

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, etc., " as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each division of the work undertaken by said church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be necessary to form a quorum.

THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT.

DEAR FELLOW-WORKERS:

Your officers submit the following, by way of report and suggestion:

Domestic Missions. "THE Domestic Committee rejoices in pledges met by the contributions from 48 parishes and the gift of \$100 from two faithful women. The Treasury is empty.

This result in the United Offering year is gratifying and leads us to hope that some time every parish society will realize what a privilege it is to share in the important work entrusted to us by the Board of Missions. Then with enlarged hearts and truer vision we may go on eagerly to help the special work which appeals to each of us.

In our diocesan work we have paid the minimum amount promised for the support of our Missionary. A work so important, so faithfully done, and so commended by the Archdeacon ought to appeal to the affection and conscience of our people. Is it too much to ask that another year the full \$600 will be given?"

Indian Mission. "THE Dakota League having the disposal this year of the Bishop Brooks Memorial income, has appropriated it to the Seminole Mission in Southern Florida.

The Treasurer's Report shows encouraging increase of contributions, which not only meet all pledges, but increase the gift to Oneida, Wisconsin.

The Committee must, however, again express regret that assignments for Boxes are so difficult to place.

There has been gratifying response to special appeals, notably the Memorial for Bishop Hare, "Apostle to the Indians," whose life and letters have been a constant help and inspiration through years of the League's work and whose death it records with profound sorrow."

Colored People's Mission. "THE Travelling Chairman of the Missions for Colored People wrote after the report of last season's work reached her, that her hopes had been exceeded in the amount accomplished during her absence. Her gratification must be shared by all who have made effort to keep the work from flagging while it lacked her stimulating presence.

The Missions in Virginia, for whose Christmas festivities we were responsible, were all gladdened by good barrels.

The pledges of money to support educational work, all of which have long been familiar sources of anxiety to those who attend meetings, have been met.

If we have done our best during the past season, under unusual conditions shall not we too, reap the only reward that laborers in the Vineyard ever get or want? Will there not come to us next year the opportunity to double our responsibility and our effort?"

Foreign Missions. "THE report of the Foreign Committee is given in a few words. All pledges have been met. Not for several years has such a large amount of money been received as during 1909-10.

One member with a few friends has pledged the salary of a missionary in China, and open hearts and purses have answered to the many special appeals which have come to us from distant countries."

Latin-American Missions. "It is difficult to estimate real progress in missionary interest and knowledge by figures, but still they are a help in testing the results of the year. Over \$200 more has been given this year than last, but this has been largely in specials to meet the urgent need for help in the famine stricken districts of Mexico. We wish very much we could make a definite pledge this coming year for medical work in these isolated mountain regions. This would make the pledges of our committed share in the three-fold ministry, Evangelical, Medical and Educational. We ask you to make this possible by your help and your prayers."

Altar Society. "THE Altar Society reports a larger number of gifts during the past year, 19 sets of Altar linen, 12 sets of Altar hangings, 85 Stoles, 21 Cassocks and Surplices and 5 sets of Communion Silver, besides an Altar for Cadova, Alaska. It also expresses a determination to exceed these numbers during the coming year, and it hopes that parishes and friends will remember that upon their orders depends its ability to make these gifts."

C. P. C. "The Church Periodical Club looks back over a year of steady if not very rapid growth, and faces more and greater opportunities for usefulness than ever before. We look forward with confident hope to meeting these opportunities, for the response to past appeals has been generous, and as Church men and women realize more and more the necessity for the sort of help we are here to give, we know that the means to give it will be entrusted to us. In addition to the usual magazines and books, we have this year sent out six libraries (or parts of libraries), consisting of from eighty to one hundred volumes and costing from \$25. to \$50. apiece. These libraries are very valuable to the communities that receive them, and we hope that gifts for the purchase of several more may be made during the coming year."

The Hospitality Committee again leaves us in their debt for the entirely satisfactory way in which they have entertained our guests.

The **United Offering.** THIS Thank Offering from the women of our Church in every land, was presented at the Triennial Service of the Woman's Auxiliary held in Christ Church, Cincinnati, on Saturday, October 8th. It amounted to \$242,110.83, or \$17,859.28 more than the offering of 1907.

Massachusetts' share in the offering was \$14,085.94. Since the Triennial Service, the further sum of \$168.00 has been sent in, so that we have exceeded by \$752.00 our offering of 1907. There was a gain of 9 in the number of contributing parishes, while many parishes increased their offering. For these things we are thankful. Can we now, at once, make such a sowing of knowledge and inspiration that in 1913 there will be an overflowing harvest?

You will rejoice with us that our branch of the Auxiliary, women and juniors, has given the amount requested by Miss Emery for work under appropriation of the Board of Missions.

A fully paid apportionment stands also to the credit of our Diocese. Every parish and mission contributed something. When will the Auxiliary reach this ideal?

Through the efforts of our Vice Presidents, Mrs. Soule and Mrs. Benedict, we welcome two new parish branches: — one St. Luke's, Hudson, in the Middle District, the other St. John's, Taunton, in the South Eastern District. Two more are proposing to join us. While we have these causes for rejoicing, there still remain some forty parishes and missions where the women do not realize the opportunities that they are missing. Which of us will bring it home to them?

The parishes by their kind invitations made it possible for your officers to pay more visits than in any previous year, and we hope that there was mutual gain, a deeper feeling of oneness, and an increased love for the mission in which the Master has commanded each of us to do a share.

By means of the Quiet Days and of the Conferences in Boston, Dedham, New Bedford, Southborough and Marlborough, opportunity was given for spiritual and practical training, for truer consecration, and for more intelligent working together in the parish, the diocese and the world-wide field.

The deliberations and conclusions of the General Convention which has just met in Cincinnati are of great importance to every member of the Church. Much has been written about them and we should take advantage of the many sources of information open to us.

One point is of special interest to the woman's auxiliary: the reorganization of the Board of Missions with the recall of Bishop Lloyd to be its president. The end in view is effective organization under spiritual leadership. We cannot do better than to take this as our ideal in all our work.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

NINE meetings of the Standing Committee have been held in the Diocesan House, Boston, during the past year, and nine monthly meetings in the Parish Rooms of St. Paul's Church.

The average attendance at the monthly meetings was 120 delegates from 54 parishes. Eighteen parishes were present at every meeting, namely,—Church of the Advent, Boston; All Saints, Dorchester; Emmanuel, Boston; Emmanuel, West Roxbury; St. James' and St. John's, Roxbury; St. John's, East Boston; St. Paul's, St. Stephen's and Trinity Church, Boston; All Saints' and St. Paul's, Brookline; Christ Church, St. James', St. John's and St. Philip's, Cambridge; St. Mary's, Newton Lower Falls; and St. Paul's, Newton Highlands.

Trinity Church, Boston, sent the largest number of delegates to the 9 monthly meetings—68 in all.

There were 13 speakers at these meetings; the Diocesan Missionary; Rev. Alexander McGuire, Cambridge; Miss Ward, C. P. C.; Archdeacon Cornish, Spartanburg, S. C.; Rev. Dr. Rousmaniere, Boston; Bishop Johnson, South Dakota; Rev. W. S. Claiborne, Sewanee, Tenn.; Mrs. Fisher, W. Mass.; Archdeacon Joyner, Saluda, N. C.; Rev. Mr. Shleman, Persia; Archdeacon Babcock, Boston; Mrs. J. W. Chapman, Anvik, Alaska; Mrs. Thorne, Ass. Sec., New York.

The 32d Anniversary and Annual Meeting was held in Trinity Church, Boston, Nov. 3, 1909. The Bishop of the Diocese celebrated the Holy Communion and made an address; a meeting was then held in the Parish Hall, 80 parishes being represented by 213 delegates. The annual reports were accepted and officers elected for the ensuing year, and an address was made by Miss J. C. Emery. Luncheon was served by the Hospitality Committee at one o'clock at the Hotel Vendome, to the Bishops, Clergy and Delegates. At three o'clock a Missionary Service was held in the Church, the speakers being Bishop Brooke of Oklahoma, and the Rev. F. L. H. Pott, D.D., of St. John's College, Shanghai.

The Annual Quiet Day was held in Emmanuel Chapel, Thursday, January 13, 1910, the services being conducted by the Rev. P. M. Rhinelander.

A Quiet Day was held in East Dedham, March 4, and conducted by the Rt. Rev. Robert Codman, D.D., of Maine.

The 13th Conference for the Parochial Officers was held in Sewell Hall, Boston, March 10, 1910. There were present 112 officers from 60 parishes.

A Conference for the South Eastern District was held in Grace Church, New Bedford, Nov. 18. And Neighborhood Conferences were held in Southborough and Marlborough.

Two new branches of the Auxiliary have been organized during the past year—one in St. Luke's, Hudson, and the other in St. John's, Taunton—making the total number of branches 132.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

THE report of your Educational Secretary last year closed with an attempt to lay before you the importance and opportunity of this department of our work, and a lament over the small amount actually accomplished therein up to that time. This year's report might well be a repetition of the same, accentuated by the great sounding-board of the General Convention just past:—great opportunity, small achievement, new determination. As has been evidenced in our meetings and study classes, and yet more in the conferences at Cincinnati, the Auxiliary is awaking to a new comprehension of its mission; not only to help with the work undertaken by the Board, but to act as a missionary educational force in the home church. The obstacles in the way of advance have shifted their grouud somewhat of late years, and one of the largest of them has come to be recognized as the ignorance of Christians concerning the problems of advancing Christianity.

Perhaps nothing has made more for rapid progress than the frank recognition of this fact, for it has brought the men of the churches to their feet to clear it out of the way, and their direct and logical methods are already beginning to take effect. We hear of the triumphant advance of the Laymen's Missionary Movement, and rejoice; but don't let us make the mistake of thinking that they will relieve us of our share in the great educational campaign which must be waged in the modern warfare of Missions. It would be a false and unpardonable modesty that would bid us in the Auxiliary to step aside now that the work we have endeavored to do is shared by stronger hands. They need us,—our leisure, our loyalty, our faithfulness, our enthusiasm,—never more than now when the Church is calling for intelligent and united action; and it is not only the consecration of our hearts and hands that they want, but of our brains and our tongues.

There is a spirit abroad in the Church just now that demands definite answers to big questions, and there is no part of our work for Missions that will count for more in the near future than our preparedness to give such answers and be able to base them on unquestionable facts. The conscientious Christian who "does not believe in foreign missions" is, thank God, rapidly becoming extinct, but in his place there stands the inquiring Christian who desires to know why he should share in this cause, and it is our business to see to it that we are able to take our part in convincing him.

What have we been doing here in Massachusetts during this past year to fit ourselves for this? Much has undoubtedly been done in the various parishes in the way of meetings and addresses and occasional readings and reports, but of the definite and regular study of the course recommended to our attention by the Board of Missions,

your Educational Secretary has only been able to find evidence in eighteen out of the one hundred and thirty-two branches of the Auxiliary in this Diocese, and in fourteen out of the seventy-three in the Junior Department. The usual Normal classes were held at the Diocesan House; two for the Auxiliary, and two for Junior leaders. They were faithfully attended, and resulted in a number of the aforesaid parish classes, but their influence reached but a very short way compared to the size of the Auxiliary.

In making this statement I recognize that I am throwing out a boomerang which must of necessity return upon my own head, for it is evident that in the endeavor to persuade you to feel with me the importance and advantage of systematic and united study, I have been so far largely unsuccessful. I have deliberately made this a report of the things we have not done rather than of what we have, because I want to turn your attention to the future rather than the past. The chief value of a report lies in the incentive it gives for renewed effort, and in order to make our work under this Educational department more practical and wide reaching during the year that is before us, I would, in closing, submit for your consideration the following resolution:—

Whereas the lack of definite missionary information in the Church is now recognized to be one of the chief hindrances in the way of progress, and

Whereas the Board of Missions, in consideration of this, has recommended certain courses for careful study, and

Whereas the Secretary of Department One, in compliance with the recommendation of the Board, has selected one of these courses for the united study of the Church in this Department during the coming season, therefore be it

Resolved, that in every parish branch of the Auxiliary in Massachusetts, an earnest attempt be made before June, 1911, to study the problem, and progress of the Church's work among the Colored People of these United States.



REPORT OF THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

1909-1910.

THE Junior Department began the year's work with the loss of its Secretary. Miss Dexter, who had been on the Junior Committee for four years, resigned to enter the Training School for Nurses at the Children's Hospital. While deeply regretting her resignation, the Committee and leaders were glad to give one of their workers for such a vocation. It was some time before the new Secretary was found, but in May the Auxiliary and Junior Department welcomed Miss Lieber Percy on the Committee. Miss Percy has been a parish Junior leader for a year, and has now had several months in the diocesan work.

The fact that seven more branches are inactive until leaders for them are found, proves again the need in each parish for some Auxiliary member who is set apart to organize and direct the Juniors. Three new branches have been started, and of these two were the direct results of efforts made by parish Auxiliary officers. In both cases the officers coöperated with the Rector in finding a leader. If other Auxiliary members would assume a similar responsibility, there would without doubt be Junior branches in parishes where at present there are not. The children or older girls are often only waiting for some one who will bring them together and train them to take an active and intelligent part in the Church's Mission. It has been satisfactory to see during the year three inactive branches resume work, so that the total number is now 73, only one less than last year. There are several parishes where the Junior branch has been suspended for some time, but possible leaders are now considering reorganization.

The Juniors have once more met the apportionment suggested to them, and the Committee has asked to have the Juniors' share in the Auxiliary apportionment raised from \$400 to \$600 for the year 1910-11. In accordance with a recommendation from Miss Emery and Miss Lindley, the Massachusetts Juniors were asked to give for General Missions instead of designating any united Junior gift. As the Treasurer's Report shows, the branches responded heartily to the new plan. The pledge for a scholarship at St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, Japan, counts under the apportionment, and is continued for the coming year. The committee is glad to think that each year the gifts are more and more the results of intelligent interest on the part of the Juniors. Where the money is not raised by fairs or social entertainments, but is earned or saved by the girls themselves, it is more truly their own missionary offering. If there is to come a "generation of cheerful givers," the utmost care is necessary in planning *how* the Juniors give.

A few more branches during the year have undertaken mission study. The Educational Secretary is able to report a number of parishes where classes were held on "Winners of the World," the book suggested for united study. These few parishes constitute only

a small proportion of the total number of branches, but they do not represent all the missionary education of the Juniors. Many leaders who cannot come in to Boston for the normal mission study class, and have hesitated to undertake a regular class on the recommended course, still are able to make their educational work thorough and systematic. By using the "Spirit of Missions," telling missionary stories, or reading aloud a missionary book, they are giving definite instruction. Several branches have undertaken with great success instructive Bible tableaux, a Missionary Pageant, and missionary plays like the "Little Pilgrims and the Book Beloved." There is a need for other plays of such educational value. In a few parishes older girls have been organized in regular mission study classes, and have used the book recommended for members of the Auxiliary, "Sunrise in the Sunrise Kingdom," the text-book on Japan. There are so many girls of this age, too old for the children's work, and not ready yet for Auxiliary meetings, that leaders here and in other dioceses are feeling the necessity of some united effort, if Juniors are to pass on naturally from the Department branches into the Auxiliary. This question of intermediate branches for older Juniors was discussed at conferences in Cincinnati during the General Convention. It is from among these older girls that volunteers for the mission fields would naturally come. So far as is known, no Massachusetts Junior branch can yet say that any one of its members has gone out to a mission field, but in August, Miss Edith Ray of St. Paul's Parish, Malden, was appointed as secretary to Bishop Roots, and sailed in September for China. She was a member of a young woman's Guild in the parish. Although that Guild is not affiliated with the Department, still Junior leaders may realize from Miss Ray's decision to offer for missionary service that there may well be in other parishes of the diocese older girls who would be fitted for some of the positions now waiting to be filled in missionary districts.

The monthly Conferences of Junior leaders have been held regularly except in June, July and August. They have been planned for the discussion of questions connected with the management of a parish branch, and have included such subjects as Work, Giving, Organization, Prayer, Interrelations with Sunday School work and with Candidate classes of the Girls' Friendly Society, Membership, and Summer's Work. At the Conference on Coöperation with other organizations in the Church, Miss Wells of the Candidates' Department in the Girls' Friendly Society, outlined a plan by which Juniors could also be candidates in parishes where the same girls would naturally be in both organizations. In a few cases, the combination is being tried, and several other branches are now considering the plan. As during the past two years, the Conferences are held on the third Wednesday morning of each month, in St Paul's Parish Rooms, Boston, and at the close of each conference there is a short service of intercessory prayer.

The leaders of the Southeastern district arranged to have a meeting for the Juniors of Fall River, and a few other neighboring parishes, in November, 1909. On the same day when the Juniors of that District

came together, the leaders met for a short conference. It was planned to have the girls united as closely as possible with the Juniors who met in Boston the following week, on Saturday, December 4th, in St. Stephen's Church for the Advent Service. The Juniors in Fall River sang the same hymns, and sent their offering with that of the others for General Missions. It was the first year that the plan of an Advent Service instead of a spring meeting had been tried. The girls marched into church, during the singing of the Processional hymn, and carried banners to indicate their different parishes. The Rev. Hugh L. Burleson questioned them on the missionary catechism, and then talked about work among the Indians to whom the Juniors send ten boxes every year. It was found so satisfactory to have all the girls come together for a service in the autumn and then to hold the business meeting in the spring for the officers only, that the plan will be continued this year. On Saturday afternoon, April 23d, the officers of each branch met in Trinity Parish Rooms, Boston, to read reports for the year, present the gifts of money, and exhibit the educational work done during the winter. The girls themselves read the reports and brought up the money from their branches in small bags which were handed to the Diocesan Treasurer. Of the note-books and charts exhibited, a committee selected the best to go out to Cincinnati for the Junior Exhibit at the General Convention.

A new plan has been adopted for meeting the pledge of articles to be sent out to the Indians at Cheyenne Agency, South Dakota. Instead of each branch sending a large box every three or four years, each is asked for a few articles every year. These are to be exhibited at the time of the Autumn Service, and then sent at once to South Dakota. By this plan, a branch may be able to undertake also a box for some other field each year, and the smaller branches are not debarred from a share in the large Indian box.

A Christmas card has been prepared for sale under the auspices of the Department. The leaders may buy these cards for four cents apiece, and the Juniors are to sell them for five cents apiece. The profit thus made will be added to the Juniors' missionary offering. The card illustrates the Nativity, and has on it the words "Thy Kingdom Come," "Peace, Good Will Towards Men."

Much more might be said of the year's work, and no report can express the significance of the Junior Department as a training school for the Church at large, for the Auxiliary, and for the mission field. There has been only a beginning of what may be accomplished. Leaders and Committee close the year's report with a determination to make the training more thorough, and the service more faithful. Only One is able to give power by which His children may carry on the mission He has entrusted to them, and in thankfulness for what has been done during the past year, we would try to say humbly, "Now unto Him that is able to do exceeding abundantly, above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us unto Him be glory in the church by Christ Jesus, throughout all ages."
