THE FORTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE
PRESIDENT OF THE MASSACHUSETTS BRANCH
OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

YEAR — SEPTEMBER, 1919, TO JANUARY 1, 1921

DEAR FRIENDS AND FELLOW-WORKERS:

For the first time in our history, we are holding our annual meeting in January instead of November, in order that we may conform to the canons of the Church. The principal way in which the change affects us is that for this year the reports all cover a sixteen months' period of time, making comparisons with former years difficult.

Fortunately, however, no stimulus of this kind is necessary to arouse our loyalty and interest in the missionary work of the Church. In fact, it is not so much the record of work accomplished, as the table in the annual report will show, that impels me to make my report to you one of thanksgiving first and last, but rather the spirit which has marked the work of the women of the Diocese all through these past sixteen months. The devotion to the Master, and the desire to serve Him through His Church, the good-will, the patience, the effort to coöperate in new plans, and, last but not least, the lack of disgruntled criticism, in a time of change and rapid evolution, have all added tremendously to the strength of our work; and with real thanksgiving for the faith and the loyalty of our church women, we take courage and face the new year with high hopes.

During the past sixteen months, three members of the Board have resigned, — Mrs. Stall, Vice-President of the South Eastern District; Mrs. Lee, Vice-Chairman of the Domestic Committee, and Miss Freeman, Chairman of the Foreign Committee. All of these officers have served faithfully in the various departments to which they belonged, and it is with deep regret and appreciation of their devotion to the work that the Board announces these resignations.

Three new members have been welcomed by the Board, — Mrs. Albert Sylvester as Vice-President of the South Eastern District, Mrs. Nicholas P. T. Burke as Foreign Chairman, and Miss Alice Perkins as Assistant Secretary.

In opening this report, I spoke of the splendid spirit displayed throughout the Diocese the past year, and one of the best means of judging this is through the Diocesan and Parish

meetings. Beginning with our anniversary meeting at Trinity Church in November, and following through the district meetings, together with the regular Diocesan monthly meetings, all have had very large and representative attendance, and been marked by enthusiastic interest in the Mission of the Church. The same thing is true of parish meetings, where the speakers have observed a decided increase in the numbers attending and in the interest shown in missions. Not many years ago, an overcrowded missionary meeting was an exception, and to-day we have to warn the verger at the Cathedral to put every available seat into commission, and the remaining standing room scarcely accommodates those who fill this hall.

A Quiet Day was held in January, 1920, at the Church of the Advent, Boston, led by Dean Fosbrook. I wish to emphasize this particularly, because, in these busy times, of what seems to most of us revolution in the church's work, the one thing we must ever keep before us is that, without the constant reënforcement of the spiritual life, all of our efforts toward larger and more efficient service will be as nothing.

In view of what I have already said regarding the general spirit, it is not surprising that the record of the work accomplished is an encouraging one. The actual amount of money passing through our Treasurer's hands, and later on to the new Treasurer of the Diocese, is larger than ever before, and the list of reported money very pleasingly smaller. This indicates progress in methods, and shows that the system of sending money through the recognized channels is becoming well established.

All of our pledges were met, and some interesting extras added, — two through the bequest left the Auxiliary by one of its devoted and faithful members at Trinity Church, Boston, Mrs. Charlotte M. Fiske. Memorials in her name have been given to St. Margaret's School, Idaho, for a domestic science room, and a rectory for Calvary Church, Charleston, S. C., has been made possible, a tablet in memory of Mrs. Fiske having been put in both of these places.

Besides these, a remarkable general Diocesan Box of supplies was sent to St. Luke's Hospital, Porto Rico, and a still more representative box was sent to the foreign field. Twenty-nine parishes contributed articles to the latter, and forty-one money, making the total value \$912.29. The letters of gratitude from the different stations receiving these supplies would indicate that the value was far beyond any figure we could name. These brief items only give a glimpse of the splendid work accomplished by the parishes through our different chairmen.

The United Thank Offering shows a splendid advance, both in the number of parishes and individuals sharing in it,

and also in the offering itself, which is seventy-six per cent ahead of the first year in the last triennial. An interesting point is that there have been no large single contributions to account for this increase. We hope that, with the offerings of money, the spirit of thanksgiving and the offering of prayer have increased one hundredfold.

The department of colored work reports the retirement of Miss Edna Wheeler, after thirty years of service in the South as a representative of the Massachusetts Branch of the Auxiliary, and reminds us that we continue to be responsible for Miss Rowell, her successor at St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C. Miss Wheeler, herself, is now one of the faithful volunteer workers at the Supply Bureau. It is needless to say that her experience as a missionary makes her a peculiarly valuable helper in our new work.

You will be interested to hear that one missionary has gone from All Saints' Church, Brookline, this year, — Charlotte Brown, to work under Bishop Tyler in North Dakota. Also that Florence Knight of St. Andrew's Church, Framingham, is training for the mission field at St. Faith's School, and that Geraldine Cabot of the Church of the Advent, Boston, is finishing a hospital course preparatory to going to the Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China.

I would also remind you of the splendid gift of lives which have gone out from Massachusetts, and which we here too often forget when we count the offerings of service. The support of your interest and prayers is asked for Marian Humphreys and Helen Tetlow, in Japan; Annie Brown, Elise Dexter, Edith Stedman and Marian Ward, in China.

I regret to say that our educational work has been decidedly weak during the past year, owing to the fact that there has been no Educational Secretary. It is, therefore, a great pleasure to announce that, through the Educational Department of the Church Service League, and its new secretary, Miss Roberts, we may hope by another year to revive and increase this important part of our work, but the chief thing the Auxiliary must do now is to find and develop Mission Study leaders.

The greatest changes which have taken place since our last report are the transfer of our Missionary Box work to the Supply Bureau of the Church Service League, and the acceptance of the Diocesan Quota of supplies apportioned from New York, with the adoption of an allotment system of work for the parishes here.

Be it to the credit of the Diocesan chairmen and parish officers that, through their good-will and coöperation, a remarkable amount of work has been done, and the Bureau, under the splendid management of Mrs. Chapin and Miss Little, with a devoted corps of workers, has been well established.

One special bit of work we have in hand for this year is the Jubilee Fund, which I heartily commend to you. The Woman's Auxiliary, throughout the whole church, is trying to raise \$50,000 to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary on October 16, 1921. This fund is to be used for the benefit of missionaries on furlough, who often need the extra help which such a fund can supply. I earnestly hope that the women in every parish in the Diocese will do their part in helping Massachusetts to make a worth-while contribution towards the final goal.

And now, as we look toward the future, let us recognize that the world has been turned upside down, and that this is the moment when every loyal Christian must act on the conviction that only as mankind turns to Christ as the living Lord and Saviour can we hope to build and maintain an enduring civilization. We are living in a period of reconstruction, and the Church, like all other corporate bodies, is trying through its administrative departments to adjust itself to the new tasks of to-day and to-morrow. Why should not every one of our organizations expect, perforce, to readjust themselves in order to do their utmost to help the Church meet the opportunities of this present time?

Already such an attempt is being made in the Church Service League, which is fast developing, through our Parish Units, into a comprehensive organization, where all forces, as integral parts of the whole, are joining hands in order that the entire strength of the Church may be put on the whole work of the Church.

Of course the Auxiliary has problems to solve under the new conditions, but one fact ought to save us from any undue fear, namely, that Missions is one of the great departments of work under the Service League, and, as the largest missionary organization within the Church, the Auxiliary ought to be the most active and helpful contributor to the enlarged plan of service. Let us try to realize that we are not a select body, pledged to guard a fixed deposit, as it were, whose present name and machinery must be saved at all costs, but rather let us realize, as Bishop Lloyd, to whom we owe so much, always expressed it, that the Auxiliary is like a leaven, active through the power of Christ's spirit of mission, working under any conditions, until the spirit has leavened the whole. Because we have believed this, the Massachusetts Branch has been able to help carry the missionary work of the church forward through Parish Guilds, Rectors' Aids, and other local societies. At the present moment, with the development of Departments of Missions under the Parish Councils, I see every reason to believe that our opportunities for service will increase.

Impelled by a vision of the world won to Christ, the Auxiliary has worked and prayed for missions, hoping that some day

every woman in the Church would share in the spreading of His gospel. Now, after nearly fifty years, it looks as if our hopes were to be realized to even a greater extent than we imagined, for through the combined forces of the Church Service League, of which the Auxiliary is a large part, not every woman, but, in the course of time, every man as well, will have the best possible chance to pray and work and give for the extension of Christ's Kingdom.

Already the results under the new reorganization indicate that more than we ever expected can be accomplished when all the members of a parish join in making, and working under, a united plan covering the whole work of the Church.

Therefore to-day I point you to wider service and a larger life than ever before, and bid you to be of good cheer and press forward to the high mark of our calling in Christ Jesus, remembering that it is as true of organizations as of individuals that "whosoever will save his life shall lose it, but whosoever will lose his life for my sake the same shall save it."

SECRETARY'S REPORT
SEPTEMBER, 1919, TO JANUARY, 1921

Twelve monthly meetings of the Massachusetts Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary have been held since the last report. Two of these meetings were held in Trinity Parish Hall, through the kindness of Dr. Mann, during the painting of the Cathedral rooms. The average attendance was 143 delegates from 64 parishes. Twenty-three parishes were present at every meeting, the Church of the Advent, Boston, sending the largest number of delegates for the year.

There were 16 speakers at these meetings, namely, Rev. G. P. Bently, Boston; Archdeacon Baskerville, South Carolina; Miss Humphreys, Japan; Rev. F. A. Saylor, Porto Rico; Right Rev. L. H. Roots, China; Mrs. Hughson, North Carolina; Miss Mary May, Boston; Right Rev. N. S. Thomas, Wyoming; Miss Elise Dexter, China; Miss Wyatt, Porto Rico; Rev. P. T. Goto, Japan; Rev. H. P. Walter, Porto Rico; Mrs. Paul Sterling, Church Periodical Club; Miss Sarah Lawrence, community work of the Church Service League; Mrs. Chapin, Supply Bureau; Archdeacon Russell, Lawrenceville, Va.

In place of the usual meeting on January 21, 1920, a mass meeting for the Church Service League was held in the Cathedral. An address was given by Dean Rousmaniere, on "The Contribution of Women to the Church To-day." The following speakers were then introduced by Bishop Lawrence, and each spoke for five minutes on the proposed work for their department, — Miss Corey, Woman's Auxiliary; Miss Feno, St. Barnabas' Guild for Nurses; Miss Whipple, Girls' Friendly Society; Miss Bush, Altar Society; Miss Lawrence, Community work; Mrs. Sterling, Church Periodical Club; Miss Hewins, Church Home; Mrs. Flint, Association of the Work of Mercy. The Bishop closed the meeting with an address on the "Church Service League and the Nation-wide Campaign."

The March meeting, coming in Mid-Lent was devotional in character, and an address was given by Miss Mary May, on the "Spiritual Side of Missions."

The usual Conference for Parochial Officers was held on the third Wednesday in May.

The forty-second anniversary and annual meeting was held in Trinity Church, Boston, November 5, 1919. The Holy Communion was celebrated at 10 A.M. by the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by Bishop Babcock, Archdeacon Dennen, Dr. Mann, and the Rev. Mr. Moses. At the session in the Parish Hall there were 318 delegates present, from 100 parishes. Bishop Lawrence opened the meeting with prayer and gave a

short address, the minutes of the last annual meeting were read, and the reports given of the Executive Committee, the Secretary, and the General Treasurer. Mrs. Rousmaniere took the chair, and the election of officers followed. At the service in the afternoon, addresses were made by the Right Rev. H. St. G. Tucker and Archdeacon Stuck.

The forty-third anniversary meeting was held in Trinity Church, Boston, November 5, 1920. At 10 A.M. the Bishop of the Diocese made an address and celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by Bishop Babcock, Dr. Pott, Dr. Mann, and Rev. J. S. Moses.

At the meeting in the Parish Hall, addresses were made by Bishop Lawrence, Miss Corey, Miss Denman, the Diocesan Parish Visitor, and Miss Henrietta Gardiner. The minutes of the last anniversary meeting were read, and the reports of the President, Secretary, and Treasurer given. The roll was called, 330 delegates being present from 101 parishes. Luncheon was served in the parish rooms by the Hospitality Committee. At the service in the church, at 2 P.M., the speakers were, the Right Rev. J. C. Morris, Panama Canal Zone, and the Rev. F. L. H. Pott, of St. John's College, Shanghai. Tea was served at the close of this meeting.

The conferences for the districts were held as follows: For the South Eastern District, November 13, 1919, in Christ Church, Swansea; and on October 20, 1920, in St. Thomas' Church, Taunton; for the North Eastern District, November 9, 1920, in St. Paul's Church, North Andover; for the Metropolitan District, in the Cathedral, Boston, January 26, 1920; and for the Middle District, in Trinity Church, Boston, December 2, 1920.

Fourteen meetings of the Standing Committee were held, with an average attendance of 13 officers. Four of these meetings were held at the Hotel Kempton, through the kindness of Mrs. Macomber.

The Rev. H. E. W. Fosbroke, D.D., gave the addresses at the Quiet Day, which was held in the Church of the Advent, Boston, on Thursday, January 8, 1919.

The United Thank Offering Service was held in the Cathedral, Boston, on May 20, 1920, the address being given by the Rev. W. H. Van Allen, D.D. A Conference for the Treasurers was held in the afternoon, and was led by Mrs. Slade.

The Provincial Conference for Diocesan Officers was held in Portland, Me., on September 29, 1920; 12 officers were present from Massachusetts.

Two hundred and twenty-nine visits were made by the Diocesan officers within, and twenty outside, the Diocese.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I. — NAME

The name of this Society shall be the MASSACHUSETTS
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE PRESIDING
BISHOP AND COUNCIL OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH
IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

ARTICLE II. — OBJECT

The object of this Branch shall be to unite the women of the Church in Massachusetts, by means of prayer, study, work, and giving, in order to coöperate more fully with the Presiding Bishop and Council in making known throughout the world the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE III. — MEMBERSHIP

1. Any baptized woman in the Diocese of Massachusetts, who shall agree to share in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, shall be considered a member of the same.
2. Wherever possible, and with the approval of the Rector, members shall be organized into Parish Societies.
3. Any group of women in a Parish may coöperate with the Diocesan Branch.
4. Each Parish Society, so coöoperating, shall present an annual report to the Diocesan Branch.

ARTICLE IV

1. The officers of the Diocesan Branch shall be a President, Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Educational Secretary, Treasurer and United Thank Offering Treasurer, with such assistant officers as may be necessary.
2. There shall be committees in charge of the work for Diocesan Missions, Domestic Missions, Indian Missions (Dakota League), Missions among the Colored People, Foreign Missions, and for Missions in the Latin-American Countries. Each committee shall be under the direction of a Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

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3. The officers, chairmen, and vice-chairmen of committees, and the secretary of the Church School Service League shall constitute the Standing Committee.

4. The President, active Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Educational Secretary, Treasurer and Secretary of the Church School Service League shall constitute an Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V. — ELECTION OF OFFICERS

1. The officers and other members of the Standing Committee shall be nominated by a committee appointed by the President, and shall be elected, by ballot, at the Annual Meeting, for a term of one year.

2. Offices left vacant during the year may be filled by a nominating committee consisting of the President, Secretary, and chairmen of the committees, with the approval of the Standing Committee and the delegates at the next monthly meeting.

ARTICLE VI. — DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. The President shall preside at all meetings and have general oversight over all matters pertaining to the Diocesan Branch.

2. The Vice-Presidents shall each have charge of a District. They shall preside at the Annual Conferences in their Districts and shall be responsible for furthering the missionary work of the women of their Districts.

3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, inform officers and committees of their election, carry on all necessary correspondence, and present an annual written report to the Diocesan Branch.

4. The Educational Secretary shall be in charge of the missionary education of the women of the Diocese and shall present an annual written report to the Diocesan Branch.

5. The Treasurer shall have charge of all property of the Diocesan Branch; receive all gifts, with the exception of the United Thank Offering, and administer the same; dispense all moneys as directed by the chairmen and by the Standing Committee; keep account of receipts and expenditures and present a monthly and an annual written report to the Diocesan Branch and the Chairman of each committee. The annual report shall be audited by an experienced accountant.

6. The United Thank Offering Treasurer shall be responsible for making known to the women of the Church the

opportunity of the United Thank Offering, and shall be custodian of the yearly offerings which are presented every three years at the General Triennial Thanksgiving Services. She shall present an annual written report to the Diocesan Branch; this report shall be audited every three years by an experienced accountant.

7. *The Duties of the Committees.* Each committee in charge of missionary work shall be under the direction of a Chairman and Vice-Chairman who shall jointly present and carry on the work of the committee.

ARTICLES VII. — MEETINGS

1. The Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch shall be held each year in January, at such time and place as may be determined by the Standing Committee.

2. The Anniversary Meeting of the Diocesan Branch shall be held in November, at such time and place as may be determined by the Standing Committee.

3. The Monthly Meetings of the Diocesan Branch shall be held on the third Wednesday of each month from September to May (inclusive) unless due notice is given of any change by the Standing Committee.

4. The Standing Committee shall meet on the Monday preceding the third Wednesday of each month from September to May (inclusive) unless otherwise ordered.

5. Members appointed by the Rector, or by the coöperating Parish Society, to act as delegates, shall be entitled to vote at the Diocesan Meetings, provided that the number of such delegates from any one Parish shall not exceed three. The members of the Standing Committee, also, shall be entitled to vote at Diocesan Meetings.

6. At the Annual Meeting, members representing not less than one half of the Parishes coöperating with the Diocesan Branch, or else not less than one hundred members entitled to vote, shall be necessary to form a quorum. At Monthly Meetings, sixty-five members, entitled to vote, shall constitute a quorum.

In case of a tie the Chairman shall have the right to cast the deciding vote.

ARTICLE VIII. — AMENDMENT OF BY-LAWS

The By-Laws may be amended at the Annual Meeting by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided that thirty days' notice shall have been given.
