## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I.

#### NAME

This Association shall be called the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

### ARTICLE II.

#### OBJECTS

The objects of this Association are to unite the branches in a program of the church for worship, study, service and fellowship; to promote definitely the cause of Missions and Church Extension, Religious Education and Christian Social Service; to collect funds for these various purposes; to encourage the formation of new branches. Work must be done, each year, in the five fields of service, the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation and the World.

### ARTICLE III.

#### MEMBERSHIP

All baptized women of the Diocese who desire to be members will be so regarded.

### ARTICLE IV.

#### OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE BOARD

Section 1. The following executive officers shall be elected at the Annual Meeting; The President, three Vice-presidents, representing the Detroit, Southern and Northern Districts, the boundaries of which shall be defined by the Executive Board; a Recording Secretary; a Corresponding Secretary; and a Treasurer.

Section 2. The following officers shall be appointed annually by the President with the advice and consent of the other executive officers; a United Thank Offering Treasurer, an Educational Director, a Director of the Church Periodical Club, a Prayer Partner, a Director of Supply Work, a Solicitor for the Spirit of Missions and a Treasurer and Custodian of the Golden Book of Remembrance.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall consist of the Bishop and the above officers, together with the Chairmen of the Standing Committees as named in the By-Laws, the Diocesan Presidents of the Girls' Friendly Society, Daughters of the King, Altar Guild and St. Barnabas' Guild for Nurses, and of any other Diocesan organization for women recognized by the Bishop, and the Convention Chairman.

Section 4. The Executive Board shall have oversight and direction of all work for the Church done by the Women of the Diocese not otherwise provided for.

### ARTICLE V.

#### MEETINGS

Section 1. The annual meeting shall be held during the week of the Diocesan Convention and in the same city.

Section 2. Regular meetings shall be held monthly from September to May, inclusive, excepting December.

Section 3. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

### ARTICLE VI.

#### CONVENTION OF THE WOMEN OF THE DIOCESE

Section 1. Coinciding with the Annual Meeting there shall be held the Annual Convention of the Women of the Diocese, which shall be non-legislative, for the purpose of considering the women's work of the Church in the Diocese and the world, of passing on to the parishes suggestions for strengthening established projects and stimulating new work, and of giving an opportunity for interchange of ideas.

Section 2. All churchwomen of the diocese shall be eligible to attend the convention and to participate in its discussion.

Section 3. Voting power shall be given to four delegates from each parish and two from each mission upon presenting their credentials to a committee appointed for that purpose. The method of election of such delegates and a like number of alternates shall be determined for itself by each parish and mission. If no other provision be made, the Rector or Minister in charge shall appoint.

Section 4. At this Annual Convention there shall be elected by majority ballot a Convention Chairman to preside at the next Annual Convention and have charge of the arrangements and program.

Section 5. Each parish and mission shall pay a convention fee annually on a sliding scale of from \$1.00 to \$10.00. This shall be payable by January 1 of each year to the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese to be kept in a separate account for convention expenses or for any other purpose authorized by the Convention.

## ARTICLE VII. QUORUM

Ten members shall constitute a quorum at an Executive Board meeting, and fifty members at regular or annual meetings, but at no time shall the lack of a quorum at a regular meeting prevent those present from proceeding with the program of the day.

## ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS

Section 1. This constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all members present. Proposed amendments must be submitted in writing to the Recording Secretary, read at a regular meeting preceding the Annual Meeting, and referred to the Executive Board for consideration.

Section 2. By-Laws may be adopted, amended, repealed, or suspended at any regular meeting or Annual Meeting by a two-thirds vote.

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## BY-LAWS.

### ARTICLE I.

#### ELECTIONS AND APPOINTMENTS

Section 1. The Executive Officers shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting and shall continue in office for one year or until the election of a successor.

The Executive Officers shall serve not more than three consecutive terms.

Section 2. A majority of all votes cast shall be necessary for an election.

Section 3. Vacancies in elective offices may be filled by the Executive Board voting thereon by ballot.

Section 4. Delegates to all meetings of the Auxiliary shall be elected in the manner prescribed by the Constitution for the election of delegates to the Annual Convention, but all members present may vote on questions other than the Annual Elections.

Section 5. The President shall be a delegate ex-officio to the Triennial Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council and the Meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Providence. At the Annual Meeting preceding these conventions four other delegates and five alternates shall be elected. The four receiving the highest number of votes shall be delegates and the five next highest shall be alternates. Vacancies in the delegation shall be filled by the President or Vice-President or in her absence by the delegates present.

Section 6. The President shall appoint a Chairman of Tellers who shall select her own assistants and with them shall prepare and have full charge of the ballots.

## ARTICLE II. PLEDGES

Section 1. Before the Annual Meeting each branch shall have signified in writing the amount it will give during the following year, to be paid through the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 2. As it seems only reasonable that each branch shall share in the expenses of the society, all branches shall contribute as liberally as possible to the General Expense Fund, the minimum for any branch being one dollar a year.

## ARTICLE III. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings; shall have general supervision of the work of the Auxiliary; shall appoint all special committees unless otherwise directed by the Auxiliary or the Executive Board, and shall be ex-officio member of all committees without the right to vote.

Section 2. The Vice-Presidents of the Detroit, the Southern and the Northern Districts in order of their succession shall preside in the absence of the President and assume all duties pertaining to the office, and shall endeavor to promote the formation of new parish branches and to help and strengthen those already existing.

Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the Annual Convention and shall prepare and edit the Year Book under the Supervision of the Executive Board.

Section 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, both of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Board, and shall conduct the general correspondence of the Association.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive, disburse and keep account of all moneys received in each department of the work, except as otherwise provided, and shall attend the meetings of the Auxiliary, reporting receipts and disbursements.

Section 6. The United Thank Offering Treasurer, the Educational Director, the Director of the Church Periodical Club, the Prayer Partner, the Director of Supply Work, and the Solicitor for the Spirit of Missions shall perform the duties of their offices according to the laws and practices of the National organizations with which they are connected.

Section 7. The Custodian and Treasurer of the Golden Book of Remembrance shall receive and record the names to be commemorated and the accompanying gifts. This book was given on the occasion of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the founding of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary by Mrs. Frederic B. Stevens, President from 1908 to 1923, and is to contain the names of all women, living or dead, regardless of church affiliation, whom it is desired to hold in remembrance. The gifts shall constitute a fund to be accumulated until it reaches the amount of \$2,000.00, after which the interest shall be used as directed by vote of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 8. All officers upon retiring from office shall deliver to their successors, or the Executive Board, all moneys, accounts, records, papers or other properties of the Association in their possession.

## ARTICLE IV. COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Standing Committees shall be as follows: Parish, Diocesan and Domestic Field, Foreign Field, Social Service, Program and Publicity, Hospitality, Nominating and Credential.

Section 2. These committees shall be appointed and the number of members decided by the President with the advice and consent of the Executive Board.

Section 3. The Committee on the Parish shall represent all parish guilds, societies and individual women of the Diocese not affiliated with National or Diocesan organizations; shall give them the support, co-operation and fellowship of this Association and shall promote the work of women in their several parishes and the improvement in the organization of such work, realizing that without spiritual life and activity in the parish there can be no strength in the wider fields of service.

Section 4. The Diocesan and Domestic Field, Foreign Field, Religious Education and Social Service Committees shall promote intelligence and activity in their several fields among the women of the Diocese. The Religious Education Committee shall have charge of the Elizabeth Fiske Locke Stevens Memorial Library and shall appoint the librarian.

Section 5. The Program and Publicity Committee shall make a plan for the meetings of the Auxiliary during the year, provide speakers subject to the advice of the Executive Board, be prepared to advise parish branches who may desire assistance in arranging their yearly programs and do all necessary publicity work.

Section 6. The Finance Committee shall have charge of the raising of all special funds unless a special committee has been appointed, and shall be charged with any other similar work requested by the Executive Board.

Section 7. The Hospitality Committee shall arrange for the entertainment of speakers and delegates attending the various meetings.

Section 8. The Nominating Committee, of which the Bishop shall be a member ex-officio shall prepare a list of nominees for all elective offices for the Annual Meeting and Convention. This list shall be delivered to the Chairman of Tellers in time to permit the printing of ballots. This shall not prevent the voting for candidates not so nominated.

Section 9. The Credential Committee shall receive the credentials of delegates, and furnish them with ballots and information.

## ARTICLE V. FISCAL YEAR

The Fiscal year of the Association shall be from January 1 to December 31 inclusive, but the Executive Board may authorize the accounting of any special fund on a different basis.

## ARTICLE VI. ANNUAL REPORTS

Each Officer and Chairman shall present a typewritten annual report, also providing a copy for the Recording Secretary. Copies of all such reports shall be sent to the Bishop.

## PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

This Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Michigan, starts a new phase in the work and it is a privilege to be with all the women of the Diocese. Those not already sharing in our plans, we hope, will be interested and inspired to have a share in the whole program of work in our church—the five fields of service.

Your president has attended board meetings of the Woman's Guild of the Detroit City Mission, Williams House, Council of Church Women, and the Diocesan Altar Guild—committee meetings of the field department arranging Regional meetings, Cranbrook conferences, Round-table, and Annual Convention dinner; spoken in many parishes and the theme uppermost in the minds of many is the reorganization or consolidation of groups or Guilds to serve in one body—the type and form to be best marked out in each parish. It is encouraging to have this message from a rector having the larger vision of the work of the women in the Church. "This is a particularly opportune time to convert our women to the (to me) necessary Christian view of the parish interests and work as but a part (a very real part to be sure) of a larger whole—that the thrill of service in the five fields can be brought home to them."

A suggestion from the Bishop that reports of the monthly meetings be shortened, will be considered; however, to educate the women in conditions and experiences in Auxiliary work an interesting report is most valuable. It should be a short story and the high lights taken home to the parish. The benefit of a meeting can be marvelous if those attending can go back filled with enthusiasm. Give a report, or even better, ask for five minutes to tell about the meeting and topics discussed.

The World Day of Prayer is to be held Friday, February 16. Plan to take part with denominational churches, or have your own quiet day, intercessions, or celebrations as is most advantageous. Last year the Detroit Church women had about nine hundred present at the services in the Christian Church. A communion service, at which women of all denominations partook, was a wonderful act of friendliness. Although we may differ in thought and form, it is the same Lord and Master, we are all striving to worship and serve. At the Provincial Auxiliary meeting held in October in South Bend, for the first time, we had more than our regular delegation. The meetings were most interesting and conferences were held. After much discussion concerning the lack of knowledge and co-operation of some rectors with Auxiliary work, a resolution was made that Theological students, before leaving the Seminary, in some manner, may learn of women's work and their place in parish life.

The Auxiliary will join with me in deep appreciation of the work of our program chairman. Her program booklet is being followed in several states, and one Roman Catholic Priest has used some of her suggestions.

May I bring to your attention two topics of interest. (1) The Movies: surely we can show our disapproval of the type so commonly shown—the vulgar, sensational pictures teach the children and young far easier than books or other modes of education. (2) A message from the National Executive Board urges all women to see that the NRA signs are in coats and dresses. It symbolizes a thirty-five hour week, minimum wage for labor, and elimination of child labor; bars work in tenement houses, basements, and unsanitary buildings. Miss Frances Perkins, Secretary of Labor, stitched the first NRA dress label into a gown.

The Fall will again bring us the Conference of women at Holiday House, at Pine Lake. About one hundred women attended last year and were most enthusiastic that such an opportunity for renewed interest, inspiration, and participation in devotional hours is given each year. May this fourth Conference prove even more successful. Cannot each branch send at least one woman to this meeting?

Another message from the National Executive Board urges our co-operation in the distribution of the April number of the Spirit of Missions. It is to be an U.T.O. edition and will help us prepare for the great Triennial Offering to be given in October at Atlantic City. Further notices and plans will be mailed each branch.

May I express my sincere appreciation of the fine work of our Executive Board, the splendid interest and attendance of all Diocesan women at the monthly meetings. Each month the spirit of friendliness has increased.

The new Constitution of the Auxiliary, adopted in November, will be found in the Year Book which was sorely missed in 1933. Defects may be found and changes may have to be made, but time will show us our mistakes which can easily be remedied.

The day of prayer on November 11, we hope, was the beginning of many days during which we shall draw closer to Him, and He to us. Should it not be our reasonable hope that so there will be developed in our lives an unwavering consciousness of His need of us and a more complete offering of our whole selves to His service. Our presiding Bishop, Bishop Perry, gives us this message, "The days for holding on are over and days for going on have come."

Those of you who have attended only the Woman's Auxiliary Annual Meeting will find that you are losing nothing, and those who have come to the House of Church Women will find the same enthusiasm which characterized that body and in the conferences planned for Thursday morning an opportunity for self-expression.

I pray for your co-operation to make this gathering a real force in the life of the Church in the five fields of service from the parish to the world.

## REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL DIRECTOR

Your chairman of Educational Work for the year 1933, begs to submit the following annual report:

During the 1933 Annual Convention a conference for Educational leaders was conducted by Miss Elizabeth Thomas. The plan outlined in the Woman's Auxiliary "Red Book" was read and suggested as a goal for Educational work along broad and comprehensive lines.

In February your Chairman presided at a conference of Parish Educational Secretaries and leaders, at which a plan for a study class on China and a review of Pearl Buck's "Good Earth" were presented. A suggested plan for a class on the American Indian was presented by the former Chairman of Education, Mrs. Frank E. Dow. Requests for leaders and speakers for Lenten Parish groups were received at this time.

In addition to classes in the topics assigned for study for 1933, China and the North American Indian, various parishes reported groups studying Church History, the Bible and the Prayer Book, in several instances under the leadership of the Rector.

In collaboration with the Chairman of the Program Committee, your chairman has secured, when asked to do so, speakers for monthly meetings of Parish groups. In this way, the work of the Church Periodical Club, the Diocesan Altar Guild, St. Augustine's Mission, and the Episcopal City Mission has been presented.

Parish Educational Secretaries, as well as many others known to be interested were invited to attend a class conducted at the Detroit Church Normal School, November 7 to December 5, upon the theme "Christ in the Modern World," using as a background the text book for 1934, "The Never Failing Light" by J. H. Franklin. Concise papers were presented upon Fascism in Italy, the Nazi movement in Germany, and their significance in a Christian Civilization; also a paper upon Communism in Russia and its threat to the development of Christianity in China. Brief Biographies of great spiritual leaders of today were given. A class averaging about twenty members attended. Mrs. W. L. Torrance conducted the class.

Letters were sent to all Educational Secretaries or to Auxiliary Presidents throughout the Diocese announcing the subject for study for 1934, and urging their attendance when possible at an all-day Institute for the preparation of leaders and a discussion of methods of presenting the theme "Christ and the Modern World" to parish groups. Mrs. W. L. Torrance acted as leader.

Attention is called to the new location of the Elizabeth Fiske Locke Stevens Memorial Library of over 300 volumes in the Diocesan House. These books and a file of the "Spirit of Missions" from 1885 to 1933 are at the service of all who wish to use them. The Librarian, Miss Delia Warriner, announces that the Spirit of Missions for 1933 has been presented this year.

Your Chairman wishes to thank the members of the Program and Educational Committees for their help and co-operation; all who by leadership of Lenten Study Groups by presentation of book reviews, or of the varied activities of the Diocese furthered the educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary; and especially Miss Elizabeth Thomas for her interest and guidance.

Our theme for 1934, "Christ in the Modern World," is a timely challenge with its searching light turned upon the racial antipathies, social injustice and narrow nationalism of our modern civilization in contrast to the ideal of love and brotherhood taught and exemplified by Jesus.

## REPORT OF CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The object of the Church Periodical Club is to bring together those who need reading matter, and those who have such material and are willing to pass it on.

During the past year 210 current numbers of magazines have been sent regularly to some given address by 120 persons. Three hundred fifty books, 110 miscellaneous articles, 9,000 Christmas cards and old magazines, too many to count.

Membership in the American Social Hygiene Association has been given to Williams House. Copies of the Spirit of Missions were sent to the Detroit Public Library for use at the main library and its branches. The Churchman was sent to the main library. These are reported as in constant use and enjoyed by many.

We co-operate with the Diocesan Field Workers and try to furnish them with material for their work. One hundred books were sent at Christmas to Missionaries and shut-ins. Magazines and books have been sent to all parts of the world, including Madagascar, and the Solomon Islands.

In the words of our prayer may we "bring many more to take part in its activities. Bless our gifts and those who receive them to the enriching of individual lives and to the growth of Thy Kingdom."

## GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY

In looking over the records of the Girls' Friendly Society, Diocese of Michigan, in preparing a summary of the activities of the organization, it seems evident that neither the motto "Bear ye one another's burdens" nor the emphasis placed upon the spiritual development of the individual member has been neglected.

Lenten Boxes were valued at \$131.55, and were sent to St. Peter's, Georgetown, S. C.; St. Paul's School, Beaufort, N. C., and the Morgantown Missions, Morgantown, N. C. Seventy-five dollars was sent to Pearl Sexton, our Scholarship child in Manila, and \$10.38 was sent to apply on the National Object. With \$24.15 in our treasury, the girls are already beginning work for the pyramid reservations.

The Diocesan Social Service Committee planned its entire program with a view to giving girls some definite insight into the technique of intelligent social service. The program has included talks, discussions, and visits to Social Service Centers. The program of suggestions was incorporated into the Diocesan Program, which except for these additional helps, remained the same as in 1932, having been found adequate. Excursions were made to: The Episcopal City Mission, Page House and Williams House, about 50 attending each excursion. A visit was also made to the Ford Republic and to the Methodist Children's Village. Out of town members were urged to visit local institutions, but no report can be given on this. The Girls' Friendly Society Social Service Committee has co-operated in the activities and meetings of other social service organizations, particularly in connection with the Episcopal Church Section of the National Conference of Social Workers.

The Holiday House Committee report that sending girls to Pine Lake amounted to an expenditure of \$847.00 and \$55.00 was given to Bishop Page for his work.

There were approximately 600 members present at the Annual Service held in St. Paul's Cathedral in April and it was a most beautiful and impressive service. Detroit branches numbering 35 and out-of-town branches numbering 15 were represented.

Mrs. Page, as Chairman of the Worship Committee, conducted several quiet hours during the year. Notices were sent from the Diocesan Office, urging girls to attend church some time on Armistice Day, and many Corporate Communion Services have been held this year among the various branches. The Girls' Friendly Society co-operated with the Woman's Auxiliary at the Annual Conference for Women, held at Pine Lake in September, and also sponsored a Younger Girls' Conference for "Teen Aged" girls, held at Holiday House, 40 girls being present. The theme of the Conference was "Higher Pathways" and centered about the need for religious faith in the life of a girl.

The Annual Contest, held Friday, March 17, 1933, was well represented. Forty girls danced, 20 took part in the singing, 30 in the instrumental contest and 40 in public speaking. The display occupied three entire floors of the Parish House of St. John's, and over 900 articles were exhibited in domestic art, literature, painting, dress making and cookery.

The Annual Candidate Party, held in May, was attended by a larger number of children than in any other year. The gate receipts from Mrs. Henry Ford's Garden Tour, amounted to \$600.00. A final report cannot be given on the Diocesan Card and Theatre Party.

The Girls' Friendly Society is a self-supporting organization and only a partial summary of the amount of social service work can be given.

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## DIOCESAN ALTAR GUILD

The Diocesan Altar Guild has held during the year 1933 four regular meetings and two open meetings. These open meetings have been very well attended and the interest shown has been extremely encouraging. Archdeacon Hagger gave splendid and inspiring talks at both meetings and an opportunity for questions was offered.

The Bishop and Archdeacon Hagger have helped very much by giving their time, and their interest has been a great inspiration to the members of the Guild. Mrs. Chaffee has also been a great help in bringing to the attention of the Woman's Auxiliary of the various churches, the fact that there was a newly organized Diocesan Altar Guild. Due to this splendid co-operation the work has grown surprisingly and satisfactorily showing there was a real work for this organization.

Visits have been made to several churches and Missions to give instruction in Altar Work, or the making of linens or hangings, and speakers have been sent to Adrian, Pontiac, Wyandotte, St. Joseph's and St. Matthias', Detroit.

Three silk burses and veils have been made for one Mission, also one fine linen cloth and one set of linen for exhibition. Sixty-six pieces of linen have been sent to needy missions. The Guild now has the satisfaction of proving that every Church and Mission in the Diocese is provided with at least one set of Altar linen. There have also been many requests made for information about the making of linens and vestments.

A new committee has been formed in addition to those already working. This committee will have information as to prices, materials, and some patterns for clergy, servers, and chorister's vestments.

Embroidery for the Guild has been done by members of the parish Altar Guilds of the following churches: St. Columba, St. Matthias', Christ Church Chapel, St. Paul's Cathedral, Epiphany, All Saints, Pontiac and Church of the Messiah.

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#### ST. BARNABAS GUILD FOR NURSES

I beg to present the following report of the Guild's activities during the past year.

There were nine regular meetings held. The services were conducted by the Chaplain, Dr. R. W. Woodrooffe.

It has been the desire of the Associate and Active members to lessen the burden of the times for the nurses in Detroit. In the past year we have made every effort to make money to carry on our Nurses' Social Centre, by giving Card Parties and entertainments, and taking over the Bonstelle Civic Theatre with the Girls' Friendly Society in February, 1933. In doing so we were able to keep a Social Hostess at the Centre, keeping the Centre open for the members. At Christmas time the Guild sent plants to 30 sick nurses and the different hospitals.

A Sales Shop, sponsored by the Guild was opened December 12 at the Social Centre, whereby unemployed nurses placed articles for sale. Also the Grenfell Shop from Labrador handicraft was sold to benefit the work of Sir Wilfred Grenfell.

## FOREIGN FIELD

The gravity of the situation affecting the missionary work in the Orient can be understood only when we realize the political, social and economic turmoil which for years has been going on in the Far East. There the Bishops of these areas so far away from the administrative leadership of the Church, have been clamoring for an opportunity to present their problems and this call the Presiding Bishop went himself to hear. Two events stand out as affecting the foreign mission field, the Layman's Foreign Mission Inquiry, and United Foreign Mission Conferences; the former was undertaken by a group of laymen and women who were sympathetic to foreign missions and at their own expense. Some of the findings were criticisms which were rather unfair. Others were commendatory, and the results as a whole served to arouse fresh interest in missions. The other, the United Foreign Missionary Conference, was undertaken by all the different religious bodies, and was held in different cities, at strategic points in the United States, October 1 to December 15, coming to Detroit October 15-16 with such speakers as E. Stanley Jones and Lillian Pickins, India; Charles R. Watson, Egypt, and our own Bishop Roots, China.

A complete report of these meetings was given by your representative at the October meeting. At the November meeting the Auxiliary enjoyed hearing Miss Simpson tell of her work as a nurse in China. Another pleasant incident in our branch was the acquiring of a beautiful old missionary hymn, for which we are indebted to Bishop Page for bringing from the last Lambeth Conference. The picturesque thrilling words are sung to the old familiar tune "From Greenland's Icy Mountains." In carrying out our part in stressing the Good Friday Offering, your representative sent out letters to the 69 branches in this Diocese.

On June 25 the congregation of All Saints' Church, Shanghai, became self-supporting, and this accomplished when many churches here at home are having hard work to keep going. Bishop Graves is appealing for young men to serve in China. In Japan the outstanding event of the year was the dedication of the first two units of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo. As I sat writing this report the postman left me a copy of the International Hospital News, published by the American Council for St. Luke's International Center. In it we are reminded that only two out of five units necessary to complete the medical center are finished, urging people to take up membership, helping to complete these units. I wish our Auxiliary could take up one, and perhaps there are others who would like to become members of this most wonderful work for relieving human suffering, and through this ministry of healing, draw men to the knowledge of Christianity. In Japan, the orderly, well disciplined and united national life has given abundant opportunity to the Church. The Christian religion, or the Nippon Sei Kowai, has become recognized officially as one of the three accredited religions of the empire, due chiefly to the wisdom and Christian diplomacy of Bishop McKine. In the Philippines the situation is wholly unique, differing entirely from China and Japan, having no established native Church with native Bishop and priests, but most vital to the life of these people at present, wards of our government, and will be more so in the time to come, when they are given their independence. Neither must the Church let slip this wonderful work begun by the late Bishop Brent. In Africa the work is assuming importance with the opening of new industries, particularly the rubber plantations. Then there is South America, with her problems and her vast expanses, with growing importance in the world affairs. The last but not least is the work in the Holy Land where, under the British Mandate, which is doing so much for the physical well-being of the inhabitants, the call to the Church comes insistently to uplift the spiritual side of the people by education and the ministry of healing.

With all these opportunities of service in the field of the world, shall we not double our efforts and: "Send forth more laborers into Thy harvest."

## SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

As Chairman of the Social Service Department of the Auxiliary it is quite impossible to bring the many activities of the various parishes into one co-ordinated report, for it is so far from being a matter of dollars and cents alone. And so we bring you an account, incomplete as it is, of our three outstanding Diocesan Social Service Agencies: Detroit Episcopal City Mission, Williams House and Page House, which you, as an Auxiliary, have had such a large part in making the successful institutions for good which they are.

In taking inventory of what we have done in the past, let us not forget in the new era, that these three splendid institutions will still have need of our continued loyalty and support. By this, we mean gifts of good used clothing and all sorts of canned goods and staple groceries.

Our goal for the Mission Guild is 1,000 members. Won't you help to attain the objective by taking out a membership at \$1.00.

I am presenting a brief summary of a very remarkable report from the Rev. George Backhurst, which was given at the Annual Meeting of the Mission Guild.

"Receipts from the Diocese have been reduced from \$5,000 to \$2,000. Mariners' Church cut their grant from \$540.00 to \$525.00. Thanks to the Trustees of St. Luke's Hospital and the Mission Guild we have been able to carry on all activities at Mariners' Church, Mariners' Inn and Page House, and to continue Chaplaincies at the various public institutions. The note at the bank for \$4,500.00 incurred at the opening of the Inn has been gradually reduced to \$2,584.19 and thanks to a loan from Mr. Wm. T. Barbour of \$1,000.00—the indebtedness to the bank has been entirely wiped out during the past year."

"Mariners' Inn has been greatly helped the past year by the number of aliens which have been taken care of by the government at a cost of \$1,007.34. The price has been reduced to 15 cents, which includes breakfast and a lunch at night. Four hundred seventy-one dollars and thirteen cents has been received from the sale of tickets and \$103.60 was paid up in arrears by former guests. Many have left because they have secured jobs; the aliens have been deported. Some have secured CWA jobs and are still staying on until they get on their feet again. Three hundred dollars per month will take care of the Inn this year.

"Mariners' Church. Morning and evening services are well attended. There is a choir from the regular worshipers, and the vestments have been supplied by members of the Guild of Women. Daily services have an average attendance of 20.

"Taylor Hall. Every seat is filled each evening during the winter season. Keno parties and entertainments are held which help keep up the morale of these men. Lessons are taught with the aid of the stereopticon and screen. During the year 45,849 free lunches were given, 8,242 families were supplied with baked goods, 250 bakers' baskets of food were sent for distribution among our missions, 6,656 pieces of clothing were given out, and over 10,000 meals were served. The total attendance of men enjoying the privileges of Taylor Hall was 21,008.

"Chaplaincies. In public institutions form a large part of the work, and 1,756 institutional visits were made in 28 different places. Ten services are held every Sunday reaching a total of 32,051 distressed people during the year.

"Page House was opened April 15th, 1932, without any indebtedness and has been practically self-supporting ever since. Miss Mary Oberlin is the House Mother in charge, and the house is filled with homeless women all the time. Some of these women are working part time and are able to pay the small amount charged for room and board. Many are carried until they obtain employment and in the majority of cases they pay up their small bills. Some are provided for by the city welfare and others by the

Y. W. C. A. Five hundred sixty-nine have been guests at Page House for longer or shorter periods during the year. Fifty per cent could not pay for either meals or shelter. We feel that Page House is meeting a real need in this present distress and has justified its existence. An important feature is that Page House can be maintained on a budget of \$2,500.00 per year and that it is practically self-supporting."

Mr. Backhurst's fine courage during the banking difficulties will be a never-to-be-forgotten inspiration to most of us. With the enormously increased demand upon his strength, and his almost non-existent financial resources, he did not fail those fine men, who were so suddenly deprived of the privilege of independence and who were so desperately in need of the spiritual and material help which he so abundantly gave.

### WILLIAMS HOUSE

The affairs at Williams House are under the direction of a very able and interested board of women, with Mrs. J. T. Sinclair their efficient chairman, and Miss Clara Wolbert resident director. I am giving you the highlights of some of the very splendid reports read at their annual meeting, which brief, as they may be, will I hope, present a picture of the breadth and scope of the work done there.

From the address of Mrs. Sinclair: "Early in the year when all sources of our income were shut off, we were wondering if it would be necessary to close Williams House. At the zero hour one of our board came to our rescue with a gift of \$5,000.00, to carry the food item for the year. Social agencies of Detroit said we could count on them for only \$1,000.00. We forged ahead, cutting everywhere, and carried on the same program that we did in years of plenty. Through the generosity of another member of the board the living room has been most attractively refurnished. With private gifts, an added amount from the social agencies, plus help from the Diocese, we have finished the year with all bills and all salaries paid. When girls who have been guests, continue to keep in touch with Williams House and ask to come back for the holidays and at other times, it means that this home is a factor in their lives."

One of the contributing factors to the success of Williams' House is the thoroughly delightful letters written by their corresponding secretary, Mrs. Frank Weber. From her report I gather the following: Several hundred letters have been written to the many friends in most of the churches in the Diocese, thanking them for their share in the many articles sent to the House. From our records we have received many contributions of vegetables, fruits and canned goods. Without this help from friends who have supplemented the amounts allowed by the Diocese and the Community Fund, this work would have been much crippled."

Mrs. Frederick Haines, most efficient and untiring chairman of the Case Committee, submitted a report of surpassing interest, which in part I am passing on to you: "From January 1, 1933, to January 1, 1934, there were 151 girls admitted, 4 children and 3 babies—112 girls to Williams House and 39 to Clara Cottage, ranging in age from 11 to 47 years; staying from one night to two years, the older women remaining for only a night or so. During the year 23 girls attended outside schools; 59 were sent to house-work jobs; 42 to relatives, 14 to other institutions; 6 to addresses of their own choosing; 13 to hospitals; four to boarding houses; 11 absconded.

The remuneration for the board and care of children received through the courts has amounted to \$1,416.00.

The Case Committee considers every girl admitted to the home, reviews those yet in the home, and those who have been discharged, where and what plan their Social Workers have made for them. The venereal work at Clara Cottage by the Henry Ford Hospital is one of the outstanding features of our Social Work. The kindly interest of the Henry Ford Hospital in this work, especially the attending physician, Dr. Menagh, and his nurses, who through their keen human understanding obtain splendid co-operation of the patients and satisfying results in all cases.

"The House Enrollment Act passed in 1933 by the State Legislature, enables the afflicted child to be cared for by a hospital at public expense. By this means 3 of our girls have received care at the Ford Hospital and one at Harper without cost to Williams House or the patient. The girls who came for protection and care are mentally, morally and physically sick. While here they have the motherly guidance of Miss Wolbert, who tries to build into the character and life of each girl the spiritual and moral courage that enables her to go from Williams House better prepared and stronger to again baffle life's difficulties."

An interesting comparison of statistics was furnished by Dr. Menagh, of which I am giving you the totals:

Visits in 1932.....	114	Treatments in 1932.....	977
Visits in 1933.....	106	Treatments in 1933.....	659

From the report of Miss Wolbert in charge of Williams House:

"In those times of consternation, as each apparent crisis arose, a way of escape was provided through the substantial encouragement and generosity of the Board of Directors and friends of Williams House. After twelve years' labor in serving the community we are repeatedly asked, 'Is Williams House a maternity home?' 'Is it a detention home?' 'Is Williams House a home for unfortunate girls?' Each time I repeat 'Williams House is not a reformatory.' 'Williams House is not a maternity home.' It is not a place for girls to hide from disgrace, but a home humming with industry of various sorts, so that everyone is occupied. It is a Christian home for girls whose sense of human relationships are undeveloped and who have failed to make adjustment in the community because of their offense against prevailing standards of human conduct. Here, in our human laboratory we strive to demonstrate a winning confidence through justice and impartiality and a sense of true values can be developed through the security of a real home and a mother's love and a sister's sympathy. The girls are received as daughters from all walks of life, and are meeting on a common ground.

The fact that during the past year 550 girls have returned to make a visit at Williams House, and that letters of appreciation for Miss Wolbert are constantly coming in from all parts of the world, attests to the vital need of such a refuge and gives us further reason for being proud that we may have even a small part in helping to maintain such a home.

10. Co-Operation with Woman's Auxiliary. Acting on executive board and helping to develop adult education through this source.

11. Church School Service Program. Operating under a committee and helping schools to work in the five fields, thus developing the idea of giving among boys and girls.

Little Helpers—Our work in this field has for several years emphasized the educational features rather than organization. We are endeavoring to again develop the Little Helpers as such.

12. Materials Developed by the Department. (1) Superintendent's Handbook; (2) Curriculum Guides, supplementing those of the National Department.

Our rural work is under the direction of the Department of Missions headed by the Archdeacon, and carried on under his direction, by six Women Field Workers. The Archdeacon determines the education policy for the Mission Field. Missions use the Chalmers' Course this year. The Archdeacon is also an important factor in our Vacation School policy. The work for the isolated is under his direction.

We are fortunate in having a Bishop who is an expert in Religious Education, has a great interest in preparation for marriage, and has written manuals on prayer, and preparation for Holy Communion.

Our whole Diocesan program is well co-ordinated, and education breathes freely in an open minded Diocesan atmosphere. Contacts with psychologists, with the educational work of the Detroit Council of Religious Education, etc., have greatly enriched our program.

## THE CHURCH SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Service Program of the Church Schools, in the year of depression just closing—1933, has shown, from the educational point of view, a fine record. Boys and girls from almost every parish and mission in the Diocese, are now working in the five fields of service—The Parish, The Community, The Diocese, The Nation and The World.

We begin the year with gifts to our Nation. Mrs. Wade, at 281 Fourth Avenue, assigned to the boys and girls of the Church Schools 583 gifts for Mission Stations in the Philippines, Hawaii and Florida.

Our capacity for giving is far beyond these 583 gifts, and we have given almost 1,500 gifts to stations in our Diocesan Mission Field. All the Field Workers and Missionaries sent in lists of their needs and in almost every case they were filled. This giving was by no means confined to Detroit churches, but Jackson, Lansing, Ann Arbor, Flint, Bay City, Saginaw, Adrian,—parishes and missions in fact throughout the Diocese—co-operated in this giving. Much education took place. Ann Arbor's gifts went to Mr. Agnew in Durand, and the boys and girls of St. Andrew's had a shop at which they selected their own gifts for the youngsters in Durand.

Many schools sent pupils to see the Mission at first hand, and their vision of the needs of our Diocese is much clearer.

Gifts from the White Gift Services were sent by many parishes to the Detroit City Mission. Thanksgiving and Christmas Baskets went from many schools to parish or community families in need.

The Epiphany is given over to raising money for Bishop Page's Epiphany Fund. This year the object is St. Basil's Church School, Highland Park. The Edith Maurice Memorial is also an object for gifts during the Epiphany season.

In the Lenten season gifts go to the World Field, and the objects in our Mission Field are presented to the boys and girls on a Sunday or a week-day session.

The Parish Field completes the year and follows Easter.

The Birthday Thank Offering is for the Iolani School in Hawaii. The offering is presented at the General Convention, and for many Triennials Michigan has been third in the amount presented.

A fine Executive Group is responsible for the Service Program, and the efforts of the members of the Womar's Auxiliary would be of great help in developing this giving.

It was decided not to emphasize the gifts this year for the Fund, but it is hoped that many who remember Edith Maurice and are interested in helping to promote training for leadership among young people will continue to send in their gifts as generously as in the past.

## REPORT OF PROGRAM CHAIRMAN

This year we made several innovations to meet the ever-growing spiritual and practical needs of our Society. First, we had Corporate Communion at each monthly Diocesan Auxiliary meeting. Secondly, we had group discussions at 12 o'clock, lasting until 12:45 p. m. The establishment of a Speakers' Bureau, directed by Mrs. Fred Baesack, the Educational Director, was our third advancement. This proved of great value, especially during the Lenten season. Fourthly, an Information Pamphlet containing the Calendar of the Auxiliary meetings, a Directory of Officers and Leaders in the Diocese and elsewhere, and various suggestions for programs was issued for all the women of the Episcopal Church.

In October a splendid inspirational meeting was held at Holiday House, the Girls' Friendly House at Pine Lake. Miss Elizabeth Matthews, the President of our Province, with her usual spiritual insight into the hearts of her listeners, gave a wonderful, stirring message which will be long remembered. The genial hospitality, the kindly fellowship, the inspiring leaders and speakers made this group feel they were greatly privileged and that such occasions should be more frequent because of both the direct and indirect results attained.

We were fortunate throughout the year in securing splendid speakers for the monthly meetings and their messages were so worthwhile that the women felt they would like to hear them each and every one again. The topics the speakers took were: Inter-racial Contacts, International Relations, Property and Economics, Family Life, Religious Thinking of Today and Parish Problems.

The following program was given this year, 1933:

February 27, 1933—St. Joseph's Church, Detroit—Speaker: Rev. C. Hung, Topic: Inter-racial Contacts. The Chinese in Detroit. A Chinese exhibit was displayed.

March 27, 1933—St. James' Church, Birmingham. Speakers: Mrs. F. C. Asquith, Topic: International Relations, Russia. Miss Ann Sprague; Topic: International Relations, America and Peace Negotiations.

April 24, 1933—St. Mary's Church, Detroit—Speakers: Miss Hazel Hardacre, Topic: Economics and Property. Mrs. A. B. Allen, Topic: Use of Leisure for Boys and Girls. Mrs. Schadt, Topic: Vacation Schools. Mrs. Joseph Courtis, Topic: Use of Leisure for Adults. Mrs. Ernest Piper, Topic: Use of Leisure in the Family. Exhibits of G. F. S. and Adult Leisure Pastimes.

May 22, 1933—St. Paul's Church, Lansing—Speaker: Herbert Welch, Sitting Bull's grandson, Topic: Inter-racial Contacts—Indians. Indian exhibit was given as well as examples of Indian music.

June 25 to July 1, 1933—Cranbrook Conference.

September 25, 1933—Church of the Ascension, Detroit—Speaker: Bishop Herman Page, Topic: Parish Problems—Leadership.

September 30, 1933 and October 1—Conference at Pine Lake—Girls' Friendly House (Holiday House), Miss Elizabeth Matthews, Leader.
