

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, &c." as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such Delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each Division of the work undertaken by said church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special Meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be requisite to form a quorum.

TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT.

IN reviewing the past year we have cause for gratitude that the work accomplished has not fallen behind that of other seasons in the money collected, that our missionary boxes have increased in value, and can we not feel that the spiritual side of our labor has been blessed in receiving as well as in giving.

The progress of the Junior Auxiliary has been marked. We regret that there is no separate report owing to Miss Sargent's critical illness, but the interest aroused among the juniors has been very far-reaching, and many parish branches have been formed under the direction of the enthusiastic and energetic young Secretary, whose health has obliged her to resign an office in which she took much pleasure. We hope soon to find some one who will assume the duty of Secretary in charge of the Juniors. Meanwhile we urge a continued zeal in all of the branches which have had the advantage of being early on the list as members of the Auxiliary, for on the training of the Juniors rests the hope of the Auxiliary in years to come.

The Vice Presidents send reports of increasing interest in their districts. In Springfield the yearly meeting of the Connecticut Valley parishes was well attended and the speakers were listened to with much attention as they described the work in their various mission fields. The Juniors in the district have done well and inaugurated many plans for furthering enthusiasm and gifts.

The Berkshire District we hope is coming more closely into communication with our Central Committee, and in the Worcester and South Eastern Districts the work is growing surely, steadily, and with ever increasing good results under the charge of their efficient officers.

The Altar Society gives an account of the sixty-five valuable gifts that have been sent to missions, thus helping the clergy and churches to beautify and enrich the services. Their appeal is one for helpers, and we would emphasize the request that those who can assist in the needlework will report to the chairman. Surely there must be some who would enjoy the embroidery and sewing offered by the Altar Society.

We miss from among us, to-day, Miss Ball, who as our Secretary for over four years has given much time and devotion to the Auxiliary. She has gone to another sphere of work, but we shall feel the loss of inspiration which her never failing cheerfulness always brought, and for which we were thankful.

In Washington, next October, at the Triennial Meeting, we, the women of the Church, will again unite in our great Offering to the Lord. As this is outside of our yearly gifts, it behooves us to take heed to our pennies if the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary wishes to present as much as in 1895 to this "Holy offering rich and rare."

Can we not increase our gifts as the "United Offering" becomes better known? The object of the next offering is the training and sending out and support of women workers in mission fields.

The Conference of Church Workers held at Trinity Church, last winter, brought together a large number of women who were much edified by the papers read and discussed. It is always an assistance to hear of the experiences and difficulties of others, and many profited by this opportunity of learning. Those of us who are older, know so well the failures caused by inexperience, that we are glad of this opportunity to call attention to the school that is starting for the training of Church Workers, under the care of Miss Clara M. Carter, whose ordering as Deaconess by Bishop Lawrence on St. Mark's Day was of deep interest to a large congregation. It is the purpose of the Committee in charge, to have courses of instruction on the Old and New Testament and Church History, given by clergymen well fitted for such teaching, while Miss Carter will have the direction of all practical work, such as visiting the poor, caring for their spiritual and bodily needs, conducting Mother's Meetings, etc. It is hoped a large number of the younger members of the Church will avail themselves of some of these courses to their profit.

Let us turn for a moment before closing this Report to the first one published by the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in 1878, and see what progress has been made during these twenty years of its existence. At first the meetings were held in the Church Rooms in Hamilton Place. Our numbers have increased sufficiently to fill this Chapel of St. Paul's—fill it to overflowing at some of our midwinter meetings, showing a greater personal interest. In that report, under the title of "Indian Division," we find that it is the "Sixth Annual Report of the Dakota League, being the first in connection with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary." Among the names of the officers on that first Board we find those of some who have gone to render an account to the Lord; some who are still working for Him here through this or other channels. Two names stand out prominently as associated with the Dakota League, that have never left our Board since the Auxiliary was organized. Miss H. E. Caryl and Miss Abby R. Loring are with us to-day, and to their prayers, their thoughts, their advice, we are largely indebted for the prosperity we have had.

It was under Bishop Paddock and with his consent that the Woman's

Auxiliary was inaugurated in this diocese, and owing to his sound judgment the Massachusetts Branch has never had to change its organization, but only enlarge on the same lines, with the increasing demands that have been made on it.

From a value in money and boxes in 1878, of \$10,567.57 contributed by eighty-two parishes, we reached a maximum in 1895 of \$31,298.49. In this sum was included our large United Offering, and though the years since have not shown an increase we can still feel that a gain this year over last of \$2,686.47, contributed by over one hundred and sixty parishes, is no mean record. This then is what we have materially accomplished during the growth of two decades. What of the future? Surely the greatest sign of promise is the desire to train the young to systematic work and giving, and the desire of the young to be trained, and profit by the experience of others. Let us then prayerfully endeavor to give to the missions at home and abroad work-women worthy of their hire and of the blessing which our dear Master has promised to those that love and serve Him.

DOMESTIC DIVISION.

THE Domestic Committee reports with grateful hearts, that the pledges have been fulfilled, and the boxes of greater value than for some years past.

Fourteen new parishes have contributed to our pledges, but some of those usually contributing failed to do so this year. Nearly all the smaller and weaker parishes have held their own, while some have materially increased their gifts, and eleven of the older and more prosperous parishes have *decreased* their offerings.

We earnestly request the parish officers to critically examine our Treasurer's report and to notice what large amounts have been contributed by individuals who report through us. But for these liberal personal gifts our report would be small indeed. We would remind all the members of the Auxiliary how desirable it is that such gifts should be reported. It enables us to have a truer estimate of what is really given by the women of the Church; it is a great encouragement to know that *some* of the urgent calls are being answered and it is an incentive to others to do likewise. We hope our Members will loyally help the work in this and every other way, remembering that we are commanded to let our light shine—and that we are as responsible for our influence as for any other opportunity for usefulness.

At the Delegates' Meeting a year ago, it was voted to continue Dr. Forsythe's salary for two years and to pay for the training of a

missionary for a like period. Dr. Forsythe continues to give efficient and satisfactory service in All Saints Hospital, South McAllester, I. T. And our beneficiary in the Philadelphia Training School is a Massachusetts young woman, who has been a successful teacher, and gives promise of being a good missionary.

A new work, demanding our interest and gifts, is pressing hard upon us. In North Carolina and the Diocese of Asheville the educational work among the poor Whites is very urgent. These people can only be reached through the children. The Schools supported by the Church furnish a Christian education sufficient for their needs. The missionaries are self-denying, faithful and earnest. We *must* help them and in faith that the parishes will sustain us we hope to appropriate \$300 for this purpose. Schools and Hospitals in North Carolina, Spokane, Utah and Idaho, are also hoping for small grants from us.

In all for the Domestic work \$1,400 will be needed the coming year. This is more than has been pledged in previous years but, surely, we cannot be satisfied to go on from year to year with no increase in our work. We serve a King whose business is "urgent." And "the King's business requireth haste."

There is a Mission in New Hampshire, furnished and supported by faithful women of this Diocese. This Mission is very promising and needing our help. We surely will not let this work, almost at our doors and carried on by our own Members, ask in vain.

The Diocesan Secretary reports encouraging features in her department. Several new parishes have contributed to the pledges the past year and some of these hitherto taking little interest in the work have remembered us most kindly. Once again she earnestly repeats the desire of our hearts that before many years, every parish in the Diocese may have its share in this work.

We were without a Secretary during last year, owing to the withdrawal from the Committee of Mrs. Kidner, who had served us so long and with so much interest. Her other duties were too pressing to allow her to continue the Auxiliary work. We are sure many of the Parish Secretaries have missed her cheerful and encouraging words. Miss Elizabeth Houghton assumes the duties of Secretary. We trust the Parish Secretaries will aid and encourage her.

We owe much gratitude to the Altar Society for its generous and ready help to our Domestic Missionaries. We must not fail to remind you of the pressing need for personal boxes for our over-worked and under-paid Clergymen in this Diocese as well as in the Domestic field; and to thank you for your generous and loving help the past trying years.

"May the coming year be fuller and richer in prayer, in knowledge and in gifts, that the King Who has commanded us to 'occupy till He come,' may soon return and take the kingdom to Himself."

INDIAN AND COLORED PEOPLES' DIVISION.

YEAR by year, if the mission work of the Church is vital, it should increase in extent as well as deepen in strength; this can only be as the missionary spirit deepens and spreads among her members. It sometimes seems as if we should emphasize more than we do, our duty as members of the Auxiliary, to interest and add to our fellowship those in our own parishes and among our own friends who have never taken active part in our work.

"The fields are white to the harvest." In the old days Minnesota and then South Dakota, represented to us Indian missions, and Mrs. Payne in Virginia a large part of our "Freedmen" work. During the past year gifts have been sent through us to sixteen different dioceses. We wish we might add that every parish in our own diocese was represented in these gifts.

It has always been our principle to desert no old responsibility as we took new ones, and so our care and help have been given to our old friends in South Dakota, who, for so many years, have depended on us. St. Mary's and St. Paul's Schools are full to overflowing, and St. Elizabeth's begins work in the new building after the disaster of the fire. These schools are training the boys and girls who must be strong enough to resist the temptations that come, as the reservation system is broken up, and the influence of bad or careless white men is felt more and more, while native helpers and catechists, under the direction of ministers in charge, are ministering at seventy-three different stations in South Dakota. It is very little for us to do something for six of these men.

The news of Mrs. Payne's death came to us last year after our report had been rendered. We all know of her long years of service to the Negro, and how bravely she struggled on in active work at an advanced age, when most women would have dropped all care. We may rejoice that the burden of the flesh is laid aside, that the glorious liberty of unhindered service is hers.

To our twelve scholarships in Indian schools, the many small five dollar scholarships in parochial schools for colored children, and the support of Mr. Deal's cooking school in North Carolina, we have been able to add this year the pledge of a "Massachusetts Junior Auxiliary Scholarship" for Alaska. We speak of it here, because Miss Sargent's illness may make impossible a full Junior Auxiliary Report, and because it is so closely connected with Miss Sabine's work in Alaska in which we are all interested. She writes to us of her joy and gratitude for our scholarship, which we must count permanent, annual. In Alaska, as elsewhere, the hope of the future must lie in the native Christian teachers. Bishop Rowe thinks Anvik the place for a boarding school, and already boys and girls are being trained who can be used for the service of their brethren.

The work among the Oneidas has had a sad blow in the death of their faithful minister, the Rev. Mr. Burleson. We hope the work of the Oneida nurse may go on, and shall do our best to support it. An-

other hospital in Arizona, in charge of Miss Thackera, has claimed our attention, and we hope to aid it, while even as we write this report, comes a plea from Bishop Brooke that we will do something towards the support of Miss Giles who is now acting both as nurse and physician among the scattered Indians of Oklahoma.

Miss Wheeler's gracious ministry at Southern Pines continues with blessed results. We rejoice to count her as our missionary and to provide her support, as well as the boxes of clothing which she puts to such good use. We can always find place for such boxes—for school, hospital, sale. Nothing comes amiss, but we beg our friends to remember that *money*, in small or large sums, is an absolute necessity for some parts of our work.

From all who know it, come words of cordial commendation for St. Augustine's School, Raleigh. Is it not a waste of fine personal force to check Mr. and Mrs. Hunter in their efficient service by constant pecuniary limitations? Little by little, however, their work grows, and it has been our pleasure to give partial support to the kindergarten department, in charge of Miss Edith Smith, a Massachusetts woman, largely through the gifts of children.

We ought to speak of the poverty of the Indian mission in Southern Florida; of the interesting work of Bishop Leonard in Utah; of the new church building in Oklahoma, and Mr. Sanford's thorough work; of the Shoshone School; of Miss Carter's lace schools. All these we have helped—a little.

In all our missions the Gospel story is so truly taught that those who learn it long to send it to others. So, in Southern Pines, Miss Wheeler gathers her children and tells them of the little Ingiliks in Alaska; so, in Alaska, the Woman's Auxiliary does its work, and Miss Sabine's "Juniors" make little moccasins and "parkies" and send them to us to sell for the benefit of the Baby Orphanage at Shanghai; so, in South Dakota, every little mission station makes its offering for mission work at home and abroad. And this they do, because they have come out of darkness into the marvellous Light, because they have seen the face of Jesus Christ our Lord, and with halting steps and eyes even now half blind, are seeking to follow their Saviour, not only in daily righteousness but by giving His truth to others. What are *we* doing, after all our years of blessing and opportunity?

FOREIGN DIVISION.

THE outlook for Foreign Missions was never brighter and more hopeful than at present. On every side we behold the signs that "the night is far spent—the day is at hand." In China, on the very

spot where the English Missionaries were so cruelly murdered two years ago, five thousand converts have been baptized, and the Faith is now spreading with unprecedented rapidity. The most conservative classes are coming under its influence, and many of those who have hitherto appeared as immovable as stone are turning voluntarily to our Missionaries and asking them for Christian instruction and help. An Imperial Edict has gone forth that in every capital city of a Province a college is to be established where youths of the higher class shall be taught "the new Western Learning." This, of course, is not intended to imply religion (at least not primarily so), but as Western learning is unthinkable, whatever our agnostic friends may say to the contrary, without Christianity, on which it is founded, the happy end is not far to seek, and God will surely crown the work that He has begun. Such full and satisfactory accounts have recently appeared of our China mission that no detailed review is necessary here. In every place where it has been planted it is becoming more deeply rooted and wide-spreading. We only need more workers and more devotion in us who send them forth. One dear saint has passed from her labors there—Lily Funsten Ward. She went out nearly three years ago, and during that time gave her best powers with absolute unreserve to the work. Her record is flawless and her place will be hard to fill. She won the love and admiration of all who came in contact with her, and died deeply lamented by the whole Mission. Of her it may be truly said:

" Soon, soon to faithful warrior cometh rest,
Sweet is the peace of Paradise the blest. Alleluia."

From Japan we have especially cheering accounts of all our schools, which are accomplishing great things and seem to be growing in a quite wonderful way. Some of us remember Miss Aldrich, who visited Boston three years ago, and was then in very poor health. She returned to Japan much invigorated and resumed her old position at St. Agnes' School in Kyoto. But desiring to engage in more strictly evangelistic teaching, she has now resigned her place there and has taken up an individual work of very wide scope. Its real aim is evangelistic, while incidentally Miss Aldrich still teaches the languages, music, &c. She has more than fifty pupils, many of them teachers in the Government schools, and their central object of study is the Bible and Christianity. There are day classes and night classes as well as the Sunday work, and Miss Aldrich is also trying to train a choir for the new church. It would seem as if her work were almost more than any one person could accomplish; but she writes with great cheerfulness and content and asks our prayers that she "may have strength and wisdom to be equal to her opportunities." The work in Aomori, so long carried on by Miss Suthon, almost without help, is now assuming quite large proportions, and they have the regular ministrations of Rev. Mr. Chappell, and when he is absent of Rev. Mr. Naide, a native priest. Miss Irene Mann is doing her part there with faithfulness and energy.

In Africa the great Cavalla rebellion is at last ended, and poor little

Liberia and the adjacent country will now have an opportunity to rest from the incessant devastating warfare of the past few years. The President is well affected to our mission work and would indeed seem to be himself a Churchman as he is the superintendent of one of our Sunday schools. A long letter last month from our new mission teacher, Miss Higgins, is of great interest. We all remember Dr. Walrath's recent visit and interesting personality. We know what an untiring and successful worker she has been, and we rejoice that so thorough-going a colleague as Miss Higgins should have been found to reinforce her and Miss Woodruff. Miss Higgins has entire charge of the seventy-eight boys at St. John's School, being assisted in the teaching by Prince Momolu and two other native young men. She writes in a most admirable spirit of cheerfulness and hopeful satisfaction in her work and speaks with admiring respect of Miss Woodruff, whom we are still to consider our special missionary in this Diocese for the coming year. She also praises Momolu and says: "He makes an excellent lay reader, but how we need a priest here and a church. At Easter we hoped that we might have a priest to celebrate the Holy Communion, but no one came." Will the Church at home never respond to this pitiful cry? Meanwhile under spiritual deprivation and material hardship of all kinds our noble workers labor on in their chosen fields. They plant and water. God gives the increase. Our part at home is to bear them up with prayers and sympathy and to minister to their bodily needs.

Our receipts for the past year have fallen off somewhat. But our actual pledges have been redeemed. Let us renew and increase them and add gift to gift, nothing doubting that God will accept and abundantly bless every offering, even the smallest, that we make in our Lord's name and for their sakes whom He died to save—the men and women of every land.

MEXICAN AND HAITIEN DIVISION.

YOUR Committee wishes first to express gratitude for the result of the year's work in Mexico. Last winter it again reached one of those crises which have so often threatened its very existence. The salary of Rev. Mr. Forrester had been long in arrears, and the time had come when Bishop Satterlee, who had been personally responsible for it, felt that he could no longer carry such a burden, and had announced in a published letter that unless measures could be taken to ensure the payment of the arrears, and provide for the future maintenance of the clergyman in charge, the work of our Church in Mexico must come to an end.

Under the pressure of this need renewed efforts were made. In our diocese, through the generous gifts of a few friends, over four hundred dollars were contributed towards Mr. Forrester's salary.

After this peril had been tided over, partly by the efforts of your Committee, an expression of confidence and interest in the Mexican Church was obtained in the form of a resolution passed by the Board of Managers, as follows:

"Resolved,—That while the Board of Managers acting under the instructions of the Board of Missions cannot make appropriations for the work in Mexico, yet it desires to express its sense of the importance of that work as at present conducted, and of the duty of the Church to sustain it, as well as the sincere hope that special contributions will be made for its support."

In the encyclical letter issued at the close of the Lambeth Conference, the following resolution was also adopted:

"That we recognize thankfully the movement for the formation of an autonomous Church in Mexico, organized upon the primitive lines of administration, and having a Liturgy and Book of Offices approved by the presiding Bishop of the Church in the United States, and his advisory committee, as being framed after the primitive forms of worship."

It seems to your committee that these expressions of confidence and sympathy should be sufficient to dispel all doubts as to the right and the duty of our Church to aid the Church in Mexico; and it is hoped that any who have hitherto been held back from giving such aid by any scruples as to the authority of that work, will now become its friends. Those who have for years befriended it and enabled it to pass so many dangerous crises, may take courage.

Meanwhile the labors of the missionaries and native priests in Mexico have been uninterrupted. Mr. Forrester writes that in spite of the anxieties of the past year he has some encouragements. He has lately visited Puebla and been greatly pleased with what he saw there. The people of the place are interested in extending the work, and expressed intelligent views on the subject. Mr. Forrester hopes sometime to take up work there among the native Indians of that place.

Miss Driggs is still devoting herself to her girls in the Orphanage. There are many discouragements in work like hers, but God has mercifully put into some brave hearts an unconquerable courage and faith, that sees in failure and disappointment only additional reasons for fresh effort. If our missionaries were as easily discouraged as we are by wayward children—sinful, half-hearted converts still bound by the old chains of race and evil living in the past, there would be no foreign missions.

This year it has been our turn to use the income of the Bishop Brooks Memorial Fund, and to send its help to our struggling missions. So from year to year it goes upon its way, we hope, with some faint reflection of the light that streamed out with cheer and benediction from the great friend of all the people in whose memory it is still being given, and grows from year to year.

We have no reason as a Committee to feel discouragement when we

consider the amount contributed this year. It is larger than any sent for a long time, and gives us hope that such an advance may become the standard for future contributions. We plan next year—hoping that what has been done may be done—to send the following amounts:

The amount of aid which we have sent to Haiti is so small that it seems hardly right for us to call ourselves a Committee for that mission. But Bishop Holly's report of the year's work shows that the mission there has been flourishing and that it is being extended. A new congregation at Dominica has been received under Bishop Holly's supervision, and the missionary founder of the congregation ordained deacon. Services are regularly held in the new church at Port-au-Prince, and a Sunday School has been organized there.

So the words of Christ are being followed by patient, loving disciples all over the mission fields of the world, and through them our Lord once more sends to us half hearted bewildered disciples, His message: "To the poor the Gospel is preached, and blessed is he whosoever shall not be offended in Me." May His Gospel be preached more and more, and may His servants come to the beginning of a new mission year with more patience, new hope, and stronger faith in Him!
