CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

This Association shall be called the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to The Presiding Bishop and Council.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECTS.

The objects of this Association are to unite the branches in a common interest; to promote the cause of Missions and Church Extension, Religious Education and Christian Social Service; to collect funds for these various purposes; to encourage the formation of new branches. Work must be done, each year, in the five fields of service, the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation and the World.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERS.

All baptized women of the Diocese who desire to be members will be so regarded.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, one to be chosen from each Archdeaconry, a Recording Secretary and General Treasurer, a Corresponding Secretary, a Diocesan Treasurer, a Domestic Treasurer, a Foreign Treasurer, a Treasurer of the United Thank Offering and the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, who with the President of the Church School Service League and the Head of the Little Helpers shall form the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V.—FISCAL YEAR.

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from December thirty-first to December thirty-first.

ARTICLE VI.—MEETINGS.

The annual meeting shall be held on the first Monday and Tuesday in May.

Other meetings shall be held at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII.—QUORUM.

At Executive Committee meetings five members and at Association meetings twenty members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII.—AMENDMENTS.

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all members present; the proposed amendments having been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended or repealed at any regular meeting or annual meeting by a two-thirds majority vote.

BY-LAWS

ELECTIONS, APPOINTMENTS.

SECTION 1. The officers, including the Auditors, shall be elected at each annual meeting. At the meeting preceding the annual meeting an informal ballot shall be given to a nominating committee appointed by the President at said meeting. This informal ballot may be cast by every member of the Association.

SECTION 2. In case of the absence, resignation or death of an Executive Officer, her place shall be filled by action of the Executive Committee, such action to stand until the next annual meeting.

SECTION 3. Each regularly organized branch shall appoint two delegates to every meeting of the Association, that each branch may be represented but all the members shall have an equal vote on all questions except the Annual Elections when the APPOINTED DELEGATES ALONE shall vote.

PLEDGES.

SECTION 1. At the annual meeting each branch shall signify in writing the amount it will give during the following year, to be paid through the Treasurers of the Woman's Auxiliary.

SECTION 2. As it seems only reasonable that each branch shall contribute something towards the general expenses of the Society, all branches shall contribute as liberally as possible, the MINIMUM AMOUNT for any branch being ONE DOLLAR a year.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The President shall preside at all meetings, and shall have general supervision of the work of the Auxiliary, and in her absence the Vice-Presidents shall preside in the order of their succession.

SECTION 2. The Recording Secretary and General Treasurer shall keep the minutes of all meetings; she shall receive and pay out, as necessary, the General Expense and the Extension Funds and such special funds as may be put in her care.

SECTION 3. The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, both of the Association and of the Executive Committee, and shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society.

SECTION 4. The Foreign, Domestic and Diocesan Treasurers, the Treasurer of the United Thank Offering and the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club shall receive the funds and manage the affairs of her own department. She shall conduct the correspondence incident to her own work and shall procure and disseminate missionary intelligence relating to her own department.

COMMITTEES:

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

SECTION 1. All matters relating to the general welfare of the Society shall be referred to the Executive Committee. It shall appoint the Standing Committees which shall co-operate with it.

SECTION 2. Seven Standing Committees shall be appointed by the Executive Committee each year after the annual meeting.

A Committee on Missions and Church Extension, a Committee on Religious Education, a Committee on Christian Social Service, a Committee on the Box Work and Bureau of Supplies, a Program and Publicity Committee, a Finance Committee and a Hospitality Committee.

The Committee on Missions and Church Extension shall promote missionary intelligence and missionary activity among the women of the Diocese and shall superintend the work of arranging for meetings in different parts of the Diocese in the interest of forming new branches and strengthening the old ones.

The Committee on Religious Education shall arrange for Mission Study classes throughout the Diocese and give all information regarding the work.

The Committee on Christian Social Service shall co-operate in the work of Christian Americanization, Hospital, Institutional and any other form of Christian Social Service.

The Committee on the Box Work shall supply lists of boxes obtained from the Church Missions House, to parishes wishing them; shall have charge of the preparation of any general Diocesan Box and present the combined annual box report of all the parishes. This Committee shall maintain a Bureau of Supplies.

The Program and Publicity Committee shall make a plan for the meetings of the Association during the year, provide speakers subject to the advice of the Executive Committee, be prepared to advise parish branches who may desire to have assistance in arranging their yearly programs and do all necessary publicity work.

The Finance Committee shall have charge of the raising of all special funds, unless some special committee has been appointed, and shall be charged with any other similar work requested by the Executive Committee.

The Hospitality Committee shall arrange for the entertainment of speakers and delegates attending the various meetings.

ANNUAL REPORTS.

Each officer shall present a written annual report, also providing a copy for the use of the Recording Secretary.

All accounts shall be audited before the annual meeting.

ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT.

The outstanding experience of the year 1919 was the wonderful inspiration given by the Triennial General Convention of the Church held in Detroit from October 8th, to the 24th.

At the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary many new measures were adopted which will enlarge the scope of the work, and will enable members to work for Missions and Church extension, as before, and to include religious education, and Christian social service, in their activities.

This change provides a more inclusive program, and an opportunity for every woman to engage in doing the special thing to which she inclines, or in which she may be best fitted to serve.

The delegates voted to form a Church Service League which is to be a federation of all the organizations for women and children in the diocese, but to be in no sense a merger, each organization is to retain its own identity.

As the proceedings of the Triennial are still fresh in our minds, and the reports are available in Church papers and magazines it is not necessary to give further details of action taken at that time.

The hearty thanks of all the Woman's Auxiliary was given to the Rev. Joseph A. Vance, D. D., the pastor, and to the Trustees of the First Presbyterian Church for their generosity in giving the use of their fine Church, with three large galleries and all their new parish buildings to the Women for their meetings—and for the afternoon teas, at which more than four thousand were served.

This gracious and hospitable kindness made it possible for the Auxiliary to hold all its meetings in one place, and as it was on the Woodward car line, and only three blocks from the place of meeting of the House of Deputies its convenient location was greatly appreciated.

Again we give our grateful thanks to all our good friends of the first Presbyterian Church.

To every woman who served in any way, during the Triennial, is given the highest praise. Always smiling, faithful and capable, untiring in their efforts to be useful and obliging, no words can adequately express what good they each did during those busy days in October, 1919.

To each one of that loyal company is extended heartfelt thanks, and to the women from the different parishes, and to the Junior Auxiliary members—so attractive in their white frocks, and bright blue ribbons with the words Junior Auxiliary printed in silver, who served the afternoon teas. How much pleasure these occasions afforded and what opportunities they provided to meet and talk with missionaries and workers from foreign lands, as well as those nearer home.

No one present will ever forget the great early morning gathering for the United Thank Offering Service, nor the Mass Meeting and addresses, on the afternoon of October ninth.

It was a high honour and privilege to have the General Con-

vention of the Church come to Detroit, and the awakening to the call of the new day is the response we must all make.

During the year the attendance and interest evidenced at all the meetings of the Diocesan Auxiliary has been gratifying.

The printed reports concerning all departments of Auxiliary work, as well as the activities of the Junior Auxiliary, Little Helpers, Young Woman's Auxiliary and the Episcopal Young People's Association in the Diocese of Michigan are full of inspiration, as well as a challenge for better work to be done each succeeding year.

Next year the Woman's Auxiliary is to celebrate fifty years of service, and on October 16, 1921, a corporate communion service is to be held in every parish throughout the country. During this year a thank-offering to be called The Emery Fund, will be gathered, as a trust fund, to be invested and the income to be used for missionaries at home on furlough, for board, medical care, study, or recreation.

The fund is to be given in grateful appreciation of the devoted service of three sisters, Miss Mary A. Emery, the first secretary of the Auxiliary, afterwards Mrs. A. T. Twing, Miss Julia C. Emery who served from 1876 to 1916 and Miss Margaret T. Emery who from 1874 to 1918, has been, most of the time, in charge of the box work.

Such a record is indeed rare and we will all desire to give substantial evidence of the great debt of gratitude we owe to those whom we delight to honour.

The fund for the long desired, Field Secretary needs subscriptions, and now that the William S. Sayres Memorial Fund is completed we hope to receive more support for this fund.

Two visits have been made to New York to attend meetings of the Executive Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary—many parishes in the Diocese as well, as in other places, have been visited—including Southern Arch-deaconry Meetings held in Owosso and Durand.

It is with great regret that we release our Treasurer for Domestic Missions, Mrs. Frank A. Osburn, whose painstaking labors for nineteen years in that office have been fruitful in every way—a kind friend and co-worker and a faithful officer the Auxiliary is sure that the warm interest and enthusiastic support so freely given will always continue.

To all officers, committees, and members, as well as to those in our auxiliary societies, especial commendation, for good work accomplished is given.

The Junior Auxiliary, now called The Church School Service League, will always be closely related with us, and we wish them every success in promoting their enlarged organization.

Many changes have been made in our own work, which will meet with endorsement, and hearty co-operation, and when adjustments are made and new plans presented we shall confidently rely on increased activity and interest in advancing to meet the opportunities for ever greater service.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY.

The past year, 1919-1920, has been an important and interesting one in the history of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The fortieth annual meeting of this organization was held in Christ Church, Detroit, on May 5 and 6, 1919.

The first session on Monday afternoon was held in the Parish House and was devoted to the annual reports of the officers and chairmen of committees.

At the close of this meeting a very enjoyable informal gathering was held at which the ladies of Christ Church served tea.

On Tuesday morning, May 6, 1919, the Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev. Charles D. Williams, D. D., assisted by the Rector of Christ Church, the Rev. William D. Maxon, D. D., and the Assistant Rector, the Rev. C. C. Purton.

The adjourned session of the annual meeting was called to order by the President at ten o'clock. Bishop Williams gave his annual address to the Auxiliary, and the election was held of officers of the Auxiliary for 1919-1920, of the delegates to the Provincial House of Church Women, and to the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, both being held in Detroit in October, 1919.

Luncheon was served in the Parish House and in the afternoon the Auxiliary listened to addresses made by the Rev. William D. Maxon on his experiences in France during the World War as Chaplain of Base Hospital No. 36, and by Deaconess Henrietta Goodwin from the Church Missions House, New York, who told of her work among the students in the several colleges in this country.

Since the annual meeting there have been eight regular and two special meetings of the Executive Committee, eight monthly meetings, seven held in the city churches and one in St. James' Church, Birmingham, two Corporate Communions, and a Quiet Morning conducted by the Rt. Rev. John Newton McCormick, Bishop of Western Michigan.

In October the Triennial Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church was held in Detroit, and at the same time the national organization of the Woman's Auxiliary held their Triennial Meeting.

Owing to the courtesy and kindness of Dr. Joseph Vance, the Pastor, and the Trustees of the First Presbyterian Church, their entire building was given over to the Woman's Auxiliary, for the time of the Convention.

At the business meetings and at several of the Conferences the President of the Michigan Branch, Mrs. Frederic B. Stevens, presided with much graciousness, patience and ready tact.

Some significant measures were enacted at this Triennial meeting of the Auxiliary, one of them being the adoption of articles which provide for a federation of all the women's societies of the Church, this federation to be known as "The Church Service League."

Another important event of this Triennial was the United Offering Service held in St. Paul's Cathedral on the early morning of Thursday, October 9, 1919. At this time the United Offering of \$468,058 was presented. Of this amount the women in this Diocese gave \$6,750.76. By action at this Convention this fund will hereafter be known as the United Thank Offering.

Following the adoption by General Convention of Canon 58, and a Presiding Bishop and Council for the Church having been elected at the Triennial Convention, and provision being made for a Department of Missions within this Council, the former Board of Missions passed out of existence on January 1, 1920. On February 25 the Woman's Auxiliary, on account of its widespread activity, was recognized as the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

The annual Mission Study Institute was held as usual this year on January 23, 24 and 25. While not as well attended as in former years by out-of-town women it was full of interest and inspiration. Only one class was held—that on "Neighbors" under the leadership of Mrs. W. A. Atkinson. At the closing meeting on Sunday afternoon, January 25, 1920, Bishop Williams gave a vigorous and stimulating address on the Nation-Wide Campaign in this Diocese.

On Wednesday afternoon, April 7, 1920, at a special meeting of the Executive Committee, the Constitution and By-Laws were revised in order to bring the work of the Woman's Auxiliary more in line with its enlarged scope of activity. These changes were submitted to the Bishop of the Diocese for his approval and presented to the regular meeting of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary at St. John's Church, Detroit, on April 26, 1920. They will again be brought before the Auxiliary at this annual meeting for action.

It is hoped that by these changes and the broadly planned future work of the organization that all women will so feel their responsibility to the work of the Church that they will hasten to enlist in one or more of the five fields of service—the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation and the World.

Resolved: That the United Thank Offering of 1922 be given to the Board of Missions or any organization which has succeeded, or may hereafter succeed to its functions, for women's work in the mission field, including the training, sending and support of women workers and the care of such workers when sick or disabled—provided that one-tenth of the offering be set aside as a permanent trust fund to be invested and administered by the Board of Missions, or any organization which has succeeded or may hereafter succeed to its functions, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering workers,—also provided that the sum of not less than \$10,000 be devoted to the erection, completion or renewal of a building or buildings approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the President of the Board of Missions and the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also Resolved: That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or of their substance to the work of the Master in the mission field.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDENT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

In October, 1919, when the General Convention met in Detroit the Church Periodical Club in this Diocese had the honor of entertaining the national organization. It was a great privilege to become more conversant with the workings of that organization as well as to meet the delegates from all parts of the country and become better acquainted with our National President, Mrs. Otto Heinigke, and Executive Secretary, Miss Mary E. Thomas. Having had this wonderful privilege, may it prove an impetus for greater work.

During the year three traveling libraries have been sent out. A miscellaneous one to Mesilla Park, New Mexico, in charge of the Rev. Hunter Lewis. A theological library in memory of Mrs. Kate Ward Minor to Boise, Idaho, in charge of the Rt. Rev. Frank H. Touret and a second theological library in memory of Mrs. Caroline Kelsey Fowler is for the use of the clergy in this Diocese and is in Harris Hall, Ann Arbor, in charge of Archdeacon Hastings.

Over three hundred current numbers of magazines have been sent, regularly, to some given address. Eight hundred books and many thousand cards and pictures.

At Christmas over fifty books were sent to individuals in this country and in foreign lands. Packages containing books have been sent to all parts of the world.

Appleton's Encyclopedia, containing twenty-five volumes, was sent to Mehan School, Yangchow, China, also a new Webster's unabridged dictionary, an up-to-date atlas and several historical books, all new.

Fifty Victrola records have been sent to different addresses, twelve pairs of eye glasses to Anvik, Alaska; a saddle to a missionary in Maine, and a silver font to the Archdeacon in Montana. Many children's books have been sent to the library at LaGrange, Georgia, and about twenty historical novels to St. Mary's Hall, China.

It is impossible to enumerate all the articles that have been sent out. Mention is only made of a few, that you may know how varied and far-reaching the work is.

Six meetings of the Librarians have been held. These meetings are most helpful, and to the loyal support of the librarians is due the success of the work.

Nearly twelve hundred Church Calendars were sold, and again we wish to thank Bishop Williams for the use of his picture on these calendars, the members of the Episcopal Young People's Association for their assistance in tying up packages, the Junior Auxiliary for their helpfulness in making over Christmas and Easter cards, also for their financial support; our President, Mrs. Stevens, for her kind and generous interest in the work, also the Woman's Auxiliary, and all who have contributed in any way to this work.

REPORTS OF VICE-PRESIDENTS.
DETROIT ARCHDEACONY.

This has been an unusual year for the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and especially so in the Detroit Convocation of the Diocese of Michigan. With the general convention being held in Detroit in October of 1919, it was necessary to press all the Auxiliary members into service on the various committees and it gave opportunity for some of the out-of-town branches to help, especially at the teas which were so greatly appreciated.

I wish to acknowledge here, that it may go on our records, how very cheerfully and willingly that service was given and how far all the services of the individual members of the Auxiliary went toward making the convention meetings of the Auxiliary the success that they were.

In October I moved to Ann Arbor for the college year, but have been in for executive and monthly meetings whenever possible, taking our president's place for both the February and March meetings. With the vice-president of the Southern Archdeaconry, I represented the Auxiliary at a meeting of the Inter-Church World Movement held in Jackson on the twenty-sixth of February. NORTHERN ARCHDEACONY.

Four factors have strengthened the work in the Northern Archdeaconry this year; the inspiration of the General Convention, special sessions for woman's work at Archdeaconry meetings with splendid assistance from Archdeacon Jermin, the Summer School held at St. John's Parish House, Saginaw, last June, and very valuable but informal conferences of the Presidents of local branches with the Archdeacon and Vice-President.

Through the first three factors we came to a clearer realization of our needs and opportunities, and through the last, we have been able to take definite action. One result is the sending of two delegates to the Mid-West Conference for Church Workers at Racine, Wisconsin, this coming July.

Three new branches have been organized this year, one at St. John's, Midland; one at Grace, Bay City; and one at St. James', Cheboygan.

At the Archdeaconry Meeting held last November in Trinity Parish, Bay City, Miss Elizabeth Matthews gave a very illuminating address on the new Auxiliary. Sixty women went over from Saginaw and delegates came from Midland, East Tawas, and Gladwin.

Study classes have been held in Saginaw, Bay City and Midland.

Twenty-three letters and six post cards have been received and sixty letters written during the year. Year books, pamphlets and programs have been sent to every branch.

We are hoping that we may have a Field Secretary with whom to work for extension this coming year.

REPORT OF EXTENSION COMMITTEE.

Two most important factors have strengthened and encouraged the Extension Work in the Diocese this year: First, the meeting of the General Convention of the Church in October, 1919; second, the Nation-Wide Campaign, the results of which are being seen on every side.

The members of the Auxiliary co-operated with the committees in all parishes and assisted in all work possible. There are many more people attending the Church Services and more children in our Church schools. People are showing a greater interest in the Church activities and are waiting to offer themselves for service. The time has come to enlarge our work and give the people the means and opportunity to work in the field of service that is most fitting and interesting to them. Plans are being perfected now, for the re-organization of the work about which we will hear more later.

The Michigan Auxiliary has been represented at several conferences in New York by our President, Mrs. Stevens, and by our Junior President, Miss Maurice, for discussions of the re-organization and reconstruction. Several Auxiliary members were present at Racine, Wisconsin, Conference, in the classes, and on the faculty.

A new branch of the Auxiliary has been reported formed at St. John's Church, Midland. Visitations have been made by members of the Committee to Trinity and St. Mark's Churches, Toledo, Ohio; St. Luke's, Ypsilanti; St. Paul's, Saginaw; Christ Church, Owosso; St. Paul's, Flint; St. John's, Durand; St. John's, Royal Oak; St. James,

Birmingham, and in Detroit to St Peter's, St. Paul's Cathedral, Epiphany, Church of The Messiah, St. Columba, and Grace Church.

The Young People's Association reports visitations to St. John's, Durand; St. John's, Royal Oak; and a new branch at St. Columba's, Detroit.

The Junior Auxiliary reports visitations to Ypsilanti and Royal Oak; a new branch at St. Peter's, Detroit, and an organization of the Church School Service League at St. Thomas' Church, Detroit.

The outlook for the next year is most encouraging, there being every indication for greater activity and greater fields of service in a material and spiritual way, among the women of the Church.

REPORT OF THE PROGRAM COMMITTEE

In planning the program of meetings to be held by the Auxiliary in the season of 1919-20, your committee felt that it should be dominated by the two great Church events, which were foremost in the thoughts of our Church people at this time, viz., the Nation Wide Campaign and the Triennial Convention of the Church, which was soon to be assembled in our city.

In accordance with the custom of the Auxiliary, the opening service of Corporate Communion was held in St. John's Church on St. Matthew's Day, September 21st, Bishop Williams officiating, and delivering the address.

The first regular meeting was held on September 29th in St. Philip's and St. Stephen's Church. We were fortunate in being able to secure for our speakers Bishop Colmore of Porto Rico, and the Rev. Robert W. Patton, the National Director of the Nation Wide Campaign, who had so ably aroused the interest of the Church in this movement.

On Monday, October 27th, we met at Christ Church Parish House. The Convention was over, but notwithstanding the fact that for three weeks we had been attending meetings and services daily, we were glad to listen to the Rev. Dr. Maxon, who, through his intimate connection with the Convention, was able to tell us much which we wished to know of what had been done and what had not been done, in this, which he characterized as an "Epoch-making Convention."

On November 24th a goodly number of Detroit women went out to Birmingham, where we were most hospitably entertained by the ladies of St. James' Church. By special request the subject considered was again "The Nation-wide Campaign," the speaker being the Rev. Paul Faude, Secretary of the Diocesan Committee for the N. W. C. He presented clearly and plainly the Why and How of the Campaign.

On December 29th, we met in St. Peter's Church, Mrs. Chalmers Burn having charge of the program, the topic being "Echoes of the Convention." She had planned to have Mrs. F. T. Ranney, a member of the First Presbyterian Church (which had so generously and hospitably given the use of their Church buildings to the Auxiliary during the Convention) tell what a Presbyterian thought of the Convention. Mrs. Ranney, however being ill, had requested the Rev. Minot Morgan of the Fort Street Presbyterian to take her place, and he took as the subject of his most interesting talk, "The Waldensian Church and its

claims upon our sympathy and assistance." He spoke of a meeting held in the interest of the Waldenses during the Convention, with prominent men of our Church, as the speakers.

Mrs. James A. Smith, Jr., and Mrs. Dan McNeil, told briefly of some of the things that had most deeply impressed them in the Convention, Mrs. McNeil's paper being read by Mrs. H. S. Hulbert.

At the meeting held on the 26th of January, at St. Matthias Church, Mr. Charles O. Ford told of the trip he had taken with Dr. Wood through the Philippines. An added interest was given to this program by the presence of Miss Frances Sibley and Miss Jessie Hendrie, both of whom had given their services, for some time, in missionary work in Manilla, and could speak interestingly of what they had seen and done there.

On the 23rd of February, at St. Joseph's Church, stereoptican views of Porto Rico were shown, accompanied by the lecture sent with the slides, from the Church Missions House, New York. Both lecture and views were most interesting.

On Tuesday, March 16th, the annual Quiet Morning of the Auxiliary, was observed. The service was conducted by the Rt. Rev. John Newton McCormick, Bishop of Western Michigan. He chose for the subject of the Meditations, "Friendship," under three divisions, viz., "Friendship with God," "The Attributes of God," and "Friendship with Man." New vistas of the wonderful meaning of friendship with God were opened up to us as we listened.

The meeting held at the Church of the Ascension on March 29th, gave us another opportunity of seeing, through Mr. Ford's eyes, the work which our Church is doing in the Orient. This time the trip was through China and Japan.

The April meeting held in St. John's Parish Building was devoted to preparation for the Annual Meeting and to the discussion of the new plans for the work of the Auxiliary, under its new title of "Women's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council."

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

The year has been an unusual one in all our work. The General Convention held in our midst, and the Nation-Wide Campaign, have been its outstanding features. We have all had a wonderful educational experience. There has been so much material for thought and discussion that we may say that all our gatherings have been sessions of a great study class.

Printed programs have been sent in by six branches—St. Andrew's, Ann Arbor; Grace Church, Bay City; St. Paul's, Saginaw, and Trinity, St. John's and Messiah, Detroit. The subjects discussed at the monthly or semi-monthly meetings have included reports of the Convention, talks on the Nation-Wide Campaign, some of the Christian Nurture material, and topics closely related to the text-book for the year—"Neighbors."

Reports have been received from a larger number of parishes and missions than ever before. We have been gratified to hear from some branches which felt that they were doing very little, but expressed the hope to do more in the near future. Contact with such branches seems to us most valuable, both to this committee and to the branches. Twenty out of 62 parishes have so far been heard from, and 13 of these are out of the City of Detroit.

In the circular letter sent out in April was included a questionnaire on work among foreign-born Armenians, to be sent on to Dr. Burgess, secretary for this work at the Missions House. Sixteen parishes have reported on this matter, and the reports show a vast field of opportunity for the Church's ministry toward those who have come as strangers among us. These are our neighbors and brothers, and our study of the year's text-book has given us a closer acquaintance with them and the historic branches of the Church in which they were brought up in the Old World. We have learned our spiritual relationship to them, and also been brought to see what a rich contribution they all have to bring to our religious life in this country. The study of "Neighbors" has served to quicken our desire for Christian Americanization through the parishes. Suggestions for community service will continue to present themselves, which we feel sure our parishes will, one and all, become eager to put into practice. We believe the topic of study for the past year will prove a strong stimulus toward producing a "Church in action," with the great objective of healing the wounds which now exist in our nation. Each "menace" will be recognized as an opportunity, and we pray that every opportunity may be embraced, to the glory of God and the furtherance of His Kingdom in the world. Notable among such opportunities is the challenge of the Wheeling workers, who have asked the churches to co-operate with them "in an earnest endeavor to apply the teachings of Jesus Christ in the Wheeling district," because they believe that these teachings "constitute a platform upon which all men can agree," and that "they can be applied to modern industrial problems." Surely this is Patriotism, and our country calls us to just this service.

In addition to the many classes held during Convention, the diocese has held its annual summer school at St. John's Church, Saginaw, June 27-July 2. The Eighth Annual Institute for Mission Study was held in St. John's Parish-house, Detroit, on January 23, 24 and 25. The sessions were given over to a discussion of the Church's re-organization as well as a consideration of the text-book—"Neighbors." We hope that Michigan will be well represented at the summer training camps:

The Wellesley Conference held at Wellesley, Mass., June 21-July 1.

The Racine Conference, July 6-16.

Fourth Summer Conference, Diocese of Michigan, Ann Arbor, June 25-July 1.

There is no financial report at this time, as the bills of the committee have been met by the general treasurer, as incurred, and will be reported by her.

REPORT OF THE SOLICITOR FOR THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS.

The Diocese of Michigan has at this time four hundred and thirty-two subscribers to the Spirit of Missions, an increase of one hundred and twenty-eight over last year.

The following number were handled through the Diocesan Solicitor or through Parochial Solicitors and reported to the Diocesan Solicitor: St. Andrew's, Detroit, thirteen new subscriptions and seven renewals; St. Alban's, Detroit, one new and one renewal; Christ Church, Detroit, five renewals; St. Columbia's, Detroit, three new; St. Matthew's, Detroit, one new; Church of The Messiah, Detroit, three renewals; Trinity Church, Detroit, seven new and five renewals; St. Paul's, Saginaw, one new and two renewals.

Two new solicitors have been appointed, one in Christ Church, Detroit, and one in St. Paul's, Saginaw.

I have visited one Parish Branch to talk on the Spirit of Missions and had planned to visit others but was hindered from so doing by illness in some of the branches, also in my own home, during the winter and early spring.

I have written eleven letters to Auxiliary women and the Church Missions House and have received fifteen letters and post cards from Auxiliary women and the Church Missions House, New York.

REPORT OF THE LITTLE HELPERS.

This is a time of transition in the Church. As Bishop Brent says, "we must be adventurers from God." The Little Helpers are carrying on—confident in the knowledge that this is God's work and that He cares for it.

Almost everyday that we had a parish meeting of The Little Helpers it rained. In some Parishes the most severe rainstorm does not prevent the members from attending their service. Some years ago I suggested the advisability of changing the time of Annual Meeting from spring until fall, because of the uncertainty of the weather in March and April, and also to the prevalence of infantile diseases. At our next meeting of The Leaders of The Little Helpers we will take some action on the subject.

The reports that have come in show us that God has heard the prayers of His Little Helpers and their Leaders, and that our work has been blest. Our gifts are larger than last year and some parishes have sent no report.

Again we commend the meritorious work of some of our Leaders—Mrs. Albert Mangelsdorf of Trinity, Detroit.

In the midst of a drenching rain on April 15, Trinity had 36 Little Helpers and 34 mothers and friends at the service. Trinity has 60 members and gave \$41.96, also a \$3.00 special for the Mary E. Hart Memorial Fund. The Woman's Auxiliary of Trinity Church also gave \$10.00 to the same fund through The Little Helpers, of Mrs. A. S. McClenahan of St. Stephen's, Wyandotte. St. Stephen's has 78 members who gave \$41.50 and a \$10.00 special for the Mary E. Hart Fund was received through the Little Helpers of that parish. Of Miss Mabel Girling of St. Joseph's, Detroit. They had a very rainy day also. Their offering last year was \$8.04, this year \$22.68. St. Joseph's was once our banner branch but their Leader was obliged to resign and for a long while they were without a Leader, but under Miss Girling's excellent care they seem to be pressing forward to their old position. My advice was acted upon by St. John's Detroit. They have Mrs. Woodward as chairman and six assistants and this first year shows excellent results. \$5.88 last year. \$38.50 this year indicates that a great work has been done.

We have had some changes among our Leaders. Mrs. Perry Kimball of Epiphany Church, after many years of good work, resigned and was succeeded by Mrs. E. G. Hitchings, who has been with us only a short time, but her splendid work has begun to show. Mrs. Louis D. Bolton of Christ Church, owing to ill-health, withdrew after four years of excellent service. Mrs. M. F. Maury-Werth was appointed as Leader. Mrs. Maury-Werth sent in a fine report which speaks for itself. Mrs. G. K. Bennett, of St. Andrew's Church, after several years of successful work asked to be released, and Mrs. Warren Uridge has been appointed in her place. Mrs. T. C. Sterling, of St. Matthias', after a short Leadership, resigned and Mrs. Lucas has taken up the duties with an earnestness that promises great results. Since the death of Mrs. E. E. Marble, of blessed memory, the Little Helpers of Christ Church, Adrian, have been cared for by Mrs. I. C. H. Channer. We feel deeply grateful to her for her kindness and deep interest in them. Mrs. E. J. Reed has been appointed Leader and the excellent report just received gives us much encouragement.

We hear that Leaders have been appointed in St. Phillip's and St. Stephen's, Grace Church, Detroit and in St. James, Grosse Ile. We bid you a most cordial and joyful welcome into this beautiful and blessed work of Our Lord and Master.

On February 2, 1920, Virginia Schuffert, aged 4 years and 5 month, St. Stephen's, Wyandotte, fell asleep. Into God's loving keeping we leave her forever with her Lord.

Whoever will forget that memorial communion service, Wednesday, October fifteenth, 1919, in the Chapel of St. John's, Detroit, Bishop W. F. Faber, celebrant. The sun streaming through the beautiful stained glass window behind the altar. Those wonderful pink roses in the altar vases. How exquisitely simple and worshipful. How inspiring were Bishop Faber's words. Our lives will ever be blessed by its memory.

THE MARY E. HART MEMORIAL FUND.

(FROM THE REPORT OF THE TRIENNIAL MEETINGS IN DETROIT.)

Resolved

That we heartily approve and adopt as our own the words of appreciation and affection in the minute on Miss Mary E. Hart's life and work, and that the Mary E. Hart Memorial be made in the form of a gift of \$5,000.00 for the School for Navajo Indians at Farmington, New Mexico.

Miss Hart entered into eternal life on August 1st, 1918, having fulfilled sixty-four rarely useful and beautiful years. Born into a family devoted to the Christian living of the Church, her gifts for serving others ripened steadily and without check in this home atmosphere. Miss Hart's missionary life is divided into three natural divisions, as follows:

First—She became intensely interested in the Woman's Auxiliary. She had one of the first Mission Study Classes. Representatives from all parishes in Rochester met with her just for the study of Missions, and this was a number of years before the present system of such classes was inaugurated. It was in the logical growth of the Woman's Auxiliary that Miss Hart saw the possibilities of what she then called "Children's Work."

Second—Her place developed into the Junior Auxiliary, of which she is acknowledged (in common with members of two other dioceses) to be one of the founders. She was one of the regular directors in the Junior Publishing Company, that issued a series of Round Robins and The Soldier and Servant Series of little books. Later she became a member of the committee appointed for the Board of Religious Education. She was head of the children's work for two years and the President of the Junior Auxiliary for twenty-three years, celebrating her twenty-fifth anniversary in her own diocese and continuing her duties until 1894. Members of that diocese can testify to the exceeding value of her efforts for the children of the Church.

Third—It may be said that Miss Hart never wholly gave up any good task but rather added something new to the old combination, carrying all forward together with the intensity of her enthusiasm. From

a simple incident of home life was struck the divine spark and there was created among us the Christian Education in Missions of very little children in a systematic way. When the first report of the Little Helpers was made to Bishop Coxe in 1891, he exclaimed, "Why this is the very keynote of the Convention of 1835, that by baptism every child is made a member of the great missionary society—The Church." It is an interesting fact that this great and beautiful work of the Little Helpers is really owing to Miss Hart's habit of noonday prayer for missions. Her little nephew, Gaylord Hart Mitchell, then not three years old, observed her withdrawal from his games at that hour and protested against it. When the reason was explained to him he claimed his share in it, and later told what his own prayer was. The simple words of the closing sentence is known to all of us. That was the founding of the Little Helpers. The child's prayer has become the accepted prayer of the Little Helpers and may be heard in various languages in all quarters of the globe.

Gaylord's early death made of the development of this work for very little children a tender memorial. It has spread to nearly all dioceses and districts. It has proved an open sesame at the closed doors of the children's homes in China and Japan. It supports beds in hospitals and scholarships in schools. It makes a specialty of giving fonts to Mission Churches, emphasizing in this manner the value of Baptism. A united gift of two fonts, one for the foreign field and one for the domestic field is made each year by the Little Helpers.

Boys and girls share alike in this work and their mothers, thro' sympathy, no less. Bishop McKim, of Japan, says, "The first kindergarten in the Japan Mission is due under God to the enthusiastic encouragement of Miss Hart. It is the Gaylord Hart Mitchell kindergarten at Akita, Japan. That kindergarten is now multiplied by 23. They are the most beneficent and successful of our evangelistic agencies, and I should like to see one at each of our stations."

The annual meetings of the Little Helpers was always an inspiring sight. The eager obedience of the children. Their pleasure in making their offering and their comprehension of their aid would convince the dullest soul that a noble work was here before them, while the deep interest and happy co-operation of the mothers proved the double power of the organization. Miss Hart's talks were so winning and so simple, so clear. She had the power of interpreting missions to the child mind.

During the weary months of a long illness Miss Hart carried forward her own diocesan work as well as chairman of the Finance Committee of the new kindergarten at Odate, Japan, to the very last day of her life. Just a few hours before her passing, her Master gave her the joy of knowing that the Odate kindergarten was all paid for and was in actual use and that its influence was greater than the Rev. Mr. Evans had ever dreamed.

Courage was hers and hope and an intense interest in life. To the end she was still an inspiration to all around her. Now she has passed into a Paradise where the multitudes of little children will bring her joy. Let her memory be preserved among us as

"The dear apostle of the child
The joyous leader of the little ones."

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

The Junior Auxiliary started work last fall with General Convention foremost in our minds and on our hands. At our first meeting in September we discussed plans for the work for which we were to be responsible, which was helping at St. John's Parish House, at the headquarters of the Junior Auxiliary, and the General Board of Religious Education. This work proved to be most varied and as the Chairman of the Registration Committee said, "they had not only the responsibilities of registration, but of a general store, box-office, headquarters for dinner and luncheon tickets, information bureau, and a lost and found office. We also had charge of the "School of Methods" class rooms."

The Juniors assisted at the Woman's Auxiliary teas, gave two performances of a play "The Children and the Evangelists," written by Miss Margaret Athey Tomes, this was given at the Arts and Crafts Theatre, and tea was served after each performance to visiting Junior officers and leaders. Last, but not least, we had charge of the Junior Exhibit, which filled the large room at St. John's Parish House and consisted of exhibits of articles made by Juniors from all parts of the country. This exhibit was received by a committee of which Mrs.

William S. Kenyon was the chairman, catalogued and labeled, and each article put in place and when Convention was over the things were packed and returned to their respective dioceses, this was a great deal of work and was most ably done by Mrs. Kenyon and her committee, who also took turns in being on duty in the exhibit room.

At the Junior Auxiliary Conferences at the Tri-ennial we were asked to merge, as soon as possible, into the Church School Service League. At our monthly conferences this year we have been studying the different phases of the Church School Service League to become thoroughly conversant with the plans, so that as Diocesan and parish officers we might be ready to put it into effect, a number of schools are starting Church School Leagues which will be more perfectly worked out next year.

The name "Church School Service League" was chosen to show the unity of the League with the Sunday session of the School, and is really the School in week-day session, emphasizing service instead of information.

The idea of the League, simply put, is to give every child in the Church an opportunity to serve in the five fields of Christian Service, the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation, and the World.

As these new plans are working out we are seeing a larger vision of usefulness for the children, when we realize that the Church of tomorrow rests with the children of today we can see that we have a serious problem to face and one that requires immediate attention. The child comes to the Church School to get something he is taught there and in some instances given the inspiration to do something for someone else, but in most cases no outlet is furnished for this impulse to be put in action, and the inspiration dies a natural death, this of course should not be, he should be given a chance to work for his church and for others and be urged to do so, which will be the aim and object of the Church School Service League.

Next year there will probably be changes in our organization but whatever they are, we will never forget the hearty co-operation and sympathy that we have had from the Woman's Auxiliary. You have always supported us in furthering the Junior work and have helped us in every way to strengthen and advance its interests. We have all appreciated this kindly help and advice and hope and trust that the Church Service League and the Church School Service League will continue to work hand in hand and that the Woman's Auxiliary will mother the Church School Service League as it has the Junior Auxiliary.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY.

Madam President and Members:

During the past year the Junior Auxiliary officers and leaders have held seven meetings with an average attendance of twelve.

There have been two general meetings. The first being held on Saturday, November 15th, in St. John's Chapel. A play "The Children and the Evangelists," was given, after which the children presented their gifts at the manger. The Christmas box this year was sent to

an Indian Mission at Lower Brule, South Dakota, there were 619 gifts and the committee that packed the boxes said that they were of more uniform value and better than usual. At this meeting eleven Detroit and two out of town branches responded to the roll call. The second general meeting, the Annual Meeting, was held on Saturday, May 1st, at St. John's Parish House, there were between 250 and 300 present. Reports from branches were given by the children. Mrs. Charles D. Williams told them a most fascinating story, after which the younger children went up stairs and played games.

The next speaker on the program was Mr. Rouillard, an Indian, who is working among his own people in South Dakota. The Juniors were much interested in Mr. Rouillard's talk and decided to send the offering, which amounted to \$20.00 to Bishop Burleson to be used for the work among the Indians in South Dakota. The first meeting of the officers and leaders was a social meting and tea held at the home of Miss Maurice. The business taken up at this meeting was in preparation for General Convention.

In October the General Convention was held from the eighth to the twenty-fourth. During this time classes in Christian Nurture and week-day work were held daily at St. John's Parish House. On the 14th and 16th a play called "The Children and the Evangelists" was given at the Arts and Crafts Theatre, after which tea was served to visiting Junior officers and leaders. The Juniors also assisted the Woman's Auxiliary at teas given at their headquarters.

On January 2nd through the 4th the Mission Study Institute was held at St. John's Parish House. A regular meeting was held on January 28th at St. Matthias' Church, when a demonstration meeting of the Juniors was followed by a supper served by the older girls. The Rev. Charles Webb, of Ann Arbor, led the Conference on the co-ordination of week-day activities, particularly showing how the Boy Scouts could co-operate with the "Church School Service League." In February the conference was held at the Church of the Messiah. Following the business meeting a demonstration Junior meeting was held, conducted by the Juniors. The Junior leaders of the Church of The Messiah served supper. The program was in charge of Miss Elizabeth Thomas and Mrs. William S. Kenyon, who explained the Block System and the Five Fields of Service. Miss Boardman in charge of the Department of Industrial Arts at the State Normal School. Ypsilanti, gave a demonstration of hand work to be adapted to the Junior work, showing us many interesting things and how to make them, opening up a new field of activities for the leaders.

The March meeting was held at St. Joseph's. Following the business meeting, their Juniors held a model meeting and later served tea. Miss Helen Edwards, the Junior Treasurer, explained most clearly the Class-Treasury system, and how it can be used.

The annual officers and leaders meeting was held on Saturday, April 24th, at St. John's Parish House, when reports were read, and officers elected for the ensuing year, all of the officers being unanimously re-elected.

We have three new branches to report this year, one at St. Clair Shores Farms, one at St. Paul's, Lansing, and a very flourishing branch at St. Peter's Church, Detroit.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

In reviewing the work for the year we begin with the "Nativity Play" given during the "Convention and realize anew at what costs of money and labor we gain our education!

During the Convention mission study was demonstrated at the Church of the Messiah, four classes being held.

Shortly after Christmas we held our Junior Diocesan Institute separately from the Woman's Auxiliary Institute. We hoped by this arrangement to give the leaders an opportunity to attend both Institutes. Our attendance was small. Three classes were held as follows:

Observation trip to the Church's outposts—Led by Mrs. Charles Williams.

Americans All—Led by Miss Elizabeth Thomas.

Down the Garden Path—Led by Mrs. Thomas M. Weber.

We can report about nineteen junior classes. This includes two classes not yet completed and two at Christ Church for the G. F. S. Candidates, who come under the Church School Service League, rather than the Juniors. From all reports the classes stimulated a great deal of interest. Some of the leaders have planned and adopted courses for their own groups—always an encouraging sign. At St. Alban's the Juniors studied the coming of foreigners to this country and then the need in foreign fields, reaching the climax of their study in a missionary program representing the Board of Missions and the peoples who make their appeals. At Christ Church, Miss Byllesby presented the subject of the Church and Missions to a group of older candidates, giving them the essence of the "Why and How of Missions." Miss Byllbesby spoke of the new response, which she had not been able to arouse in the older girls heretofore. These girls had had "Christian Nurture" in the Church School.

Though it is outside of the province of the Educational Secretary, I should like to suggest the educational influences which the children have felt during the year. Though these influences have been a little confusing to our regular programs, they have undoubtedly had their effect. I refer to the General Convention, with its demonstration schools, and Juniors helping at the teas, and the Nation-Wide Campaign, with especial emphasis on the Pageant.

With the growth of the Church School Service League, it is hard to stay within bounds and report only Junior Mission Study work, so I hope you will forgive digressions. We can all see the beginnings of great things and the coming of a time when all the children of the Church will be studying missions and working for them in all five fields continually.

REPORT OF THE EPISCOPAL YOUNG PEOPLE'S ASSOCIATION AND YOUNG WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

The purpose and plan of the Episcopal Young People's Association met the searching test of the General Convention, when at that time it was presented and proved that an organization of its kind was meeting a great need in the Church.

Since then we have been giving our attention to a new-found task, that of helping to organize other diocesan units, as well as conducting an Extension Campaign in our own diocese.

We may justly be proud of the spirit of enterprise shown by our young people in the months of preparation for this great event; it was the goal toward which the members of the Association directed all their best efforts, for they were to demonstrate a work in which they were represented and that had made a definite place for itself in their Diocese.

The Rt. Rev. William Frederic Faber, D. D., was celebrant at the Corporate Communion service which was held the first Sunday of the Convention.

And at a later date the "Model Meeting" was held to prove the practical value of an existing organization which the youth of the Church enter, and by means of a working alliance, render "greater service to the Church and Country."

This typical Young People's Mass Meeting served the purpose of showing methods followed, and general plan of developing the aim of the Association, in which the four governing principles and practice of Fellowship—Service—Study and Prayer was explained as factors.

Bishop Wise was the speaker of the evening, and in a stirring address urged the young men to consider more seriously the ministry as a vocation, and that the young women put themselves under training for the mission field.

An accountability of stewardship is suggested in the personal question which is asked on the 1919-20 program: "What kind of an Association would this be if everyone was just like me?" There has been an aim in the work of the year just closing, to appreciate the records of the preceding years, by thoughtfully developing this year's program of service.

Parish branches have been active in the Nation-Wide Campaign program, and groups have pledged generously when there has been some local need that had to be met. The box work and other activities are recorded separately.

Representatives from twelve branches attended the Lenten Study Class in Christian Americanization conducted by Mrs. W. A. Atkinson.

The course covered six sessions and special speakers were provided to talk on "The Common Experiences of Every Immigrant," "Homes Which They Make in Detroit," "The Home and the Living Wage," "How Home Life is Affected by Sickness," "The Results of Inadequate Home Life as Brought Out by the Juvenile Court," and the last session was given to a debate: "Resolved, That we restrict Immigration." Reports have come from groups that are doing definite community work.

Connection has always been made with the Educational Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary in arranging study courses, and it is well to note that the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese has for a period of years broadened the scope of its work in that the activities of the young people have claimed the interest and support of the president, Mrs. Frederic B. Stevens, and members. As evidence of this, we report with great interest that through special gifts, members of Christ Church branch of the W. A. will contribute this year the amount required to send a young man as delegate to the Racine Conference, July, 1920. A fund has been started and it is hoped that a delegation of young people will go from the Michigan Diocese to Racine.

As in previous years, the Annual Corporate Communion Service, conducted by Bishop Williams, was held in St. Paul's Cathedral, Palm Sunday, with the usual large attendance.

The annual election of officers was held at the Sibley House April 21st and the officers of the preceding year were re-elected.

The Church has a great interest at stake, developing the resources of her sons and daughters, so that the Call to Service will have response from these young patriots, who will joyfully and fervently

undertake untried tasks for the advancement of the Kingdom.
