ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT.

Rev. Bishops, Clergy and Women of the Auxiliary:

As I look into the faces of the large audience sitting before me, I cannot help thinking of the gratifying results that have come from that first meeting eleven years ago, when a few earnest women in Minnesota met and organized this branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Indeed have they sown better than they thought—and well may we here to-day, without fear of vanity, indulge in a just pride of our growth and our works.

But with the example of those noble women who inaugurated the work, whose names should ever be remembered, and with the results of their exertion before us, we should be inspired with renewed strength and energy to advance and carry on to its utmost limit that work, which in so short a time has proved so fruitful.

When we think of this our bounden duty, we are brought face to face with homely facts, and must question ourselves individually and collectively as to whether or no our duty has been performed.

As your chosen officer, I am constrained to submit, for your consideration, such thoughts as have presented themselves to my mind during the past year, and sincerely trust there may be in them some few grains of reason, that by proper nourishment will bear fruit.

In order to make the Auxiliary strong we must not be weary of well doing; but steadily press on to attain greater results.

The burden of work in parishes must not be shifted from the shoulders of the individual members—to the shoulders of the few who have been selected as your Officers, for their work is burdensome and tedious, though cheerfully and willingly done.

Yet how much more willing, cheerful and pleasant their work, if made to feel the true sympathy and encouragement of individual members.

Every parish in the diocese should have a branch of the Auxiliary, or a Missionary Society.

Out of the one hundred and seventy-four Parishes and Missions in the diocese, but thirty-four are represented in the Auxiliary. This fact suggests sad thoughts, for there must be some cause for it. Is it ignorance of missionary work? Lack of the true missionary spirit? Lack of interest on the part of the clergy? Or the mistaken idea that because a parish is poor it cannot do missionary work? If due to these causes, or any one of them, let us consider how, and by what means, they may be removed.

Ignorance of missionary work is one of the most prevalent faults that we have to contend with, even in our largest parishes; I feel this to be so true, that I will venture to say, without fear of contradiction, that out of the hundreds of Mite Chests distributed in the diocese, not one-half of the women holding them know what the money given by them is for; this may seem a strong statement, but when you consider it for a moment, you must realize the truth, for if it be not true, we should have over one thousand dollars a year instead of a little over five hundred dollars.

There are more than one thousand Mite Chests distributed, and every person accepting a box pledges themselves to put into it not less than two cents a week, or one dollar and four cents a year.

With no small degree of timidity do I mention the thought that suggests a lack of interest on the part of the clergy.

My observation is that when a clergyman is full of missionary zeal, the parish will be deeply interested in missionary work, and good results naturally follow. But, when the missionary work flags, we find that the clergyman is not supporting the women of the parish with sympathy and encouragement in their work. These are simple facts that have come to my notice, and which I now present to the clergy for consideration.

Because a parish is poor, to refuse to do any missionary work is like denying our mite to assist suffering humanity at our door; shall our hearts be closed to the suffering about us, because we, in fact or fancy, need something ourselves? God forbid this being so, for it is sacrifice that is asked of us in the Church as well as at home, and in making sacrifice we are doubly blessed.

No parish is so poor that it cannot give a little, even if it be no more than the one dollar membership fee to the Auxiliary. We require and need the sympathy of all, as well as the money, to encourage us in our work.

Women of the Auxiliary! as you go back to your parishes from this meeting, I urge upon you the necessity of organizing parish branches, of studying the subject of Missions, that you may work and give intelligently; of giving systematically, if it be no more than the two cents faithfully put into your Mite Chests every week.

It is intelligent and systematic work, faithfully performed, that is to help the Board of Mission, through the Woman's Auxiliary, to sustain and encourage those earnest men and women in the field, who are devoting their lives to the Master's Work.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDENT OF THE "CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB."

SEPTEMBER 26TH, 1893.

To the President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

It is with reluctance that the work of the Church Periodical Club is presented.

There has not been a satisfactory amount of it accomplished. When the work was first undertaken it was entered into with much enthusiasm. It is an immense one and a valuable agency in carrying great cheer and comfort to many a missionary heart and home, otherwise cut off from the knowledge of the activities of the Church, and food for study.

A clergyman wrote to me in the following words: "The books sent to me are invaluable. It is hard to prepare sermons without the aid and contact with spirit and thought of the times."

A circular was sent to all the clergy in the Diocese, containing information of the importance of the work sanctioned by our own Bishop, as well as many others, asking co-operation in the way of appointing a librarian in their parish, whose duty should be the collecting of literature. The lack of interest taken in the work, no librarian having ever been appointed and the few responses to the circulars, damped the ardor of the correspondent.

There have been sent out from the Diocese about one hundred and thirty books and periodicals; they have been sent as silent messengers to the extreme north, to the sunny south as far as the Gulf of Mexico, and westward to the Pacific coast. I think if the knowledge of the work could be extended, its object better known, the result would be more encouraging. I think it would not be amiss here to define the object of the

Church Periodical Club. It is to collect and systematically distribute literature of every sort which would be of use to clergymen, missionaries and laymen, and that it might be sent by those who possessed it to those who could not afford it.

Some offer their literature for distribution, but are not willing to take the time and trouble of sending it themselves. The words of the originator of this worthy work, and its first president, are so lovely and sweet I must quote them: "The time you take to put up your paper, the string with which you tie it, the stamp necessary to send it, and perhaps the little prayer that goes with it, make it a true missionary work."

In one of our parishes the spirit of the work has been carried on for several years, but not in connection with the Club.

The Church periodicals have been systematically collected and sent to the Bishop of the Platte. Perhaps it would be interesting to many to know of the immensity of the work up to 1892. At that time there were forty-two Dioceses working in conjunction, distributing since the year of 1889, between four and five thousand periodicals, over seven thousand books, 154,000 odd numbers, four thousand Christmas cards, besides Bibles, Hymnals, S. S. papers, Catechisms and everything of that sort.

Thus briefly I have endeavored to give some idea of what has been done, hoping to create an interest in this work among the members of the Woman's Auxiliary in Minnesota, so that the record of the work done in our Diocese will exceed that of the past.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This association shall be called the Minnesota Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

The object of this association shall be to unite all the Parishes in the Diocese, in the different branches of Missionary work: Foreign, Domestic and Diocesan.

ARTICLE III.

Any Parish may become a member of this association by the payment of one dollar annually.

ARTICLE IV.

The annual meeting shall be held in either St. Paul or Minneapolis in the autumn of each year, as shall be appointed, for the election of officers, and for the transaction of such other business as shall properly come before the meeting.

ARTICLE V.

SECTION 1. The officers shall be two Presidents, and Secretary and Treasurer.

SECTION 2. The duty of the President shall be to preside at all meetings, to arrange for the organization of Parochial branches, and to have general charge of the work.

SECTION 3. The duty of the Secretary shall be to keep a correct record of the meetings, and to conduct the necessary correspondence.

SECTION 4. The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive and disburse funds, under direction of the President and Secretary, and render account of the same at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VI.

Each Parochial branch shall submit a report of the year's work to the Secretary of the Diocesan branch, to be read at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII.

Each Parochial branch may be represented at the annual meeting by four delegates who shall be entitled to vote.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

I.

The election of officers at the annual meeting shall be by ballot.

II.

Special meetings may be called by the President at such time and place as she may designate, for the purpose of stimulating interest in the work.

III.

The regular order of business for the annual meetings shall be as follows:

1. Offices of devotion.
2. Reading of the minutes of last meeting.
3. Report of officers and committees.
4. Election of officers.
5. Miscellaneous business and addresses.

IV.

These By-Laws may be amended at any meeting by vote of a majority present.
