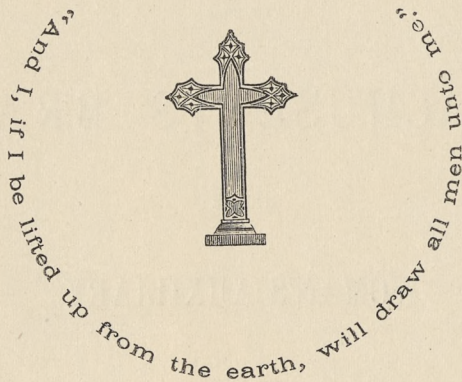

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be a Public Anniversary of the Society in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or a sermon; upon which occasion a collection shall be taken up in behalf of the Society.

II. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society upon the third Wednesday in October, unless otherwise duly notified, at such time and place as the Officers and Standing Committee shall indicate.

III. The election of Officers and of the Standing Committee shall take place at the Annual Meeting, and they shall continue in office one year, or until their successors shall have been appointed.

IV. In case of the vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled by nomination of the Standing Committee, which nomination shall be approved by the Society at a Stated Meeting; and any person so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting.

V. Ladies coöperating with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, will be considered members of the Society.

VI. Ladies appointed by the ministers, or by the benevolent organizations of Churches working with "The Woman's Auxiliary, etc.," as delegates, shall be enrolled accordingly, and shall be the members entitled to vote at its meetings; Provided, that the number of such delegates from any Church shall not exceed three for each division of the work undertaken by said Church or any of its working Societies. The Officers and Standing Committee shall also be entitled to vote at its meetings.

VII. The Stated Meetings of the Society shall be on the third Wednesday of each month.

VIII. At Stated or Special meetings of the Society, twenty members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum; but at the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one-third of the Churches connected with the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, or else not less than forty members entitled to vote, shall be necessary to form a quorum.

THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT.

DEAR FELLOW-WORKERS :

Your officers again lay before you the report of some part of the work accomplished through your gifts and your prayers.

Our treasurer has received from thirty-four parishes and from friends \$3501.00, nearly all of which was designated. This is a gain of \$350.00 over the amount passing through her hands last year. The money *reported* from New York is less, thus decreasing the total.

The \$40.00 given in memory of Elizabeth Jackson of Christ Church, Boston, supplied a Communion Service for use in mining camps and scattered communities in Alaska. \$800.00 went to Schools and Missions among mountain people; \$300.00 for Mission Hospitals, and the balance was divided among the Missionary Bishops.

Boxes have taken help to many anxious people. Will not those parishes who have not contributed, take courage and help us in the future? Twenty-nine parishes gave \$570.00 towards the salary of our Diocesan Missionary who is doing excellent work.

We would gratefully record the gift of \$25.00 in loving memory of Elizabeth Jackson. Also gifts in response to special appeals, amounting to over \$600.00. But we were unable to send the full amounts formerly *pledged* and now more than ever needed for the different Indian Districts, and the assignments of work were not fully taken. The number of parishes giving and working for Indians has gradually diminished, while the number of individual givers has somewhat increased. This diocese was the first to organize for Indian work — “having put our hand to the plough, let us not look back.”

We have had the loyal help of a large number of parishes in the recognition of responsibility for pledges made of money and boxes, and we have been able to provide all the boxes that Miss Emery asked of us.

With an advance in methods, there has been a corresponding increase of interest.

Miss Wheeler has continued to be our representative in the field, carrying on at St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C., the good work that she has been doing there for many years. We realize the great impor-

tance of the Schools and have helped to send teachers to St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., the Industrial School at Tryon, N. C., and the schools at Birmingham, Alabama, and Brunswick, Ga. A scholarship has been provided at St. Augustine's School for the daughter of one of our faithful workers, and she is making good.

**Foreign
Committee.**

As many of the parishes were studying Japan during the winter, your Chairman was not invited to speak to Auxiliaries as often as in the past. Of seventeen parishes visited, ten chose Liberia as the subject and many contributed towards a box for the girls under Mrs. Moort at the Julia C. Emery Hall, Clay Ashland.

Among the special gifts for the year was one of \$1,000.00, to be added to the fund for a Trade School in Liberia, the sum of \$300.00 towards the expenses of a Japanese instructor who is taking advanced courses at one of our Universities, and an X-Ray outfit, valued at \$732.88 for the use of Dr. McWillie in Wuchang, China.

**Latin American
Committee.**

It is gratifying to report that the number of parishes contributing this year to the Latin-American Missions is nearly double that of last. Personal appeals from Bishop Aves, of Mexico, and from the Rev. C. E. Snavelly, of Cuba, met with generous response and brought the total amount up to \$1530.00.

The gifts this year include Hospital and Educational work in Mexico; Educational work in Brazil; Evangelistic and School work in Cuba, and a small sum given to the Rev. C. E. Benedict, of Haiti, to be used at his discretion. Some undesignated money was sent to the work whose support is pledged by the Board of Missions. A private Communion Set was given to the Rev. W. H. Decker, of the Isle of Pines, and a boy from that Island is having a year's schooling given him in Massachusetts, by two members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

**Altar
Society.**

With devotion and effectiveness, this Society has helped many struggling missions to make beautiful and dignified the service of the House of God. This year a higher standard of workmanship was reached than ever before.

**Church
Periodical Club.**

This Society publishes its own report, but the relation between it and the Auxiliary is so close, that our report would be incomplete were not mention made of the far-reaching spiritual and intellectual help which this Society gives through the wise distribution of books, magazines and libraries. Your interest and contributions are needed to carry on this work.

**Hospitality
Committee.**

Every year increases our debt to the generous-hearted women who exercise a hospitality from which the clergy, and our representatives far and near, derive pleasure and benefit.

**United
Offering.**

The Presentation Service for the "United Offering of 1913" was most inspiring! Would that all who had shared in the gift could have been present! On October 9th, in the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, in New York city, the Offering was made, a united gift of \$307,000.00, and together with it more than 3,000 women, representing the womanhood of the Church, offered themselves anew, "their souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy and living sacrifice" unto their Lord. What a channel of inspiration they should be, even to the remotest parish!

Our part of the gift of money was \$18,670.00, a gain of some \$4,000.00 over the offering of 1910. To the faithful parish treasurers this measure of success is largely due. Let us not rest until every woman, in every parish, has the opportunity set before her to take part in the offering of 1916.

The report of the Educational Secretary will be found on page 11. That of the Junior Chairman on page 19, it includes the account of encouraging progress made among the "Older Girls," by the Junior Vice-Chairman, Mrs. John A. Tuckerman.

The Quiet Day in the Epiphany season, the Conferences — in Neighborhood, District and Department — and the General Monthly meetings gave food for growth in consecration, in knowledge and in efficiency.

The special advance in the Middle District was the fostering of Junior work in one of the most active parishes. Mrs. Soule carried out her valuable plan of furnishing to all parish branches, during six months of the working year, type-written notes of the General Meetings in Boston. The South Eastern District reports a growth in zeal and understanding. Many United Offering boxes were distributed and three United Offering treasurers were appointed by Mrs. Benedict, and best of all, an Educational Secretary for the District was secured, Mrs. Henry H. Eddy of Fall River. The North Eastern District, led by its Vice-President, Miss Corey, is laying much stress on method and education in order that it may do the best work.

We are thankful to note that our Diocese has not only been able to meet in full our apportionment, but to exceed the amount by \$3,613.00, thus making up in part the lack of others less fortunate.

At the request of Miss Emery, a paper was prepared and read at one of the monthly meetings held for Diocesan Officers at the Church Missions House in New York. The subject was: "The ideal Auxiliary as outlined by the Massachusetts Diocesan Committee." The paper met with official approval, and with commendation from a number of Diocesan Branches. It formed the basis of our Annual Conference for parish officers.

In May the newly appointed Secretary of the First Department, Rev. G. W. Davenport, called together, to the number of thirty, representatives of the Woman's Auxiliary and its Junior Department, of the Girls

Friendly Society and of the diocesan Sunday School Associations. Valuable suggestions were made and were embodied in a circular which was sent by the Secretary to the Societies represented and to the clergy of the Department.

At this time, our minds are full of impressions from the General Convention, of the great deeds for Christ reported there, of the still greater opportunities with which He has crowned the work done in faith. We would heed the words of Bishop Lloyd in his address to the Convention: with eloquence and persuasiveness he pleaded that the Church should ascertain and realize her immense resources of brains, character and wealth, that she should, following the best business methods, apply these resources to meeting the needs of the new-comers to our shores, of our youth in the centres of education, of our rural population in stranded communities, of hungry souls in all Missionary Districts. Her present methods are out of date, she should frame "a plan that would substitute for an army of individuals asking for help, the Church, the body of Christ, laying before His servants the opportunity for their devotion."

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

NINE meetings of the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary have been held in the Cathedral Rooms, Boston, on the third Wednesday of each month from September 18, 1912, to May 21, 1913. And nine meetings of the Executive Committee were held in the Diocesan House.

The average attendance at the monthly meetings was 123 delegates from 56 parishes.

Seventeen parishes were represented at all these meetings, namely:— Church of the Advent, Boston; All Saints, Dorchester; Emmanuel, Boston; Emmanuel, W. Roxbury; St. John's, E. Boston; St. Mark's, Dorchester; St. Paul's, St. Stephen's and Trinity, Boston; Church of Our Saviour and St. Paul's, Brookline; Christ Church and St. John's, Cambridge; St. Paul's, Malden; Grace, Newton; St. Mary's, Lower Falls; and Emmanuel, Wakefield. Emmanuel Church and St. Stephen's, Boston, sent the largest number of delegates to these meetings, at which there were thirteen speakers: Mrs. Bugbee, Secretary of Los Angeles Branch; Rt. Rev. N. S. Thomas, D.D., Wyoming; Rev. J. F. Von Herrlich, N. Y.; Rt. Rev. F. F. Reese, D.D., Georgia; Rt. Rev. George Biller, Jr., South Dakota; Miss Ward, C. P. C.; Rev. W. S. Claiborne, Tenn.; Miss Wood, Wuchang; Miss Grace Lindley, Associate Secretary, New York; Rev. C. E. Snively, Cuba; Rev. A. R. Gray, Educational Secretary, New York; Miss Sill, G. F. S., Boston; Miss Bridges, a visitor in the Philippine Islands.

The Thirty-fifth Anniversary and Annual Meeting was held in Trinity Church, Boston, on Wednesday, November 6, 1912. The Bishop of the Diocese celebrated the Holy Communion at 10 A.M. In the Parish Hall at 11 A.M. there were 319 delegates from 107 parishes. The speakers in the Hall were Miss Richmond of Shanghai and Mrs. Wetmore of Arden, North Carolina. In the Church at 3 P.M. addresses were made by the Rt. Rev. A. S. Lloyd, D.D., President of the Board of Missions, and the Rt. Rev. H. D. Aves, D.D., of Mexico.

The Annual Quiet Day was held in the Chapel of Emmanuel Church, Boston, on Thursday, January 9, 1913, the services being conducted by the Rev. Hugh Burleson.

The Sixteenth Conference for the Parochial Officers was held in the Cathedral Rooms on March 28, 1913. 67 parishes were represented by 112 Officers.

A Conference for the North-Eastern District was held in St. Ann's, Lowell, on October 31, 1912; a Conference was also held on November 21, 1912, in St. Thomas' Church, Taunton, for the South-Eastern District.

Two new branches have been organized during the past year—in St. John's Church, Charlestown, and in Christ Church, South Hamilton.

The Diocesan Officers made 161 visits, 9 of these being outside the Diocese. 85 parishes and missions were visited.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

1913.

Once again, as we face the opportunities and duties of a new year, the Educational Department of the Massachusetts Auxiliary would present a report of gradual progress and an appeal for redoubled effort.

In the conviction that no greater Auxiliary service could be rendered to the Board of Missions than the earnest attempt to carry out a carefully prepared plan whereby the Auxiliary might reach every woman in the diocese with vital information concerning the Church's Mission, a group of representative officers and members met with the Educational Secretary in the autumn of 1912, and made a study of diocesan possibilities in the way of missionary study and the use of the text book "Japan Advancing, Whither," which the Board had recommended for the year. The results of this study were the recognition of three main facts, the adoption of a policy of action, and a conscientious effort to carry it out. The facts recognized were:—

First,—The enormous need for increased missionary support and activity in Japan in order to take advantage of immediate openings.

Second,—The necessity for a wide-spread understanding of the situation on the part of the Church at home in order that, not only in Japan, but through Her entire sphere of influence, Her pioneers might be enabled to meet the superb opportunities presented to them.

Third,—The difficulty of creating this necessary understanding, at a time when missionaries ought not to be called from their work for the sake of an educational campaign at home, and trained educational leaders are far too few for the task.

The policy, covering these points in the reverse order, was as follows:

It shall be the purpose of this educational department,

First,—To call forth leaders for the extension of the Kingdom of God, and prepare them for effective, sustained, and consecrated service.

Second,—To secure the study of the text book in every parish in Massachusetts where there is a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary or its Junior Department; and to arrange, if possible, several classes in each parish for the realization of the following united aim.

Third,—To pave the way for the Advance of Japan into the World-Wide Empire of Christ.

The attempt to carry out this policy, included in the first place, the holding of a conference for Mission study leaders at the Cathedral Rooms in December. The successes and disappointments of the pre-

vious year were frankly shared, in order that all might gain experience from them, and the following questions were pretty generally discussed :

- I. What is the practical use of Mission study —
 - A. To the members of the class ?
 - B. To the parish ?
 - C. To the Board of Missions and to workers in the Field ?
- II. What sort of people should attend Auxiliary Study classes, and how can we secure them ?

In brief, the conclusions of this conference were that Missionary study, if it is entered into in the right spirit and seriously pursued by the representatives of many departments of parish life, should be the means, not only of increasing the spiritual understanding and effectiveness of the parish, but of setting free for action certain forces which cannot rest until the power of the Living Christ within them is felt far and wide.

The second step in our attempt to carry out the policy was the organization and conduct by the members of the Central class, of fifteen normal classes for the training of leaders, four of which came under the Junior Department. Eight of these were held in Boston, three of them being in connection with the Cathedral Institute, and one a Junior class. Of the rest, three — one Junior — were in the North-Eastern District, three in the Middle District, and one in the South-Eastern District. Resulting from these there were held, for the most part in Lent, eighty-four parish classes, of which twenty-seven were Junior, one was a Sunday School class, and one a missionary Bible class at the Massachusetts General Hospital, under the management of the the Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses.

Most of these classes (80) studied Japan, three were Bible classes, and one was on Lucas's "Empire of Christ."

In addition to these there were twelve Reading Circles, one Junior ; — eleven on Japan, and one on The Conquest of the Continent.

All of this means that we are gradually advancing towards the time when every branch of the Auxiliary shall count it a natural and necessary part of its work to set aside some time each year for serious study of the problems which the Board of Missions sets before us for solution. Perhaps your Educational Secretary's chief cause for hopefulness as to the future lies in the increasing regret of the apologies which come from branches where, for one reason or another, it has seemed impossible to hold a class. It is not so very far back to the time when young and trembling Educational Secretaries felt almost apologetic over the presumption of asking the Auxiliary to study. Thank God, that time is gone, and that we who stand in the midst of the greatest missionary era the world has ever seen, have at least begun to recognize our accountability to give of the best that is in us, — heart, mind and hand, — for the building of the great highway over which our Lord will come into His Kingdom.

Is it worth while, all this education of the Auxiliary, through classes and lectures and exhibits and missionary magazines? For ourselves, no — except in so far as we become the richer for what we give ; but for the cause we pretend to represent and for the glory of

the Leader of that cause, yes — a thousand times! When we hear again and again, as we have through the General Convention just passed, the cry of the Church's warriors to a Church that seems half asleep, we know that God is offering to us the privilege and putting upon us the responsibility first to heed and hear and then to give voice to their message until the Church which we love shall awake and meet Her opportunities.

During this coming year we shall study the "The Emergency in China." Let us do our part to meet it by a resolute effort to overcome that which the Bishop of Shanghai referred to as "The Emergency in the United States" — namely the Church's indifference in the face of a great call. Let us see to it that our parish classes are not the fruitless things which someone has accused them of being, mere "meetings for intellectual entertainment" — but that every one of them shall prove itself to be a power house for the furtherance of the Church's Mission. Let us gain the co-operation of women by whose help we may spread the knowledge of both "Emergencies" far beyond the borders of the present Auxiliary. Let us make it abundantly evident to our Juniors that we are interested in their work and see to it that in 1914 not one Junior branch shall fail to report some definite study. And finally, let us pray that in all this part of our work, the Holy Spirit may direct the eyes and ears of our minds until "we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard."

REPORT OF THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

1912-1913.

The Junior department has been carrying on its work with much the same methods as in previous years. The monthly conferences were held as usual on the 3d Wednesday of the month, at 10.45, in the Cathedral Rooms. These began in September with a corporate Communion and address by the Rev. Mr. Lauderburn, of St. Stephen's, Boston. The subjects discussed during the winter were as follows: Aims; Organization; the Leaders' relation to the Juniors; the relation of the Branch to the Board, the Field, the Diocese and the Parish; The Spirit of Giving, Manual Work, Study; Prayer; the Raising of Money and Summer Work.

Four central normal classes were held for the leaders. One on the Junior book, one most helpful one on manual work and two on Japan. One of these on "The Honorable Little Miss Love," for leaders of younger Juniors, the other on "Japan Advancing, Whither," for leaders of older girls. These resulted in twenty-eight branches studying Japan, but we want more next year.

There were the usual two diocesan meetings for the Juniors: the annual Fall service for all the Juniors and the Spring meeting for officers.

The Fall meeting was held on November 9th, at Trinity Church, Boston. There was a large attendance and the Rev. Mr. Malcolm Taylor gave the children a most inspiring talk.

The officers' meeting was held in St. Paul's Cathedral Rooms, on May fourth. At this meeting reports were handed in and selected children read portions of their examination papers on Japan which were very good. At this meeting Mrs. Lowell presented the banner to the branch at St. Paul's, Newton Highlands, for the best examinations, it having done exceptionally good work in other ways also.

As will doubtless be recalled, this banner is carried by the branch winning it, at the head of the procession at the annual meeting.

There are in the Diocese fifty-four branches with a total enrollment of 1105 children. Though the number of branches has not increased as we would like, we feel that the work that has been done has greatly improved. We see this from the reports of the work of the individual branches and in the contributions sent in for the Cheyenne Agency barrels. These donations far surpassed anything ever sent before both in kind and amount. Plays such as "Little Pilgrims and the Book Be-

loved," "Lady Cathecism" and Japanese fetes were reported by several branches as having been most successful, both from the interest of the children and from a financial point of view. May more follow their lead.

The North Eastern District reports a conference of their leaders, a normal class on Japan and a successful combined meeting of their Juniors. There is a great need of a South-Eastern secretary to do like things in that District for leaders and children unable to get in to the central meetings.

In closing, I have to report several changes in the committee. Miss Percy has resigned as chairman and her place has been taken by Miss Buchan. Miss Rosamund Bigelow has been appointed secretary in Miss Buchan's place.

The new committee stands ready to help in any possible way, either by private talks with the individual leader or by visiting branches.

Having great confidence in the ability and consecration of the new officers, we have great hopes for the future of the work committed to them.

REPORT OF THE OLDER GIRLS.

THE work of the Older Girls has been carried on as far as possible on the lines laid out by Miss Grace Hutchins, the first Vice-Chairman of the Junior Department, and Leader of Older Girls in Massachusetts.

There are twenty Branches doing active work with members ranging from the ages of fifteen to twenty-five. In many of these there were Study Classes, and the regular work of the Auxiliary was done.

A special box was sent to St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, Japan, to which St. Anne's, Lowell, Trinity, Melrose, and All Saints, Brookline, sent articles needed for the Hospital.

There was a Bible Class in Boston held at the residence of Miss Mason, led by Dr. Fosbroke, from the first Thursday in December till Lent, on the Old Testament, which was found most interesting and helpful. During the course there were ninety members, with an average attendance of about fifty-five. At the last meeting Miss Alice Lindley spoke, urging the Class to do some active work. At this meeting twenty-five new members joined the Class, chiefly the débutantes of the winter.

A Foreign Committee was formed, with Mrs. Archibald Blanchard as chairman, and twenty-five members. Plans are being made by this committee to send a nurse to the Foreign Field, and they have promised a box to Mr. Snively.

Two Study Classes were held during Lent, with thirty members—one on the Gospel of St. Matthew, by Miss Lucy Sturgis, and one on "Japan Advancing—Whither?", by Miss Corey. Both were extremely helpful, and showed an increased interest in missions.

It is hoped to have many new Branches in the parishes, and the Vice-Chairman urges the leaders to invite her to visit their meetings, and to help her in bringing them in closer contact with the Auxiliary.

The Thursday morning Bible Class will continue as last winter under Dr. Fosbroke, with Miss Grace Lindley at the first meeting to tell of the work done by the Convention, and it is hoped that with more members some active work will be accomplished at home and in the foreign field.
