CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

This Association shall be called the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECTS.

The objects of this Association are to unite the branches in a common interest; to diffuse missionary intelligence and missionary activity among the women of the Diocese; to encourage the formation of new branches, and to collect funds for various missionary purposes.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERS.

All baptised women of the Diocese who desire to be members, will be so regarded.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, five Vice-Presidents, (one to be chosen from each Convocation), a Recording Secretary and Treasurer, a Corresponding Secretary, a Diocesan Treasurer, a Domestic Treasurer, a Foreign Treasurer, a Treasurer of the United Offering, and the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club who together with the President of the Junior Auxiliary and the Head of the Little Helpers shall form an Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V.—MEETINGS.

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be held on the first Monday and Tuesday after the first Sunday in May.

Other meetings shall be held at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI.—QUORUM.

At Executive meetings, five members, and at Association meetings, twenty members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VII.—AMENDMENTS.

This constitution may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all members present; the proposed amendments having been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended, suspended or repealed at any regular meeting or annual meeting by a two-thirds majority vote.

BY-LAWS.

ELECTIONS, APPOINTMENTS.

SECTION 1. The officers, including the Auditors, shall be elected at each annual meeting. At the meeting preceeding the annual meeting an informal ballot shall be given to a nominating committee appointed by the President at said meeting. This informal ballot may be cast by every member of the Association.

SEC. 2. In case of the absence, resignation or death of an Executive officer, her place shall be filled by action of the Executive Committee. Such action to stand till the next annual meeting.

SEC. 3. Each regularly organized branch shall appoint two delegates to every meeting of the Association, that each branch may be represented, but all the members shall have an equal vote on all questions except the Annual Elections, when the APPOINTED DELEGATES ALONE shall vote.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The President shall preside at all meetings, and in her absence the Vice-Presidents shall preside in the order of their succession.

SEC. 2. The recording Secretary and Treasurer shall keep the minutes of all meetings; she shall also hold the General Expense Funds.

SEC. 3. The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, both of the Association and of the Executive Committee, and shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society.

SEC. 4. The Foreign, Domestic and Diocesan Treasurers; the Treasurer of the United Offering and the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, shall each receive the funds and manage the affairs of her own department. She shall conduct the correspondence incident to her work, and shall procure and disseminate missionary intelligence relating to her own department.

COMMITTEES:

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

SECTION 1. All matters relating to the general welfare of the Society shall be referred to the Executive committee. It shall appoint the Standing Committees which shall co-operate with it.

SEC. 2. Four Standing Committees shall be appointed by the Executive Committee each year after the annual meeting.

A Committee on Extension to consist of the Vice-Presidents and two other members. A Program Committee, a Committee on Mission Study and a Hospitality Committee.

The Committee on Extension shall superintend the work of arranging for meetings in different parts of the Diocese in the interest of forming new branches and strengthening the old ones.

The Program Committee shall make a plan for the meetings of the Association during the year, and provide speakers, subject to the advice of the Executive Committee.

The Committee on Mission Study shall arrange for Mission Study Classes throughout the Diocese, give all information regarding the work, and take charge of the Missionary Library.

The Committee on Hospitality shall arrange for the entertainment of delegates attending the various meetings.

ANNUAL REPORTS:

Each officer shall present a written annual report.

All accounts shall be audited before the annual meeting.

ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT.

The President gave a report of the closing meetings of the Woman's National Foreign Missionary Jubilee, held in New York, March 27-30, 1911.

As a result of one of the sectional meetings for women, held in connection with the Ecumenical Conference, in New York, May, 1900, a Central Committee on the United Study of Missions was formed, to provide for systematic, united study, by the women of the various Boards of Foreign Missionary Societies. Ten volumes have been published to present an outline study of Missions from the time of the Apostles down to the nineteenth century.

Although much work by women had been done for Missions before 1860, that year marked the organization in New York of the first Woman's Board of Missions in America, the Woman's Union Missionary Society. As the year 1910-1911 marks the fiftieth anniversary of this Society, and the tenth of United Study for Missions, the Central Committee arranged to celebrate these anniversaries by sending speakers to address a series of meetings for women, beginning on Oct. 12th, 1910, in Oakland, California.

The meetings held in Detroit on November 19th, 20th and 21st were most enthusiastic and inspiring. Thirty-two cities were visited, from the Pacific Ocean to the Atlantic, and of the one million dollars it was hoped to raise, \$879,456.90 was reported on March 30th, the contributions of women for missions as a result of the interest quickened by these meetings, with other amounts to be credited, the time for payment being extended to January first, 1912.

These meetings were indeed a notable demonstration of praise and thanksgiving.

A brief account was also given by the President of impressions received during visits made the first week in May to The World in Boston, America's first great missionary exposition, held in the Mechanics' Building, April 22nd to May 20th, 1911.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY.

During the year just closed there have been ten meetings of the Executive Committee of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, held in St. John's Parish House, with an average of eight members present.

Seven regular monthly meetings have been held in the following named churches: Church of the Epiphany, St. Paul's, St. Peter's, Church of the Messiah, St. George's, Christ Church and St. Stephen's.

The average number of Branches present was fifteen, represented by an average of seventy-four delegates. The largest number of Branches present at any monthly meeting was twenty-three, represented by one hundred and twenty-three delegates.

At the Annual Meeting, held May 3rd, 1910, thirty-three out of the fifty-five Branches in the Diocese were represented.

There have also been four special services and three special meetings held during the year, making in all twenty-four meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary.

September 21st, St. Matthew's Day, the women of the Auxiliary met for a Corporate Communion in St. John's Church. The Bishop of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev. Charles D. Williams, D.D., was celebrant, assisted by the Rev. William F. Faber, D.D.

November 21st a special service was held in St. John's Church, in conjunction with the Woman's National Foreign Missionary Jubilee. A strong missionary sermon was preached by Bishop C. D. Williams.

March 22nd, in St. Andrew's Memorial Church, the Rev. W. O. Waters, D.D., of Chicago, conducted a "Quiet Morning," the subject of his three meditations being "The Christian Motive," "Spiritual Growth," and "The Great Reward."

April 1st, in St. John's Church, a miniature Triennial United Offering Service was held. Offerings from all parts of the Diocese were presented. Two hundred women were present at the corporate communion, at which the Bishop of Michigan was celebrant.

The speakers at the three special meetings were the Rt. Rev. Lucien Lee Kinsolving, Bishop of Brazil, January 7th; the Rev. C. E. Betticher, of Alaska, January 10th, and the Rev. John E. Curzon, Secretary of the Fifth Department.

We had the pleasure of having at our monthly meetings the following named speakers: Mrs. Walter Hughson, Grace Hospital, Morgantown, District of Asheville, N. C.; Dr. Mary Glenton, Elizabeth Bunn Memorial Hospital, Wu Chang, China; Deaconess Margaret Routledge, Settlement House, Manila, Philippines; Mrs. Frank H. Touret, Colorado Springs; Mrs. Charles Scadding, Portland, Oregon; the Rev. William D. Maxon, D.D.; the Rev. William Sayres, D.D., the Diocesan Missionary; the Rev. Otis A. Simpson, the Rev. H. Hobart Barber, Mr. C. O. Ford.

At the monthly meetings in October and November, the General Convention and Triennial Meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary were the special topics of interest.

A very comprehensive resume of the General Convention was given by the Rev. W. D. Maxon, D.D. Short papers were read by several Diocesan officers: Mrs. F. A. Osburn, Miss Emily S. Paddock, Mrs. Joseph Taylor, Miss Bertha Lloyd, Miss Delia Warriner, and by Miss Lillian Armstrong.

At the December meeting a paper on the Church in Porto Rico and Cuba was read by Mrs. C. T. Seibt, and in February Miss Jean E. Hutchings read a paper on the Church in Mexico.

At the January monthly meeting at the Church of the Messiah we followed our usual custom and held an Experience Meeting. The regular order of business was followed at the morning session, after which luncheon was served. At the afternoon session specially prepared reports were read from all the city Branches, and from eighteen Branches out of town. This meeting was in charge of Mrs. Joseph Taylor.

During the General Convention of the Church, our President, Mrs. Frederic B. Stevens, was our special representative at the Triennial Conference of the Woman's Auxiliary in Cincinnati, October 5th to 26th. A delegation of forty women was present from Michigan. The great honor of being chosen Presiding Officer at the important business meetings of Diocesan Officers of the Woman's Auxiliary, in Cincinnati, was conferred upon our President, an honor greatly appreciated by the women of the Michigan Branch of the Auxiliary.

Our Diocesan Branch of the Auxiliary was again honored when our President was invited to preside at the Monthly Conference of Diocesan Officers held in New York, at the Church Missions House, February 16th. Through the acceptance of this invitation, Michigan was represented at this Conference.

During the last week in March the final meetings of the Woman's National Foreign Missionary Jubilee were held in New York. Mrs. Stevens represented the Michigan Auxiliary at these great gatherings.

During the winter she has visited, in the interests of the Woman's Auxiliary Extension, St. Phillip's Mission; Church of the Messiah; All Saints', Pontiac; St. Paul's, Flint; St. Stephen's, Wyandotte; Emmanuel Church, St. Louis, and All Saints', Brooklyn. The President also addressed the annual meetings of the Baptist, Presbyterian and Methodist Missionary Societies, held in Detroit. The President attended "The World in Boston," the first week in May, in order to give a report of this wonderful Missionary Exposition.

For her never failing zeal and interest, her unlimited expenditure of time, strength and means in the service of the Woman's Auxiliary, we are most sincerely grateful to our President.

REPORT OF FOREIGN TREASURER.

The Foreign Treasurer is glad to report an increase in receipts in her department over last year, due to the fact that the memorial to Kate W. Minor, from the women of St. John's Church, has passed through her hands.

A short reference to the subject of memorials in general may seem fitting, as the first memorials were begun in the Foreign Department. There are now four—the oldest being that from St. Paul's, Detroit—begun in 1883, and in 1885 given the name of the Jane Stewart scholarship, in memory of one of our most devoted workers. It is placed in St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, and is for forty dollars. That same year, 1888, St. John's, Detroit, inaugurated the Joseph N. Blanchard scholarship—also for forty dollars. This is placed at Cape Mount School, Africa.

One thousand dollars was raised by the Auxiliary after Bishop Harris' death and given to St. Andrew's Memorial Church, Detroit, but the perpetuation of his name in the Auxiliary is accomplished through the Harris Memorial scholarship of \$100, established in 1886 and placed in St. John's College, Shanghai, where it educates a young medical missionary.

The Joseph H. Johnson scholarship of one hundred dollars was the name given in 1896, to the work in Mexico, begun two years earlier. This helps educate a young man for the ministry in Mexico. These four scholarships all help in the apportionment.

For convenience we may divide memorials into three classes: *First*—A fund left by the individual herself or himself—i.e., a testamentary bequest; of this there is no example in the Diocesan Society, but the Harriet J. Butler fund left to the Auxiliary of St. Paul's, Detroit, is such a one; every year the interest on this fund of four hundred dollars is turned over to the Auxiliary and thus her name is held in lasting remembrance. May we not hope for many more such as the years roll on?

Second—A fund or gift raised in a limited time and completed; such a one is the Rufus W. Clark Memorial of \$2,225, just finished in this diocese.

Third—The annual memorial—raised afresh every year; such are the four scholarships above mentioned—all representing splendid work,

but likely to become burdensome if their number increases unless some time limit is imposed upon them. In conclusion may we not urge more memorials left by individuals themselves, next more memorials of larger or smaller amount completed and bearing interest which shall annually do the work; *Third*, the consideration of a *time limit* applied to memorials to be raised annually.

RESOLVED:—That the United Thank-Offering of 1913 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the mission field, including the training, testing, sending and support of woman workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$20,000 be devoted to buildings for the use of woman workers, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly, as the Lord hath prospered them.

REPORT OF THE LITTLE HELPERS.

1910-1911.

It is with great pleasure that we present the report of the Little Helpers of Michigan for your consideration. The Little Helpers have met all financial obligations. They have increased their appropriation from \$50.00 to \$88.00. The new work given the Little Helpers of the church by Miss Emery was the raising of \$500.00 for the support of a kindergarten at Mayaguez, Porto Rico. Towards this, Michigan gave \$25.00. Also our Little Helpers gave \$7.00 towards the support of the Gaylord H. Mitchell bed in St. James' Hospital, Anking, China.

After many years of faithful service for the Master, Mrs. I. N. Baker, of Bay City, owing to illness has been obliged to resign the secretaryship of the Little Helpers of Trinity parish. She has always been so capable, conscientious and enthusiastic that we feel we cannot give her up, but we must, knowing that we have her prayers and love. We bid her successor a loving welcome to our circle.

In this day and generation when religious training of children in the home is almost unknown, let me beg you to realize what the work of the Little Helpers is.

It is a simple practical system of object teaching for the tiniest child baptized into the church, to train it in the habit of praying and giving for missions, so that it will never remember the time it was not doing its part as a member of the great missionary society. The Little Helpers

is educational, practical work, and in order to interest children, it must be personal. It is an ever growing influence in the missionary world which will develop in proportion to the appreciation of its sane and sacred purpose of missionary education.

We are preparing and laying the foundation of Christian responsibility and on the good work done *now*, depends the future missionary work of the church. Is it worth while? Shall it be done in a careless manner or so well that the members of the Church of God having learned and loved their responsibility to their brethren of all nations and tongues from their earliest childhood, shall continue to be Christ's faithful soldiers and servants to their life's end. This work is the greatest work in the Church.

Our missionaries in foreign lands and in the domestic field do what they can for the older people, but their energy and strength is given to the education of the children. This is true of our diocese. Upon the education of the children depends the growth of the Church. Give me a child until it is seven years old, said one of the great Cardinals of the Roman communion, and I care not who has its education after. We need statesmen in our Church, people with far-reaching vision. We are laying foundations now, but the building is for eternity. As the baby's physical life is so tenderly cared for in infancy, so must its spiritual life be fed. St. Paul tells us that we have a natural body and we have a spiritual body. We can kill the spiritual body by spiritual starvation just as we can kill the child by depriving it of food. This spiritual responsibility rests on parents, sponsors, on all members of the Church. Some members are responding to the call of Christ's little ones with zeal and consecration, but the great body of the Church—yes, members of the Woman's Auxiliary—are not interested in the Little Helpers. You do not speak for it. Some of you do not even know what it really stands for. Inform yourselves. You need to know all about it, so you can do better work in your own branch, for the Little Helpers and Juniors are departments of the Woman's Auxiliary. They are the feeders of your branch.

The Church realizes as never before that the work of the Little Helpers is a vital reality. Will you not pray that we who labor among Christ's little ones may make more earnest efforts, and have a deeper concentration of purpose and greater consecration of life and not only for us, in our diocese, nor for those in our communion, but for all peoples that they shall teach all little children that Jesus is the Son of the Living God.

The program arranged for 1910-1911 was one, which the committee hopes, proved instructive and helpful in every way.

REPORT OF THE MISSION STUDY COMMITTEE.

The Mission Study Committee respectfully submit the following report:

The interest in Mission Study manifested in the Diocese of Michigan during the year just closing is most gratifying to the committee which has had the work in charge, and to every member of the Woman's Auxiliary.

It is significant of a great wave of interest which is sweeping through every Christian community.

There is a desire for more light. These two words, *More Light*, might well be chosen as the motto for Mission Study.

This committee now consists of seven members, Mrs. Don D. Williams having filled the position of Secretary-Treasurer during the year, in a most efficient manner.

Miss Alice M. Alexander and Miss Elizabeth Thomas again attended the Conference in July at Silver Bay, New York, of the Young People's Missionary Movement, and twenty-six members were enrolled in the two Normal Classes, led by them, during the six weeks preceding Thanksgiving.

The study of the *Why and How of Foreign Missions* is recommended as the foundation for Mission Study. The new course, on the *Books of the Acts*, as a study in Missions, aroused much interest.

REPORT OF THE RUFUS W. CLARK MEMORIAL FUND.

In Columbus, O., on the tenth of January, 1909, occurred the death of the Rev. Rufus Wheelwright Clark, D.D., who from 1877, for nearly twenty-nine years, had been rector of St. Paul's Church, Detroit. Dr. Clark resigned as rector in 1905, to accept the appointment from the Board of Missions as secretary of the Fifth Department, with the charge of the Sixth Department, on November 14, 1905.

In December, 1906, he resigned the secretaryship of the Fifth Department and was made secretary of the Sixth. He resigned that position in 1908.

In consideration of the fact that it was under Dr. Clark's leadership that on the 19th of January, 1880, St. Paul's, the first branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions in Michigan was organized, and that the Diocesan Branch was organized, also in St. Paul's, on April 22nd, 1880, at the Diocesan Auxiliary annual meeting, held May 4, 1909, it was decided to undertake the raising of a suitable memorial, in commemoration of Dr. Clark's life and services.

The subjoined report evidences the favorable and cordial reception of the decision of the Auxiliary, more than the proposed amount having been raised in less than two years from the commencement of the work.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S NATIONAL FOREIGN MISSIONARY JUBILEE FUND.

Following the Woman's National Foreign Missionary Jubilee meeting in Detroit, November 19-21, 1910, action was taken in the Woman's Auxiliary that one thousand dollars should be raised by the women of our Diocese to erect a memorial in China which should forever perpetuate the Fiftieth Anniversary of Woman's Organized Foreign Missionary Work.

The committee has worked hard—held many meetings, made personal visits and written many letters. We were so hopeful that the missionary women of our Diocese would *each and all* give something to this cause and give it promptly. We appealed to individuals and not to auxiliaries. Ninety-eight women have responded and five auxiliaries and in all \$601.50 has been raised. All but a few unpaid pledges and the money expended for printing and postage amounting to \$23.65, is in the savings bank. The committee recommend that this work be continued until the required sum is raised. Whether it may be given in another direction which would meet with greater enthusiasm is possible. Your committee will be glad of any suggestions.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY OF THE MICHIGAN BRANCH OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY, 1910-1911.

The Junior Auxiliary of Michigan has had, on the whole, a very successful year. We have held nine officers' meetings and three general meetings for the children.

At the first officers' meeting of the year, held on May 10th, it was decided to send our Christmas gifts to Blowing Rock, N. C.; Peake, S. C., and Sisseton Agency, S. D.

At the September meeting reports were made by Miss Thomas and Miss Alexander, who had attended the Silver Bay, Lake George, New York, Missionary Conference.

They reported that the Episcopal delegation, numbering forty-four, was in charge of Bishop Roots and Rev. Wm. Gardner, of the First Department.

The final gifts for the United Offering were made and contributions for the Triennial exhibition were arranged.

At the November meeting reports were made by Mrs. Stevens and the Junior delegates to the Triennial Convention, Miss Maurice, Miss Granger and Miss Frazer, being our representatives.

On November 26th the fall general meeting was held. Rev. Paul Faude made a helpful address, and after inspecting the many Christmas gifts simple refreshments were served.

At the December meeting for leaders Miss Bertha Lloyd gave a talk on the United Offering. Miss Lloyd used the question and answer method employed at the convention, which proved to be interesting and effective.

At the January meeting Miss Thomas announced a Mission Study class for Junior officers on the Upward Path.

This was a normal class for leaders and older Juniors and there were representatives from about every parish in the city who were thus prepared to lead classes in their various branches during Lent.

We had in all fourteen study classes this year.

On Tuesday, January 10th, the mid-winter general meeting was held. Rev. Charles E. Betticher, of Alaska, gave an illustrated talk, which was much enjoyed by nearly two hundred Juniors.

At this meeting the Juniors promised Mr. Betticher eighteen sweaters, which were sent to some of his boys at St. Luke's Mission, Salchachet, Alaska.

At a meeting of the Advisory Board and officers, held on January 21st, Miss Elizabeth Thomas was appointed Educational Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary of Michigan.

It has proved to be a great benefit to the Auxiliary to have an Educational Secretary, as we have had more interest shown in Mission Study than ever before.

At the February meeting for leaders, it was decided to edit a Junior Missionary magazine to be in charge of a literary committee with Miss Thomas as chairman.

We feel that this undertaking has been a step in the right direction in reaching the older girls, for Miss Trowbridge and Miss Thomas have organized the older Juniors, two or three from each parish, into a board of managers of The Torchbearer, as the magazine is called. They have met every two weeks for over two months; this has helped to bring

the older girls of the different churches into closer touch and made them wish to form branches in Churches where they had none. One branch has already been started in this way and two study classes were organized by the girls themselves.

This magazine, *The Torchbearer*, issued the first number April first and has proved to be the most important thing the Michigan Juniors have done this year.

It costs five cents a copy and is full of interesting items and stories; another number will be issued in the fall.

On Thursday, March 9th, the leaders were invited to meet at the home of Miss Trowbridge in honor of Deaconess Margaret Roulledge, who left for the Philippines the following day.

March 13th Miss Maurice and Miss Thomas visited Ann Arbor and helped to reorganize the Junior Branch there.

On Saturday, April 7, the leaders had a luncheon for Miss Edwards, one of our vice-presidents, and a faithful leader, who has gone to New York to assist the Rev. John C. H. Mockridge in Sunday School work, in Trinity Parish.

On Saturday, April 29th, Miss Alexander was invited to speak on the importance of Mission Study at the fourth annual meeting of the Junior Auxiliary of Southern Ohio, held in Cincinnati.

Our annual officers' meeting was held on Monday, May 1st; reports were read, and pledges for the ensuing year were made and were most encouraging.

The annual general meeting for the children was held on Saturday afternoon, May 6th, in St. John's Parish House.

Bishop Williams gave an address which will long be remembered by the children, on the light that they can shed in the world.

Reports were given by a representative from each branch; these showed that a steady growth is going on and that many Auxiliaries had increased their pledges.

After the reports a play was given, entitled, "Hands Across the Sea." This was prepared and given by the board of managers of *The Torchbearer*. The scene was laid in Tokyo, at St. Luke's Hospital, and St. Margaret's School, and the characters represented were Bishop McKim, Dr. Tessler, Miss Bull, Miss Haywood, Mr. Nogi, St. Margaret's girls and some visitors from America. This made the places and people seem more real to the children.

After the play Mrs. Stevens, President of the Woman's Auxiliary, gave the children a most interesting description of the "World in Boston" and told them what she had seen there.

Then about three hundred children, mothers and friends enjoyed ice cream and cake.

In the nineteen Churches in the city we have seventeen Junior branches, three more than we had last year. Out of town we have six branches, making in all twenty-three Junior Auxiliaries in the Diocese.

There are many things which we wish to do that we have not been able to accomplish this year.

One thing which we hope to have next year is a home department for the older Juniors who are employed, and not able to come to Junior meetings. There are so many things that they can do at home and this will help to keep us in touch with the girls in the stage between the Juniors and the Woman's Auxiliary.

Another thing we want to start is an educational and extension fund to help the Mission Study work along and enable the officers to visit some of the Auxiliaries, out of town, occasionally.

Our aim this year has been three-fold: preparation, extension, and co-operation.

Preparation: By Mission Study classes, and attendance at conventions, institutes, and summer conferences.

Extension: By visiting out-of-town branches, and by reorganizing, and organizing, in town.

Co-operation: By our monthly conferences for leaders, one big general gathering where all the Juniors meet together having a common purpose, the extension of Christ's kingdom on earth.
