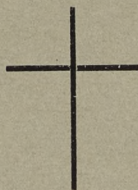

All Officers and Chairmen making reports at meetings, please hand in a copy of report to the Recording Secretary.



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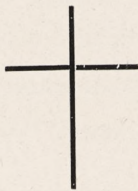

# CONSTITUTION

## ARTICLE I.

### NAME

This Association shall be called the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

## ARTICLE II.

### OBJECTS

The objects of this Association are to unite the branches in a program of the church for worship, study, service and fellowship; to promote definitely the cause of Missions and Church Extension, Religious Education and Christian Social Service; to collect funds for these various purposes; to encourage the formation of new branches. Work must be done, each year, in the five fields of service, the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation and the World.

## ARTICLE III.

### MEMBERSHIP

All baptized women of the Diocese who desire to be members will be so regarded.

## ARTICLE IV.

### OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE BOARD

Section 1. The following executive officers shall be elected at the Annual Meeting; The President, three Vice-presidents, representing the Detroit, Southern and Northern Districts, the boundaries of which shall be defined by the Executive Board; a Recording Secretary; a Corresponding Secretary; and a Treasurer.

Section 2. The following officers shall be appointed annually by the President with the advice and consent of the other executive officers: a United Thank Offering Treasurer, an Educational Director, a Director of the Church Periodical Club, a Prayer Partner, a Director of Supply Work, a Solicitor for the Spirit of Missions and a Treasurer and Custodian of the Golden Book of Remembrance.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall consist of the Bishop and the above officers, together with the Chairmen of the Standing Committees as named in the By-Laws, the Diocesan Presidents of the Girls' Friendly Society, Daughters of the King, Altar Guild and St. Barnabas' Guild for Nurses, and of any other Diocesan organization for women recognized by the Bishop, and the Convention Chairman.

Section 4. The Executive Board shall have oversight and direction of all work for the Church done by the Women of the Diocese not otherwise provided for.

## ARTICLE V.

### MEETINGS

Section 1. The annual meeting shall be held during the week of the Diocesan Convention and in the same city.

Section 2. Regular meetings shall be held monthly from September to May, inclusive, excepting December.

Section 3. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

## ARTICLE VI.

### CONVENTION OF THE WOMEN OF THE DIOCESE

Section 1. Coinciding with the Annual Meeting there shall be held the Annual Convention of the Women of the Diocese, which shall be non-legislative, for the purpose of considering the women's work of the Church in the Diocese and the world, of passing on to the parishes suggestions for strengthening establish projects and stimulating new work, and of giving an opportunity for interchange of ideas.



Section 2. All churchwomen of the diocese shall be eligible to attend the convention and to participate in its discussion.

Section 3. Voting power shall be given to four delegates from each parish and two from each mission upon presenting their credentials to a committee appointed for that purpose. The method of election of such delegates and a like number of alternates shall be determined for itself by each parish and mission. If no other provision be made, the Rector or Minister in charge shall appoint.

Section 4. At this Annual Convention there shall be elected by majority ballot a Convention Chairman to preside at the next Annual Convention and have charge of the arrangements and program.

Section 5. Each parish and mission shall pay a convention fee annually on a sliding scale of from \$1.00 to \$10.00. This shall be payable by January 1 of each year to the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese to be kept in a separate account for convention expenses or for any other purpose authorized by the Convention.

## ARTICLE VII.

### QUORUM

Ten members shall constitute a quorum at an Executive Board meeting, and fifty members at regular or annual meetings, but at no time shall the lack of a quorum at a regular meeting prevent those present from proceeding with the program of the day.

## ARTICLE VIII.

### AMENDMENTS

Section 1. This constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all members present. Proposed amendments must be submitted in writing to the Recording Secretary, read at a regular meeting preceding the Annual Meeting, and referred to the Executive Board for consideration.

Section 2. By-Laws may be adopted, amended, repealed, or suspended at any regular meeting or Annual Meeting by a two-thirds vote.

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## BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE I.

#### ELECTIONS AND APPOINTMENTS

Section 1. The Executive Officers shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting and shall continue in office for one year or until the election of a successor.

The Executive Officers shall serve not more than three consecutive terms.

Section 2. A majority of all votes cast shall be necessary for an election.

Section 3. Vacancies in elective offices may be filled by the Executive Board voting thereon by ballot.

Section 4. Delegates to all meetings of the Auxiliary shall be elected in the manner prescribed by the Constitution for the election of delegates to the Annual Convention, but all members present may vote on questions other than the Annual Elections.



Section 5. The President shall be a delegate ex-officio to the Triennial Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council and the Meetings of the Women's Auxiliary of the Providence. At the annual Meeting preceding these conventions four other delegates and five alternates shall be elected. The four receiving the highest number of votes shall be delegates and the five next highest shall be alternates. Vacancies in the delegation shall be filled by the President or Vice-President or in her absence by the delegates present.

Section 6. The President shall appoint a Chairman of Tellers who shall select her own assistants and with them shall prepare and have full charge of the ballots.

## ARTICLE II.

### PLEDGES

Section 1. Before the Annual Meeting each branch shall have signified in writing the amount it will give during the following year, to be paid through the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 2. As it seems only reasonable that each branch shall share in the expenses of the society, all branches shall contribute as liberally as possible to the General Expense Fund, the minimum for any branch being one dollar a year.

## ARTICLE III.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings; shall have general supervision of the work of the Auxiliary; shall appoint all special committees unless otherwise directed by the Auxiliary or the Executive Board, and shall be ex-officio member of all committees without the right to vote.

Section 2. The Vice-Presidents of the Detroit, the Southern and the Northern Districts in order of their succession shall preside in the absence of the President and assume all duties pertaining to the office, and shall endeavor to promote the formation of new parish branches and to help and strengthen those already existing.

Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the Annual Convention and shall prepare and edit the Year Book under the Supervision of the Executive Board.

Section 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, both of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Board, and shall conduct the general correspondence of the Association.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive, disburse and keep account of all moneys received in each department of the work, except as otherwise provided, and shall attend the meetings of the Auxiliary, reporting receipts and disbursements.

Section 6. The United Thank Offering Treasurer, the Educational Director, the Director of the Church Periodical Club, the Prayer Partner, the Director of Supply Work, and the Solicitor for the Spirit of Missions shall perform the duties of their offices according to the laws and practices of the National organizations with which they are connected.

Section 7. The Custodian and Treasurer of the Golden Book of Remembrance shall receive and record the names to be commemorated and the accompanying gifts. This book was given on the occasion of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the founding of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary by Mrs. Frederic B. Stevens, President from 1908 to 1923, and is to contain the names of all women, living or dead, regardless of church affiliations, whom it is desired to hold in remembrance. The gifts shall constitute a fund to be accumulated until it reaches the amount of \$2,000.00, after which the interest shall be used as directed by vote of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 8. All officers upon retiring from office shall deliver to their successors, or the Executive Board, all moneys, accounts, records, papers or other properties of the Association in their possession.



#### ARTICLE IV. COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Standing Committees shall be as follows: Parish, Diocesan and Domestic Field, Foreign Field, Social Service, Program and Publicity, Finance, Hospitality, Nominating and Credential.

Section 2. These committees shall be appointed and the number of members decided by the President with the advice and consent of the Executive Board.

Section 3. The Committee on the Parish shall represent all parish guilds, societies and individual women of the Diocese not affiliated with National or Diocesan organizations; shall give them the support, co-operation and fellowship of this Association and shall promote the work of women in their several parishes and the improvement in the organization of such work, realizing that without spiritual life and activity in the parish there can be no strength in the wider fields of service.

Section 4. The Diocesan and Domestic Field, Foreign Field, Religious Education and Social Service Committees shall promote intelligence and activity in their several fields among the women of the Diocese. The Religious Education Committee shall have charge of the Elizabeth Fiske Locke Stevens Memorial Library and shall appoint the librarian.

Section 5. The Program and Publicity Committee shall make a plan for the meetings of the Auxiliary during the year, provide speakers subject to the advice of the Executive Board, be prepared to advise parish branches who may desire assistance in arranging their yearly programs and do all necessary publicity work.

Section 6. The Finance Committee shall have charge of the raising of all special funds unless a special committee has been appointed, and shall be charged with any other similar work requested by the Executive Board.

Section 7. The Hospitality Committee shall arrange for the entertainment of speakers and delegates attending the various meetings.

Section 8. The Nominating Committee, of which the Bishop shall be a member ex-officio shall prepare a list of nominees for all elective offices for the Annual Meeting and Convention. This list shall be delivered to the Chairman of Tellers in time to permit the printing of ballots. This shall not prevent the voting for candidates not so nominated.

Section 9. The Credential Committee shall receive the credentials of delegates, and furnish them with ballots and information.

#### ARTICLE V. FISCAL YEAR

The Fiscal year of the Association shall be from January 1 to December 31, inclusive, but the Executive Board may authorize the accounting of any special fund on a different basis.

#### ARTICLE VI. ANNUAL REPORTS

Each Officer and Chairman shall present a typewritten annual report, also providing a copy for the Recording Secretary. Copies of all such reports shall be sent to the Bishop.

## PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

During the past year the Woman's Auxiliary has endeavored to function in all phases of Women's Work as prescribed by the Constitution adopted at the last Annual meeting. Judging by the attendance at the monthly meetings, and the interest exhibited, it has been apparently successful.

The Regional meetings in Adrian and Saginaw and the wonderful Pine Lake Conference all were most helpful and inspirational.

Especially gratifying has been the attendance at the Communion Service each month. We realize that it is not always easy for women to be away from their homes so early in the morning and we thank Mr. Jatho for showing us it was possible to have these services.

Your president wishes to express her appreciation for the splendid co-operation and friendliness shown by the Executive Board.

Since it seems best to make some changes each year in the officers and chairmen of committees in order that more women may obtain knowledge and interest in the work of our Church, we regret not being able to retain all the old members as well as the new ones.

Many Parishes and Missions have been visited and necessary Board meetings attended by your president.

The outstanding experience of 1934 was the 51st Triennial Convention of the Episcopal Church held in Atlantic City which included the three thrilling services, the special evening meetings where we heard the messages from all over the world, the luncheons where more informal talks were given by Mission workers in the foreign and domestic fields.

May I express my sincere appreciation for the trust you put in me, in sending me as a Delegate to the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. The experience is most valuable—one gains a vision of our Church impossible to get in any other way. May many be able to attend the next convention in 1937 in Cincinnati.

The topic of Auxiliary meeting was "If We Be His Disciples." Two important topics were considered, "Christian Citizenship" and "The Life of the Spirit." One hundred and eight Diocese and Missionary Districts were represented and a total of 6786 women attended.

At these meetings one feels the "one-ness" of it all; nothing is foreign or far away when the women from Hankow, Alaka, Mexico and Michigan are all working and listening together; each receiving the same message to take back to her women.

We urge you to secure a copy of the minutes of these meetings and read, study and discuss them in your organizations.

For the first time at a Convention, the Women were honored by having our own Miss Lindley as the only woman in that marvelous procession of the Open Service. Also a tribute was paid by the National Council in having elected to its body, four members of the Auxiliary. These were nominated by our Auxiliary members and confirmed and elected by the National Council; Miss Matthews, Ohio; Mrs. Cain, South Carolina; Miss Hibbard, Los Angeles, and Miss Corey, Massachusetts.

Following the Triennial in November, twenty-one teams composed of 124 men and women, a Missionary Bishop, a Clergyman and a woman from the Woman's Auxiliary participated in a Missionary itinerary, visiting 413 churches with 1239 meetings and reaching approximately 150,000 people. Never before have so many church people been given a personalized Missionary message in the month preceding the Every Member Canvass.

It was my privilege to speak in the Diocese of Northern Indiana with Bishop Jenkins of Nevada and Mr. Foucks of Kalamazoo, but found it impossible to go to the Diocese of Chicago as requested by the National Field Department. Of the 59 Diocese, eight did not have such teams visit them.



Under our splendid Program Chairman, much fine work has been done in Program building in the Parishes. One recently received from St. James, Brightmoor, a small mission, is such a splendid plan that it has been sent to Auxiliary headquarters in New York as an illustration of what can be accomplished and planned. Each organization with a well thought-out program can certainly achieve far greater success than without one.

And now for our Forward Movement? "Forward be our Watchword." What can we accomplish in the coming year? Many women's organizations are co-ordinating and finding it most successful. A rector said recently, "I used to have 12 at an Auxiliary meeting, now we are re-organized and have nearer 300. Consider some plan, if you have not already gotten together. Do everything possible to educate and familiarize your women with the work necessary outside their own four walls as well as inside, their responsibility is to help spread the kingdom.

Do not forget the world Day of Prayer, March 8th.

Again let me speak of the wonderful Pine Lake Conference. Each year the interest is increasing, over 100 attended last year. It would be a fine step "Forward" for each Branch to send at least their president to this meeting the latter part of September. Friendly contacts and an increased spiritual inspiration are the results. The finest experience of the year.

The Regional Meetings in Adrian and Saginaw were so successful we hope to again plan similar meetings in central locations in the Southern and Northern Districts.

The various phases of our work in the five fields of service, The United Thank Offering, Supply, Spirit of Missions, Social Service and the Church Periodical all need your help and we need more and more the co-operation of the Girls' Friendly.

The past year has been encouraging but cannot each one of us do just a little more to help spread the Kingdom? Let us take with us the thought, "If We Be His Disciples," ask ourselves, "Are We"? Do we mean to be? What are we going to do? Carry the message to our meetings, in our work and contacts with others. Let our ideals and aspirations be higher and with the help of Him whom we serve. We can if we care, we will if we dare.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY

Including the annual meeting of January, 1934, eight monthly meetings have been held with a total attendance of 1,925 and an average attendance of 240. An enjoyable tea and social hour held January 10, 1935, was attended by about 75 members. There have been nine Executive Board meetings.

The monthly meetings followed the plan inaugurated last year of having Corporate Communion at 11 o'clock, conferences for group leaders at 12 o'clock, luncheon at 12:30, and business meeting at 1:45, followed by the program; all meetings closing promptly at 4 o'clock.

Eleven members of the Executive Board attended an all-day meeting at St. John's Church, Saginaw, the group presenting the program which consisted of three-minute talks by the leaders in the various departments represented. There were 140 present from 12 parishes.

The Auxiliary also co-operated in the activities of the Detroit Council of Church Women, being well represented and actively participating in the World's Day of Prayer, May Breakfast, Ascension Day Service, Missionary Institute, and the week of meetings and talks during the visit of the Chinese Christian leaders.

The average attendance at monthly meetings of 240 in 1934, shows a gratifying increase over the previous year when the average was 221, and is, it is hoped, indicative of an increased zeal and a broadened vision in carrying out the challenging and inspiring program of the Auxiliary for the extension of Christ's kingdom and the realization of the Brotherhood of Man.

## REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL DIRECTOR

The educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary for 1934 centered around that thought-provoking book by J. H. Franklin, "The Never Failing Light." With its theme, Christ in the Modern World, and its dedication to "all who press on toward brotherhood," this book opened up for discussion various phases of our American life where Christian ideals of social and economic justice do not prevail. Surely from our reading and study of "The Never Failing Light," there was achieved in some measure a better understanding of our various social and racial groups, a realization of the dangers of a narrow nationalism, and a deeper devotion to the cause of world-brotherhood and peace.

No Parish is too small or too poor to have a study group. Is it impossible to buy the suggested books of the year? Prayer Books and Bibles are always available. Parish Educational leaders have expressed strongly their desire for more Bible study. At the Church Normal School Dr. Forsythe's class on "The Prayer Book and Human Need," almost overflowed the room at every session.



For our study for 1935 the themes are:

1. Orientals in the United States.
2. Japan.

The two books to be used as chief sources are:

1. "Orientals in American Life" by A. W. Palmer, 60c.
2. "Suzuki (a representative Japanese citizen) Looks at Japan" by Willis La Mott, 60c.

A few suggested reference books for "Orientals in American Life":

1. "Out of the Far East" by Hunter, 60c.  
(Adventures in Christian friendship with Orientals in the United States.)
2. "Gold Mountain" by Payne, 60c.

(*"The Oriental Mind," "What Christianity may do to help in Japan and China."*)
4. "East Wind, West Wind" by Pearl Buck.

(*"A book that will warm your heart and quicken your zeal."*)
2. "Japanese Women Speak" by Michi Kawai, 50c.  
(*Work being done for women in Japan.*)
3. "Daughter of the Samurai" by Sugimoto, \$1.00.  
(*Charming autobiography.*)
4. "Kagawa," a biography by Axling, \$1.00.
5. Japanese poetry; two hundred and thirty translations by Curtis Hidden Page.
6. "The Hundred Names" by Henry Hart.  
(*Lovely translations of ancient Chinese poems, some nearly 2,000 years old.*)

At the Church Normal School, in the course arranged by Mrs. B. R. Platt, program chairman of the Woman's Auxiliary, Archdeacon Hagger gave an interesting talk on the work of our church in Japan, and showed a chart describing the growth and scope of the work. Archdeacon Hagger also had a class on Japan at the Cranbrook Conference. During the Church Normal School course a native Filipino woman and a native Japanese woman, each in the charming dress of her country, told of their impressions of us and of our country. A young Chinese man, a graduate student at the University, also addressed us.

Mrs. Wilbur Ales, who has served as leader at the Interdenominational Missionary Institute, gave practical suggestions for capturing the interest of a group.

To launch the program, a luncheon or supper with Oriental food, cherry blossom decorations, gay flags, umbrellas, or "Forii" as place cards, with young girls in Oriental dress serving. For groups desiring intensive study it was suggested that an art chairman, a drama chairman and a music and poetry chairman to report and arrange special programs. A visit by the group to the Art Institute for Detroit Parishes would enrich our knowledge of the Orient.

Magazines rich in material are:

Spirit of Missions, Survey Graphic, May, 1926; Literary Digest, Missionary Review of the World, Asia, National Geographic, Forum, Current History, Atlantic Monthly.

One Detroit Parish made a scrapbook last year for a member long confined in a hospital. A portfolio of material gathered by another Detroit Parish was sent to a northern mission and used by them for their class on China, as was also "The House of Exile," sent by still another Parish.

May our educational work for 1935 be indeed a "co-operative search for truth through all the experiences of life," and deepen our belief that our part though small, is necessary to the great work of the Kingdom of God.

## REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The object of the Church Periodical Club is to bring together those who need reading matter and those who have such material and are willing to pass it on.

This report of necessity is much the same each year as it is a record of the magazines and books and other material sent and of the donors and recipients of these articles. I wish it were possible to record the contents of letters received and to tell you of the joy and gladness which this reading matter has brought to many lonely and isolated lives and also to tell of the gratitude expressed by many missionaries and church workers, not only in this country but in foreign lands.

Two hundred and sixty magazines have been sent regularly to some given addresses by one hundred and twenty-five persons; three hundred and forty books; one hundred and fifty Bibles and Prayer Books; nine thousand five hundred Christmas cards and tracts, lesson leaflets, odd magazines and miscellaneous articles too many to count.

At Christmas one hundred and fifty books were sent to missionaries and shut-ins.

Membership in the American Social Hygiene Association has been given to Williams House.

Five subscriptions to the Spirit of Missions were sent to the Detroit Public Library for use in the main Library and its branches and one subscription to the Churchman for the main Library.

We try to furnish material for the diocesan field workers and to co-operate with them in every way possible.

Mrs. C. W. Thomas and Mrs. Wm. T. Barbour were the delegates to the Church Periodical Club meetings which were held in Atlantic City during the Triennial Convention last October.

Four meetings of the parish secretaries have been held. I wish to express my appreciation to these secretaries for their interest and co-operation. I also wish to thank all who in any way have contributed to the Club. Without your help it would be impossible to carry on this work.

## GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY REPORT FOR 1934

### Diocese of Michigan

The Girls' Friendly Society, as never before, is meeting the live issues which women and girls are facing today in this restless and materialistic world. Young people are uniting to face today's world seeking to find together a richer and more joyous Christian life. Through our well planned programs and conferences, we have given our branches a splendid opportunity to work in the five fields of service. Our department programs of Worship, Social Service, Service to the Church including Missions, Classes and Recreation have all been thoughtfully planned by our chairmen, and the attendance at all meetings and conferences has proven beyond a doubt the desire on the part of our members for the better and more cultural things of life.

More interest has been shown by the branches in planning for the religious life of its members and there has been a great spiritual awakening in the lives of many of our girls and women. A deeper interest has been shown in the development of worship services and many religious pageants have been given at Sunday night services.

The organization has shown a continual growth during the past year with several new branches and old branches reorganized.

The Annual Festival Service, held in St. Paul's Cathedral April 29th, was a beautiful and impressive service. The Cathedral was filled to capacity, the Bishop and a large number of the clergy of the Diocese being present. Mrs. Page, chairman of the Worship Committee, contributed to the service a beautiful prayer and Te Deum of praise and thanksgiving, which was repeated by the entire membership.

Our Society has given a scholarship of \$75.00 for a girl in the House of the Holy Child, Manila, Philippine Islands. This scholarship was started twenty-five years ago by Miss Frances W. Sibley. We gave to our National Mission Object in Kusatsu, Japan, which is a mission home for lepers, and co-operated with the Woman's Auxiliary in the Lenten box work, sending boxes to Nixon, Nevada, valued at \$200.54. Christmas gifts amounting to \$3.15 were sent to Waseca, Minnesota. Our Mission chairman visited eight groups and planned a definite study program, which was carried out in nearly all of our branches.

The Social Service Committee has been alert to the needs of the many girls in the Diocese. Through the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ford, a garden party was held on their estate, Fairlawn, in July. The receipts, \$770.00, enabled us to send girls and women greatly in need of a rest to Pine Lake. Through the generosity of interested persons, clothing was secured and the wardrobes of many girls replenished. At Thanksgiving and Christmas, the branches gave generously of food, clothing and toys to needy families and institutions, and one branch provided stockings filled with candy and nuts to all members of their church school. A small mission group entertained 200 members of their parish, providing a supper without charge with games and music afterward. Also another group collected toys and reconditioned them. Our Society is truly a Friendly Society, so many girls and women outside our organization have been given assistance in many ways, which space will not permit us to mention. Never has a girl come to our notice that has not been helped. Our Holiday Houses have been a "haven of rest" for many a sick, discouraged and weary soul. Many lovely letters have been sent to us by our guests at Holiday House thanking us for the good they have received mentally, spiritually and physically.

Through a well organized recreation program, we have provided many pleasant activities for the leisure time of our members. A large party was held in St. Columba Parish House in February. A candidate party, held in St. Matthias Parish House in May, gave pleasure to over 200 children. The Annual Picnic, held at Pine Lake in June, with over 400 attending, was a great success and was enjoyed by many church groups. This is fast becoming a day for a real church family picnic.



The Annual Contest, held in St. John's Parish House March 9th and 10th, is becoming one of the outstanding Diocesan projects. Much interest was shown by the parents and friends of the girls, and the entire building was overcrowded by spectators throughout Saturday, the day of the exhibition. The work done by the girls showed a marked improvement over previous years, with about 2,000 entries.

Outstanding conferences held at Pine Lake during the year were: The Younger Girls' Conference, sponsored by the Department of Religious Education and the Girls' Friendly Society. The Diocesan Girls' Friendly Society contributed \$56,000 to send seven girls to this conference. Forty-eight girls attended the Girls' Friendly Society Teen Age Girls' Conference, and branches from all over the Diocese were represented. The Older Girls' Conference, held in June, was attended by fifty-three girls and women. A fine program on "World Fellowship" was given by outstanding speakers. This subject was so interesting, it was decided to carry it on through the year at meetings held once a month in Christ Church Neighborhood House, with speakers prominent in their own countries; such as, the Spanish Consul and others. Through the kindness of Mrs. Frederic B. Stevens, we were able to send a delegate to the Cranbrook Conference. The Girls' Friendly Society was very happy to extend hospitality to the Woman's Auxilliary for their Annual Conference for the women of the Diocese, to the Archdeacon for a conference for field workers, and to the Bishop's Conference for the clergy of the Diocese. The Girls' Friendly Society conducted a five weeks' course at the Normal School, choosing as their subject, "New Ways for New Days." A keen interest was shown in this course as was manifested by the average attendance of 100 girls and women.

Holiday House is more and more being used by church, social and college groups. Throughout the entire year the number of guests in all houses was more than 2,000, besides numerous picnics and other outdoor activities. The Mite Box collection from Holiday House was equally divided between Bishop Page and Archdeacon Hagger for their Discretionary Funds. Through the kindness of our many friends who patronized the Autumn Market, we are able to make needed improvements on our vacation houses.

The Girls' Friendly Society gave \$100.00 toward Bishop Page's tenth anniversary gift, and many of its members attended the dinner given in his honor.

The Girls' Friendly Society, as you know, is a national and an international organization, and the Society throughout the Nation has given in gifts to the parishes \$14,572.80, besides a great deal in service. Most of our girls teach in the church schools, sing in the choirs, serve on the Altar Guilds, and often do the work of a janitor, and some branches have been known to decorate the inside and outside of their parish houses. Money gifts to the church outside the parishes, including gifts to missions, amounted to \$5,028.43; money gifts to social service, outside the church, \$4,184.60. We have in America twenty holiday houses, ten lodges and the National Center, none of which are self-supporting, the properties having been bought by gifts from our organization.

If our Society has been able in a small way to bring about the Kingdom of God on Earth and to cheer and comfort the sad and lonely, then we have fulfilled His divine command and have lived up to our Motto, "Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ." Will you all pray for us that we may carry on our work in His Name and for His Glory.

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## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN ALTAR GUILD

During the year 1934 the Diocesan Altar Guild has held their regular meetings, the annual meeting preceded by Corporate Communion at which Bishop Page was celebrant, one open meeting at which Archdeacon Hagger was the speaker and during the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary the Altar Guild had a half hour program, a short talk being given and motion pictures of altar work as done at St. Martins, Providence, R. I. being shown. All these meetings have been very well attended; the interest shown in the work both by members of Altar Guilds and non-members has been very encouraging.

The president has spoken before Altar Guilds and general gatherings of women in seven churches in Detroit as well as in Lansing, Adrian, Saginaw, Pontiac and Brightmoor. Demonstrations of vesting and preparing the Altar for a celebration of Holy Communion have been given in almost every instance. Many questions have been answered at these meetings and many by telephone or letter.



The chairman of the linen committee reports 125 articles cut and stamped during the last two years. Two complete sets of Altar linens were stamped and embroidered, 7 silk burses and veils made and 4 linen burses. Two parishes were visited to advise about hangings and linens.

The chairman of the Supply Committee reports sending out 60 articles. The treasurer reports receipts of \$161.97| Expenditures \$161.14. It is hoped during the coming year to secure more active and also non-corporate members, thus interesting a greater number and with their help aiding more Missions and small parishes.

The moving picture film showing Altar work as it is done in the large church and small mission in the Diocese of Michigan, shown for the first time at this annual meeting is intended for use in any church desiring to show it. A small rental fee will be charged.

This Altar Guild sent a complete set of Altar linens and silk burses and veils in the four colors to the exhibition of the National Committee of Altar Guilds at the Triennial Convention. Everything at the exhibition was intended for use in the small church or mission, simply but beautifully made and inexpensive.

It is felt by those closely connected with the Diocesan Altar Guild since its inception in 1931, that definite and encouraging progress has been made in helping the needy Parish and in raising the standard of Altar work throughout the Diocese. With the continued interest of these charter members and the encouragement and help of many new members even greater things may be accomplished.

## FOREIGN FIELD

Madam President and Members of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, as chairman of the Department of the Foreign Field I beg to present my report at this, the 55th annual meeting. It also marks the completion of my tenth year of service to the Auxiliary, first as supply secretary, afterwards representing the Foreign Field; years which have been full of joy and satisfaction with the ever increasing conviction that of all the fields of service none present a more worth-while opportunity for endeavor than that of the Mission of the Church. I also wish to express my deep appreciation to the two former presidents and to the one now in office for giving me this privilege of serving the Auxiliary and my Church. In addition to the regular monthly and executive board meetings, I attended a special meeting of the board at Adrian reading a paper on the Foreign Mission Field, speaking before the League of St. Joseph's Church on the same subject. In October I had the great privilege and pleasure of attending the 51st Triennial Convention at Atlantic City as an alternate. While there I paid special attention to the meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and Missionary meetings, enrolled as a member of the National Training Class Institute on Missionary Principles and Methods. On my return I gave a report of the missionary activities going on in the Church at large, at the October meeting in Port Huron and again at a special meeting in Saginaw. As chairman for the Quiet Day of Prayer on November 12th, one thousand leaflets were distributed and one hundred and one letters sent to clergymen, lay readers and branches of the Auxiliary sponsoring the Good Friday Offering; letters were also sent to all Branches. In September I took charge of the jewels which came from the gold and silver offerings, diamonds, pearls and one opal. The Auxiliary is very desirous of disposing of them and sending the money to apply on the deficit of the general church. Thus far I have sold some of them to the amount of \$35.75. Some diamonds and pearls are still in my safety deposit box which I wish very much people would take advantage of and purchase at a great bargain for repairs or remodeling old jewelry. The Auxiliary has had three opportunities to hear wonderful native speakers from Japan and China. The Interdenominational group brought Michi Kawai, the head of a school for girls in Tokyo, who told most convincingly of the need for Christianity both to satisfy the heart-longings of her people and as a means for promoting world peace. In November we all who heard her have occasion to remember Miss Lucy Wang, president of the Woman's Christian College of South China Hua Nan Foochow. She was so appealing in her pleas for our support and interest in providing higher education to satisfy the desires of the new China's women and girls who in turn will be a powerful witness for Christianity in rapidly changing China. Those of us who heard Dr. Francis Wei cannot forget his plea for our continued support said he, "You did not go into the Mission Field because you believed the people were the worst in the world but because you could not bear the thought that men anywhere should live without Christ." It is this wonderful idea of sharing that we, "If we be his disciples" must ever keep in mind. In the Mission Fields of the great west as well as the great cities, all over the United States, teeming as they are with foreigners both from Europe and the Orient lies the sole hope of making and keeping America Christian. What is the future of our country we may well shudder to contemplate when we think of the millions of boys and girls who are being brought up with only secular training. These same children who may be leaders of our country in a coming generation are being raised in paganism and the Church must sit by and watch golden opportunities slip by because her people will not provide the means.

I cannot close this necessarily brief report without mentioning the wonderful spirit of unity exhibited at the General Convention on the subject of Missions. The work begun in which so much treasure both of human life and money is involved must go on and if possible new work begun that the sacrifice of such a life as Rudolph Bolling Teusler and countless others must not have been made in vain. But the National Council can only carry out the work provided for by the men and women of the Church, and after all, my dear friends and members, does it not lay a special duty upon us if we be His disciples to deny ourselves and give that others may have the "Abundant Life" of the Gospel.

## SOCIAL SERVICE

In reviewing the Social Service work for the year 1934, it appears that nearly every parish and mission in the diocese is aiding the City Mission, Page House, and Williams House, with clothing, magazines, vegetables, canned goods and money.

In the way of parish Social Service, new garments are made, old ones repaired, pantry shelves kept stocked for the needy, food hampers placed in church to receive donations, and in some cases, parish visitors assist the unfortunate.

Agencies that are co-operated with are Red Cross, Y. W. C. A., Goodwill Industries, and Visiting Nurses Association.

A shower was given by the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary for the City Mission, Page House and Williams House in November. In addition to \$7.75 in cash, clothing and approximately 100 cans of fruit and vegetables were given; also a shower of new and used clothing was given for the work of Bishop Abbott, of Lexington, Ky. Many out of town parishes contributed to these affairs; St. Luke's, Ypsilanti, and St. Paul's, Lansing, deserve special mention.

A branch of the Needlework Guild was formed at St. Columba's parish, thus making it possible for the City Mission, Page House and Williams House to receive articles from the Guild.

Rev. George Backhurst reports that the year 1934 was a very eventful one in the life of the City Mission. On account of lack of funds, it was thought that Mariners Inn would have to be closed; but by closing the former building, and opening and equipping a 3-story building at 300 Griswold Street, which is owned by the trustees of Mariners Church, the Inn is serving more men and in much better fashion than ever before. Some of these are aliens awaiting deportation, some are unemployed sailors, and others are sent by the Wayne County Welfare Commission. Mr. Backhurst hopes to make this institution a poor man's club.

Aid has been received from the Diocese, the trustees of St. Luke's Hospital, and recently the Rackham Fund has contributed \$2,500, \$100 given by a young man who would not disclose his name, and a gift of \$500 from Mrs. George Booth.

The Guild of Women, under the able leadership of Mrs. George K. March, has also been of great assistance. The amount from membership dues for 1934 is \$432, and from various entertainments \$655.26. The treasurer of the Guild reports that \$1,321.07 is the total received for the year. Membership dues are \$1.00 per year.

The staff at City Mission hold services in public institutions and thousands of people are reached in this way. These include services at hospitals, detention homes, Eloise, jails, and many other places.

Page House has been redecorated, and under the direction of Miss Laura Coyne, is doing a splendid work in taking care of homeless women. Discouraged women are given hope, young girls counseled, some unemployed are allowed to work out their board for a time, and as one woman living said: "No one can measure the amount of good done here in helping the women and girls who find their way here"; 579 individuals enjoyed the hospitality of Page House in 1934.

### Williams House

This home for underprivileged girls has gone on through the year under the loving and wise guidance of Miss Clara Wolbert. Many of these girls say that they have never known what a real home was, until they lived at Williams House. Here they find sympathy and co-operation, are taught household arts, guided as to vocation, have recreational work, and Miss Wolbert asks "What nobler work can the Church do than heal broken hearts?"



A fine spirit of co-operation exists between Williams House and the agencies which send most of the girls there, namely, The Girls' Protective League, Wayward Minor Court, Juvenile Court, Children's Aid Society, League of Catholic Women and many others. It is conceded by these agencies that the work of Williams House is invaluable.

Over 10,000 service days were given during the year; and Dr. Menagh and the nurses from Henry Ford Hospital conduct a clinic twice a week at Clara Cottage.

Many showers of food and clothing have come from parishes and missions; also pledges of money; and in 1934 new pledges were received from many small parishes. Special gifts of money, including one large one were also received. All of these gifts are very deeply appreciated, as they are necessary to supplement the financial aid given by the Diocese and the Community Fund.

Individuals have been most kind in replacing worn out articles in both houses, also in having rooms papered. The trustees of St. Luke's Hospital have aided with repairs to both houses.

The board of directors, with Mrs. J. T. Sinclair as chairman, have carried on wonderfully with a much reduced budget; they are facing the year 1935 with courage and faith but without sufficient funds in sight.

Will every parish and mission in the Diocese earnestly give consideration to contributing all the aid possible, during the coming year? Groups and societies are asked to remember Williams House with articles such as dish towels, table linen and any other items they care to furnish. Williams House is glad to welcome such groups for a visit that members may become better acquainted with the work.

The following report of the activities of the Department of Religious Education of the Diocese of Michigan is made with deep gratitude to the men, women, and young people who made it possible. Co-operation with the Woman's Auxiliary and the Girls' Friendly Society are invaluable features of this program.

## CHURCH SCHOOL SERVICE PROGRAM REPORT—1934

Many people at the General Convention in Atlantic City were amazed to find that the boys and girls of the Church Schools had given more through their Lenten and Birthday Thank Offerings than the women in the United Thank Offering, the amount for the triennium being more than \$922,000.

### **Birthday Thank Offering.**

The boys and girls of the Diocese of Michigan gave, through the Birthday Thank Offering, an offering of \$600 which went to the Iolani School in Hawaii. The new object of the Birthday Thank Offering is the Children's Ward of St. Luke's Hospital, Shanghai, China.

### **The Christmas Box.**

The fall is devoted to sending Christmas cheer to boys and girls who otherwise would be forgotten. This field of work is now divided into the following fields of service, and the total number of gifts so far recorded is 1916:



1. **Nation.**

Eight hundred sixty-one gifts go to the Nation Field from 20 parishes, and are sent to Cuba, the Southern Mountaineers, the Negroes of the South, and the Seaman's Institutes at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and Charlestown, Massachusetts.

2. **Diocese.**

Eight hundred fifty-five gifts, including cones and greens from several missions of the north, came from 30 parishes and missions.

3. **Community.**

Twelve Church Schools have sent gifts to the Detroit City Mission. Many parishes throughout the Diocese have not yet been heard from, and several like St. John's, Saginaw, which sent 200 gifts locally, have had white gift services and sent gifts to the community.

**Lenten Offering.**

Three thousand two hundred forty-seven dollars and ninety-one cents was offered by the Church Schools of Michigan in 1934. This offering was participated in by almost every School in the Diocese.

**Women's Organization Helping.**

Church School Service projects have aroused interest in many women's organizations, such as at Tecumseh, where a carload of vegetables and canned goods went to Williams House, and at Monroe where gifts went to the Seaman's Institute.

Service chairmen in some parishes are appointed to develop service in the Five Fields in women's organizations as well as the Church School.

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## THE COMMITTEE FOR THE ISOLATED

Although I feel there can be very few members of the Auxiliary who do not now know about the work being done for the isolated, I have been asked to give a short report of it.

We have on our list the names of 52 people in different parts of the Diocese who, on account of illness, old age, or the impossibility of getting to Church, are glad to have a connection with the church through a group of women, who carry on a friendly correspondence with them. About six times a year the Archdeacon writes a letter to each one and some four or five times during the year a leaflet of Church News called "The Friendly Visitor," is mailed—it is supplied for the Publicity Department of the Church Missions House.

We have on our mailing list also the names of 55 children to whom is sent each week a Church School Leaflet, graded, of course, as in our Church schools, by their age.

While the idea of this work was started by the Bishop and Archdeacon, it is mainly through the Auxiliary that we are able to do the work because they have very generously given us money to do so. It seems only fitting, therefore, that the following financial report should be submitted to you:

## Report of the CHAIRMAN OF DIOCESAN AND DOMESTIC FIELDS January, 1934—January, 1935

The reports of the Field Secretaries in the Diocese show us the good auxiliary work they are doing under the very able direction of Archdeacon Hagger, and working with the priests and lay readers of their respective fields.

Their Church Schools and their Summer Vacation Schools show an increase and a consistent effort along Church lines. The secretaries are happy in their contacts and carry a good deal of cheer to the lonely souls in the rural sections.

This has been evidenced by the work among the Isolated that has grown apace through the effort of the Archdeacon and the able co-operation of Mrs. Barbour. The committee now numbers 19 who write to 52 people, and 55 children receive the Church School Lessons weekly.

Twice during the year your chairman, in conjunction with the Social Service chairman, Mrs. Duncan, have sent out materials brought in by the various Parishes and Missions. In the first instance the box valued at \$25.00 was sent to the Diocese of Lexington, Kentucky, for the work among the mountain whites, this box was sent to Bishop Abbott as a result of his visit among us. The second were three boxes of groceries sent on November to the City Mission, Page House, and Williams House.

### Domestic Field

Your chairman went with Mrs. Spaulding to the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Western Michigan. Speaking first on "Woman's Work in Relation to the Church," and later conducting a class on the Study Book.

At the September meeting a resolution was offered as a tribute to the memory of Rt. Rev. W. F. Faber, who died July 23rd, 1934.



The Missionary work done by the Bishops, Clergy and laymen of various groups, going through the country following the Triennial, was a distinct service to wider and better understanding of the Church's work; and the desire to implant in each Parish as far as possible knowledge of His Kingdom as it is realized all over these United States, and Missionary districts attached to us. If this knowledge is persistently increased, our giving should be stimulated and certainly our prayers inspired for His work which is ours to do.

To the Detroit Branch of St. Barnabas Guild for Nurses:

I beg to submit the following report of the Detroit Branch.

The activities of the Guild have practically been the same as previous years.

The Guild regretted very much the closing of St. John's Community House, for it was necessary for us then to close our nurses' social center.

Our Chaplain, Rev. Robert Woodroffe, resigned in May, 1934, owing to leaving the city. The Rev. Kirk B. O'Ferrall, Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral, was elected to fill this vacancy. The headquarters for our monthly services and meetings have been returned to St. Paul's Cathedral.

The two outstanding religious services of the Guild during the year are the Florence Nightingale Services held in May in St. Paul's Cathedral. This service forms an annual baccalaureate service for all schools of nurses, and nurses of the Detroit City Hospitals. There was an attendance of six hundred nurses in uniform.

The visit to Christ Church, Cranbrook, in June is always an outstanding event. The service followed by supper on the lawn of the Church.

The regular monthly services are conducted by our Chaplain, or a Priest Associate. These meetings are generally followed by social programs.

This year we have had most interesting visitors from the following Missionaries who are members of the Guild and to whom the Guilds render financial assistance in their work:

Miss Cora Simpson—General Secretary Nurses' Association, Hanchow, China.

Miss Agnes Dunn—Former member Visiting Nurses' Association, Detroit, Michigan, Public Nurses.

Miss Tilannia Rajputana—India.

Miss Frances Fell—Former member Visiting Nurses' Association, Detroit—"Mission St. John's on the Mountains," near Endicott in Blue Ridge Mountains, Virginia.

Miss Eleanor Marable—St. Barnabas Mission, Elkton, Va.

Miss Ellen Hicks—Puerto Rico, superintendent School of Nurses, Ponce Hospital. Her salary is entirely paid by National Council to which all local branches contribute.

The Detroit Branch contributes yearly to Frontier Nursing Service, Kentucky.

Nurses who had to spend Christmas as "shut ins" in their hospital due to illness are always remembered by the Guild.

Subscription to magazines to be shared by sick nurses are sent to Eastlawn and Maybury Sanitorium, Northville, Oakland County Sanitorium, Pontiac.

It was my privilege to attend the Fall Meeting of our National Council, held in Atlantic City, New Jersey, in October last, same time as the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church. The Convention hearing that the Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses was planning to celebrate its semi-centennial before the General Convention would meet again, passed the following resolution in both House of Bishops and House of Deputies.

"RESOLVED, That the Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses, which since its organization in 1886 has enrolled thousands of nurses in its membership for the maintenance of the spiritual life and the advancement of the highest ideals in the practice of their profession, is offered the congratulations of this Convention on its approaching fiftieth anniversary, and is cordially commended to the Church for the interest and prayers of our clergy and people."

## ANNUAL REPORT OF PROGRAM CHAIRMAN

In 1932 we sought to familiarize our members and their parishes with the spiritual and practical value of the church organizations which already existed, such as the Girls' Friendly Society, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, etc.

In 1933 all our programs dealt with the six fields of service: The family, the parish, the diocese, the community, the nation and the world.

Since 1934 was the Triennial year, we dealt with the subjects to be discussed there, Christian Missions, both domestic and foreign. The development of plans and the remedies for our own parish and diocesan problems were sought also.

As a result of this three years' program of ours, the Auxiliary has seemed to become more conscious of the good fellowship to be attained in its midst and to feel more responsibility, not only for those in the immediate environment, but also for those peoples and projects in distant lands.

As signs of progress this year, we find the following: greater attendance at the Corporate Communion service, more parish programs printed or planned, the Speakers' Bureau called upon throughout the year, the revised Information Pamphlet used oftener in the parishes, greater interest in exhibits and posters, more calls for meetings out of town, and a larger attendance at the noon-day conferences. Special meetings of our board were held in Adrian and Saginaw, where cordial welcome was given to all speakers.

May 28, 1934—St. James' Church, Grosse Ile. Speaker: Dr. Adelaide Case of Columbia University. Topic: "Women and Christian Citizenship."

June 24-30, 1934—Cranbrook Conference.

September 27-28, 1934—Pine Lake Conference.

September 24, 1934—St. Columba's Church, Detroit. Speaker: Dr. Nur Malik, a native of India. Topic: "World Friendship."

October 29, 1934—Grace Church, Port Huron. Speakers: Triennial delegates. Topic: "The Triennial Convention." An exhibit of the Domestic Mission work shown.

November 26, 1934—St. Matthias' Church, Detroit. Speakers: Bishop Herman Page of Michigan and Miss Lucy Wang of China. Topics: "Diocesan Problems" and "Christian Colleges in China."

January 8, 1935—Trinity Church, Detroit. Silver Tea. Musical program.

I wish to thank my Program Committee, the Bishop, the Diocesan Officers, the members of the National and the Provincial Boards, the Speakers, and the many, many others who by their suggestions and cheerful assistance have made these three years full of joy and inspiration to me.
