I should like to congratulate and to thank the Officers, Chairmen and all their committee members for their devotion to the work and unselfish gift of time and effort. I should also like to express my appreciation to Bishop Page and Bishop Creighton for their never failing help and encouragement.

An effort has been made this year to carry out one of the special messages from the Triennial of 1937, to work toward a better understanding of Christian Unity. To further this the Auxiliary members have been urged to attend all the open meetings of the Council of Church Women. The Quiet Day of Prayer was omitted that the women might join with the Council in their Ascension Day Service. Can we not cooperate more often in whatever concerted Christian activities are offered and approach our fellow Christians with a more sincere appreciation of all that we have in common and put less emphasis on our differences.

During this year a Committee in Christian Research appointed by Bishop Page has been studying the effect of various conditions in the world today on the life of the Family. The Auxiliary program has in conference and meetings emphasized the study of the Family and has taken for the theme of the 1939 Convention "The Church and Good Family Living."

The class on Women's work included in the regular curriculum of the Cranbrook Conference proved very popular and plans are under way to have such a class at the 1939 Conference. This class with many other splendid ones offered at Cranbrook, at the Normal School, and the Round Table Fellowship, make for a well rounded Leadership Training course. To Miss Thomas and Chairmen and Committees planning these courses, we are greatly indebted, and I hope we will show our appreciation by taking advantage of these splendid opportunities.

You may be interested in a brief report of your President's activities, during the year. I have attended all meetings of the Executive Board, all but one Monthly Meeting of the Auxiliary, I was also on the Faculty of the Cranbrook Conference, have attended the meetings of the Committee on Publicity and of the Field Department, meetings of the Detroit Council of Church Women, Williams House and Page House whenever possible, Program and Educational Committee Meetings, have spoken at nine Parish Auxiliary Meetings, attended the Provincial Synod in Flint, giving the address of welcome to the Provincial Woman's Auxiliary, have served on a sub-committee of the Committee in Christian Research, have contributed to the "Diocese of Michigan" and have edited the News Letter.

The past year has been a very busy one for us all, but we must ask ourselves how vital has it been? Has it really made a difference in our Communities that a branch of the Auxiliary is functioning in a Parish Church? Have we seen the real purpose of the Auxiliary? Bishop Fenner of the Diocese of Kansas says that the Auxiliary is one of the liveliest, most modern and comprehensive organizations in present

day social and religious group activities. It neglects, he says, no concern of the Christian woman in either her spiritual life or her interest as a Christian with a world view. Are we allowing ourselves to be so engrossed in the "time worn" church activities or are we as individuals or as groups trying to learn how to establish a higher type of Christian social order and accept our responsibilities as church women in the present social, political, and religious chaos?

"I love Jesus Christ and want to be His disciple. Therefore I must set forward His Kingdom on earth.

"To do this I must prepare myself by study, worship and prayer. Having prepared myself, I must work individually and in my group in the Five Fields of Service—the parish, the community, the diocese, the nation and the world.

"I cannot do all the work of the World, so I must give as generously as possible that others may do it.

"Finally I believe that it matters tremendously whether or not I, one woman do this, and it will affect the progress of the Kingdom."

October 18, 19, and 20 attended the Synod of the Fifth Province in Flint. Your representative takes this opportunity to thank the Board of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary for making it possible for her to attend this very enlightening and interesting meeting.

October 21 attended the meeting of the Northern Convocation in Cheboygan at St. James' Church of which the Reverend Francis Drake is Rector. The afternoon was devoted to a meeting of the women of the Northern District, at which meeting your representative presided. The speaker of the afternoon was Mrs. Creighton, wife of Bishop Creighton. Mrs. Creighton gave a very interesting talk about her life in Mexico.

Your representative is still trying to devise a means of making personal contact with the different groups of women in the Northern District. So far she has not been very successful, but has not lost hope yet of finding a way to do so.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

Since the Convention of 1938, there have been held eight regular meetings of the Executive Board; one special meeting; one Parish Presidents meeting; and seven regular monthly meetings of the Diocesan Auxiliary. Five of the Diocesan meetings were held in Detroit, one at St. Johns, Michigan, and one in Pontiac. The average attendance throughout the year was 220.

The programs have covered all phases of the work of the Auxiliary, but the Educational Program has been especially stressed. In March, Mrs. D. D. Tabor, a National Field Worker, who had been visiting many Auxiliary Groups in the Diocese, spoke at a monthly meeting, a Board meeting, and at the Presidents Conference. Her general subject was "The Work of the Woman's Auxiliary in Relation to the National Council." The splendid work of the National Executive Board was evaluated, the organization of the Church was outlined, and valuable suggestions made to interest larger groups of women and relate all Auxiliary undertakings with the Program of the General Church.

Another outstanding meeting was the one held at All Saints in Pontiac, at which time Dr. D. A. McGregor, of the National Department of Religious Education, spoke on "What Women Can Do in Religious Education": a simple beautiful message, "To make people at home with God, their fellowmen, and in the Church of God."

Besides the Regular Meetings, the Auxiliary has also participated in a Summer Conference at Cranbrook, held a Conference at Pine Lake, and was well represented at the Quiet Day conducted by the Detroit Council of Church Women in May.

In October, the Provincial Synod was held in Flint, a well attended and most inspiring council.

It is a great privilege to be among those who serve the organization on your Board in endeavoring to carry forward the program of the Church for the extension of the Kingdom.





The meeting of the year considered the most worthwhile, and the one your committee wishes to commend to all parishes, was the one at St. Clement's Mission, Inkster. The chairmen of the departments met around a table with like chairmen of the Diocesan Auxiliary to ask and to have answered many, many questions regarding the needs of the mission and the church at large. Your committee felt that in this manner it was able to comprehend the needs of St. Clement's much better than if the speakers had spoken to the whole mission group.

During this year your chairman has conducted classes on "The Rural Church," and sponsored a class on "The City Church" at the Normal School; conducted an Institute of Study for Lenten Classes; met with Educational Secretaries in conference; attended the Woman's Auxiliary Board Meetings excepting two.

I am including in this report the reports of several committee members: Mrs. John Spaulding on the Forward Movement, and Mrs. E. N. Lord on Visual Education, and Mrs. B. R. Platt on Methods, Materials and Projects—which I especially commend to your attention. Mrs. Ferry has done some excellent program planning. Please, before you make out your next year's one, consult her.

Your committee thinks that there should be more study in parish groups, less listening in to speakers, more effort to inform ourselves concerning the advance of the church, so that the Kingdom may come and that we may in our turn help not retard the progress.

 - How May We Follow Christ Today
 - The Meaning of Evangelism for Our Day and Our Individual Responsibility for Evangelism.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The year 1938 marked the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Church Periodical Club and an effort has been made to increase the Endowment Fund, the slogan being 'Fifty thousands dollars for fifty years.'

The amount received during the year was \$2,543.20, which brings the total up to \$50,736.88.

The interest from this fund is used to buy new books. At the Epiphany Tea given at St. Paul's Memorial Church, the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary celebrated this anniversary. The rector, the Rev. James G. Widdifield, gave an outline of the history and work of the Club.

The Rt. Rev. Herman Page and the Rt. Rev. Frank W. Creighton were present and spoke congratulating the Club and commanding the work.

The Auxiliary very generously gave the silver offering which amounted to \$15.92 to the Endowment Fund. From the sale of old gold and silver \$21.00 was realized and from gifts from individuals and Parish organizations \$78.08. Total given by this Diocese, \$115.00.

This year a Diocesan Committee has been appointed. The members are Mrs. Donald C. Stevenson, Mrs. Holmes R. Martin, Mrs. Maurice Hammond, the Rev. R. W. Woodroffe, Jr., and the Diocesan Director.

For some time Bishop Page has been desirous to have small lending libraries in Church Schools. With the Bishop's approval and after considerable study, this committee has suggested twenty-five books suitable for such libraries, the list having been published in the December issue of the Diocese of Michigan.

Two hundred and twenty magazines have been sent regularly to some given address by one hundred and fifteen persons, 1,500 books, hundreds of odd magazines and cards and miscellaneous articles too numerous to mention.

There have been four meetings of the Parish Secretaries.

I wish to thank the Secretaries for their fine co-operation and interest, also to thank everyone who has contributed to the work of the Club.

The Diocesan Solicitor for the Spirit of Missions has, during the year of 1938, attended five of the seven monthly meetings of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary with their preceding Board meetings. Two meetings were missed through absence from home and one because of a meeting on that date of the National Cathedral Guild with Bishop Freeman, of Washington, as guest speaker. Schadt is head of study and devotions, Miss Grace Annis of publicity and Mrs. John Shoemaker is our extension secretary.

Our study program has included, Our Hand Book, Our Life of Prayer, Art of Living, Women of the Bible, Romance of the Book of Common Prayer and in one chapter an extra meeting is devoted to Bible study.

The services of the Order are many and varied such as altar work, making and laundering of vestments, distributions of flowers, calling, the Day of Prayer on All Saint's Day, baskets for the needy, dresses for the Goodfellows, teaching in the Church School, scrap-books and ANYTHING else that the rector wishes for the Spiritual Upbuilding of the Parish.

Two outstanding things have been done that have and will continue to aid the spiritual life of the chapters. One is the meditation that is prepared and given by different members at the opening of each meeting of the chapters and the Assembly. The other is the Day of Prayer that the new St. Hilda's Chapter started in September and which is to be an annual affair. It started at 2 and continued until 7:30 P. M. with meditations by the rector, the Rev. O. R. Berkeley.

The past year two chapters have been added to the roll, St. Hilda, a senior group of young women in St. Columba and a junior chapter at St. John.

The Order is so very grateful for the time that has been given to it on the Diocesan Auxiliary, Cranbrook and Convention programs. It offers an extra opportunity for the Order to be known and thereby to grow.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ALTAR GUILD

The Altar Guild has held four regular meetings during the year.

The Constitution and By-Laws have been revised and amended and copies sent to all members.

A Quiet morning was held in St. John's Chapel, St. John's Church, in May. The Communion Service was followed by service of Meditation and Prayer, conducted by Archdeacon Hagger.

The following churches and missions have been visited during the year: Trinity Church, Church of the Epiphany, All Saints, St. Timothy, St. Andrew's, Ann Arbor; St. Michael and St. Clement's Missions.

The motion picture of altar work as done at St. Paul's Cathedral and St. Timothy's Mission have been shown when requested, also the figures representing the three orders of the ministry, Bishop, Priest and Deacon with vestments, and talks in altar guild work have been given. These figures are available for use by Parishes and Missions' Altar Guild Society, also the films. A small rental fee is charged for the film.

During the year there has been organized an Altar Guild Society at the Episcopal City Mission to care for altar and vestments of Mariners Church.

At the Cranbrook Conference in June the Altar Guild sponsored an illustrated talk in Ecclesiastical Embroideries and Vestments, given by Mrs. Adele Weibel, Curator of Textiles of the Detroit Art Institute. During the Diocesan Normal School in October, Mrs. Weibel gave another talk—sponsored by the Guild, on the same subject in the Textiles Gallery of Art Institute, illustrating her talk by showing embroideries in the Institute collection.

At the first meeting in October Archdeacon Hagger gave a most interesting talk and descriptions of altars which he saw in cathedrals and churches while in England and Scotland this past summer.

There are 24 active members and 30 corporate members of the Guild.

During the year a Committee listed books in Diocesan Library pertaining to Altar Guild work. These books may be borrowed any time from the Diocesan Library.

A Junior Altar Guild Committee was appointed during the year. This committee made a survey finding how many Junior Groups there were in the city, and what work they were doing. This committee submitted an interesting report. At the November meeting of the Altar Guild, Mrs. E. R. Milburn was appointed Chairman of the Junior Committee, Miss Grace Murray, Assistant Chairman. For further information, a complete report of the year's work may be secured from the President.

Mrs. William T. Barbour has sent the Church School leaflets week after week for several years. She deserves much appreciation for faithful service.

Mrs. Edwin N. Lord keeps in touch with a large group at the Michigan Home at Lapeer. Again this year she went out to the Home two days before Christmas with Mrs. Stephens, and took gifts and several hundred cards, fruit and candy for a party.

The Committee has four meetings a year when the Archdeacon meets with the members to encourage them and suggest new approaches. The work is discussed, and occasionally a member has a letter which is so touching, or shows such confidence and friendship that she feels justified in sharing a passage with the others. There is great satisfaction in this work!

Now for a plea—if you live in a small city or town where you and your rector might have contact with people in the country, who cannot get to church frequently, or are otherwise isolated, will you not, please, send us names or ask your rector to do so. We surely are not in con-

tact with all of our own church people in this Diocese who are not connected with a parish. Perhaps you may find church people when you are in the country on a vacation. We are equipped to take care of many more correspondents—we have waiting lists of committee members, but we cannot write unless we have names. Let us be as effective as we want to be!

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE DIOCESAN AND DOMESTIC FIELD

Your Diocesan and Domestic Field Chairman has spoken before several groups during the year on the subject of Missions; St. Thomas', Detroit; St. Stephen's, Wyandotte; twice at St. Margaret's, Hazel Park; addressed a joint assembly in Wayne on the World Day of Prayer. Presented the work before the Woman's Auxiliary Class at the Cranbrook Summer Conference in June.

It has been the privilege of this department to recommend the sending of three Field Workers to the Cranbrook Summer Conference, also to place at the discretion of the Archdeacon, \$25.00 for the use of these women in the purchase of materials for the missions and to grant a request for \$30.00 to purchase a new linoleum for the Parish House at Au Sable. Our Field Workers were remembered at Christmas with a gift of money, as it is well known that these women often use their own funds to supply needs they find among the people and it was our opportunity to do something for them.

Letters have been written to the twelve parishes and missions who asked for information about our women field workers, in answer to the questionnaire sent out last Spring.

DIOCESAN WOMAN FIELD WORKERS

Among those who have reason to be thankful for the Woman's Auxiliary are the Diocesan Woman Field Workers. Their complex task would be more arduous were it not for the thoughtful and generous support of the Auxiliary. They are especially indebted for the Christmas remembrance for their own personal use and for the money which was placed in their hands in the fall to assist them in the purchase of materials incident to their work. Nor are they ungrateful that a part of the total cost of their attending the Cranbrook Summer Conference is borne by the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary.

Substantially, the duties of the Field Workers during 1938 were no different from those of other years. Primarily their task is pastoral. It consists of endless parish calling. But parish calling is never perfunctory. Eventualities are constantly arising. One call uncovers sickness; another brings the caller face to face with bereavement; another eventuates in an unofficial confessional; another discloses dire personal or domestic needs. Calls often open channels of approach that result in a deeper sense of loyalty to the Church, requests for Baptism and Confirmation, and expressions of willingness to serve in one of the Church's organizations.

Part of the Field Worker's duties appertain to youth. She is directress of Christian education in the Missions with which she is associated. It is her responsibility to supervise the operation of Church Schools, to conduct special Vacation Schools and Church School Lenten Missions, and to provide teacher training. She is also expected to give leadership in work among young people.

Miss Alleen Cornick completed her first full year with the Department of Missions. Since she took up her duties as a Field Worker in September, 1937, she has been attached to St. Andrew's, Flint; St. John's, Otter Lake; and Grace Church, Lapeer. She also works in the Lapeer Home and Training School. Deaconess Robinson completed ten years of service for the Diocese and suitable recognition was made by the Churches she serves in the Alpena Field. Miss Grace Dennis, who started as a part-time worker, completed her first year as a full-time worker. She is connected with two Detroit Missions, also St. Margaret's, Hazel Park, and St. John's, Wayne. Mrs. Charles Stephens had the joy of seeing her work in Inkster bear fruit in the erection of a serviceable church for the St. Clement's congregations. The dean of the Field Workers in point of service is Miss Lydia Greedus. She had the experience in 1938 of relinquishing her work to the first resident clergyman in two of the Missions under her care—St. Timothy's and St. Mark's, Detroit.

ANNUAL SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

It is with great pleasure your Chairman reports on the Social Service work in our Diocese. We should be very proud of what is being done through the City Mission and at Williams House.

The City Mission was founded to provide religious ministration in public institutions, to minister to the needy, and offer guidance, counsel and advice to those who wished it. With Mr. Backhurst at the head, nothing seems impossible and the work of the City Mission grows and grows. Continually taking on new responsibilities, the City Mission now has—

The Rev. S. S. Preston at Eloise—Four services are held each Sunday, a total congregation of 500. During the week Dr. Preston assists

in discussion groups in the various wards and visits the hospital wards—a big opportunity—10,000 poor, distressed, sick parishioners.

The Rev. R. E. Randall at Receiving Hospital—Visiting and helping the friendless. On Sunday mornings services are held for those able to attend in wheel chairs. This same work goes on at the Women's Detention Home and the Immigration Detention Home.

Captain Lucas, who is now at the Juvenile Court doing a splendid piece of work—Interviewing all Protestant boys before they come before the Judge, and many are now placed on probation in his care. It is most important to protect and guide the youth of our City. With this in mind, Mr. Backhurst has taken over Taber House and is all ready to start a character building home for boys just as soon as he can obtain a State license. This will be a big step forward in our Social Service work.

Taylor Hall—Where hundreds of down-and-out men are given free shelter and food.

Mariners Institute—Where 105 are given a home. Here 80 per cent pay for their own bed and board at a very small cost. Mr. Backhurst feels there is a big need for a home for the older men on a pension, and is hoping 1939 will see this hope fulfilled. Then there will be more room for the younger men at Mariners Institute.

Page House—A boarding home well managed by Miss Coyne, who is always willing to give help and advice, and is a real friend indeed to the sick and those in trouble. Here working girls and older women with a small income can have room and board for a very small amount. It is our help that makes this home possible at such a low cost.

The City Mission Guild is our part in all of Mr. Backhurst's work. Through membership dues and a card party, our pledge of \$1,000 was raised for 1938, and it is hoped this can be increased to meet the growing needs of 1939. Mr. Backhurst thanked the Guild at the Annual Meeting for all they had done in 1938 and especially spoke of the splendid work of the Altar Guild for the Mariners Church. This is the first year the Guild, through their Altar Society, has taken care of the altar. The fresh memorial flowers each Sunday—and the care of the linens and vestments are greatly appreciated. The other outstanding piece of Social Service work we support through our church societies, our membership dues and donations, is Williams House.

Williams House is a character building home for girls from 12 to 17 years of age. The girls come from the Juvenile Court, Wayward Minor Court, or some recognized social agency, and they stay as long as they need the guidance and help of the home, until they are capable of being placed elsewhere, or of taking a job. Here, with Mother Wolbert's guidance, the Home aims to develop sturdy Christian citizens and claims success with more than 80 per cent of the girls who enter the Home. Most of these girls have never had a fair chance. This is truly a glorious Christian service. Williams House needs all our support. It requires a great deal to care for 33 girls. Wholesome environment is most necessary in character building, and with this in mind, a Committee has been searching for a new home. They are most optimistic and feel sure they will be moving in the spring.

On the second Monday in each month—except during the summer—Williams House Auxiliary holds its meeting at the Home at 10:30 A. M., and the City Mission Guild has its meeting at 2:00 P. M. on the same day at Page House. Attend a meeting some time and get to know more about the splendid Social Service work being accomplished in our Diocese.

CITY MISSION AND PAGE HOUSE

New members of the Staff of the Episcopal City Mission, Rev. J. J. Preston, D.D., who is the full time Chaplain at Eloise, where there is a population of 10,000 poor folks. He is doing a splendid work and the sick poor are being ministered to freely by our Chaplain.

Rev. R. E. Randall has reached the retiring age and his place as City Hospital and Court Chaplain has been filled by Rev. Herbert A. Wilson. The staff officers of the Receiving Hospital presented Rev. Randall with a purse of money in appreciation of his services, as also did the staff of the Woman's Detention Home.

Captain E. A. Lucas began this year a new work in the Juvenile Court as a Lay Chaplain in charge of pre-delinquent boys and others of Protestant faiths. Much preventative work has been accomplished.

Miss Coyne, the House Mother at Page House, reports that 175 different individuals were received at Page House during the year and happiness and a measure of security given to these girls and women sadly needing help. The cost of operating Page House is \$6,000 annually and is chiefly contributed to by the small amounts charged for board and room, plus donations and gifts of food by our friends.

Mariners' Church, Institute and Taylor Hall have largely contributed to the relief of homeless men of the city. 27,516 free lunches were served, 18,498 men paid a nickel for a lunch and 6,520 free beds were given.

In the office Rev. Geo. Backhurst, Superintendent, reports 2,594 seeking counsel and advice, 454 found employment and 1,026 articles of clothing and shoes were distributed.

WILLIAMS HOUSE

Our family extend greetings to friends, visitors and delegates of the Diocesan Convention. We trust through these sources to convey our sincere appreciation of all the loving kindnesses demonstrated by the various parishes in sending us money, clothing and edibles, also for the personal contacts through parties and entertainments for the girls.

We marvel at the results of your generous giving. At the end of each year we take "account of stock" of help received—what a fine record our church people have registered to their account. A bus driver said recently when we were starting out on a little trip, "It must cost something to take your family out," and I replied, "Yes, that is true, but they are worth it." Have you heard that two of our girls entered training this year for definite church service? One going to a Preventorium for children in the Blue Ridge Mountains under the Diocese of Virginia, another entering a Training School for Deaconesses.

Several girls who graduated with honors from school last year are now holding responsible jobs in the community and their employers give fine reports of their work.

During December and over the holiday period, we had around 500 visits from girls. About 40 girls came back for Christmas dinner. Girls, who except for Williams House, have no other home. Each girl received a gift from Santa Claus and some candy. We enjoyed a bountiful dinner through kind friends sending turkeys, cranberries, etc.

The allegiance of loyal friendships and confidences of a Church Home through their years of development have been the ladder upon which our girls have climbed to higher standards of living.

Unless we can awaken the interest of our girls to a higher sense of values for both material and spiritual attainments, our labors here would be of no avail. Williams House continues to be a Character Building Home for girls between 12 and 17 years of age, who come to us through Juvenile Court, Wayward Minor Court, Girls' Protective League and through personal application. The girls stay as long as they need our protection and training. Most all our girls attend out-

side public schools as well as the classes conducted in the Home through the Board of Education and volunteer teachers. All are taught to assume responsibility of household duties and are trained in these tasks as well as dressmaking, child care, personal hygiene, music, etc.

We are glad to be able to share one or two endorsements of our work.

Miss Mary Hulbert, Director of Girls' Protective League, says, "I do feel that too much cannot be said for the valuable assistance given girls at Williams House. Your program of helpfulness is far reaching and essential in safe guarding, sustaining and in true understanding of girls' needs. I feel that it is not a charity, but a community need. I have known hundreds of girls who have received valuable assistance. This is my sincere endorsement."

Judge D. J. Healy said, "I feel that the training and the spiritual counsel given at Williams House is of great assistance to us in our endeavor to help our girls become useful and happy citizens."

ANNUAL REPORT OF GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF MICHIGAN

Sixty years ago the founders of the Girls' Friendly Society stated that its purpose was "to unite for the Glory of God in one fellowship of prayer and service." We believe that this purpose still has significance for us today as we work with young people in interpreting the Christian "way" in every department of life. The Girls' Friendly Society is concerned with the girl—the development of all her possibilities in character and personality.

We have about fifty branches throughout the Diocese and these groups are self-governing, which gives a wide scope for the study and usage of parliamentary law and teaches the girl to prepare herself for club and social work later in life.

During the past year the National Society sponsored a Membership Drive, and through the able leadership of our Membership Chairman, Mrs. Geo. Severance, a very successful campaign was launched, and 427 new members were admitted in this Diocese. As a result of this campaign Michigan won first place, and we were presented with a beautiful gavel by the National Society.

Due to the untiring efforts of Miss Vivian Forester, Chairman of Older Members, a very interesting Diocesan monthly Girls' Friendly Society paper—"TWIGS"—was published this year.

The resolutions adopted at the Triennial asking that committees be appointed to further co-operation between the Woman's Auxiliary and the Girls' Friendly Society has been well exemplified in this Diocese and we hope for even better understanding in the future.

As in former years, the girls did sewing for the Mission boxes in co-operation with the Woman's Auxiliary and the value of these boxes amounted to \$265.00. Miss Alice Alexander, who for many years was Chairman of this department, entered Life Eternal last June. She gladly gave her time, her energy and her unstinted enthusiasm to the work of the Girls' Friendly Society for a great many years. Though sorrowing we thank God for having given us the joy of her friendship.

In February we sponsored a play, "Second Childhood," which was presented at the Cass Technical High School Auditorium. The proceeds of \$1,000.00 was turned over to our Scholarship and Fellowship and Service Funds. Through these departments many girls have been helped.

Our Vacation Houses at Pine Lake—Bird's Nest, Holiday House and Rest Cottage—accommodated one hundred girls each week during July and August. We had the pleasure of holding a Provincial Conference for Girls' Friendly Society leaders, which gave the leaders of other Dioceses the opportunity of visiting our beautiful houses. We were also very happy to welcome the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese.

One of our branch Presidents—Mrs. Ernestine Postles, of St. Cyprian's, Detroit—was honored by the National Society by being sent as a delegate to the National Inter-racial Conference held in Chicago in November, and recently another honor has been bestowed upon Mrs. Postles by the Presiding Bishop, who has chosen her as one of ten delegates to attend the World Conference of Christian Youth which is to be held at Amsterdam, Holland, next summer.

Today's Girls' Friendly Society will be tomorrow's Church women—women who may be richer personalities, more intelligent, more concerned about the world we live in; women who care about world peace, economics, race equality, and missions, as well as about their own families and vocations.

REPORT OF THE PROGRAM COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1938

During the year 1938 your program committee has studied the outline prepared by the Committee on Findings at the Triennial; and has tried to bring to the women of this Diocese a program that would consider such vital problems as War and Peace, Christian Unity and Co-operation, Industrial Problems, the Missionary needs of the Church at home and abroad, and religion in family living.

The committee is indeed grateful to Bishop and Mrs. Page, Bishop and Mrs. Creighton, Archdeacon Hagger, many members of the Clergy, the speakers, and the many, many others who by their suggestions and assistance have made this year's program possible.

In May the Diocesan Auxiliary co-operated with the Detroit Council of Church Women in a Quiet Day of Prayer at Christ Church, Cranbrook. Our Diocesan President, Mrs. Donald C. Stevenson, was chairman of the day.

The theme of the Pine Lake Conference was "Religion in Family Life." The Rev. I. C. Johnson sounded the keynote of the conference: "The Place of Religion in Family Life" concluding with the admonition that religion is a way of life; that we must return to God, for no matter what we do must be in harmony with the laws of God. Mrs. Belle Farley Murray addressed the group on the subject: "Living Together in the Family." In the evening Mrs. G. W. Willard and Mrs. Clarence Brickman told of the work being done for college students at Ann Arbor and Lansing. Thursday morning Mrs. Morgan Sherman led a discussion as to what we shall believe and what we shall teach to our children. The Rev. W. R. Wood gave a comprehensive interpretation of the Field Department of the Diocese. The Rev. Bates G. Burt was the celebrant at the Holy Communion service. Mrs. Donald Stevenson, President of the Diocesan Auxiliary, presided.

However, our attendance has been most encouraging. Our Chaplain and Priests' Associates have been most helpful. The numerous committee chairmen have each and every one functioned perfectly.

Financially we have slipped. The Educational Fund has not grown as I had hoped it would, nor have the demands on it been as great as we might have wished, but let us hope that the uncertain times may be partially responsible and that next year it will be better.

I still feel that there are great possibilities for the Guild and it is my hope that it may further develop along the lines of Greater Service and Christian Spirit. My dreams are of a rest cottage, scholarships for returned missionary nurses, as well as greater help to our younger nurses to further education.

St. Barnabas' Day Corporate Communion and the early Easter Morning Communion to which nurses from all of the city hospitals were invited.

The Annual Christmas Service preceded by supper and Christmas tree to which all Senior nurses of the training schools were invited. Music was furnished by the Henry Ford Hospital Glee Club under the direction of Mr. Frederic B. Morse.

The June Service was held at Holiday House, where Mr. Backhurst conducted a very beautiful service. It brought back vivid memories of Mrs. Breitenbecker, who was one of our old members.

Our Social meetings consisted of a tea, held at the home of Mrs. A. S. Crawford, where Miss Agnes Burton showed her father's slides of old Detroit.

Miss Wallace entertained us at the Detroit Sanatorium. At this meeting the Guild members entertained us by telling of their trips to England. The members of the Guild, who are on the Staff at Maybury Sanatorium, invited us to Northville for a very enjoyable July meeting.

Our Keno Party in the Fall left us neither in the red nor in the black column. It looks as though we should consider some other method to raise funds next year.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

NAME

This Association shall be called the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

ARTICLE II

OBJECTS

The objects of this Association are to unite the branches in a program of the church for worship, study, service and fellowship; to promote definitely the cause of Missions and Church Extension, Religious Education and Christian Social Service; to collect funds for these various purposes; to encourage the formation of new branches. Work must be done, each year, in the five fields of service, the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation and the World.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

All baptized women of the Diocese who desire to be members will be so regarded.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE BOARD

Section 1. The following executive officers shall be elected at the annual meeting: The President; not less than three Vice-Presidents, representing districts, the boundaries of which shall be defined by the Executive Board; a Recording Secretary; a Corresponding Secretary; and a Treasurer.

Section 2. The following officers shall be appointed annually by the President with the advice and consent of the other executive officers: A United Thank Offering Treasurer, an Educational Director, a Director of the Church Periodical Club, a Prayer Partner, a Director of Supply Work, a Solicitor for the Spirit of Missions and a Treasurer and Custodian of the Golden Book of Remembrance.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall consist of the Bishop and the above officers, together with the Chairmen of the Standing Committees as named in the By-Laws, the Diocesan Presidents of the Girls' Friendly Society, Daughters of the King, Altar Guild and St. Barnabas' Guild for Nurses, and of any other Diocesan organization for women recognized by the Bishop, and the Convention Chairman.

Section 4. The Executive Board shall have oversight and direction of all work for the Church done by the Women of the Diocese not otherwise provided for.

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

Section 1. The annual meeting shall be held during the week of the Diocesan Convention and in the same city.

Section 2. Regular meetings shall be held monthly from September to May, inclusive, excepting December.

Section 3. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VI

CONVENTION OF THE WOMEN OF THE DIOCESE

Section 1. Coinciding with the Annual Meeting there shall be held the Annual Convention of the Women of the Diocese, which shall be non legislative, for the purpose of considering the women's work of the Church in the Diocese and the world, of passing on to the parishes suggestions for strengthening established projects and stimulating new work, and of giving an opportunity for interchange of ideas.

Section 2. All churchwomen of the Diocese shall be eligible to attend the convention and to participate in its discussion.

Section 3. Voting power shall be given to four delegates from each Parish and two from each Mission upon presenting their credentials to a committee appointed for that purpose. The method of election of such delegates and a like number of alternates shall be determined for itself by each Parish and Mission. If no other provision be made, the Rector or Minister in charge shall appoint. Voting power shall also be given ex-officio to the members of the Executive Board. Each Diocesan organization for women recognized by the Bishop shall be entitled to elect two representatives with voting power.

Section 4. At this Annual Convention there shall be elected by majority ballot a Convention Chairman to preside at the next Annual Convention and have charge of the arrangements and program.

Section 5. Each parish and mission shall pay a convention fee annually on a sliding scale of from \$1.00 to \$10.00. This shall be payable by January 1 of each year to the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese to be kept in a separate account for convention expenses or for any other purpose authorized by the Convention.

ARTICLE VII QUORUM

Ten members shall constitute a quorum at an Executive Board meeting, and fifty members at regular or annual meetings, but at no time shall the lack of a quorum at a regular meeting prevent those present from proceeding with the program of the day.

ARTICLE VIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. This constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all members present. Proposed amendments must be submitted in writing to the Recording Secretary, read at a regular meeting preceding the Annual Meeting, and referred to the Executive Board for consideration.

Section 2. By-Laws may be adopted, amended, repealed, or suspended at any regular meeting or Annual Meeting by a two-thirds vote.

BY-LAWS ARTICLE I ELECTIONS AND APPOINTMENTS

Section 1. The Executive Officers shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting and shall continue in office for one year or until the election of a successor.

The Executive Officers shall serve not more than three consecutive terms.

Section 2. A majority of all votes cast shall be necessary for an election.

Section 3. Vacancies in elective offices may be filled by the Executive Board voting thereon by ballot.

Section 4. Delegates to all meetings of the Auxiliary shall be elected in the manner prescribed by the Constitution for the election of delegates to the Annual Convention, but all members present may vote on questions other than the Annual Elections.

Section 5. The President shall be a delegate ex-officio to the Triennial Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council and the Meetings of the Women's Auxiliary of the Providence. At the Annual Meeting preceding these conventions four other delegates and five alternates shall be elected. The four receiving the highest number of votes shall be delegates and the five next highest shall be alternates. Vacancies in the delegation shall be filled by the President or Vice-President or in her absence by the delegates present.

Section 6. The President shall appoint a Chairman of Tellers who shall select her own assistants and with them shall prepare and have full charge of the ballots.

ARTICLE II

PLEDGES

Section 1. Before the Annual Meeting each branch shall have signified in writing the amount it will give during the following year, to be paid through the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 2. As it seems only reasonable that each branch shall share in the expenses of the society, all branches shall contribute as liberally as possible to the General Expense Fund, the minimum for any branch being one dollar a year.

ARTICLE III

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings; shall have general supervision of the work of the Auxiliary; shall appoint all special committees unless otherwise directed by the Auxiliary or the Executive Board, and shall be ex-officio member of all committees without the right to vote.

Section 2. The Vice-Presidents of the Detroit, the Southern and the Northern Districts in order of their succession shall preside in the absence of the President and assume all duties pertaining to the office, and shall endeavor to promote the formation of new parish branches and to help and strengthen those already existing.

Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the Annual Convention and shall prepare and edit the Year Book under the Supervision of the Executive Board.

Section 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings, both of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Board, and shall conduct the general correspondence of the Association.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive, disburse and keep account of all moneys received in each department of the work, except as otherwise provided, and shall attend the meetings of the Auxiliary, reporting receipts and disbursements.

Section 6. The United Thank Offering Treasurer, the Educational Director, the Director of the Church Periodical Club, the Prayer Partner, the Director of Supply Work, and the Solicitor for the Spirit of Missions shall perform the duties of their offices according to the laws and practices of the National organizations with which they are connected.

Section 7. The Custodian and Treasurer of the Golden Book of Remembrance shall receive and record the names to be commemorated and the accompanying gifts. This book was given on the occasion of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the founding of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary by Mrs. Frederic B. Stevens, President from 1908 to 1923, and is to contain the names of all women, living or dead, regardless of church affiliations, whom it is desired to hold in remembrance. The gifts shall constitute a fund to be accumulated until it reaches the amount of \$2,000.00, after which the interest shall be used as directed by vote of the Michigan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Section 8. All officers upon retiring from office shall deliver to their successors, or the Executive Board, all moneys, accounts, records, papers or other properties of the Association in their possession.

ARTICLE IV COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Standing Committees shall be as follows: Parish, Diocesan and Domestic Field, Foreign Field, Social Service, Program and Publicity, Finance, Hospitality, Nominating, Credential and Work With the Isolated.

Section 2. These committees, except that on Work With the Isolated, shall be appointed and the number of members decided by the President with the advice and consent of the Executive Board.

Section 3. The Committee on the Parish shall represent all parish guilds, societies and individual women of the Diocese not affiliated with National or Diocesan organizations; shall give them the support, cooperation and fellowship of this Association and shall promote the work of women in their several parishes and the improvement in the organization of such work, realizing that without spiritual life and activity in the parish there can be no strength in the wider fields of service.

Section 4. The Diocesan and Domestic Field, Foreign Field, Religious Education and Social Service Committees shall promote intelligence and activity in their several fields among the women of the Diocese. The Religious Education Committee shall have charge of the Elizabeth Fiske Locke Stevens Memorial Library and shall appoint the librarian.

Section 5. The Program and Publicity Committee shall make a plan for the meetings of the Auxiliary during the year, provide speakers subject to the advice of the Executive Board, be prepared to advise parish branches who may desire assistance in arranging their yearly programs and do all necessary publicity work.

Section 6. The Finance Committee shall have charge of the raising of all special funds unless a special committee has been appointed, and shall be charged with any other similar work requested by the Executive Board.

Section 7. The Hospitality Committee shall arrange for the entertainment of speakers and delegates attending the various meetings.

Section 8. The Nominating Committee, of which the Bishop shall be a member ex-officio shall prepare a list of nominees for all elective offices for the Annual Meeting and Convention. This list shall be delivered to the Chairman of Tellers in time to permit the printing of ballots. This shall not prevent the voting of candidates not so nominated.

Section 9. The Credential Committee shall receive the credentials of delegates, and furnish them with ballots and information.

Section 10. The Committee on Work With the Isolated shall be appointed in such manner as the Bishop may direct and shall endeavor to bring the message and fellowship of the Church to those who may be unable to receive the regular ministrations of a parish or mission.

ARTICLE V FISCAL YEAR

The Fiscal Year of the Association shall be from January 1 to December 31, inclusive, but the Executive Board may authorize the accounting of any special fund on a different basis.

ARTICLE VI ANNUAL REPORTS

Each Officer and Chairman shall present a typewritten annual report, also providing a copy for the Recording Secretary. Copies of all such reports shall be sent to the Bishop.
