

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, etc.," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such delegates from any church shall not exceed three for each division of the work undertaken by said church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be necessary to form a quorum.

THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

DEAR FELLOW-WORKERS :

You will read the following reports of your Committees with especial interest, as throughout the year fears have been expressed lest the days of the Auxiliary's usefulness were numbered.

**Domestic
Committee.** Liberal gifts have been made for hospitals, schools and orphanages throughout our land. While the mountain work has been emphasized, other important calls have been generously met by individual members of the Auxiliary.

There is no single one of our twenty-three Domestic Missionary jurisdictions which does not need help for such orphanages, schools and hospitals as are endorsed by the Board of Missions, and for the salary of missionaries. Many women are supported by the United Offering, but until this is greatly increased many needed in the field must be cared for by special gifts.

We have lost from among us our faithful Diocesan Missionary. Mrs. Worden passed away in the summer, after a brief illness. For eight years she served with efficiency, and will be greatly missed.

Miss Marion Furness, trained at "St. Faith's" training school for Deaconesses in New York, has taken up her work.

We are sure that those who understand the value of her services to the Diocese will continue their gifts for her support, and that *all of us* will hold up her hands by our sympathy and prayers.

**Dakota
League.** In giving up the pledges it is most gratifying to report the same amounts sent through the Dakota League for "specials" as in the past, the income of the "Lucy Lee Chickering Fund" for this year helping in such result.

As a "Forward Movement" three scholarships were given by individuals for the school at Fort Hall, Idaho,—one to continue through-out "Sunshine's" education.

Bishops Thomas and Funsten, Mr. Hoare and Miss Woods of Alaska made personal appeals for their Indian work, and received encouraging response from Auxiliary women. In July, \$100.00 was sent through our Treasurer, in answer to a pressing appeal in the *Churchman* for the Seminole Mission of Southern Florida.

The choice for Bishop of South Dakota of Dean Biller, associated with Bishop Hare at All Saints' Cathedral, ensures a continuance of his ideals in the administration of Indian Missions in that district. On the day of his consecration a gift of \$125.00 was sent him in token of our good-will and confidence.

Colored People Committee. This Committee reports a satisfactory year. A large number of parishes continued the money help given in the past, so that all pledges were met, and in one instance the amount promised was considerably increased.

Miss Wheeler has given another year of faithful work at St. Augustine's School, Raleigh; and the Industrial School at Tryon, North Carolina, justifies our continued interest by doing better work each year.

We responded with great pleasure to the appeal made in behalf of St. Athanasius' School, Brunswick, Georgia, now in charge of Augustine Perry, son of an old friend, Rev. J. W. Perry of North Carolina. In all our work we have been greatly helped by Miss Neal's legacy.

The making up of missionary boxes continues an important feature of our work, the larger number being sent at Christmas time. Each year, by careful planning and more definite suggestions, we try to do this work more intelligently, making the boxes of greater value not only to those who receive them, but to the senders as well.

Foreign Committee. With the new plan of apportionment, it is hard to tell what interest has been aroused during the past year in Foreign Missions and what financial gain has been made. Where thirty parishes were visited by the Chairman of the Foreign Committee last year, only seventeen have asked for a visit this winter. Articles for a Liberian box valued at \$91.82 have been sent, and Christmas cards and books to a native clergyman also in Liberia for the Sunday School in his charge. We feel sure that when people have adjusted themselves to the new plan, interest and zeal for Foreign Missions will increase. One has only to hear the Missionaries from China tell of the wonderful advance there of Christianity to be filled with enthusiasm and to realize that now, at the beginning of the new Republic of China, the time is ripe for further development.

Latin-American Committee. All the pledges for this Committee were assumed by the Board of Missions under the present apportionment; therefore, we have been assisting the mission work in other parts of the field this last year.

In Mexico we have given \$220.00 to the House of Hope Hospital in the mountains of the state of Hidalgo and \$827.00 towards the purchase of land for the new St. Andrew's School at Guadalajara. This school is the seminary for the training of the native ministry. A part of this sum was Miss Neal's legacy, given last year.

In Cuba, we have sent \$155.00 for furnishings for the Cathedral School at Havana, \$10.00 towards the memorial for the Rev. Thomas Burry of the Isle of Pines, and Christmas presents for the missions under the care of the Rev. and Mrs. Mancebo of Santiago.

In Haiti, we have given Rev. E. G. Benedict \$16.00 for his work and paid part of a scholarship at St. Paul's School, Virginia, for Lydia Holly, granddaughter of the late Bishop T. T. Holly.

Brazil has received very little from us, but we hope to do something for their educational work this coming year.

Altar Society. For the first time, the Society's Rooms were open during the summer and the orders were constant. This entailed larger expenses, and the surplus for missions did not greatly increase. But the assurance that the Society is needed gives great confidence for the future.

Church Periodical Club. For the Church Periodical Club the past year has been one of quiet growth and development. The Massachusetts branch now numbers seventy-one enrolled parishes, although only about sixty reported work done last year. In addition to a large number of magazines constantly being sent out, several libraries of from seventy-five to one hundred and fifty books have been placed in neighborhoods where they fill a very real need, and it is encouraging to note that the Bishops and Missionaries are applying with more and more confidence for such help as the Church Periodical Club can give. In order to encourage this confidence the Club must enlarge its circle of contributors and meet its appeals with greater generosity and wisdom, and for this it trusts to the kindly interest of its many friends and well-wishers.

Hospitality Committee. The Hospitality Committee with charming readiness not only provided for the luncheon at our extra Conference, but also added greatly to everyone's pleasure by inviting the wives of our clergy to the luncheon at our annual gathering in November.

United Offering. The gifts continue to show a gain over the corresponding period three years ago. The double duty of prayer and giving must be still more faithfully performed if we hope to fulfill Miss Emery's ideal of a United Offering worker sent out yearly from each diocese, and the ideal of our Treasurer that the sum of \$20,000.00 should be Massachusetts' portion of the gift in 1913. "Let us not pray for tasks as small as we are, but for the faith that removes mountains."

The report of the Educational Secretary will be found on page 12, and that of the Junior Chairman on page 21.

Among the courses at the Conference of Church Workers in Cambridge last summer, the one of particular interest to us was given by Miss J. C. Emery on Woman's Work for Missions, as illustrated by the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. It imparted valuable information as to the history, the use and the possible development of the Auxiliary.

From the foregoing reports certain changes in the work are evident, and from a financial point of view we appear to have suffered. When, however, we consider that our diocesan apportionment, which was increased some 90% over that of the previous year, was met and exceeded by \$400.00, it would seem that the members of the Auxiliary, as parishioners, had been loyal in their gifts of money, as well as of time and work.

It was the wish of the Bishop and of the Board of Missions that

the apportionment should be met by the parish as a whole. A conference of the Auxiliary was called in October, to see how the Auxiliary could be most helpful, both to the parish and to the Board of Missions. A circular letter was sent out embodying the conclusions of this conference. The chief recommendations were for deeper consecration by means of prayer, and study, and systematic giving, on the part of the Auxiliary, in order that they might have worthy help to offer the parish. In several cases joint missionary committees were appointed by the rector and the every member canvass instituted. The success of this plan was in proportion to the thoroughness of the trial made.

The Vice-Presidents in their districts presented the same ideals to those who could not attend the Boston meetings. They did much more in holding study classes, organizing new branches, introducing better system. In consequence, five new branches are reported in the Middle District, four in the South-eastern District, two in the North-eastern District, and three in the Metropolitan District.

The officers of the Board have made one hundred and ninety-five visits to one hundred and seven parishes and institutions in the diocese, and five outside. Some of these visits were made at the invitation of the Girls' Friendly Society, and we rejoice in the growing fellowship with that society.

The Missionary Week at All Saints', Dorchester, the Neighborhood Conferences among the Newton parishes and at the joining of the Women of the Auxiliary with the Juniors in the Institute held in February at Emmanuel Church, Boston, the taking up of the work among older girls by Miss Hutchins and later by Mrs. John A. Tuckerman, the Department Conference held by Mr. Gardner,—all these are indications of the longing for unity, the desire to work together with one heart and one mind.

That the Auxiliary is considered a part of the working force of the Diocese was shown by the invitation given your Board, as your representatives, to take part in the diocesan service at St. Paul's Cathedral on October 7th. In his address on that day, the Bishop emphasized the need for one-ness and the force of it. The Cathedral organization is for the Diocese an embodiment of this ideal. And so our thoughts are led back to the source of unity, the omnipotent Father; and we are comforted in our imperfection, and we are reassured as our hearts follow our beloved Junior Chairman, Grace Hutchins, who joyfully and in perfect faith is ready to take her part in the immense problems in China.

As we look back over the year, and as we look forward to another, let us consider the words of a successful missionary in China: "We are sowers, not reapers; there is no defeat as long as we do not shirk from doing our duty."

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

DURING the past year the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has held nine committee meetings in the Diocesan House, and nine monthly meetings in the Parish Rooms of St. Paul's Church, Boston, the October meeting being an all-day conference to discuss the new apportionment and how the Auxiliary could help to meet it. The average attendance at these meetings was 59 parishes, represented by 123 delegates, a decided gain over last year.

Twenty-three parishes were represented at every meeting, namely: — Christ Church, Andover; Church of the Advent, Boston; All Saints', Dorchester; Emmanuel, Boston; Emmanuel, W. Roxbury; St. James', Roxbury; St. John's, E. Boston; St. Mark's and St. Mary's, Dorchester; St. Paul's, St. Stephen's and Trinity, Boston; All Saints', Church of Our Saviour and St. Paul's, Brookline; Christ Church, St. James', St. John's, and St. Peter's, Cambridge; St. Paul's, Dedham; St. Paul's, Malden; Grace, Newton; St. Mary's, Newton Lower Falls; and St. Chrysostom's, Wollaston.

Fourteen parishes organized a Branch of the Auxiliary or a Missionary Society to work with the Massachusetts Branch: — St. Mary's, Barnstable; Church of the Ascension, East Cambridge; St. Mark's, Fall River; St. Barnabas', Falmouth; St. Mark's, Foxborough; St. John's, Franklin; St. John's, Haverhill; St. Andrew's, Hyannisport; St. Ann's, Lowell; Advent, Medfield; St. Paul's, Millis; Emmanuel and St. James', Somerville; Epiphany, Walpole.

There were 14 speakers at the monthly meetings: Rev. G. A. McGuire, Field Secretary of the American Church Institute for Negroes: Rt. Rev. J. B. Funsten, D.D., Idaho; Miss Ward, C. P. C.; Deaconess Goodwin; Miss Ethel Paine, Boston; Rev. G. P. Mayo, Va.; Rev. Dudley Tyng, Wuchang; Rt. Rev. T. P. Thurston, D.D., Eastern Oklahoma; Miss Wood, Wuchang; Miss Sill, G. F. S.; Mrs. John Tuckerman, for the Older Juniors; Mrs. Benedict, Vice-President of the South-Eastern District; Mrs. Soule, Vice-President of the Middle District, and Miss E. D. Corey, Vice-President of the North-Eastern District.

The Thirty-fourth Anniversary and Annual Meeting was held in Trinity Church, Boston, November 2, 1911; the speakers were Miss Sibley, from the Philippines, in the morning, and the Rt. Rev. N. S. Thomas, D.D., of Wyoming, and the Rev. H. St. G. Tucker, D.D., of Tokyo, in the afternoon. Luncheon was served at the Hotel Vendome by the Hospitality Committee.

The parishes in the North-Eastern District held a Conference in North Andover on Nov. 9, and one was also held in Grace Church, New Bedford, for the South-Eastern District, on November 23.

The Quiet Day was held in Emmanuel Chapel, January 11, 1912; the services being conducted by the Rev. Harvey Officer, O.H.C.

The Fourteenth Conference for the Parochial Officers took place in St. Paul's Parish Rooms, March 13; the subjects were the "Every Member Canvass" and the "Duplex Envelope."

The Diocesan Officers made 195 visits, 5 of these being outside the Diocese. 107 parishes and institutions were visited.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

THE Educational Department of the Massachusetts Auxiliary can present a report for the year that is past which not only ought to give us courage for the future, but should spur us on to accept the opportunities that are opening up to us. Mission study, thanks to the energy of the General Educational Secretary at headquarters, to the encouragement of the Department Secretaries, and to the efforts of Diocesan officers, has begun to take its rightful place as a natural and necessary part of Auxiliary work, and Massachusetts has felt the impetus of the general demand for accurate knowledge and tactful testimony.

The action of the Diocesan and Auxiliary Boards in regard to the Apportionment, left us, a year ago, facing the realization that to the Woman's Auxiliary belonged, in a peculiar degree, the duty of setting before all the women of our Church the reasons for their sympathetic support of that active part of Her life back of which the Board of Missions stands. To consider how we might best rise to our responsibility in this matter, a representative group of Auxiliary officers and members met for eight weeks in the autumn with the Educational Secretary, and as the result of careful study, both of the text-books recommended by the Board, and of conditions in the various Auxiliary districts of the Diocese, adopted as their policy for the year, the following purposes:—

First.—To secure the study of "The Conquest of the Continent" in every branch of the Auxiliary in Massachusetts before Easter, 1912.

Second.—To secure the study of "The Decisive Hour" among uninterested or partially interested people, wherever the opportunity can be found by the help of Auxiliary leaders.

To carry out these purposes, these same women arranged for and conducted fifteen normal classes for leaders in the following centres. Six in Boston, three of which were in connection with the St. Paul's Institute, one each in Andover, Brookline, Cambridge, Fall River, Franklin, Natick, Newton Highlands, Salem, and Taunton. One hundred and thirty-one people registered in these classes, and from them there were returned, shortly after Easter, report cards of sixty-nine parish classes, twenty-five of which were under the Junior Department, one interdenominational class, and twelve reading-circles. The average membership in these classes was twelve to fifteen, which means that something over a thousand women were engaged during Lent in studying, more or less actively, the problems confronted by the Board of Missions and by those who represent them in active service.

In itself, this means something, although we came far short at arriving at the accomplishment of our stated aims. In addition to this, there are certain encouraging features of the year's work which may mean far more for the future than any number of statistics:— First,

there is the spirit in which the Auxiliary entered into this task. Ninety per cent. of the classes were for the study of the special course recommended by the Board for united study, — “The Conquest of the Continent,” and “Conquerors” for the Juniors. The report cards showed that the purpose of most of these classes was to arouse greater interest in the cause of Missions in our own land through accurate knowledge of the history and problems of the workers. This was well, so far as it went, but from some of the leaders came evidence of purposes which went still further, and which can best be stated in the words of one of them: — “Our aim is to awaken such an interest in Missions that the influence of this class will be expressed in the parish and throughout the world, in increased activity for the setting forward of the Kingdom of Christ.”

The natural working out of such a purpose in this particular class, and in others, was that not only was the Woman’s Auxiliary represented in the group which came together to study, but practically all the varied interests and societies in the parish, from the Sunday School to the Woman’s Guild. The prize class in this respect was at Grace Church, Lawrence, where eight parish societies were represented in the class membership, and the leader herself was an Associate both of the Girl’s Friendly Society and the Guild of St. Barnabas. This is the second cause for encouragement, for it means that through this educational side of our work we are destined to be Auxiliary to the Board of Missions far beyond our own borders. If our work is to meet its opportunities, it would seem that increasingly it will be our privilege to gain the co-operation of those who, while they are chiefly occupied with a different form of missionary service from our own, are none the less very close to us in their loyalty to the cause for which the Board of Missions stands.

In this same connection, the central class played its part, for it numbered among its members the Diocesan Missions Associate of the Girls Friendly Society, who afterwards conducted classes for missionary leaders in that Society, and spoke in many a parish where the Auxiliary profited no less than the G. F. S. from her practical enthusiasm. During Lent, the President of the Girls Friendly Society in Massachusetts led the Auxiliary study class in her own parish, and the Auxiliary Educational Secretary led a class of nurses which was organized for her by the Diocesan president of the Guild of St. Barnabas at the Massachusetts General Hospital.

These things in themselves seem of small account, but if we recognize the signs of the times and see the unity of purpose and effort which is slowly but surely drawing together all those who are striving to turn this world into the Kingdom of Christ, we must rejoice that He has given to us the privilege of serving as a rallying point where people of all sorts of interests may gather to study and to hasten the advance of the King’s forces at the outposts. As we go on to further service, may we take heart from the encouragement of the past, and prepare with quickened zeal to meet the greater opportunities that are so surely coming our way.

REPORT OF THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

1911—1912.

DURING the year 1911 and '12 we have been trying to carry out the work of the Junior Department along the lines Miss Hutchins instituted.

We began our leaders' conferences with an address on consecration by Dr. Fosbroke, followed by a corporate communion. We continued to hold our monthly leaders' conferences in St. Paul's Parish rooms, Tremont Street, Boston, on the 3d Wednesday of the month, at 10.45. Work, giving, study, organization, ideals, for our juniors, and proportionate giving, were the subjects discussed—each one being introduced by a short talk, followed by open discussion. These conferences were usually well attended, but we hope for better attendance this year, which will result in a larger usefulness from the more varied experience of a great number of leaders.

There were 54 active branches last year, fourteen of which were new branches. Three branches were suspended for the year, and two branches changed to what is known as a combination branch, and one new combination branch organized. By a combination we mean a combination of the G. F. S. candidates and Junior Auxiliary. Rules for such a combination have been worked out by the G. F. S. officers and the Junior Diocesan officers. It is only in special cases that such a combination is possible, and as yet we feel that it is only in its experimental stage.

The fall meeting for the Juniors of the diocese was held in the Church of the Advent on Nov. 11. About 300 children were present, marching in, as usual, behind their parish banner. The address was given by Father Mayo on the Work among the Mountain Whites.

There were three normal classes during the winter—one on Miss Lindley's "Junior Book," one on the "Conquerors of the Continent," the mission study book for the Juniors, and the third a story-telling class for older girls. These girls later volunteered as helpers in Junior branches, and were of great assistance to branch leaders. Besides these classes, which were held during the winter, a four-days' Institute was held in Emmanuel Parish rooms, Boston, with the Woman's Auxiliary, from Feb. 14-17. Again there were classes on the "Junior Book," "Conquerors of the Continent," and story-telling, for those previously unable to attend the winter classes, and also a Bible class. At this Institute there were excellent educational missionary charts, which attracted much attention. The Institute closed with a corporate communion for the older girls and an address to them by Miss Grace Lindley.

The committee were pleased with the report of twenty-eight branches who took some form of mission study last year. We hope for a like report from at least twice that many next year, with also a greater uniformity in the subject studies. The Board of Missions gets out a text-book each year for the Juniors, with a book of "Helps for the Leader," which give the needed help to those unable to attend normal classes. It is only as we work and study along uniform lines that the branches will gain a sense of diocesan unity, which will make for stronger and more effective work.

This diocesan unity and loyalty we are urging in another way—through a diocesan pledge for Christmas presents to over 800 Indian children in the Cheyenne Agency, S. D. Each branch is asked to contribute toward this, and must do their share if we are to fulfil our pledge. The articles sent last year were well exhibited, as usual, at the annual meeting. We hope, however, that the work for this central box does not preclude the possibility of each branch sending another small box to some other field with which the children can get into personal touch with a missionary, gaining definite first-hand knowledge of that work.

The spring meeting for Junior officers, delegates, and leaders was held on Saturday afternoon, May 4, in Trinity Parish rooms, Boston. There were over 100 at this meeting. Twelve branches read papers on assigned questions on the "Conquerors of the Continent." Mrs. Lowell presented a banner to the Junior Department from the Woman's Auxiliary, which was to be awarded every year at this meeting to the branch having the highest average in attendance, work, and study during the year. This year it was presented to the branch doing the best study—namely, St. Andrew's, Wellesley. The branch holding the banner marches with it at the annual fall meeting.

Several changes have been made on the Junior Committee. Miss Hutchins resigned as vice-chairman in charge of the older girls, to take up her work in St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China. Mrs. John A. Tuckerman was appointed in her place, and accepted. Miss Brayton resigned as S. E. Secretary. Miss Marion Humphreys has accepted the appointment as N. E. Secretary.

With the plans for an older girls' Bible class, a normal class in manual work, and district normal classes on the Junior text-book, we have great hopes for the future of the work that has been committed to our charge.
