amount far larger than it is. Those who heard Mommolu Massaquoi last winter received a vivid impression of what our Christian schools in Liberia are doing for the native people. No doubt, too, every one felt a certain thrill of surprise that so much intelligence and real manhood should lurk beneath the dark skin of a wild African boy. But this need no longer astonish us. The excellent intellectual and moral capacity of the native African has been abundantly proven of late years.

Bishop Crowther was a remarkable instance, and his granddaughter, Emilie Nichol, is now, as we all know, doing devoted and effective work at St. George's Hall as Mrs. Brierley's substitute during her absence. The last word that comes from Africa tells how our native priest at Cape Mount has redeemed from slavery ten children, boys and girls, of varying ages, to whom he is giving Christian nurture, entirely unaided, out of his own scanty means. We are thankful that we can send Mrs. Brierley back with full hands, and help to give her two new valuable co-workers, Dr. Sarah L. Walrath and Miss Woodruff.

In Japan we have had some reverses. The recent earthquake at Tokyo made serious havoc in our buildings, and especially at the Cathedral, and cost us the life of a native teacher in St. Paul's school. Through the mercy of God there were but two persons in the building at the time of the earthquake, the school having closed the previous day for vacation. Our valuable missionary, Miss Mailes, has been obliged to return home on account of ill-health, but we trust that this is only temporary. Her cherished work of training "Bible women" is now being carried on very ably by her pupil, the devoted Kimura San. It is discouraging that St. Agnes' school at Osaka should have had to be closed, but, perhaps, that work is really transferred now to Tokyo; and, at any rate, the establishment of St. John's Orphanage in permanent quarters at Osaka must be a distinct gain for that place. It seems impossible that with such devoted and untiring Christian teachers the young people of our mission schools should not be well grounded and built up in the Faith, but one of the missionaries begs our prayers that Japanese teachers who are not Christians may be entirely banished from the schools. It has been thought necessary to admit them in some cases for the maintenance of a certain fine equipoise of relation with the Japanese, who are over-sensitive about foreign influence. But such a policy would certainly seem a questionable one to say the least. An interesting and hopeful sign is the sending forth last month of a lay missioner by the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. Mr. Evans will be under Rev. Isaac Noonan at Nara, and will teach in the school there.

In China the work has made remarkable advances during the past year. But, alas! our share has been as nothing! We have given but the paltry sum of three hundred and fifty-three dollars all told. Your committee feel that we must begin to work once more in earnest for China, if we are not to be hopelessly shamed. This year Rev. Y. K. Yen, Miss Dodson and others of the China mission are with us, and we trust that their living presence will make us feel, as never before, the needs of that great empire, still sitting in darkness and in the shadow of death! God forbid that we should ask you to do anything but *increase* your offerings for Africa, but when we realize that Liberia has received about three times as much as China, *excluding* the sums toward the memorial, we cannot but feel that we have in some way failed to present as we should the immense needs of China. If you would read the little publication* which Bishop Graves sends out

every other month, it would give a great impulse to your interest. The shortest possible summary for the past year includes the re-building of St. John's College, Shanghai, the transference of St. Luke's Hospital to the mission, the opening of St. Peter's Hospital at Wuchang, the sending out of two new workers, Miss Ward and Miss Crummer, the first anniversary meeting of the Chinese Woman's Auxiliary, and the first general missionary council at Shanghai. Now they require a Deaconess' House and a helper for Miss Dodson. Miss Emery asks our special interest in this new effort, and also renews the request that we would support one of our women workers in Japan. We failed to do this during the past year, contributing only about one-third of the needed amount. Let the new year find us with our loins girded and our lamps burning, and like unto them that wait for their Lord.

MEXICAN AND HAITIAN DIVISION.

WE have not this year as last to report any great changes in the work of our Committee. Mr. Forrester has continued his care of the Mission in Mexico on the lines which he mapped out before us at our last Anniversary. The Orphanage has been enlarged, the course of instruction carefully revised, and Miss Driggs has had the assistance of Miss Mutschlechner of Buffalo. The girls have given the greatest satisfaction to their teachers. Twenty-three out of the whole number of forty-four are communicants, and several are to go out as teachers this year. New scholarships are much needed, and money to assist day scholars whose parents are very poor will be of great service to Miss Driggs. The little girls come sometimes without having had any breakfast, and with no prospect of sufficient food when they go home. With a little money at hand Miss Driggs can make them comfortable in the matter of food and clothing, and save them from the life of the streets, into which so many Mexican girls are forced.

Mr. Forrester's great hope is in a training school for boys where they can be fitted for the ministry. He has had five boys under his instruction, and hopes to make them the nucleus for a theological school. But means are sadly wanting for this his favorite plan, upon which he believes the future of the Mexican Church depends. He is very anxious to obtain scholarships for this work. The cost of maintaining one of these boys is ninety dollars a year in our money. We hope and pray that some one, or some parish, in this diocese may come forward and assume one of these scholarships. Surely we may trust to

Mr. Forrester's wise and discriminating judgment when we know that he is to have the choice of the scholar and the training of him for Christian work. And we cannot help seeing what a power the trained and consecrated life will be among his brethren.

Another great cause of anxiety this year has been the day schools connected with the congregations in the country. There is danger that they may have to be closed for want of means to continue them. We have sent about two hundred dollars for the Dean Gray Memorial School. We have never sent the full sum, two hundred and forty, which we undertook to do at first, and now the expenses are greater. Let us beg you to keep up and increase the contributions towards this school, and, if possible, send help to the others, so that this most important branch of the work need not fail for want of aid.

A strong appeal has come to this country from Bp. Holly for the rebuilding of the church in Port au Prince. For years the good bishop and his family have lived in their little cabin outside the city, striving to raise among their own poor people, and to win from the sympathy of their mother church, the means to begin once more their labors for Christ. It is hard to see why such patience and fidelity should go so long unrequited. Our total gift to Haiti this past year was \$16.50. Why is not some small but regular offering given by each parish for this work, which appeals to us by every plea which a mission can make:—its needs; its uncomplaining patience; its faithful efforts at self-support, its continuance in well-doing? Must we give such a deaf ear to its call this coming year? Shall we not rouse ourselves to send some worthy contribution for its necessities?

But we will not close our report by a complaint. We are very thankful that this year of need and distress at home has still found us able and willing to give to distant lands — far from us — but just as near the great heart of our Heavenly Father as His children here. May that Father's love kindle ours to warmer charity, and even more generous giving in the years to come.

IN MEMORIAM.

AT a special meeting of the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the following memorial to Bishop Brooks was accepted by a rising vote and placed on record:—

Few and simple must our words be, as we speak of the loss to this society of its friend and Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Phillips Brooks.

Surely no work in the whole church could be nearer to him than that which we are set to do. He, whose love for man, knowing no distinction of land, or race, or caste, made the whole world one, whose consuming passion it was to show to all men the light and love of God in the face of Jesus Christ, could give nothing but blessing and support to us.

And how generously he gave! We remember the ready ear, the quick response, the frank and genuine respect, the gentle courtesy, the spiritual sympathy and support, which he gave unstintedly.

As he spoke to us of our work, "the great, deep spiritual meaning of it all rose up and took possession of us with its power." We might multiply devices and alter methods, but "the living spirit was within the wheels," and the simplicity of the missionary idea —the love of God going forth to save—put all minor things in their true place. Through the transparent purity of the life he lived among us, we saw the Lord. In his death we are not comfortless, for all Love, and Life, and Work are one, and what know we?

"So many worlds, so much to do,
So little done, such things to be!
How know we what had need of thee,
For thou wert strong, as thou wert true?"

We pray that the memory of his passionate devotion, his undaunted courage, his gentle patience, his childlike reverence, his utter consecration, may inspire us now and always, that we may so do our humble work for the church he loved, that Christ, his Lord and ours, may draw near and abide with us forever.

Boston, Jan. 30, 1893.

Sure that the members of the Woman's Auxiliary throughout the diocese must desire to express, by some fitting offering, their gratitude to God for the great life whose loss we mourn, the Standing Committee requests that gifts for such a memorial be sent, as soon as may be, to the general treasurer, Miss S. J. Chase, Cambridge, Mass.

Sure that the offering will be spontaneous and generous, the committee name no special sum to be raised. Two things only they desire—that both the gift and the use of it may be as catholic as the spirit of him whom we seek to honor.

The gift shall be catholic. Therefore let every woman in the diocese, whose every village and town was dear to its bishop, send her offering, however small, that the memorial may be the loving tribute of the many.

The use of it shall be catholic. Whatever sum is raised, will be held as the Bishop Brooks Memorial Fund. The income of this will be used each year by the several departments of the auxiliary in turn, at the discretion of those in charge, so that each new year shall bring to some little point in the great mission field—in our own diocese, in the far West or South, in Mexico, or in distant foreign lands—some help and cheer, some ministry of Christ, given in loving memory of him who was in deed and truth our missionary bishop.

It is requested that those to whom this statement comes, will make it known to others.
