

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, etc., as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each division of the work undertaken by said church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be necessary to form a quorum.

TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

We must begin our year by recording our gratitude not only for the courtesy and kindness that the late Rector of St. Paul's Church, Boston, has always shown us, but also for all he was in his daily life as an example of a true gentleman, proving by his character and Christian service his love for God and man. Dr. Lindsay's word of encouragement and cheer was never wanting in any righteous enterprise, and we are thankful to have been blessed with his long continued sympathy, which we shall greatly miss.

With deep regret we report the death of three Auxiliary workers, who having finished their course with faith now rest from their labors :

MISS MARTHA B. CUSHING,
MISS ELLEN J. BAKER.

These truly Christian women, associated with the Auxiliary from its earliest days, sometime officers, always interested, leave a vacancy in our ranks that will with difficulty be filled. Miss Woods, for long years Chairman of the Dakota League, brought to the Board a keen and discriminating mind—a heart full of love for her Master's work—a rare sense of humor that relieved a gloomy outlook—a Christian cheerfulness and hope that made intercourse with her a pleasure—a character of strong and wide influence that will not pass.

Miss Cushing was never absent from our meetings until the past year when failing health prevented her coming. She was ready to help by word or deed and was always to be depended on to do well whatever she undertook in behalf of our missionary work.

Miss Baker—alert and alive to all and everything pertaining to missions—but especially interested in the foreign field—constant in attendance, never forgetful of prayers and gifts for the cause so dear to her heart—was an example of a quiet life imbued with the love of God.

Additions to our Board were made this year. With the Bishop's consent, and in anticipation of the coming Convention, Mrs. Lawrence kindly consented to become our Honorary Vice President. Miss Bumstead also has a place as Treasurer to the Executive Board of the Convention Committee, and as assistant to our Secretary.

**South Eastern
District.**

THE annual meeting, in November last, of the Auxiliary of the South Eastern District was a fitting close to the splendid work of the retiring Vice President. The beautiful service,

with the solemn Eucharist ; the sermon with its spiritual uplift and the glowing words of the address succeeding it ; and, in the afternoon, following the business, speeches by the officers of the Board and others, full of instruction, of enthusiasm and zeal ; all conspired to make the occasion a notable one. During the past year the Vice President visited and spoke to a number of Auxiliaries, and was pleased by signs of interest and assurances of renewed effort.

Many letters have been written. To some, there were replies full of encouragement, while from other Branches came stories of sickness and hard times, of struggles to maintain the home parish and inability to do aught else. On the whole, however, average work has been accomplished by the Branches. A new one has been formed at Christ Church, Swansea, but with no work as yet to report.

Special letters have been written pleading for interest and co-operation in the United Offering, also asking that a record be made of the number contributing.

**North Eastern
District.**

SEVERAL changes have taken place in the North Eastern District the past year. A new Auxiliary has been organized at Gloucester, which as yet has sent no definite report. But

one of the parishes reporting last year has failed to do so this year, and two, not heard from in 1903, have responded. Several churches speak of an increase in the United Offering.

A distinct effect has been felt as the result of the first district meeting held last fall. In this connection we must speak of the irreparable loss that the District has sustained in the death of the Rev. Augustine H. Amory of Lynn, who preached a sermon on that occasion, the words of which no one who was fortunate enough to hear them can ever forget, because of the spirit of consecration and high Christian purpose by which they stirred the heart that they awakened to do the very utmost for the Master. A gain over last year's receipts is shown in the reports of the parishes of Christ Church, Andover; St. Paul's, North Andover; Trinity, Haverhill; St. Peter's, Salem, and St. Paul's, Newburyport. One large gift is announced from this last named parish of \$5000, for the Equipment Fund of Porto Rico. The most encouraging thing to the officer in charge, as she meets the members of the Auxiliary, is the spirit of devotion manifested by them, and their earnest desire to do what they can for the Lord's work.

**Domestic
Committee.** IN October, 1903, a large meeting of "Domestic" delegates from thirty parishes or more, gathered at the Diocesan House to listen to a report made by the Chairman of the Committee, about the condition of the work in various parts of the Domestic field. The delegates voted, at that time, to devote their pledges of money to the payment of Miss

Carter's salary in Alaska, \$600, to the salary of Miss King, the Diocesan Missionary, \$600, and to the partial payment of a woman's salary for the work in Porto Rico. These pledges have been met in full, and other gifts of money and boxes have not fallen in value below those given the past few years, notwithstanding the effort made this year for the increase of the United Offering.

Our Treasurer's report indeed makes a much better showing than usual, but this is due to the large gift of one Parish. This gift testifies strongly to the personal interest of that parish in the efforts of their former Rector. The Secretary adds: "If we could count all the Missionaries as our personal friends — and why not since they are friends of Jesus Christ? — should we not often reckon gifts by thousands from those who heretofore have been content to give sparingly."

Miss Agatha King has continued her excellent work as Diocesan Missionary supported by the Woman's Auxiliary. During the past year she has made herself useful in New Bedford, Taunton and Winchester, and has canvassed many of the adjoining towns.

Dakota League. THE Dakota League appreciates the renewal of interest in Indian boxes indicated by the increased number sent during the year. Less money has been received, barely sufficient to meet the pledges, yet it was possible to send help not previously pledged to North Dakota, from the income of the Lucy M. Chickering Fund, which was paid this year to the Indian Committee, and to it was added a special donation from one parish—the same parish also sending the first gift from Massachusetts to the new Indian Mission at Sacramento.

Shall we not increase our gifts and zeal until the Indians in Duluth, Los Angeles, North Dakota and Sacramento become annually our beneficiaries as well as those Missions that we have helped heretofore?

It has been decided that the memorial to Miss Woods shall take the form of a font to be presented to some one of the churches for Indians. You will recall that for many years she was the chairman of the Dakota League, and only failing strength led her to resign a position which gave her so much active work for a people in whom she was deeply interested. Of course, the size and beauty of the font must depend upon the amount contributed to it. Will those who are desirous of sharing in this memorial, please hand their offerings to Miss H. E. CARYL, 82 Myrtle St., before the first of February.

Work Among Colored People. IN summing up the year's work for Colored People, we find that we have made a very near approach to the ideal of a general interest, in that the results accomplished have been brought about by the co-operation of nearly ninety parishes. We provided last year, and we hope to do the same this coming season, for the Christmas Festivals of the Mission Stations of Southern Virginia. In addition to these Christmas boxes, family boxes were sent to three

clergymen, and also a large number of boxes for "Mission Shops." We have met all our money pledges, including that of \$100 for the General Treasury in New York. With every year we see an increase in the intelligence with which help is given, but there are still a number of parishes who show by their individual action that they have not yet grasped the idea of our being "workers together," and that as a Diocesan Branch, certain responsibilities are laid upon us, which we are bound to meet before other work is undertaken. The Conference of Parish Delegates, which has become an annual feature of the work of our Committee, helps to a clearer understanding of the situation. The Negro Problem is one of overwhelming difficulty, and that our Church begins to feel its responsibility in solving this problem, is a hopeful sign and a promise of better things to come. Meanwhile, as members of the Woman's Auxiliary, we are simply asked to stretch forth a helping hand to those of our own communion whose needs are known—whose worth is tested, and to whom our assistance is a matter of vital moment.

WE regret to report that all the pledges and
The Foreign Committee. Scholarships have not been met this year.

A member of Trinity, Boston, has assumed the Insurance Dues for Mr. Roots, a Missionary in China. This makes five missionaries whose Insurance Dues Massachusetts now pays. We hope next year to add a sixth, as there is still another Massachusetts clergyman in the field, with his life uninsured. There are two Massachusetts women, whose salaries have not yet been entirely raised, whose stipends we must pay in full.

Readers of the "Spirit of Missions" will find an interesting letter from Miss Wall in the April number of 1904.

Notwithstanding the war in the East, the Church's work there is growing. Hospitals and Schools have been enlarged and new Mission stations started. Very important and significant is the fact that prominent posts, both in the army and the home government, are given to Christian Japanese. Mr. Matthews at Cape Mount, Africa, although still without help, is continuing his noble work, and many are being won from the heathen "bush" life to Christianity.

Mexico, Hayti and Brazil. EFFORTS are to be made in the coming year to have a greater number of individuals and parishes pledge themselves for a part, or for all of a scholarship, in one of the three important Church Schools of Mexico.

\$250 supports a scholarship in the Divinity School.

\$100 supports a scholarship in the Dean Gray Memorial School for Boys.

\$80 supports a scholarship in the Mrs. Hooker School for Girls.

Each year these schools educate and send out young Mexican men and women who have received the best possible modern school training; they become members of the Church and greatly help the work by their force and influence.

Bishop Holly, of Hayti, made an appeal to this Committee for their interest in behalf of his two grandsons, orphans, whom he desired to have educated in this country. Scholarships have been procured for them for the coming year in Laurenceville School, Virginia. Bishop Holly's work grows slowly but with lasting strength. In the future it is hoped a more general interest may be shown in the Missions of Hayti. The fifteen ordained clergy of the Haytian Church receive so small a stipend that they are obliged to follow secular work during the week for the proper support of their families. The Missions could grow so much the more in power if the clergy could give, as they should, all their time and energies to the work of the Church.

Services of the Church in eight new places; three chapels and ten churches built; ordination of three native deacons; admission of three candidates for Holy Orders; employment of one Acting Deaconess; organization of a Theological School with eight students; and a great advance in the self-support of the Brazilian Church, is the record of the progress of the work in Brazil during the last year.

Does not this record of the work in the Brazilian Church urge us to equal its success in the interest and help that we shall send them?

Altar Society. THE Altar Society has sent gifts valued at \$663.74 to forty-eight different places. In many cases work has been prepared and sent with careful directions as to how the embroidery or sewing should be done. In this manner women have been enabled to help their own Mission Churches, though unable themselves to pay for the materials. In order to earn the money to purchase these materials the Society receives orders from those able to pay and gratefully acknowledges the growing patronage it has received.

Church Periodical Club. THE C. P. C. continues to show satisfactory signs of life, if not wonderful growth. There are now forty-two parish branches in good order and eight vacancies. An effort has been made to introduce the work among children's societies, and although it is too soon yet to boast of success, there seems reason to hope that it will flourish. The interchange of friendly letters between senders of Magazines and those who receive them is also on the increase. In many cases, of course, correspondence is not possible, but in others it is perhaps the best part of the gift, and it is pleasant to see how the idea of personal friendship is spreading in our ranks. The Massachusetts Correspondent is always glad to answer questions or describe the work done by the Society.

It will be noticed that several of the Secretaries mention the district and special-delegate meetings as aiding in arousing intelligent interest in the mission work we are doing. These appear to have been the key note of the year and we can report larger receipts than for some time past. This increase is not owing to the United Offering alone, to which in three years we have contributed about \$9000, but also to the generous gift of one parish.

All are hoping for an awakening and inspiration from these Triennial Meetings of the Auxiliary.

The consideration of the coming Convention, as bearing on all Missionary Work, and especially that with which the Auxiliary is connected, was the topic chosen for the Seventh Conference, as it was for the one of the previous year. Our plans were matured for the meetings which Miss Emery then outlined, and at this time their success can be adjudged. We hope the daily gatherings at Pierce Hall, as well as the special meetings elsewhere, held to encourage and uplift our missionary zeal, will have quickened us to a wise insight to the joys and sorrows of the missionaries' life. As we have heard of the daily struggle, the success and failures, but still of the steady advance of the spread of the Kingdom, have we gained the knowledge that brings first prayer, then gifts, to be laid with our lives at our Master's feet; have we learned how we at home can best and understandingly aid the cause He has given in charge of His Servants who have gone to spread the gospel? Let us hope so.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The usual regular meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary have been held during the past year, that is to say, nine Committee and nine Monthly meetings, the 26th Anniversary, the Quiet Day and the Seventh Conference for Parochial Officers. In addition to these there have been Conferences held by the Vice-Presidents of the North and South-eastern districts, and by the Committees of the Domestic and Colored Peoples' Missions. Also, ten meetings of the Executive Committee in charge of plans for the Convention.

The average attendance at the monthly meetings was 113 delegates, representing 49 parishes, an increase over last year's report. Fifteen parishes were represented at each meeting, namely: St. John's, Arlington; Emmanuel, Good Shepherd, Messiah, St. Paul's and Trinity, Boston; St. James' and St. John's, Roxbury; St. Mark's, Dorchester; St. Paul's, Brookline; Christ Church, St. James', St. John's and St. Peter's, Cambridge, and St. John's, Hingham. St. James', Cambridge, sent the largest number of delegates for the year, 65 in all; and St. Stephen's, Boston, the largest number at any meeting, 13 being present at the Anniversary Meeting.

Two new branches have been formed and one re-organized. At the Monthly meetings there have been eleven speakers, namely: Miss Ward, C. F. C.; Archdeacon Babcock, Boston; Rev. W. S. Claiborne,

Tenn.; Rev. C. N. Field, Boston; Bishop Brewer, Montana; Miss Thacher, P. I.; Bishop Hare, S. D.; Bishop Brown, Ark.; Miss King, the Diocesan Missionary; Mr. Knapp, Alaska; Miss Jarvis, Conn., and the Rev. Leroy Ferguson, Ark.

The 26th Anniversary took place Nov. 4th in Trinity Church and Chapel, Boston. The Bishop of the Diocese celebrated the Holy Communion at 10 A. M., assisted by Bishop Restarick and Dr. Pott. At the session in the Chapel, the roll was called—77 parishes were represented by 250 delegates. The speakers were: Miss Mahoney of Africa and Mrs. Pott of China.

At the Missionary meeting at 3 P. M., the speakers were: the Rt. Rev. H. B. Restarick of Honolulu and the Rev. F. H. L. Pott, of China.

The Quiet Day Services were held in the Chapel of Emmanuel Church, Thursday, January 7th, and were conducted by Bishop Lawrence.

The 7th Conference for Parochial Officers was held on Wednesday, March 23, at the house of the President. One hundred and twelve officers were present, representing sixty-three parishes. A paper was read by Mrs. Fisher of Worcester, on the United Offering.

Six thousand one hundred and sixty-five leaflets, reports, etc., and seven hundred and nine letters have been sent out and four hundred and fifty-five letters received by the Secretary.

One hundred and nineteen parishes contributed either money or boxes during the year. Total receipts from all sources, in money, \$16,867.51.

Estimated value of boxes, \$11,053.81.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1903-4.

It is satisfactory once more to be able to report a gradual advance in the work of the Junior Department of the Woman's Auxiliary in Massachusetts. During the past year eight new branches have been formed, five of them in direct connection with the Woman's Auxiliary in their respective parishes. Two have been disbanded, owing in one case to the illness, in the other to the absence, of their officers. All along the line in the older branches it is encouraging to realize a constantly increasing desire and effort, on the part of the officers, to press the systematic study of Missions in connection with the work done, and a conscientious endeavor to widen the interest of the children by an intelligent and judicious distribution of their gifts. At the officers' meeting, in November, especial emphasis was laid upon the opportunity which the Junior Department offers as a training school in which to impress upon the children their duty towards the Woman's Auxiliary and to the Board of Missions; and, in this connection, it is interesting to note that their offerings this year to General Missions have more than doubled those of last year, and their contribution to the United Offering has been generous, considering the fact that they have heretofore taken comparatively little interest in the subject.

The Auxiliary has met with a loss, owing to the resignation of its secretary, Miss Derby, who, on account of expected absence from Boston, felt obliged to give up her position as a Junior officer. In her place the Board has elected Miss Gertrude Sheffield of Cambridge as Junior Secretary.

The autumn and spring meetings of Junior officers were held, as usual, in November and February, in the Parish rooms of St. Paul's Church, Boston. The attendance was good, and, as heretofore, a number of interesting questions and helpful suggestions were brought up for informal discussion. Once again, in the Spring, the Junior officers were invited to join in the Conference of the Woman's Auxiliary, to hear from the various officers what preparations had been made for the coming General Convention, and discuss what further efforts were possible and advisable in order to secure the greatest advantage from the opportunities to be offered at that time both to our Massachusetts women and children and to our expected visitors.

The seventh annual Junior meeting was held in Emmanuel Chapel, Boston, on Saturday, May 14th. In consideration of the success of

the last annual meeting, at which reports were read by the secretaries of the various branches, the same experiment was repeated, and twenty-seven branches were duly heard from, the time allowance for each report being two minutes. Archdeacon Babcock presided, and opened the meeting with a short address, and the other speakers were Miss Emery, Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary; Miss Ward of the Church Periodical Club; and Miss Sturgis. Miss Emery introduced the Juniors to the Church Missions House, and explained to them the duties of the officers to the Board, and just how the Church's Missionary machinery works. Miss Ward urged that the Juniors should have their share in the work of the Church Periodical Club, especially along the line of correspondence, and in the circulation of Missionary literature. In connection with the meeting, an exhibit was held, composed of articles made by the Juniors during the year, and a number of interesting things were sent in, the most satisfactory being those which showed that the study of Missions had been keeping pace with the work. The various materials which are collected at the Diocesan House, 1 Joy St., for the use of Junior branches, have not been used as much as was expected. The lantern slides and their illustrated descriptions have proved popular, and a number of lantern talks have been given during the year by the Juniors of various branches; but requests for leaflets, maps, and reports have been very few, and the Committee feels that more use might advantageously be made of these things.

It is impossible, in closing this report at this time, not to make some mention of the results for the Junior department, which it seems must necessarily follow upon the services, meetings, and conferences which have been held in connection with the General Convention, just past. Looking back upon the opportunities which have been ours, it is impossible not to feel the responsibility which those very opportunities have laid upon us as Junior officers. We have been privileged to feel the thrill and power of Missionary work, we have heard its message and seen its possibilities, and the chance is open to us now as never before, to urge forward our cause with redoubled energy, intelligence and confidence, remembering always that our only reliable strength for service must come from Him to whom we turn asking that He will teach us to know what things we ought to do and will give us "grace and power faithfully to fulfil the same through Jesus Christ our Lord."
