

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, etc.,," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each division of the work undertaken by said church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be necessary to form a quorum.

THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

DEAR FELLOW-WORKERS:

God's command to Moses is ringing in our ears to-day, "Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward."

Have we in our appointed work gone forward? Are we more faithful in prayer, is our knowledge broader, our membership growing? Are more lives and larger gifts offered for the advance of the Kingdom?

With these questions in mind, let us go over the reports of your Committees and of the other officers of your Executive Board.

Domestic Missions. "The Domestic Committee has much to be grateful for. For the first time in many years we have had the satisfaction of sending special gifts for Hospital and Educational work.

The legacy of Miss Caroline F. Neal enabled us to give \$300.00 for the Bishop Randall Hospital, Wyoming; \$100.00 for St. Margaret's Hospital, Boisé City, Idaho; \$75.00 for work among Mountain Whites; \$50.00 for work in Eastern Oregon.

Towards our pledges we contributed just under \$1300.00. In this was included \$25.00 in memory of Mrs. Joseph W. Woods.

The Diocesan Missionary's work has been constant and faithful.

From Miss Neal's bequest was further given \$500.00 for St. Andrew's Parish House, New Bedford, and \$24.84 to St. Luke's Church, Fall River."

Indian Mission. "The Dakota League records with gratitude the good work on Boxes done by the Parishes.

While the pledges with but one exception were met in full, it was by the help of individual members who kindly made up the deficit that confronted us last spring.

There was a generous response to a "Special" appeal from Bishop Johnson for St. Mary's School, destroyed by fire. A goodly sum was sent for immediate needs, and later \$1350.00 towards the new school building. This more than balances any deficit in pledges.

We pray that light may spring out of the darkness that is now shadowing the Niobrara Indians on account of Bishop Johnson's resignation."

Colored People's Mission. "The work for Colored People has been almost entirely upon lines laid down for us in New York, so carrying out the Auxiliary idea of being "workers together." Almost our entire activity in the early part of the year was directed to the preparation of the Christmas boxes which were sent to the missions of South Virginia. These boxes stand for the expression of our interest in the work being done, and so accomplish much more than the simple provision of a certain number of gifts. The miscellaneous boxes go later in the year, and of these we never fully meet the demand. In addition to the pledges made to the Board to help meet its appropriation, we have had the privilege of raising three "specials,"—the salary of Miss Wheeler, who is still at work at St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C.; the partial support of a teacher at St. Paul's, Lawrenceville, Va.; and a contribution towards the maintenance of an Industrial School at Tryon, N. C."

Foreign Missions. "The Foreign Committee has joined the ranks of the Forward Movement, for in the spring our treasury showed a credit of almost \$300.00 after all pledges and salaries had been paid. Never before have we met our pledges so early in the season as this year. Doubtless the interest in the Women's Jubilee and the World in Boston has inspired many to work and to give to Foreign Missions, and we have felt the impetus in our department of the Auxiliary. We hope this enthusiasm will continue to grow, for our help and our money will be needed more than ever to meet the increasing demands which come from China, Japan and Africa, for more schools, more hospitals and chapels, and more Christian helpers."

Latin-American Missions. "The Committee for Latin-America is glad to report an increase in the amount given to the pledges. Fifty-eight Parishes contributed this year, the largest number that have ever given to these missions.

The special gifts are larger than ever before. A beautiful memorial of the Chapel and furnishings has been given to the new hospital, "The House of Hope," Nopala, Mexico. This gift is inscribed, "Chapel of the Holy Faith, Nopala. In memory of Sarah Burnham Whittemore, a beloved mother." Another member of the Auxiliary has contributed generously for a nurse's salary.

Three scholarships have been given:—the scholarship "Thanksgiving" for the Hooker School, Mexico; a scholarship to Bishop Kin-solving's new school in Brazil; and a scholarship for a grand-daughter of the late Bishop Holly at St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va."

Altar Society. "More orders were filled than ever before, and the Society had in consequence a good surplus to devote to the needs of the mission field."

C. P. C. "The work of the Church Periodical Club varies little from year to year, but it is possible to put the emphasis on different parts of it and thus stimulate growth. This year, without neglecting the sending of regular magazines, of which about 1618 have been going out, more stress has been

laid on libraries, both travelling and stationary. Three or four have been placed with very satisfactory results, and others are being prepared.

\$724.05 were collected in subscriptions and donations, which shows a gain of \$118.35 over last year, and as these figures only represent what is sent to the Diocesan Correspondent in cash the real total must be considerably larger. Nearly 3,300 books have been distributed, and it is impossible to realize what this means to countless persons who come into direct or indirect contact with them."

The Hospitality Committee through their kindly work add to the enjoyment of the social side of our gatherings, and we are ever grateful to them.

The United Offering. The gifts thus far show a gain over the corresponding period three years ago. The gain is not large, and there are still many who have never heard of this Thank-offering for the women of the Church.

The diocesan apportionment and that of our Auxiliary, both of Juniors and of Women, have exceeded the amounts called for by the Board of Missions. An increased apportionment is asked this year from the whole Church. Can we look on this as a sign of God's approval, for he that was faithful in little was made ruler over ten cities?

The Vice-President of the Middle District reports one new parish branch at St. George's, Maynard; one was formed at St. Ann's, Revere, and from the Vice-President of the South Eastern District comes word of increased interest and activity. The new Vice-President of the North Eastern District, elected last May, is ready to take up her work. These three officers are eager to become acquainted with the whole of their respective districts and to be helpful in any way that the parishes may desire.

This wish to be helpful is shared by all your diocesan officers, and they were glad of the opportunities given them in the past year to visit many of the parishes. These visits, including District Conference and Neighborhood Meetings, have brought out good-fellowship and closer co-operation.

Help from outside the diocese has come to us from our speakers at the Anniversary and at the monthly meetings, from him who, on the Quiet Day, led our thoughts into heavenly places, from the Jubilee, the World in Boston, the Conference of the First Missionary Department.

The Jubilee showed to Churchwomen the large and effective work which, in a deep spirit of prayer, women of other Christian bodies are carrying on. More important still was the absence of rivalry, the establishment of sympathetic relations, the cementing of true friendship, the bringing nearer the time when the great cause of "Christ for the World" will unite all Christians into one body in Him.

The "World in Boston" put these lessons into visible and concrete form, educating heart and mind, and giving a solid foundation for future work.

The Department Conference aimed to bring all these lessons home to the visiting women of the Auxiliary and to fit them in all points for more efficient service.

The report of our own Educational work will be found on page 12. From the account there given it would seem that we are not all alive to the advantages of systematic study, or to the excellence of the courses that are offered.

Miss Grace Hutchins has been elected to the new office of Vice-Chairman of the Junior Department. Her duty is to prepare the older girls to enter the ranks of the Woman's Auxiliary. Our duty is to be ready to receive them both into our hearts and into our work; so shall we be at unity in our own household.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

THE Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has held during the past year, nine Committee meetings in the Diocesan House and eight Monthly meetings in St. Paul's Parish Rooms, Boston, the March meeting being omitted on account of the Woman's Jubilee for Foreign Missions.

The average attendance at the eight meetings was 52 parishes represented by 111 delegates. 19 Parishes were represented at every meeting, namely,—Emmanuel Church, Boston; Emmanuel, W. Roxbury; St. James' and St. John's, Roxbury; St. John's, E. Boston; St. Paul's, St. Stephen's and Trinity, Boston; St. Paul's, Brookline; Christ Church, St. James', St. John's and St. Peter's, Cambridge; Calvary, Danvers; St. Paul's, Dedham; Grace Church, Newton; St. Mary's, Newton Lower Falls; St. Paul's, Newton Highlands; and St. Chrysostom's, Wollaston. Trinity Church, Boston, sent the largest number of delegates for the year, 47.

There were 13 speakers at these meetings: Miss Woods, Alaska; Rt. Rev. R. L. Paddock, E. Oregon; Rt. Rev. L. L. Kinsolving, Brazil; Mrs. Wilkes, No. Carolina; Rt. Rev. F. F. Johnson, So. Dakota; Deaconess Phelps, Wuchang; Archdeacon Babcock, Boston; Rev. W. E. Gardner, Boston; Rt. Rev. A. S. Lloyd, D.D., President of the Board of Missions; Mrs. S. V. R. Thayer, Boston; Miss Ward, C.P.C.; Miss Corey, Brookline; and Miss Rose, Wyoming. In January, the meeting adjourned to the Church in order that more people could hear Bishop Lloyd and Mr. Gardner.

In place of the usual meeting on March 15, a service was held in St. Paul's Church, Boston, beginning with a Celebration of the Holy Communion at 9.30 A.M., Rev. E. S. Rousmaniere, D.D., being the Celebrant and assisted by the Rev. Hugh Burleson, Rev. W. E. Gardner, Rev. F. J. Walton, and the Rev. R. M. Harper. The following clergy were in the Chancel and took up the offertory: Rev. L. K. Storrs, D.D., Rev. John Matteson, Rev. Edward Tillotson, Rev. C. P. Mills, and the Rev. H. E. Kelly. The offertory was for St Margaret's School, Tokyo. Addresses were made by the Rev. Dr. Rousmaniere, Mrs. Montgomery, Mr. Burleson, Deaconess Phelps and Miss Lindley.

The Thirty-third Anniversary and Annual meeting was held in Trinity Church, Boston, November third. In the absence of the Bishop of the Diocese, Bishop McKim of Tokyo celebrated the Holy Communion at 10 A.M., and the Rev. E. S. Rousmaniere, D.D., gave an address. A meeting was then held in the Parish Hall, Archdeacon Babcock opening it with prayer. 89 parishes were represented by 264 delegates. The Annual reports were accepted, and officers elected for

the coming year. Addresses were made by Miss Loring, Miss Sturgis and Miss McIntosh. After the luncheon, which was served to the clergy and delegates by the Hospitality Committee, in the Hotel Vendome, a Missionary meeting was held in Trinity Church, the speakers being Rt. Rev. John McKim of Tokyo, Rt. Rev. Benjamin Brewster, W. Colorado, and the Rev. William Watson of Mexico.

The Quiet Day was held in Emmanuel Chapel, January 12, 1911, the services being conducted by the Rt. Rev. Robert Codman, D.D.

In the place of the Conference for Parochial Officers, an "After the Jubilee" meeting was held in Trinity Parish Hall, March 23. 48 parishes were represented by 117 delegates. The speakers were, Miss Stanwood, Secretary of the Congregational Board; Miss Butler, Secretary of the Methodist Board, Mrs. Wilkins, Secretary of the Universalist Board, and Miss Eva D. Corey of the Episcopal Church.

A District Conference was held in Grace Church, Salem, and one in Grace Church, New Bedford. Neighborhood meetings were held in Auburndale, Natick, and Concord. The Diocesan officers made 158 visits, 8 of these being outside this Diocese. 76 parishes and institutions were visited, of which number 16 had not been visited for two years.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

“RESOLVED, that in every Parish branch of the Auxiliary in Massachusetts an earnest attempt be made before June, 1911, to study the Problems and Progress of the Church’s work among the Colored People of these United States.”

The above Resolution closed the report of your Educational Secretary one year ago, and although in the nature of the case it could be no more than a suggestion, and in the human nature of the Auxiliary it was acted upon by comparatively few branches, it is satisfactory to be able to report that at least some headway was gained towards the goal of united study which has been set for us by the Board of Missions and our Department Secretary. Two normal classes were held, as usual, for leaders of Auxiliary classes, and those who attended carried back with them to their parishes new interest in the fate of our colored neighbors, and a new appreciation of our responsibility towards them. Three classes were held for leaders in the Junior Department; two on the Junior Supplement to the Upward Path; and one for leaders of older Juniors on a biographical course, the Servants of the King. This last, and one of the Junior classes, were conducted by the Chairman of the Junior Committee. Beyond this definite work on which it is easy to report, a large amount of conscientious reading and discussion of the prescribed course was carried on, concerning which it has been difficult to obtain data. The subject in itself was not one which tempted study, and those who took it up did so with commendable loyalty to the Board, and incidentally were well repaid for their efforts. This augurs well for the future, and when we are inclined to mourn over the small gain made in united study during the past year, we would do well to remember that unusual demands were being made upon the time and interest of our women through the service that was asked of them, and was for the most part freely given, for the Jubilee meetings and the World in Boston.

Concerning the latter, it seems appropriate for the educational report to speak, for much of the work given was in the nature of study classes for stewards. Here again it has been difficult to obtain an accurate report, but it is safe to say that at least twenty training classes were conducted by women of the Woman’s Auxiliary, and more than twice that number gave generous and faithful service on Committees.

All this is encouraging, for it shows a readiness on the part of the Auxiliary to give of its time and of its brains when once the need for

this sort of missionary offering is apparent. We are standing to-day at the turning of the ways, and it is becoming daily more clear to those who look carefully at the signs of the times, that not the least important of the roads opening out before us, is the common way of accurate knowledge which leads straight under the walls of prejudice. We have done well this past year, but as the October issue of the Church Militant puts it, "the reward of doing a good thing is that we are promptly asked to do a better thing." We have come one step nearer to the realization that our duty to our neighbor in Alaska or China involves not only that we shall become familiar with his needs, but shall make those needs known to our neighbor in Boston or Salem or New Bedford, wherever we happen to have our opportunity to prove to the Lord our God that we love Him not only with all our hearts and souls, but also "with all our minds."

REPORT OF THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

1910—1911.

THE year 1910-1911 in the Junior Department has been marked by various changes in the work, and by the great Missionary Exposition, the "World in Boston," in which most of the Juniors were interested. But the general work of the branches and the regular monthly conferences have been continued as before. The year's routine began with an impetus from the General Convention. Junior classes and conferences were held in Cincinnati during Convention, and the Massachusetts Department was represented by the chairman, secretary, and educational secretary.

Last year's report gave the total number of branches as 73. But several parishes from which the Committee had received no report were counted as having Junior branches. Since a report should count only those branches which are known to be actively at work and meeting regularly, the total number should now stand as 59. Five new branches were organized, but nine were suspended for lack of leaders. One branch which has been reorganized, and is also a candidates' class of the Girls' Friendly Society, proves that, when necessary, such a union is possible. It is inevitable that several branches each year should be left without leaders, who perhaps move away from the parish, or find it impossible to continue the work. To secure the right successor is usually a difficult matter in any parish. There is often a need for some one outside the parish to come in and lead the Juniors at least for a time. This year a number of Rectors have asked for such visiting leaders, and a plan for providing them has been outlined by the Committee. A training class on "How to lead a Junior Branch" is now being organized for a few young women who will then visit parishes needing leaders.

The apportionment for the Juniors was raised by the Committee's request this year from \$400 to \$600. The amount given is nearly twice this increased apportionment, and the pledge for St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, which counts under the apportionment has been fulfilled. It is encouraging that Juniors in every diocese are giving more and more toward General Missions. This year a new plan was tried in Massachusetts: the treasurer and the committee apportioned the branches by suggesting to each what might well be its share in the whole diocesan apportionment. It was generally felt that such a definite suggestion was an advantage and helped the members of the branch to give according to their ability. Now, however, since the whole system of apportionment from the Board of Missions has been changed, the Junior Department is no longer asked to give any particular amount. It is uncertain as yet just how this new arrangement will affect the Juniors' gifts of money, but each branch will probably give toward the whole parish apportionment. Thus a diocesan Junior treasurer may tell a branch now much it gave last year, but the amount given this year will be reported through each parish treasurer. It is more than ever

necessary now when the whole parish is trying to give a larger sum than ever before, that each Junior leader and Sunday school teacher should guard against the raising of money without regard to the way in which it is given.

One of the best things in the year's work was the interest taken in the plan for uniform study. Three normal classes for Junior leaders were held during the winter. Two of these were for leaders of younger Juniors on the Negro text-book, the Junior supplement to the "Upward Path." From these two normal classes resulted fourteen parish classes of Juniors studying the Negro book. Other branches also studied the subject in a less definite way, and many had good teaching as children stewards for the "World in Boston." One normal class for leaders of older Juniors was on the subject of the "Servants of the King." Three parish classes were held on this text-book. Two parish classes of young women on "Sunrise in the Sunrise Kingdom" were held in connection with the Exposition. Although only a small proportion of the branches conducted a regular and systematic study of the Negro course, yet the work of those few was more thorough than in the previous year. The best examination papers from each branch were judged by a committee who awarded \$5.00 to the branch doing the best study. This reward was offered by the President of the Woman's Auxiliary, and was given to the Juniors of St. Mary's, Newton Lower Falls. The branch designated it for a missionary object which they themselves chose. A more complete account of the year's mission study is given in the report of the educational secretary.

Almost without exception each branch visited the "World in Boston," and studied particularly the exhibit of missionary work in Africa, and among the Negroes of the South. It was an opportunity which would hardly come again during a lifetime. Many Juniors had a share in the scenes, and worked as children stewards, besides visiting the different exhibits.

The Exposition interested a number of young women who had never before been in mission study classes. As stewards they had the training of at least one class, and then served as guides, explaining the exhibits and the missionary work being done in the country represented. Thus the "World in Boston" has been a preparation for the autumn campaign to form branches of these girls. The Woman's Auxiliary has created a new office of the Standing Committee,—Vice-Chairman of the Junior Committee, and this new officer will have charge of the younger women and the older Juniors. Twelve girls have been appointed as a committee to help at the Service for all the younger Juniors in November. They are to act as marshals, and then help to pack the articles sent in from all the Junior branches for the Indian Christmas box.

The new plan for meeting the pledge of articles to be sent out to the Indians at Cheyenne Agency, South Dakota, was tried for the first time. Each branch sent a few articles instead of sending a large box every three or four years. The articles were all exhibited at the time of the autumn service; and then sent to South Dakota. In this way each branch has a share every year in the large Indian box, and if it is able to undertake anything more, may also send a small box to some other field. When the Juniors are sending a box to some station, it is a good opportunity for them to gain as definite a knowledge as possible of the work being carried on in that district.

The conferences of Leaders were held as usual each month, except that the one usually held in May was omitted on account of the "World in Boston." The aim of these conferences is to bring the leaders to-

gether in order that they may know each other, and exchange ideas about the best methods of work. But the aim will never be attained until every leader co-operates and brings in suggestions that may be helpful to others. The conferences which were most successful were for the discussion of questions on certain subjects. The questions had been given out to each leader at the preceding conference and considered during the month. The place of meeting for these conferences is St. Paul's Parish Rooms, Tremont Street, Boston, and the time is the third Wednesday morning of each month.

The Autumn Service for all the Juniors was held in Trinity Church, on Saturday afternoon, October 29th. About 400 formed in procession and walked from the Parish House into the church, singing a hymn. Each branch carried a banner with the name of the parish on it, and when all were in the pews the nave of the big church looked well filled. Bishop Roots, of Hankow, China, made the address. He told the Juniors about the Prisoner of Wuchang, and urged them all to pray unitedly during the year that he might be kept strong in his faith.

As in the previous year, the spring meeting was for the Junior officers and leaders, but not for all the members. It was held on Saturday afternoon, May 8th, in Trinity Parish Rooms, Boston. Four children officers or delegates from each parish came for this business meeting. Twelve branches answered the examination questions on the Negro course. The reward was given to the branch doing the best study, and the roll of honor was read. Each Secretary brought up a report from the branch, and each treasurer presented the gifts of money offered by the members.

Leaders who have tried to help the Juniors in forming the habit of definite intercession for missionary work, have long felt the need of some guide which could be given out to the members of their branches. Such a guide has been provided this year in the Junior Prayer League card, published quarterly by the Massachusetts Department. The simple intercessions there suggested follow the same general plan as the quarterly leaflet of the Church Prayer League, but are written especially for the Juniors. Many leaders have already taken these cards, and with some explanation have given them out to the members. A committee is now in charge of this Junior Prayer League, and the cards may be obtained from the Secretary, 1 Joy Street.

A Constitution for the Massachusetts Junior Department was adopted by the leaders at the March and April conferences. It has been found of use in stating briefly and definitely the purpose, basis of membership and organization of the department. Copies of this Constitution may be obtained from the Junior Secretary, 1 Joy St., Boston.

Several changes have been made on the Junior committee. In April, Miss Hutchins resigned, as she expected to sail during the summer for work in China. Miss Percy was appointed chairman and accepted. Miss Mary Chester Buchan, of St. Mary's Church, Newton Lower Falls, was appointed secretary in Miss Percy's place, and accepted. She has been a Junior leader for two years, and has now begun her work as diocesan secretary. Miss Hutchins, whose departure for China has been postponed, has been appointed for the new office of vice-chairman, and will serve temporarily to take charge of the older Juniors.

A separate officer set apart for work among older girls, will be able to lead many of them in time into the Woman's Auxiliary. The gap between 16-year old Juniors and the parish Auxiliary members must be bridged by giving the girls work of their own to do, at least for a few years. Then as each girl seeks to know what part she is to take in the Church's Mission, many will be led into the Auxiliary, and others

will go out to places where the laborers are so few. There is much that the members of the Woman's Auxiliary can do to welcome the Juniors who will begin to come into the parish meetings, and who must have activity and responsibility. A place may be prepared for them. As soon as there are many young women upon whom the officers can count, it will be found not only that the training of the younger Juniors has been bettered, but also that the missionary work of the Church as a whole has been strengthened. It is for their sakes, no less than for the work itself, that Auxiliary members and Junior leaders alike must make a united effort to use the older girls.

It may be said once more that no written report can adequately record the work of the year. Forward steps have certainly been taken along several lines. As the organization becomes more perfect, the Department may be a better instrument in the Master's Hands for the extension of His Kingdom. Through conferences, meetings and classes the spirit of devotion to Him, and of love for all His people, may more and more truly find expressiou. And the possibilities of prayerful work are limitless.
