

SEC. 3. Each regularly organized branch shall appoint two delegates to every meeting of the Association, that each branch may be represented, but all the members shall have an equal vote on all questions except the Annual Elections, when the APPOINTED DELEGATES ALONE shall vote.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The President shall preside at all meetings, and in her absence the Vice-Presidents shall preside in the order of their succession.

SEC. 2. The recording Secretary and Treasurer shall keep the minutes of all meetings; she shall also hold the General Expense Funds.

SEC. 3. The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, both of the Association and of the Executive Committee, and shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society.

SEC. 4. The Foreign, Domestic and Diocesan Treasurers; the Treasurer of the United Offering and the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, shall each receive the funds and manage the affairs of her own department. She shall conduct the correspondence incident to her work, and shall procure and disseminate missionary intelligence relating to her own department.

COMMITTEES:

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

SECTION 1. All matters relating to the general welfare of the Society shall be referred to the Executive committee. It shall appoint the Standing Committees which shall co-operate with it.

SEC. 2. Three Standing Committees shall be appointed by the Executive Committee each year after the annual meeting.

A Committee on Extension to consist of the Vice-Presidents and two other members. A Program Committee, a Committee on Mission Study.

The Committee on Extension shall superintend the work of arranging for meetings in different parts of the Diocese in the interest of forming new branches and strengthening the old ones.

The Program Committee shall make a plan for the meetings of the Association during the year, and provide speakers, subject to the advice of the Executive Committee.

The Committee on Mission Study shall arrange for Mission Study Classes throughout the Diocese, give all information regarding the work, and take charge of the Misionary Library.

ANNUAL REPORTS:

Each officer shall present a written annual report.

All accounts shall be audited before the annual meeting.

ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT.

The two paragraphs marked on page 12 should have been inserted here.

In the name of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, it is indeed a high honor and privilege to extend a most cordial and hearty welcome to each and every member, and to express the earnest hope that great spiritual benefit and inspiration may result from this annual meeting and conference. There is always enthusiasm in numbers, and this large gathering of loyal church women is a splendid augury for the success of the Auxiliary and of those who are so earnestly engaged in the work of the Church for Missions.

The objects of this Woman's Auxiliary Association are: "To unite the branches in a common interest; to diffuse missionary intelligence and missionary activity among the women of the Diocese; to encourage the formation of new branches, and to collect funds for various missionary purposes."

The reports of the various officers and committees have shown the splendid work accomplished during the past year, in which we all justly take pride, with the earnest resolve to strive for ever greater effort, and more abundant achievement.

The mission study classes have been of the greatest benefit; and your attention is called to the practical results to be attained by the more extended use of "The Why and How of Foreign Missions," and of similar study courses, in the branches, and for personal reading during the summer. Why can we not, in that interval when no regular meetings are held, prepare ourselves for a more intelligent knowledge of the work we are all to take up again when our meetings are resumed.

We are always most interested, in that in which we are best informed, and no one need remain in ignorance of the live, active work being accomplished in the cause of missions, all over the world, who studies the subject, and keeps in touch with all that is going forward, both in the Domestic and Foreign field, by subscribing to—and reading "The Spirit of Missions," that fine illustrated monthly review of Christian Missions.

The letters of the Woman's Auxiliary Secretary, Miss Julia C. Emery, describing her visits to mission stations in Japan are now being published and are full of interest. This magazine is a necessity for all Auxiliary members.

In connection with the mission study classes, the importance of attendance upon the summer conferences of the Young People's Missionary Institute is urged. Perhaps some Auxiliary members may be able to spend their summer vacation in such study. The Diocesan Auxiliary might well consider the benefit to be derived from sending some member to such conference.

Your attention is also called to the Fifth Department Missionary council to be held in Grand Rapids, September 28th next—when a representative of the Diocesan Auxiliary should be present, to bring to us a report of this important meeting. The Fifth Department comprises the Dioceses within the states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin.

At the council held in Chicago, October 20th, the Auxiliary was represented by the Vice-President of the Detroit Convocation—and her report was full of valuable suggestions.

That the Branches are "united in a common interest" is shown by the large attendance at all the meetings, even at times when the weather was most unfavorable.

We cannot sufficiently express our appreciation of the hospitality shown the Auxiliary by the churches in which we have been so kindly welcomed and by the members of the Branches who have been so successful in all their arrangements for the meetings.

The program committee is to be congratulated upon the work of the year, and also those members whose valuable papers have added so much of knowledge and interest to Auxiliary work.

Will you not consider the desirability of holding the Experience Meeting during an entire day—with luncheon at noon? These annual conferences are so important that more time should be given to them.

The Quiet Morning, conducted by the Rev. George Craig Stewart, Rector of St. Luke's Chruch, Evanston, Illinois, on the Feast of the Annunciation, March 25th in St. Paul's Church—was one of deepest significance. The spiritual benefit received by those taking part in the service and meditations will remain with us all, and a message giving expression to our profound sense of thankfulness should be sent by the Diocesan Auxiliary to the Rev. Mr. Stewart.

The change of the date of holding the Diocesan Convention, from October to May, goes into effect this year, and is to be held in Monroe May 12th and 13th. As parochial reports must, by the new Canon, be sent in by each Rector, fifteen days before this Convention is held, this may necessitate a change in the date of holding the annual meeting of parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, to enable the Rector to send that report with those of the other parish organizations.

It would be most desirable to have the annual meetings of the several branches held in accordance with the requirements of this Canon, and also—a sufficient time before the annual meeting of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary to give full opportunity for consideration of pledges for the ensuing year. This change is commended to your consideration.

It has been a great pleasure to have with us, at several of the meetings during the year, the Vice-Presidents of all but one of the convocations. The Northern convocation Vice-President has been unable to be present, owing to the distance from Cheboygan.

At a meeting of the Saginaw Valley convocation, held in Trinity Church, Bay City, on May 25th, the President, and the Vice President of Detroit convocation were most hospitably entertained and enjoyed the fine meeting arranged by Mrs. Fitzhugh. The increasingly valuable work of all the Vice-Presidents is recognized as of inestimable benefit in extending the interest in missions and they are to be congratulated upon the encouraging success of their efforts.

A special message of good wishes should be given to the Girls' Friendly Society for the success of their recent establishment of a department of missions.

The Junior Auxiliary, and the Babies Branch or Little Helpers are each doing efficient service in the cause of missions and in training their members to take their part in the extension of the kingdom.

The Treasurers all rejoice in being able to report much more systematic and prompt returns from the Branches—and there is a growing sense of the importance of having the money pledged, paid, before coming to the annual meeting. This much desired result enables the reports of the Treasurers and Auditors to be made without confusion or delay and, most important of all, the pledges are immediately sent to the Board of Missions. In this connection, we may all remind ourselves of the duty of remembering the Church and Her missions in the form of bequests.

The legal title for use in making wills is: "The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America."

Since our last annual meeting, many who were with us have been called to enter into "the rest that remaineth for the children of God." All these we remember with gratitude to our Heavenly Father for their lives of steadfast faith and their good works, which do follow them.

Especially would we pay our heartfelt tribute to the everliving memory of the Rev. Dr. Rufus W. Clark and Elizabeth Fiske (Locke) Stevens, both of whom were present at the annual meeting in Grace Church last May. Mrs. Stevens was the Chairman of the Mission Study work and the President of the branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in St. Joseph's Church. Ever a devout and earnest church woman, a loyal and devoted friend, with unusual gifts of mind and heart, her beautiful life of loving service will ever remain a fragrant, inspiring memory. Truly she was "A faithful soldier and servant unto her life's end." She fell asleep January 7th, 1909. In tender memory it is desired that the Diocesan Library may be called the Elizabeth Fiske Stevens Library.

It is interesting to note that on the afternoon of Thursday, April 22, 1880, this Diocesan branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was organized in Old St. Paul's Church at Congress and Shelby Streets. At this meeting addresses were made by the Rt. Rev. Samuel Smith Harris, D. D., L. L. D., Bishop of Michigan, and Miss Julia C. Emery of New York, Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, to four or five hundred women, perhaps one of the largest congregations of Christian women ever assembled in Detroit, pledges and money given then amounting to more than five hundred dollars.

The constitution and By-laws were adopted at a meeting held on Friday, April 23, and a meeting held in Grace Church June 9, 1880, was called the first annual meeting.

The Reverend Dr. Rufus Wheelwright Clark was ever a tower of strength to the Woman's Auxiliary of Michigan.

On the 19th of January 1880, three months before this Diocesan Branch was formed, Dr. Clark organized St. Paul's Church Branch and served as President for one year.

With all his ardor of Missionary zeal he watched and encouraged the growth of the Diocesan Auxiliary from its very beginning.

An enthusiastic believer and worker in the cause of missions throughout his life, he was an exemplar of the truth of the living word—and as a beacon light set upon a hill! He entered into rest January 10th, 1909.

In reverent memory of this strong and radiant spirit it is proposed to raise a fund of two thousand dollars to be called the Rufus W. Clark Memorial Fund, the annual income to be used in sustaining some one of the many interests which engaged his earnest devotion, as the Auxiliary may later decide.

Our dear Mrs. Thomas C. Pitkin, the first President of the Michigan Branch of the Women's Auxiliary, on April 14th celebrated her ninety-first birthday anniversary, and received her friends, on that occasion, with all her long-time interest.

"Blessed are they that dwell in Thy house; they will be always praising Thee.

"They shall go from strength to strength: and unto the God of gods appeareth every one of them in Sion."

These two paragraphs are by mistake out of place, they should have been on page 10

With high praise and hearty thanks for the wonderful grace and virtue declared in all these saints of God, we are slowly building upon the foundation, so strongly laid, by those who have gone before. In sincere appreciation of the loyal and encouraging support of every officer, and every member of the Auxiliary, I beg you to realize the measure of this, our great privilege and opportunity—and to mighty strive together for the larger, wider, vision, and more complete fulfillment of our obligation, as Church women to the great cause of Missions.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY.

The Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has held during the past year seven monthly meetings, six executive meetings, one corporate Communion service, at which Bishop Williams officiated and preached, and the Quiet morning in St. Paul's Church conducted by the Rev. George Craig Stewart.

The monthly meetings were held in the following named churches: St. Joseph's, St. George's St. Peter's, St. Matthias', St. Stephen's, St. James' and St. Andrews Memorial Church. The average number of parishes represented was 16.

At five of these meetings carefully prepared papers upon the work in five missionary jurisdictions were read, after the business session.

It was a pleasure to have with us at our annual meeting in May, and again in January, three of our Vice-Presidents, representing the Saginaw Valley, Central and Southern Convocations.

Although every effort was made by the Executive Committee, it was impossible to secure any of the missionaries at home on furlough to speak at our monthly meetings.

We have had to depend on letters for the inspiration and quickened interest which comes from close touch with the missionaries themselves—Many of these letters, asking for help, were met by a ready and generous response from the Auxiliary. We realized at our last annual meeting, that a longer session was necessary in which to satisfactorily complete our business, and also that the time allotted to the special speakers for the day, was too limited.

It was therefore recommended by the Executive Committee, and accepted by vote of the Auxiliary "that we have an extra session at our Annual Meeting, this session to be held Monday, May 3rd, at 2 o'clock."

We also record a slight change in the order of business.

On recommendation of the Executive Committee and by vote of the Auxiliary it was decided that the offering which was formerly taken just before the closing exercises, should now be taken immediately after the reading of the report of the Babies Branch.

Through the death of Mrs. Elizabeth Fiske Stevens, our very efficient chairman of the Mission Study Class Committee, we have lost one of our most earnest and devoted Auxiliary members.

On recommendation of the Executive Committee and by vote of the Auxiliary, it was decided that we call our Diocesan Library "The Elizabeth Fiske Stevens Library," and that we ask for gifts for this memorial.

On motion it was decided that we have a Library fund in connection with our list of pledges.

It is with deep sorrow that we record the death of the Rev. Rufus Clark, D. D.

Dr. Clark was the founder of our Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and was always our faithful friend, ready to help us in our difficulties and discouragements, or to rejoice with us in success.

The memory of the faithfulness and loyalty of these two friends will ever act as an inspiration to us all.

REPORT OF THE LITTLE HELPERS.

Another year has come to a close, and we find that God has blessed The Little Helpers. The vine has grown and the branches have borne fruit in abundance. Grace Church, Lapeer, St. Mary's, St. Thomas and the new department of St. Paul's, Detroit, have added to our gifts. St. Peter's and Epiphany, Detroit, St. Paul's, Larsing, have commenced the work, but made no financial report. We most heartily commend the work done in St. Thomas' and St. Mary's parishes. "A little child shall lead them" and we hope and pray that the Little Helpers will lead many who have not yet felt an interest in this great work of the Church to heed the call of The Master and rise to their privilege.

The Little Helpers of St. Paul's, Detroit, are to be congratulated for the great work that they are doing. Through the kind interest taken by the Secretary and her assistants the work is divided into The Little Helpers

who give to the general work. The Kindergarten Department giving towards the support of East Wind, a little Indian boy living in White Rocks in the missionary jurisdiction of Utah. The Primary Department giving towards the support of Marquis St. Paul, a little Japanese boy in "The Widely Loving Society" Osaka, Japan. We wish we had time to tell of the three crucial moments that have come to us who are interested in this scholarship. It should be a lesson to us, that this great work is not man's work but God's—that we should never worry about the result but trustingly do our very best and in His own appointed time and place. He will honor our trust and we shall be satisfied.

North, East, South and West have the prayers and the pennies of the Little Helpers of Michigan found their way. We have given \$5,000 to the apportionment that the Board of Missions have asked of the Little Helpers. We have met every obligation. We have given to the Day School for girls in Shanghai and for the boys in Wuchang, China. To the three kindergartens at and near Akita, Japan. To the Widely Loving Society, Osaka, to Miss Carter's Emergency Fund, White Rocks, Utah. This is the fund that has helped Bishop Spaulding of Utah care for his Indian work. Here lives Little Red Moon and East Wind, whom all the Little Helpers love. Then we have given to the little cot for colored children in St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh, North Carolina. The Little Helpers of the United States raised \$473.00 of the \$500.00 asked by the Board of Missions for the building of a children's ward in the new Chinese Hospital in San Francisco. So we send \$5.00 more to wipe away the deficit. Then we sent our share of the Arthur Selden Lloyd Scholarship for the support of Walter Wilder in the Mountains of Kentucky. We have remembered our Detroit Missionaries in foreign lands. Mrs. Littell of Hankow, China, Miss Routledge of Manila. We sent our mite to the Bishops of Alaska, Africa, Cuba, Porto Rico, Mexico, Hayti, Brazil, Honolulu and the Philippines. For the font which the Little Helpers will send to the foreign field, and \$20.00 will be given to the Associate Missions at Waynesville. This is under appropriation.

In the Diocese we have remembered the Bishop's Fund, Dr. Sayres. The United Offering, the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund. Our share in Printing the Annual Report. We have paid our debts and have a goodly sum for Extension Work.

Our new work this year was the gift to the Rev Austin Mann, and our grateful thanks for his wonderful work in the priceless ministry. A small gift for the colored work. The Little Helpers will give their mite towards the memorial that the Woman's Auxiliary will give in memory of Dr. Clark and also will aid in the Elizabeth Fisk Stevens memorial Library. The new work for the coming year will be the furnishing of the Children's Ward in the Chinese Hospital in San Francisco. In this work the Little Helpers ask the aid of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Elizabeth Fiske Locke Stevens was for three years secretary of the St. John's branch, Detroit. During that time of practical service and in the years following she proved herself a true and loyal friend of the Little Helpers.

In Dr. Rufus Wheelwright Clark the Little Helpers had a sincere friend who saw the great possibilities of the work they might do for the Master and by his interest and faith in them he encouraged them to greater effort.

In the passing of Mrs. John Hutchings the Little Helpers lost a friend who loved little children and who showed a practical interest in what they did for the Master by a loving gift each year made in the name of a little child.

May these friends rest in peace. May light perpetual shine on them is the prayer of the Little Helpers.

I am asked so often what is the aim of the Little Helpers. The aim is "To know of the love of God which passeth all understanding and then to do His will which is that we should love one another." To love one another is to make known that love to every living soul. This love should be the *first thing* in the hearts of all Christ's soldiers and if it is not then we should see that we put it first. The first message at the birth of Christ was a missionary message. The first prayer Christ taught was a missionary prayer. The first disciple, St. Andrew, was the first missionary. The first message of the Risen Lord was a missionary message. The first command of the Risen Lord to his disciples was a missionary command. The first apostolic Sermon was a missionary sermon. Christ's great reason for Christian love was a missionary reason, Christ's great reason for unity was a missionary reason. The first Coming of Christ was a missionary work. The second Coming of Christ is to be hastened by missionary work. Our Saviour's last wish on earth was a missionary wish, and the last wish of the departing Saviour should be the first wish of His returning children.

Last fall your President and first Vice President visited Bay City for a Sectional Meeting. As your delegate the first Vice President visited Chicago on October 20th, at the first meeting of the Fifth Missionary Department. All parishes in the Detroit convocation which have no branch of the Woman's Auxiliary have been written to and there is at present no place among these where conditions are such as to warrant organizing. The work of the Extension Committee is to organize new branches, strengthen old ones and visit branches already formed throughout the Diocese. Visits have been made at St. Clair, St. Philip's, St. Alban's, Church of the Epiphany, Birmingham, Tecumseh, Hillsdale, Cambridge, Monroe, Otter Lake, Saginaw, Midland and new Auxiliaries have been organized at Hillsdale and Otter Lake. Thirty-eight letters have been written, thirty-one received.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY OF THE MICHIGAN
BRANCH OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY FOR
1908 AND 1909.

During the past year the Junior Auxiliary has held seven officers', one executive and two general meetings.

The officers' meetings which are held the second Monday in the month at 4 P. M. in St. John's Parish House have been well attended and full of interest.

The spring general meeting was held Saturday May 9, 1908, in Grace Church. Dr. Faber, the Chaplain of the Junior Auxiliary gave a short talk, Bishop Williams told a helpful story, and Miss Jane Weber, in native costume, gave a Chinese monologue. The gifts to be sent to Alaska were then displayed, after which ice cream and cake was served to the two hundred juniors present.

The fall general meeting was held in St. John's Parish House, Saturday Nov. 21, at 2:30 P. M., Dr. Faber being in charge.

Three juniors described the places to which the five hundred Christmas gifts were sent. Rev. Mr. Ridley, of St. Mark's Detroit, talked in an interesting way of the work among the colored people in the south. Rev. Mr. Fox closed with an earnest talk on character building.

At the January officers' meeting the recording secretary gave an account of a day which she had recently spent at the Church Missions House, also a representative from each branch reported of the work being done in her branch.

It was decided at the February officers' meeting to divide 510 gifts among the missions at Bessemer City and Gastonia, White Rocks, Utah and Raleigh, N. C.

Regular mission study classes have been conducted in several branches during Lent, the subject being an illustrated junior course on the "Why and How of Missions," while in one branch "The Uplift of China" was studied throughout the year.

New branches have been reported at Trinity and St. Peter's, Detroit, making a total of 18.

One of the important events of the year will be the presentation of the symbolic play, entitled "The Little Pilgrims and the Book Beloved," given by Juniors from several branches. There will be two performances, one on Thursday evening, May 6, with a silver offering, and the other at the next general meeting which will be held Saturday, May 8.

With a faithful and enthusiastic group of leaders who have inspired their branches to study and work and give, we feel that the year has been profitably spent.
