President's Report.

Dear Friends of the Auxiliary:—

The year of the Triennial Convention is always one of special activity and often of anxiety lest our United Offering fall below that of preceding years. It was therefore a relief at our semi-annual meeting held at St. John's, St. Paul, on May 28th to learn that we had a little more for our United Offering of 1913 than in 1910, and that the Misses Holmes of Minnesota had given **themselves** to mission work in Alaska. Our prayers and our loving thought will follow them through the coming years. The total amount which our United Offering treasurer Mrs. Lydia Bass, presented Oct. 9th in New York, was \$3666.95. This was largely the gathering of small sums from persons of moderate means. We know of only one individual gift of \$50. Our gain over the United Offering for 1910 was \$295.60. We had hoped for more. The first year of the triennium we fell behind because of having to change our efficient treasurer Mrs. W. H. Hallam, whose term of office had been long and personal acquaintance with the women of all parishes made her work easier than that of her successor. Would it not be wise for us today to name a sum toward which we shall be systematically working for the United Offering to be presented in St. Louis, in 1916. Not waiting for the last few months to collect with feverish anxiety what would have been comparatively easy by systematic giving during the three years. Miss Sybil Carter, of blessed memory out of her small salary, always sent us her offering of one cent a day \$10.95 for the three years. Our Methodist friends raise very large sums through the Tithe system. Whatever system we adopt the question will be "Is the Lord getting His own from us, or, by withholding of it, are we shutting ourselves out of the abundant blessing?" The total United Offering for 1913 as reported today is \$307,565.00 a gain of \$64,000.00 over that of 1910. The United Offering of 1910 has provided the Board with \$82,000.00 each year of triennium and supports 151 women, 87 in the domestic and 64 in the foreign field. The object of the United Offering for 1916 will be substantially the same as that of 1913, omitting the special appropriation for buildings. The aim is to support all the women workers at home and abroad. At present the United Offering for 1910, supports less than half of the women missionaries.

GENERAL AUXILIARY.

The meetings of the General Auxiliary in New York are so recent and so fully reported through the Church papers, that I shall only speak of a few facts which have special bearing upon the work in our Diocese and give a few quotations. We were represented in New York by five elected delegates, three of the delegates from the cities, two from the country parishes, Mrs. Theopold being unable to attend, the first alter-

nate, Mrs. C. H. Peake substituted. Mrs. C. L. Bates of Lake City attended all the Junior conferences and will make her report at our meeting of Juniors. It was voted that the three departments of "Little Helpers" aged to eight years, the Juniors from eight to sixteen years of age, and the young Woman's Auxiliary from sixteen until graduated into the Woman's Auxiliary, should be under the supervision of the Junior President with leaders or Vice Presidents for each of these departments. It was agreed when possible, that one of the delegates to General Meetings should be the leader of Little Helpers. A resolution was offered by the women of Iowa that money be substituted for boxes. It was agreed that the missionary should be given his choice. In October 1914, the 6th Missionary District Conference is to be held in Minnesota. Your President therefore called a meeting in New York of the women of this District. It largely attended, spirited and very representative. A Committee was named to consider an organization of the Auxiliary in the 6th District. Miss Mary Peabody, Chairman, Mrs. J. D. Morrison and Mrs. Nathaniel Thomas. A Committee was appointed to prepare a program, Mrs. Cameron Mann, Chairman.

It was agreed that an Institute and study class should follow the District Conference, and many women agreed to remain an extra day for the Institute. On behalf of the women of Minnesota, entertainment was promised for the delegates.

In 1909, through our Bishop, I was appointed a member of an English organization which meets quarterly in London and is called "The Central Committee of Woman's Work." Its presiding officer is Mrs. Davidson, wife of the Archbishop of Canterbury. There are about 20 American members who co-operate by correspondence. Miss Cropper was the English representative who was sent over to this country to attend our recent meetings in New York. It broadens us to realize the largeness of work which binds us together. I have been asked to present to you the claims of an organization of this Central Committee called the Mother's Union. There may be young mothers present to whom the objects of this Union may especially appeal.

- “I. To uphold the sanctity of marriage.
- II. To awaken in mothers of all classes a sense of their great responsibility in training of girls and boys.
- III. To organize a band of mothers who will unite in prayer and seek by example, to lead in purity and holiness of life.”

QUOTATIONS.

Bishop Lloyd summed up the Woman's meeting of October 9th in New York as the most wonderful meeting he had ever known, the result of three years of work.

Bishop Graves of Shanghai spoke of the gift of life. In 1890 it was hard to get offerings of life. In the last three years 46 have offered themselves for work in China.

Bishop Brent startled us by saying "It is pagan for any parish to

work only for itself. There is no difference between the pagan of fifth avenue who worships his tinsel and God of pleasure and the pagan in the hills of Luzon who piles his pitiful offering before an idol."

Mrs. Pratt in her splendid reports to the Living Church, says "Never such crowds, never such enthusiasm, never such services, never such offerings." To some of us the gem of the Triennial was a quiet hour conducted by Bishop Lloyd at the close of the Mission study classes, meditations on reverence and serenity.

MEETINGS.

In Minnesota, the past year, our three Diocesan meetings were largely attended and conferences of officers were called from time to time. At our semi-annual, our Junior President strongly advised holding monthly or quarterly meetings of parochial officers. Her fourteen years of service with Junior directors made her realize the worth of such conferences. At our three Diocesan gatherings we are eager to listen to Bishops, missionaries and clergy and after long services and addresses, and still many miles from our homes, we have to cut our informal hour short and go without having discussed the questions of detail which puzzle us in our parish work. How familiar the question asked by rectors and newly elected parish officers,—"What is the difference between the red and the blue mite box?" "What do you mean by the domestic one-sixth?" "What offerings apply on the parish apportionment, etc." As an experiment on June 26th last, a conference was called of parochial representatives from the Twin Cities, at the home of your president, and although the day was excessively hot, seventeen women were present, one coming twenty-five miles. All were enthusiastic over the helpfulness of the quiet conference and urged that during the coming year we hold short informal quarterly conferences for parochial officers, no refreshments no special speakers. Our directors in the deaneries might help us greatly in assuming the added responsibility.

Our midwinter meeting was held February 20th in St. Peter's Church, St. Paul, the president of Juniors presiding. The special speaker was Rev. Edgar Gould, Assistant to Rev. A. B. Hunter, of Raleigh, N. C. The offering was \$26.43 supplemented by individual gifts designated for St. Augustine's school.

At the semi-annual meeting held on May 28th and 29th in St. John's, St. Paul, it was voted to work toward a scholarship at St. Mary's Hall, to be named the Grace Harmon Edsall Memorial Scholarship. \$300.00 was promptly pledged, and the committee continued, with power to act Mrs. W. P. Remington, the efficient chairman. Now that our United Offering and annual offerings have been presented for this year, the committee plan to give every woman in the diocese an opportunity to share in this memorial to one so dearly loved. I do not remember a year in our history when so many active members have passed to the great beyond. I am afraid to name them for fear of omitting some one

who has served us well in years gone by. Out of the list, only three were recent parish officers, viz., Mrs. J. W. Edgerton for year's president of Christ Church branch, St. Paul. Mrs. H. M. Green of Pine Island, whose last act was to send us a letter of encouragement and a sum of money for the United Offering of 1913. While we are in session now, one who was often a delegate for St. Mark's, Minneapolis, Mrs. L. F. Clarke is being laid to rest. Of our beloved Honorary President Grace Harmon Edsall, I can scarcely trust myself to speak. Her presence with us today is very real,—“In the soul of true love there is no parting.” Early in the year we were saddened by the death of Miss Susanne Weare, once President of the Iowa branch. Miss Weare had visited us often and was greatly loved by many of us. Since our last annual meeting we have lost by removal from the Diocese the Directors in three of our Deaneries. Mrs. W. D. Stires of Mankato, has gone to the Diocese of Springfield; Mrs. Horatio Gate of Willmar to Fond du Lac; Mrs. Charles Holmes of Faribault Deanery to Oregon; Deaconess Davies, who organized the Young Woman's Auxiliary has also taken up new work in South Dakota. We shall miss these splendid workers and we must elect their successors today. Early in the year, Mrs. C. C. Rollit, who had served us well as correspondent for the Church Periodical Club, begged that some one relieve her of that department, and Mrs. B. Woodruff took up the duties with great enthusiasm. Through the “Record” and “St. Clement's Chimes” a splendid appeal was made for literature. Mrs. Woodruff would like to form circulating libraries and she has many plans which she will present to us,—to make her department a real power for good.

December 5th, Mrs. O. B. Gould, the enthusiastic director of the Winona deanery and I, attended a good meeting of the guild and auxiliary in Rochester. In spite of a cold rain, about thirty women were present. Here we found a Rector who really guides and cares for his auxiliary, and as a result, an active interest in all our departments of Church work. We were delightfully entertained by Dr. and Mrs. Kilbourne and Dr. Laura Linton.

JUNIORS.

In spite of many discouragements, the juniors have a fine report this year. By a splendid example of patience and perseverance, and by frequent visits made in all kinds of weather, our dependable president for juniors keeps her branches alive. I cannot too heartily praise the young women who are responsible for their several departments. We have reason to be very happy over their faithfulness and the sweet spirit of harmony and helpfulness, in which they are doing their work. From their reports today you will learn of their many visits in and out of the diocese, speaking as willingly for woman's work or United Offering or other general interests,—as of the own special department. We are fast learning to drop the term **Woman's Auxiliary** and speak only of

The Auxiliary. Miss Mary Smith, one Educational Secretary, has been particularly active. The Woman's Magazine of the Presbyterian Church for the Northwest, for August last, in reporting the Summer School held in Duluth—says, “The Minnesota Educational Secretary is particularly pleasing and invests an old subject with fresh life and interest.” In New York she led a large class of auxiliary women in the study of this year's text book, *China*. Last year the Minneapolis and St. Paul classes for leaders were not as faithfully attended as we had hoped, the coming year we look for larger classes and better results.

I want to express my high regard for the efficient work done by Miss Elizabeth E. Yardley in the auxiliary department of the diocesan paper “*The Record*.” Our Secretary of Little Helpers—prints her own report which you will find in the pews. Minnesota has one of the strongest branches in this department. I hear it said by rectors and mothers that with the Sunday School Lenten and Advent boxes, the Little Helpers' box is “one too many—as though the small amounts of money collected in the baby's box was the *raison d'être* for the organization. What a mistake! As early impressions are the most lasting, the *educational* value of the organization is its principal reason for being—and the little box a constant reminder to mother and child of a daily prayer and instruction in the Church's mission work. A year seems a long time to a child, can the instruction in missions as given during the hurried sessions of the Sunday School in Lent or Advent, compare with the education of the mother and child who give and pray **every day** for the missionaries all over the world. What better motto for Little Helper leaders than the old proverb—“What is learned in the cradle is carried to the grave.”

In the Dioceses of Maine and Mississippi we are told, especial effort has been made to reach the isolated Church women. In our State Federation of literary clubs, to which many of us belong—I note great activity along the line of interesting farmer's wives, and daughters in literary matters,—Can we not have a Committee of Church women to do a like work along spiritual lines? Who will volunteer this year to correspond and to send Church literature to some shut in. Miss Emery once suggested that our meetings would be more inspiring if we felt the responsibility of making the account of them interesting to some other person.

We shall listen with special interest to our Corresponding Secretary's detailed report. A total of 60 boxes sent to missionaries and mission stations and money valuation of \$3,532.70.

Among all of God's great mercies to us this year the last and greatest is the restoration of our dear Bishop to his former health. The Auxiliary is his parish and as the Diocesan Branch we owe our loyalty and first allegiance to our Diocesan Bishops.

Summing up the year's work in all its departments, we have reason

lies in the fact that we are not increasing our membership. Through the efforts of the Director of the Winona Deanery we attempted a doubled membership campaign. It did not succeed. I think of no more important subject this afternoon than a discussion of some plan by which we can work together as a unit in this coming year—to double our membership.

Let us pray for a spirit of loyalty and enthusiasm, and the love that draws, so that many Church women of our Diocese shall say,—“We will go with you, for we have heard that God is with you.”

Minutes of Annual Meeting.

The thirty-second annual meeting of the Minnesota Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Gethsemane Church, Minneapolis, Thursday, November sixth, 1913. The meeting opened at ten o'clock A. M. with celebration of Holy Communion. Rev. Stanley Kilbourne assisted by Rev. Dr. James E. Freeman, celebrants. At eleven o'clock Bishop S. C. Edsall introduced Rt. Rev. Frederic W. Keator, Bishop of Olympia who preached from the text—"O Come let us worship and fall down and kneel down before the Lord Our Maker." He impressed upon his hearers the necessity of humility—of entire consecration to the will of God, if true worship were to be attained. "First wait upon the Lord—then speed to do His bidding." The offering was taken and the service closed with hymn 584. Bishop Edsall then addressed the Auxiliary in his usual forceful way—speaking of the two great needs in Missionary effort—the spirit of devotion and spirit of prayer—combined strength which would go forth touched by divine fire—lighting the dark places of the world and bringing glimpses of Heavenly Joy—which would transform sordid life, lifting one's eyes to catch the Vision of far-reaching Love. Even the Vision of the Lord. He then introduced Rev. Wm. E. Gardner of Boston, General Secretary to the Board of Religious Education, whose remarks were full of the earnest zeal of his calling. He said—"There are today two Boards of Missions, that of the Hands and Feet and that of the Head—bound in one organic whole—expressing the entire Life of Christ. He hoped through this newly appointed office to be able to lead parents and sponsors to accept and fulfill their obligations taken at the Font and to inspire christian experience and to promote methods by which the youth of the Church would hear the call of the Ministry and respond. Bishop Edsall then read noon-day prayers, after which Bishop McElwain brought a message from the Diocese, which was of intense interest, bringing to attention the pressing demands of this Diocese with its awakened congregations and re-opened churches, long closed—and he earnestly requested prayers for the building up of the store house of Christian energy.

The Red Mite Box Offering was then presented and the Roll Called.

In the absence of the Rector of Gethsemane Church, Rev. Stanley Kilbourne acted as temporary host and most graciously welcomed the women of the Diocese—inviting them to remain to luncheon, which was delightfully served by the ladies of the church at one o'clock. The long tables in the dining room were filled and second tables prepared proving the cordial hospitality of the women of Gethsemane Parish. It is needless to say the noon hour was greatly enjoyed.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At two o'clock the meeting was opened with hymns and prayer lead by Bishop McElwain, who spoke most interestingly of the General Convention.

The President Mrs. Hector Baxter took the chair and called the business session to order. The minutes of last meeting were read and approved. Mrs. Baxter's annual address was listened to with deep interest.

A motion was made and carried to suspend rules of order for the day and proceed with elections. Tellers were appointed and ballots distributed. Committee on Credentials reported 118 delegates present, which was accepted.

Mrs. Chard, chairman Committee on Nominations, reported 76 cards sent out and only 18 returned.

Mrs. J. M. Smith, Corresponding Secretary read a brief but encouraging report showing that general interest in missions is deepening throughout the Diocese.

Mrs. H. F. Stevens, Treasurer, reported \$1,633.67 received.

Mrs. F. B. Bass, Treasurer United Offering, reported \$3,666.85, given to the United Offering in the last 3 years from Minnesota Diocese.

Mrs. Hovey Clarke, chairman of Finance Committee, reported Red Mite Box fund to be \$1,262.27 and recommended that two-thirds of said amount be given to Bishop Edsall for Diocesan Missions and one-third be sent to General Missions, New York, to be divided between domestic and foreign—namely one-sixth be sent to Missions House, undesignated, and the remaining one-sixth divided equally between the three memorial scholarships, namely, Bishop Whipple, Cora R. Bronson and Bishop Gilbert; that the morning offering, \$50.00 be given to current expense fund.

Miss Kathrene Sleppy, President of the Juniors, gave a brief report of that work, which was as always full of inspiration and encouragement.

Mrs. O. B. Gould brought an earnest message of appeal for greater zeal in obtaining more members. Said an evening Bible Class of which she was a member had become interested and had given \$20.00 for special missionary work.

Mrs. Perry Norris, President of the Little Helpers, reported progress although not as many new members as she had hoped. \$216.12 had been received during the year.

The Grace Harmon Edsall Scholarship, St. Mary's Hall, Faribault, was presented and subscriptions solicited.

Mrs. Denis Follett spoke of the Emery Fund; said the result of money thus given would be far-reaching if not world wide.

Secretary of the Church Periodical Club, Mrs. E. B. Woodruff, gave a fine report of her work, obtaining thereby 12 new subscriptions. She also asked that Christmas cards be sent to needy people.

Mrs. Chard read list of newly elected officers. There being several

changes, namely; President, Winona Deanery, Mrs. C. L. Bates; President, Faribault Deanery, Mrs. H. C. Theopold; President Mankato Deanery, Mrs. Edith Conant; President, Willmar Deanery, Mrs. Alexander Coffin; President, Minneapolis Deanery, Mrs. Wm. P. Remington; who, however, refused to serve and Mrs. Hovey Clarke very kindly consented to continue in office. Editor of Auxiliary Department Church Record, Miss Elizabeth E. Yardley; Correspondent Church Periodical Club, Mrs. E. B. Woodruff.

Mrs. E. P. Smith, Treasurer of the Board of Sheltering Arms, made a strong appeal for memberships at \$3.00 per year.

The interests of the Church Home was presented by Miss Martha Benedict.

An invitation for the Annual Meeting 1914, was received from Calvary Church, Rochester.

All Saint's Church, Minneapolis, extended a cordial invitation for the mid-winter meeting.

Resolutions of Sympathy were adopted to be sent to the bereaved friends of the late Mrs. L. S. Clarke, whose funeral was held at that hour, and also a message of sympathy to Mrs. Chas. Horton, of Winona. A message of greeting to Mrs. Williston, Red Wing, whose absence from the meeting was deeply regretted and a message to Rev. Mr. G. H. Ten Broeck thanking him for his kind letter and extending the good wishes of the Minnesota Auxiliary for success and happiness in his new field. Greetings to Mrs. Dorcas Hallam of Portland, Ore., for her thought of the meeting today.

A rising vote of thanks was extended to members of Gethsemane Parish for their kind entertainment.

Bishop McElwain closed the meeting with prayer and Blessing.

Report of Educational Secretary.

In January 1912, an Educational Secretary was appointed for the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Minnesota. Early in that year, letters were sent to each parochial branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to ascertain to what extent the study of missions had been pursued. "The Conquest of the Continent" had been used by eight different groups, as a text book, while the "Spirit of Missions" was used in about twelve branches. The report of the educational work done in Minnesota in 1912-13 showed an advance in mission study, as twenty study classes submitted reports, twelve classes having used "Japan-Advancing, Whither?"

In St. Paul and Minneapolis, the Educational Secretary conducted two interparochial classes, hoping thereby to train and enlist leaders. The Educational Secretary has made twenty-one visits to branches of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the Junior Auxiliary in Minneapolis and St. Paul, and conducted a class for older girls in each city.

The out of town visits have been to Austin and Hastings, to attend a regular monthly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, to Appleton, Owatonna and St. Peter to attend the meetings of the deanery held in those places, to Devils Lake, N. D., to conduct an institute held at the time of the Convocation, to Duluth to attend the annual meeting of the diocese of Duluth and to conduct a series of three lessons on "Methods," and to New York City to conduct a class on "China," at the time of the General Convention.

In order to be better prepared for work the Educational Secretary attended the conference of the Missionary Education Movement at Silver Bay, N. Y., in July 1912, and the Minnesota Summer School of Missions in June 1913.

With the co-operation of every member of the Woman's Auxiliary in Minnesota, with your prayers and with the grace of God, your Educational Secretary hopes to help the King and to hasten His coming.

There are only six Librarians in the Diocese, where there should be one in each Parish.

One Branch keeps up a library at St. Paul City Hospital. The girls who form this guild and have charge of the club-work in the parish, carry these books about the wards every Tuesday.

They have just added 30 new books to the 150 already there. There has been sent out during this time, 55 periodicals regularly, 8 boxes, 215 Easter-cards and 30 sheets of music.

Report of the Junior Auxiliary.

A glad note of encouragement rings always through the work of the Junior Auxiliary. It is the note of youthful enthusiasm, progression, devotion and consecration of body, mind and soul. Always the girls of S. Mary's Hall, Faribault, have given so generously to missions, but this year they surpassed themselves giving in value of boxes and money some \$624.80. Heretofore we have always depended upon their gifts to lift us over the thousand-dollar mark, but this year our parish branches climbed beyond it alone. Our boxes have gone to the Sheltering Arms, to Birch Coulee, to Wyoming, North Carolina, Montana, Cuba and Akita, Japan. Into these boxes have gone clothing, household necessities and toys for the Christmas treats. The branch at St. Peter, Minnesota have supported a little girl in the mission under the care of Rev. J. Mancebo, Santiago de Cuba. This branch is composed of young women ranging in ages from 23 years to 26 years and will be one of the first to be known as the Young Woman's Auxiliary. S. Paul's, Minneapolis claims the distinction of having the first young woman's branch.

The offering for the United Offering from the Juniors for the past three years was \$335. This is handed in yearly by the Juniors in March and may not be raised by any other means than birthday offerings, self-sacrifice or the results of individual earnings. In our endeavor to train the Juniors to aid more effectively in the General Apportionment for diocese and parish, we emphasize the apportionment by calling it our "unselfish gift" or "our Junior World-wide gift" and offer it at our annual meeting in May.

The Minneapolis Semi-Annual meeting was held in November at S. Andrew's Church. Miss Pelton of All Saints told the Christmas story.

The St. Paul Semi-Annual meeting was held at the Church of the Good Shepherd in November. The story was told by Miss Grace Denny. At both of these meetings the gifts were offered for Tryon, North Carolina. Much interest was aroused in this mission by the visit of Miss Catherine Moran who kindly visited the branches and speaking of the work.

The Annual meeting was held at Holy Trinity Church, Minneapolis in May. Helpful addresses were given by the Rev. Stanley Kilbourne of Holy Trinity and the Rev. Robert Wood of Ichang, China. The gifts were offered for Akita and Aomori, Japan. By a coup d'etat on the part of our beloved president of the Woman's Auxiliary, who is always present at our meetings, all of the Diocesan officers of the Senior branch were present.

Our study work for the year was based on the book, "The Honorable Little Miss Love" and the work was greatly aided by the classes held

by Miss Mary Smith who also arranged a Doll's Festival at S. Paul's Church, at which all the dolls offered for Japan were exhibited. Each Minneapolis branch was given some part to perform and the venture proved a successful one.

Again this year, we were called upon to mourn the loss by death of one of our faithful directresses, Miss Sarah Patten, Church of the Good Shepherd, St. Paul and with the diocese, the Juniors mourn the loss of the dear wife of our Bishop, Mrs. Grace Harmon Edsall. The new branch of Juniors at Holy Trinity organized just after her death, perpetuate her name being known as the Grace Harmon Edsall Branch.

We pay also a tribute to the eight years of faithful devoted work of Mrs. Charles Beard and Miss Nellie Jones, directress and associate directress of S. Clement's, St. Paul, who raised that branch to the record of "best" in the diocese and who laid down their offices only because of the pressure of many duties. We are grateful for their past inspiring aid.

Text.

Those who love them can still keep boxes and each Sunday put in a gift, and ask God’s blessing on His little ones who believe in Him, binding together the church militant and expectant.
