CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

This Association shall be called the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECTS.

The objects of this Association are to unite the branches in a common interest; to diffuse missionary intelligence and missionary activity among the women of the Diocese; to encourage the formation of new branches and to collect funds for various missionary purposes.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERS.

All baptised women of the Diocese who desire to be members, will be so regarded.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Association shall be a President five Vice-Presidents, (one to be chosen from each Convocation), a Recording Secretary and Treasurer, a Corresponding Secretary, a Diocesan Treasurer, a Domestic Treasurer, a Foreign Treasure, a Treasurer of the United Offering and the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club who together with the President of the Junior Auxiliary and the Head of the Little Helpers shall form an Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V.—MEETINGS.

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be held on the first Monday and Tuesday after the first Sunday in May.

Other meetings shall be held at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI.—QUORUM.

At Executive meetings, five members, and at Association meetings, twenty members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VII.—AMENDMENTS.

This constitution may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all members present; the proposed amendments having been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended, suspended or repealed at any regular meeting or annual meeting by a two-thirds majority vote.

BY-LAWS

ELECTIONS, APPOINTMENTS.

SECTION 1. The officers, including the Auditors, shall be elected at each annual meeting. At the meeting preceding the annual meeting an informal ballot shall be given to a nominating committee appointed by the President at said meeting. This informal ballot may be cast by every member of the Association.

SECTION 2. In case of the absence, resignation or death of an Executive officer, her place shall be filled by action of the Executive Committee. Such action to stand till the next annual meeting.

SECTION 3. Each regularly organized branch shall appoint two delegates to every meeting of the Association, that each branch may be represented, but all the members shall have an equal vote on all questions except the Annual Elections, when the APPOINTED DELEGATES ALONE shall vote.

PLEDGES.

SECTION 1. At the Annual Meeting each branch shall signify in writing the amount it will give during the following year, to be paid through the Treasurers of the Woman's Auxiliary.

SECTION 2. As it seems only reasonable that each branch shall contribute something towards the general expenses of the Society, all branches shall contribute as liberally as possible, the minimum amount for any branch being fifty cents a year.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The President shall preside at all meetings, and in her absence, the Vice-Presidents shall preside in the order of their succession.

SECTION 2. The Recording Secretary and Treasurer shall keep the minutes of all meetings; she shall receive and pay out, as necessary, the General Expense and Extension funds and such special funds as may be put in her care.

SECTION 3. The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, both of the Association and of the Executive Committee, and shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society.

SECTION 4. The Foreign, Domestic and Diocesan Treasurers; the Treasurer of the United Offering and the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, shall each receive the funds and manage the affairs of her own department. She shall conduct the correspondence incident to her work and shall procure and disseminate missionary intelligence relating to her own department.

COMMITTEES:

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

SECTION 1. All matters relating to the general welfare of the Society shall be referred to the Executive Committee. It shall appoint the Standing Committees which shall co-operate with it.

SECTION 2. Five Standing Committee shall be appointed by the Executive Committee each year after the annual meeting.

A Committee on Extension to consist of the Vice-Presidents and two other members. A Program Committee, an Educational Committee for Mission Study, a Diocesan Box Committee and a Hospitality Committee.

The Committee on Extension shall superintend the work of arranging for meetings in different parts of the Diocese in the interest of forming new branches and strengthening the old ones.

The Program Committee shall make a plan for the meetings of the Association during the year, and provide speakers, subject to the advice of the Executive Committee.

The Educational Committee for Mission Study shall arrange for Mission Study Classes throughout the Diocese, give all information regarding the work, and take charge of the Missionary Library.

The chairman of this committee shall be called the Educational Secretary.

The Diocesan Box Committee shall supply lists of boxes, obtained from the Church Missions House, to parishes wishing them; shall have charge of the preparation of any general Diocesan Box, and shall present the combined annual box report of all the parishes.

The Committee on Hospitality shall arrange for the entertainment of delegates attending the various meetings.

ANNUAL REPORTS.

Each officer shall present a written annual report.
All accounts shall be audited before the annual meeting.

ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT.

The annual meeting of the Michigan Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary is always an occasion of deep interest, as the work of the past year is reviewed and plans are made for greater service.

Reports of all departments which follow will serve as an outline only, to present the consecrated effort which has been the source of the results attained, and every member is urged to read these records with careful attention.

This request includes every report in the Year-Book, with reference especially to the work of the Little Helpers, Junior Auxiliary, Young Woman's Auxiliary, and the Young People's Association in the Diocese of Michigan, which was organized to include both young men and young women, on January twenty-first, 1915, following inspiring addresses by the Bishop and the Rev. C. L. Ramsey.

As all these organizations are the foundation of the future upbuilding of the church, the helpful personal interest of Auxiliary members is relied upon by these young co-workers, and surely will be abundantly given.

Attention is called to the Special Fund of \$400,000, to which the Board of Missions is asking every member of the church to contribute, that the sum may be raised by the close of the fiscal year, August 31, 1915.

In October, 1916, the General Convention of the Church is to be held in St. Louis, Missouri, and at this time the United Offering is to be presented. A greater effort should be made to remember this privilege, and the opportunity presented, as the entire offering is to be devoted to the training and support of women sent out by the Board. No part of this thank-offering is to be given for building.

Can not many Auxiliary members plan to attend a summer conference at Silver Bay, Lake George, New York, at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, or at any of the centers which may be more accessible?

So much good results from the Michigan Annual January institute for Mission Study, held under the direction of the Auxiliary Educational Committee, it is hoped all members will plan to attend the one to be conducted next January, due notice of which will be given.

An invitation has been accepted with much pleasure to attend the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Michigan City, to be held in Marion, Indiana, May 13, 14, 1915.

The Auxiliary annual corporate communion service will be held St. Matthew's Day, September 21, in St. John's Church, Detroit, and a large attendance is expected.

October fifteenth, 1915, we all enjoyed the honor of having the Woman's Auxiliary in the twelve dioceses in the Fifth Province meet in St. John's Parish House for a conference, which was addressed by Miss Emily Tillotson, and which was full of helpful interest.

A conference is to be held next October, in Chicago, which will give an opportunity for further exchange of experience in Auxiliary work.

The generous response to the needs of the Priory School for Girls, under the direction of Bishop Restarick, at Honolulu, was largely in evidence when the supplies were shown before the box was packed, to be later sent from New York, through the Panama Canal, to its destination.

Auxiliary members will please send to the diocesan box-work chairman for lists, conduct all the work through her direction, and report to her all work completed, that an accurate account may be kept.

With grateful commendation and recognition of the work accomplished by each individual officer and member during the past year, including all departments, with praise and thanksgiving we all begin another year of loyal service.

ANNUAL REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY.

The Thirty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in St. Paul's Cathedral, Detroit, May 4 and 5, 1914.

Monday afternoon, May 4, at 2 o'clock, the Auxiliary convened. Annual reports from all departments were read.

Tuesday morning, May 5, at 9 o'clock, a corporate Communion was held in the Cathedral. The celebrant, Dean Marquis, was assisted by Dr. McCarroll. Immediately following the services a business session was held in the Cathedral parish house. At the afternoon meeting addresses were made by Mrs. J. E. Emerson, recently returned from Honolulu; Bishop Charles D. Williams, and Dr. Sayres. Thirty-seven parishes were represented at the meetings by one hundred and eighty-one members.

During the year just ended eight regular monthly meetings have been held, with an average attendance of sixty-three delegates from fifteen parishes.

The regular business of the society was transacted at these meetings and addresses were made by Dr. Sayres, General Missionary in the Diocese; the Rev. Harry C. Robinson, of Columbus, Ohio; Miss Jessie S. Hendrie, United Offering Treasurer; Miss Ada Freeman, of the Associated Charities; the Rev. William L. Torrance, of St. Andrew's Church, and the Rev. George Mackay, of St. Alban's Church.

At the September monthly meeting six ladies, representing the Baptist, Methodist, Congregational, Christian, Lutheran, and Presbyterian churches, spoke on the personal element in Missionary work.

October 27 the Diocesan Auxiliary met in St. John's Church, Saginaw. The meeting was a most enthusiastic one and well attended. Ninety-four members were present from twenty-four branches—the largest attendance at any monthly meeting during the year.

On St. Matthews' Day, September 21, 1914, a Corporate Communion was held in St. John's Church.

On March 23, 1915, in St. Paul's Cathedral, the Rt. Rev. William A. Leonard, Bishop of Ohio, conducted a quiet morning service, taking for his subject "The Spiritual Life."

December 24, 1914, Miss Margaretta Grider addressed a meeting held in St. Andrews' Church, telling of her work in Nenana, Alaska.

There have been nine meetings of the Executive Committee held during the year, with an average attendance of eight members present.

Miss Bertha E. Lloyd, for twelve years the faithful and efficient treasurer of the United Offering, felt compelled to resign her office. With sincere regret her resignation was accepted, and Miss Jessie S. Hendrie appointed to fill the office.

Mrs. James Austin, for many years Chairman of the Box Committee, resigned from this office in November, 1914. Mrs. Austin's untiring and devoted service is deeply appreciated and her resignation was accepted with much regret. Mrs. William C. Noack was appointed to fill the office.

On Thursday, October 15, 1914, preceded by a Coronate Communion service in St. John's Church, the Rev. W. F. Faber, celebrant, the fifth meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the province of the mid-west was held in St. John's Church House. Mrs. Frederic B. Stevens presided, the meeting commencing in the morning and lasting until 4 o'clock, with an intermission for luncheon. The special speaker at the morning session was Miss Emily C. Tillotson, Educational Secretary from the Church Missions House, New York, who spoke on The Importance and Value of Mission Study.

Nine out of twelve Dioceses in the province of the mid-west were represented by twenty-nine delegates, and there was a large and enthusiastic attendance at both sessions.

From the sale of old bits of gold and silver twenty dollars was given to the Endowment Fund of the Church Periodical Club.

The churches contributing to the fund were Christ Church, St. John's, St. Andrew's, St. Joseph's and St. Barnabas', Detroit.

In behalf of the club let me thank the Woman's Auxiliary, Junior Auxiliary and all who in any way have contributed to the club and ask for your continued interest and support, without which it would be impossible to carry on this important work.

Since September, 1914, there has been sent out forty-five letters and postals; also a limited amount of printed matter, including Year Books, yearly programs and leaflets on general Auxiliary work. Answers to correspondence, as last year, have been satisfactory.

On the sixth and seventh of October I attended a meeting of the Central Convocation in Port Huron. The first service held on the evening of the sixth, in St. Paul's Church, was missionary in character. Addresses were given by the Revs. Gallagher, Baxter and Bishop. On the morning of the seventh, in Grace Church, Holy Communion and sermon by the Rev. Henry J. Simpson of Lansing; the afternoon was devoted to problems of the Sunday School; the evening was devoted to three addresses by Dr. Sayres, the Rev. J. B. Pengally and Canon Davis of Ontario. I took advantage of the presence of the clergy to talk over auxiliary problems held in common.

I attended a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions in the Province of the Mid-West, held in Detroit on the fifteenth, which proved a very fine meeting, and much pleasure and benefit was derived therefrom. Later in the day I was present at a meeting of the Junior branch, and in the evening at a meeting of the Young Woman's Auxiliary at the home of Miss Julia Fish, where we were most hospitably entertained and where we again had the opportunity of hearing our Educational Secretary, Miss Tillotson—also a few words from our President and each of the out-of-town ladies who were present—making a full and profitable day.

On October twenty-seventh I attended a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, in St. John's Church, Saginaw. A meeting so highly successful could not help but be an inspiration to all present and one carried away almost as much benefit as from an Annual Meeting. It reflected much credit upon Mrs. Mitchell, our new vice-president of the Saginaw Valley Convocation, and upon others of the Woman's Auxiliary who had it in charge. All who were present will remember with pleasure the hospitality of the Saginaw ladies.

On December 15, Grace Church Auxiliary, Port Huron, was pleased to welcome Miss Margaretta Grider of Nenana, Alaska. An effort was made to have the meeting inter-denominational, as far as possible. All were much interested in the work presented. Grace Church subscribed London Times for Miss Grider and from the Auxiliary connected with St. George's, Sarnia, the World's Work was subscribed.

As one looks back over the Auxiliary year closing, one sees opportunities not always taken advantage of by your vice-president; of the work generally much more of encouragement than of discouragement; of some promises not carried out perhaps, but feel that the fulfillment has only been postponed, not cancelled. Each year there is always one star which shines the brightest in our Auxiliary firmament, and this year it is a branch which, in spite of the year's depression, has raised its pledge for General Missions from fifty dollars to one hundred dollars; has applied twenty-three dollars on Domestic Diocesan Missions; Thank Offering, fifteen dollars. Not by swift strides has this been accomplished, but bit by bit, and by the sacrifice of time and effort by a small band of women who are realizing the purpose for which our Auxiliary was created. Beside the one star is another, shining with a lesser light, perhaps, but as steadily. This light is emitted from a branch which last year dropped down from its pledge of years, of eleven to four dollars. This Auxiliary will probably never see as dark a year again; its members have had to contend with fire, illness and more than the usual depression; its wage-earners have all been out of work save two; but steadily its pledge has crept up until now it stands at eleven, again, thirteen, all told, but this year they feel it, for there is no Thank Offering. As one reviews their difficulties, and sees how they have been met and adjusted, the Thank Offering is, I am sure, in our hearts, and is very great, that we have this branch in our midst; it is an example to carry us on to greater effort.

During the year of 1916, if it is permitted, Central Convocation hopes to specialize on the Educational features of Auxiliary work as laid out for us by our Diocesan Secretary; also to take up Church Periodical work effectively.

SAGINAW VALLEY CONVOCATION.

The work of the Saginaw Valley Convocation presented many difficult problems to me when I took it up a year ago. Observation and study of the situation convinced me that the first great need was to develop a spirit of co-operation among the workers already in the field, and then reach out from the larger centers to the weaker missions. We have made only a beginning, but it is a beginning.

On May 29 I attended a meeting of St. Cecilia's Guild in St. Paul's Parish, Saginaw, and spoke to the girls about the Junior work. When the Woman's Auxiliary of the parish packed the missionary box in November St. Cecilia's Guild was invited to attend the meeting and the girls donated clothing and money for the box.

In June St. Paul's Auxiliary, Saginaw, held a missionary tea at my home and we invited St. John's and Calvary's Auxiliaries. About fifty ladies came, although the day was extremely hot.

September 29 I went to Midland. The rector of St. John's Church and his wife, Rev. and Mrs. James G. Widdifield, went with us to the Parish Guild and I was given an opportunity to speak to the ladies. I have tried all through the year to keep them in touch with the work, and the rector had a Mission Study Class during Lent, but I have not succeeded as yet in getting them to organize an Auxiliary.

October 1, I attended a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary at Calvary Church, Saginaw. The attendance and interest were both good.

Mrs. J. N. Baker, President of the Auxiliary at Trinity, Bay City, invited me to come to a meeting November 10 to speak upon the United Offering and Junior Work. There were over thirty present.

January 22, 23 and 24 I attended the Diocesan Mission Study Institute in Detroit, and Monday, January 25, the Diocesan Meeting at Christ Church.

During the year I have arranged for four meetings. The first was the October Diocesan Meeting which was held on the 27th at St. John's Church, Saginaw. The large number of Diocesan officers and others who came from a distance was very gratifying to us. Seven clergymen and women from a number of nearby towns helped to make the attendance large. We were especially grateful to Miss Jessie S. Hendrie, our United Offering Treasurer, for the excellent talk she gave, with beautiful slides, upon the work in the Philippines, and to all who helped make the meeting such an inspiration and success.

December 18 a meeting was held in Bay City at the home of Mrs. W. C. Moulthrop, to which the Saginaw Auxiliaries were invited. We had the very great pleasure of listening to Miss Grider of Nenana, Alaska, who described the conditions along the Yukon River most graphically.

February 23 Miss Lillian Armstrong made a very strong appeal for the work of the Little Helpers, to about fifty women, at St. Paul's Church, Saginaw. Scarcely a woman present had any understanding of this beautiful work before the lecture was given. Miss Armstrong went to Bay City the next day to address a meeting at Trinity Church.

During Lent I led a Mission Study class for the women of the three parishes in Saginaw. Although the attendance was not large, those who did come seemed much interested in the subject which we studied, The Social Aspects of Foreign Missions.

I have written seventy-seven letters and a number of post cards, and have received thirty-six letters and a few post cards during the year. I have given out programs, reports and printed matter wherever I thought advisable.

Conferences with the Dean, Rev. Emil Montanus, and with Dr. Sayres, and some replies to letters that I have written following up every available avenue which seemed to lead to a possible opening, have given me reason to hope that I shall be able to reach women over in the eastern part of the Convocation, where I am most anxious to see something accomplished.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

The little band of followers were discouraged. Their Lord had gone from them. They knew not what to do. But, true to His promise, as they were gathered together, He came unto them in a new way. And the world was changed. The experience of that first Whitsuntide has been repeated among groups of women in this and other dioceses, as they have come together to seek knowledge and guidance as to their Father's business. To those to whom parish life has settled down into a dead level of monotony has come a larger vision of the Church and its great work, so that henceforth the world for them has been changed. It is such testimonies as these which make our work so much worth while.

It is not an easy task to sum up the results of the educational work of any season, especially at so early a date as this. Seeds are sown which may lie dormant for some time, then spring forth to a rich fruitage. Figures are a weak medium, and altogether inadequate for expressing the inspiration which has come to more than one group of earnest seekers during a Lenten season.

The record for the year just closed is one of growth, and this fact seems conspicuous in seven different ways.

In the first place, the early fall was marked by an Interdenominational Institute, the first to be held in Detroit. Six organizations united in providing during two weeks' time, opportunities of training equal to those afforded at any of the summer conferences. Leaders for classes of men, women and young people were here prepared. Our own Church furnished its full share of material, as it is accustomed to do at the summer conferences. The plan proved so successful as to call for a repetition the coming fall.

Beside the broadening influence of such an instance of co-operation among Christian people, we may note an increase in the number of workers in our own ranks. Of the 24 leaders who were in charge of the Detroit classes, 16 were new to the work this year. Thus, while all were regretting the absence of several of our most experienced leaders, we must rejoice at the new and able material which has entered our ranks.

In the third place, the year has seen a more definite organization of the Educational Committee. It was decided that 12 be the number of active members upon the committee. And further, to be able to make the desired reports to be sent to the Church Missions House, report sheets have been sent to every branch in the diocese. Reports are asked regarding program meetings held during the year, the method of preparing the program—whether by program committee or otherwise—whether programs are printed and how many study classes have been held in the parish, and what results have been felt in the parish from these classes. Eighteen replies have thus far been received to the 58 report blanks sent out. One of these makes the statement that a good result of the class has been the meeting of the parish apportionment. Attention is called to the apportionment of the parish upon the report blank. At a special meeting of the Educational Committee and leaders, called just before the close of Lent to consider its relation to the Emergency Fund, there seemed to come a revelation, a deeper understanding of the mission of this committee. Michigan has never met her apportionment. This year she fell short by \$3,000.54. The reason for this failure was because half of the parishes did not send in the sums asked of them. They failed, not because they were not able to meet the call, but because they did not know their relationship to the work of the great Church to which they belong, did not understand the methods employed by this most wonderful organization in carrying out the Great Commission of its founder. It is to be the privilege of this committee to help to bring this knowledge and the inspiration which is bound to follow it, into each of the 58 parishes which now have branches of the Woman's Auxiliary. Then to go on spreading the knowledge and the inspiration among those who have not yet reached beyond the parochial consciousness and become a part of the world-wide work through this body. Thus in the fifth place, we note a deeper realization of the work that is ours.

The question of interesting the younger women has been brought very strongly before the Auxiliary since the last meeting of the General Convention. We of Michigan are thankful to say that the younger women are coming into our Auxiliary branches, as is shown by the increasing number of study classes held by groups of younger women, and the number to be found in our various parish groups. We may also report that the men are inquiring into our methods, and it certainly will be a great pleasure to share with them, all that our study has come to mean to us.

Finally, it is most gratifying to report that of the 30 Lenten classes so far reported, 12 have been among groups of the Young People's Association of the Diocese, which has come into existence during the year.

It was the privilege of your secretary to visit a number of these groups, and everywhere to find an earnestness equal to the enthusiasm of the members. Several groups closed the course with an ably debated question, such as the respective values of educational and medical missions, whether commerce or missions is the greater force in civilization, or that missions are the greatest of aids to International Peace. Already three of our young people have been stirred to a desire to be prospective workers on the field. Little can we tell what fruit this seed will bring forth! We thank God and take great courage at this time to go on with our work of sowing, leaving the harvest unto Him.

REPORT OF THE LITTLE HELPERS.

I know that you will rejoice with us that so many of our young plants are bearing much fruit. The annual service has been held for the first time in the Church of the Ascension, Epiphany, St. Peter's, St. Matthew's, Detroit, and Grace Church, Mount Clemens. Others are planning to hold meetings in the Fall. With one exception, we had fine weather for our services. Many mothers brought their little ones. The Woman's Auxiliary of the parish was the hostess in all the new work, and by their presence and charming hospitality, made the service and the social hour one long to be remembered. The secretary, relieved of her duty as hostess, was able to visit with each Little Helper and his mother.

Epiphany holds the banner this year. There were thirty-five Little Helpers present; twenty-eight mothers, besides the members of the Auxiliary. Their offering was \$18.00.

Although it takes a great deal of time to go to each parish, it is worth while. The little groups are appreciative; the boys are just as interested as the girls, which cannot be said of all the men of our Church. The Church is making a mistake when she neglects the missionary education of her boys. Why cannot something be done for the boy of thirteen and fifteen years, as is being done for the girls of that age. The very latest item in missionary information is that the women are to interest and educate the men of the Church in the study of missions. Members of the Auxiliary know a great deal about missions, but do their husbands? The Little Helpers' Department educates the boy as well as the girl.

We have lost a number of secretaries and associate's secretaries from our list of workers. Mrs. Clara K. Armstrong, after several years of faithful and efficient service as secretary; Miss Bertha Lloyd, associate secretary of St. John's, parish, spared neither time nor herself in doing excellent work for the Master. Mrs. Fox for nearly nine years was the capable secretary of All Saints' Church, Pontiac. Mrs. Applebe, of St. John's, Saginaw, after a short time in office, was persuaded by her rector to give her entire time to the older guild, but she did not resign until a new secretary had been appointed. At first we absolutely refused to accept the resignation of our oldest secretary, not in years, but in service, Mrs. Lyman Johnston, of Wyandotte—a veritable tower of strength to us; quiet, faithful, and very efficient; always the first to send in her report. We have worked together for nearly seventeen years in this beautiful work, and she never disappointed us—but there are rays of light for the Little Helpers of Wyandotte. Mrs. Johnston will continue to assist the new secretary, who is a splendid worker. She is keeping up the good standard set by her predecessor, Wyandotte sent in the first report! Mrs. Brennan was transferred from St. Joseph's to Grace Church, Mount Clemens, and she is doing splendid work among Christ's little ones there.

Death has not entered our circle of Little Helpers this year, but the peace which passeth all understanding came to Mrs. Emily V. N. Walker, of Christ Church, Detroit, who in our younger days was a living friend and helper. "May light perpetual shine on her."

We have two requests to make to the Parish Presidents of the Auxiliary: Please do not put on committees or box work any secretary or associate secretary of the Little Helpers. They have been detailed by their rector for special work; the work of the Little Helpers.

Please ask for a report from the Secretary of the Little Helpers in your parish every month.

To the new secretaries and associate secretaries we extend a hearty greeting and congratulate you on your opportunity for service. Faithful stewardship must mean self-sacrifice and denial, but you must remember you are about the King's business and that the service we render Him must always be our best. It is demanded of us that we bear fruit. So shall ye be disciples. The secretary must do her work with simple purpose, in faith, because the promise is to the faithful servant. When Jesus came as a missionary, He came as a Child, and a large part of missionary work concerns itself with children. They must be taught that religion is not for them alone, but that each one is a trustee of a precious treasure to be shared with others. There is a *noblesse oblige* about missions. The child who knows the story of the introduction of Christianity to his ancestors will want to send the tidings of great joy to the rest of the world. Imagination, that great door through which thought passes from the seen to the unseen must be made use of. The Little Helpers must hear the angels sing o'er the Judean hills: "Behold, I bring you tidings of great joy which shall be to you and to all people." What we grown-ups need is more vision. How many people are living starved lives, sympathies blunted to disuse, emotions shallow and limited, capacity for deep friendships and large interests grow less and less each year. They are daily feeding their souls on the little, the petty, the mean in nature. Those who are always going to do something never arrive anywhere. God has chosen to work through the human. By work alone do we become true women; useful to the world. There is no failure. All we have to do is to sow the seed. Having done this, God will, in his own good time, permit us to see the harvest. "Feed my lambs," said Christ, but we must come as pupils, as the disciples did, to learn at the feet of the Master. We must go because we were made for work. Go, because Christ sends us and can use our petty and mean talents just as He used the loaves and fishes of the little boy. Go, work, because the little ones are waiting for you and He has promised to be with you. Living leaders awakens life. Life begets life. We must encourage and enthuse every Little Helper to be about their Father's business. Bishop Brent says: "The greatest world enterprise is that of Missions or the purpose to make the evangelization of the human race the dominant note in life." How can we help our Little Helpers to see that vision? We must lead him by the hand up the mountain-side, higher and higher until, as he gazes upwards, he sees the vision of the Christ Himself. His heart will be on fire with zeal and love. His life will be consecrated to the needs of a needy world and he cries:

"I'll go where you want me to go, dear Lord,
Over mountain or vale or sea;
I'll do what you want me to do, dear Lord,
I'll be what you want me to be."

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY OF THE MICHIGAN BRANCH OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

Madam President and Ladies:

During the year 1914-1915 there have been nine meetings of the Junior leaders and officers with the average attendance of ten. There have been three general meetings with fourteen, seven, and fifteen branches responding to the roll call.

The first general meeting was held in November, the object being to view the articles contributed to the Christmas boxes. These boxes were sent by the Juniors:—one to Vieques, Porto Rico, another to Pittsboro, North Carolina, and the third to Tarboro, North Carolina.

The second general meeting was held in February, the occasion being the United Offering stereopticon lecture given by Miss Jessie Hendrie.

The third general meeting was held on the afternoon of May the eighth. The Rev. H. H. Fox officiated. After the Junior delegates had read their very interesting reports, the Bishop gave his annual address explaining the uses made of the money contributed by the Juniors. This address was followed by a stereopticon lecture by the Rev. C. E. Betticher on Alaska. Both the pictures and the lecture were most enjoyable. Refreshments were served at the close of the meeting.

A corporate communion of Junior leaders and officers was held September nineteenth, five days after the first meeting.

At the first meeting, the Christmas boxes were discussed, reports were given in regard to the Lake Geneva conference, and tea was served in honor of Miss Alice Alexander, who was leaving shortly for New York.

The October meeting was taken up with miscellaneous business. The Interdenominational Institute was announced and attendance urged.

At the November meeting, Miss Margaret Burton, one of the leaders of the Interdenominational Institute, spoke to us, telling us stories of oriental lives which had been influenced by Christianity.

The Rev. W. L. Torrance spoke on The School of Religion and its Relation to the Junior Auxiliary, at our December meeting.

The January meeting was occupied with preparing for the Mission Study Institute, and with plans for the general meeting with the United Offering lecture.

A service of intercessory prayer was held at the February meeting.

The March meeting was taken up with miscellaneous business.

In April, Miss Helen Edwards gave an exhibit and explanation of manual work.

The annual meeting was held on May eighth at ten o'clock. The reports of the officers and special departments showed development in several lines, especially in regard to the Young People's Work, and in educational opportunities; pledges were made and officers for the ensuing year elected.

We regret the retirement of Miss Frances Fraser as treasurer. She has served in this capacity most faithfully and efficiently for ten years. After the meeting the leaders and officers adjourned to luncheon.

The following branches have withdrawn: Christ Church and The Church of the Epiphany, Detroit; St. Paul's Church, Jackson; All Saints' Church, Pontiac; St. Andrew's Church, Ann Arbor. We have four new and promising branches to add to our list: One at St. Columba's Mission, Detroit; St. Stephen's Church, Wyandotte; St. James' Church, Grosse Ile; and the Church of Our Savior, Leesville. This makes our present number 21, as in 1913-1914.

The emphasis for this year has been placed on education. Several Junior leaders attended the Interdenominational Institute in October. About ten leaders attended the Junior class at our own Institute held January 22, 23, 24. The class was led by Miss Elizabeth Thomas. There were two text books used: The Building of the City, by Arthur Gray, for the older Juniors, and How the Cross Goes Around the World, by the Rev. Phillips Osgood, for the younger members. Twenty-two Junior Mission Study Classes were conducted during Lent, this number far exceeds that of any other year.

Next year we hope to bring about a more direct connection between the Junior Auxiliary and the Sunday School, keeping in mind the work among the boys.

REPORT OF THE YOUNG WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, INCLUSIVE
OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S ASSOCIATION OF
THE DIOCESE OF MICHIGAN.

The first general meeting of the Young Woman's Auxiliary was held at the home of Mrs. Benjamin Fish, 766 Second Avenue, on Thursday evening, October fifteenth, 1914. Miss Emily Tillotson, who addressed the Woman's Auxiliary in the Province at an afternoon meeting, made her plans inclusive of the evening; so that the young women had the pleasure of both meeting and hearing her. Delegates from Chicago, Jacksonville, Ill., Indianapolis, Toledo, Port Huron, and Michigan City were present; each enthusiastically responded to the request for a few moments' talk. That the gathering at this time had been profitable to the organization, we could not doubt after the gracious words of approval from our Diocesan President, Mrs. Stevens.

Mrs. Charles D. Williams extended a cordial invitation to the Auxiliary to meet at her home, November tenth. This was a special meeting and one of unusual pleasure and interest.

Miss Margaret Burton, National Secretary for Y. W. C. A., and in charge of Oriental student work, talked most informally, delighting her hearers with interesting accounts of the Orientals' life.

The second regular meeting was held at the Cathedral House, November 16, when supper was served and one of the finest Christmas boxes the children of Columbia, Tennessee, had ever received was packed.

One of the active branches contributing to this box was a Young People's Society, and as some of these young men and women were to have their share in a programme which had been carefully prepared, there was an invitation extended to boys' clubs and young men of the various parishes. About one hundred and twenty-five were in attendance, a large percentage of which were boys. In consideration of this successful initial step, which was taken to encourage a broader scope to the work, it was believed that only greater aims would qualify.

For the following date of coming together, do we wish to consider plans for a mass meeting? This was an unlooked-for suggestion, but it was generally discussed and favored.

The invitation would be extended to all young people within the church, of high school age and over.

A committee representing every parish in Detroit met at the home of Miss Thomas December 14. The enthusiasm and sincere interest which was brought out through general discussion, made this a memorable event. At this time an organization committee was chosen, and a constitution was framed.

The committee in charge of the mass meeting secured Bishop Williams and the Rev. C. L. Ramsay as speakers.

The meeting was held January 21 at the Cathedral House. About three hundred young people were in attendance. The purpose of this society was then founded on Fellowship, Service, Study and Prayer.

March eighth was the date of the next general meeting. This was held at St. John's Parish House, and between one hundred and one hundred and sixty young people attended. Deaconess Goodwin, from the Church Missions House, and representing student volunteer work, gave a most wonderful address; her subject was "Enthusiasm."

There will be two boxes sent this year; one will go to Lydia, Virginia, the other destination not yet decided.

A committee composed of two representatives from each parish, representing the Young People's Association of the Diocese of Michigan, met March 18 to elect officers for the year. Palm Sunday, March 28, was chosen for corporate communion.

Two courses of mission study, including The Homes of the World and The Social Aspects of Foreign Missions, were successfully presented to thirteen groups of young people.

Mrs. C. R. Pancoast of Germantown, Philadelphia, Secretary and Treasurer of the Woman's National Council, St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo, Japan, has consented to give an illustrated talk to this organization, May 19. This meeting is to be held at Christ Church House, the address to be preceded by a supper.

Such unusual activities as have characterized the entire year's programme, inspires joyousness in service and is a helpful record encouraging to those within and beyond the Diocese.
