CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.

NAME

This Association shall be called the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECTS

The objects of this Association are to unite the branches in a common interest; to promote the cause of Missions and Church Extension, Religious Education and Christian Social Service; to collect funds for these various purposes; to encourage the formation of new branches. Work must be done, each year, in the five fields of service, the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation and the World.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERS

All baptized women of the Diocese who desire to be members will be so regarded.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS

The Officers of this Association shall be a President, seven Vice-Presidents, one for each Archdeaconry, two in charge respectively of Education and Supply Department, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a Treasurer for the United Thank Offering and the Director of the Church Periodical Club, who with the Supervisor of the Church School Service League shall form the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V.

MEETINGS

Section 1. The annual meeting shall be held during the week of the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. Regular meetings shall be held monthly from September to May, inclusive.

Section 3. Other meetings shall be held at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI.

QUORUM

Five members shall constitute a quorum at an executive meeting, and fifteen members at regular or annual meetings, but at no time shall the lack of a quorum at a regular meeting prevent those present from proceeding with the program of the day.

ARTICLE VII.

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all members present; the proposed amendment having been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended or repealed at any regular meeting by a two-thirds majority vote.

BY-LAWS
ARTICLE I.
ELECTIONS AND APPOINTMENTS

Section 1. All officers shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting and shall continue in office for one year or until the election of their successor.

A majority of all votes cast shall be necessary for an election.

Section 2. In case of the absence, resignation or death of an executive officer, her place shall be filled by the Executive Committee, such action to stand until the next annual meeting.

Section 3. Each regularly organized branch shall appoint two delegates to every meeting of the Association, that each branch may be represented, but all the members shall have an equal vote on all questions except the Annual Elections, when the APPOINTED DELEGATES ALONE shall vote.

Section 4. At the annual meeting preceding the Triennial Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, five delegates and five alternates shall be elected to the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The five receiving the highest number of votes shall be delegates and the five next highest shall be alternates.

ARTICLE II.
PLEDGES

Section 1. At the January meeting each branch shall signify in writing the amount it will give during the following year, to be paid through the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 2. As it seems only reasonable that each branch shall share in the expenses of the society, all branches shall contribute as liberally as possible to the General Expense Fund, the minimum for any branch being one dollar a year.

ARTICLE III.
DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings and shall have general supervision of the work of the Auxiliary.

Section 2. The Vice-Presidents shall in order of their succession preside in the absence of the President and assume all duties pertaining to the office.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Archdeaconries shall endeavor to promote the formation of new parish branches and to help and strengthen those already existing.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of Foreign and Domestic Missions, Education, and Supply Work, shall inform the parish branches through correspondence, visiting, or providing speakers, of the needs of work in their respective department.

Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings, and prepare and edit the Year Book.

Section 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, both of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Committee, and shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive, disburse and keep account of all money received in each department of the work, except the United Thank Offering, and shall attend the meetings of the Auxiliary, reporting receipts and disbursements at the same.

Section 6. The Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall receive all contributions from the branches and under the direction of the Executive Committee endeavor to arouse and increase an interest in the same.

ARTICLE IV.

FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from January 1st to December 31st.

ARTICLE V.

COMMITTEES

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. All matters relating to the general welfare of the Society shall be referred to the Executive Committee. It shall appoint Standing Committees, which shall co-operate with it.

Section 2. Seven Standing Committees shall be appointed by the Executive Committee each year after the annual meeting.

A Committee on Missions and Church Extension, a Committee on Religious Education, a Committee on Christian Social Service, a Committee on the Box Work and Bureau of Supplies, a Program and Publicity Committee, a Finance Committee and a Hospitality Committee.

The Committee on Missions and Church Extension shall promote missionary intelligence and missionary activity among the women of the Diocese and shall superintend the work of arranging for meetings in different parts of the Diocese in the interest of forming new branches and strengthening the old ones.

The Committee on Religious Education shall arrange for Mission Study Classes throughout the Diocese and give all information regarding the work.

The Committee on Christian Social Service shall co-operate in the work of Christian Americanization, Hospital, Institutional and any other form of Christian Social Service.

The Committee on the Box Work shall supply lists of boxes obtained from the Church Mission House to parishes wishing them; shall have charge of the preparation of any general Diocesan Box and present the combined annual box report of all the parishes. This Committee shall maintain a Bureau of Supplies.

The Program and Publicity Committee shall make a plan for the meeting of the Association during the year, provide speakers subject to the advice of the Executive Committee, be prepared to advise parish branches who may desire to have assistance in arranging their yearly program and do all necessary publicity work.

The Finance Committee shall have charge of the raising of all special funds, unless some special committee has been appointed, and shall be charged with any other similar work requested by the Executive Committee.

The Hospitality Committee shall arrange for the entertainment of speakers and delegates attending the various meetings.

ARTICLE VI.

ANNUAL REPORTS

Each officer and chairman shall present a typewritten annual report, also providing a copy for the use of the Recording Secretary.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY—ANNUAL MEETING

January 27, 1931.

Greetings:-

This has been a busy and interesting year, the meetings splendidly attended, and all seemed to enjoy lunching together each month, followed by the business meetings and fine speakers who have made our programs inspiring.

Some of the meetings attended by your president are as follows: Two Regional meetings at Flint and Jackson. Monthly meetings of the Boards of Williams House and Detroit City Mission, regular Board meetings of the House of Church Women, a conference on and with the Diocesan Organization heads, the Field Department of the Diocese, Educational Departments, and Round-Table committee. Together with the rest of the Board of House of Churchwomen we were delightfully entertained at luncheon in Adrian by Mrs. Clark Baldwin. Various churches were visited and efforts to help them in their Auxiliary work were made. St. Paul's Flint, Christ Church Cranbrook, Christ Church Adrian, St. Stephen's Wyandotte, St. Paul's Memorial, Detroit, St. James, Brighton, Epiphany, Detroit, St. John's, Royal Oak, and St. Mary's, Detroit, twice.

At one of the meetings of the Council of Churchwomen it was my pleasure to represent the Episcopal women and to lead the Devotions. The Delegates to the Interdenominational Council which have been appointed by the Auxiliary gain much in their contact with these women, and bring back much from their fine meetings. The second meetings of the Parish Presidents, held in Mt. Clemens just before our monthly meeting, was well attended, and we hope the future meetings will be even more helpful, and draw us closer together in our work.

Our aim through the year has been to heartily co-operate in the whole church, stressing our interest in the Diocesan needs and work. A meeting, following communion and luncheon at St. Paul's Cathedral was held by the combined Boards of the House of Church-Women and Auxiliary preparatory to this Annual meeting. At this time it was suggested that the two organizations consider a co-ordinated plan for the future that duplication of effort may be eliminated and each of us seek to be more co-operative. It was suggested that we have prayers on this effort, so the two Boards attended communion together on Epiphany in the Cathedral. Last year on a motion from the Auxiliary to the Bishop, a request was sent asking that the Boards of the two organizations meet with him, at his pleasure, to consider more co-ordination of work. At the Bishop's request this meeting was held on January 20 in St. Paul's Cathedral. It was purely suggestive in nature and discussions concerning the subject were made. The Bishop will speak more fully on this subject later. The compliance with a Resolution from the Annual in 1930 from the House of Church-women that a committee be formed consisting of the President of the House of Church-women, and the President of the Auxiliary, together with two other women selected by each of them to formulate and put into effect a plan by which full co-operation from all Church-women in the Diocese in securing other capable and enthusiastic women field workers to join those already at work in the Diocese of Michigan. That we assure the Bishop we are heartily in favor of this project. This meeting was held in December and plans were discussed whereby this matter can be brought to every Parish in the Diocese that all may share in the work. Realizing that due to financial conditions the field work may possibly have to be curtailed, let us all show our interest and realize our own responsibility, and help to the utmost if the call comes for action.

It was my pleasure to be the guest of the Woman's Auxiliary of Western Michigan at their fifteenth annual Convention held in Grand Rapids, May 20-21. Mrs. Chas. E. Jackson, who is their very capable President, is now the Vice-President of the Provincial Auxiliary and our guest speaker on the program Thursday morning. Your greetings and congratulations were conveyed to them during the delightful dinner. The business meeting the following morning was most interesting. We are such close neighbors of this Auxiliary surely it is well to promote the feeling of good-fellowship between the two branches.

Your Secretary, Educational Secretary, Vice-President of the Southern Archdeaconry, Chairman of Advance Work and your President, attended the Conference in Racine in May. The knowledge of Auxiliary work gained at this meeting is hard to estimate. The subject of the entire meeting was "The Life of the Spirit in the World Today." Reports on the Advance work were given. Every one of the thirteen Diocesan branches were represented in attendance; eleven Presidents, and Educational Secretaries from Marquette and Eau Claire.

Miss Lindley and Miss Mathews were the inspirational leaders. Different programs given were: "The Changing Condition of the Home," by Mrs. Happ; "Student Life", by Mrs. Gammuck of Ann Arbor; Miss Anderson, California; Miss Read of England who had been a Y. W. worker in India for six years; "Indian Reservation in S. Dakota and Mexico" by Mrs. Barbour; Rev. John A. Williams, colored, of Omaha, a wonderful character and formerly a choir boy of Detroit, spoke of conditions with colored students, etc.; Deaconess Williams, work in the Virginia Mountains; Miss Upton, Japan; Miss Dies (Chinese), China; Prof. McNair of the University of Chicago gave Historical China; India, Miss Read; Hawaii, Miss Mathews. Miss Lindley in her summary of the Conference gave the message that we have a sense of our Lord's leadership and that we are moving forward—look at things through Christ's eyes.

In October I attended the first meeting of our Provincial Auxiliary as a delegate from the House of Churchwomen but was recognized as the President of our Diocesan Auxiliary. A fuller report of this meeting will be given by me Wednesday afternoon.

It convened in Springfield, Ill. Property to take the place of Taylor Hall, Racine, has been secured in Chicago. Thirty different sites were investigated before accepting the final location. Thirteen Dioceses were represented at the meeting and fifty-eight in all attending, two only from Michigan, although our quota was five.

Concerning the appointments of delegates to the Provincial Auxiliary, as the present ruling is an "Ordinance," they will have to be appointed according to the Canon unless a revision is made. As the Triennial is to be held in Denver in September there will be no Provincial Auxiliary meeting until 1932 when it convenes in Cleveland. As in Racine, the work among the students was a subject of much interest. The Conference on Devotional Life was led by Miss Lindley. Mrs. Flockhart of Iowa lead the discussion on Educational Problems, the Advance Work by Rev. R. P. Frazier. The officers elected at the business session of the Auxiliary were:

Mrs. Charles E. Jackson, Grand Rapids, Vice-President.

Mrs. Ralph Evans, Ohio, Treasurer.

Mrs. Wilbur Leak, Chicago, Secretary.

It is a pleasure to have the President of the Girl's Friendly now representing them and telling us of their accomplishments at our meetings.

Remember the world day of prayer is to be on February 20; we hope all parishes will join in some service and be one in this world-wide devotional day.

India is our subject for Mission Study and surely all branches are preparing to enjoy this interesting topic.

A final message that we may all remember. We do not wish to cling to worn-out methods, let us be eager to adopt new plans and ideals and help us grow in the great work of the church. We were told by Bishop Anderson two things stand out prominently in the life of the Woman's Auxiliary, high ideals and splendid accomplishments. Its methods have been to study, to learn, to pray. The results have been cheerful giving and magnificent benevolence throughout the whole church. Its present aim is to make progress more progressive.

One-tenth of the Offering to be added to the permanent trust fund, the income from which is to be used for retiring allowances of United Thank Offering workers.

That at least \$75,000 be held in reserve for training of United Thank Offering workers, any surplus to revert to the general fund.

And the sum of not less than two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) to be appropriated for buildings to be erected in the mission field.

The balance of the Offering, together with all interest earned thereon to be used by the Missionary Society as directed by the National Council, for the work of women in the missionary enterprises of the Church including their training, equipping, sending and support and for their care when sick and disabled, the appointment of said women having been approved by the Executive Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That to our United Gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers, that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves and their substance, to the work of the Master in the Mission Field.

Madam President, Members of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, the Vice-President of the Foreign Field begs to submit the following report:

I regret that absence from the city prevented my attendance upon several monthly and executive meetings yet my thoughts and prayers were always with the Auxiliary. The past year has been one of high lights and deep shadows in the Foreign Field.

In Liberia the work has gone increasingly forward. In Japan new native priests and bishops have been ordained and consecrated. The Woman's Auxiliary, through the United Thank Offering and money given for the Advance Work, have built churches and schools. From St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, comes the encouraging news that funds are at hand sufficient to go ahead with certain units.

Bishop Thomas writes from Brazil that the revolutionary troubles have caused no suffering to the Church's Mission, that he believes that under the new regime the country will go ahead.

Even from war torn China, where the heavy shadow of revolution and communism darkens the outlook, comes a ray of light with the news that General Chiang Kai-shek, president of the national government, has become a Christian and was baptized in Shanghai, his conversion having been brought about through the influence of a devoted Christian woman, herself a convert. How history repeats itself, we have only to turn back the pages to read of the saintly Queen Helena and her influence with Constantine which caused such far-reaching and lasting results in the Church's life.

In the sacred Bible Land there is the same valiant struggle going on against poverty, ignorance and the baleful Moslem creed. And now India, like the man from Macedonia, stretches out her hands and says "Come over and help us."

Remembering St. Paul's wonderful example, we dare not disregard these calls. They only point the way to the re-doubling of our efforts and gifts.

ANNUAL REPORT ON THE DOMESTIC FIELD JANUARY, 1931

I wonder how many of you know the exact number of Churches and Missions in the Diocese of Michigan?

When a parish becomes self-supporting and is not obliged to ask for help from the Diocesan office, it has passed from a Mission to a Church, but it sometimes happens, a church meets many adversities, comes to lean years and again becomes a Diocesan charge to a greater or less degree.

According to reports received at the Diocesan office, in answer to questionnaires sent to each parish, there are, in the Diocese of Michigan, 71 Churches, 48 Missions and 3 Parochial Missions (that is Missions affiliated with large churches) and only 40 branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, though you will note the United Thank Offering Treasurer reported sixty-nine contributing to that fund. Is this discrepancy due to the fact that some parishes actually have no Woman's Auxiliary or to the Rector's lack of familiarity with his own parish?

The 48 Missions all need help, as do some of the churches also. Some are new and some re-organizing. Their women greatly value co-operation and advice in establishing their work, be it in League, Guild or Auxiliary, there is plenty of work for those who are willing, if only in calling and holding out the right hand of fellowship.

One of the keenest examples of appreciation was shown upon the occasion of a visit to St. Basil's, not a Mission, but merely a Church School, holding their sessions in the Gymnasium of a ward school, on Cottage Grove Ave., between Brush and Beaubien. That is in Highland Park. It was the night of their Christmas Pageant, gotten up by one of the older girls of the school who in this way showed the talent a course in Pageantry at the School of Religious Education had developed. St. Basil's school has been fostered and shepherded against great odds by Mr. Conover, who has built it up to about 100 scholars, children foreign born or of foreign born parents. The school has been in existence several years. Some girls have grown up in it and through Mr. Conover's inspiring interest the co-operation of the foreign-born parents has been evoked, both they and the older scholars are deeply interested in its growth. At the Christmas Pageant, there was an attendance of 200 children and their relatives, all interested, eager and reverent. The Pageant itself was most creditable, many sweet voices in a well trained choir, such beautiful reverence shown throughout by everyone in that room.

I sat next to a Hungarian woman, who had two girls in the school. She told me in her broken English her little girl had gone to the Baptist Sunday school, when she came home she said: "Why they told me the same thing." The mother responded: "Sure, there is only one God and one Christ for everybody."

The older girls are most anxious to have some organization for their mothers, in which Mr. Conover heartily concurs, so we plan to go back to St. Basil's (I hope many times), get in touch with the mothers as only a woman can, have some tea parties and with the help of the older girls bring about a fellowship among them and before long we shall have a full fledged Mission. Is there not some parish represented here which will take St. Basil's under their wing?

St. Joseph's contributed the Christmas gifts, one for each child.

There were other missions and churches visited during the year but time forbids citing them, as I want to call your attention to one Mission, in which we are and have been interested for some years, which is not in our own Diocese, but in Ivanhoe, Virginia; St. Barnabas Mission, among the Highlanders of Virginia. We of the Woman's Auxiliary of Michigan have maintained a scholarship in the school which has been in charge of Mrs. William Wilkins, who is well-known in Detroit and has many relatives here.

Last year we sent St. Barnabas Mission \$236.00 in the annual pledges and \$68.00 in personal gifts from members of St. John's, Detroit, branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The most discouraging element of Mrs. Wilkins' work has been the bitter antagonism of the "Holy Rollers" who have blocked her or tried to at every move she has made, even going so far as to say it would be a blessing if the school should burn. Probably this was sufficient suggestion for one man, the father of a family in which Mrs. Wilkins had tried consistently and vainly to get a foothold. Within the past year, he gathered together several of his kin, mostly boys, some of his own sons, looted the Mission and burned the school to the ground. One of their deeds culminated most disastrously for the band. They robbed the home of a relative of all their meat, their victim had them arrested and several of them drew long sentences in jail. When the ringleader was arrested he told one story and told an entirely different one in court. When questioned about these two stories he said the one told in Court was the only one which counted, any-

thing told out of doors did not have to be the truth. Mrs. Wilkins was obliged to appear in court, testify against them and identify the Mission's belongings. Though you might expect this to militate against her and the Mission with the natives, it has had the opposite effect. Not only has one of the Holy Rollers given a lot upon which to rebuild the school but there has been circulated a petition which has been signed by 208 people, mostly "Holy Rollers" for the rebuilding of the school. We deeply regret the requisite amount of money for the rebuilding is not forthcoming at present.

If any parish feels interest is at low ebb and would like to visit, just notify the President or the Vice President of the Domestic field.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY OF THE HOUSE OF CHURCHWOMEN, AND THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

The task of reporting a year's program is very difficult, not because of any lack of co-operation on the part of everyone concerned, but rather because of the enormity of the work.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION:

The term "Education" is a very broad one covering as it does, the entire field of our human endeavor, and when we qualify that term by speaking of it as "Religious Education" we should not feel that the meaning has been narrowed but rather broadened. I never realized this so fully as I did when attending the Conference for Educational Workers at Racine, Wisconsin. Discussions were held touching on all of our modern, social and economic problems such as our changing family and social life and our labor conditions. They were treated, not merely as civic affairs, but as problems which can be helped by the application of Christian principles.

LEADERSHIP:

Members of a few groups throughout the Diocese have told me "that their women couldn't carry on much of an educational program because they had no leader." As to that question of leadership, I believe that every group, however small, has someone who can lead. Accept the challenge of finding that leader, then safeguard her from failure by your wholehearted co-operation.

TRAINING OF LEADERS:

As much of our work lies in developing leadership, a class was held at St. Paul's Cathedral, Detroit, last February, in which "Roads to the City of God," the story of the Jerusalem conference, was studied. It was under the very able direction of Mrs. Torrance.

PARISH CLASSES:

During Lent the majority of Parish groups held classes, and the reports that I received from several secretaries indicated that the women were much interested in the Jerusalem Conference, especially in the fact that Christian leaders throughout the world brought the every day problems of life to Jerusalem seeking their solution through the light of Christianity.

In May I had the good fortune to attend the Educational Conference at Racine, of which I have spoken. At that time it was announced that the topic for the Lenten Study for 1931 would be "India." Miss Margaret Read, who has worked in India for several years, introduced the two text books, "India Looks to the Future," and "India on the March." She spoke interestingly about the present-day situation and she stressed the fact that so much fine leadership is to be found among Indian women.

HILLSDALE: Training Classes.

During the year I have had two classes on "India" which were attended by many parish leaders. One was at the Hillsdale Conference, in June, and the other was at St. Paul's Cathedral, Detroit, during the Normal School session. Everyone seemed keenly interested in the topic and will, I know, be able parish leaders.

A YEAR'S OUTLINE FOR PARISH GROUPS:

At Hillsdale an hour was given to a discussion of a plan whereby some educational work could be carried on throughout the year. Many plans were suggested but the two most favored were as follows:

(a) A current event period to be held at each meeting, in which the leader might review articles from magazines of interest to church groups. Fine magazines which are in most city and school libraries were chosen and a survey was made of the contents for 1929. There were many topics which we thought would be of interest and value to church groups. Those used were "Literary Digest," "Current History," "Forum," "Christian Century," "Missionary Review," and (not in many libraries) "The Spirit of Missions."

(b) The review and discussion of some of our new books on religion and biography would be of value.

INSPIRATION:

In thinking over our achievement in Religious Education, we must not overlook the inspiration gained from attending the meetings of the Round Table Fellowship which are held for five Monday Evenings during Lent.

Last year a very fine program was held at St. Joseph's Church in Detroit. This year, owing to the increasing popularity, we are holding our meetings at the Young Women's Christian Association, at Witherell Avenue, and Montcalm St. in Detroit.

PARISHES VISITED:

I have been fortunate in being able to visit several of our parishes. One particularly interesting trip took in Standish, Alpena, Au Sable, Saginaw and Midland. In each place I found an interest and an enthusiasm in our Lenten work for this year. There has been the same kind of response to the work in Detroit, Flint and Lapeer, where many parishes were visited. It is truly most gratifying.

It is a great privilege and an inspiration to meet and work with these groups, and I know that the same fine spirit will be carried on in all of our work.

Tuesday, April 22nd, 1930, in St. Paul's Cathedral, the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the organization of The Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese, was marked by the presentation of the Golden Book of Remembrance, the gift of Mrs. Frederic B. Stevens.

Regardless of Church affiliation, the names of women now living, or of those who have died have been recorded, and together with the accompanying gift for the Fund (representing any amount the donor chooses) is to be a permanent and continuing Fund and Record. When the interest from this Fund produces a sufficient income, a decision will be made as to its use in some special field.

The Golden Book of Remembrance is described as follows: In dimension 11 x 8 inches; bound in medium Blue Morocco of Levant grain; back, hand tooled, and on its face in gold letters, the title—Golden Book of Remembrance—and a short space below—Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Michigan, April 22, 1880-1930. The leather was a special order from a firm in Philadelphia. There are two hundred leaves of Fellows hand made paper selected from a very choice stock of paper made about thirty-five years ago in England—the top of the leaves only are gilt edged.

Through the order of the Book various pages are illuminated in delicate water color designs.

The first is the illumined Title page.

The second, a record of the Gift.

The third, a list of the Bishops of the Diocese from 1879 to 1930.

The fourth, the names of the organizers and first officers of the Woman's Auxiliary, April 22, 1880.

The fifth, Scriptural verse from the Book of Job and Psalms.

The sixth, the names of the presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary from

1880 to 1930.

The seventh, another beautiful page devoted to this Scriptural text from Galatians 6-10:

"While we have time, let us do good unto all men;

Especially unto them that are of the Household of Faith."

Then comes the record of the names which are entered in the order in which they are received.

On a page toward the close of the book, the following statement appears:

The Golden Book of Remembrance made under the direction of Bertha Elizabeth Lloyd, by the Richmond Backus Company; illuminated by Minnie Bacon Coates; names recorded by Julia Mary Fish; inscribed by Augusta Adeline Fish; presented to the Woman's Auxiliary by Anne E. Shipman Stevens; at St. Paul's Cathedral, April 22, 1930.

PRAYER PARTNERSHIP PLAN, JAN. 1931

We have in this Diocese now, only three of the six original Prayer Partners. Of these six, three have resigned.

Miss Elizabeth Beecher who was doing field work, Miss Geraldine Huntley who was working in Cuba, and Mrs. Estelle Royce who had been for ten years or more in Haiti. The last named is perhaps the best known of the three to us because she has been in Michigan and several of us know and loved her when she was at one of the summer conferences at Hillsdale.

The three left are:

Miss Elizabeth Roberts, who was a teacher at St. Mary's school, in China. In her last letter, she was a little doubtful about returning there and I have been unable to learn as yet whether she went or not.

Miss Blanch Meyers was the next added to our list when we were so glad to feel that Michigan was sending her to do secretarial work in our church hospital in Anking, China. In a letter to Mr. McCausland of Trinity church, Bay City, for it is from there that Miss Meyers went, she had just returned to Anking from Wuhu where she had fled with others during one of the outbreaks. In this letter, she writes: "There are only five grownups and four children here" which suggests the probability that the hospital work had been rather demolished and will have to be built up anew.

Miss Cornelia Everard was our next Prayer Partner and she too went from Michigan and is teaching at St. Margaret's School, Tokyo, Japan. Just this morning a letter came from her sister at Grayling enclosing one she had that day received from her sister. It brought back to my memory an afternoon about three years ago when a lovely young woman came to see me about her anticipated trip to Japan. Miss Everard, for it was she, was then just twenty-two years old and I looked at her in amazement and admiration, that one of those years should start on so great an adventure of love and devotion to her Master, leaving behind all her dear ones for several years to come. However, one has only to read her letter to see what joy she is getting out of her work, because I am sure she is bringing such happiness to others.

She tells in the letter of the "Nativity Play" so beautifully given by the girls, for this was her after Christmas letter, and writes: "The Nativity Play at school was beautiful every one said. We need to stress the religious side out here, of Christmas, because the Japanese are rapidly taking over Santa Claus and the festivity, without the slightest conception that there is more than that to it." I could not help but wonder if that does not apply here as well.

A letter from Miss Ellen Flanders suggests two names for us to take in place of the three who have resigned:

Miss Ruth Loaring Clark, who has gone to do work among the students of the Northwest, and

Miss Odessa Babin, a girl from Louisiana who has gone to assist Miss Boynton at the Hooker Memorial School, Mexico. I will write them and tell you their answer as soon as I have replies.

At one of our meetings several months ago, I was asked to place Miss Margaret Rutledge on our list. When writing Miss Flanders, I asked her if we might have her as our Prayer Partner but she neglected to reply, so this too will have to be reported later. I am sure though that we may include her in our prayers for she too went from Michigan and we all know of her splendid work in the Philippines.

Two hundred and eighty periodicals have been sent to some given address by one hundred and thirty persons, four hundred and ninety Bibles, Prayer Books and Hymnals; seven hundred books, nine thousand cards and pictures, eight thousand games, records and miscellaneous articles.

Twenty-six institutions in this Diocese have been aided.

Four meetings of parish secretaries have been held.

New Christian Nurture material has been sent to many of the mission schools in the Diocese. Books on special subjects have been given to the Field Workers. A large Prayer Book and Hymnal were given to Camp Frisbie and also to Camp Chicigami.

Thirty dollars was sent to Miss Mary E. Wood to commemorate thirty years spent in China and the founding of Boone Library.

Madam President and Members of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council:

Your Program Committee submits the following report for the year of 1930:

The Committee has prepared all programs, beginning with the Annual Meeting held February 4th, 1930, and ending with the Annual Meeting, January 27th, 1931.

At the Annual Meeting February 4th, 1930, Corporate Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Reverend Herman Page, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese of Michigan, at 10 o'clock, followed by the regular business session, with the Vice President of the Detroit District, Mrs. J. H. Benedict, presiding.

Speakers of the day were: Miss Blanche Meyers, Diocese of Anking, China, whose subject was "Present Day Conditions in China," and Miss Ellen Gammack, U. T. O. worker at the University of Michigan, who spoke upon "Student Work at the University."

On Monday, February 4th, the monthly meeting was held in St. Andrew's Memorial Church, Detroit. Dr. Charles N. Lathrop, Executive Secretary Department of Social Service of the National Council, gave an address upon "Social Service."

On Tuesday, April 22nd in St. Paul's Cathedral, was celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the Founding of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Michigan. Mrs. Frederic B. Stevens was chairman of the day.

The Rev. G. Warfield Hobbs, editor of the Spirit of Missions, gave an address upon "Missions in Picture and Story."

The plan of the "Golden Book of Remembrance" presented by Mrs. Frederic B. Stevens to the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, was fully explained at this meeting, and Miss Julia Fish was announced as Custodian of the book.

On Monday, May 26th at St. Luke's Church, Ypsilanti, Miss Ellen Gammack was asked to present a more detailed account of her work among students, at the University of Michigan, and the Rev. J. F. Sant of St. Luke's, Ypsilanti, spoke of his work among Ypsilanti students.

At Christ Church, Cranbrook, on Monday, September 29th. St. Michael and All Angel's Day, a musical program followed the regular business session.

On Monday, October 27th, at Grace Church, Mt. Clemens, Mrs. Herman Page spoke upon the Lambeth Conference.

On Monday, November 24th at St. John's Church, Detroit, Archdeacon L. P. Hagger presented Miss Olive Robinson, Field Worker, who gave an interesting account of her work in the Northern Field.

The Chairman wishes to thank the Clergy and the various Parish Branches who have so cordially entertained the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary, and to express appreciation to Miss Elizabeth Thomas of the Diocesan Department of Religious Education, and to the members of the Program Committee for their help in planning the program for the year.
