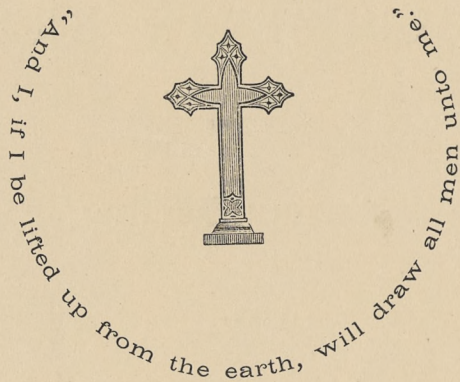

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, etc.," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each division of the work undertaken by said church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be necessary to form a quorum.

THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT.

DEAR FELLOW-WORKERS:

You will be interested in the following pages, for they are a summary of what you, with the coöperation of your Board, have been able to accomplish during the past year for the spread of the Father's Kingdom.

Each Committee makes its separate report as follows:

Domestic	"THE Domestic Committee reports with gratitude
Missions.	that fifty-seven parishes helped to redeem our pledges.
	By their gifts, the salary (\$900) of our missionary
	at Logan was paid. Perhaps no work in our own land

is more important than the work among the Mormons. Please give our missionary your prayers.

The \$600 for West Colorado and Nevada, a very important part of our total pledge, was contributed by individuals. Thus less than \$1000 of the \$1500 pledged was given by the parishes. If, however, we can depend upon the loyal support of all our parish branches, there need be no anxiety in future regarding the meeting of our whole pledge. We cannot go back. We must go forward.

Our Diocesan Missionary goes quietly on commended by the Bishop and the Archdeacon, and successfully accomplishes all the varied duties required of her. Her salary has been fully met."

Indian	"THE Dakota League presents a gratifying report.
Mission.	No assignment of boxes has been neglected, as any
	lack on the part of Auxiliary branches working for
	Catechists was counterbalanced by the zeal and gene-

rosity of individuals.

All pledges of money were fully met, Specials as well as Work under Appropriation.

In addition, personal appeals for Alaska, Oneida and Southern Florida have met with ready response.

The number of parishes pledging money for work among the Indians might and should be much larger.

The Committee wish to record their deep sense of loss in the death of Miss Caroline F. Neal, a loyal friend of their work."

Colored People's Mission. "IN the work for colored people Miss Ednah H. Wheeler has acted as our representative in the field, as for many years past, finding abundant opportunity for service at St. Augustine's School and St. Agnes Hospital, Raleigh, N. C.

Our help given to St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., has made possible a much needed improvement in sanitation.

To the day school at Tryon, N. C., our pledge has brought not only financial help, but the assurance of confidence and sympathy which has given fresh courage to those who have the work in charge.

Our gifts to the Board of Missions for Work under Appropriation have shown a gratifying increase over former years, and have been applied to school work in South Carolina and Mississippi.

Outside the meeting of our pledges, considerable gifts have been made by parishes and individuals in the form of Specials."

Foreign Missions. "THE report of the Foreign Committee this year is told in a very few words, but those, fortunately, are cheerful ones. Our pledges have been met and Miss Woodruff's salary paid. The parish visiting has been a pleasant feature of our work this winter. More parishes have been visited than last year, and new interest shown by increased contributions and, most encouraging of all, eager desire to hear and learn more of the Missions in foreign fields."

Latin American Missions. "OUR pledges are happily more than met, and this has been due in large measure to the efforts of the little parishes to give according to their ability. Some who gave last year have not felt that they could do so this year, but the gain in numbers giving has been greater than the loss. We are coming, I think, into more personal touch with the work in the Latin American countries. The specials that have been given show this. A font to the Isle of Pines, Christmas presents for the work in Cuba and Mexico, personal help to the clergy in Haiti, all these show a helpful and growing interest in the work."

The Educational Secretary's Report will be found on page 11,—the Junior Department's Reports on page 23.

We owe much to the Educational Secretary and to the officers of the Junior Department for the spirit and skill with which they are helping the Auxiliary and the Juniors to bridge over the dividing gap of which we have heard so often. Let us all share in this vital work.

Altar Society. "THE Altar Society, after another year of hard work, wishes to express its gratitude for the many orders received. These made it possible to send gifts of vestments, silver and altar hangings to many stations in the mission field, both foreign and domestic. In addition to other gifts, a hundred dollars is about to be given to Bishop Rowe for an altar in Cordova, Alaska, a new and promising mission. The Society has met

with a great loss, in that Miss Clara V. Parker, so long its President and devoted member, has decided to live in New York. The appeal, therefore, is more urgent than ever for new workers, and especially for those who can do fine sewing and are willing to make the missionary surplices after they are cut and basted. Gifts of money are gratefully received. Two dollars will pay for the making of a cassock, for which many requests come from our faithful missionaries."

C. P. C.

"THE Church Periodical Club continues to show growth in various ways. Not only have four new parishes taken up the work during the past year, but one branch has been resuscitated, and several of those in working order show an increase in their gifts. Figures, while not wholly accurate, are a help in testing progress, and it is satisfactory to see that nearly \$150 more was reported this year than last, while 64 more regular magazines and 1,417 more books have been contributed. As many of the latter were of a high grade, we may hope that great good has been done among the unknown many whom they reached and influenced."

THE Hospitality Committee has again taken over all care, and left us nothing but pleasure in entertaining our visiting friends. We thank them for the thorough and charming way in which they fulfilled their duties.

The United Offering.

"WE have already begun our third and last year of the United Offering for 1910. We trust that every woman in every parish will consider it a privilege to share in it by prayer and gift. The treasurer would like all offerings sent to her, if possible, in June, or at the latest by September 1st."

The Services of the Quiet Day were conducted by the Rev. Arthur S. Lloyd, D.D., General Secretary of the Board of Missions. Once more he made plain to those who were present, how noble is the service to which they as Christians are called. We cannot let pass Dr. Lloyd's name without speaking of the great loss which comes to us, women of the Auxiliary, through his election as Bishop-Coadjutor of Virginia. This, his fifth call to the Episcopate, he felt to be imperative, though it necessitated his resignation as Secretary of the Board of Missions. His wise and kindly sympathy treated as trivial no small detail which we carried to him. We are grateful for his help in our missionary business, still more for the vision that he ever held before us of the King in His beauty, of the glory and privilege of His service, where all is gladly done, the love of the human child answering to the love of the heavenly Father.

THE Board of Missions suffered another loss by the death on April 21st of George C. Thomas, its Treasurer. Deeply as he is missed, the Church remains the richer for the ideal of stewardship which he upheld,—stewardship not only of money, but of time, and talents, and affection.

THE pledge leaflet which was sent out last autumn failed to accomplish its object. By means of it we hoped to secure a more general

sense of responsibility and more systematic giving on the part of the parish Societies. The opposite came to pass. Though all our pledges were met, for Work under Appropriation and for Specials, this result was brought about largely by the considerable gifts of the few, rather than by the small gifts of the many.

On the other hand, it was by many gifts, received from every parish and mission, that our Bishop was able to report for the first time that our Diocese had met its Apportionment. Cannot we women report next year that every woman's missionary society has contributed at least twenty-five cents for Missions? And not that only, but that every parish and mission in this Diocese has a society of women whose love to God and their fellow-men reaches beyond the limits of parish, and even of country? There remains much to be done, for out of 188 parishes and missions only 110 worked with us last year. If any of you who read this belong in a parish, or know a neighboring one, where there is no Missionary Society working with the Auxiliary, will you try to find where the difficulty lies? Will you let your officers help you by letter or by personal visit?

We would specially urge the parishes of the Middle and of the South Eastern Districts to become acquainted with their Vice-Presidents, and to give them an early chance of service. A notice giving their names and addresses will shortly be sent out.

Four conferences were held during the year, as you will see by the Secretary's report. It is hoped that Neighborhood Conferences will be held more and more in the country. They will be found most useful in cultivating good fellowship and in spreading the knowledge of Missions, and of the methods by which these Missions can be helped.

There is much to be thankful for in this report of our year's work. A larger opportunity, however, is still before us. Let each one of us work while it is day; let us share our opportunity with every soul whom we can seek out and reach. Let us pray without ceasing, for alone we can do nothing. The harvest truly is great, and the King's business requires haste.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

THE Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has held during the past year nine Committee meetings at the Diocesan House and eight Monthly meetings in St. Paul's Chapel, the April meeting having been held in Trinity Parish Hall on account of the noise caused by the work on a new building adjoining St. Paul's Church. Conferences were also held in Bridgewater, Marlboro' and the Church of the Ascension, Boston. The average attendance at the monthly meetings was 125 delegates from 65 parishes.

Twenty-one parishes were represented at every meeting, namely: Church of the Advent, Boston; All Saints, Dorchester; Emmanuel, Boston; St. James', Roxbury; St. John's, East Boston; St. John's,

Roxbury; St. Mark's, Dorchester; St. Paul's, St. Stephen's and Trinity, Boston; Trinity, Bridgewater; Church of Our Saviour, and St. Paul's, Brookline; Christ Church, St. James', and St. John's, Cambridge; St. Luke's, Chelsea; Calvary, Danvers; Grace Church, Newton; St. Paul's, Newton Highlands; and St. Chrysostom's, Wollaston. St. James' Church, Cambridge, sent the largest number of delegates for the year, 46, nine having been present at the January meeting.

There were 14 speakers at these meetings; Archdeacon Atwood, Arizona; Mrs. Wetmore, Ashville; Mrs. Ford, Chairman of Domestic Committee in New York; Mr. Walker of St. John's College, Shanghai; Miss Ward, C. P. C.; Deaconess Goodwin, Special Student Secretary, New York; Mr. Yui, China; Rev. J. W. Chapman, Alaska; President Tucker, St. John's College, Tokyo; Miss Lindley, Church Missions House, N. Y.; Archdeacon Russell, St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va.; Miss Woods, Ft. Yukon, Alaska; and Mrs. Moort of Liberia.

The Thirty-first Anniversary and Annual Meeting was held in Trinity Church, Boston, November 4th. The Bishop of the Diocese celebrated the Holy Communion, and gave an address. At the session in the Chapel 84 parishes were represented by 245 delegates. The Annual Reports were read and the officers elected. Luncheon was served at one o'clock at the Hotel Vendome to the Bishops, Clergy and Delegates. At three o'clock a Missionary service was held in the Church, the speakers being the Rt. Rev. A. W. Knight of Cuba, Rev. Nathan Matthews of Cape Mount, Africa, and the Rev. J. W. Chapman of Anvik, Alaska.

The Quiet Day Services were held in Emmanuel Chapel on January 7th, and were conducted by the Rev. A. S. Lloyd, D.D.

The Twelfth Conference for Parochial Officers was held in Sewell Hall, Boston, March 25th. There were present 83 officers from 43 parishes.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

A report of gradual advance in the way of Mission-study in the Auxiliary can be made for the year that is past, and the outlook is encouraging, though there is still much room for improvement in united study throughout the diocese. During the winter of 1909, five training classes were held at the Diocesan House under the leadership of the Educational Secretary,—three for leaders of Auxiliary classes and two for Junior leaders. An effort was made in the first class to gather together a number of women who would be ready to conduct classes wherever they were desired, but with the exception of two inter-parochial classes held at Newton Highlands by a member of the branch at All Saints, Brookline, and at St. Paul's Church, Brookline, by a member of St. John's, Boston, all the resulting classes were held in the parishes to which the several members of the training class belonged. The text-book used in all the classes except the one for leaders of younger Juniors, was "The Why and How of Missions," which deals with the general principles and methods of the work, and gives the best possible foundation for further and more defined study. The class for young Juniors worked over a short course for Lent, preparatory to a two years' course — "The Winners of the World" — which it is hoped many of the Junior branches will unite in for 1910. In addition to these classes, an attempt was made to hold a six weeks interparochial class for the neighborhood about Taunton. In the outcome, the neighborhood limited itself to the St. Thomas's Auxiliary, but the class was large and met for study between sessions, in small groups, with most satisfactory results in the way of sustained interest.

Thanks to the generosity and coöperation of the Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, a small travelling library was fitted up in the Spring and put at the disposal of the Educational department for use in connection with past or prospective study classes. Its visits are limited to six weeks in each place, and it only had time to make two during what was left of the season, in Wollaston and Taunton, but its value is already proved, and a welcome is promised for it in various parishes during the coming winter.

On the whole, the Educational department can claim at this, the end of its second year of service, not so much accomplished as so great a vision opening before it of accomplishments which may be, and which must be if the Auxiliary is to keep step with the stirring onward sweep of the Church toward the orderly, generous, and intelligent support of her work under the Board of Missions.

REPORT OF THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

1908-1909.

THE Junior Committee once more reports for the Department an increase in number of branches and in amount of gifts. Statistics of growth must indicate a deepening and expanding interest in the Mission of the Church on the part of children and older girls throughout the Diocese. Two branches have been suspended during the year until leaders can be found to carry these on, but four new branches and three reorganized with new leaders make a total of 74 branches.

The Treasurer's Report shows that the apportionment has been more than met. Although the amounts for the Kyoto and Alaskan scholarships were met without difficulty this year, still the committee in correspondence with Miss Emery, the Secretary of the Auxiliary, and with Miss Lindley, the new associate Secretary in charge of Junior work, lately thought it wise to suggest a change in the pledge which no longer counts under the apportionment. This suggestion was accepted by the leaders who have voted not to carry the Alaskan scholarship during this coming year, but to let more of the money given by the Juniors go toward general Missions. There is an increasing realization that the department as a training school for the Auxiliary should keep before the children an ideal of cheerful giving toward the support of the Board's general work. The amount given by the Juniors is comparatively small, but if they form the habit of loyal support, they will become helpful members of the Auxiliary. For the same reason the Committee wishes to put greater emphasis upon the Juniors' share in the United Offering, and urge them to make it a special offering of thanksgiving at Christmas time.

The educational work is without doubt making the foundation for all activities of the Juniors. The Educational Secretary's report gives the number of normal classes and the resulting parish classes held during the year, but figures are an inadequate estimate of mission study. As the difficulties in the way of regular and systematic study by each branch are slowly overcome, the thoroughness of such training becomes apparent in more active and permanent interest among the Juniors, and in deeper and more vital prayer for the work in the mission field. It is largely through the study class too that a few older girls have already been enlisted in the Auxiliary. Two or three parishes have made it a part of their year's missionary campaign to hold mission study classes for the girls who are too old for a regular Junior branch and have not yet taken part in the women's work. As a result of such classes, several new workers have been provided for parish Auxiliary committees. A service and meeting of women and older Juniors who had been in classes on the "Why and How of Missions" were held on April 24th, 1909, from which the offering for general missions was sent through the Auxiliary Treasury. A small beginning has thus been made toward leading the Juniors on into more advanced work, but the effort to make known to

these older girls that they are members of the Auxiliary by right of their membership, and are called to take a part in church expansion, has not as yet been to any large extent successful. Many of them are working all through the day, and others are absorbed now in other interests. Further co-operation of Auxiliary officers, members, and Junior leaders, is needed if the help of these girls is to be permanently secured.

Another movement not directly connected with the Department in Massachusetts, but closely allied with it, was started in February, 1900. A missionary meeting for boys was conducted and addressed by men. The Diocesan officer for the boys has been carefully investigating the methods in the Brotherhood of St. Paul to which this work may be attached. If parish branches of the organization are formed Junior leaders will be generally called upon to help. The need for boys' missionary societies is increasingly felt as we realize the call for men's service in the field and the opportunities for the work of missionary laymen in the Church at home. The boys may be largely reached through the Sunday School, and the Committee and leaders have felt during the year that Junior branches should co-operate with the Sunday School classes for the introduction of mission instruction into the Sunday School. At one of the conferences when the subject was discussed it was found that a large proportion of Junior leaders were also Sunday School teachers. The monthly conferences have taken a large place in the work of the Department. The subjects during the year have been Work, Giving, Relation of the Department to other organizations in the Church, Prayer, Bible Study, Summer's Work, Consecration and Study. Attendance has increased, but the representation has not included all the Junior branches. The chairmen of the different Auxiliary committees came to the conferences during the year and made more real to the leaders the work of the various fields. The short service of intercessory prayer at the close of each conference has been found to fill a need, and continues this year. Conferences are regularly held on the third Wednesday morning of each month in the Parish Rooms of St. Paul's Church, Boston.

The Annual Meeting took place in Trinity Parish Rooms on Saturday afternoon, May 8th. There were about 450 Juniors present. Addresses were made by Fr. Powell, on the mission field of Hawaii, and by Bishop Lawrence, who also presided. The children appreciated the stories of Hawaii, and at the close of the meeting the roll call was read while each branch stood in turn to show its representation, and the reports of work done during the year were brought up to be filed. Although the annual meetings have been in some ways inspiring to the Juniors, the Committee and the leaders have nevertheless decided to change the old order of a spring meeting for the children. The plan of an Advent Service for all Juniors has been adopted. The children are to march into church with banners to indicate the parish from which they come. In the spring there will be held a business meeting of the children officers who will read their reports themselves and exhibit the educational work which their branches have done during the year.

Now as we try to estimate the progress of the year's work, we realize again that it is not ours, but the Master's. He alone can give the increase.
