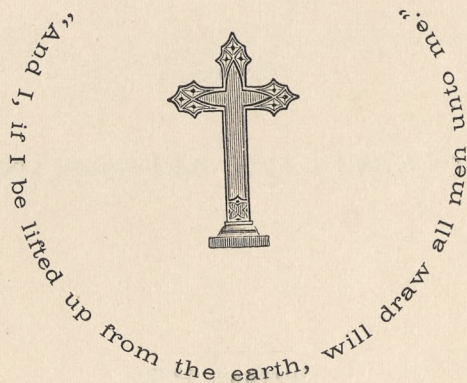

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, etc.," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each division of the work undertaken by said church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be necessary to form a quorum.

MASSACHUSETTS BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

THE past year has brought many changes to the Board, changes which cause regrets, but the ranks are filled by other members of the Auxiliary and the work goes on, the new comers ever profiting by the experience and example of those who leave their mark on the Mission work of the Church.

We shall miss the words of advice and cheer brought to us by the late Treasurer; and regret her personal, if possible, more than her official loss. Miss Foote, who sends her resignation because of an absence that promises to be prolonged, has left the Treasury in receipt of systematic offerings for general expenses, which we hope the parishes who have hitherto so generously responded, as well as those who have not yet contributed, will not fail to remember.

It may not be generally known that we have three separate funds in the Massachusetts Branch. The Chickering Fund, the Page Bequest, and the Bishop Brooks Memorial Fund (this latter still increasing) which yield an income of \$175.35 a year which is appropriated in rotation to the work of the different Committees.

The Board echoes the words of the Domestic Committee when it tells us that the only one thing that has grieved them is "the enforced retirement owing to ill health of the Secretary, Miss Turner, who has so long cared for our diocesan work with great devotion and self denial. Our best wishes and prayers will follow her away."

The Foreign Committee has lost for a time, its able Chairman, whose earlier experience in the field was a help in carrying on at home the work to be supported in far distant lands. We sympathize in the cause that forces Mrs. Scudder's absence and thank her for all she has done to awaken an earnest spirit among us during the many years she has been on the Board.

During Mrs. Scudder's absence, Miss Bradford has kindly undertaken her work.

We cordially thank Miss Neal, who to our regret has left us, for the care and time she has given to our financial report. We also offer to Miss Ellicott our thanks for the kind assistance she gave us during the absence of our Secretary.

The Secretary of the Junior Department has kindly undertaken the duty of Chairman, with another to assume her Secretaryship. With all these changes others still are before us. Farewells which we rejoice need not be spoken at this moment.

The Worcester District tells us that from the statistics of the Branch reports, which were most carefully and promptly returned in June, it is evident that in most parishes there has been a decided increase in work and workers. Two new branches have been organized and one Woman's Guild has identified itself with the Woman's Auxiliary. Several successful study-classes were organized. The Vice President has visited ten parishes. In October a conference of Diocesan and Parochial officers was held in All Saints, Worcester. Twenty-one parishes were represented at this meeting and a member of each Diocesan committee spoke of the work planned for the ensuing year. In the spring a special meeting was held in Worcester to arouse an interest in the United Offering. It has been very gratifying to find that there is a much greater demand in the Branches for Woman's Auxiliary publications than last year, and it is to be hoped that more study-classes will be formed during the coming winter. More neighborhood meetings of an informal nature would be another means of quickening interest in mission work.

The Connecticut Valley District reports a large attendance at its annual meeting, with increase of interest and offerings in some of its branches.

An especial effort has been made to have every parish participate in the United Offering, which has resulted in larger gifts than three years ago, some parishes more than doubling the previous amount.

The growth in interest,—and consequent work,—is slow but steady, and though but slight changes can be noted from year to year, yet as we look back over the period of our working together, we can see that there is reason to be deeply grateful for the progress made, and to say with truth and thankfulness, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us."

For Berkshire all of the fifteen parishes have given something for missions; five that last year contributed nothing have done so this year, and twelve of the fifteen have given more than before, not including the United Offering. More interest has been shown in diocesan missions, eight parishes contributing. The annual meeting was held in October, at St. Stephen's, Pittsfield. The Stockbridge Branch in June invited neighboring parishes to hear from Mrs. Hunter, of the work at St. Augustine's, Raleigh, N. C., and Pittsfield sent invitations to all the Berkshire parishes to listen to Miss Bull of Japan. These meetings are very pleasant and draw the members of the various Auxiliary Societies nearer together.

The Southeastern District held its annual meeting in Attleboro, and was very successful and unique. It was an object lesson for many to be present at a missionary meeting in a mission and to see what can be accomplished by women who are interested heart and soul in their own parish and its activities, and yet are giving to the world with an equally consecrated spirit. The Vice-President in charge of the district regrets that a long illness prevented her from visiting branches where

her presence was desired and trusts that the coming year will be marked by greater strength and power to do the work committed to her care.

The Northeastern District reports an improvement. The offers of the Vice-President to visit the parishes have not been generally accepted, although missionary and neighborhood meetings have been held in Salem and Lawrence. The value of boxes is greater this year than last, and the United Offering more general than ever before.

Domestic Committee. THE Domestic Committee has to acknowledge, with deep gratitude, increased interest in offerings for its work. The pledges for Texas, Alaska and the "Poor Whites," also those for hospitals and schools, have been promptly met. The Committee earnestly beg that this interest may be continued through the coming year. The boxes which have been sent out are more in number and of greater value than previously. While we hope no such calamities as those at Galveston and Jacksonville will occur again, the great need of boxes throughout all the Domestic Missionary field must not be forgotten. The Diocesan work must also be kept in mind.

Dakota League. THE Dakota League presents an encouraging report. The contributions have been larger, so that not only were the scheduled pledges fully met, but Archdeacon Appleby, who again recently spoke to us of his work among the Indians of Duluth, has been given \$50. In addition to this there should be noted a ready response in money and barrels of supplies to Bishop Hare's appeal for the boarding schools in South Dakota, which were in distress owing to the withdrawal of Government rations. Although the boxes assigned to us were all provided for, the Committee urge greater promptness in the acceptance of such assignments by the parishes. Even when it is impossible to send the Indian box early in the season, it greatly facilitates the arrangements of the Secretary, if the Branches signify their intention of filling such a box during the winter at the first meetings of the Auxiliary. In view of the new and increasing calls for help for the work among the Indians in various dioceses and jurisdictions, and also of the possible transfer of some of their warmest friends to a new diocese, the Chairman earnestly urges an increase of zeal for the regeneration of our native tribes, together with constant prayer that the Lord will multiply our efforts to the filling of the same pledges as heretofore.

Work Among Colored People. THIS is the work in which the weakest parish can bear a part, the smallest gift meeting a definite need. Consequently we can look to a large number of parishes for systematic help, and rejoice to see this number increasing annually. In addition to the renewal of pledges made last year, our work this year has included the raising of an endowed Scholarship of \$100. for the Mission Day-School of Rev. J. J. Perry of Brunswick, Ga. We have given a

helping hand to St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, and St. Augustine's, Raleigh, and to the several day schools in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia. We must all regret the closing of the school and "shop" of Miss Wheeler at Southern Pines. Its history for the five years of its existence has been one of helpfulness and of lasting influence for good to the colored people to whom it ministered. Now that there is a larger opening for Miss Wheeler's helpful service at St. Augustine's School, we will follow her there with our interest and support. We have again assumed the entire support of the Cooking School of Rev. J. A. Deal in North Carolina, and rejoice to know of the good that is being done in training girls for a position of honest self-support. In South Carolina, under Archdeacon Joyner, we have met the expense of the Mission Day School at Peake, so ably taught by the wife of the missionary at this place. In addition to our co-operative work in meeting our pledges, we have generously responded in money and boxes—to two special appeals; one for the family of Rev. Geo. Howell of South Carolina and one for Jacksonville sufferers. The usual number of boxes have been sent, varying in value according to the ability of the parish sending, but always bearing the message of good will. The general adoption of the "Sale" plan for the contents of missionary boxes makes these boxes a direct financial help to the missions, and we are most anxious to increase the number sent by Massachusetts.

Foreign Missions. It is gratifying to announce that there is a gain over last year, in contributions for Foreign work, the total amount being rather over \$2,800. Nevertheless the treasurer reports that there is about \$25.00 still due Miss Woodruff on account of her salary, but we hope this may be made up before long. Our pledges for Insurance have been met and most of those for Scholarships and Cribs, with the exception of "The Loving Friends Crib," St. Mary's Orphanage, China, which is very much behind, as through some misunderstanding it was thought that the Junior Auxiliary had it in charge. It is most important that this deficiency should be made up before next year. Over \$1,000 has been sent to the Hospital at Shanghai this season, in addition to nearly \$400 last year. This is owing largely to the personal appeal of Dr. Gates herself, who made one see with her eyes, her own interest in the work and its great needs. Dr. Gates has sent in her resignation and it has been accepted with sincere regret. Her place has already been filled, so that her retirement will not interfere in any way with the work of the hospital. Missionary zeal seems to have been quickened in China since the recent troubles and all work is being taken up there with renewed vigor. In fact many Missions and Schools are overcrowded. St. John's College was obliged to turn away over one hundred students. Surely this should urge us to greater efforts in enlarging and carrying on the good work. The money has been raised for the church which it is expected will be built within the year in Sendai, Japan. We have sent \$100 for a typewriter for Bishop Partridge, \$25. for Miss Bull's salary and a small sum to Mr. Ishii's Orphanage.

This latter work, which is a noble one, makes its own special appeal to our sympathy and our gifts. The work at Cape Mount progresses. The new building for the girls' school is completed, but teachers and helpers are sadly needed. The Rev. Mr. Mathews, who has taken the Rev. Mr. Hope's place, is quite alone with the boys and is in great need of efficient assistance and relief.

**Mexico, Haiti, and
Brazil.**

FIFTEEN years ago all work in Mexico was looked upon with suspicion and distrust, so greatly had the labors of that zealous and eloquent, but *unwise* and *untrustworthy* official, then in charge, prejudiced the minds of otherwise friendly helpers. That deposed official still continues to ask for aid, and a word of *caution* is hereby spoken to all who wish to know that their gifts are wisely used for the objects to which they are given. Give through accredited channels, and not in response to the little printed leaflets which now and then are circulated from that official's hand.

With an honorable, prudent and self-sacrificing superintendent at the helm for the past ten years or more, the Church's ship has sailed into quieter and safer seas.

Bishop Doane's visit was a most important feature of the year's experience. Owing to sudden illness the visit was much shorter than expected, but in the few days of his stay he saw the opportunity for immediate and lasting help. His name and influence have raised a sufficient sum to enable Mr. Forrester to write "the Church of San José de Gracia, in the City of Mexico, is saved to us. It will be called hereafter *San Pedro*, and we are to reopen it September 15th, when Bishop Johnson of Los Angeles will be with us. The Church will be quite handsome and the Seminary, being in one part of it, will save us rent and be helpful in many ways. Our position in this city will be vastly improved and we feel greatly encouraged. God is evidently caring for and blessing His work in our hands and we look forward with great hopefulness." In addition to this, through the same influence, valuable aid has also been given to free the Church in Pueblo from debt. The two young Mexican girls who were in the Philadelphia Training School for two years, have returned to Mexico to assist in the work there.

Other graduates from the Hooker Orphanage School are also acting as Teachers and Organists in the City of Mexico and elsewhere. The Orphanage has been so altered that fifteen more girls, of the many eager to be received, have been admitted as pupils. \$80. supports a girl for a year and \$60. a young man at the Dean Gray Memorial School. Those who support such a scholarship, have the pleasure of hearing from the pupils themselves, of their work and progress.

For Haiti, there is little that is new or thrilling to chronicle. Bishop Holly spent some months in the United States and has raised only a part of the money he asked for, for the Hospital, Bishop's residence and School.

If faithful, persevering efforts ever merit a reward, surely this faithful man should not lose his.

In Brazil, the work increases in extent and interest under the wise supervision of Bishop Kinsolving, three or four American and some native clergymen, beside several ladies who have gone out from the United States.

We understand that the need of a pure faith is very great in Brazil, that the opportunities are manifold and encouraging for sowing the good seed.

Altar Society. THE Altar Society during the past year has helped fifty-six parishes by sending 117 gifts at a total value of \$648.40. These went to twenty-nine different dioceses and missionary jurisdictions, showing how widespread assistance this society is giving. It should be more especially remembered by those wishing to do plain sewing or embroidery for Church use.

Church Periodical Club. THE Church Periodical Club continues to enlarge its work and distributes all sorts of printed matter. The number of parishes assisting in this helpful distribution increases. Realizing how much benefit we derive from a good or amusing book or even newspaper, should make us remember those who are prevented by distance or poverty from profiting from this simple recreation.

In January the Board was most regretfully obliged to announce that for stated reasons the luncheon at the Anniversary meeting would be discontinued. The Auxiliary at large having of its own initiative taken up the subject, now announce that they are, through a Committee of their own, endeavoring to make arrangements for continuing the luncheon on a different basis. For this the Board offer their sincere thanks, feeling sure that the benefit of this social reunion of clergy and Auxiliary workers once a year cannot be over-estimated.

A request having been sent us to join in a Missionary Historical Exhibit to be held in San Francisco, at the time of the Triennial meeting of the Auxiliary, a Committee was appointed consisting of Mrs. C. W. Duane of Cambridge, Mrs. B. H. Fabens of Salem, Miss Mary T. Spaulding of Newburyport, and Miss M. E. Batchelder of Cambridge, to see what could be collected of interest. They early reported that owing to the value of many relics the distance made it necessary to confine our exhibit principally to photographs. The study of the old Churches of Massachusetts has been a most interesting one, and as a result our United Offering was placed in an envelope bearing a photograph of the Roger Conant House in Salem, where in 1625 the Prayer Book was first used and the Holy Communion administered within the limits of the present diocese of Massachusetts. We hope to keep copies of these photographs at our room in the Diocesan House.

The United Offering presented on October 3d in Grace Church, San Francisco, amounted to \$104,000. The effort was made this year to find out how many of the probable twenty thousand women com-

municants of this diocese contributed. Few of the parishes responded to our request to count the givers, but we are convinced that the effort brought the United Offering, as well as the Auxiliary work at large, to the knowledge of many having heretofore an imperfect idea of our aim as a Missionary Society, and we hope that before 1904 the object will be so truly appreciated that no woman will wish to remain unrepresented in our great United Offering. This sum of \$104,000, exceeding that of 1898, represents not a larger amount from any one individual but a greater number of people as interested, and so is a most hopeful sign of growing interest in Missions in the diocese.

In completing the twenty-fifth year of its existence in 1902, the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary will wish to offer a Sacrifice of thanksgiving for the prosperity which has been vouchsafed to it. A Committee has been appointed from the Auxiliary at large to devise some scheme by which this may be done effectually and will report later.

Coming at the same time with this Celebration we see a falling shadow. A divided diocese brings with it a divided Auxiliary, though not a divided cause—the love and affection for the individual will remain. We are simply sending our daughter out to do her own work with greater faith and hope than heretofore. We are grateful if we have trained her to do loving work in the Lord's Vineyard. Her officers are strong and brave and the Auxiliary in the new diocese will do a surer and more consecrated work than ever before. We bid them God speed and with every prayer for their success we turn to our narrower boundaries and ask an additional blessing on the older diocese, a blessing of strength and love for Service, a quickening of Spirit—a strengthening of Faith, that will enable us to show an unchecked advance in the Master's work.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

THERE have been held, during the past year, nine Committee and nine Monthly meetings of the Auxiliary; also the Anniversary meeting, the Quiet Day, and the fourth Conference for Parochial Officers.

The attendance at the monthly meetings averaged the same as last year, but there were fewer parishes represented at the Conference. Seven new Branches have been formed or re-organized, making the number of Auxiliary Branches and Missionary Societies one-hundred and forty-six, besides correspondents in twenty-four other parishes. Some of these one-hundred and forty-six Branches or Guilds are not new organizations, for it has been found that where it was thought there was only a correspondent in a parish, there was really an organized society.

An effort has been made this year to try and find out the number of women interested in the work of the Auxiliary in the different dioceses; therefore, on the blanks which were sent to each parish to fill out, that question was asked. Many did not answer it, but it is hoped that they will see the importance of it and try to do so another year, for surely there are more than 2500 women in Massachusetts who give either their services or their money through the Auxiliary.

The twenty-third Anniversary Meeting took place in Trinity Church Nov. 7th, at 10 A.M. The Bishop of the Diocese celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by Bishop Partridge of Japan. Bishop Lawrence also presided at the meeting which followed in the Chapel, and the speakers were Miss Emery, the General Secretary of New York, and Bishop Holly of Haiti. Seventy-three parishes were represented by two-hundred and ninety-three delegates. At the afternoon meeting, addresses were made by Bishop Partridge of Kyoto, Japan, and Mr. John W. Wood, Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Missions.

At the monthly meetings there have been twenty speakers, namely: Rev. J. J. Perry, Georgia; Rev. F. W. Merrill, Oneida, Wis.; Miss Wheeler, Southern Pines, N. C.; Rev. W. M. Partridge, Peabody, Mass.; Bishop Atwill, W. Missouri; Mrs. Chapin, General Secretary of the Church Periodical Club; Miss Tannatt, Spokane; Rev. J. M. Prevost, Alaska; Dr. Mary Gates, China; Rev. W. H. McGee, Cuba; Bishop Doane, Albany; Bishop Hare, So. Dakota; Rev. A. B. Hunter, Raleigh, N. C.; Rev. A. E. Whatham, Vt.; Rev. Guy Miner, Medway, Mass.; Miss Ward, C. P. C. Correspondent; Rev. D. G. Huntington, China; Archdeacon Appleby, Duluth; Rev. Scott Wood, Lawrenceville, Va.; Rev. Ellis Bishop, Boston.

The Quiet Day services, which were held in the chapel of Emmanuel Church, Boston, on Thursday, January 10th, were conducted by Bishop Brewster of Connecticut. The general subject of the addresses was "The relation of the church-worker to the work."

The fourth Conference for Parochial Officers was held March 27th at the house of the President. There were eighty-three delegates present, representing fifty parishes. Two papers were read: "The History of the Auxiliary in Massachusetts," by Miss Lucy R. Woods, and "The United Offering," by Mrs. E. A. Fisher.

Two thousand four hundred and ninety-eight postals and notices, and three hundred and eleven letters, also one hundred and eighty-two mite-boxes, have been sent out by the Secretary. Four hundred and eighty-two letters have been received.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1900-1901.

THE work of the Junior Auxiliary in Massachusetts during the past year has, on the whole, been very satisfactory. The Committee has been much crippled by its lack of a chairman, as it was impossible to fill Miss Reynolds's place; and only a few new branches have consequently been formed; but the outlook is nevertheless decidedly encouraging, as the interest and work in the old branches is steady, and the department, as a whole, is undoubtedly progressing along lines more in conformity with those of the Woman's Auxiliary than has heretofore been possible. This last fact is especially gratifying, as it was exactly this result that was desired when the division of the Society was made, and the Sunday School branches were taken out of the Junior Auxiliary.

Certain changes have lately been made in the Committee, which it is to be hoped will enable the work to be more actively carried on. As no one could be found to fill Miss Reynolds's place as chairman, Miss Sturgis has undertaken the work of that position; and the Board have elected Miss Caroline A. Derby to the office of Secretary.

In accordance with the resolution which was passed at the Spring conference in 1900, a meeting of Junior officers was held in November, in the parish rooms of St. Paul's Church, Boston, on the morning of the day upon which the Woman's Auxiliary held its monthly meeting. The attendance was good, and the meeting a successful one. It was voted that a similar meeting should be held in February; but unfortunately this could not be accomplished, owing to the absence of the Secretary from the city.

The Spring conference of Junior workers was well attended, and several questions of importance came up for discussion. Among these was the question of the financial support of Junior branches in such parishes as had depended for funds for this purpose upon the offerings of the Sunday School. It was agreed that the question should be put before the Sunday School Auxiliary Committee. This was done; and, after discussion, the Committee replied as follows: "It is resolved that, whereas the interest of the children in their offerings is of the utmost importance, as well as their loyal desire to co-operate in undesignated offerings; and whereas the Committee realizes that the existence of a Junior branch is most stimulating to the missionary spirit of a Sunday School; the Sunday School Auxiliary Committee sees no objection to the Sunday Schools appropriating a part of their monthly missionary offerings to the use of the Junior Auxiliary work, provided it is done by the vote of the Sunday School as a whole."

The Annual meeting took place in May, in Emmanuel Chapel. As no Sunday Schools were invited, the number of children present was necessarily much smaller than last year; and a rainy day added to the difficulty of gathering the branches together. In spite of these drawbacks, however, the meeting was most successful. There were about two hundred and fifty children present, and they were thoroughly interested and attentive and joined heartily in the hymns, which they had practised beforehand. The speakers were: Bishop Lawrence, who opened the meeting; Miss Church of the Junior Auxiliary of New York; and the Rev. J. L. Prevost of Alaska.

Owing to the division of the Diocese, certain of the Western branches of the Junior Auxiliary will, in the future, have no connection with the Central Committee in Boston. It seems best, however, that, until the work is separately organized in the Western Diocese, any connection that would be of advantage to these branches should be continued. This applies especially to the Junior leaflets and the publications of the Church Missions Publishing Co.; and to the lantern and missionary slides. These things can be obtained upon application to the Secretary, and can be sent to any part of the Diocese.

The class for mission study at the Church Training School, 7 West Cedar St., Boston, will be continued this year. It will meet at twelve o'clock on Mondays, and all those who are interested in the subject of the History of Indian and Colored Missions, and who are near enough for regular attendance, have an opportunity that should not be lost.

In closing this report it is satisfactory to be able to state that the actual work of the Junior Auxiliary is steadily gaining. During the year the offerings to Missions have been generous; although, owing to the division of the Society, the actual sum sent was not equal to last year. The boxes were well prepared, and enthusiastically received in the Mission Fields. From Mr. Ashley in South Dakota has come warm commendation of the Christmas boxes sent to him for distribution among the Indians; and it is to be hoped that this part of the work will be as satisfactorily carried on in the future. It is well, however, while thinking of these things, to keep in mind the fact that, although the actual work is important, the spiritual work is still more so; and that it is through the interest that can be aroused, and the sincere prayers that are offered, that the cause for which we all work can best be furthered.
