

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon ; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting ; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, etc.,," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings ; Provided, that the number of such delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each division of the work undertaken by said church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum ; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Women's Auxiliary, or else not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be necessary to form a quorum.

MASSACHUSETTS BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT.

IN presenting the twenty-second annual report, several new names appear on our Board and a larger number of officers than heretofore. Miss Whittemore, now in charge of the Dakota League, tells us of the assistance Miss Woods has given her. Miss Dix, for many long years the faithful and devoted secretary of the committee in charge of work in Mexico and Haiti, was obliged to leave us owing to home cares. With gratitude for the past, we sadly miss her helpful counsels, her interest in missions, and her never tiring zeal in all Auxiliary work. Mrs. Prescott Hall is proving herself a most capable successor. The Bishop has appointed Mrs. Harold Arrowsmith to the charge of the Berkshire District in place of Mrs. Newton, who has kindly had the work under her care for several years, and who leaves us with regret. In June a large and successful Auxiliary meeting was held in Lenox.

The position of Vice President in the Worcester District is yet unfilled,* but the methods inaugurated in the District show their strength by the continued interest manifested.

Miss Marcia Packard has kindly accepted the Bishop's appointment to the charge of the North Eastern District, and it is hoped will soon bring the parishes under her supervision into closer connection with the general Board.

In the Connecticut Valley a deeper interest and broader grasp than ever before has shown itself. Suggestions come unsought, and a more neighborly interest in one another seems springing up among the societies of the District. In the one or two parishes which have no organized societies, contributions are made to the missionary cause, and we hope some time to include every such parish in our list, both for the Woman's Auxiliary and the Junior Branch.

The South Eastern District reports new workers, and the date of the yearly gathering has been changed so as to bring the meeting at the beginning of the year's work and nearer our anniversary.

The Secretary of the Domestic Committee will have full charge during Miss Loring's absence. A Junior Department has been established with a Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of its own, having quite outgrown the strength of the one officer having it in charge. It presents to-day a separate report to the Women as well as the Juniors of the Auxiliary.

The General Treasurer has sent to each parish a letter explaining definitely the needs of the Board for general expenses, and it is hoped attention will be given to its details, and that the co-operation of the parish branches will be forthcoming.

The Committees report fewer boxes and lower values, although in some cases the money given was increased. The general summary shows a decrease in receipts.

The contributions of the parishes vary considerably. The Auxiliary does not do its full duty when only 102 out of 192 parishes in the diocese are represented on its list. Some new societies join us yearly, but even with increasing numbers we sometimes look in vain for the names of old friends who have dropped from our ranks.

DOMESTIC COMMITTEE.

The Domestic Committee has been ambitiously hopeful during the past year of reporting a much larger accomplishment both as to the scope and the volume of the work represented by boxes than ever before, but figures such as are at hand hardly fulfil these expectations. The aggregate valuation of boxes is not so much as last year. This showing is not, however, as discouraging as would at first appear. The gifts in money exceed by over a thousand dollars those of the previous report, a more substantial and a more helpful proof of unflagging zeal as well as a much more accurate one, for boxes must necessarily vary in value according to the mood of the appraiser.

The co-operative plan, the sending by two small parishes of one large good box, which would have staggered the imagination and palied the working force of either one alone if it had been attempted single-handed, has developed most encouragingly and brought out several notable examples of pluck on the part of parishes of little financial strength.

Still, the record is not one which we can contemplate with restful complacency. There must surely be resources in this diocese for the building up of the Church in our own land which have gone to waste because somebody failed to direct and husband those resources. Failures of this sort are not without their bright side. If rightly studied they are excellent lessons for future improvement. Archdeacon Spurr's new Hospital in West Virginia—to specify only one of the interests which our diocese has kept close to her heart—has been enriched by a Bishop Brooks memorial room, to which the Bishop Brooks memorial fund was this year devoted. One bed was furnished completely by All Saints', Brookline; and St. John's, Charlestown, gave a bedstead, mattress and pillows to complete the outfit of the room which now lacks only framed pictures of the Bishop and of Trinity Church. The gifts of bed linen and money made by other parishes for this hospital are not included in this memorial room.

The Diocesan Work has been most satisfactory, and the secretary in charge feels that to help the poorer clergy, at times often in urgent need, secures the best work for the Auxiliary in the Diocese.

DAKOTA LEAGUE.

Although the Dakota League met with a severe loss in the resignation last fall of its most able and devoted Chairman, her successor has been so upheld by Miss Woods' untiring aid and counsel, as well as the cordial co-operation of all friends of the Indians, that this year's report is more favorable than we dared hope. Every requisition for boxes has met with some response; if not by a parish, by combined effort. Our pledges to Bishops Hare, Leonard, Talbot and Gray were fulfilled; also that for half of Miss Sabine's salary. Bishop Brooke of Oklahoma and Miss Sibyl Carter received not only the amount pledged, but additional gifts. While we did not reach our *aim* in helping the hospitals at Oneida and Arizona, boxes of supplies were sent to the former as well as one quarter of the nurse's salary, the real pledge, to Mr. Merrill, missionary in charge. Miss Thackara received for the Fort Defiance Hospital, Arizona, a very generous proportion of the sum we hoped to send her.

A letter from Miss Sabine, Anvik, Alaska, speaks of the continued improvement and progress of her pupils and her own increased opportunities for outside work among the Indian families since the arrival of Miss Proebstel, the new and efficient Matron for the School.

The Woman's Auxiliary there met with full members always, although many extra meetings were called to execute the orders which poured in from traders and travellers.

In our work among colored people definite pledges of assistance were given to twenty points in the field, in sums varying from \$5 to \$200.

These pledges have all been met, and in some cases the amounts promised have been largely increased through the interest of individual members of our Branch.

This pledge system commends itself with every year's experience as the best way to get most helpful results from the small amounts we are able to give, but at the same time it has not hindered us from responding to several special appeals which have been made to us this past year.

With every year there has been an increase in the number of parishes who feel their responsibility in the matter of pledges, and who, by their renewal of help previously given, show their vital interest in the work.

The Mission at Southern Pines, N. C., under the care of Miss Wheeler, and the Cooking School at St. Cyprians, Franklin, N. C., have been wholly in our care, as for several years past and in both cases we have reason to feel proud of the work done.

St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., and St. Augustine School, Raleigh, N. C., make great demands upon us, and are worthy of a large increase in the help we give.

Grateful mention is made of the kindness of a few individual members of our Branch who have reported large gifts made by them directly to missionaries, and by so doing have enabled us to present a

total of contributions more worthy of Massachusetts than in some previous years.

The demand for boxes is never supplied, and we hope for the help this coming year of a greater number of parishes than ever before.

FOREIGN COMMITTEE.

The Treasury being the visible record of our practical interest in our foreign work, this, as every year, it is encouraging to see that on the whole our report indicates a gain of about \$700, including the gifts of the Juniors. But this extra amount is more than accounted for by the \$788 sent to Mr. Osuga's Orphanage in Tokyo, Japan, a goodly share of which was voted by the Girls' Friendly Society, and most of the remainder contributed, by request of our officers, strictly as extra to our pledged work.

Last Epiphany the Committee sent out a circular to all the clergymen of the Diocese, hoping in that way to increase the number of our Branches. Some gratifying responses came, and twelve new parishes sent in their gifts. This shows in all forty-eight parishes in Massachusetts contributing to Foreign Missions through the Auxiliary.

As Miss Woodruff—our missionary at Cape Mount, Africa—is now in this country, we hope to make that personal acquaintance with her which always crystallizes interest. There has been no more faithful worker than she, and under conditions peculiarly trying. A third clergyman appointed to that station has just declined to go, giving fresh emphasis to Miss Woodruff's remarks: "Surely it cannot be that fear of the climate stands in the way. Everywhere on this coast there are men who come for earthly gain, leaving home and friends and risking life in much more unhealthy places than Cape Mount." Both the boys' and girls' schools have grown in numbers the last year, and in interest, and the new buildings are nearly completed. Nothing is lacking but men and means.

Bishop McKim writes: "May I thank you most heartily for your very warm and material interest in Mr. Osuga's* work. There is no charity in Japan more worthy than his."

Miss Dodson, of St. Mary's Orphanage, Shanghai, says: "Mrs. Boone has kindly undertaken to teach kindergarten in the Orphanage, and if you know of any one who would like to help us by sending us kindergarten material it will be most thankfully received. It is hard to get anything of the sort here. I did get some nice little bamboo chairs last week at a fair, twenty-four chairs for \$1.20 in United States money. The children are so proud and happy that each small child may be seen going about with her own little chair."

Most of our scholarships and pledges have been promptly met, and Rev. Mr. Mosher, of Shanghai, has written most gratefully of the insurance taken out in his name by one of our Boston churches. The Junior Auxiliary promises to be a substantial help in the foreign work, a fact that surely means more than the mere money given.

Every sensitive Christian must feel stirred by the overwhelming op-

portunities that are crowding upon our Church. When shall we claim our full rights as loyal children of Our Father in making known His Son?

MEXICO AND HAITI.

Since our last report, by direction of the Board of Missions at the General Convention held last October, the Church work in Mexico has again come under the care of the Board of Managers, and under the most encouraging auspices; on the motion of the Bishop of New York, the resolution being adopted, that the work of the Mexican Episcopal Church, under the provisional care of our presiding Bishop, is entitled to the largest measure of commendation and help in view of its evident increase in stability and efficiency.

It must mean encouragement and a feeling of security to those laboring so bravely in Mexico to know that the Church in America gives them her hearty sympathy and cordial approval.

Many towns and villages would be glad to have a resident clergyman, and frequent requests of this kind have to be refused. The Dean Gray Memorial School and the M. J. Hooker Memorial School, which are carefully training young Mexican men for the church and young women for teachers, are the sources to which we look to supply this increasing demand.

Some aggressive work has been done in Haiti during the year, and the mission in Brazil is full of the spirit of enthusiasm.

ALTAR SOCIETY.

The Diocesan and Domestic Missions, as well as those to the Indian, Colored and Foreign fields, acknowledge with gratitude the help offerings of the Massachusetts Altar Society, which have amounted to \$550.00.

The consecrated workers of this Society are strengthening the Church incalculably by suggesting something of the beauty of holiness to the humblest worshippers.

THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

has now thirty Librarians, which means that thirty churches in the Diocese are represented, and there seems to be a deepening interest in the work, and the number of books, etc., sent out to those who are hungering for them is steadily increasing. The letters received in grateful acknowledgment of these are often most pathetic, and their appeal is irresistible. Is to be hoped that there will be shortly a librarian in every parish in the diocese to represent the Church Periodical Club, and that a contribution, however small, will be taken up regularly for its benefit.

We ask that you bear ever in mind our United Offering of 1901. The Missionary Bishops are already planning the use they can make of the share to be assigned to each of them. Miss Theodora S. Wall, who has been sent to Japan from the United Offering of 1898, is a Massachusetts woman, a graduate of the Philadelphia Training School. She, with ten other missionaries, the largest number ever sent out at

one time by our church, started in September for foreign fields after a farewell service held at the Church Missions House in New York.

Mrs. Abbott reports that in Shanghai, at the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, she found a crowded chapel and an offering of \$131.00. This is a larger offering than at times we have made at our anniversary services. Can it be that converted heathen women give so much more largely in proportion to their means because they realize more truly than we, with our ampler opportunities, the value of the Gospel of Glad Tidings?

As we review with gratitude the success with which our feeble missionary efforts have been blessed, we should seek diligently the cause of our failures. As a body the Auxiliary is enthusiastic, but may it not be that our *individual* lukewarmness in the Master's service is the reason that more laborers and larger harvests are not reported.

Let us begin the year with a prayerful examination of our own backsiding, and be ready to do more of our share in making widely known the life and teaching of that dear Lord "who for our sake became Man," nineteen hundred years ago.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

SINCE the annual meeting, which was held October 20th, 1898, there have been a few changes in the list of officers; also a new department has been formed, that of the Junior Auxiliary, owing to the great increase in their work.

The Anniversary Meeting took place at Trinity Church, November 1st. The Bishop of the Diocese celebrated the Holy Communion and gave a short address at 10 A. M. The Bishop also presided at the meeting which followed, in the chapel, and the speakers were: Miss Julia C. Emery, Miss J. R. Reynolds, and Bishop Graves of Laramie. At the afternoon service addresses were made by Bishop McKim of Japan, and the Rev. Henry Forrester of Mexico. Seventy-eight parishes responded to the roll call.

At the usual monthly meetings there have been fourteen speakers, namely: Miss Tsuda, Japan; Mrs. Twing, the honorary secretary of New York; Miss Parker, of the Altar Society; Miss Fogg, of the Church Periodical Club; Mrs. Brooke, wife of the Bishop of Oklahoma; Miss Sibyl Carter, Minnesota; Mrs. Ware, South Dakota; Bishop Morris, Oregon; Archdeacon Russell, Virginia; The Reverend Dr. Lindsay, Boston; Rev. W. T. Crocker, Boston; Rev. J. G. Meen, Jr., Brazil; Mr. Sakai, Japan; and the late Mr. Allan, of the Sailor's Haven, Charlestown.

Several more parishes were represented this year at these meetings. Three new Branches were formed. One hundred and fourteen mite boxes and eighty-nine new labels were given out for the United Offering.

The second Conference of the Parochial Officers was held on March 22d. About fifty ladies were present, and five subjects were discussed: 1st. How to interest people in Missions, who say they are not interested. 2d. The best method of conducting meetings of uneducated women. 3d. How many parishes open sewing meetings with prayer. 4th. How to make parishes realize their responsibility in meeting the Auxiliary pledges. 5th. Is not the Auxiliary departing from its original intention in pressing money appeals more than boxes? The members of the Auxiliary are urged to remember this Conference from year to year, and if they have any special subject to discuss, it would help advance the work if they would write a paper to be read.

The Quiet Day Services which were held in the Church of the Good Shepherd on December 1st were conducted by the Reverend C. H. Brent.

The delegates are earnestly urged to carry away with them the reports intended for their Parish, which will be found in the Parish rooms, after the morning meeting, the day of the Anniversary, or send stamps sufficient for the number of reports they require, for it is important that Parishes should know about the work which is being done.

Contributions in money or boxes were received from one hundred and two parishes.



CHAIRMAN'S REPORT.

THE growth of the Junior Auxiliary work during the past year has been very gratifying. It may not be easy to note this from the detailed report, because such statistics of the work as are here given have never been gathered until now. But even a careful examination of the sums of money given, and the boxes sent, will fail to show the great advance in the only really important line of Junior work, the study of missions. A greater degree of interest among the children and young people, and a growing sense of responsibility toward this branch of the Church's work, is the sure result of this study.

In order to help in the work of teaching the Juniors, a grant of money was made by the Board to the Junior Auxiliary Publishing Company, which has increased the numbers of pamphlets in our possession, and which can be obtained from the Secretary and borrowed as from a lending library.

As another means of aiding this part of the work, some money was privately raised to buy a magic lantern with slides illustrating missionary life. In those places where it has thus far been used it has been of real help. Its use is open to all Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, as well as to those of the Junior Auxiliary, and also to Sunday Schools which have no connection with the Juniors.

Early in the year the Board decided to make the Junior Auxiliary a separate committee, and to authorize the election of Miss Lucy C. Sturgis to the office of Secretary. Twenty-two new Branches having been enrolled during the year, the work had become too heavy to be accomplished satisfactorily by one officer. Two of the old Branches have ceased to exist, but there are at present fifty on our list.

In accordance with a resolution passed at the General Convention in Washington last autumn, the second Sunday after the Epiphany was set apart to lay the subject of Missions before the Sunday Schools.

In Massachusetts services were held in many churches. In various places as many as five Sunday Schools came together from neighboring parishes to join in one united service. The great number of children that met in this way was a real inspiration, and the knowledge that such services were being held, not only all over this Diocese, but in all parts of the country, was a source of encouragement and strength. The offertories, which amounted to \$67.17, were sent to New York, marked: "From the children of Massachusetts, for work among children in the mission field."

In April came the annual meeting, which was more largely attended than ever before, about four hundred and fifty being present. Bishop Lawrence presided, and Mr. J. Lindsay Patton, of Japan, and Miss Reynolds spoke to the children.

A Conference of Parochial Junior Auxiliary workers had been held in March. A very heavy storm prevented a large attendance, but the meeting was helpful to those who came. There were no regular speakers, the aim being to get at and understand the difficulties constantly being met by both the Parochial and Diocesan officers, and to suggest possible remedies. It is to be regretted that so many of the Branches are too far from Boston to attend these meetings, but this is unavoidable. In order, however, to preserve the unity of the Diocesan Society, it was decided to send a letter to the head of each Branch, asking her to vote on certain matters that had come up before the diocesan officers, it being undesirable that those who were necessarily absent should have no voice in making rules which would govern the whole organization. Only twenty-six answers were received to the forty-nine letters sent; a result to be regretted, for, as a united organization, the Junior Auxiliary can accomplish twice the work that a number of independent parishes can. The Auxiliary should not allow itself to be represented by half its numbers.

In response to the letter sent this year it was voted: 1st. That each Branch shall contribute annually to general expenses, and that the contributions shall be voluntary, according to the ability of the Branch. 2d. That the Massachusetts Junior Auxiliary shall provide ten boxes per year for work among the Indians under Rev. Edward Ashley. This means that each of the fifty Branches shall provide for him one box in five years, the work to be begun in 1900.

It seems impossible to close this report without calling attention to those most important results of our work, which cannot be set down in figures and formal phrases. At the same time that much of the work done by the children is so excellent that we are led to wonder at their being able to attain to such results, there is a great deal of other work not in itself very good. But inasmuch as this is often done at the cost of greater self-sacrifice and effort, it is not to be rated as of no importance, but as one of the means of spreading the knowledge and love of Christ. The amount of thought, love and work put, for instance, into the mending of old toys that are of but little value when finished, cannot and ought not to be overlooked. Such love and work is prompted by the spirit that it is our aim to instill, that "charity without which all our deeds are nothing worth." Who dare say that those gifts, of so little value in our eyes, will not be found more acceptable before God than others of greater intrinsic value given with less of the spirit of love?
