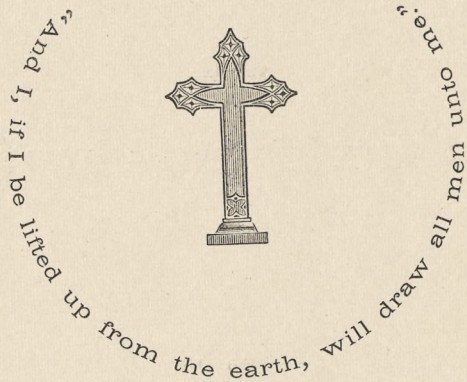

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, etc.," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each division of the work undertaken by said church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be necessary to form a quorum.

MASSACHUSETTS BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

SINCE we bade Godspeed last year to the Auxiliary of Western Massachusetts, the total separation of our branches has been accomplished. We offer our thanks to their officers for kindly and courteously helping us to fulfil the pledges which were undertaken before their final organization had been determined upon. The committees all unite in expressing their regrets at the loss of so many faithful workers, but there is no note of discouragement. The most helpful circular with which they have inaugurated their society shows the ability and zeal of the Western Diocese, and to us remains the task of proving that we can continue our service of activity in a manner that will show no diminution in the gifts sent from Massachusetts.

The change in the new boundaries of the old diocese made readjustment of the lines of the districts necessary. The Southeastern District has been reduced to twenty-nine parishes. Essex County is set apart as the Northeastern Districts, and the remaining parishes, too far from Boston to send delegates to the monthly meeting or be directly in communication with the Executive Committee, have been assigned to a third Vice President.

The Southeastern District held a large Annual Meeting in the Church of the Ascension, Fall River, last November. Bishop Lawrence was the preacher. Missionaries from Japan and Mexico and speakers from the Central Committee were present and the meeting was helpful and successful.

Miss Packard sends her last report from the North Eastern District. In three years her efforts have brought many parishes into line and we regret that she is obliged to resign the charge of the work so well begun. She reports from twelve parishes contributions of boxes whose value was \$187.24 less than the last year. The gifts in money exceeded those of 1901 by \$324.48; this does not include the \$291.56 given for the United Offering. Three able parishes reported directly to the Secretary. Amesbury and South Groveland have started promising branches, and as a final word Miss Packard adds: "If my experience in this especial work has taught me one thing more than another it is not to despise the day of small things."

**Domestic
Committee.**

MISSIONARIES in the Domestic field have continued to receive help and our pledges have been fulfilled, but we have been unable to respond to many pressing appeals.

Four women have gone to represent Massachusetts in Alaska, two of whom may have been influenced in their decision by attendance at the Training School for Church Workers under Miss Carter. It is the desire of the Committee that this diocese assumes Miss Carter's support. She is so well known to many of us and so beloved by all who know her that we are sure our women will be glad to claim her as a special representative in the field and add this pledge to others.

The Diocesan Missionary, Miss Langdon, having left in June for service in Alaska, her successor Miss King is now working under the Archdeacon of New Bedford. It is earnestly hoped that the parishes of the diocese will support her for the coming year in order that the Bishop's plan of a woman missionary may have a fair trial.

**Dakota
League.**

THE Dakota League has met its pledges and during the year has given much in response to special appeals, notably that of Bishop Hare for the School Food Fund. He sincerely regrets the necessity of

closing two of the boarding schools in his jurisdiction owing to the withdrawal of government rations. The usual assignment for St. Paul's School not being forthcoming, it is anticipated that all other assignments will be eagerly taken and filled with greater success than ever before.

The other "specials" nobly responded to were for the Oneida Creamery, the travelling expenses of a nurse who went from Massachusetts to the Indians in Utah, and the work at Anvik, Alaska, so inspiringly brought before us by Miss Sabine in person. The Chairman desires to call attention to the change of form in the Alaskan pledge which is suggested as an expression of the interest felt by the Diocese in all three of the Massachusetts women who have chosen that distant territory as their sphere of labor.

**Work Among
Colored People.**

TURNING to the first annual report of the Massachusetts Branch, we read that the committee to the freedmen sent six boxes valued in all at \$152, and \$19.25 in money. This compared

with our total for this year, the best of our history, of over \$5000, gives us courage to press on to still greater increase in the future. The absence of the Secretary during the first five months delayed the work usually undertaken, but the greater interest felt in our missions because of the report thus brought directly from the field more than made up for the delay at the start. To see the work was to believe in it, and to the recital of the incidents of the missionary journey, from Texas to Virginia, a large number of parish branches gave cordial attention, and grateful acknowledgment is made of the interest thus manifested. One feature of these meetings worth noting was the unusually large number of occasions when two or more parishes were represented.

The pledges this year were for the most part a renewal of those made in former years. Of Miss Wheeler, at St. Augustine's school, who has been our own representative in the field, Mrs. Hunter writes: "She has been a blessing and a help to our poor people and I sincerely hope that the Auxiliary of Massachusetts will send her back to us next year." The school at Peake, S. C., almost ideal in its conditions and management, has had our support as for several years past, as also the cooking school at Franklin, N. C. At other points we have coöperated with other branches of the Auxiliary, our gifts testifying to our wide interest.

The most notable one has come from the Girls' Friendly Society of Massachusetts, a contribution of nearly \$400. for a parish schoolhouse in Virginia, in which one of their own members from this diocese is a teacher.

With the new year we begin a new era in this department, the Secretary in charge assuming the title of Chairman in charge of work among the colored people. We must be prepared for improved methods of work, realizing that no radical change is ever undertaken without careful thought and conference with our general secretary in New York.

Foreign Committee.

THE changes that have come through the division of the Diocese and the apportionment plan, together with the absence of the regular chairman of the Foreign Committee, have somewhat unfavorably affected the receipts of the past year. Believing that the gain has been in other directions, we rejoice that the good work goes on, and in many respects the year has been a good one. The regular pledges, including the salary of Miss Woodruff, who though transferred from Cape Mount to Cape Palmas is still our immediate charge, have been practically fulfilled and one or two new ones assumed. But as the supporters of scholarships fall away by death or other causes we need new contributors to take their places. Outside of the regular pledges the special appeal for the year was for the Memorial to the late Honorary Secretary of the Society, Mrs. M. A. E. Twing, which called forth the warm interest of all who knew her work in the early organization of the Society and her devotion of heart and life to its continued progress. Moreover, the object itself, which aimed at raising the condition of girlhood in China, commended itself to the hearts of women. Seven hundred dollars were contributed with more to be forthcoming had not the desired sum been otherwise completed. You are asked to carry over your interest to the equally important work of Bishop Graves in the rebuilding of St. John's College for Chinese boys.

Japan also sees that progress without a moral foundation is a dangerous thing, and we have there new opportunities and centres for needed work.

Cuba has been added to the foreign department and comes with claims of special force at this time.

While as a country we are boasting of missionary work accomplished by the force of arms, must we not show that the sword of the Spirit is both more Christlike and more effective?

Haiti and Mexico.

THE Mexican Church has been again prominently before the country, since the meeting of the General Convention in San Francisco in 1901.

At that meeting the Bishops, in the exercise of their supposed prerogative, authorized the consecration of *two* Bishops for the Mexican Church. At a later meeting in Cincinnati, the Bishops having further light, voted their approval of the consecration of *three* Mexican Bishops elect, subject to the formal approval of the constitutional proportion of the whole number of Bishops required in such case.

This action has been severely criticised on grounds both of legality and expediency. Whatever may be the merits of the case, it should be borne in mind, that the Mexican Church, like the church in Japan, is a distinctly independent, autonomous, national church, with its own constitution, canons, synod, liturgy, rights and privileges, as complete and separate as the Church in the United States or Canada, and that the three Bishops, for whom consecration is asked of the American Bishops, are the choice of the Mexican Church, acting in its own sovereign capacity. The question is not at all, an election by the General Convention of three *missionary* Bishops to be *sent* by the American Church to Mexico, but, of giving the Episcopate by the American Bishops to a sister Church duly organized and operated in a foreign country—still feeble and financially dependent and asking and receiving financial assistance until, like the Church in Japan, it is able to stand alone.

Meanwhile several kind friends in Massachusetts have sent large gifts and many others smaller ones to increase the capacity of the Hooker School, as well as to benefit its working apparatus, and Mr. Forrester writes that the new rooms are all filled, and that the school is entirely out of debt. A number of graduates are doing good service as teachers, organists, etc., in various places. Eighty dollars supports a scholarship in the Hooker School.

The renovated Church of S. José de Gracia gives a fresh and suitable place for worship, while the rear of the building is in active usefulness for quarters for the Dean Gray Memorial School. Scholarships for this school are \$100 a year.

The visit last Fall of Mr. and Miss Forrester gave great pleasure to all who heard them. The Committee ask for additional scholarships in both schools.

In Brazil there are constant evidences that our work increases in interest and opportunities. Again and again is Bishop Kinsolving asked to start churches in various places. This he does as far as he is able. His report of the comfort and help which some of the people find in our church and its services should make us eager to give to all the benefits of a purer church home than they have known before. Our workers in Brazil, both men and women, command the respect and sympathy of us all. As Bishop Brooks used to say: "In proportion as we value the good news of the Gospel ourselves, will we wish to share it with others less favored than we."

Poor Haiti, racked with internal conflict and political unrest! How can she do much for her own spiritual growth? And yet, the patience,

fortitude and wisdom of Bishop Holly and his co-laborers are renewedly apparent. They labor on, year after year, as opportunity and ability are given, and amid all the turmoil, the Church, the school and the Hospital invite and bless many weary souls in that distracted land. Do not forget Haiti.

Altar Society. THE Altar Society's report shows an increase of work ably accomplished. Fifty gifts have been sent to parishes in twenty-one dioceses, to China and to Brazil. These with the forwarding charges amounted to \$750 in value. This by no means represents the sum total of their achievements, for the enriching of the services in the poorer parishes is assisted by the orders received from the larger ones, the profit thus arising being used to help the Society's mission work.

Church Periodical Club. THE Church Periodical Club continues its good work and is gradually enlarging the borders of its usefulness. The secretaries in charge in Massachusetts are always ready to respond to any invitations to tell the story of the helpfulness and cheer that it takes to many homes, and would at any time be glad to meet with the parochial branches at their weekly or monthly meetings. If the librarians and church people will turn a willing ear to what they have to say, the future of the Society is safe.

The Juniors, under their enthusiastic young officers, show in the separate report the work undertaken and accomplished.

Referring to the Treasurer's report you will see the money for general expenses has been generously contributed and that the expenditures have been somewhat decreased. \$286.09 for the United Offering has been sent in, and you are reminded that the General Treasurer, Mrs. H. S. Macomber, 162 Cypress Street, Brookline, is the authorized collector of that offering, which should be remitted to her after the periodical opening of the mite boxes.

One thousand dollars of the Bishop Brooks Memorial Fund was given to the Auxiliary of Western Massachusetts to be held in the same form and for the same purposes as our own. This fund is always open for your contributions. The extra \$35,000 asked from the Auxiliary at large as an increase in its yearly gifts will assist the Board of Missions to develop their more systematic plans, and Massachusetts it is hoped will give its share of this additional sum.

The tenor of these reports make us regret the more that some of our ablest officers are obliged to retire from the board.

Miss Bradford, whose name appears first in the report for 1883, finds the demand on her strength too great. Her many years of faithful service on the Committee leaves us with a vacancy that will be hard to fill. Her never failing zeal for the work, her wise advice, her unvarying courtesy, have added to our board an influence that will long be felt in Auxiliary work. Mrs. Hall, who for some years has served with great interest on the Mexican Committee, will take the place which Mrs. Scudder's continued absence prevents her from resuming.

Mrs. Winslow has also been obliged to withdraw, and we give her our sincere thanks for the help she has been to us for the past years.

We ask your continued assistance for the new officers whose names are presented by the nominating committee.

The increasing desire to send money whenever possible, instead of its equivalent, to our missionaries, is a hopeful sign of progress. Certainly in some instances the box will always be of more assistance to the missionary and his family, but in the many cases the money will far better help out the small salary and give the opportunity of a choice, which even the kindest request will fail to bring to our notice.

The neighborhood meetings are reported on the increase and as being most helpful to those parishes who can meet thus and discuss plans and methods for widening their influence.

In arranging for the celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary it was the purpose of your Committee to bring to the parochial branches the help which the enthusiasm of the triennial meetings bring to the Diocesan Branches.

In January the following Resolutions were sent to all the parishes:

Resolved, That the Thank offering which is to mark the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, be sent to the Board of Missions for General Missions; that we, the members of that Branch, desire thus to express our sympathy with the great work of the Church in all lands, and our loyalty and gratitude to the Board of Missions for its administration of the work.

Resolved, That the offering be presented by the parish delegates throughout the diocese, at the service of the Holy Communion, on the day of our twenty-fifth anniversary, in November, 1902, and that with it we may, according to that holy office, not only lift up our hearts in gratitude to God for all the past, but more fully than ever before, "present ourselves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy and living sacrifice," in the service of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

We earnestly ask that every parish will send a delegate to this service bringing with her their Thank offering, feeling sure that she will take home to her Society fresh impulse for loving and more interested devotion to the cause.

And it may be questioned "Why a Thank offering?"

In turning to the report for the past twenty-five years we are forced to confess that though much has been accomplished we have left much also undone. The receipts for the last half of the time have not increased as promised by the early years. Other calls have become more frequent, and our increasing Triennial offering may have affected the yearly receipts. From \$992, given to the "enrolment fund" in 1892, the United Offering rose to \$6,778.14 last October, and this gain is not only in amount, it was the small contribution of the many, not the large gifts of the few. Nor can we report the same proportionally large representation at our Monthly Meetings as was recorded fourteen years ago, but nevertheless the knowledge and interest in the work show signs of being far more general than ever before. Records

when dependent on the vicissitudes of parish life are hard to preserve, and we find South Groveland announcing this year the formation of a branch, when our very first report gives the parish credit for a "box." We are very human in our forgetfulness and backslidings. It is, however, impossible to look back twenty-five years without recognizing that progress has been made in a way that no statistics can give, though they show \$271,339.83 and boxes valued at \$301,360.13 have been sent from Massachusetts in that time.

The desire to know more of the conditions of the heathen as well as fellow-Christians, the Missions Study classes, the wish to add the encouraging touch to the missionaries' life by the letter or the book that brings it in contact with our own, the interest that is given with the mite, the Quiet Day that takes us for a little while apart with our Master, and the habit of the noon-day prayer for missions, show an advance on the spiritual side of our work, for which no offering, however large, that we can make at the time of our corporate communion can sufficiently show our gratitude, unless it be accompanied with a spirit of loving and humble service.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The usual number of meetings have been held during the year, nine Committee and nine Monthly meetings of the Auxiliary, also the Anniversary, the Quiet Day and the fifth Conference of Parochial officers.

The average attendance at these monthly meetings was seventy-nine delegates, representing forty-one parishes, and at the Conference thirty-five parishes were represented by sixty delegates.

Seven new Branches or Guilds have been formed, and four reorganized; two have been given up. This makes the total number of Branches and Guilds one hundred and seventeen, with correspondents in fourteen other parishes.

The appeal for the number of women interested in the Woman's Auxiliary brought out a better response this year, and instead of the 2,500 women in the whole diocese of Massachusetts reported last October, this year the number sent in is 2531 for this diocese and 980 for Western Massachusetts. Even this is far behind the proper number, as many parishes did not reply at all, and others were not able to state the number.

The twenty-fourth Anniversary meeting took place in Trinity Church, Nov. 6th. The Bishop of the Diocese celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by Bishop Graves of China, Bishop Rowe of Alaska, Bishop Kinsolving of Brazil, and the Rev. Andreas Bard of Spokane.

Bishop Lawrence also presided at the meeting which followed in the Chapel, and called attention to the fact that this was the last time this Auxiliary would meet together as one branch. Mrs. Thayer followed, giving a brief account of the Convention and of the United Offering, the share from Massachusetts of the \$104,000 being \$6,646.76. Miss Loring presented a resolution expressing regret and sympathy on the death of Mrs. Twing, the Honorary Secretary. It was adopted by a rising vote. Rev. Andreas Bard spoke of his school in Walla Walla, Spokane, and Bishop Kinsolving of the work being done in Brazil. Three hundred and forty-three delegates, representing eighty-six parishes, were present. At the afternoon meeting, addresses were made by Bishop Graves of China, Bishop Rowe of Alaska, and Bishop Lawrence.

At the monthly meetings there have been eight speakers: Rev. W. S. Claiborne, Tennessee; Miss Bull, Japan; Dr. Lloyd, General Secretary, New York; Bishop Horne, Ashville; Rev. W. G. McCready, Lexington, Kentucky; Miss Sabine, Alaska; Rev. E. H. Evans, Japan; and Miss Wheeler, Raleigh, N. C.

The Quiet Day services were held in the Chapel of Emmanuel Church, Boston, Thursday, Jan. 9th, and were conducted by Dean Robbins of Albany.

The fifth Conference for Parochial Officers was held on Wednesday, April 9th, at the house of the President. There were present sixty delegates representing thirty-five parishes. Two papers were read,—“Personal Influence at Home,” by Miss M. T. Emery, and “Personal Influence in the Mission Field,” by Miss Carter.

Two thousand eight hundred and seventy-five notices, postals, &c., and five hundred and forty-five letters were sent out, and five hundred and two letters received by the Secretary. Six hundred and seventy-eight mite-boxes have been sent out by the Treasurer.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1901-1902.

DURING the past year, the work of the Junior Auxiliary in Massachusetts has been gradually growing. Various changes have been made in the organization as a whole, which, from a financial point of view, do not make this growth apparent; but, on the other hand, what the Society has lost in strength of numbers, the Committee has every reason to feel assured it has more than made up in unity of work and purpose. Ten branches have left us and banded together to form the foundation of the Junior Auxiliary in the Western diocese; and one or two branches, which could not strictly be said to be Junior societies, have dropped out; but, to offset this, nine new branches have been formed and have taken hold splendidly, and the reports from the older branches show steady, satisfactory work.

No changes have been made in the Committee, but, in order that the lantern slides and leaflets belonging to the Auxiliary may be seen and used to better advantage, they have been combined with those of the Sunday-school Auxiliary in a cabinet at the Diocesan House, 1 Joy St. There they can be seen at any time, and from there they can be loaned upon application to Miss Margaret Bush, 1 Joy St., Boston.

The Autumn and Spring meetings of Junior officers, held in November and February in the Parish rooms of St. Paul's Church, Boston, were fairly well attended and interesting. The informality of these meetings gives an opportunity, the importance of which cannot be too strongly emphasized, for the officers to compare notes, offer suggestions, and make plans for united work; and it is greatly to be hoped that all who possibly can will attend those to be held during the coming year on the third Wednesday in November and February.

The Spring conference of Junior workers was well attended, and various subjects of interest came up for discussion, chief among them being the desirability of a close relation between the Junior officers and the Woman's Auxiliary. This question was also touched upon in the conference of the Woman's Auxiliary, and it was suggested that in every parish where it was possible, at least one of the Junior officers should be made a member of the Woman's Auxiliary also. Another important subject was the share of the Junior Auxiliary in the contribution to general missions. A letter was read from Miss Emery, regretting that so little had been done by the Juniors in Massachusetts towards General Missions, and urging us to undertake some special work that would come under that head. It was voted, that at this time it would be impossible for Massachusetts to make any extra pledge for this purpose;

but it is earnestly to be hoped that the branch-leaders will, at least, bear the subject in mind and realize the opportunity which is theirs, as well as the duty of contributing their share to the general work.

The annual meeting was held in Emmanuel Chapel on April fifth, the speakers being Bishop Lawrence, who opened the meeting; Miss Sabine from Anvik, Alaska, and Miss Loring of the Woman's Auxiliary. This is the second meeting of the Juniors apart from the Sunday-schools, and it is satisfactory to be able to state that the separation has been of the greatest advantage both to the Juniors and the Sunday-schools. Those who attended the service in Emmanuel Church on the afternoon of the second Sunday after the Epiphany, can have no question as to the advantage it has been to the Sunday-schools, to have their annual service arranged for them at that time by their own Committee. With due respect to the Sunday-schools, also, there can be no doubt that the division is of the utmost benefit to the Junior Auxiliary. Not only do we gain in the Annual Service in attention and enthusiasm; but on account of the interest which is spreading among the Sunday-school children through the efforts of their Committee, enthusiasm works back into the Junior Auxiliary. When the division was first made, the Auxiliary lost ten branches. Now, five of these have formed regular Junior Societies and a number of others have been started on account of the interest aroused in the Sunday-schools by the work of their Committee.

The Mission study class at the Church Training School, 10 Arlington St., will be held this year on Mondays at eleven o'clock, beginning on November third. The subject this year is to be "Missions in China," and the course is sure to be full of interest and advantage to all who can attend it regularly.

A report of this kind necessarily must deal with the practical side of Junior work; must be an account of meetings held and boxes and money sent, etc.; but it is well, while going over the record of such things, to keep in our minds a realization of the far more important side of the question—the knowledge of Missions and what they stand for, and the spread of Our Lord's Kingdom in the hearts of His children, not only in the outposts, but in our own land and our own homes as well. This is the foundation of the Junior Auxiliary, the basis upon which we must all build if we are truly to help in the fulfilment of our motto,—“Thy Kingdom come.”
