CONSTITUTION



ARTICLE I.—NAME

This Association shall be called the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECTS

The objects of this Association are to unite the branches in a common interest; to promote the cause of Missions and Church Extension, Religious Education and Christian Social Service; to collect funds for these various purposes; to encourage the formation of new branches. Work must be done, each year, in the five fields of service, the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation and the World.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERS

All baptized women of the Diocese who desire to be members will be so regarded.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS

The Officers of this Association shall be a President, seven Vice-Presidents, one for each Archdeaconry, two in charge respectively of Education and Supply Department, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a Treasurer for the United Thank Offering and the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, who with the Director of the Church School Service League shall form the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V.—MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The annual meeting shall be held during the week of the Diocesan Convention.

SECTION 2. Regular meetings shall be held monthly from September to May, inclusive.

SECTION 3. Other meetings shall be held at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI.—QUORUM

Five members shall constitute a quorum at an executive meeting, and fifteen members at regular or annual meetings, but at no time shall the lack of a quorum at a regular meeting prevent those present from proceeding with the program of the day.

ARTICLE VII.—AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all members present; the proposed amendment having been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended or repealed at any regular meeting by a two-thirds majority vote.

BY-LAWS



ARTICLE I.

ELECTIONS AND APPOINTMENTS

SECTION 1. All officers shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting and shall continue in office for one year or until the election of their successor.

A majority of all votes cast shall be necessary for an election.

SECTION 2. In case of the absence, resignation or death of an executive officer, her place shall be filled by the Executive Committee, such action to stand until the next annual meeting.

SECTION 3. At the annual meeting preceding the Triennial Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, five delegates and five alternates shall be elected to the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The five receiving the highest number of votes shall be delegates, and the five next highest shall be alternates.

ARTICLE II.

PLEDGES

SECTION 1. At the January meeting each branch shall signify in writing the amount it will give during the following year, to be paid through the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary.

SECTION 2. As it seems only reasonable that each branch shall share in the expenses of the society, all branches shall contribute as liberally as possible to the General Expense Fund, the minimum for any branch being one dollar a year.

ARTICLE III.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The President shall preside at all meetings and shall have general supervision of the work of the Auxiliary.

SECTION 2. The Vice-Presidents shall in order of their succession preside in the absence of the President and assume all duties pertaining to the office.

The Vice-President in charge of the Archdeaconries shall endeavor to promote the formation of new parish branches and to help and strengthen those already existing.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of Foreign and Domestic Missions, Education, and Supply Work, shall inform the parish branches through correspondence, visiting, or providing speakers, of the needs of work in their respective departments.

SECTION 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings, and prepare and edit the Year Book.

SECTION 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, both of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Committee, and shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society.

SECTION 5. The Treasurer shall receive, disburse and keep account of all moneys received in each department of the work, except the United Thank Offering, and shall attend the meetings of the Auxiliary, reporting receipts and disbursements at the same.

SECTION 6. The Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall receive all contributions from the branches and under the direction of the Executive Committee endeavor to arouse and increase an interest in the same.

ARTICLE IV.

FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from January 1st to December 31st.

ARTICLE V.

COMMITTEES

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. All matters relating to the general welfare of the Society shall be referred to the Executive Committee. It shall appoint Standing Committees, which shall co-operate with it.

SECTION 2. Seven Standing Committees shall be appointed by the Executive Committee each year after the annual meeting.

A Committee on Missions and Church Extension, a Committee on Religious Education, a Committee on Christian Social Service, a Committee on the Box Work and Bureau of Supplies, a Program and Publicity Committee, a Finance Committee and a Hospitality Committee.

The Committee on Missions and Church Extension shall promote missionary intelligence and missionary activity among the women of the Diocese and shall superintend the work of arranging for meetings in different parts of the Diocese in the interest of forming new branches and strengthening the old ones.

The Committee on Religious Education shall arrange for Mission Study Classes throughout the Diocese and give all information regarding the work.

The Committee on Christian Social Service shall co-operate in the work of Christian Americanization, Hospital, Institutional and any other form of Christian Social Service.

The Committee on the Box Work shall supply lists of boxes obtained from the Church Missions House to parishes wishing them; shall have charge of the preparation of any general Diocesan Box and present the combined annual box report of all the parishes. This Committee shall maintain a Bureau of Supplies.

The Program and Publicity Committee shall make a plan for the meeting of the Association during the year, provide speakers subject to the advice of the Executive Committee, be prepared to advise parish branches who may desire to have assistance in arranging their yearly programs and do all necessary publicity work.

The Finance Committee shall have charge of the raising of all special funds, unless some special committee has been appointed, and shall be charged with any other similar work requested by the Executive Committee.

The Hospitality Committee shall arrange for the entertainment of speakers and delegates attending the various meetings.

ARTICLE VI.

ANNUAL REPORTS

Each officer and chairman shall present a typewritten annual report, also providing a copy for the use of the Recording Secretary.

ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT

The work of your President during the year 1926 has been the usual one of receiving and writing many letters, meeting with the various committees, and visiting many parishes in the Diocese. It has been her great regret that it has not been possible to have visited many more for she has thoroughly appreciated the benefit she has derived from knowing more intimately the women of the Auxiliary.

To those of you who were here at the last annual meeting, I wish to express my hearty thanks for again electing me to the office of President. It is an office of great responsibility and it has meant no small piece of work to keep it to the high level attained during the presidency of Mrs. Frederick B. Stevens. To the officers who have so generously given of their time and advice, and to the Chairmen of Standing and Special Committees, I extend my most hearty thanks for their faithful co-operation.

The following reports will give so adequately the work accomplished during 1926 that I am not going to speak further on things accomplished, but ask you to think with me of some of the things which could be accomplished in the future, if we but have the Will and the Faith to carry them on.

What then are these possibilities? First, I should say, what the Diocese of Chicago has accomplished in doing—organizing an Auxiliary in every Parish. This is possible, but only in one way, and that is if we all as individuals and in Parish groups, take an interest. We need volunteers who will go to talk to groups of women on various phases of Auxiliary work; volunteers who will go to lead study classes. In the meetings of our Educational Committee it has been felt that in no way can the Missionary spirit of a Parish be so readily built up as by the forming of study classes.

Another possibility is the enlargement of the Supply Work. Our splendid Chairman has several plans in mind, such as a permanent supply closet where old clothes can be sent to and distributed from. Also the possibility of the making of altar hangings and linens for Missions.

And so each branch of the work needs the help of every Parish to carry on to the greatest possibility of usefulness, its services.

As I look back over the life of the Auxiliary in Michigan, I long for a Book of Remembrance which would record the names of those who have been so active in its development. Such a book has been started in another Diocese, the placing of these names meaning that a sum, great or small, has been given by a person or parish to a so-called Endowment Fund, so that we may feel that these former loyal members are still actively working with us.

Our part in the Bishop's Crusade; what shall it be? The entire plan has not yet been made, but we can, as individuals, do much toward the furtherance of the idea. First, by looking to our own lives very carefully. Are we truly LIVING WITNESSES of the Master? If we could so live and show the world that it is really worth while to be a Christian and a member of the Woman's Auxiliary, I am sure we could be of infinite help to the Crusade. I ask you, therefore, to do your part when the time comes, in our active work for it.

And so, women of the Auxiliary, I would leave with you this thought to carry back to your groups: We are a privileged few. We have had

given to us the greatest gift in the world, the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. Shall we keep it to ourselves or shall we share it with those who are longing to hear it. It is for each one of us to ask ourselves what we shall do to help to spread the good news. Please help your president by accepting whatever task she has in mind for you, remembering that your responsibility is as great as hers in making the Auxiliary a force in your Parish. And so, let us keep always in our minds that Message of the Auxiliary:

"Realizing that only through personal dedication to Jesus Christ, our Lord, can we hope to bring to fruition our human endeavors, we re-dedicate ourselves to the service of our Lord Jesus Christ, to making the strength of our deeds the measure of our faith; to a sincere and simple effort in our daily living to follow with humility the example of our Saviour."

ANNUAL REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY

The last annual meeting, the forty-seventh, of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Michigan, was held in St. Paul's Cathedral House, Detroit, on Monday and Tuesday, May 17th and 18th, 1926.

On Monday afternoon the annual reports of the Officers and Chairman of Committees were given and the election of officers for the ensuing year was held.

A Corporate Communion was celebrated on Tuesday morning in the Cathedral, the Bishop of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev. Herman Page, D. D., officiating, assisted by the Dean of the Cathedral, the Very Rev. Herbert L. Johnson and the assistant, the Rev. Stanley Dainton. At this service the list of those members of the Auxiliary, who had passed to the "life eternal" were read and appropriate prayers were offered by the Bishop.

Following this service the adjourned session of the annual meeting was held in the Cathedral House. Bishop Page made his annual address, and Mrs. Allan McGregor, of Southern Ohio, gave a stirring talk on "The Message". Tuesday afternoon was devoted to conferences on the different branches of Women's Work in the Church.

Six meetings of the executive committee, eight monthly meetings, the annual meeting for 1925, three corporate communions, and a quiet morning in Lent were held during the year 1926.

The attendance at the monthly meetings was unusually good, only one falling below the one-hundred mark. A noticeable thing was the goodly representation from branches outside of Detroit and from newly organized ones.

A very instructive and successful Mission Study Institute was held on January 22nd and 23rd. Mrs. Phoebe Pancoast, of Philadelphia, and Miss Alice Alexander, of Detroit, were the leaders of the classes, which were well attended.

The United Thank Offering, under the care of its able treasurer, Mrs. Thomas Stirling, grew most satisfactorily in the first year of a new Triennium, there being \$1,933.72 more than at the end of 1923, the first year of the last Triennium.

The work of the Gold and Silver Offering taken up in the fall of 1925 was brought to a close this year. The sum netted from the principal sale and the later disposal of articles left over, was \$5,319.99. This amount was forwarded to New York to be placed in the fund for the rebuilding of St. Margaret's School, Tokio, Japan, which was destroyed by the great earthquake.

Thanks and much appreciation should be extended to Mrs. William L. Clements, of Bay City, who had charge of the work connected with this offering. Mrs. Clements and members of her committee visited and spoke before the Auxiliaries in many of the parishes in the Diocese in the interest of this object.

On this occasion may we, as officers and members of this society, express to our President, Mrs. William T. Barbour, our grateful appreciation of her interest and successful guidance of the work of the Diocesan Auxiliary during the past year. Also let us extend our heartfelt thanks to both Mr. and Mrs. Barbour for their generous gift of money to pay for the tuition of a Chinese girl, Miss Chi-Liang-Kwei, who is taking a medical course in John Hopkins University, in Baltimore, Maryland. Miss Kwei will return to China to practice medicine in the district, where her father was the first Chinese Christian priest of our Church.

REPORT OF MISSIONS COMMITTEE

There is not much to report, and yet a great deal for the Missions Committee.

The interest in the Boone School Library Fund has proved itself in a substantial way. Your Committee has sent through its Custodian \$500 and \$40 to Mrs. Cunningham, the National Custodian. Mrs. Cunningham has on hand \$5,356.

As Miss Ward cannot go back to China at present (owing to the conditions there), she is in Washington, D. C., having been asked by Mr. Porter, of the Foreign Relations Committee, to come there and help him get the joint Resolution on China through Congress. "A great compliment to her, truly," says Mrs. Cunningham. To me it seems to show that "the powers that be" in Washington are "waking up" to the fact that they need someone who *knows*, to help them.

Thank you letters have been written to all who have contributed through me; also reminders to those who promised to help.

A letter has been received from the Rev. Lindel Tsen, whom you all heard speak at our meeting last year, asking for help to buy a moving picture machine and some other equipment to help in getting through material efficiency, greater spiritual aid. He says: "I have not been here long (the Cathedral of Our Saviour, Anking), but I hope soon to start a new plan of educating and organizing the whole Cathedral Congregation for active service in the common task of extending Christ's Kingdom."

May we all remember the work he is trying to do in our prayers, and so be brought to help through our purses!

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE

The first part of this report has been gleaned from the files and reports of Miss Thomas who previously held the office of Educational Chairman until May, 1926.

The Institute of 1926 was held as usual in January in connection with the semi-annual meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and the House of Churchwomen. Three inspiring sessions were led on the two days of the Institute by Mrs. Charles R. Pancoast of Philadelphia, her subject being, "Personal Service—Its Place and Power in the Christian Life." Coincident with this, Miss Alice Alexander of Detroit led three discussion sessions upon the subject of the year's study, "Latin America," using as the text book, "That Freedom," by Arthur R. Gray. This class prepared leaders for the parish Lenten Study classes.

Forty parishes reported some sort of study work during Lent or other parts of the year—the two general subjects being Mission Study which covered various fields of the Church's activity and Bible Study. The leaders were prepared at Hillsdale at the Institute and in some cases self-prepared at home.

The Educational Department of the Diocesan Auxiliary is closely allied with that of the House of Church Women co-operating with the

latter in the promotion of its Diocesan Bible class and in attendance at the Round Table Fellowship. At the latter a background course for the subject of the year's study is given. Last year this took the form of a series of lectures by Prof. Arthur S. Aiton of the U. of M. on Latin America.

This contact with the various groups of church women is adding a new enthusiasm and interest to the Auxiliary educational work which is so well illustrated by the report from one parish that it seems well worth taking time to mention it. The parish in question is the sole Episcopal Church in one of our Michigan cities. Its Auxiliary has had for several years a hard struggle to keep alive; nevertheless its sparks are finally igniting the whole parish, as will be seen. Within the past five years a very strong Guild has developed under splendid leadership, which is divided for geographical reasons into ten smaller guilds. For their study program they decided upon the plan of asking eleven people to prepare themselves each upon some one topic and present that topic to each of the ten guilds during the year, the subjects being in general: China, Alaska, Latin America, Negroes, Indians, Mountain Whites and the United Thank Offering. In this way about two hundred women and girls were reached, with the result that, though many are not actually members of the Women's Auxiliary, they are contributing as associate members and have taken Blue Boxes. Five of the leaders were from these associate members and had never attended a meeting of the Auxiliary, but, to quote directly from the report, "are women with more than average ability, young and enthusiastic about the work, and will probably be officers and leaders in a few years."

This briefly covers the first five months of educational activity for the year 1926.

For Miss Thomas to terminate her office as Educational Chairman was indeed a blow, and to follow immediately in her footsteps seems practically impossible, for here were measured with poise, good judgment and knowledge that but the exceptional few possess. It is only with the feeling that from her unique position where she can survey the educational work of the Diocese as a whole, she is always most graciously willing and anxious to assist, that one dares haltingly to tip-toe her way after her.

The present chairman's career began most auspiciously by your giving her the opportunity of attending that exceedingly valuable Educational Conference at Racine last fall under the direction of Miss Laura Boyer, concerning which she has previously reported. As we have had the privilege the last three days of having with us Mrs. Haff, one of the inspiring leaders at Racine, you can judge for yourselves whether your chairman's enthusiasm was warranted. All those who have come in contact with her—and we only wish it might have been every educational leader—have felt the same enthusiasm.

During the fall, the chairman has spoken at several places in the Diocese. In order that the responsibility for the educational work might be more widely spread, the following committee was asked to assist: Miss Elizabeth Thomas, Ypsilanti; Mrs. James H. McDonald, Royal Oak; Mrs. F. D. Parker, Bay City; Mrs. Jos. R. Appelbe, Saginaw; Miss Annie Condon and Miss Eleanor Williams, Ann Arbor; Miss Geneva Weeks, Mt. Clemens, the latter acting as secretary to the committee; Mrs. Wm. Torrence and Mrs. Elizabeth Bissell of Detroit, the latter being dramatic advisor.

Reports are very apt to be considered dry and uninteresting, because so often we are conscious of the husks of the matured fruit of accomplishments. But when we consider that within the husks lie the seeds of new work, then we realize that reports should point the way to new and renewed efforts. There has been sent to each parish educational secretary a copy of suggestions for her work, which it is hoped will assist her

in accomplishing many new things. Of these suggestions we would like to emphasize three: First, that the Parish Educational Secretary associate with her a committee, that interest may be spread over a larger group, and that she may thus accomplish more; second, that in consultation with her rector she formulate some educational plan, at least for the women, in the form of program meetings and study periods. This year the subject of study suggested is the Rural Problem, using as a text-book, 'Beyond the City Limits.'

Lastly, and this point we draw particularly to the attention of every church woman here, attend the summer conference at Hillsdale. Will you not take back to your parish the resolution to make it possible for your Educational Secretary or representative to attend Hillsdale? The amount of the investment will be returned to you many times not only by the enthusiasm and inspiration she will bring back, but also by the practical solutions she will have learned for many parish difficulties. Education is the background for every line of church work, starting with finances, parish quotas, supply work and pledges, through the human problems in social service, the girl and boy problem, parish frictions, both among individuals and organizations—we all have them—on up through the spiritual problems, where knowledge brings poise and the will and desire to forget our own personalities in the larger field of thinking and doing for others. Indeed, it is very true, "Knowledge is Power."

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE THE GOLD AND SILVER OFFERING

The Gold and Silver Offering was taken up in this Diocese in the fall of 1925.

The work was done by myself and a committee under my supervision.

Many parishes in the Diocese were visited and the branches of the Auxiliary addressed with marked interest resulting.

A sale was held in Detroit and later articles left over from this sale were disposed of.

The whole amount realized after expenses were paid was \$5,319.99. This sum was forwarded to the Treasurer at the Church Mission House, New York, to be added to the fund for rebuilding St. Margaret's School in Tokio, Japan, which was destroyed by the great earthquake.

THE CORPORATE GIFT

This is a gift which was pledged by the Auxiliary at the last Triennial Convention.

It is to come from all the Auxiliary women in the Church and is to be used for the following objects:

1. St. Agnes School, Kyoto, Japan.
2. St. Timothy's Hospital, Cape Mount, Liberia.
3. St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska.
4. Holy Trinity Church, Port au Prince, Haiti.
5. Church of the Resurrection, Baguio, P. I.
6. Church of the Nazarene, Livramento, Brazil.

Michigan's share in this gift should be \$2,500, and this will have to be raised by the time of the next Triennial Convention in October, 1928.

The amount given by the Diocese of Michigan in 1926 was only \$406.00. This leaves \$2,094 to be raised in the next two years if we reach the goal set.

IN MEMORIAM
MRS. ABBIE M. SAUNDERS FRASER

March 21, 1926.

On Sunday evening, the 21st of March, 1926, after an illness of only two days, the beautiful spirit of our loyal friend and co-worker, Mrs. Abbie M. Saunders Frazer, was called to enter into the rest that remaineth for the people of God.

During a life time of eighty-eight active, useful years, this faithful soldier and servant of her blessed Lord and Master went about doing good, and while we shall miss her bodily presence among us, we rejoice that it has been our high privilege to have enjoyed the companionship of this rare woman, a teacher by example as well as by precept, keeping an open window of spiritual vision always before us. The influence of such a consecrated soul lives on in ever increasing value, though her gracious, wise and gentle spirit has passed to where, beyond these shadows, there is Light.

As a child, Mrs. Frazer came to Michigan from her birthplace in Lowell, Mass., to live in Ann Arbor.

There she met and was married to Robert E. Frazer, and moved shortly afterwards to Detroit, where her husband subsequently served for many years as Judge in the Circuit Court.

Three children were born to them, two daughters who survive, and a son who died several years ago.

Mrs. Frazer was an early communicant of old St. Paul's Church, formerly at Congress Street West and Shelby Streets, then of the present Cathedral parish. Later her membership was transferred to St. Joseph's Church, where she was actively engaged until she was called from her labors.

For many years she served as president of the St. Joseph's parish branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and from September, 1907, to May, 1908, Mrs. Frazer was the beloved president and leader of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Michigan.

At that time, owing to the illness of Judge Frazer, the family expected to remove from Detroit to a milder climate in the South, but his death occurred before the change had been made, and the family remained in Detroit.

Here Mrs. Frazer has lived and labored in civic, philanthropic and patriotic organizations, but most of all in the church, to which was given the devotion of her heart.

At the Diocesan and Triennial General Conventions of the Church, Mrs. Frazer was always an alert and deeply interested attendant, and she never failed to meet with and encourage the members of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary by her wise counsel and active support.

As Historian for the Auxiliary we treasure her beautiful tributes in memory of those who have passed to rest.

Of Mrs. Frazer it may be truly said: "She kept always an inward stillness, and a happy humility of heart."

We all loved her!
Our dear Mrs. Frazer!

As we approach another Easter Day, we think of her "at rest and free.

Where loyal hearts, and true,
Stand ever in the light,
All rapture, through and through,
In God's most holy sight."

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

During the year three hundred and forty-nine current periodicals have been sent regularly to some given address by two hundred and three persons. Five hundred and fifty Bibles, Prayer Books and Hymnals. Three hundred and twenty-four tracts and catechisms. Seven hundred and sixty-nine books—one hundred of these were sent at Christmas as special gifts to individuals. Over nine thousand Christmas and Easter cards and over one thousand pictures, games, scrap books and miscellaneous articles.

New Mission Hymnals were given to the City Mission and to several missions in rural districts. Special reference books, which had been asked for by the Oriental students, were sent to Taylor Hall, Racine, Wis.

It is impossible to mention all the places where reading matter has been sent; however, during the year magazines or books have been sent to every missionary district in this country and in foreign lands. Think for one moment, what it means to a lonely person to receive, through the Church Periodical Club, a magazine regularly each week or month, when, perhaps, it is the only article received by mail during the entire year, or the isolated missionary to whom a magazine or book comes as a ray of sunshine to rest and cheer after a weary day.

For several years, the Church Periodical Club has, in the different diocese, united in working for the equipment of one or more libraries. For the year 1927 the special object will be Boone Library, Waushang, China. At our November meeting, which was held in the auditorium of the Detroit Public Library, we were fortunate in having as our speaker Miss Mary Elizabeth Wood, the founder of the Boone Library. Surely no one who heard Miss Wood could doubt the importance of this work or the necessity of doing all that we can to help furnish the equipment.

There have been six meetings of the Parish Secretaries. I wish to express my appreciation of the fine co-operation and splendid work of these Secretaries and also to thank all who in any way contributed to the Club.

CHURCH SCHOOL SERVICE PROGRAM

The Church School Service League is now officially known as the "Service Program" for Church Schools and every well organized Church School is expected to have as part of its curriculum a Service Program which may be participated in by all members of the School.

Michigan has twelve diocesan officials whose duty it is to help the teachers and leaders in our Church Schools to give to the boys and girls a program of Christian Service in the five fields. These officials are ready to go to any school that needs them to help plan the work in each field. We also have Church School Service Conferences for leaders at both the Saginaw Valley and the Detroit Normal Schools for teacher training. A good many leaders come, but what we are aiming for is to have a Supervisor of the Service program appointed in every church who will attend the conferences and take back to the leaders and teachers in their school the plans suggested for each Field, and help the teachers and classes to carry out their program of work for the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation, and the World.

At the Detroit Normal School we have two handwork classes; an afternoon class taught by Miss Mary L. Cook, a trained manual training teacher and the director of Religious Education at St. Andrews Church, and an evening class taught by Miss Anna Austin, supervisor of toycraft classes for the Municipal Department of Recreation. Miss Austin specializes in boys' work and teaches the boys and their leaders to make all sorts of interesting things and she has helped a number of our parishes, both in and outside of Detroit, to organize work for boys.

I am sure there are many persons who do not know of these classes or of the great help that they are to leaders, or the class-rooms could not hold all who would come. Will you please pass on this information to your rectors and superintendents in case they do not know it.

February 8th is to be Boys' Night at the Detroit Normal and Miss Austin asks every church to send two boys to her class so they can be initiated into this fascinating work and taught to lead classes in their own parishes. She is to have extra leaders there and if you will send the boys Miss Austin will do the rest.

To return to our program for the year: In the Fall we want to help your supervisors to plan Christmas-box work to be done by the whole school and later to do work for the Community, for children in our hospitals and institutions. From Epiphany to Quinquagesima is the time set apart for work in our parishes, but we will probably find things to be done there at other seasons too.

One very important way in which boys and girls can help their parishes is by helping to meet the parish apportionment, in this way learning their duty to the parish and the diocese.

In Lent we study about our missions and how to help them, because that is the season in which the children are earning and saving their Lenten offering for missions. Next year our Christmas gifts are to go to the Indians, so this Lent we are going to learn all we can about Indians in order to work and give intelligently.

From Easter to the close of school in June we work for and study about the diocese. There are many ways in which the boys and girls can be of service to their diocese and great interest was shown last year in giving money for a font at Onaway, which Miss Elliot told us about, in giving kindergarten chairs to several small missions, in helping St. Cyprians colored mission, Camp Frisbie, and in various other diocesan projects.

Besides work in the five fields we give to the Birthday Thank Offering, which at the next triennial in Washington will be sent to the Hooker School in Mexico. The Birthday Thank Offering is a most worth-while

project and should be stressed; each triennium it goes to a different field, the first went to Alaska and was \$8,000, the second was \$22,000 and was sent to Africa, the next will go to Mexico, and no one knows how large it will be. The children and teachers are asked to give a penny, nickle or dime for each year of their age and to pray for the people and missionaries in the field. It is most educational for the boys and girls to join in a large corporate act of this kind.

One report last year showed that twenty-six schools worked in the five fields, forty gave a Birthday Thank Offering, eighty had Lenten offerings and that the united gifts of these schools as reported amounted to \$18,092.84. In consulting a national report I find that in the fifth province (which is our province) Michigan stands first in the amount of children's gifts, and there are some strong and large dioceses in the province, such as Chicago, Ohio, South Ohio, and Western Michigan. This shows that an untold amount of good could be done if every school had an intelligent and well-worked-out Service Program.

May I give you an outline of what to do if you wish to have a service program in your church school?

First—Ask your rector to appoint a supervisor of the service program.

Second—Ask the supervisor to get in touch with the diocesan supervisor, to attend the Church School Service League conferences at the normal schools each month, and the hand-work classes, or to have some one else who is going to lead the children, take the training and get assignments of work from the diocesan secretaries and to let us help work out our service program in every way possible.

Wherever Miss Thomas goes she tells the schools about the service work and what it is their privilege to do, but Miss Thomas and I cannot visit every parish in the diocese, so will you not all constitute yourselves field-workers to this extent and see if we cannot have a supervisor of the service program from each parish?
