

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, &c.", as Delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such Delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each Division of the work undertaken by said church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special Meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else, not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be requisite to form a quorum.

EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

It would indeed be interesting could we follow, in detail, the work of our Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary as it is carried on from year to year in the different Parishes, but having neither time nor the proper statistics, we must content ourselves this afternoon with a very general glimpse of what has been accomplished since the last Annual Meeting. Then it seemed as if every Committee had before it innumerable pledges to fulfil and numerous plans for assisting those who looked to them for aid.

After listening to the various reports, we shall see that many hopes have been realized.

Surely we can derive therefrom encouragement which will help us in taking up again that which from necessity, may have been left undone, and the new work for the winter which appeals, as it ever should, to the practical as well as to the sympathetic side of our nature.

Let us look first to the four Districts to see what progress has been made. Much has been done, but we will not single out any special deed of good will or charity to be recorded here, but rather be thankful for all, both great and small, as well as for the cheering words which come from the Vice Presidents, who report a steady, healthful, and growing interest in missions.

There is a marked individuality in the working of each District. We find in the Connecticut Valley that more than one half of the Parishes have Junior Branches, and in some few Baby Branches have been formed, while in the Worcester District little or nothing is done in these lines, there being but three active Junior Branches, but the unusually large and well attended meetings among the women show more than satisfactory results, one Parish branch alone having sent out boxes valued at over one thousand dollars, besides large contributions in money.

The Berkshire District is carrying on its usual work, and the South Eastern shows plainly the constant devotion and care given to the work by the Vice President. Much activity being displayed by both Parish and Junior Branches.

It is to be regretted that there are so many Parishes in the North Eastern part of the Diocese (seventy-five or more) that do not have

any especial oversight from the Standing Committee, and therefore have little knowledge of how the work of the Auxiliary is developed.

We hope to be able in the future to call the attention of these many branches, more fully, to the manner in which the Auxiliary, by systematic work, is able to send forth assistance to both the Foreign and Domestic Field, and also give them a clearer idea of the Diocesan work which is of so much importance. We should appreciate the fact that in assisting our Diocesan Parishes we make it sooner possible for them to take up their own share of mission work.

The sixteenth day of last October was observed generally by the Massachusetts Branch as one of special "Intercession and Prayer for Missions." Through the courtesy of the Rector and Wardens, Emmanuel Church was used for the services which were considered so helpful that it is hoped that a similar meeting may soon again be held.

It will be a gratification to many to learn that the "Bishop Brooks Memorial Fund" is still increasing, although not so rapidly as we could desire. In April forty dollars, a portion of the interest of the fund, was paid to the Dakota League. It has been arranged that each Committee shall in turn have forty dollars a year. When all have been benefited by it, the interest of the whole fund, whatever it may then be, will be used in the same manner.

So much of late has been said regarding the "United Offering" that it seems unnecessary to enlarge upon the subject, yet it would be ungrateful should we not thank those who have given so generously towards the \$5,729.77, the sum which Massachusetts sent as her share towards this most worthy object. With the exception of two noble donations of one thousand dollars each, one the gift of a lady in Springfield, the other from Trinity Church, Lenox, the amount was almost entirely made up by small contributions. We may justly look upon the whole as representing acts of self-sacrifice and love of which Massachusetts may truly feel proud.

May we now speak most lovingly of one, who since the organization of the Auxiliary in Massachusetts has ever been to it a zealous and sympathetic friend. By the death of Mrs. Calvin Page, which occurred last Spring, we have lost one of our most constant and devoted members, whose interest in the work will not only be perpetuated by gentle and kindly memories, but also by her bequest which gives to the Auxiliary a sum which yields something over twenty dollars a year. It was the desire of Mrs. Page that one half the interest should go yearly towards the general expenses, the remainder to be divided between the Foreign and Domestic Committees.

As we go forth from this, our Eighteenth Annual Reunion, may we remember the charge, "Withhold not good from them to whom it is due," and by keeping the words ever before us may we be brought to a realizing sense of how far we are responsible for those poorer lives which lack spiritual as well as bodily comforts.

DOMESTIC DIVISION.

The time has come again for our Annual Meeting, and for us to look over the year that is behind us, and see what we have done in the Diocesan and Domestic fields.

Let us take the Diocesan first. The Secretary tells us that the record for the past year is a satisfactory one. "Four of the Archdeacons have received help in their work, and the amount contributed has equalled our expectations. The work however grows constantly larger and the desire of the Committee that each parish in the diocese should contribute something has not yet been gratified. With the new year we trust that much may be gained in this direction."

Here Miss Turner's message to us ceases, but let us say to ourselves that much shall be gained in this direction in the new year, the responsibilities and duties of which we are just taking up. What a joy it is that all the years are not behind us, for alas we cannot undo, but we can always do more and better than we have done, and each annual meeting points to fresh opportunities for serving God by work. What strides we should make if we could realize that work for God, in order to be good, requires knowledge, thought, self-denial, real personal effort and perseverance, and that just like all other work it is good or poor, helpful or disappointing in proportion as these qualifications are brought to bear upon it. No good work is easy.

Turning to the Domestic field, the work has gone on prosperously in many directions, but those who can see the whole cannot help longing for more thoughtfulness and greater interest in each phase of the work. It is trying to see the easy parts taken up eagerly and the difficult parts, which are often the most important, left for someone else to do.

In the matter of missionary boxes, we do not seem to progress very rapidly. Perhaps further progress is not now possible, but are we willing to admit this, and to be satisfied with the height which we have reached? We hope not, for we all know that satisfaction, with attainment, is the sword which slays ambition, and is the forerunner of decay and degeneration. Let us be determined to do better work each day, gathering up the power gained by the experience of yesterday, and bringing it to bear with all the ingenuity of which we are capable on the work of to-day.

The pledges which we made last autumn have been redeemed. Bishop Brooke has been greatly helped and his medical missionary has been supported.

You will see by the annual report of the Treasurer that the value of our missionary boxes is \$6,195.20. The total of contributions in money is \$2,851.71. The Penny Collection from the Sunday Schools for the endowment of a Child's Cot at St. Peter's Hospital, Montana, was \$77.26.

The Altar Society, as in the past, has been ready to help us at all times, and we should often be at a loss if we did not have it to turn to. The report of this Society has been read to you from month to

month, but we should like to say here, that it needs very much the interest of new people and new workers in addition to the faithful ones who have been connected with it from the first.

And so ends our report and our year. Let us not be weary in well-doing, but press on to the prize of our high calling, looking unto Jesus the author and the finisher of all truly consecrated effort.

INDIAN AND COLORED PEOPLE'S DIVISION.

Everything that makes the missionary work personal and definite is of value, and we therefore rejoice that our past year shows growth in this direction.

First of all in importance, we count the visits made by active missionaries to parish and neighborhood meetings, where many who never come to our Boston meetings have heard from the lips of Bishop Talbot, Bishop Brooke, Mr. Coolidge, Archdeacon Joyner, Mr. Crittenden, Miss Wheeler and others the story of vigorous and practical missions among the Indians and colored people.

We mention next the plan of appointing a special parish delegate for each Committee, which seems to be growing in favor. It may not be possible for every parish to do each year something for each branch of our work, but the appointment of a delegate, while it pledges the parish to nothing, does make it possible for us to keep in touch with the workers all over the diocese as we can in no other way. May we not ask the parishes to remember this and act accordingly?

During the past year our aid has been given to the Indian and colored work in twelve different dioceses and has been of many sorts. The boxes, always needed, and usually most generously supplied, have gone to missionary, to catechist, to school, to shop, to hospital. In money, our gifts for scholarships have somewhat increased, but we still plead for more. To learn that five dollars practically keeps a colored child in school for a year is a revelation to many societies and classes that want a definite disposition for a small sum.

We have done our share in paying the pension of Mrs. Payne, have assumed about half Miss Sabine's support and the whole of Miss Wheeler's. Miss Wheeler had become to us all a welcome and familiar presence. We know her work in Columbia; it is exceptionally varied and successful, done among all sorts and conditions of colored people, in a spirit of sympathetic affection which bears witness of itself as she tells her story. Miss Sabine's picturesque account of her first year's work in Alaska will soon be in print for you all, but to the Woman's Auxiliary of Massachusetts comes a personal note of gratitude. Her heart and mind are consecrated to her far-off and scattered

Ingiliks, but her sympathies run through the world and she bids us pray for all darkened souls that the Lord will send forth witnesses to the true Light.

South Dakota, in which our Indian Missions are most firmly planted, needs most. Its schools and chapels, its faithful native workers claim our constant support. One pleasant item of our report shows the gift from one Sunday school of a large part of the sum necessary to fit up a cottage for sick children at St. John's School, Cheyenne.

The Oneida Mission has completed its little hospital and asks aid to maintain it. In Utah wonderful opportunities have opened for Indian work under government protection. In Wyoming we have done something for the Shoshone school. Mr. Deal's cooking school for colored children has been equipped by us.

In Indian Territory, Bishop Brooke has appointed an overseer for the Indian work; here the flourishing "Segur Colony," which owes so much to our former president, Mrs. Burnham, is to have at least the occasional ministrations of the Church, and the old work under David Okerhater, in whose planting we so long ago assisted, is to be revived and fostered. In addition to a pledge made to Bishop Brooke for this work, we sent to it a part of our income for this year from the Bishop Brooks Memorial Fund; the other half will give to the new chapel at St. Augustine's, Raleigh, a font or a lectern. We chose the Indian Territory Mission because it is so needy,—the St. Augustine's, because it is so thorough and hopeful. As we send the little gift on its way, we wish that it were more generously worthy of the name it bears, but we pray that it may carry at least a little courage, support and pure ambition to the workers for Christ and for His Church.

For all that has been done in the past we are grateful: for all we have failed to do, we mourn. What can we ask better for the new year than that the fountain of all missionary life—the Love of God in Jesus Christ our Lord—may so spring up in the hearts of all Christ's people that all wildernesses and solitary places of this great world may be glad for them, all deserts rejoice and blossom as the rose.

FOREIGN DIVISION.

As we turn toward the field of Foreign Missions for our annual survey of the work going on there, unhappy China, with its monstrous disintegrating Empire, its unsuccessful war, its riots and massacres of Christians, arrests our first attention and seems to present a spectacle of so much misery, that we are ready to cry out: "Who shall show us any good?" But it is only a momentary discouragement! We need not look far below the surface to perceive the premonitory movements

of a new life stirring among the dry bones of that ancient civilization. We know that new life, that formative impulse can have only one Source—even Him Who was with God in the beginning and Who was God. “By Whom also He made the worlds.” Sure that the new stirrings are from Him, we ask ourselves what humble share we may hope to have as co-workers with God in this great regeneration of China.

Last autumn, at the General Missionary Council of our Church in Hartford, the Woman’s Auxiliary pledged the amount necessary to build a Christian Training School for women at Shanghai, and it is now hoped to have the building ready for occupancy within a few months. There will then be inaugurated a systematic effort to train Christian woman teachers whose influence among their own people we trust may become powerful and far-reaching for good in the future. Meanwhile our very faithful and efficient worker, Miss Dodson, has gone back to her post there, having sailed a few weeks ago in company with two new Missionaries, one clerical, one lay, the Rev. Daniel Trumbull Huntington of Hartford, Conn. and Dr. W. L. Ludlow of Seattle, who has been sent out by St. Andrew’s Brotherhood.

The same ship carries back to the scene of his earlier missionary labors, that true hero of the Cross, Bishop Schereschewsky, who having at last accomplished, with almost superhuman effort, the great work which has filled his years of enforced absence, now returns bearing it as a priceless gift to the people among whom he hopes to pass the remnant of his days. Anyone who ever saw that devoted man, as your Secretary once had the privilege of doing, seated in almost complete physical helplessness amid his books and papers, his hand shaking, his speech faltering, but undying courage in his eye and in his words, will know that faith can still remove mountains and Apostolic love still hope and endure to the end. But we must hasten on! The Bishops consecrated two years ago for China and Japan, are at home again for the General Convention and we shall listen eagerly to all they have to tell us and to Bishop Ferguson who is also in our midst once more. Like China, Japan rejoices this year in the return of a Chief Pastor, the venerable and beloved Bishop Williams, who now resides at Kyoto, where assisted by two native Deacons, he ministers to the spiritual needs of many.

The war has been indirectly the means of bringing Christianity into greater prominence and has strengthened confidence in those who profess it. The leaven is working very surely and very widely in Japan, but the cry is for more workers and for their speedy sending forth. Two valuable women have been lost to the mission this year, Miss Palmer and Miss Goepp, and Miss Mailes is still invalidated although improving we hope. Miss Aldrich has returned with fresh vigor to her work and will resume her position as head of the Young Ladies’ Institute at Tokyo, while Miss Suthon still continues her devoted and successful labors at Armori. The Orphanages, Schools and Hospitals in Japan and China are all doing steady, noble, truly missionary work, sometimes it may be of a very humble character and in almost unnoticed ways. But it is always a blessed work and perhaps all the

more blessed for its humbleness if done, as we know that it is, with faithful and loving hearts.

In Africa the little children are weeping, ay and the older ones too, for their mother has been taken away from them. On July the sixth, that devoted woman Mrs. Brierley ceased from her earthly labors. One of those who owe everything to her writes: "I cannot in words begin to picture how God has blessed my people through the instrumentality of this noble woman of God. Her death brought sorrow to the hearts of Pagans, Mohammedans and Christians alike." Since the death of Mrs. Brierley, her able co-worker Dr. Walrath has been dangerously ill, but we hope that she is quite restored again by this time. She is in immediate need, however, of an assistant, and oh how pressing and pathetic is the reiterated appeal for a church and priestly ministrations at Cape Mount. Almost with her dying breath did Mrs. Brierley deplore the deprivation of her "dear children" who were able to receive the Holy Communion "only once in thirteen months." "Truly our God is faithful," she writes, "or we should never be able to rule them. It seems so difficult to understand that none among our spiritual guides know of any one who is willing to put his hand to the plough and come to the help of the Lord." What memorial shall the women of the Church raise to this humble, patient saint who gave herself so unreservedly and with such tender love to the dark children of her adoption? Can we not build at least a Chapel and support a clergyman at Cape Mount that her little ones may no longer go un-shepherded? Surely she deserves not less than this at our hands who did so much for that cause which is supremely dear to us all. How short a time it seems since she stood in our midst, a quaint and modest presence, utterly unpretentious, but full of quiet strength and dignity, telling the story of her much loved children! And now she has gone to return no more, leaving behind her a fragrant memory and in many many hearts good seed of her planting which shall spring up in the days to come and bear fruit unto everlasting life.

"Eternal rest grant to her, O Lord, and let Light Perpetual shine upon her."

MEXICAN AND HAITIAN DIVISION.

The past year has been a very uneventful one, but in the field of Mexican work it has been a year of prosperity and growth.

In November the Rev. Mr. Forrester and Rev. Mr. Carrion paid a visit to this country and addressed our Anniversary Meeting in Trinity Church. They also attended several parish meetings, and wherever

they were heard they gained the interest and sympathy of those who listened to them. Mr. Forrester's clear and frank statements inspired confidence, and Mr. Carrion's earnest face and manner made his unintelligible speech a strong appeal to his audience.

Mr. Forrester has written often and fully through the year, and we have had frequent letters from Miss Driggs. Both report a continued improvement in the Orphanage, and Mr. Forrester says that the whole work is improving throughout.

Mr. Forrester gives lessons in theology, Greek and English every day to the clergy and to the pupils of the Dean Gray Memorial School; beside which he has printed a Manual of Christian Instruction.

Miss Driggs' letters show how entirely her heart is in the work of the Orphanage. The girls now have a cooking class beside the usual training in house-work, while all who show intellectual ability are taught English by Miss Forrester. Some gifts of English story-books have been much prized by the children, and as they can be sent by mail at small expense it is hoped that more will be contributed.

One of the most hopeful features of the work is the self-sacrificing spirit of the clergy and people. Though the stipends of the Missionaries are very small they give a large proportion every year to ensure the support of the services and schools. They give up rooms in their houses, sometimes abandon their houses altogether, and in every way deny themselves for the sake of the Church. The people show the same spirit, several congregations building rooms or Chapels or giving land for Church uses.

The young girls who went out from the Orphanage to teach in the country places are all doing well.

The most important act of the Mexican Church has been the preparation of provisional Offices, including Morning and Evening Prayer, Baptism and Holy Communion. The Offices have been accepted by Bishop Williams and are now in use in all the congregations. They are based on the Mozarabic ritual, that is, on the ancient national liturgy of the Spanish Church, and are identical in essential points with those of our Church. They are particularly rich in passages from the Scriptures, and the collects are very beautiful in their simplicity and spirituality. This beautiful orderly liturgy must have an elevating and purifying influence over the people, and it is a satisfaction to know that wherever our Church is working in Mexico, these prayers and chants, so like our own, and yet so adapted to the different natures of those Spanish speaking congregations are being offered up with ours to our Common Lord.

In regard to Bishop Holly's work in Port-au-Prince there are no new developments, nor can there be till the Church is rebuilt. We have sent a small amount for the purpose. We have also been enabled through the Altar Society to furnish a set of vestments for Bishop Holly.

A remarkable mission has been started at Aquin, Haiti, by Rev. Mr. Jones, formerly of Jeremie. Appointed to take charge of a college at Aquin, a large flourishing town of Southern Haiti, he went there last January to find himself the first Protestant missionary ever

established in that place. He found also great interest among the people and especially the influential men and government officials. The result is that Mr. Jones has a Chapel which is crowded at every service, and that he is permitted to read the Bible every day in the College of which he is in charge.

Church furnishings of all kinds are needed, and Mr. Jones makes a strong appeal for them, in order, by an attractive and permanent service to hold the people who have so cordially welcomed the first Protestant Mission ever established among them.

Your Committee thus places before you the record of the year. It asks you to consider its evidences of devoted systematic work, to remember the trials through which it has successfully passed, and to consider its present usefulness and zeal. It begs you for increased and more systematic help, for your continued interest, for your prayers.
