CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

This Association shall be called the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECTS.

The objects of this Association are to unite the branches in a common interest; to diffuse missionary intelligence and missionary activity among the women of the Diocese; to encourage the formation of new branches and to collect funds for various missionary purposes.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERS.

All baptised women of the Diocese who desire to be members, will be so regarded.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, five Vice-Presidents, (one to be chosen from each Convocation), a Recording Secretary and Treasurer, a Corresponding Secretary, a Diocesan Treasurer, a Domestic Treasurer, a Foreign Treasurer, a Treasurer of the United Offering and the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, who together with the President of the Junior Auxiliary and the Head of the Little Helpers shall form an Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V.—MEETINGS.

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be held on the first Monday and Tuesday after the first Sunday in May.

Other meetings shall be held at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI.—QUORUM.

At Executive meetings, five members, and at Association meetings, twenty members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VII.—AMENDMENTS.

This constitution may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all members present; the proposed amendments having been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended, suspended or repealed at any regular meeting or annual meeting by a two-thirds majority vote.

BY-LAWS

ELECTIONS, APPOINTMENTS.

SECTION 1. The officers, including the Auditors, shall be elected at each annual meeting. At the meeting preceding the annual meeting an informal ballot shall be given to a nominating committee appointed by the President at said meeting. This informal ballot may be cast by every member of the Association.

SECTION 2. In case of the absence, resignation or death of an Executive officer, her place shall be filled by action of the Executive Committee. Such action to stand till the next annual meeting.

SECTION 3. Each regularly organized branch shall appoint two delegates to every meeting of the Association, that each branch may be represented, but all the members shall have an equal vote on all questions except the Annual Elections, when the APPOINTED DELEGATES ALONE shall vote.

PLEDGES.

SECTION 1. At the Annual Meeting each branch shall signify in writing the amount it will give during the following year, to be paid through the Treasurers of the Woman's Auxiliary.

SECTION 2. As it seems only reasonable that each branch shall contribute something towards the general expenses of the Society, all branches shall contribute as liberally as possible, the minimum amount for any branch being fifty cents a year.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The President shall preside at all meetings, and in her absence, the Vice-Presidents shall preside in the order of their succession.

SECTION 2. The Recording Secretary and Treasurer shall keep the minutes of all meetings; she shall receive and pay out, as necessary, the General Expense and Extension funds and such special funds as may be put in her care.

SECTION 3. The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, both of the Association and of the Executive Committee, and shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society.

SECTION 4. The Foreign, Domestic and Diocesan Treasurers; the Treasurer of the United Offering and the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, shall each receive the funds and manage the affairs of her own department. She shall conduct the correspondence incident to her work and shall procure and disseminate missionary intelligence relating to her own department.

COMMITTEES:

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

SECTION 1. All matters relating to the general welfare of the Society shall be referred to the Executive Committee. It shall appoint the Standing Committees which shall co-operate with it.

SECTION 2. Five Standing Committees shall be appointed by the Executive Committee each year after the annual meeting.

A Committee on Extension to consist of the Vice-Presidents and two other members. A Program Committee, an Educational Committee for Mission Study, a Diocesan Box Committee and a Hospitality Committee.

The Committee on Extension shall superintend the work of arranging for meetings in different parts of the Diocese in the interest of forming new branches and strengthening the old ones.

The Program Committee shall make a plan for the meetings of the Association during the year, and provide speakers, subject to the advice of the Executive Committee.

The Educational Committee for Mission Study shall arrange for Mission Study Classes throughout the Diocese, give all information regarding the work, and take charge of the Missionary Library.

The chairman of this committee shall be called the Educational Secretary.

The Diocesan Box Committee shall supply lists of boxes, obtained from the Church Missions House, to parishes wishing them; shall have charge of the preparation of any general Diocesan Box, and shall present the combined annual box report of all the parishes.

The Committee on Hospitality shall arrange for the entertainment of delegates attending the various meetings.

ANNUAL REPORTS.

Each officer shall present a written annual report.

All accounts shall be audited before the annual meeting.

ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT.

This year, at our annual meeting, we miss the presence of the Rev. William S. Sayres, the faithful General Missionary in the Diocese, whose death, on May 6, 1916, brought sorrow to many hearts.

Dr. Sayres' reports of his work, in which the members of the Auxiliary were so deeply interested, and which they always liberally supported, were one of the features of each annual meeting, and his cheerful, optimistic counsel is sadly missed. The amount of good accomplished by this loyal soldier and servant of the Church cannot be estimated, and the tribute adopted in his memory is the expression of each individual member.

A fund, to be called the William S. Sayres Memorial Fund, to be raised by the Woman's Auxiliary during the next two years, will be invested, and the income used to perpetuate the work throughout the diocese, to which he devoted his life since his appointment, in 1899, as General Missionary.

Out of respect to the memory of Dr. Sayres, the Auxiliary members from the entire diocese, who came for the opening session of the annual meeting of the Auxiliary, attended the funeral services held at St. John's Church, Detroit, and the Monday afternoon and evening meetings were not held.

The Auxiliary deeply regrets the departure from Detroit of Miss Emily S. Paddock, who has served with such efficiency as Secretary and General Treasurer for the past twelve years, and also regrets that Mrs. Joseph Taylor, the devoted Corresponding Secretary for the past thirteen years, finds that, as a result of her recent serious illness, the necessity has arisen for a rest from many activities which have been given such constant attention. We all rejoice that the opportunity has been given to benefit by the services of these, our faithful co-workers, and we know their interest in the Auxiliary will always continue.

The reports of all officers and workers are full of interest and are commended to your careful attention.

We are all especially interested in the work for our young people throughout the diocese, and know their endeavors will receive the needed support.

In October, 1916, we are to have the inspiration which always comes from attendance at the General Convention of the Church, when our United Offering for 1916 will be presented, and notices will be sent concerning arrangements to be made for our stay in St. Louis. It is hoped there will be a large attendance of Auxiliary members in Michigan—to honor the fiftieth anniversary of the consecration of the Rt. Rev. Daniel Sylvester Tuttle, our beloved presiding Bishop.

In considering the reports presented, will not each member resolve to use her own personal effort to strengthen the Auxiliary work during the coming year, in every department, and to make not only parish and diocesan work important, but, most of all, the entire work of the extension of the Church throughout the world.

ANNUAL REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY.

The thirty-sixth annual meeting of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, was held in St. John's Church House, May 6 and 7, 1915. Thirty-seven branches of the Auxiliary were represented. At the afternoon session, May 6, annual reports from all departments were read. In the evening an informal reception was held in the Parish House. Mrs. Charles D. Williams, the clergy of St. John's Church, the officers of the Woman's Auxiliary, and the Rev. C. E. Betticher, of the Tanana Valley Mission, Alaska, received the guests.

Friday morning, May 7, at 9 o'clock, in St. John's Church, Bishop Williams administered the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rev. Herbert H. Fox.

The Auxiliary convened immediately after the service, in the Parish House, and listened to addresses from Bishop Williams and Dr. Sayres, the general missionary, after which business was resumed.

In the afternoon, immediately following luncheon, the Rev. Charles E. Betticher, special speaker of the day, told of the splendid work being accomplished in Alaska, under conditions that are often most difficult, and illustrated his address with many interesting stereopticon pictures.

Since the last annual meeting there have been eight regular monthly meetings, two of which have been all day meetings; six meetings of the Executive Committee, two special meetings, one Quiet Morning, and one corporate Communion service.

Thirty-six parishes have been represented during the year through their delegates—seventeen city branches and nineteen out-of-town branches.

September 21, 1915, St. Matthew's Day, the members of the Auxiliary came together in St. John's Church for a Corporate Communion.

September 27, the regular monthly meeting was held in St. Columba Mission. Interesting and instructive talks were given on "The Origin and Progress of the Woman's Auxiliary," by Mrs. Robert E. Frazer and Mrs. Rufus W. Clark.

October 23, 1915, a special meeting was called in St. John's Church House to hear Bishop Kinsolving, of Southern Brazil, tell of the work in his diocese, and Dr. Rudolf Teusler, of St. Luke's General Hospital, Tokyo, Japan, tell of the work and needs of that hospital.

October 25, the Diocesan Auxiliary met in St. Paul's Church, Flint, where an all-day meeting was held, with a splendid representation from twenty parishes. A delegation of twenty-four women went from Detroit, representing eight parishes.

Mrs. William A. Atkinson gave a stereopticon lecture on the mission work our Church is doing in this country.

November 29, the monthly meeting was held in St. Mary's Church, and reports of the meetings of the Provincial Synod of the Mid West, which were held in Chicago early in October, were given by Mrs. Fred-eric B. Stevens and Miss Elizabeth Thomas.

December 27, the monthly meeting was held in St. George's Church. The special subject for the afternoon program was "The Two Ends of a Missionary Box," and was in charge of Miss Annie Condon, of Ann Arbor, fourth vice-president.

January 31, in St. Paul's Cathedral House, an all day meeting was held, commencing with the Holy Communion at nine o'clock in the Cathedral. The date of this meeting fell on the thirty-fifth anniversary of the

founding of the St. Paul's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, which added much interest to the meeting. Immediately after the luncheon, addresses were made by Mrs. Justin E. Emerson and Mrs. Rufus W. Clark, reviewing the history of the Auxiliary in St. Paul's Church and the commencement and growth of mission study classes.

Miss Paddock had the special program for the afternoon, and told, in part, of her trip around the world, and of the missions she visited, illustrating her talk with stereopticon pictures.

February 28, the monthly meeting was held in St. John's Church House, the special program being "The United Offering and the Women Workers Supported by This Fund." Miss Jessie S. Hendrie gave an interesting lecture on this subject, with stereopticon slides.

March 22, Archdeacon Stuck spoke at a special meeting in St. John's Church House, telling of the great need of assistance at the present time for the hospitals in Alaska. Bishop Rowe was unable on account of ill health to make this appeal personally, and appointed Archdeacon Stuck to raise money for this special work in Alaska.

March 29, in St. Stephen's Church, Wyandotte, the regular monthly meeting was held. The special topic was "The work of the Junior Auxiliary in All Departments," explained by Miss Edith Maurice and Miss Julia Fish.

March 29, the Rt. Rev. Joseph M. Francis, D. D., Bishop of Indianapolis, conducted a Quiet Morning in St. Joseph's Church, taking for his general subject, "Belief in God."

April 24, a business meeting, in preparation for the annual meeting, was held in St. Alban's Church, Highland Park. An informal nominating ballot for officers took place and other necessary business was transacted.

During the year the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has been honored by having our President asked to preside at a conference outside this diocese. On December 16, 1915, Mrs. Stevens attended the Monthly Conference of Diocesan Officers of the Woman's Auxiliary, held in the Church Missions House, New York, and presided at the business session.

On October 14, 1915, Mrs. Stevens attended the meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary held in connection with the Synod of the Province of the Mid West, held in Chicago.

We record with regret the death of Miss Frances Isabel Chandler, September 12, 1915. For fifteen years, from 1889 to 1904, Miss Chandler was the able and faithful Recording Secretary and General Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary, and although obliged at that time to withdraw from the more active service in the Auxiliary, she never lost her interest in it.

In the death on May 6, 1916, of the Rev. William S. Sayres, D. D., the Woman's Auxiliary has lost one of its staunchest friends. Dr. Sayres was a firm believer in this organization, and what it stands for—Missions—and it was his hope to see a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in every parish in the diocese. Dr. Sayres was often present at our meetings, always giving a cheerful, optimistic report of his work, and always full of hope for the future of the Church in this diocese, throughout which he was greatly loved and will be greatly missed.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDENT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

For some years the Church Periodical Club moved along in about
the same groove. However, this year it has branched out in several
different directions. On the afternoon of November 17, 1915, in St.
John's Parish House, the illustrated lecture, "Around the World With
the Church Periodical Club," was given by the Rev. Herbert H. H. Fox,
after which an offering was made, the proceeds of which went towards
a Traveling Library, named in memory of Mrs. Thomas Clapp Pitkin, the
first President of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

This library, which contains eighty-five volumes of a miscellaneous
character, is the first one to be sent out by the Diocese. We trust that
many more will follow, in fact it is hoped that a second one will be sent
out in the early autumn.

This library has been sent to Tucumcari, New Mexico, in charge of
the Rev. Edward J. Hoering, and will remain there for six months, and
then go to another isolated community, to remain six months, and thus
travel from place to place, giving brightness and cheer to many lives.

It has been most satisfactory to have had so many parishes and indi-
viduals contribute to this object, thus making it a truly Diocesan Library.
At Christmas over five hundred Church calendars were sold by the
librarians.

Notwithstanding these additional activities, the regular work of the
club has gone on steadily increasing in efficiency. Three hundred and
fifty-seven periodicals have been sent away regularly to some given ad-
dress, nine hundred and seventy-two books, among which was a complete
set of the Encyclopedia Britannica, six thousand and seventy cards and
pictures, and twenty boxes and barrels, all sent to various parts of our
own country, including our island possessions, and to foreign lands.

Six conferences of librarians have been held and a detailed report of
the work in this Diocese has been prepared. These conferences have
proved most helpful in unifying the work. We only wish that it were
possible for all the librarians to be present at these meetings.

It is with pleasure that we report the appointment of a librarian in St. Phillip's Church, Detroit; St. Stephen's, Wyandotte, and Trinity, Bay City, the latter having been without a librarian for some time.

We wish to thank Bishop Williams for his kindness in allowing us to use his picture on the Church calendars which we issued; the Rev. Herbert H. H. Fox for giving the lecture on the Church Periodical Club; our President, Mrs. Stevens, not only for her gifts, but also for the time and thought she gave to the selection of books for the Traveling Library; the Librarians for their faithful and untiring interest and hearty co-operation. Especial mention should be made of the work of the Library and Printing Committees.

We also wish to thank the Woman's Auxiliary and Junior Auxiliary, as well as every individual who has contributed to the club. Without this generous support it would be impossible to carry on this important work.

REPORTS OF VICE-PRESIDENTS DETROIT CONVOCATION
AND REPORT OF THE EXTENSION COMMITTEE.

There have been two committee meetings held by the extension committee, one on October 26, 1915, at Flint, at the time the all-day Diocesan meeting was held there, and the other on January 31, 1916, when the all-day meeting was held in St. Paul's. At the first meeting all the Vice-Presidents were present excepting from the Northern Convocation.

The work of this committee is to organize new auxiliaries and to be of help, wherever it can, in strengthening the work already organized. In the Fall, branches were organized at Canton and Tecumseh, through the efforts of Rev. Frederick Hewitt and Mrs. Hewitt. These places are in the Southern Convocation. In the Saginaw Valley Convocation, Mrs. Mitchell organized a branch at Deckerville, in the fall, and in the Detroit Convocation, Mrs. Stevens and Miss Warriner went to Algonac on May 3, 1916, when a branch was formed there. We welcome these new branches at this, their first annual meeting, and trust that the work will be a blessing not only to the women who have come into the work, but to their parishes and the missionary work as well.

Visits have been made at Ann Arbor, Mt. Clemens, Birmingham, Ypsilanti, Detroit, St. Andrew's, Trinity, Church of the Epiphany, St. Mary's, St. Alban's, from this Convocation.

The request is again made that branches having printed programs send to the chairman of this committee, as it helps in keeping track of the work being done and in giving suggestions to other parishes.

The Extension Committee stands ready to be of any service possible to the branches throughout the Diocese. Will not the women already interested help to interest more women in the spread of the Gospel through the Auxiliary.

CENTRAL CONVOCATION.

During the year 1915-1916, a convocational meeting was held in St. Paul's Church, Flint, on October 27, 1915. Central Convocation was well represented, four church members coming from Durand, where as yet no branch has been formed. The meeting was both interesting and successful, and we were most hospitably entertained by the ladies of St. Paul's Church.

Central Convocation has put forth many efforts through the year toward the formation of branches, and remains hopeful, if not altogether successful.

During the past year there have been sent out fifty letters and post cards, twenty-five year books, and programs and printed matter, when requested or required.

SAGINAW VALLEY CONVOCATION.

The work of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Saginaw Valley has gone steadily onward. Your vice-president has been able to cover a little more ground and feels that there has been a better spirit of co-operation shown this year. Letters and urgent appeals have not always brought response, but this should not unduly discourage us because it has been the history of all missionary endeavor. Encouragement, however, has come from the increasing number of invitations to present the work to the different branches. Such requests hearten the missionary to put forth her very best efforts.

May 17, 1915, I was invited to a large meeting of Trinity branch, Bay City, held at the home of Mrs. I. N. Baker. Again on February 28, 1916, the same branch asked me to give a report of the Diocesan Mission Study Institute at another well attended meeting, held at the home of Mrs. O'Neil.

I had the pleasure, August 24, 1915, of attending a splendid meeting of the Petoskey branch in the Diocese of Western Michigan, which was held at Edgewater, on Little Traverse Bay. Twelve dioceses were represented that afternoon. The speaker, Miss Elizabeth Matthews, Educational Secretary of the Diocese of Southern Ohio, inspired us all with a desire to attend one of the Summer Conferences, as she described the work of the interdenominational study classes, and told of the inspiring addresses and of the quiet hours of devotion which she had so greatly enjoyed at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin.

October 26, 1915, with a number of Saginaw and Bay City ladies, I went to Flint to attend the Diocesan meeting held at St. Paul's Church. Much good is coming from these large sectional meetings in the Central and Northern convocations each October. Mrs. Bennett is to be congratulated that so much was offered in the Central Convocation at Flint, and that so many came to receive the benefit and to enjoy the hospitality of St. Paul's branch.

November 13, 1915, your vice-president started out on a little missionary journey, with Deckerville as an objective point. Dean Montanus kindly sent word of my coming to Rev. and Mrs. Chester C. Kemp, of Bad Axe, who not only made the few hours I was there pleasant, but who arranged to have Mrs. A. E. Sleeper, President of the Woman's Society of St. Paul's Church, meet with us for a conference. Late in the afternoon I went on to Deckerville, where I was most hospitably entertained at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Clement, and where, that evening, in spite of severe cold and many being ill, five ladies gathered together to organize a branch of the Auxiliary. You will be very sorry to learn that soon afterward death claimed one of the most ardent members, and that another is leaving Deckerville. Discouragements have overwhelmed them; however, I sincerely hope that the start made will not be given up and that other workers may rally to their need. Mr. and Mrs. Clement most kindly took me by automobile to Sandusky the next morning, where we met the Rev. and Mrs. Clarence Tinker. They were very hospitable, but Mr. Tinker felt that it would not be possible to undertake any Auxiliary work there at present.

On Epiphany I was invited to a meeting of Calvary branch, Saginaw, held at the rectory with Rev. and Mrs. Andrew F. Schultzberg. Out of that meeting grew a Lenten study class, averaging nine. Eleven enrolled, but after the second lesson one member was kept from attending because of an accident. No one who was privileged to attend this class, so ably led by Mr. Schultzberg, would willingly forego another, next Lent, I feel sure. We used the King's Highway, by Helen Barrett Montgomery, as our text-book.

The Institute for Mission Study, held January 28, 29 and 30, 1916, at St. John's Parish House, Detroit, was very valuable to me, and especially so to our delegate from St. Paul's, Saginaw, Miss Jane Mershon, who was to lead the mission study class for the first time this year. This class enrolled eight, and had an average attendance of six. It was very enjoyable, and, we felt, very profitable. While in Detroit we were able to attend the Diocesan meeting held at St. Paul's Cathedral Church House on January 31.

February 16, at the request of the rector, Dean Montanus, I was again given the opportunity to speak of the January Institute to St. John's branch, Saginaw. Wherever I go I strive to arouse an interest in this most important part of our work, for where we are interested we can always find ways and means to advance those interests.

Effort is being made both at St. John's and St. Paul's, Saginaw, to establish the work of the Little Helpers.

The Church Periodical Club has gained a stronger hold and a number helped to supply books requested for the Diocesan Traveling Library.

Three conferences of the Extension Committee have been attended. I have written fifty-nine letters and twelve post cards and have received twenty-eight letters and eighteen post cards. Printed matter has been sent out liberally.

I can not bring this report to an end without making the plea that we put God's work first. How do we accept the gift of Life Eternal so freely given if we do not, with all our hearts, desire to send it to others? The work of the Woman's Auxiliary is the extension of Christ's Kingdom.

SOUTHERN CONVOCATION.

REPORT OF PROGRAM COMMITTEE.

The aim of the Program Committee this year was to present the missionary work of the Church we were expected to do, as an Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

Tuesday, September 21, 1915, St. Matthew's Day, a Corporate Communion Service was held in St. John's Church, the rector, Rev. Herbert H. Fox, celebrant.

On Monday, September 27, at St. Columba Mission, of Christ Church, Detroit, a new Auxiliary branch was about to be organized, and was a most appropriate place to hold a meeting. Those who attended this meeting were afforded an excellent program. A most interesting and instructive bit of history on the subject, "Origin and Progress of the Woman's Auxiliary," was given by Mrs. Rufus W. Clark and Mrs. Robert E. Frazer.

The all-day out-of-town meeting was held Tuesday, October 26, at St. Paul's Church, Flint. There was a large attendance, many coming in from parishes in the Convocation. The program was in charge of Mrs. C. B. Crampton, of Flint. The afternoon speaker was Mrs. Atkinson, diocesan educational secretary.

At St. Mary's Church, Monday, November 29, "Echoes, Legislative, Practical, Inspirational, from the Synod of the Province of the Midwest," held October 14, in the city of Chicago, were given. Several members of the Auxiliary who attended the Synod meetings gave reports.

Under direction of Miss Annie Condon, Fourth Vice-President, "Two Ends of the Missionary Box" was presented at St. George's Church, Monday, December 27. Providing articles, arranging and the packing of a box, was told by Miss Laura G. Smith, St. Luke's Church, Ypsilanti. Its reception and acknowledgement was most delightfully expressed in a letter written by Mrs. C. W. Blatchford, of East Tawas.

Another all-day session, beginning with Corporate Communion, Rev. Frederick Edwards, celebrant, was held in St. Paul's Cathedral Monday, January 31, 1916. The afternoon program was in charge of Miss Emily S. Paddock. Her subject, "Our Missionary Work Around the World." Miss Paddock showed pictures of life in the Orient, which quickened interest in the extension of the Kingdom throughout the world.

"United Offering and Women Workers Supported by This Fund" was the subject of an illustrated talk given by Miss Jessie S. Hendrie at St. John's Parish building the afternoon of Monday, February 28. The meeting was well attended.

A Quiet Morning service conducted by the Rt. Rev. Joseph M. Francis, D. D., Bishop of Indianapolis, was held March 29 at St. Joseph's Church. General subject, "Belief in God: What It Implies," was presented in four meditations: "The Nature of Belief," "Personal Fellowship," "Personal Responsibility," "Personal Holiness." The Bishop spoke of our relationship to God, and as we come into closer communion we must feel responsibility to Him.

An out-of-town monthly meeting to present "Work of the Juniors in all Departments, including the Little Helpers," was held in St. Stephen's Church, Wyandotte Monday, March 27, at 2:30 o'clock. Miss Edith H. Maurice, President of the Junior Auxiliary, was in charge of the program. Miss Elizabeth Thomas, Miss Julia Fish and Miss Catherine Johnson, a member of the Wyandotte Junior Auxiliary, spoke on the work now being done in their branches.

The last meeting of the year, a business one, was held Monday, April 24, at St. Alban's Church. The entire time was taken up with preparing for the annual meeting May 8-9 in Christ Church, Detroit.

Tea was served at each meeting.

Twenty-seven letters, ten postals and fourteen programs were sent out.

With grateful appreciation to those who assisted in making the year's program profitable, the committee respectfully submit the report.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

The nations of the world have been spread out before us this year. In this day of large things, when internationalism is in the throes of birth, how impossible it would be to keep our minds from the thought of the Church in its relation to these various members of the world-family! We have tried to think of ourselves as in an airship, looking down upon the different peoples of the family of our Heavenly Father, and to see the world as God sees it, with its infinite possibilities and its universal yearning. As each child shares the love of the human parent, how much more does God desire "abundant life" for all His children.

At this time of distress, which is felt all over the world, when it is seen that all else has failed the world indeed seems as never before to be waiting for the Way of Peace and Love.

The very interesting diagram prepared by Mrs. Rufus N. Crosman for the study class at St. Paul's Cathedral shows us how many of the more than sixteen millions of the world population have heard the Gospel message—only about one-third. From such a graphic picture we feel anew the greatness of the need of carrying the Light into the world's dark corners. Perhaps the greatest gain of our Lenten study in 1916 has been a more definite knowledge of the specific problem of each of the world's non-Christian peoples—the animistic races, like Africa and those of the islands of the sea; the ancient peoples of Oriental culture who yet lack the compelling Love of the Christ-life in the human soul; and the great Mohammedan world, least touched of all by the Spirit of Love and Service.

With more definite knowledge comes the possibility of more definite prayer. And it must be accomplished. We feel with Tennyson that

"More things are wrought by prayer
Than this world dreams of.

* * * * *

For so the whole round earth is every way
Bound by gold chains about the feet of God."

And it is this for which we are striving. Truly this is the mission of the Church.

While most of the classes have been seeking to get this world-vision of *Evangelization*, our young people have been occupied with considering our own nation and its *Christianization*. And several groups have been even more intensive in approaching the various problems in connection with the Christianization of our own great city of Detroit. We have come to realize that while foreign missions, so called, are a temporary matter, since we are seeking to plant a native Church in every country, home missions will continue all over the world until the Kingdom has indeed come through all the world, and every city is one "where life is worth living" for every soul within its borders.

The Educational Committee was most gratified to enroll among its leaders this year a number of young Churchmen, who spent three evenings with the Educational Secretary by way of preparation for meeting with groups of the Young People's Association.

The Fourth Annual Institute for Mission Study was held January 28-30, 1916, in St. John's Parish House. The sessions were opened at 2 o'clock on Friday afternoon by the rector of St. John's, and closed with an informal tea at the home of the Bishop, on Sunday afternoon, at the close of the third two-hour session of the Institute. The total attendance was 64, including the six leaders and two librarians. The places represented were Bay City, Birmingham, Clinton, Saginaw, Tecumseh, Wyandotte, Ypsilanti, Detroit and Windsor, Ontario.

The distinguishing features of the year 1915-16 have been:

1. World-vision. A realization that "an age like this calls for world-vision, world-knowledge and world-citizenship. And the highest form of patriotism finds its expression not in national self-exaltation, but in world-sympathy and world-service."

2. Better organization.

We are glad to report that during the year 18 parishes, or about one-third of those parishes having branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese, have reported the names of parish Educational Secretaries. These officers will be the medium through whom the educational work of the parish is to be carried on. They in turn are expected to see that the study of missions is carried on in some way in each organization of the parish. Thus throughout the Church, in the words of Mr. Gray, a "mission study drive" may be accomplished. Compare a movement of this sort, conducted with all the efficiency of the destructive campaign in which our sister nations are now engaged, and we may well believe that "the only real preparedness is Internationalism, and the only real safety for our country is the safety of the world!" These secretaries have been prompt and painstaking in sending in the report blanks, thus ensuring a full and accurate report of the work done, which is appended, and will be reported to the Educational Department at the Church Mission House. A parish with a live Educational Secretary surely could not fail to meet its apportionment and more.

The parish Educational Secretary is often the chairman of the program committee. Ten printed programs have thus far been issued, which may be examined by any who are looking for suggestions along this line.

To the various Diocesan Educational Secretaries or committees of the Province of the Mid-West has been committed the task of acquainting their several dioceses with the advantages offered by the Lake Geneva Summer Conference. Each of the clergy, as well as all the branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Michigan, will receive, this week, literature regarding Lake Geneva Conference, which it is hoped will be even more serviceable to the Church people of this Province than it has yet been, though testimonials of the highest sort will be enclosed by prominent members of the Church.

3. Closer co-operation with other groups.

We have already spoken of the co-operation between the Educational Committee and the Social Service Commission of the diocese. The Church Club has expressed its intention of further stressing educational work, and the plans which are contemplated by them were presented to the committee by the Bishop's secretary at the Lenten luncheon of the committee, at which leaders, both men and women, were in attendance to the number of 18. The Parish Institute, which has been planned by the Diocesan Work Committee of the Church Club, has been participated in by a number of the Educational Committee. Your secretary has had a part in both of the Institutes held so far, and has, during the year, visited twelve different parishes, some of them a number of times, spoken before three other communions—Baptist, Methodist and Congregational, and attended a meeting of the Deanery of Lambton at Walpole Island, and made one visit to the Church Missions House. A member of the committee was given a farewell luncheon last June on the eve of her departure for India, where she is now engaged in the work of the Y. W. C. A. Another member of the committee, Miss Alice Alexander, to whom the foundation of the work of this committee is largely due, is also keeping us in touch with the work of the same organization, as well as the educational work in the diocese of Western New York.

It will be noted from the detailed list of classes which follows that there have been a number of "parish classes" this year. It is interesting to see that in the unifying of parish life, of which we hear a great deal nowadays, it is upon a larger knowledge of the Church's mission that all groups can unite. In a number of the parishes this may be the best way to begin the work.

A number of our Sunday schools have used the course on "Welfare," and the Cathedral Sunday school devoted the entire Lenten season to missionary study, in all its departments.

4. And most of all, we believe that the year has taught us the need of greater consecration, if we are to be used in this great work. Let us never forget that the coming of the Kingdom is to be accomplished, "not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts."

The members of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary assembled today for their annual meeting are saddened by the knowledge that one who for many years has been wont to meet with us on these occasions has passed from this life to the life beyond.

The Rev. William S. Sayres, D. D., who for the past seventeen years has been the General Missionary in the Diocese of Michigan, died at his home in Detroit in the early morning of the sixth of May, 1916, in the sixty-fifth year of his age. Coming to Detroit in 1893, after several years spent in missionary and parochial activities at home and abroad, he became assistant rector of St. John's Church, and later rector of St. Stephen's.

In 1890 he was appointed General Missionary for the Diocese of Michigan, and was actively engaged in fulfilling the duties of that arduous position until his last illness.

To us, who have known him as ever the warm friend of the Woman's Auxiliary, coming year after year to report progress and to give an account of the work so dear to his heart and to the hearts of the members of the Auxiliary, the sense of loss is great.

His ever-cheerful spirit amid his indefatigable labors, his earnest striving for the upbuilding of the Church, and the planting of new missions in the neglected parts of the Diocese, his readiness to undergo hardships in carrying on his work, his happiness when he could report some new branch of the Woman's Auxiliary formed as a result of his efforts, and his rejoicing when, in any way, he could aid suffering humanity, brought us into very close sympathy with his work and himself.

In his dealings with men he won respect and esteem by his strong fund of common sense, his tolerance of the honest opinions of others, and his possession of that most excellent gift of charity, which awoke a ready response in the hearts of many with whom he came in contact.

Dr. Sayles was a graduate of Dartmouth College, and in recognition of his worth received from that college the degree of Doctor of Divinity, in 1904, a fitting tribute, which gave him much pleasure.

To his afflicted family we tender our sincerest sympathy.

With the consolations afforded by the blessed Eastertide in mind, may we not at this time give thanks for the good example of this servant of our Lord, who, having finished his course in faith, now rests from his labors.

From the reports received I find that most all of the parishes held their annual parish meeting of Little Helpers, and the meetings were very successful, both in numbers and enthusiasm. In looking over the list of parishes I find that some of our largest branches have made no report, but said they would send in later; but all those who have contributed have done better than last year. Is not that a great cause for thankfulness to Almighty God and an added encouragement to begin another year of loyal service to the King of kings among His Little Helpers?

"The Master is come and calleth for thee" came the summons to George Becht, a Little Helper of Trinity parish. Quickly he arose and the little soul was gathered into the Everlasting Arms. So grows our membership in that sweet, blessed country. The Little Helpers' beloved friend, Rev. William Seaman Sayres, D. D., their first clerical friend, was called to his reward. His life was of the vitalizing, quickening sort. The beautiful and unselfish spirit remains with us, making duty seem easier and heaven nearer. He has gone, rich in the honors which earth bestows, and richly deserving them; gone with that highest of all honors, an abiding place in the memory of men. To my co-workers I wish I could express all that my heart feels for the faithfulness, loyalty and devotion each one of you have shown by your earnest work this year, and for the kind and loving messages you have sent me during my illness.

I was invited by the President of the Diocese of Pennsylvania to preside at a conference of Little Helpers' workers in Philadelphia. I received many new ideas which I will present to you. I was also present at the annual meeting of the Little Helpers of Long Island Diocese. It was such an interesting meeting. If all enjoyed it as much as I, then it was a glorious success. As I looked at the happy faces of the Little Helpers I thought, with all our different methods, our work is the same.

There is urgent need that we implant the faith so firmly in childhood that future shocks cannot destroy it, for the child must look up in loving reverence to his Heavenly Father if his faith is to be a mainspring for action as he tries to live helpfully among his fellow-men. The Little Helpers' work should be a Christian power house to pour into the world more and more of the Spirit of our Lord and Master, as they only can who so lately came from Him. It is His Spirit in their young lives that must speak. The little child is sitting where the Master placed him, in

your midst. The ages are in his keeping, his training is in yours. Is not that the greatest challenge of our time? I leave this thought with you. Learn from the child how to pray. He asks definitely for what he wants. The effectiveness of your work is the definiteness of your purpose. What am I here for, and what am I trying to do? Christ's decision was made because He was in touch with God and saw clearly and knew what God's will was for Him. Of Him that sent me. What an inspiration to know that you, my co-workers, are sent of God.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY OF THE MICHIGAN BRANCH OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

Madam President and Members:

I have the honor to present to you the report of the Junior Auxiliary of the Diocese of Michigan for 1915 and 1916.

During the year there have been nine meetings of the Junior leaders and officers with the average attendance of about twelve. There have been three general meetings, with fifteen, and thirteen branches, responding to the roll call.

The first general meeting was held on November 13. The officers and leaders, numbering twenty-four, were joined by sixteen members of the clergy at luncheon, after which the branches assembled to look at the articles contributed to the Christmas box. This box was sent to the Indians at Wakpala, South Dakota. The Rev. Simson Auk Bingham, of St. John's Church, Walpole Island, addressed the branches.

The special general meeting was held on March 22, at St. John's Parish House, for the purpose of hearing Archdeacon Stuck, of Alaska, speak of the work in that country. Owing to the meeting being held on a school day, and the hardest snow storm of the season having occurred the day before, there were only about forty children present, a very good number under the existing circumstances.

The third general meeting will be held on May 13, when Miss S. E. Hopwood, of Anking, China, will speak to the branches.

At the first general meeting of officers and leaders, held at the home of Miss Maurice, Miss Trowbridge was asked to take charge of a Home Department of the Junior Auxiliary which was to be created. A program of the meetings for the year was made out, plans for a luncheon to which the clergymen were to be invited, at the November meeting, were made.

The October meeting was taken up largely with the subject, "The Motives of the Junior Auxiliary." The Auxiliary Hand Book was used as a basis of discussion.

At the December meeting Miss Maurice announced that there were more gifts presented than were needed for the Christmas box, so it was decided to send those gifts to the Rev. S. A. Brigham, of Walpole Island.

Miss McAuley read a splendid paper on the subject of the Juniors.

The January meeting was occupied in preparing for the Mission Study Institute. Miss Williams had missionary scrap books and plays on exhibition.

At the February meeting it was decided to take half of a box to go to the Girl's Training School, St. Paul's River, Liberia, West Africa, and another box to go to the Church of the Holy Spirit, Randlett, Utah, for next year. Miss Trowbridge sent a paper on China, which was read.

At the March meeting Rev. H. Hobart Barber spoke on the subject of prayer. He made a plea to us to make our prayers less formal, but to make them more real and heartfelt.

The April meeting was given over to a discussion of box work and to making plans for the annual meeting. Miss Virginia Smith, of St. Joseph's Church, read a fine paper on "A Junior's Idea of a Leader."

There has been one new branch of the Junior Auxiliary formed at Grace Church, Mt. Clemens, and the branches of All Saints', Pontiac, and Grace Church, Port Huron, have been reorganized.

This may not seem a very large addition to our forces this year, but, after all, strength does not always lie in numbers, and the success of the Junior Auxiliary is more dependent on the sincere devotion, and true missionary spirit of each individual member of that organization.

REPORT OF THE YOUNG WOMAN'S AUXILIARY AND THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S ASSOCIATION OF THE DIOCESE OF MICHIGAN.

The Young People's work for the year we report in regular order, with three general and three central committee meetings.

There has been a most gratifying evidence of extension and strengthening of parish societies.

Letters asking for a detailed account of organization methods have been received from the New York, Kentucky, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Maryland and Oklahoma dioceses.

With the emphasis which has generally been placed on the training of our girls in missions, the Michigan Diocese is a recognized leader in the plan of education, which includes all of its young people.

The box work, important among the activities of the Young Women's Auxiliary, is shared by the association.

One of the generous boxes, valued at \$240, for which our young people are now on record, went to St. James' Mission, Lydia, Virginia.

In November, when these gifts were sent, the diocesan organization was entertained by the young people of St. Andrew's Church.

As this was the first of the general meetings for the year, it was very significant to have this occasion one in every way memorable.

Study and Service were incorporated in three tableaux presented by several groups with much character and ability, thus defining the year's program.

The first tableau was entitled "Our Church and Our Country," with scene laid in Virginia, and the little band of pioneer churchmen assembled for their first communion service at Jamestown. Then some of the young people had visited the mountain districts of the South, and interpreted in a

very engaging way the full joyousness of the Christmas festival in the mission at Lydia, Virginia, where their gifts were going. The third tableau represented Dr. Teusler receiving the royal party sent from the Emperor with his gift for St. Luke's, in recognition of that which Christian missions had done for Japan.

Dr. Teusler was expected to speak at an association meeting in December, and came for that purpose, but important letters received, urging him to leave at once for Washington, changed his plans.

Feeling an interest in the work, he wrote a note to the young people expressing his regrets at not being able to keep his appointment, but hoped to be with them later in the year.

Having this change in the program to consider, Rev. H. W. Wells kindly consented to give an address and spoke of his travels in China and Japan.

The Young Woman's Auxiliary has not only maintained its regular standards, but in each parish group the interest seems to have deepened, and a more thoughtful attitude is evident in all their activities.

St. Matthew's has a branch which was organized in the fall, 1915.

The gifts this year will go to a large mission district in South Carolina, of which St. Paul's Mission, Graniteville, is the distributing point. Our young people will provide for 150 children.

In order to vary the regular plan outlined for the year, the occasional home meetings have been favored.

The Central Committee met for conference at the home of the secretary in March. Bishop Williams presided. A hearing was given to the several methods suggested in raising \$1,000, the amount pledged by the Young People's Association, toward the building of a children's ward for St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo, Japan.

Bishop Williams addressed the general association at St. Paul's Cathedral House in April and inspired the young people to have their campaign represent self-sacrifice and hard work. In this way a general good time event to follow would be much better enjoyed.

The campaign letter and design for collection cards are credited to two of our young men.

In the letter the appeal is made to "all interested in the spread of Christ's Kingdom among men, and in the efforts of Christians to relieve suffering humanity."

The young people met at the Cathedral the fourth Sunday in Lent for corporate communion. There were about 100 in attendance at this service.

Special prayers, asking for guidance and understanding of the work, were offered at a service held on St. Matthias' Day, when those directing and deeply interested in the Y. P. A. met for corporate communion at St. Paul's Cathedral. Rev. Cecil C. Purton was celebrant.

As an outcome of a Normal study class held during the Epiphany season, six parish groups secured young men leaders. The course was "Our Church and Our Country."

A service conducted by Bishop Williams will be held in June, in recognition of the fact that our young people have had a share in the extension of Christ's Kingdom. The offering for St. Luke's Hospital in Tokyo will be presented at this time.
